STAND OF KETCHIKAN PEOPLE CONFIRMED

BRITISH WARSHIP, ON COAST CRUISE, ARRIVED IN PORT THIS AFTERNOON

Alaska Editor Declares That People of Territory Wish to Capture Fish Packing Trade

Edward G. Morrissey thinks, however, that Prince Rupert and Ketchikan should get along

"While there may be business competition between Ketchikan and Prince Rupert there is no reason why there should be the most friendly of relations between the two ports," says Edward G. Morrissey, editor of the Ketchikan Chronicle who is a passenger going through today on the steamer George after a two months' trip east.

Mr. Morrissey is quite frank about his desire and that of Ketchikan business interests that there be no reduction in tariff on Canadian halibut

tariff on Canadian halibut

He goes further than this and says that he thinks that steps should be taken to oppose the marketing in the United States of halibut landed at other than American ports. Furthermore, he expresses objection at halibut from American bottoms landed and packed at Canadian ports for shipment to the States being still termed American halibut.

He says that, through the process, it has changed its status and is not properly to be treated as American fish.

Mr. Morrissey does not expect that the president will reduce the tariff on Canadian halibut.

As an instance of the difficulty of obtaining tariff reductions, Mr. Morrissey points to the recent case where the tariff commission recommended a reduction on the sugar tariff, the recommendation being rejected by the president.

Ultimate Benefit

Mr. Morrissey thinks that it will ultimately work to the benefit of Prince Rupert and Ketchikan if the proposition regarding halibut by the latter point is adopted. He foresees the inauguration of a car ferry service between Ketchikan and here which would bring to this port for shipment over the Canadian National Railway not only large quantities of halibut but also of canned salmon and other commodities.

Relations between the 2 ports would be improved thereby rather than strained. Ketchikan and other Alaska ports are, however, desirous of having the packing industry which really belongs to them. He thinks that it would not harm the American fishermen.

Mr. Morrissey is returning home after having attended the recent Rotary Club International convention at Cleveland and visited his old home in Massachusetts. His trip also took him to Washington, New York, Boston, Montreal, Toronto, Buffalo, Seattle and a number of other important cities.

Arctic Flight for Fifty is Planned

None for Trip by Dirigible in

1927 Given Soviet

MOSCOW, July 29.—Capt. Peter Bruns, of the Norwegian force, has arrived here from Berlin and submitted to experts scheme for a scientific air expedition to the Arctic in 1927 to be led by Dr. Fridtjof Nansen, the Norwegian explorer.

A dirigible of 150,000 metres capacity, 245 metres long, with a lifting capacity of 55,000 kilograms and a crew of fifty men, could be used.

The route would be from Kuransk to Franz Josef Land, via the north pole to Alaska or Anatolia, and back.

It is estimated that the flight from Kuransk to Anadir will occupy fifty hours.

SKEENA PACK
71,000 CASES

The total salmon pack for the Skeena River up to the end of last week was 71,000 cases of which 30,000 cases was sockeye. The pack in 1923 at similar date was 82,930 cases including 47,000 sockeye.

ARRIVAL OF HUSKY DOG AT PENTICTON CAUSES EXCITEMENT



EFFICIENT METHODS ON ROADS OF B.C.

Worst Roads in this Province are Better than Best in Alberta

VICTORIA, July 29.—Owing to the modern and efficient methods adopted by the Department of Public Works during the past few years the cost of supervision of roads has been reduced materially, and in most cases it is now lower than the percentage of total expenditure which the engineering profession consider reasonable in the case of private works. In a letter just received by the Department from a prominent Vancouver businessman on his return from a motor trip which took him as far as Alberta it is stated that the roads of the Province are in excellent condition. As compared with the sister province, the worst roads here are better than the best there, he told the department.

New Ontario Beverage Tax is Worrying Soft Drink Vendors; Customers Being Overcharged

OTTAWA, Ont., July 29.—(Canadian Press).—At the last session of the Ontario Legislature an Act was passed to supplement the revenue of the Crown in the Province of Ontario, and known as "The Luxury Tax Act of 1925." The object of the tax was to secure a revenue on the sale of beverages, which includes beer, ale, porter and any malt liquor, wines and other drinks prepared or manufactured from grapes or any other fruit, or from any plant or vegetable, also "soft" drinks of various descriptions, and other compounded or mixed drinks; mineral waters and aerated or carbonized waters, and drinks of every description.

