JAP LABORERS EXPELLED FROM TOLEDO

BRITISH GOVERNMENT TO ESTABLISH COURT OF INQUIRY LABOR DISPUTE

Rounded up Japanese and Carried them out of County from Mill

Mob of about Four Hundred Men and Women and Children Escorted Orientals away from Toledo, Oregon

TOLEDO, Oregon, July 13.—Overcoming armed guards a mob of about four hundred men, women and children rounded up the Japanese laborers in the mill operated by the Pacific Spruce Corporation here and loaded them with their belongings into trucks and carried them beyond the county line yesterday. The employment of Orientals in the mill has been a subject of agitation here for some time culminating in the action taken yesterday.

VICTORIA GIRL WON AT TENNIS

Took Everything in Sight at Final
Championship Games in Van-
couver

CROCKER MEN'S CHAMP. Record in Number of Games is Set in Men's Singles

VANCOUVER, July 13.—Before nearly 2,000 enthusiastic spectators the finals in the Canadian lawn tennis championships were played here Saturday afternoon.

Willard Crocker and Jack Wright of Montreal defeated Wallace Scott of Tacoma and Leon DeLorenne of Seattle in the men's doubles, 6-3, 6-2, 6-0, 6-2. Crocker beat Scott in the men's singles, 4-6, 9-7, 18-16, 6-2, the score in the third set establishing a new Canadian record for the number of games to which it went.

Miss Marjorie Leeming won the women's singles from Mrs. H. F. Wright of Ottawa, 7-5, 6-4.

In doubles Miss Leeming and Miss Tatlow of Victoria defeated Mrs. Muir and Mrs. Wright, 6-1, 6-1. Miss Leeming and John Proctor of Victoria took the mixed doubles championship from Miss Dot Gillespie and John McGill of Vancouver, 6-3, 6-3.

HINDU STABBED BY COUNTRYMAN

Died Almost Instantly Following
Attack When Sitting in
Ranch Truck

KELOWNA, July 13.—Taka Singh, an elderly Hindu, fatally stabbed Gajor Singh, a fellow countryman and is held by the police in connection with the affray.

Gajor Singh, it is alleged, attacked Taka with a knife during an altercation among a number of East Indians here late Saturday.

Taka was stabbed in the neck, chest and abdomen while sitting in a ranch truck, dying almost instantly.

TORONTO, July 13.—Violent deaths in Eastern Canada were again numerous over the week end, no less than 13 being reported mainly through automobile and bathing fatalities.

FAVORS RENEWAL OF THE SEALING TREATY

Senator Dill A so Would Stop
U.S. Government Using
B.C. Coal

ANCHORAGE, July 13.—Renewal of the Pelagic sealing treaty with Canada when it expires in 1926 will be urged in Congress by Senator Dill of Washington, he declared here Saturday, following an inspection of the seal rookeries of the Pribiloff Islands.

The senator also declared himself in favor of legislation to encourage Alaska coal operators by preventing British Columbia coal being used by the Government.

Battle of Boyne Fought in Miniature at Glasgow and Many Heads are Sore Today

GLASGOW, July 13.—Many sore heads are being nursed among the Irish on the Clyde district today as souvenirs of a giant celebration of the anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne here Saturday night and Sunday morning.

Fully 50,000 Orangemen attended the ceremonies in the outlying parks Saturday. The trouble began when the demonstrators marching back to the city encountered bands of Sinn Feiners waving green flags.

Burns Will Build Cold Storage Plant at once on the Waterfront but no Abattoir there just now

Construction will start within a day or so on the Cold Storage plant for P. Burns & Co. according to R. Moore, local manager for the firm.

J. McMahon, engineer for the company, arrived in the city this morning from Vancouver on the Prince Charles, and will be in the city for some time until the work is under way. Later, the company's architect will arrive from the south as the work proceeds.

It is the intention of the company to have an up-to-date plant in every respect, suitable to take care of the business offering at this point, and the plans have been already approved and everything is in readiness to proceed.

An abattoir will not be constructed in connection with the plant, but a site will be selected which will possibly be more convenient for this purpose.

The plant should be ready in the course of a few weeks, to take care of the trade of this section of the country.

British Government to Conduct Inquiry into Coal Mining Dispute

LONDON, July 13.—Premier Baldwin announced in the House of Commons today that the government had decided to establish a court of inquiry regarding the causes which have led to the present dispute between operators and employees in the coal mining industry in this country.

There is a concerted effort being made to reduce wages and extend the working hours and this is being met by the labor unions who are opposed to such a move.

