POWER POSSIBILITIES TO BE INVESTIGATED

SIR ADAM BECK, ONTARIO'S POWER WIZARD, PASSES OFF HUMAN STAGE

**Here to Investigate
Power Situation with
View to Development**

Here to investigate the possibilities of power development and marketing at Prince Rupert, Lorne A. Campbell, vice-president and general manager of the West Kootenay Power & Light Co., arrived from the south on the Princess Alice this morning. He will remain here for a couple of days to go thoroughly into the local situation and the possibilities of development. He is accompanied by Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands and local member of the legislature, and his son, Lorne Jr., is also making the trip.

ELECTION NOT DISCUSSED BY THE CABINET

Hon. Dr. King Says he Will Seek Re-election in East Kootenay if Nominated

VANCOUVER, Aug. 17.—Setting at rest rumors that he might seek to represent a coast constituency, Hon. Dr. King announced here before leaving for Ottawa that he will seek re-election in East Kootenay at the next federal election if nominated by the Liberals there. He said he expected to return in September to make a tour of British Columbia but added that the tour did not have any bearing on the possible election, which subject, he said, had not yet seriously been discussed by the cabinet.

BORDEN PLAN FOR DOMINIONS

Scheme Suggested to Have High Commissioners Given Cabinet Standing

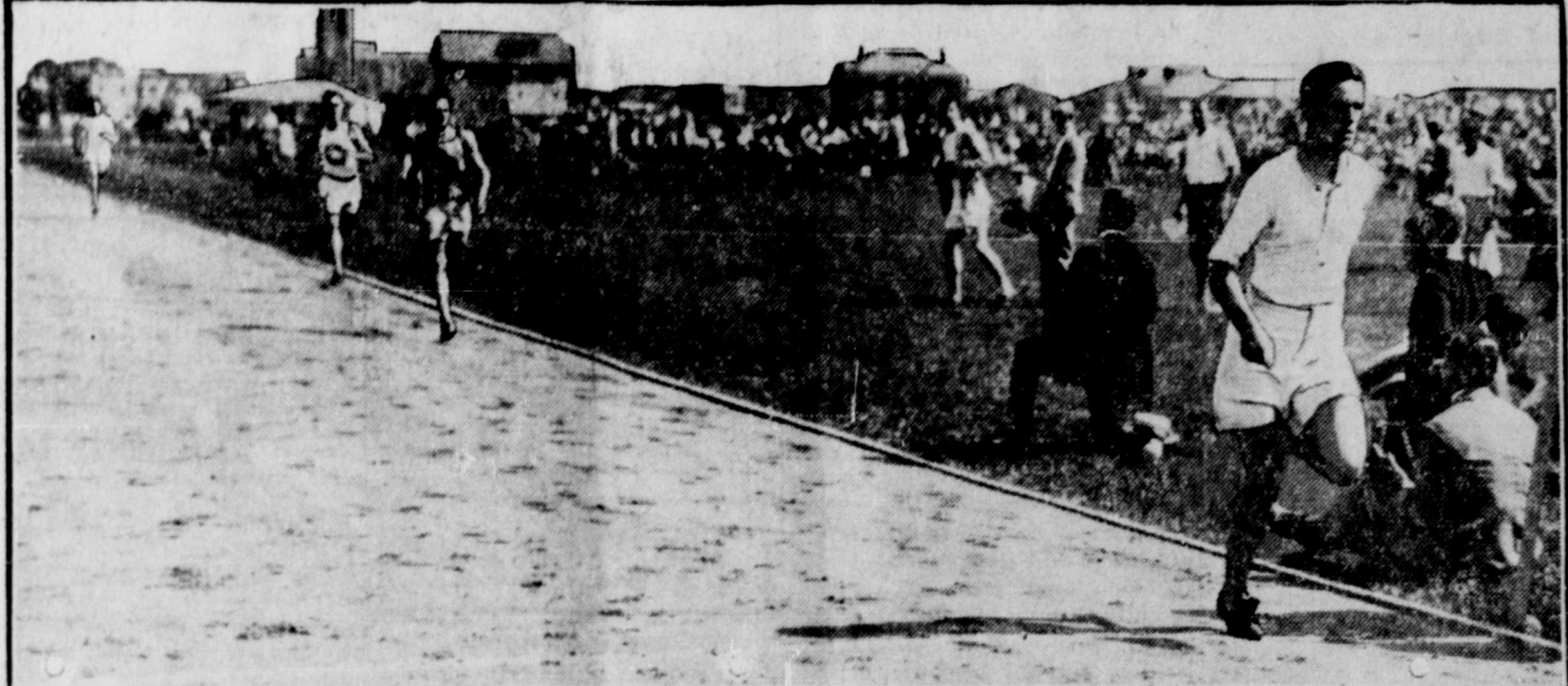

RAILWAY LABOR C.N.R. BOARD

Premier Mackenzie King Says They Should be Represented When Addressing Them

OTTAWA, Aug. 17.—Premier Mackenzie King stated today that the great railway labor organizations of Canada should have representation on the board of the Canadian National Railways. He made the statement when addressing the Dominion legislative board of the brotherhood of locomotive firemen and engineers in session here.

ATLIN MINES LOOKING WELL

Developments Going on Especially at Engineer and Kirkland Properties

That the Atlin mining district is developing fast is the word brought by A. J. Gaul, mining engineer at Stewart, who arrived from the north on the Princess Louise and is returning to Stewart today.

Mr. Gaul says the Ruffner property, a silver-lead mine on Fourth of July Creek has been taken over by the Guggenheims and is being operated by them. The Engineer people are doing a lot of work. Extensive quarters are being erected for the employees and a hospital is being built. Lumber is still going in there. The power plant is being doubled and everything looks like progress there.

WOULD UNITE ALL VETERANS

WINNIPEG, Aug. 17.—The Dominion convention of the Grand Army of United Veterans on Saturday unanimously passed a resolution endorsing a union of all veterans' organizations. It was decided to hold the 1926 convention at Kamloops.

CHIEF INSPECTOR OF FISHERIES IS COMING THIS WEEK