This new Act has been giving the retail confectioners and grocers and the vendors of soft drinks all over Ontario a great deal of trouble and worry. A special committee of retail confectioners in the City of Ottawa recently consulted with E. M. Trowern, dominion executive director and secretary of the Retail Trade Bureau of Canada, a newly formed dominion wide organization with headquarters at Ottawa. Mr. Trowern, after careful consideration of the act, advises that he finds the position to be as follows:

"The purchaser of a beverage of any sort is required by the Act to pay the tax when he purchases the same from the retail merchant or vendor, and the retail merchant is required to collect the same as a trustee for the government. In the case of soft drinks of any sort, whether from a bottle or from a soda fountain, at the rate of taxation as set out in the Act, it would mean that the purchaser or the customer is required to pay a tax of three and one-eighth mills on every glass, and one quarter of one cent on every bottle of soft drink purchased. In other words,

The funeral service of the late Frank Morgan was held yesterday afternoon at Haynes' chapel. The remains are being shipped east accompanied by the father of the deceased.



Here and There

During July thousands of osteopaths and members of allied professions gathered in Toronto from all parts of the United States and Canada to attend the International Convention of Osteopaths. Several of the visitors toured the country in the interests of osteopathy.

Final figures showing the total live lobster catch on the Nova Scotia coasts, for the season ending June 1st, show a total of 8,585,000 lbs. valued at \$1,364,141, an increase over the 1924 season of 3,687,400 lbs., in quantity and approximately half a million dollars in value.

During his tour of Western Canada over the Canadian Pacific lines, Field Marshal Earl Haig was received on all sides by cheering and enthusiastic crowds. At towns in northern Ontario and elsewhere he shook hands and exchanged reminiscences with local ex-service men, many of whom he recognized.

Having concluded his visit to the Pacific Coast, His Excellency Lord Byng, Governor-General of Canada, has returned East. Before leaving the West His Excellency stayed off for a few days at Banff to meet Earl Haig, and the two famous soldiers spent some time together talking over old times.

Considerable interest has been aroused in London, England, over the arrival there of 8,000 peony blooms for exhibition in the Canadian Pacific pavilion at Wembley. The peonies were grown by W. Ormiston Roy of Montreal, and have been sent to England to dispel the belief that Canada's climate is excessively cold.

A delegation of prominent newspaper proprietors and journalists from Great Britain passed through Canada recently on their way to attend the Third Imperial Press Conference to be held at Melbourne, Australia, during September. Besides the delegates from the British Isles, representatives of Canada and the other Dominions have been invited and will attend the conference.

Two automobile accidents occurred in Montreal over the weekend at railway crossings, in both of which it was proven that the car struck the train. In the first accident the car ran into the first car behind the engine and in the second struck the side of the engine itself. Public attention has been directed to these accidents as illustrative of the results of negligent driving.

Early in July a party of one hundred French-Canadians associated with the University of Montreal departed from Windsor station on a three-weeks educational tour of the country under the auspices of the University. Mayor Duquette of Montreal, Monsignor A. V. J. Piette, rector of the University and Professor E. Montpetit one of his associates accompanied the party. They were seen off at the station by E. W. Beatty, K.C., chairman and president of the Canadian Pacific Railway and other officials.

A similar excursion to the above left Toronto, July 20th, for the benefit of English speaking school-teachers. This tour, also lasting three weeks and covering all principal points of the Dominion was conducted by Dean Sinclair Laird of MacDonald College under the auspices of the Teachers' Federation of Canada.

Mrs. Geo. M. Henning of Chicago arrived on the Prince George this morning and will spend sometime visiting with her nephew, Fred Henning of this city.

VATICAN GEMS WERE STOLEN

Daring Robbery Took Place Recently in Papal Edifice

ROME, July 29.—An audacious theft recently resulting in the loss of a variety of objects of considerable artistic and intrinsic value, though the principal treasures were not touched. The scene of the theft was the Treasury of St. Peter, located in the chapter house adjoining the basilica.

Building operations have been proceeding for some months on the first floor of this edifice, and were nearing completion. The thieves, whose number is guessed to be three, had evidently gained access, professedly in connection with these operations, to the room above the Treasury, which is on the ground level. Having made a hole in the ceiling and managed to conceal themselves when the workmen left at midnight they lowered themselves with a rope into the Treasury, broke the case, and seized numerous objects. Apparently they took alarm at some noise and left suddenly, with only a few articles whose value the Vatican authorities put at about £8,000.

Famous Jewels

The stolen articles include the famous sapphire and diamond ring fitting the finger of the statue of St. Peter, on which in practice an imitation ring is placed; a gold and pearl Communion set given by Cardinal Merry del Val; several jewelled chalices and crosses, including a cross of gold and emeralds given
