DRYDOCK GETS BIG CONTRACT FOR WINTER

LEGISLATURE HAS PASSED RESOLUTION ASKING LASH FOR DRUG SELLERS

Four Freighters Coming Here for Conversion from Coal to Oil Burners at Local Plant

Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Shipyard also receives contract for remodelling of steamer Prince Charles

One of the best contracts that the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Shipyard has ever received is that of converting from coal burners to oil burners the four freighters of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine plying between Ocean Falls and Calcutta in the paper carrying trade—the Canadian Goaster, Canadian Observer, Canadian Farmer and Canadian Rover. Announcement that the contract had been secured by the local yard was made this morning. Each boat will take the best part of a month and altogether the contract will mean four months' good work for the machine shop particularly. The work will necessitate more men being taken on especially pipe fitters and such skilled labor. The first boat will arrive here about December 15 and the three others will follow monthly thereafter.

FERRY DOCK AT VICTORIA

New One Being Built at Point Ellice for Use of Car Barges

VICTORIA, Dec. 1.—Work has commenced on the construction of a car ferry at a point just beneath the Point Ellice bridge. It will be large enough to handle the cars brought by the barge Kenora, which is already used in the Canadian National ferry service.

The new slip will enable lumber shipments from island points to be made by rail and landed at Point Ellice docks where a lumber assembly dock is being established. It will also to some extent do away with the necessity of using the Patricia Bay terminals where the Kenora now discharges its cars. The barge will ply direct to Victoria.

FORMER KAISER TO GET RETURN

Government Decides to Give Him Seven Millions in Cash as Well as Property

BERLIN, Dec. 1.—The Prussian government has decided to return a goodly amount of requisitioned holdings to the Ex-Kaiser. He will be given about 17,150,000 in cash, 18,000 acres of forest and agricultural lands, three palaces in Berlin, one at Babelsberg and some house property in the capital.

LOCARNO PACT SIGNED TODAY

Simple Ceremonies Marked Consummation of Epochal Peace Treaty

LONDON, Dec. 1.—With simple ceremonies, Britain, France, Belgium, Italy and Germany today signed the Locarno treaty and collateral pacts guaranteeing the peace of Europe and submission to arbitration any disputes arising between them regarding frontiers.

Cowper, publisher and editor of the Weekly Tribune in the libel action instituted by the Bakers over the articles published last June concerning the death of Janet Smith was withdrawn last night after counsel for the printers agreed to make public retraction and pay half the cost of the plaintiffs.

HARD SURFACE TRUNK ROADS

Government Urged to Action by Associated Boards of Trade in Session

Provincial Government Has New Offer to Make Regarding Waterfrontage Near Cow Bay

Is Willing to Convey 400 Feet to Dominion Government Provided They Make Provision for Fishermen and Yacht Club

The Cow Bay-fishermen's wharf question took on a new aspect at last night's council meeting when a letter was read from Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands and member for the district, offering to convey to the federal government 400 feet of waterfrontage just east of the Georgetown wharf to be used for the accommodation of the mosquito fleet and Yacht Club in return for the city giving its assent to the filling in of Cow Bay by the railway company. The letter was in reply to a communication sent recently to Mr. Pattullo by the council asking that 300 feet of waterfront just east of the Georgetown wharf be conveyed to the city instead of 200 ft. on the east side of Cow Bay in exchange for the city's rights in Cow Bay.

Original Offer

Mr. Pattullo's letter referred to the original offer of 200 feet made by the city by the government. The member stated that he had been able to have an act passed to this effect, the concession being a matter of grace rather than right as far as the city was concerned. He was of the opinion that the mosquito fleet and Yacht Club should be taken care of in its present location, Seal Cove being too far distant for the present time. Accordingly, he had secured the consent of the government to the conveying of 400 feet of waterfront just east of the Georgetown wharf to the Dominion Government, providing the Dominion Government furnished proper accommodation for the mosquito fleet and the Yacht Club.

Parliament IS TO MEET IN JANUARY

Making Preparations For Christmas.

Nearly everyone is making preparations for celebrating Christmas. The season is close on us and we all become enveloped in its activities.

This is not an urge to buy Christmas presents early. We all should know enough to do that without being urged. It is an urge not to forget those who are likely to have few friends or perhaps none during the festive season.

We give presents to our friends, who do not need them. It often becomes a sort of exchange and mart. It means a lot for the sentiment that is expressed is the right kind of sentiment. But there is another way of getting joy out of Christmas and that is to search out those who are without friends and see that they are brought into the Christmas circle.

In a place like Prince Rupert, people are coming and going continuously, and it is difficult to keep in touch with them. Yet it can be done and is done by those who like to do it. In spite of all the efforts we sometimes hear afterwards that some person we know was lonely and neglected on the big day of the year.

