PEACE RIVER AND ALBERTA

GRAIN VESSELS AT VANCOUVER

Sixteen Clear From Port During Week With Cargoes but Wheat Arrivals Slow

WINNIPEG, Nov. 28.—From the head of Lake Superior, 91 vessels cleared with 12,505,000 bushels of grain during the week and during the same time 16 vessels cleared from Vancouver with approximately 1,531,000 bushels.

COLONEL HEADS ORGANIZATION

The conference is continuing today with the election of officers which will be completed.

BRIAND HEADS FRENCH STATE

Succeeds in Difficult Task of Forming Cabinet with Confidence of Chamber

PARIS, Nov. 28.—After efforts of several others had failed, Premier Briand, "the man of the hour" in France, has formed a cabinet, which it is expected will secure the confidence of the Chamber of Deputies.

M. Briand's health has not been good for some time and he has been reluctant to lead the government again, but offered to serve under Senator Doumer.

Briand has two difficult tasks ahead of him. His first is to grapple with the financial problems of the country and another equally important is to deal with the international relationships with Russia.

DUTHIE MINE GOING STRONG

Will Start Shipping Carload of Ore Daily—Staff Will be Increased

Gypsies Burned to Death and Those Implicated Are Being Tried on Charge of Murder

MOSCOW, Nov. 28.—Twenty-six peasants are being tried for murder as a result of the burning alive of two gypsies in a village near here.

The superstitious peasants suspected the victims of being witches and a crowd of three hundred attacked them in the woods. After beating them, they built a bonfire, placing the victims in the flames with a tree trunk over them to prevent escape.

MILL AT BURNABY BURNS AT LOSS OF ABOUT \$60,000

VANCOUVER, Nov. 28.—Fire this morning destroyed the sawmill and boiler room as well as several hundred thousand feet of lumber of the Lowmoss Lumber Company of Burnaby. The loss is estimated at \$60,000.

GERMAN PRESIDENT SIGNS SECURITY PACT

BERLIN, Nov. 28.—Baron Von Hindenburg, president of Germany, today signed the security pact which was negotiated at Locarno. German representatives will leave for London Sunday to sign the documents there.

J. Gillis on the schooner Beryl G. off Sydney Island on the night of September 15, 1924.

ANCIENT PRINTER DIED AT WINNIPEG

Warren Lambert Helped Take Printing Press Over Rockies to Cariboo

WINNIPEG, Nov. 28.—Warren Lambert, who assisted in transporting a printing press over the Rockies to establish the Cariboo Sentinel and who was a member of the Victoria Colonist staff in the early sixties, died here yesterday aged 85.

Nine Charges Brought Today Against Export Liquor House by Control Board Investigator

PREPARING A SARCOPHAGUS

Body of Queen Mother Rests on Catafalque Until Final Resting Place Ready

WINDSOR, Eng., Nov. 28.—The body of Alexandra, the Queen Mother was brought to rest among the tombs of the kings at Windsor this morning. A simple private committal service was held in the presence of the Royal Family.

The body was brought from London during the night and after the service the remains were placed on a catafalque below the steps in St. George's Chapel where it will rest amid a profusion of flowers until the sarcophagus has been prepared beside that of King Edward VII.

CHECKS TURNED OVER TO TRUSTEE OF THE WHALEN PAPER COMPANY

VANCOUVER, Nov. 28.—Certified checks for \$150,000 and \$100,000, the first payments on the recently purchased assets of the defunct Whalen Pulp & Paper Co. Ltd., were ordered turned over to the trustee by Mr. Justice Murphy in the Supreme Court yesterday at the request of the Montreal Trust Co., acting as receivers for the bankrupt concern.

MUNICIPALITIES GET FORESHORE RIGHTS UNDER PATTULLO BILL

VICTORIA, Nov. 28.—At the instance of Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, the Legislature yesterday accorded first reading to a bill granting municipalities not already in possession of them the statutory rights over foreshores, including bathing beaches.
