WESTERN PROVINCES ARE UNIT AGAINST DELAYING EQUAL FREIGHT RATES

Western Provinces are United Against Action Revise Freight Order

VANCOUVER, Sept. 15.—R. G. McPherson, former postmaster of Vancouver, was chosen last night to be Liberal candidate for Vancouver South. He is an old time Liberal and was member for one term before being postmaster.

Hon. Simon Fraser Talmie, veterinarian former minister of agriculture in the Meighen government, was chosen last night by the Conservatives of Victoria to again contest that seat.

MEIGHEN DENIES KING CHARGES

Says Never Uttered Word to Set One Race Against Other

DRUMMONSVILLE, Que., Sept. 15.—Hon. Arthur Meighen yesterday issued an absolute denial of the charges made by Premier King in his Alexandria speech that the Conservative leader was seeking to arouse race prejudice and feeling in the current election campaign. "Never in my life have I uttered words which either in meaning or inference tended to set one race against another," Mr. Meighen declared.

LAD STABBED SISTER'S BEAU

Man From Washington at Westminster Fair Picked up Girl But Boy Resents It

The victim said the assailant was a young boy who rushed at him with a jack-knife as he was talking to the lad's sister, whom he had "picked up."

OLDEST MASON DIES

Dr. J. H. Hillstead was 107 Years of Age, Possibly Oldest Mason in World

TWO DIVISIONS IN RUPERT

Returning officer E. H. Mortimer yesterday received the writ formally calling the federal election for the Skeena riding. Nominations take place on October 15 and the elections on October 29.

Prince Rupert is an urban polling district with two divisions. West of McBride Street is Urban Polling District Division 1, and east of McBride is division 2. Registrars of these districts are J. Lorne MacLaren and J. W. McKinley, respectively. They will sit to receive applications from new voters for inclusion on the lists commencing September 29 at 9 a.m. and the list will close September 30 at 9 p.m.