Poor But Proud, So They Suffer.

Sometimes in looking around we think there can be no poor in this city. We never see any signs of poverty. Everyone seems to have money to spend. All go to see the pictures and are well dressed and seemingly happy. Yet those who get below the surface are aware that things are not always what they seem.

Naturally there are a lot of people who are helped who do not deserve it. If we all got our deserts we should none of us get much. At Christmas time we try to forget whether it is our own faults we are poor, Christmas is a season of joy and the joy should go to the foolish, the indiscreet and the criminal as well as to the wise, the careful and the good citizen.

Inheritance Tax Still Discussed.

The inheritance tax is still being discussed by some politicians and newspapers, and public men are expressing themselves as being in favor of reducing this tax in preference to others.

It can be understood that in a city like Victoria, which is a place to which rich people retire, they may find that the inheritance tax keeps a few people away. They go somewhere else to die, where the state does not take as much of their wealth at death. They seek out a place where their sons and daughters may inherit all the riches and where their consequent downward career may be all the more spectacular.

In Prince Rupert we have no idle rich. We have very few rich people and they should be of such a type as to realize that their children will make better men and women if they have to fight their way as their fathers and mothers did before them. For the state to step in and take a portion of their wealth ought to be a righteous thing.

The average man has not enough property to leave at death to be affected by the inheritance law. He has to pay taxes every year but what is paid from his estate after death does not affect him. He knows and we all know that the taxes have to be collected somewhere. If that is true, then the inheritance tax is one of the least felt.

In Britain where the rich have most to do with the making of laws they have a stiff inheritance tax. The justice of the imposition is admitted by the very men most directly affected.

New and More Powerful Rays Discovered by Dr. Robert A. Millikan, formerly of Regina

Announcement Made at National Academy of Sciences States They Are 100 Times More Penetrating Than X-rays.

REGINA, Sask., Dec. 1.—Rays more penetrating and powerful than anything heretofore known or imagined on earth, have been discovered, studied and measured by Dr. Robert A. Millikan, of the California Institute of Technology, Pasadena, the foremost scientist in the United States, with whom has been associated in the last and most fruitful years of his research work, G. Harvey Cameron, of Saskatoon and a gold medalist of the University of Saskatchewan.

Announcement of the remarkable discoveries made by the two scientists, was made by Dr. Millikan recently at a meeting of the National Academy of Sciences. He told of invisible messengers from the great cosmic spaces beyond the ken of man; rays approximately 100 times more penetrating than the most powerful X-rays produced in hospitals and laboratories.

Mr. Cameron, whose share in the discoveries brings him into world prominence as a scientist, was graduated with honors from the University of Saskatchewan in 1921. On the recommendation of Dean G. H. Ling and Dr. E. L. Harrington, Mr. Cameron was given a teaching fellowship in the California institute immediately after graduation.

Mute, but mighty totems of an endless activity in creation's workshop in the immeasurable stellar regions, these rays tell a story of the birth of new worlds and new atoms. They come with the speed of light, bringing with them traces of energies of inconceivable magnitude. So penetrating are these rays, according to Dr. Millikan, that they can pierce a wall of lead six feet thick.

The eminent California scientist does not speculate on the practical value of the rays to man, nor on the possibilities opened by them for further research, but facts which he has disclosed indicate that the cosmic energies of the universe hold and pour forth tremendous stores of energy which mankind some day may harness here on earth.

The tests carried out by Dr. Millikan and his associate were largely carried out from the very shadows of the peak of Mt. Whitney, the "roof of the United States." It was here that the scientist discovered that the much-mystifying high frequency rays are of cosmic and not terrestrial origin. Dr. Millikan has disclosed that scientific instruments of remarkable precision and ingenuity were used in carrying out the experiments. One of these was the electro-scope, used in measuring the penetrating power of the rays. Another instrument was sent up in sounding balloons to an altitude of ten miles. It was carried above the clouds and contained a recording barometer, a thermometer, three sets of moving photographic films and the necessary driving machinery to operate them and yet weighed only seven ounces.

Nobel Prize Winner The Mt. Whitney experiments were the continuation of research work that has been going on at the California Institute of Technology for several years. He has practically devoted his life to determine definitely the nature and origin of high frequency rays first noticed nearly a quarter century ago. Dr. Millikan was awarded the Nobel Prize for physics as a result of his work in isolating the electron, the basis of all modern advance in physics and atomic studies.

