## BIG STEAMER AT MERCY OF FIERCE GALE

### LIBERAL WINS QUEBEC SEAT IN ELECTION YESTERDAY BY GOOD MAJORITY

#### Negotiations to Lease Elevator to Wheat Pool Ended Without Success

Local Grain Board will turn attention to other ways of securing shipments of grain this way

At a meeting of the Grain Board held last night in the City Hall, M.P. McCaffery, chairman, presiding, it was ascertained that negotiations, which had been pending for the past three weeks, between the federal government and the Canadian Co-operative Wheat Producers Ltd., Calgary, for the leasing of the local elevator to the latter concern, and which to date had been of a confidential nature, had finally fallen through when a wire to that effect was read from Fred Stork, M.P., at Ottawa, who had been conducting the negotiations on behalf of the Grain Board.

#### REGULATIONS ARE CHANGED ALASKA 1926

Salmon Traps Prohibited in Some Waters and Restricted in Others  
50 PER CENT MUST PASS.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—New regulations governing salmon fishing off the coast of Alaska during 1926 were approved today by Secretary Hoover. These prohibit the use of traps and purse seines in certain waters including Lynn Canal, Icy Straits and Leross Sound districts. Gill net fishing is permitted with certain restrictions, acting under provisions which require fishing to be limited to a degree allowing at least fifty per cent of the salmon returning from the ocean to reach the spawning grounds of the rivers.

#### SASKATOON WINS HOCKEY MATCH

Plays Her Last Game on Coast Before Returning to Prairies to Meet Edmonton

VANCOUVER, Dec. 8.—Saskatoon won her final match of the present coast series when she beat Vancouver in a close hockey game last night by three goals to two. She plays her next game against Edmonton on her own rink on Saturday, the first of a series of home games and will not be at the coast again until January 18.

#### SEIZE PROPERTY OF COWPER IN ORDER TO RECOVER \$2,000

VANCOUVER, Dec. 8.—Sheriff's officers were yesterday instructed to seize the property of J. S. Cowper in order to recover the \$2,000 judgment awarded Mr. and Mrs. F. L. Baker for libel.

#### RUNAWAY LOCOMOTIVE CRASHED INTO TRAIN KILLING ONE PERSON

SEATTLE, Dec. 8.—Felix Harder, a car inspector, was instantly killed last night when a runaway freight locomotive speeding at the rate of 35 miles an hour crashed into the rear of the Northern Pacific passenger train standing in King Street passenger station. Several people were injured.

#### ELEVATOR TO BE KEPT BUSY

Superintendent Heatherington Says Government Will be Active in Getting Grain Cargoes LOCAL MEN EMPLOYED

That the federal government will take as active an interest in the securing of business for the new terminal grain elevator here as it has taken in having the facility erected was the statement made this afternoon to a representative of the Daily News by R. Heatherington of Fort William, general manager of government elevators.

Mr. Heatherington was desirous of correcting an impression which he had been told existed here that the responsibility of the government ended with the building of the elevator. He pointed out that the government spends several thousands of dollars annually in advertising its elevators and is at all times in touch with the trade.

#### U.S. INVITED TO JOIN IN PEACE PARTY

League of Nations Initiating Movement Toward Big Conference of Powers

GENEVA, Dec. 8.—The council of the League of Nations today decided to invite the United States, Russia and Germany to participate with the League of Nations in the work of a special commission which is to prepare for an international disarmament conference.

#### LUMBER KING DIES THIS AFTERNOON AT OTTAWA AGED 98

OTTAWA, Dec. 8.—John R. Booth, lumber king of this city, died this afternoon aged 98. He had been unconscious since yesterday afternoon.

#### ROCKY KANSAS OF BUFFALO WON FIGHT

BUFFALO, Dec. 8.—Rocky Kansas of Buffalo won the light-weight boxing championship of the world from Jimmy Goodrich also of Buffalo in a stirring fifteen round bout last night.