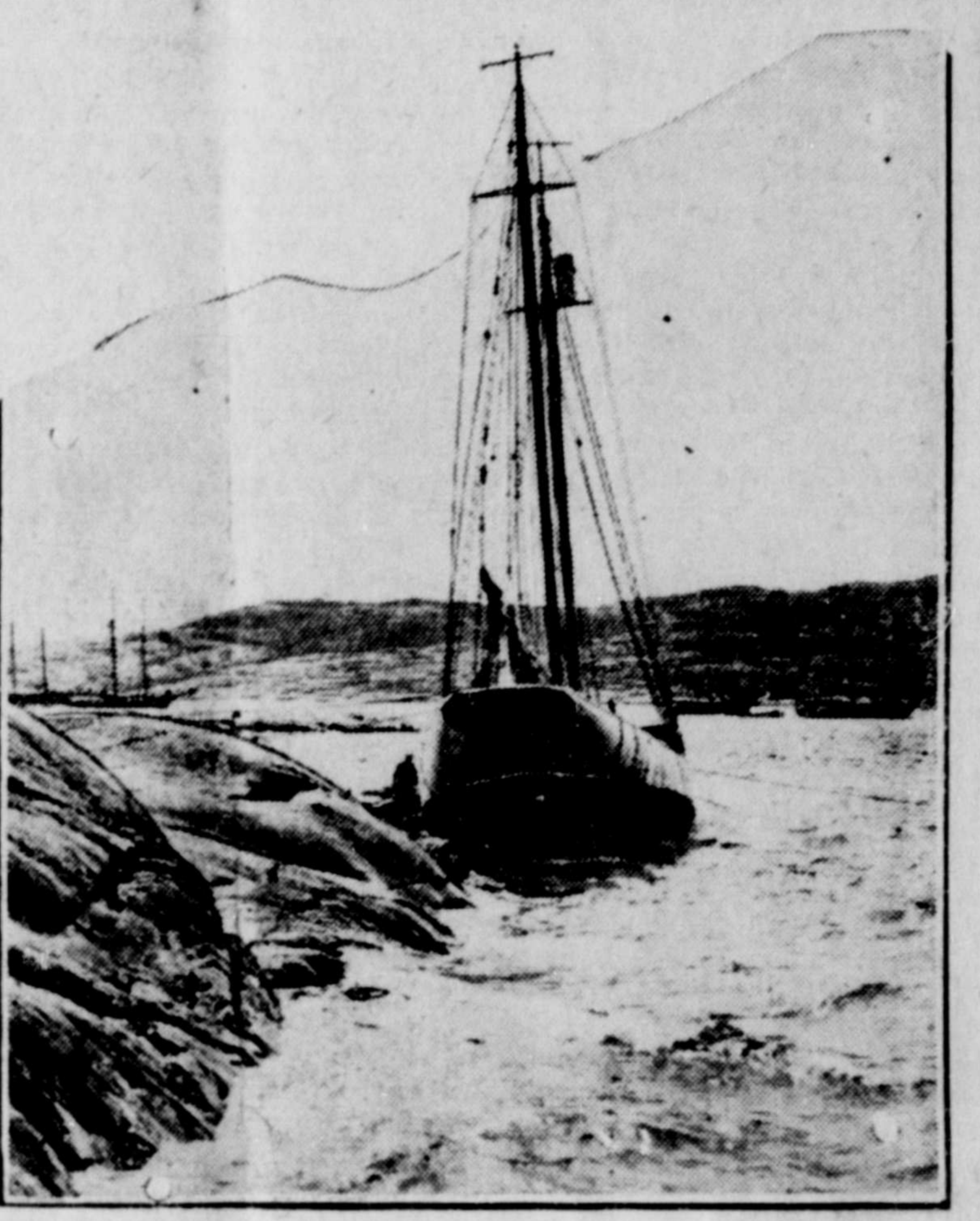
TROTSKY DECLARES ENGLAND IS HEADED TOWARD REVOLUTION

Big Contest in the Nomination Today for Mayor of New York; Hearst Press Backs Mayor Hylan

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—(By Canadian Press).—This is primary election day in the largest city on the continent, with more than a million voters eligible to cast their ballots to designate mayoralty nominees to carry the party standards at the municipal election on November 3. The polls open at 3 p.m. (daylight saving time) and close at 9 o'clock tonight.

Not in many years has there been such keen interest in a mayoralty fight on account of the bitter internecine warfare in both the Democratic and Republican parties.

Another fight underneath the surface is the battle between New York's popular governor, Alfred E. Smith, and William Randolph Hearst, the publisher, who has frequently attempted to assume the role of dictator in the Democratic party. If the Governor wins it will place him in the national limelight once more as a possible candidate for the Presidency. If he loses, he faces oblivion.

SIX ESCAPE COUNTY JAIL

Two Held For Nanaimo Bank Robbery and Others Get Away at Seattle

SEATTLE, Sept. 15.—T. H. Johnston and James Burns, awaiting extradition to Canada in connection with the Nanaimo bank robbery; Alvin Kilborne, held on a charge of robbery of the state bank at Bethwell last June when two companions were killed in a running fight; Lloyd Richardson, convicted of manslaughter for killing a Seattle policeman, and two other prisoners escaped from King County jail this morning.

CHINESE SHOT AT VICTORIA

VICTORIA, Sept. 15.—Wah Low Fong, a Chinese grocer, was shot and killed near his store on Government Street here last night by another unknown Chinaman. The police believe the murder to be the outcome of a personal quarrel.

VICTORIA, Sept. 15.—Chong Wong was found dead this morning in a disused lumber yard with a revolver clutched in his hand and a bullet hole in his head. Last night Wong killed Wah Low Fong in a quarrel.

Giant Project Endorsed to Harness Big Tides in Bay of Fundy by Maine

PORTLAND, Maine, Sept. 15.—The hundred million dollar project for harnessing the great tides in the Bay of Fundy to generate from 500,000 to 700,000 horsepower and supply power to the eastern sections of the United States and Canada was endorsed yesterday by Maine voters, the vote in favor being nine to one.

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—(By Canadian Press)—Hydraulic engineers of New York are quoted by the Herald-Tribune as saying that the project of Dexter P. Cooper to generate 500,000 to 700,000 horsepower by harnessing the tides in two inlets of the Bay of Fundy near Eastport, Maine, is not only feasible from an engineering point of view, but is "the most promising development in the electrical world in a decade."

The paper points out, however, that Canada will likely have something to say regarding the project, saying the sanction of the Canadian and United States governments will have to be secured.

According to the Herald-Tribune, Frederick Darlington, engineering expert for the Westinghouse Electric Company, who recently inspected the Passamaquoddy and Cobscook bays, in the Bay of Fundy, where for four years Mr. Cooper has been making preliminary surveys for his project, said he was convinced the plan will be carried through.