Major J. A. Motherwell, chief inspector of fisheries, will arrive here from Vancouver on the steamer Malaspina on Wednesday morning. Accompanied by John Dybhavn, he will proceed to the interior to inspect the hatchery at Lakelse Lake and the propagation of trout in Lake Kathleen.

Ontario's Power Wizard Dies After Work Had Been Carried on with Success Many Years

LONDON, Aug. 17.—Sir Adam Beck, creator and architect of Ontario's great hydro power system and chairman of the Ontario Hydro-electric Power Commission, noted horseman, former cabinet minister and probably the best known man in the province, died shortly before midnight Saturday at his home here from pernicious anemia in his 68th year. He had been suffering for several months. The funeral takes place in Hamilton.

MAY START WORK SOON

John Dybhavn Expects Tenders to be Called For Biological Station Here

While in Vancouver last week John Dybhavn attended a meeting of the Pacific committee of the federal biological board and, as a result of that meeting, he expects that within a week or so tenders will be called for the erection of the biological station here on the site selected at the west end of the government wharf. Mr. Dybhavn expects to receive plans and specifications for the structure at an early date. All difficulties that have stood in the way of getting the work started seem now to have been removed.

TRUSTEES FOR LOCAL RESORT

Local Men Named to Body that Will Administer Park at Salt Lakes

An order-in-council incorporating the resort surrounding the Salt Lake under the Parks Act and providing for the appointment of a local board of trustees, consisting of Dr. W. T. Kergin, C. H. Orme, Col. S. P. McMorris, J. H. Thompson and H. F. Pullen is now awaiting the signature of the lieutenant governor of the province, announces Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands and local member, who arrived in the city from Victoria this morning. This will complete steps that were started by Mr. Pattullo to have the park brought under local control.

FEDERAL ELECTION MAY BE POSTPONED

Possibility of Another Session Before Appeal is Made to Country

(Special to Daily News)
OTTAWA, Aug. 17.—There is a rumor here in Liberal circles that the general election may quite likely be postponed until after the next session of parliament. If it is held this year it will be not long before Christmas. To hold an election during the harvest or season of fall plowing on the prairies would seriously interfere with the work.

CANADA ELIMINATED FROM DAVIS CUP BY LOSING TO AUSTRALIA

Southern Contingent Tennis Players Will Now be Matched Against Japanese Champions

MONTREAL, Aug. 17.—Victories for Patterson and James Anderson in the final singles contests in the second round of the Davis Cup series with Canada Saturday gave Australia a clean sweep, the visitors winning five matches to one. Anderson defeated Wright 6-2, 6-4, 6-1. Australians now enter their third round. They will meet the Japanese players who eliminated Spain at Baltimore this week.

