BRITISH STRIKE OUTLOOK GLOOMY TODAY

CALIFORNIA DOCTOR CLAIMS INVENTION OF NEW INSTRUMENT OF WARFARE

Negotiations Between Owners and Workers Continue; Twenty Thousand Miners Quit Working

LONDON July 30.—Chances for averting the threatened British coal strike appeared to be decreased today. Negotiations between the owners and the workers, meeting separately with Premier Baldwin, were resumed this morning in a gloomy atmosphere. Hope for a settlement is farther off than ever according to A. J. Cork secretary of the Miners' Federation.

AMANFORD, Wales, July 30.—Armed with bludgeons, eight bands of striking miners, each about 400 strong, visited the anthracite area early today, intimidating officials and ordering the safety men to withdraw from the pits. Despite the advice of the Miners' Federation that they remain at their posts, the safety men went out. Twenty thousand men are on strike in this district and the police have been powerless to prevent disturbances.

SPECULATION ON ELECTION

Ottawa Believes that Federal Cabinet is Now Awaiting Result in New Brunswick

OTTAWA, July 30.—It is now stated here on good authority that there will be no more meetings of the cabinet until after the New Brunswick provincial election which is to take place on August 10. In that case it is improbable that any announcement will be made for at least a couple of weeks regarding the holding of an election this autumn. It is taken for granted that the government is awaiting the New Brunswick result before deciding whether or not to go before the country this year. For the present, it is apparent that the question of holding an election before the snow flies remains unchanged.

SURRENDER OF JOSEPH HEARST

Head of Defunct Music House, Hunted on Two Continents, Gives Himself Up.

WINNIPEG, July 30.—Hunted by the police of two continents for more than seven months, Joseph Hearst, former head of the defunct Hearst's Music Publishing Co. of Canada, surrendered to the police on Tuesday. Hearst disappeared from Winnipeg in December 1924, following an investigation into the affairs of his company. An auditing of the firm's books revealed the complete financial collapse of the corporation involving a loss to investors throughout Canada and the United States of approximately \$750,000.

LIQUOR SEIZED BY CUSTOMS OFFICERS

Haul of Five Hundred Cases is Made on West Coast of Vancouver Island

VICTORIA, July 30.—More than five hundred cases of liquor were seized by customs officers on Saturday night at Ucluelet, on the west coast of Vancouver Island, it is reported here. The tug Dreadful has left to bring the contraband to this port.

COMMUTATION OF DEATH SENTENCE

Yamamoto Will Not Hang for Murder of Fellow Countryman at Port Alice

VANCOUVER, July 30.—The sentence of death upon I. Yamamoto, Japanese, for murdering a fellow countryman at Port Alice last May, has been commuted to life imprisonment according to word reaching here yesterday from the Department of Justice at Ottawa. Yamamoto was to have been hanged on August 7, but he was declared to have been insane at the time the crime was committed and representations to Ottawa on his behalf resulted in commutation of sentence.

WHALEN CO. TO BE REORGANIZED

T. W. McGarry Says that Negotiations in New York are Making Favorable Progress

(Special to Daily News) TORONTO, July 30.—T. W. McGarry, representative of the debenture and stockholders in the Whalen Pulp & Paper Co., states that a protective committee, now negotiating with New York financiers with a view to making a financial reorganization that will put the business on a stable basis, is making favorable progress due to improved operating conditions.

ACCUSED OF BLACKMAIL

Vancouver Man Arrested as he Went to Pick up "Hush Money" from Japanese

VANCOUVER, July 30.—Norman Bradley, aged 43, is being held by the police in connection with an alleged blackmail plot against a "Japanese Lodging House Association and Japanese Bank." He was taken in custody yesterday morning when he went to the steps of a church to pick up a suitcase placed there following a demand for \$2,000 "hush money" made in a letter sent the Association.

NO ANNOUNCEMENT ABOUT ELECTION

Premier King Leaves for his Summer Home Following Lengthy Cabinet Meeting Tuesday

OTTAWA, July 30.—Following a prolonged cabinet meeting on Tuesday, Premier King left for his summer home after announcing that there was nothing to make public. It is generally believed that no date was considered for the general federal election.

