Pattullo announced this morning that the provincial government was about to declare that area a park under the Parks Act and that the lieutenant governor in council will appoint a board consisting of five local citizens to control and administer the place. The Prince Rupert Swimming Club will be asked to make recommendations regarding membership of this board and will be permitted to frame regulations for handling the park. This means that the people of Prince Rupert will be given in perpetuity the right to conduct the park as they see fit and will be permitted lease the property if it is so desired and carry out improvements and raise money.