GOVERNOR CONCLUDES TRIP TO THE ARCTIC

Arrives in Edmonton and is Met There by Lady Byng

EDMONTON, Aug. 17.—Concluding a month's trip to the Arctic during which he covered more than 4,000 miles since he left here on July 13, Governor General Byng arrived Saturday and was met by Lady Byng, who has spent the past month in British Columbia. The governor spent four days in the Edmonton district.

NO ELECTION TO BE ANNOUNCED

Final Decision Will Await Arrival Home of Governor

OTTAWA, Aug. 17.—This afternoon's meeting of the cabinet, to which particular significance is attached in view of the possibility of an election late in October or early in November, will be attended by Hon. P. C. Larkin, high commissioner in London, who arrived Saturday and spent the week end with the Premier. The question of cabinet reorganization in the event of an election will be decided upon and continues to be a subject of discussion in political circles here.

Premier Dunning left for the West Saturday night. Whatever passed between Premier King and Premier Dunning during their conversations is unknown. Any announcement in this respect will probably await the decision on the question of an election. It is felt that no public announcement will be made in regard to a possible election until the Governor returns from the west next month.

REDUCTION OF TARIFF LIKELY

John Dybhavn Expects This Will be Outcome of Conference Held Last Week in Seattle

"As far as the Canadian representatives were concerned they received a fair and satisfactory hearing and, in the evidence placed before the commission investigating the halibut tariff at Seattle last week and the preliminary report submitted, it was proved conclusively that a reduction of fifty per cent in the duty on Canadian Halibut entering the United States is justified," declares John Dybhavn, manager of the Royal Fish Co., who returned home on the Gardena last night after having attended the conference in Seattle.

There will be a conference in Washington on October 20 between the United States and Canadian governments on the matter of the halibut tariff and the commission in Seattle is anxious to have its report in the hands of the President of the United States by that time, Mr. Dybhavn says. Until then it is not likely that any final decision will be reached or announced.

HAIL CAUSES MUCH DAMAGE

Southern Manitoba Experiences Terrific Storm That Takes Crop

WINNIPEG, Aug. 17.—Great damage to the crops in a large section of southern Manitoba on Saturday night was caused by a terrific hail and wind storm with rain. In some sections the loss went as high as 100 per cent while many farmers report eighty per cent loss.

Seals Eat Salmon Says U.S. Senator.

According to Senator Dill the seals which make their homes on the Pribiloff Islands eat a million tons of salmon a year. This is worth more than the proceeds of the seal pelts. There are said to be 800,000 seals on the islands.

We still are of opinion that it would be a good thing to have the seal treaty abrogated and that Prince Rupert fishermen should be given a chance to hunt the seals in the open sea. The statement of Senator Dill seems to indicate that Alaskans may be of the same opinion as ourselves, Alaska as a territory cannot benefit much from the present arrangement but if there were open sealing, Ketchikan fishermen would have an opportunity to take part in the hunt and earn a few dollars when fishing was poor. In that way they would benefit the salmon fishermen.

Fishermen And New Sources Of Supply.

Fishermen everywhere will be interested to hear how those Norwegian fishermen fared who went up Davis Strait to ply their calling during the summer months. Something like a thousand men have gone into those waters to put up salt fish. This was a result of an expedition sent out by the Norwegian government to search for new sources of supply.

It is possible there may be more halibut banks off this coast, which so far have not been discovered. No one can afford the time to make an extensive search. If the government does not act, a fisherman may blunder across the bank some day.

Have Americans A Sense Of Humor.

Humor is not altogether a national trait. We think the Irish are humorous and yet we have met Irish people who were more stolid than an Englishman. There are plenty of Americans who have not the slightest sense of humor. If they had they would not act as they do. True, there was a Mark Twain and there is a Ring Lardner and an Irvin Cobb. That would indicate nothing were it not that people read their writings, which often are quite humorous. Sometimes their efforts to be humorous are funny. Americans are just about as humorous as most folks, no more and no less and they are just as funny. We can laugh with them and also laugh at them.

Do We Wear Too Little Clothes?

Some people are shocked at the small amount of clothes worn on the beaches and in the ballrooms. They point to the present customs as signs of decadence. Yet they must admit that the present customs are far preferable to the old ones. Many people remember the time when it was considered indecent for men and women to bathe on the same beach, even though at that time women wore much more clothes in the water than they do today. Yet people were not any more moral in those days, and we seriously doubt if they were equal to the boys and girls of today in the standards of right and wrong.

The amount of clothes worn is purely a matter of custom. In Vancouver it is common to see young men and young women on the streets in their bathing costumes. We are becoming less prudish and more sensible.