#### LEGISLATURE HELD ALL NIGHT SESSION

#### Liberals Win in Bagot but with Majority Less than Former Member

ACTONVALE, Dec. 8.—A supporter of the Mackenzie King Government has been elected in Bagot. G. D. Morin, Liberal, was the choice of the electors yesterday in the by-election in the federal riding by a majority of 473 over Hon. Andre Fautoux, Conservative.

The majority of the Liberal candidate was not as large as at the general election when the late J. E. Marcile was elected by a majority of 774. Marcile was personally very popular and he was ill in bed at the time he was elected.

#### HANGED 500 IN A CELLAR

Executioners and Priest Charged With Crime by Moscow Authorities  
MOSCOW, Dec. 8.—Fifteen executioners of the Czarist regime, who received from ten to fifty dollars for each execution and the priest who charged a dollar a head for prayers said at the gallows, have been arrested.

#### MISSING MAN IN LAUNCH IS FOUND LASQUETI ISLAND

VANCOUVER, Dec. 8.—Missing since last Thursday, John Gilmore, a cannery employee, who left West Vancouver in a gasoline launch for Steveston, was found today at Lasqueti Island, 25 miles north of West Vancouver, where he had been driven by wind and tides after the engine broke down.

#### Steamer West Orawa in Critical Situation Washed by Mountainous Seas Driven by Eighty Mile Gale

BREMERTON, Dec. 8.—Rudderless and helpless in an eighty mile gale which is driving it westward battered by mountainous seas, the steamship West Orawa is once again in a critical condition, an official radio message from Cordova last night stated.

As waves sweep over the deck, the ship lists badly to leeward with her nine-foot high deck cargo straining at the leashes. Steamer Admiral Dewey is standing by with all her hawsers carried away in a vain attempt to tow the crippled ship. Both vessels are now awaiting the arrival of the steamer West Holbrook, bound to Portland from Japan. The Holbrook will attempt to tow the West Orawa with the Admiral Dewey secured to the stern of the latter to serve as a rudder.

#### Dominion Government to Spend Considerable Sum Cow Bay Floats

City gives up its riparian rights provided improvements are made within year by federal authorities

After a conference with J. P. Forde, district engineer for the federal department of public works, who outlined the plans he proposed submitting to parliament with a view to having accommodation provided at Cow Bay for fishing boats and the mosquito fleet using the harbor of Prince Rupert, the city council last night, after some discussion, on motion of Ald. McMordie, seconded by Ald. Larsen, passed a resolution requesting the provincial government to turn over to the city 450 feet of waterfront in return for which the city will relinquish its riparian rights in Cow Bay, and providing that assurance be given to the minister of lands that the city will deed over 300 feet of the waterfront to the federal government so that it may proceed with its development with the proviso that, unless the federal government has not started that development within a year, the property will again revert to the city. This resolution, passed unanimously by the council, will be the city's reply to Mr. Pattullo's suggestion of last week that the provincial government turn over to the federal government 100 feet of waterfront for the purpose of providing accommodation for the fishing boats and mosquito fleet.

#### MOTHER DIES FROM SHOCK AT SON'S ILLNESS

Former Mayor of Fernie Ill Following Loss of Wife and Son

FERNIE, Dec. 8.—Mrs. G. Henderson, wife of ex-mayor Henderson, died suddenly today shortly after receipt of word that her son Jack was seriously ill at New Westminster. When the message came she went out to find her husband and collapsed, dying soon after.

When Mr. Henderson heard of his wife's death and his son's illness he also collapsed and is in a serious condition.

Later word came that the son was dead, having fallen out of the window of a sanitarium at New Westminster and broken his neck. Word of the death is being withheld from the father.

#### BUSINESS OF CANADA BETTER

President of Bank of Montreal Says Trend Slowly but Surely Upward

MONTREAL, Dec. 8.—At the annual meeting of the shareholders of the Bank of Montreal yesterday Sir Vincent Meredith, president, said there was no question but the trend of business was slowly but surely upward. The marketing of this year's crop would bring at least \$500,000,000 new money into the Dominion.