NAVY PROGRAM IS APPROVED

Laborites Fail in British House to Get a Reduction in Warships

LONDON, July 30.—The House of Commons last night put its stamp of approval on the government's cruiser building program. This was done after the Liberals and Laborites had sought to have the appropriation for the new warships reduced on the ground that there was no naval war in sight and, therefore, it was needless to burden an already heavily taxed country with an additional expenditure of £58,000,000.

ULSTER WINS SOCCER CUP

Defeated Nanaimo Two to Nil in Dominion Champion-ship Final

WINNIPEG, July 30.—The Ulster United football team of Toronto last night won the Dominion soccer championship and the Connaught Cup by defeating Nanaimo western champions, two goals to nil in the third game of the series. The first two games were draws—one being scoreless and the other, one all.

DOES NOT WANT LEAVE CANADA

Sir Henry Thornton, However, Makes no Definite Announcement on Future Plans

OTTAWA, July 30.—"I have made no plans, but I cannot imagine anyone wanting to leave Canada after having resided here three years," declared Sir Henry Thornton on Tuesday night when inquiries were made regarding rumors of his departure. He said that he did not feel that he should make any announcement as this should come from the government.

ROSS WATSON GETS LIBERTY

Bail of \$10,000 was Granted Yesterday by Mr. Justice Morrison

VANCOUVER, July 30.—Ross Watson was granted \$10,000 bail yesterday by Mr. Justice Morrison on application of R. L. Mailand, his counsel. Watson will be liberated as soon as bonds are arranged pending his second trial at the Nanaimo Assizes in October. He was charged with robbery of the Royal Bank at Nanaimo last spring and the jury disagreed when dealing with his case a couple of months ago.

H. M. S. Capetown will Spend Seven Days in Prince Rupert; Receive Visitors at Week-end

H.M.S. Capetown reached port yesterday afternoon shortly after 2 o'clock and tied up at the ocean dock. Upon her arrival, she was met by Mayor Newton and a committee from the G. W. V. A., consisting of J. Campbell, J. Hutchinson, T. Silversides, and M. McArthur. Geo. Hill, as president of the football association, was present and arranged for a game between local players and a team from the cruiser.

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Claims Invention of Death Stroke in Form of Canned Lightning

SAN FRANCISCO, July 30.—Dr. Edwin Scott, self-styled inventor of what he terms a death stroke in the form of "canned lightning" which he claims will revolutionize existing war tactics, will formally ask the Navy Department's assistance in testing the invention off the California coast in September on an old battleship or a pilotless airplane.

Scott says that his invention is capable of destroying all life on sea land or air within a radius of twenty miles and can disable all radios in a similar radius. He claims that the invention burned holes in two-inch steel plates at a distance of three to seven miles and that dummy airplanes were destroyed in air tests.

INDIANS FAIL TO SEE KING

Chiefs from British Columbia Disappointed With Their Reception in London

LONDON, July 30.—Three Indian chiefs, who arrived here from British Columbia to seek an audience with the King to submit their grievances concerning tenure of lands and trapping of game, are disappointed and discouraged.

BRITISH PEER PASSES AWAY

Son and Heir of Late Lord Cheylsmore Has Been Resident of Alberta for Four Years

LONDON, July 30.—Major General Lord Cheylsmore died here yesterday following injuries sustained in a recent accident. The son and heir of Lord Cheylsmore has been a resident of Alberta, Canada, since 1921. He has been farming on two sections of land known as the Happy Valley ranch near Alix.

CAPETOWN, July 30.—Completing his tour of South Africa, the Prince of Wales left yesterday morning aboard H.M.S. Repulse for South America. He is due in Montevideo on August 14.

TO REBUILD AT MINAKI

Resort, Like Jasper Will Replace That Which was Destroyed by Fire

WINNIPEG, July 30.—Minaki Inn, one of the Canadian National Railways summer hotels which was destroyed by fire last month on the eve of opening, will be rebuilt on the bungalow style similar to Jasper Park Lodge. Announcement to this effect was made today following a conference of system officials with Sir Henry Thornton who states that plans will be developed immediately for the erection of the new inn on the banks of the Winnipeg river.

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HAIG AGAIN URGES UNITY

Gives Final Message at Montreal Following His Tour of Canada

MONTREAL, July 30.—In a farewell message here closing his Canadian tour, Field Marshal Earl Haig urged ex-servicemen "to link hands again as you did on the field in that magnificent spirit of good-fellowship and trust which, above all things, carried us through to ultimate triumph."