MANY WHALES ROSE HARBOR

Record Catch of 139 at That Station: Naden Harbor Got 59 and Kyuquot 83

VICTORIA, Sept. 15.—The Consolidated Whaling Company reports the season rather disappointing but there was no scarcity of whales at Kyuquot, though the vessel had to go to sea farther than formerly. Three boats captured 83 mammals at the Vancouver Island station.

STEVENS COMES TO SPEAK HERE

Leader of Conservatives in This Province to Speak Behalf of Bushby

VANCOUVER, Sept. 15.—Hon. H. H. Stevens, in charge of the Conservative campaign in the province, leaves for the north next week visiting Anyox, Prince Rupert and several other points where he will speak in behalf of the candidature of George Bushby.

Elections Are Now Rather Difficult.

In view of the election campaign that is now on it will be well for those in authority to look into the very strict regulations that bind the candidate and agents in future campaigns.

The prohibitions of the election law are not merely confined to gross corruption, but extend definitely to the influencing of voters by any of a variety of methods such as fear, fraud, violence, and even by such possible innocent acts as the supply of food or drink, or by the suggestion of benefits to follow from voting or refraining therefrom. The statutory provisions of this subject are very involved, and candidates are advised in the book of election instructions being sent out from Ottawa to see that their supporters confine themselves "to the administrative organization of the electoral district and the political education of the electors."

Another interesting point is that everyone employed by a candidate for pay or reward in relation to an election is disqualified from voting, and it is a serious offence if such a person attempts to mark a ballot. "Candidates and their official agents should, therefore, take effective steps to ensure the abstention from the polls of everyone who serves them otherwise than gratuitously."

Must Not Carry Bludgeons To Poll.

The electoral officer points out also that the "carrying of arms," or of even bludgeons, on polling day within a mile of any polling station is prohibited. Not only the selling, but also the giving away of any "spirited or fermented liquor" on polling day is an offence "if the sale or gift is made within any hotel, shop, or other place." Anyone who pays an elector's fare or who hires or lets a conveyance for the purpose of taking electors to or from the polls is guilty of an offence, which, although committed by an agent without the knowledge of the candidate, is sufficient to have the election set aside.

The old trick of publishing anonymous scandal sheets in the dying hours of a campaign has not the same possibilities it used to have. In order that the responsibility for this kind of printed matter may be brought home to the persons who publish them, the law requires that there shall appear on every advertisement, poster, dodger, etc., issued in reference to an election, the name and address of the printer and the person by whom it is published. The omission of this information renders both printer and customer liable to penalties.

Regarding campaign funds—with one not unimportant exception all contributions to any campaign fund must be made by individuals. No unincorporated association or company may under any circumstances apply its funds for election purposes, even through an official agent, and this is equally true of all incorporated bodies, except those which have been incorporated for political purposes alone. The individuals belonging to or accepting for any organization not falling within the exception become individually liable to heavy punishment. A candidate will not become liable to punishment by reason of the innocent acceptance of such money, but candidates and their official agents will, if they are wise, refuse to receive any subscription from any company or association unless it has been incorporated for political purposes exclusively.

These indicate some of the pitfalls along the straight and narrow path of the prospective statesman. One unwary step on the part of a candidate or his followers will put the opponent on the band wagon at the last day.

Evolution as Much a Fact as Crumbling of Mountains and Erosion of the Deep Valleys

Long before Darwin's time men had speculated upon the possible evolution of one species or one type of animals from others. Even if we leave out of account the suggestions of other eras of thought, such as those of the ancient Greek epoch or of St. Augustine in the early period of Christianity, and confine ourselves to the unitary development of Western thought which started with the Renaissance, we find numerous thinkers who advanced evolutionary theories. Prominent among these were Erasmus Darwin, Lamarck, and Robert Chambers. The merit of Charles Darwin, however, was twofold. First, the facts themselves assumed a new form in his hands. As presented by his predecessors, they had provided a legitimate basis for speculation. His industry and patient reasoning piled and chained them until they formed a chain of circumstantial evidence so cogent that but one conclusion was possible. And, secondly, he provided a theory to account for the facts and the conclusions drawn from them, and a theory which in its broad lines was seen at once to satisfy all the requirements made on it. That is to say, whereas the theories advanced by earlier evolutionists had been either vague to uselessness or at variance with biological knowledge, Darwin, at the same time as he made inevitable the conclusion that evolution had occurred, provided a plausible and reasonable explanation of the mechanism by which evolution could have been brought about.