Sir Frederick Williams Taylor, general manager, reported the bank with clean business and satisfactory organization.

#### RUPERT TO GET ITS SIDEWALK PLAN PASSED AT VICTORIA

VICTORIA, Dec. 8.—The municipal committee of the Legislature yesterday recommended the passage of a measure originating in a request from Prince Rupert, in reference to financing sidewalk walks on one side of the road only.

**Liberal Elected Bagot Constituency.**

A Liberal has been elected in Bagot constituency in the Province of Quebec with a reduced majority but yet with a sufficiently large support to indicate that there is no doubt as to what the electors desired.

Great efforts were made by the opposition to win this seat as it meant almost everything in its influence upon the action of Parliament in the forthcoming session.

It was hardly expected the majority of Morin would be as large as that of Marcille who was very popular in the constituency. His opponent, Hon. Andre Fauteux, was the Conservative candidate who had opposed Marcille and he was well known and popular.

Intimation is given that now the government is assured of a working majority in the House, Premier Mackenzie King may proceed to secure a seat for himself. That would prevent delay later and would indicate that he had confidence in the outcome of the meeting of Parliament.

**Railway Matters Being Discussed.**

The letter published elsewhere in regard to the C.N.R. roadbed, is scarcely called for just now. The present mild spell has melted the snow on the mountains and that along with the heavy rains caused floods which carried away bridges and in places washed away the roadbed of the Canadian National. Even after many years of preventive measures similar things happen on the C.P.R. yet. Only last season the road was tied up for traffic for several days.

We know nothing of the way in which the railway is keeping up the roadbed. Only a railwayman is competent to judge of it. What we know is that the condition of the road has nothing to do with the floods which have just caused so much damage.

**Efforts Of Local Grain Committee.**

The local grain committee has been making efforts to arrange a short lease of the local elevator to the wheat pool with a view to having it operated to its fullest possible capacity. This effort has apparently failed and now the committee will have to devise other ways and means of securing the shipment of grain this way.

As yet, it should be remembered, we have no elevator. It is not yet completed. Until it is completed we do not know that it is not being used. If grain is shipped into it today, it cannot be shipped out. There is yet a good deal of work to be done before the big house can be said to be ready for operation. Had it been completed earlier, when the rush was on, there would have been greater possibility of securing business. As it is, no one knows whether shipments will be made this way or not this season. In any case we shall be ready for next year. In the meantime we have a live committee working on the job and the people of the city will have confidence that they will do the best possible to forward local interests.

**Must Keep Up Annual Fair.**

Without knowing anything about the management of the local fair, which shows a small deficit this year, it can be taken as an axiom that the fair must continue and that for a small matter of a few hundred dollars it should not be allowed to end the year in debt. The fair is worth a great deal to the city from a business point of view as well as from that of education. If the weather had been a little more propitious doubtless the small deficit would not have occurred.

**FAIR BOARD NEEDS HELP**

City Council Requested to Give Relief of \$450 Deficit this Year

A letter from the Northern B.C. Agricultural & Industrial Association signed by R. F. Self, president; John Bulger, vice-president; and Frank Dibb, honorary secretary, stating that the Association was facing an excess of liabilities over collectible revenue of \$450 as a result of this year's operations and requesting that additional relief be given by the city was read at the meeting of the city council last night and referred to the finance committee for report.

The letter pointed out that \$300 of the \$450 shortage was required to cover insurance renewals for a period of three years. During the season, the Association had expended some \$1,000 on permanent construction and repair work on the building which was now in good condition. The work of the year had resulted in outside interest in the fair being increased and there had been a great many more district entries. The Association expected that another year would see an even greater expansion along these lines. Bad weather during the fair this year had been a disturbing factor as far as finances were concerned. The Association decided to place the situation clearly before the council with the request that such relief be given as seemed warranted.

The communication was referred to the finance committee without discussion.

To insure the city being protected, the only solution he saw would be for the waterfrontage to be conveyed to the city. He then presented his resolution to this effect which was seconded by Ald. Larsen.