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Prospects Are For Busy Season.

Prince Rupert people, especially the business men, are finding that it takes some time for a resumption of industrial activity to make itself felt in a resultant improvement in general business conditions. There are several hundred men employed here on elevator construction this summer and the saw-mill is employing another hundred. Prince Rupert had neither of these sources of employment last spring. The halibut fisheries are running about normal and there is a greatly increased tourist traffic. Some people think that the population of the city is about 8,500. Yet merchants say that only now is business beginning to pick up. They have been having rather a quiet spring of it.

However, conditions are looking better now and it is reasonable to expect that present activities will result in a bustling fall and prosperous winter. There is reason to believe that money will be circulating much more freely in local business at the end of 1925 than it was at the beginning.

Psychology And Newspapers.

There is a good deal of psychology in the newspaper business. The task of the editor is to put into his columns matter that the people will read—not necessarily what will please them. He may tread on somebody's toes and may run so-called "piffle." Hardly anything appears in a newspaper that everybody reads but some matter is read more than other. It is the task of the successful editor to run material that the most possible people will read.

The editor is not to be discouraged to hear his "stuff called trash." It is more pleasant to his ears to hear that a large number of people read that "trash" than to learn that nobody read some more weighty matter. If the public reads trash that it says it does not like, then it is up to the editor to give them more of the same medicine.


Women Athletes Or Suffragettes.

The London "Daily Graphic" says editorially:—If there is one sport which epitomizes the modern girl, it is tennis. None of the Pankhursts—either the learned Christabel or the pugnacious Sylvia—so stands for women's freedom as does Suzanne Lenglen or Kitty MacKane. A quarter of a century ago tennis was the quintessence of ladylikeness. It was for most girls just a polite form of shuttlecock and battledore after afternoon tea. It was a pastime rather than a sport. The tennis girl's skirts were long; her play was languid. She was much too proper (and, conceivably, much too underdeveloped also) to indulge in the high jumps of the tennis girl of today. Carrying her racket to the courts she might have been the hearer of a bishop's crozier, so staid and self-conscious was she. As it is played today, tennis symbolizes the revolt of woman's soul against all the restrictions and constrictions to which it was slave even so recently as 1900. The racket has sundered more chains than all the hammers of all the suffragettes. The danger is that our girls may overdo Wimbledonism and the free, strenuous manners which it commands.

Editor of Daily News Goes Holidaying
A Pleasant Evening

FOURTH ARTICLE
DEVASTATION CHANNEL—The sea is being churned up by a stiff breeze and the white caps are too much in evidence for us to risk facing them with the Gwien. Hence, we are anchored in a little bay just off the sweep of the wind. A big swell is beating on the shore and we are sitting on a rock overlooking it all and wishing for fairer weather.

We should have been cruising between Gribble Island and the mainland now but the powers have said "no" and we are obeying.

We left Gardner's canal this morning and are now on our way to Butedale where we expect to spend a little time with Joe McPhee before leaving for our respective homes.

Yesterday we explored Peril River and dined at a logging camp where we received a hearty welcome and enjoyed a pleasant evening. Gildersleve's camp is just across from Channel Island where the logging outfit is located. We landed there Tuesday evening to inquire about the river and were invited to spend the evening, which we did. Before leaving we were given an invitation to dinner the following evening.

You may have heard about loggers and so had we. These were different. Mr. and Mrs. Gildersleve have a family of six, one a baby and the oldest about fifteen. They are all workers and they have quite an extensive home on a raft, the raft being beached on the sand at the mouth of the river. Butedale, forty miles away, is their post office and supply station, so it is clear that they cannot always have fresh vegetables and fruit. They hunt deer and wild goat in season and what they cannot eat they can. They also dry some of the meat and smoke salmon and the result is that the butchers do not get very rich from their trade.

Evening at Gildersleve's
The Gildersleves and their relatives and employees are musical. Last night there was a big logger, Carl Johnson, who played the accordion for an hour accompanied by Miss Gildersleve. The father of the family played a horn. The mother played the piano as well as the daughter and the grandmother played the piano and sang. Another logger played the violin the previous night and others played the same instrument. On the whole they seemed to have a merry time yet there was no drinking, smoking or swearing. Lemonade was the strongest drink we tasted or heard of. On the wall was a bear hide taken from an animal killed by our host, and numerous antlers decorated the walls.