"Only a Theory"

What the evidence was which he collected in such overwhelming battalions I have attempted to outline in my first article. He marshalled it and showed that all of it was consistent with the idea that the various forms within a group had developed or evolved from some common ancestral form, while a great deal of it was inconsistent with the only other theory which had been put forward to account for the facts—namely, the theory that all the hundreds of thousands of different existing species had been created as they are, once and for all, by a divine fiat. Indeed, for much of the evidence no other theory seemed possible than that of evolution. Especially was this true of the succession of related fossil types in the rocks of one area, and of the existence in embryos of higher animals of organs like gill-slits or notochord now found in the adults of lower types from which the higher forms could be presumed to be descended.

People sometimes talk of the theory of evolution as "only a theory." It is "only" a theory in this sense—that no one has yet watched all the stages by which one species is produced from another species or one group from another group; and this, of course, is chiefly a matter of time, since evolutionary processes appear to demand centuries or millennia instead of years or decades. But a scientific theory, in the accepted and proper sense of the term, is (as opposed to a mere hypothesis) an attempted explanation which not only satisfies the known facts but enables us to prophesy other facts, and does so better than any other explanation that has been advanced.

Later Confirmation

This is very much the case with the theory of evolution. Generations of biologists have been digging up facts all over the world since 1859, yet no single one of these has been hostile to the theory of evolution. Many of them (especially the detailed studies of fossils and the proof of the chemical similarity of the blood of animals which the evolutionist claims as closely related), support it more cogently and in greater detail than those which Darwin had at his command. And many of the facts have been unearthed because the evolution theory made us suspect that they should be there if search were made—for instance, the discovery of extinct men and ape-men in varying degrees intermediate between modern man and the higher apes.

Let me repeat that not only does it account for the facts better than any other theory, but that no other theory has ever been advanced which is not immediately and conclusively negated by large bodies of known fact. In this way evolution is as much a fact as that mountains have been raised by foldings of

the earth's crust, deep valleys carved out by erosion, and islands like our own separated from the mainland by gradual subsidence. The evidence in both cases is circumstantial, not direct; but it is none the less conclusive.

Darwin's Argument

The new method which Darwin advanced to account for evolution was what he called natural selection. The following was his line of argument: If we look at the domestic breeds of one animal we shall often—as with dogs or pigeons, for instance—find them so different from each other than a systematic unacquainted with the facts would classify them in different species, genera, or even families. This diversity has been brought about by the artificial selection of man in a few centuries or at most millennia. If we can find any selective process at work in nature it would have whole acaons in which to work, and could account for the diversity of animal and plant forms, for the beautiful way in which they are adapted to their mode of life, and for the fact that improvement accompanied by extinction of less satisfactory types has taken place during geological time. Now, as Darwin proceeded to point out, this selective process must exist, since it follows automatically from the following known facts: First, that variations are constantly occurring in all directions in organisms; secondly, that certain kinds at least of these variations are inherited; thirdly, that in all species, even the slowest breeding, more young are produced than can survive. The last fact must lead to a struggle for existence; this will lead to a survival of the fittest; and this, with the aid of the first two sets of facts, to a progressive hereditary alteration of species—in other words, to evolution.

Acquired Characters

Other explanations of evolution have been offered. The only ones that demand serious consideration are various modifications of the original Lamarckian hypothesis, which assumes that the effects of use and disuse, the effects of training, or the direct effects of external environment accumulate in the race—in other words, that acquired characters are inherited. For this, however, no conclusive proof has ever been offered. Weismann showed on what unsatisfactory evidence the accepted belief in the process rested. Later work, such as that of Kamberger, has not yet been accepted because so far no other scientist has been able to confirm his results. It is highly probable that in certain cases we shall find other agencies affecting the germ plasma; but it is to all intents and purposes certain that neither the important large steps in evolution nor the fine details of adaptation of organs can have been accomplished by this means.