SALMON FISHING WAS BADLY INTERRUPTED WEATHER CONDITIONS

Boats B own away from Grounds
Far Away as Wark
Channel

The salmon fishing which started out well on the Skeena River last week got gradually worse as the week advanced. Much of the time it was impossible to fish owing to rough seas. Some boats were blown twenty to thirty miles away from the fishing grounds taking refuge in Wark Channel.

Most of the fishing is done outside the river so far as there are not many sockeye in the Skeena.

ROUGH WEATHER HIPPO ISLAND

Plenty of Spring Salmon There
But Weather Too Bad for
Boats to Operate

Spring salmon fishing has been much interrupted at Hippo Island by the bad weather during the past week. There are plenty of fish but the seas have been so rough that it has been impossible for boats to operate except at intervals. A great many of the boats have left but most of the Skeena and Vancouver boats are still there. The fleet now numbers only about seventy boats, whereas at one time earlier in the season there were one hundred and fifty operating. As soon as the sealing season opened many of them left for the rivers.

Only a few cohoes have been taken and fifteen cents each is all the fishermen get for them so they are not very keen on taking them. At Dundas Island the price is thirty-five and forty cents.

Yesterday the fish packing boat Chief Zibassa arrived in port with 56,000 pounds of springs and a few cohoes and halibut.

RAIN WELCOME IN INTERIOR

Crops Improved by Moisture: Farmers Will Raise Grain Next Year Says Visitor

Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Hunter and son, Billy, returned on yesterday afternoon's train after having spent a fortnight at Lake Kathleen at Mrs. Birnie's summer camp. Lake Kathleen is a very attractive spot and possesses all the natural advantages that should make it a popular summer resort. There is good trout fishing in the lake and the bathing is fine. The water is quite warm and there are good natural beaches. Among the guests at the lake are parties of Canadian girls in training from such points as Smithers and Hazelton. Some of these girls practically live in the water.

During the past fortnight, Mr. Hunter reports, there has been a good deal of rainy weather throughout the Bulkley Valley. While such conditions make camping not quite as pleasant as it might have been, the district, after a long dry spell, was badly in need of moisture and it has been of great benefit to the grain and root crops though they had already suffered from drought. The rain was also timely in bringing into check some forest fires, especially that between Lake Kathleen and Evelyn in fighting which at one time there were over one hundred men engaged. The flames swept along both sides of the railway track for some five miles but did little damage to timber, the fire just getting into the heavy timber when the rain came and practically extinguished it.

Some of the Bulkley Valley farmers are already talking of shipping grain to the Prince Rupert elevator when it gets in operation this fall. This possibility of disposing of grain it is felt should be an incentive to grain production throughout the central interior.

The town of Smithers, after a rather quiet winter and spring, is quite busy again. Contributing to the impetus is the resumption of mining operations at the Dulhieu mine. There is also a sawmill in operation along the railway track just west of Smithers.

FAMOUS BIRD MAN WAS HERE

Jack Miner With Party of Buchanan Boys on Way North

Notable among the 286 tourist passengers who were aboard the C.P.R. steamer Princess Charlotte, Capt. Bennett, northbound from Vancouver to Alaska this morning were a party of 73 boys—66 American and seven Canadian—whose trip has been made possible by George Buchanan, well known Detroit capitalist, who visited the city a couple of years ago with a similar party. So far, the boys had been having the time of their lives with more wonders developing the farther north they go. They will go to Skagway on the Princess Charlotte and will then proceed to White Horse and Atlin, returning south next week on the Princess Louise.

The lads range in ages from 11 to 19 years and are nearly all attending school. A movie man is also with the party. To make the trip it was necessary for the boys to pay one-third of the cost, \$125, with money which they earned themselves, their parents advanced another one-third where possible, and the balance was put up by Mr. Buchanan with the understanding that it be repaid before the boys reach manhood, the fund to be kept intact to provide trips of a similar nature for other boys.

Perhaps the most notable individual with the party is "Uncle" Jack Miner, of Kingsville, Ontario, the famous Canadian bird naturalist, whose studies and work with wild fowl have attracted attention. Others in the party, which numbers 90 altogether, are George Buchanan, the leader, Mr. and Mrs. Loomis, Mrs. Miner, Miss Beatrice Buchanan (Chatham, Ont.), Miss Gibson, Mr. Beers and Dr. Lindenfesty, the medical man in charge.