The camp school teacher lived at this home. He was engaged by the families concerned to teach the children for the year. This is the second camp we found with a school, the other being Owen's camp of which I wrote previously. Owen's had a radio outfit but this one depended on the inmates themselves for their amusement and recreation.

First Weather Delay
The wind is subsiding and we are planning to leave. We have been delayed here about half an hour, the only time since the beginning of the holiday that the weather has held us up. Yesterday we were sweltering in the heat in the afternoon and were glad to get back to our camp. Yet we enjoyed the trip up Peril River for a couple of miles. We were told we might take our launch up the river but were glad we decided to row in the dinghy. There are a good many perils in the stream, too many to please us. The waterfalls were so fine, however, that they were worth the trip to see.

We have been discussing human nature, Dick and I. We have decided that in order to carry out any great work it is necessary to have strong convictions and yet those convictions may not be right. Truth is largely a point of view and those holding adverse views on a subject may both be right or very nearly so. Newspaper work tends to make a person look on both sides. The editor realizes that every time he takes a decided stand or expresses an opinion he is stepping on the toes of many of his readers. Whether he discusses religion or politics or science or sociology or any other subject, the opposite opinion will probably be held by many of his readers

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The officers of No. 5 B.C. Hospital have now received their ranks which they are to hold in service. The staff of 72 nurses has been approved practically as recommended. Dr. J. T. Wall, formerly of this city, has a place on the staff with the rank of Captain.

The Board of Trade is meeting this afternoon to discuss the possibility of securing a copper refinery for this point.

H. L. Gibbs, who has charge of the Babine Hatchery operated under the Dominion Government, was a passenger on yesterday morning's train for the interior.

Among the tourists returning from a round trip to Alaska on board the City of Seattle last evening was Mr. Geo. Slaten, Governor of Georgia. He enjoyed a motor trip around the city and expressed himself as being agreeably surprised as to the development here.