The key to the problem remains in the study of variation. Variation of evolutionary value starts in the hereditary constitution, not in the modifications

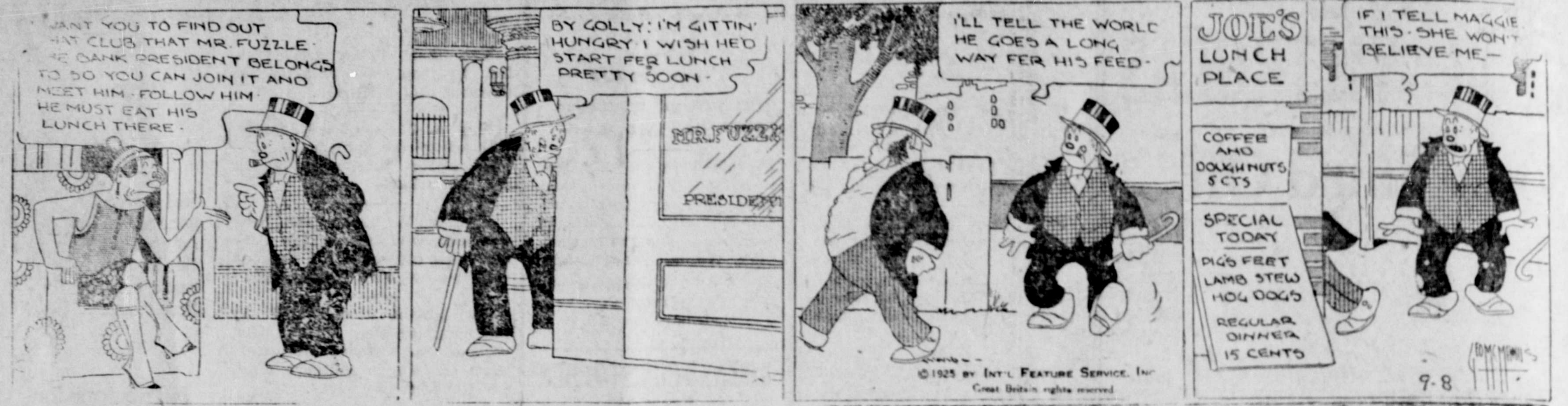

TREASURER TO CONVENTION

D. J. Matheson to be City Delegate to Union of B.C.

City Treasurer D. J. Matheson will leave at the end of the week for Victoria where he will attend the convention of the Union of B.C. Municipalities to be held in that city next week. Authorization for the treasurer to make the trip was given at the meeting of the city council last night.

Recommendations that it is proposed to put before the convention were also discussed at the meeting last night. One of these will ask that the local improvement act be so amended as to provide that on streets not graded to full width and having a sidewalk on one side only, both sides receiving the benefit of the sidewalk, lots on both sides share in the cost. The division suggested is two-thirds for the side having the sidewalk and one-third for the opposite side. At present the side having the sidewalk has to pay the full cost.

Another recommendation proposed to the Union by this city will be that the time for giving notice of tax sale be extended from six months to eight months.

Tax Penalties

Another proposed recommendation which caused the council last night a good deal of discussion was one that the penalties for non-payment of taxes by certain rates be removed and that discount for prompt payment be substituted. There was considerable difference of opinion as to the wisdom of this move. Ald. Casey and Ald. Stephens were in favor of the change while Ald. McMorrie, Ald. Larsen, Ald. Perry and Ald. Brown were inclined to oppose it. Mayor Newton was in doubt. Finally it was decided to leave the matter over until next week for further consideration, when it is probable that a compromise recommendation will be decided upon calling for a reduction in the present penalties of ten and five per cent.

Uniform Accounting

Besides these matters, it was reported to the council by the mayor that Mr. Matheson was anxious to support at the convention a recommendation from the city of Nelson that a uniform system of municipal bookkeeping be put into effect throughout the province.

Mr. Matheson will also attend in Victoria the convention Municipal Officers' Association of B.C. which will take place at the same time. This convention will deal with technical matters, particularly municipal accounting.

BOND ISSUE UPSET BY ERROR IN DATE

Royal Financial Corporation Advised City It Will be Held Responsible for Cemetery Road Debetures

A technical error with regard to the date of the recent bond issue covering the construction of the cemetery road has led the Royal Financial Corporation of Vancouver to advise the city that it will be held liable for bonds sold under that issue.

Reporting on the matter, the city solicitor advised the council last night of his opinion that the Royal Financial Corporation had no claim against the city and that, as the bonds on being bought from the city by the Royal Financial Corporation were subject to endorsement by counsel for the company, the company could not have lost money on bonds that could only be sold subject to such legal opinion.