United States War Secretary Urges Increased Expenditure on Defences of the Nation

Would increase army garrison Panama Canal, establish station at Hawaiian Islands, and improve air service

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—(By Canadian Press).—Dwight F. Davis, Secretary of War of the United States, in his annual report to President Coolidge, made public here, declared the situation in the regular army to be extremely serious and repeated the recommendation of his predecessor for increase of the enlisted strength to 150,000. He urged that the security of the Panama Canal should be assured without delay and the western outpost of the U.S., the Island of Oahu in the Hawaiian group, be placed on a basis to resist an attack of any probable magnitude which has for its purpose the seizure of the Hawaiian Islands with their valuable military, naval and commercial bases.

Safety of Nation

The Secretary of War fully described the projects he considers necessary for the full execution of the National Defense Act of 1920, the first real military policy ever enacted for the United States. The carrying out of the provisions of that act, he confidently believed, would insure the safety of the nation against aggression, save immense amounts of treasure in future years, and, more vital than such financial savings, result in the sparing of bloodshed and the saving of lives should war again loom upon the United States. Adoption of the major army projects would provide at the end of ten years the "balanced force, fitly equipped and modern" which was declared by President Coolidge in his inaugural address this year to be demanded by the best interests of the nation. Mr. Davis stated:

"The present strength of the regular army is not sufficient to permit the accomplishment of its mission as a training and instructing cadre for the civilian components and activities, much less to allow the perfection of its essential training." Mr. Davis reported to the president. "The air service is of insufficient size to carry out its mission under the National Defense Act, and the same is true of many other branches of the service. To insure the training of the regular army to that point where it

would be able to move out into the field at a moment's notice, prepared for active campaign, could only be accomplished by an increase in personnel.

Panama Canal

"I need not dwell on the tremendous strategic value of the Panama Canal. The loss of the Canal during the first stages of a war would be practically irreparable. It is vital that the garrison stationed there be at all times sufficient to repel any probable invading force and to withstand any siege until such a time as reinforcements in large numbers could arrive from the United States. The very minimum has been sought in the number of troops required to assure the safety of the canal. The figures finally arrived at were 703 officers and 13,734 enlisted men. The garrison on June 30, 1925, comprised 474 officers and 8,628 enlisted men.

The Panama Canal is not only of vital military importance to the United States, but is also of great political and commercial importance. Plans for the employment of our fleet in either ocean are based upon the uninterrupted use of the canal. It is, therefore, of the greatest value to this country as a strategic waterway. It is contemplated that the peace garrison shall be expanded rapidly upon the approach or outbreak of any war until the war garrison required for the defense of the canal is present, such increases involving the transportation of a large number of troops with their personal arms and equipment.

Must Be Supplied

It is considered inadvisable to depend upon shipping at such a time of sufficient supplies and equipment to maintain the proposed war garrison during its defense of the canal. Therefore supplies and equipment must be on hand prior to the outbreak of war to fully feed, clothe, and equip in all respects the war garrison of the Canal zone. The requirements in personnel, organization, supply, communications, and all other essentials for an adequate defense have recently undergone a comprehensive study and revision looking to a more effective organization of the garrison of the Panama Canal and an economical readjustment to its needs. Exclusive of the question of increased personnel for the peace time garrison, the more important items remaining uncompleted are the erection of barracks, quarters, and storage facilities, the completion of fortifications required for the proper defense of the canal, and the construction of roads and trails which constitute a military necessity. It is desirable that the program for the defense of the Panama Canal be completed in an orderly and systematic manner over a period of 10 years beginning with the fiscal year of 1927.