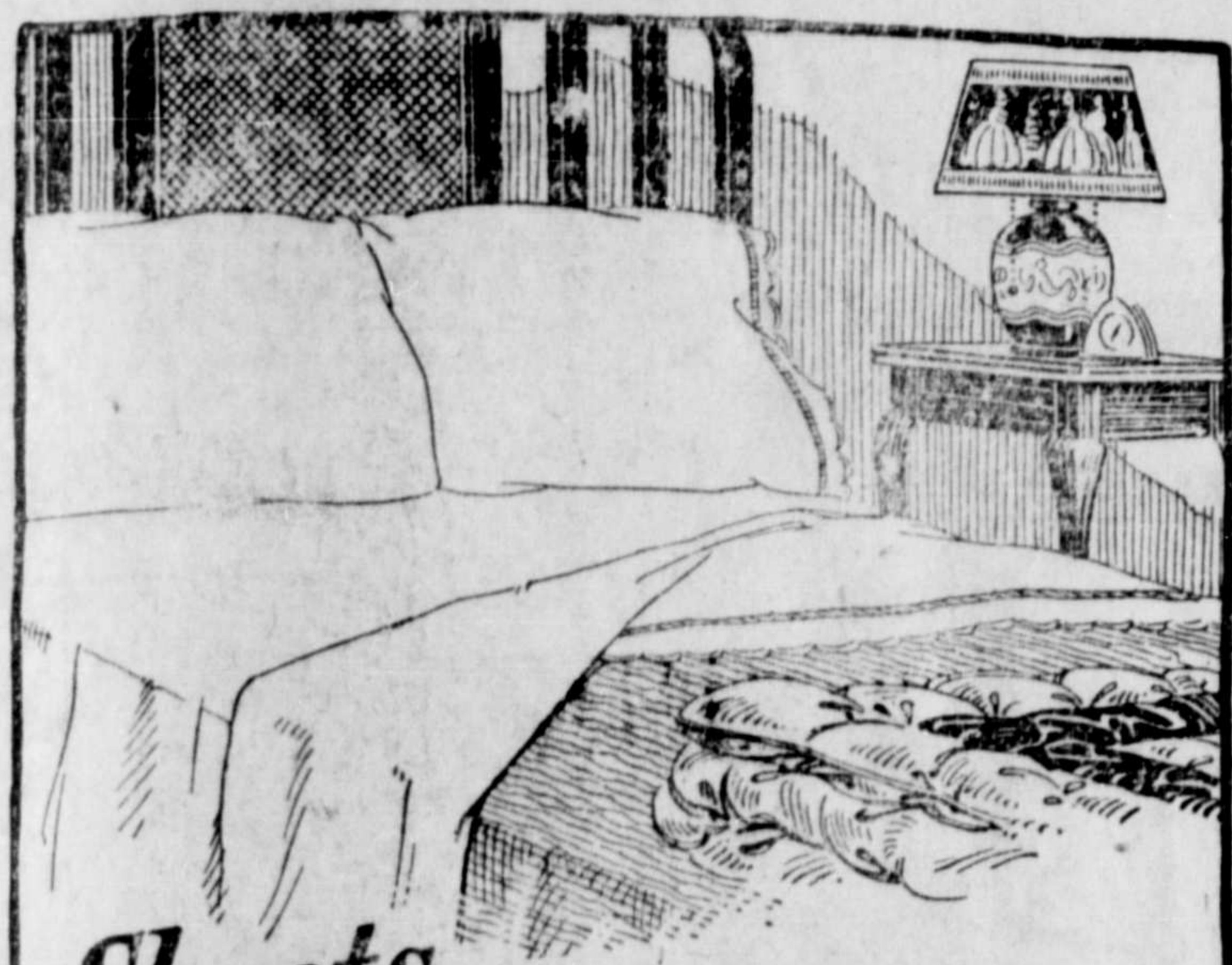

Here and There

Conditions in the fruit areas of British Columbia are reported as satisfactory. Weather conditions have been good and the trees are healthy.

According to recent reports general conditions in the Maritime Provinces are normal. Potato seeding is about complete. Trees in the Annapolis fruit districts are in good shape and estimates point to a normal crop.

A consignment of lumber from South Westminster, B.C., arrived recently at Dorval, Quebec, on the Canadian Pacific lines, consisting of twenty-nine logs of Douglas Fir, some of which were so long that three flat-cars were required to carry them.

Field Marshal Earl Haig and Countess Haig travelled through western Canada to the Pacific coast over the Canadian Pacific Railway recently, after attending the conference of the British Empire Service League at Ottawa.

"Western Canada has never had better crop prospects than which exist now," stated Ernest G. Cook, of E. Cook, Ltd., Crop Insurance Co., of Moose Jaw, Sask., who recently spent two weeks at Banff, after touring the West and studying crop conditions.

According to "Agricultural and Industrial Progress in Canada" the Department of Trade and Commerce has issued the following comparative statement for 1924 and 1925 trade in the Dominion:—

According to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics the annual consumption of standing timber for use, amounts to about 2,600,000,000 cubic feet. The loss by fire, insects and fungi about doubles this depletion, and it is estimated that Canadian forests are depleted at the rate of upwards of five and a half billion cubic feet per annum.

For the first time in the history of Canada upwards of three thousand redskins from the four western provinces and Montana journeyed to McLeod, Alberta, early in July, and held an all-Indian celebration and formed a league of plains Indians. Five thousand white people attended the ceremony and watched the Indians stage their spectacular mounted war-dance.

Deep gratification is felt in Canadian Pacific Railway circles over the receipt of the following cablegram sent to President E. W. Beatty by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales:—"Umvuma, South Africa, July 2nd.—Have just heard of Mr. Howard's death. Please convey to relatives my deepest sympathy. (Signed) Edward P." The late Mr. W. B. Howard was twice in charge of the Prince of Wales' train when His Royal Highness travelled over Canadian Pacific lines.

For the second time in the history of the newsprint industry, Canadian output has run ahead of that of the United States. During the month of May Canada produced 130,013 tons of newsprint, as compared with 129,026 tons in the United States. The cumulative production of Canadian mills for the first five months of the current year totals 622,235, which favorably compares with a production of 652,034 in the United States during the same period.