Mayor Newton stated that when the error, involving one day in the date of the bonds, had been discovered, the Royal Financial Corporation had been asked to call in the bonds and take others in their place until the issue could be revoked by the people. Nothing more had been heard until the treasurer had received the wire stating that the city would be held responsible for them. The opinion of the city solicitor had then been sought and it was now presented. He (the mayor) suggested that the matter be left in the hands of the city treasurer and city solicitor to take up with the Royal Financial Corporation and that, if satisfactory arrangements could not be made, the issue be again referred to the people for their re-endorsement.

It was moved by Ald. Casey, seconded by Ald. Perry, and carried, that the course as suggested by the mayor be taken and that the city treasurer and city solicitor report back to the council.

Democrats, the Republicans are linking their chons in anticipation of a juicy meal of tiger meat—the Tiger being a popular name for Tammany.

Tammany Machine Backing

Senator Walker, has the tremendous benefit of the support of the Tammany Hall machine, one of the most smooth running political machines in the United States—a regular stone crusher. In addition, he has an attractive personality and has been called a "second Al Smith" on account of his popularity.

The Mayor has the somewhat luke-warm backing of the regular country machine in his home town, Brooklyn, and in the smaller boroughs of Queens and Richmond. But in these boroughs, there have been wholesale desertions of party leaders, who stand in fear of incurring the enmity of the thoroughly aroused Tammany Tiger.

The position of the Mayor of

New York is one of the prize-plums in municipalities in the United States. The term is for four years and the salary is \$25,000 per annum. The mayor presides over the destinies of an army of more than 50,000 employees and has numerous "fat" appointive positions. In no city in the United States is there greater patronage from a financial standpoint.

Unusual precautions have been taken to preserve order throughout the five boroughs of the greater city, where a record vote is anticipated. Several police guards were stationed this morning in the congested districts in the tenement sections, where there have been disorders in other years. The returns will be tabulated at police headquarters.

In view of the many contests, not only for mayor but for scores of minor offices, the result probably will not be known until long after midnight.

With two months of inactivity facing outside athletes and fans, the question again arises as to the possibility of staging football games in Prince Rupert during the fall and winter as it is done in other parts of this province, particularly on Vancouver Island and the lower mainland. As far as weather is concerned, the game could be played here just as well as in the south but the difficulty is in getting the time for it. As far as the merchants are concerned, Thursday afternoons could be used and the offices close on Saturday afternoons. As things now stand, on neither of these half holidays could the teams be mustered to full strength. There is the suggestion that football games could be played on Sunday afternoons but the law to a certain extent prevents this and there is a good deal of sentiment against Sunday ball which some of the soccer players share. The evenings in the fall and winter, being so short, are, of course, impossible. Perhaps some readjustment of the weekly half-holiday law might be effected to meet the situation if the time could be arranged, there would seem to be no reason why football could not be played here up to Christmas and beyond giving Prince Rupert outdoor sport practically the year round.

Big billiards will soon be the thing again, and the first of the great tournaments starts at the end of the month, when the national three-cushion tournament of the United States is inaugurated. The great attraction as a matter of course will be Willie Hoppe, who has just taken into himself a new wife. Hoppe for years specialized at and held the championship of the balk-line game, and some say that the reason that he lost the honors was because he devoted too much time to practicing three-cushion shots. There will be only eight contestants as Cannifax, a champion at this style of play, is



LA FOLLETTE FOR SENATOR

Son of Former Leader up for
Nomination in Wisconsin
Today May be Beaten

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—
(By Canadian Press).— Political
issues of more than ordinary
importance hang on the result
of the primary to be held today
in Wisconsin and the special
election September 29, to fill the
Senate vacancy left by the death
of Senator La Follette. The
contest is recognized as of na-
tion wide importance and the
outcome is being watched with
keen interest by the political
leaders of both parties and in-
surgents and independents.

Basically, the question is
whether the conservatism which
now dominates the republican
party and the national adminis-
tration shall wipe out, or at
least greatly weaken, the pro-
gressivism and independence
which for years have obtained in
Wisconsin because of the efforts
of that indomitable fighter, the
late Senator La Follette. While
Senator La Follette was alive, he
was always able, when he ran,
to sweep the state and in a gen-
eral way to keep it in large
measure from being dominated
by the so-called "old-guard" re-
publicans. Now that he is dead,
the republican organization of
the state and the nation, with
the backing of President Coolidge,
is making a great effort to
gain control and crush the La
Follette organization and the
"progressive" elements.