Hawaiian Islands

"The garrison of our western

outpost on the Island of Oahu should be sufficient to withstand an attack of any probable magnitude which has for its purpose the seizure of the Hawaiian Islands with their valuable military, naval and commercial bases. On Oahu is located the naval base at Pearl Harbor, from which the trade routes from Asia and the United States may be controlled and our Pacific coast protected. Oahu constitutes an outpost of tremendous strategic importance for defensive purposes. The strength of the Oahu military garrison on June 30, 1925, was 769 officers and 13,708 enlisted men. To protect the islands, this number should be 980 officers and 19,377 enlisted men. The peace garrison must be provided with armament, roads, storage and shelter in order to maintain itself in peace time and to permit of rapid expansion in time of war. Further construction is required to keep the shore batteries abreast or ahead of the naval, aerial, and military weapons of any potential enemy. A military road system is vital in order to provide for rapid movements of troops and supplies so that the garrison may be kept at the minimum consistent with safety. Storage requisite for the war reserve supplies and material which must be provided in peace time is necessary. To supply Oahu in time of war might be impracticable.

in a position to reach ammunition production of safe volume in from 12 to 14 months and it is hoped that a 10-year program for the completion and maintenance of the ammunition reserve required for two field armies of 1,000,000 men may be started with the coming year. Most of the country's harbor defenses constructed prior to the World War are now obsolete or of secondary importance. Developments have made necessary the installation of long-range guns of big caliber in order to modernize harbor fortifications.

Long Range Guns

"The installation of modern long-range guns for the protection of our largest coastal cities and our most vital harbors," the Secretary reported, "would be a defensive measure in the truest sense of the word. It is problematical whether such guns would ever be fired in case of war. So far as can now be seen, the guns mounted on the modern battleship will never be able to outrange the heavy-caliber guns which we hope to replace for the defense of our strategic ports and harbors. The very fact that such guns were mounted, and that their location in general were known, would serve to prevent the approach of any hostile fleet to within effective range of such harbor defense."

Air Service

Speaking of the air service project, the Secretary declared any failure to keep progress with the developments which the air forces of the world are undergoing is detrimental not only to the air service itself, but to the entire army. Pending the report to the President of the special board of inquiry to consider the whole question of the state of the air defense of the nation, the Secretary of War said it seemed desirable that War Department discussion of air projects be held in abeyance.

Plans for industrial mobilization in war time have been worked out by the War Department under the National Defense Act and other laws which provide that the Secretary of War can fix prices of articles needed by the army, control transporta-

LONDON, Dec. 8. — (Canada Press despatch).—"I shall never buy or start another newspaper, except for defensive purposes or as a reprisal," declared Lord Beaverbrook in an advertisement concerning the Sunday Express, one of his trinity of journals. The exception which his Lordship indicates is capable, of course, of a very wide interpretation.

In an article discussing how the big financier has come to dominate London newspaper ownership, "Truth" remarks:—"The dark horse in the newspaper world today is Lord Beaverbrook. He is the ablest man in the business. He has money, brains, youth, ambition. He has also personality. He is a man who takes long views, any observer can see that in his newspaper policy he is not concerning himself so much with the dividends for the day as with building for the future. Lord Beaverbrook is gaining in experience and ripening in judgment, but he still handicaps himself by impetuous and amateurish exhibitions which shows that

today for Calgary and Winnipeg where I will endeavor to secure business for the Prince Rupert elevator."

Mr. Hetherington said that it was also his intention to keep in close touch with the local grain board which would be in a position to furnish him with information on local conditions at all times.

"If nothing moves through the Prince Rupert elevator," he said "it will be through no fault of the elevator management."

Mr. Hetherington leaves here with the expectation that the plant will be ready to receive grain in force on December 15 and ready to ship it on January 1.

Regarding the staff of the plant, Mr. Hetherington stated that, apart from the superintendent, accountant and electrician, all the employees would be local men. The inspection and weighing staff was not appointed by the grain commission but by the Civil Service Commission of Canada.

At first there will be a skeleton crew at the elevator but, as the movement of grain demands, this will be increased. The staff with the elevator operating at capacity will number about 25 men.

Mr. Hetherington sails tonight for Vancouver enroute to Fort William. He expects to be back here in the spring.

## HUNDRED MILES TIMBER BOUGHT

**De Boys Pulp Concern of Pennsylvania and Oregon Interested at Islands**