SPORT DETERIORATION IS SUGGESTED RESULT TOO MANY SPECTATORS

Fewer Today Who Play For Love of the Game Says Newspaper Article

While we are deploring the decline of lacrosse in Canada and steps are being taken to revive interest in that game, we find that similar concern is being expressed across the border with respect to baseball, says the Edmonton Journal. The National Amateur Athletic Federation has made a survey and learns that, while the crowds at the major league matches are larger than ever, there is a steady decrease in those who play. It reports that professionalism, working down from the big leagues into the small town teams, is to blame in a large part for the waning of the game. Then, too, as cities grow, the sand lot is harder to find and harder to get to. The young player who plays for the fun of it and the love of it, not only finds difficulty in getting into a game of baseball, but if he makes a place for himself on an amateur team, he is frequently obliged to compete against players imported and paid. It is only a matter of time under these conditions for the sport to deteriorate seriously even in its highly organized branches. As an English parodist once wrote: Ill fares a game to hastening ill a prey. When gates accumulate and men decay.

The whole bill of fare served up in the sport line did not amount to much in the past week. Scarcely any of the games scheduled could be played, and there is now considerable interest in several local fixtures which are billed for this week. The Callies and Vets are anxious to settle the Dominion Cup for another year, and from the attitude of supporters of each team it is evident that there will be a contest worth watching.

The local fans are hoping that it will be possible to stage a real good game of baseball before long. If outside teams are to play here during the Fair week let us unite in putting in a team which will show the visitors that we are on the baseball map. To develop that team, and to have them coached properly will require the closest co-operation of all the players as well as captains and coaches. The local

STRANGE COINS FROM FAR NORTH

Number Probably of Egyptian Origin Found at Mackenzie River Delta

EDMONTON, July 13.—Strange tales a-plenty come down from Canada's far northland, and strange finds are made, which carry the minds of men back to those early days of the first explorers—of Alexander Mackenzie, of Sir John Franklin, Hearne and many others.

Last summer at Aklavik in the Mackenzie delta, an Eskimo, digging idly in the dust, turned up what appeared to be a lump of heavy, dirt-encrusted copper. Breaking away the surface earth, he found a number of coins, all tightly packed together with the verdigris accumulated by many years of exposure.

He passed them on to an Indian in trade, and later, the Indian, travelling south on the A. & G. W. Railway, sold them to Brakeman Bradburn who was much interested in the find.

They proved to be some twenty in number principally copper, with a few of silver. All are of foreign origin, probably Egyptian, and, according to one coin collector to whom Mr. Bradburn sold a specimen, are around two hundred years old.

The most probable assumption as to how these coins came to have reached this distant corner of the world, is that they were taken in by some member of the crew of an American whaler, years ago, by way of Behring Strait.

TRAVEL IN HOUSE CAR TO STUDY BIRD LIFE

McPHERSON, Kans., July 13.—A study of bird-life from South Dakota to Mexico City, and back along the western coast of Mexico and the United States to Canada, will be made this summer by Prof. H. H. Nininger, head of the biology department of McPherson College here.

Prof. Nininger will make the trip under the auspices of the National Ornithology Society and it is expected to result in the most important discoveries in the interests of ornithology.

The party will start from western South Dakota and travel in a house-car built especially for the purpose. Care will be taken to keep well ahead of cold weather, so that the birds can be studied in advance of the migratory period for the American species. Crossing the Rio Grande, the party will continue south, gathering data on the species

SOUGHT TO PREVENT RESURRECTION OF CHRISTIANS KILLED

NEW YORK, July 13.—Dr. Earl R. Bull, missionary of the Methodist Episcopal Church in charge of the work in the Loo Choo Islands District of Japan, reports that in his travels about the island of Amakusa, he recently came across a huge grave marked by a large stone boulder on which it is stated that the heads of 11,111 Christians lie buried there.

He grave dates back to the year 1637, when the Japanese practically wiped out all the Christians who had been converted to that faith by Roman Catholic missionaries. The inscription over this grave tells that 33,333 Christians were slain, beheaded and buried. Their heads were buried in graves many miles distant from the rest of their bodies. Only one-third of the Christian heads were buried in this particular island.

When Dr. Bull made inquiries as to why the heads were buried in graves miles distant from the rest of the bodies, he was told, "When the Catholic priests preached about the resurrection, they said that Christians would rise again. Fearing that it might be true, the officials of the persecuting Shogun determined that they would make it impossible for them to rise again by separating different parts of the bodies of the dead Christians. If their heads were buried in one township and other parts of their bodies in another township, they concluded that the resurrection was then impossible."
