IMPRESSIVE FUNERAL FOR QUEEN MOTHER

SUPERINTENDENT FOR NEW ELEVATOR ARRIVES PRINCE RUPERT FOR DUTY

King Walks Alone Behind the Casket of Queen Alexandra as it is Taken to Westminster Abbey

Icy hand of winter on land as it was when Princess Alexandra came from her native land to Britain

LONDON, Nov. 27.—Winter, reaching out her icy hand, laid tribute on the bier of Alexandra, Britain's Queen Mother, today, covering the casket with a fleecy blanket of snow as it was trundled on a gun carriage from the Chapel Royal in St. James' Palace to Westminster Abbey where the simplest funeral services were held. Thus the Sea King's daughter departed from the capital of her adopted state as she had entered it, for snow was falling on that day sixty years ago when she came from Denmark to be the wife of the British prince who later became King Edward.

King George followed the casket, walking alone, while abreast, immediately behind him, came the kings of Belgium, Norway and Denmark, and back of them the Prince of Wales and his brothers.

In the Abbey was Queen Mary surrounded by the queens of Spain, Norway and Belgium, Princess Mary and Duchess of York.

The occasion was a very solemn one. LONDON, Nov. 27.—An Exchange Telegraph reports that the council of ministers under Mustapha Kemal has decided to refuse compulsory arbitration by the League of Nations in the dispute with Britain over the Mosul territory.

The territory is important because it is an oil producing country and Britain needs the oil for her navy and merchant marine.

UNION OIL CO. MAY COME HERE

Big Fuel Corporation is Now Negotiating For Site at This Port

The Union Oil Co., one of the most powerful rivals of the Imperial Oil Co., which is already established here, is negotiating for a waterfront site in Prince Rupert on which to start business. If negotiations are brought to a successful conclusion, the company will probably set up a big plant here, including tanks and docks. A large service station in a central part of the city is also believed to be on the company's program.

EARTHQUAKE AT VICTORIA RUMBLES FOR FEW SECONDS

VICTORIA, Nov. 27.—An earthquake with its centre six miles from here, probably beneath the straits of Juan de Fuca, was registered at 1:37 yesterday afternoon. It was accompanied by a slight rumbling lasting two or three seconds. Bellingham also recorded the quake.

Personal Property Tax Is Doomed.

Last year the Provincial Government reduced the personal property tax fifty per cent and yesterday in his budget speech Hon. J. D. MacLean, minister of finance, announced that it would be further reduced by ten per cent. He also promised that if it was found practicable to substitute a gross income tax for it, the tax would be abolished altogether next year.

Thus at last the Liberal Government is likely to fulfil the promise made at the election when they were first returned to power. During the early days of their administration it was found so difficult to finance that it was impossible to make the change. It has been done gradually and in that way the finances have not been affected injuriously.

Reduction Made In Income Tax.

The Provincial Government has made a reduction in the income tax as well as in the personal property tax, and still expects to have a small surplus at the end of the year.

It is a great thing for the province to have the financial condition as healthy as it is in British Columbia today. It is in marked contrast to previous administrations when there was a yearly deficit. Prior to that again the income was derived largely from land and timber sales but in those days there was no railway deficit to pay.

Shall We Curtail Debate On Address.

When the Lieutenant Governor reads the speech from the throne which is prepared for him by the cabinet at the beginning of the session of the Legislature each year, an address in reply is formally moved and seconded and then a general debate follows, lasting for a week or two during which members of the opposition lash the government for their shortcomings and the supporters of the government pat them on the back and at the same time draw attention to the needs and importance of their own constituencies. There is no necessity to keep to the subject because it is an occasion when every member is supposed to have an opportunity to give vent to his views on any matter ever so slightly related to administration or legislation.

The cost of keeping the Legislature going for those two weeks is very considerable and the people have to pay for it. Yet it acts as a sort of safety valve for the people. Matters are brought to public attention there which could not be aired in any other way.

Proposal To Abolish Free For All Debate.

A proposal is now made to abolish the free for all debate on the address. It is claimed that it is a pure waste of time and that the country would be much better without it. Nothing of a constructive nature is ever said and members take refuge behind the parliamentary prerogative to say things which they dare not say on the street. In other words it is claimed that the privilege of free speech is abused and that it would be better for the country if it were no longer allowed. Any member having a matter of importance to bring before the House may do so by resolution or by introducing a private bill. He also has the privilege of questioning the ministers and of speaking during any of the debates as long as he keeps to the subject under discussion.



SCIENTISTS ARE TO VISIT PORT

Pacific Committee of Biological Board Arranges Work for Local Station

At a meeting of the Pacific committee of the biological board at Vancouver, from which John Dykhavn has just returned, Mr. Finn and Mr. Reid of Manitoba were appointed scientists to the Prince Rupert biological station. They will arrive here shortly to commence investigations into problems connected with the freezing of fish. Pending completion of the station at this port, arrangements have been made for them to carry on their research work at the plant of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.

The meeting further decided that, in connection with the experiments into the problems of freezing, advisory committees would be appointed to assist in the matter. One of these committees will be formed in Vancouver and another at Prince Rupert. The committees have not yet been named.

Experimental Station

At the meeting, which was held in Vancouver on November 23, it was decided that the name of the Prince Rupert station would be "The Pacific Experimental Station for Fisheries" corresponding with the station on the Atlantic coast.

The meeting, Mr. Dykhavn reports, was furnished with a report on fish tagging operations during the past summer. It was interesting to note that fish tagged on the west coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands were caught as far south as the Columbia river and north into Alaskan waters.

The principal item dealt with by the meeting was the consideration and preparation of estimates for the next season which will be presented to a general executive meeting of the biological board to be held in Ottawa early in January.