U.S. NEGLECTS CHEMICALS AS A WAR WEAPON

Report of Head of Service Urges Preparation For Any Future Struggle

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—Neglect of proper preparation for the employment of the defense against an efficient war weapon, "borders on national suicide," Major General Amos Fries, Chief of the Chemical Warfare Service, declared in his annual report to Secretary of War Davis made public today. The report declared that "a speedy and sure victory" in any war can be assured to the United States only by adequate use of the unique superiority the country enjoys as to chemical resources.

"This position as to chemical resources of the United States," General Fries said, "will give it superiority over any other nation or group of nations which will mean success in any future war, but a state of chemical preparedness will never result if we slacken or neglect our military development and training in chemical warfare. It must be recognized that there is absolutely nothing inherent in chemical warfare to prevent its consideration as a logical and perfectly justifiable means of waging war."

Russian Increase

General Fries noted with particular interest "the recent chemical warfare developments in Russia, where that portion of the national defense has been launched on a large scale, backed by great public enthusiasm." He said that despite "many disadvantages," the morale of the American chemical warfare service was excellent, but added: "Nevertheless, without a drastic increase in appropriations, we will soon be the weakest among the half dozen most powerful nations in chemical warfare."

Supply stocks for the service left over from the war had been reduced "practically to nothing," General Fries asserted, adding that annual appropriations were not sufficient to replace this loss or "to maintain the war reserve for foreign projects."

GARNET WHEAT PROMISES WELL

Ripens From Seven to Twelve Days Earlier Than Marquis But is Yellowish

REGINA, Dec. 1.—Garnet wheat, the new discovery announced by L. H. Newman, dominion cerealist at Ottawa, which promises to revolutionize the wheat growing industry of Western Canada, has been developed from "Saunders" crosses. Dr. Charles F. Saunders, former dominion cerealist, had thousands of wheat crosses when he left his work to Mr. Newman, and from these, the new cerealist has announced that he has evolved a wheat which ripens from seven to twelve days earlier than Marquis. Dr. Saunders was the discoverer of the latter variety. Mr. Newman is also experimenting with another new wheat called "Reward" but it is not yet ready for distribution. If final tests prove successful a limited quantity of Garnet will be distributed to Western farmers next spring. The parents of Garnet wheat were a high quality taken from the Riga district in Russia and Preston wheat, one of the Saunders wheats. Preston was at one time grown rather extensively in Western Canada as it is a very early wheat of high milling quality, but it is bearded and shatters easily, and while still grown in a few districts, the yield is generally light. In the new wheat the good qualities of both parents appear to predominate. Red Eye, one of the parents of Marquis wheat, is now known to have come from the Riga district, so that Garnet comes from a select family. The only blemish on Garnet's record so far as has been revealed is the color of its flour, which is slightly yellowish, and the wheat-consuming countries have constantly demanded flour that will make the whitest bread possible. It is probable, however, that some strain of Garnet may be discovered which does not have the objectionable shade of color.

COMMISSIONER LAMB TALKS IMMIGRATION

Urges That Tests be Less Strict and That Aid be Given to People Coming to Canada

VICTORIA, Dec. 1.— Commissioner D. C. Lamb, veteran head of the Salvation Army emigration department, on the coast on his way from London to Australia, issued a criticism of the medical and other tests imposed on immigrants entering Canada. He declared that these tests were too rigorous. Complaining about the objections made by persons in the east about boys from Dr. Barnardo's Homes, and also about the fact that some of the children shipped out to this country by the Salvation Army had been denied admission, said he objected to the refusal of some of these immigrants from the lower classes on the grounds of defective mentality. New Zealand is now securing more immigration than Canada because of special aids and because of the fact that a much less rigorous standard is required for admission; the commissioner said. With an increase in the population of England through birth of 1,000 a day, some readjustment must be made to relieve the pressure and give these people a chance to emigrate overseas. The commissioner suggested that Canada should inaugurate a system of subsidized passages to help immigrants to come here, and should inaugurate supervised colonies in which they could be adapted to the new rural life in this country. He also said that it might be possible for the British government to capitalize some of the money now spent on doles and spend it on preparing emigrants and helping to ship them overseas.

OPPOSED TO WINE IN BEER PARLORS (Victoria Times) Some busy gentlemen who will not be satisfied until they have completely restored the bar and its viciousness are now trying to stir up enthusiasm among the members of the Legislature in favor of selling wine by the glass as well as beer by the glass. We note that the Attorney-General is reported to have frowned on the idea. That is the proper attitude to take. The public of this province is not at all of one mind as to the wisdom of extending the privileges of the Liquor Control Act to include the open sale of the malt-and-hops liquid. Before any new opportunity to spend money on alcoholic refreshment is furnished, the people ought to be asked to approve a more economic form of expenditure in the shape of better provision for safeguarding the public health.