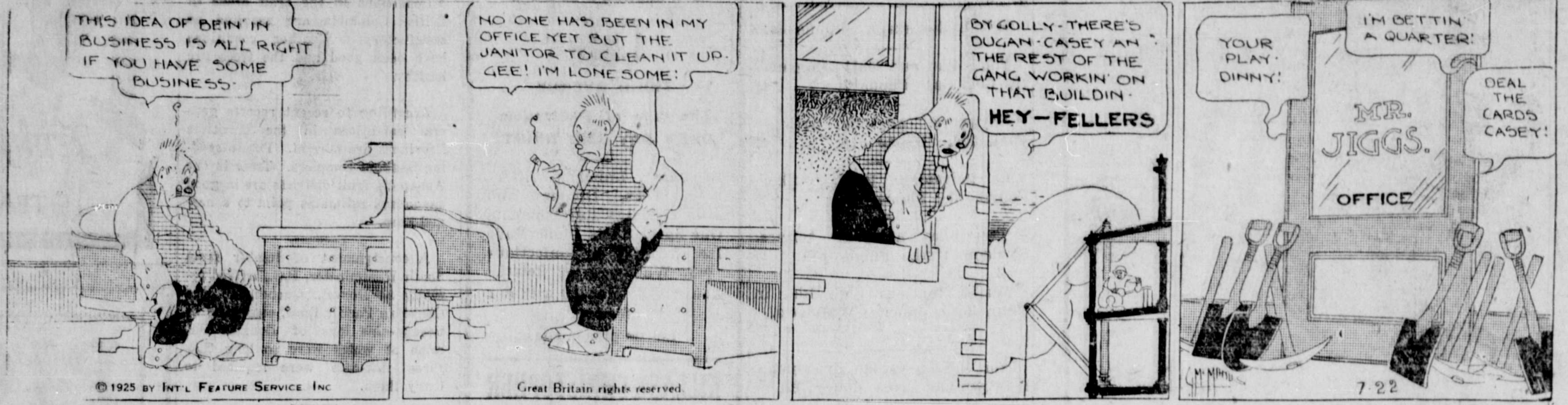

WOMEN COMING INTO THEIR OWN

Entitled to Same Pay for Same Work as Men, Lady Attorney Says

MONTREAL, July 30.—"Women who are as capable as men, will be paid salaries equal to those of men who are doing similar work, before very long," said Miss Dorothy A. Moncreu, attorney in the War Department at Washington and president of the Phi-Delta-Delta Women's Legal Fraternity of the United States, interviewed while in the city.

"In George Washington University alone there are 150 girls studying law. To enter the law course in the next year or so, although at the present time one may study law after having taken only two years of the arts course. Policewomen take up law to improve their general activities, and many girls who aspire to leading positions in the government, study law as it leads them to better things and makes their work more interesting. Most of the women lawyers in Washington favor civil cases, although women are adapted also to the criminal cases. Twenty-five women at the United States capital are practising law very successfully on their own account and have proved an inspiration to the hundreds of girls in the United States who enter law schools every year."

TEN THOUSAND DOLLAR WAGER

J. E. McCoy Making Hike From Frisco to Halifax and Return

WINNIPEG, Man., July 30.—Ten thousand dollars is the wager which J. E. McCoy expects to win from the executive of the San Francisco Athletic Club for his hike from San Francisco to Halifax, N.S., and return, touching at Winnipeg, Calgary and Vancouver. When he reached Winnipeg on his return trip he was seven days ahead of schedule, and barring accidents, Mr. McCoy expects to complete the long hike within the prescribed time limit.

McCoy started from San Francisco on October 25, 1924, and arrived at Halifax, April 17, 1925. He has three months to reach his starting point.

According to the stipulation of the wager, McCoy must travel only on highways and is forbidden to take to the tracks. As he could not find a highway along the north shores of Lake Superior, he left Canada at the Soo, and went through United States territory until he was able to enter near Fort William. He is entirely dependent upon the charity of people in the districts through which he passes for his sustenance.

In passing through Montana, McCoy was held up by bandits, but as he had nothing to give them, he was released. He lived without food for eight days and although he came across a number of Indian villages he was unable to make them understand his plight.

The hiker must not accept a "lift" but must stretch his legs "by after day along the dusty roads until he reaches his goal in San Francisco.