Oriental Like Gambling Games.

One of the Vancouver newspapers has compiled a table showing that since the beginning of the year 1923 Orientals were arrested in gambling raids in that city and that fines to the amount of \$20,630 were paid. According to the same authority the games are still going on and foolish yellow men continue to stake their cash and lose it, just like white people. Taking a chance is something we sometimes admire and sometimes the people who do it are wicked gamblers.

FREE COUNTRY NO PLACE FOR BOLSHEVISTS

Most of Them are Foreigners Who Came from Land Where People Oppressed

An interesting editorial article entitled "Why Be Bolshevists?" appeared in a recent number of the Nelson News. It follows: "Of the rank and file of Canadian bolshevists, nine out of ten at least, and probably a higher per centage, are from foreign soils. Lecturing on the beauties of bolshevism, viewed at a safe distance, probably makes a good living for some native Canadian bolshevists, such as A. E. Smith, once a Methodist parson in Nelson, but it is among the newcomers, used to seething against oppression, that the rank and file of this more or less invisible school of thought is recruited.

Among the foreigners on the waterfront of Port Arthur, among the foreigners in the coal mines of Drumheller, possibly among some groups of foreign-born in the Kootenay, the tendency to seethe, borne of real oppression in their several "old countries," is capitalized by crafty agitators.

New Canadians

But why should these who have come to Canada to be "New Canadians," to better themselves under the free and equitable constitution and laws of Canada, permit themselves to associate with the aim of destruction, levelled against the peace of the country by whose grace they are enjoying privileges and a prosperity they never knew in the old land?

Here is a thought or two for these newcomers who have not yet properly settled down to appreciation of their Canadian liberties.

If they become Canadian citizens, they enjoy perfect political equality with all other Canadians. The rule of "One man or woman, one vote," governs in Canada. In none of the old countries from which they have come to us is there such a broad or liberal suffrage, if indeed their working class were even admitted to it. Even in modern Germany, the great state of Prussia, comprising more than half the empire, had a franchise under which the vote of one aristocrat was equal to the votes of many others lower in the social scale. Yet Canadians for over a century have enjoyed virtual manhood suffrage or better.

Personal Liberty

No man can wrongfully put another in prison in Canada and keep him there. The laws as to personal liberty are the same for all.

No man can, by right of feudal lordship, dishonor his tenant's home, in Canada. The courts are open alike to the rich and poor for redress of injury.

No man can dictate another man's job in Canada. Subject to the laws made to keep human life and property safe, any man or woman in Canada may enter any lawful occupation.

Families are not attached to certain estates, in a species of semi-slavery. Debts do not descend upon children, to hold them in thrall to usurers. There are no usurers, for the law forbids them legal standing.

Every province of Canada provides free education, placing the child of the immigrant on an equal footing with the child of the wealthiest man, to up the working age.

Land may be purchased and owned by anyone, and under certain conditions may be obtained free or practically so from the various governments.

Every man has a right to his own earnings in Canada, for the benefit of himself and his family. There is no limit to the advancement he may make, and no limit to the fair profits he may produce for himself by engaging in industry, subject to the just dues to the government for administering the country.

Free Speech

If a law in Canada is not fair in the estimation of any man, he has the right of free speech, by which to advocate a change in that law, and his political power, used in conjunction with that of a sufficient number of his fellows can peacefully secure its amendment.

Subject to the personal rights of every individual, and to rights

guaranteed to minorities by the constitution, the majority rules. When our "New Canadians" take thought to compare their political and material condition here with the status they were held to in the lands of their birth, they will soon come to see that the Canadian constitution embodies just the freedom they came here hoping to find, and that upsetting of this order is the last thing they should want.

SUN DEFENDS RAILWAY HEAD

Attacks Hon. Arthur Meighen for His Attitude Toward Canadian National

The Vancouver Sun, which often attacks the Government, defends Sir Henry Thornton and the Canadian National in a recent editorial article. It says:

What good does Mr. Meighen expect to accomplish for himself and for Canada with his constant attacks on Sir Henry Thornton and the Canadian National?

The figures which Sir Henry gave in Vancouver last week show that, notwithstanding a decrease in gross earnings, there was an increase in the net earnings of the Canadian National amounting to 17 per cent. Surely this is a showing of which Sir Henry and every Canadian National employee must be proud.

And, as owners of the road, it must be pleasing to the people of Canada to know that their road is making such progress.

So what has Mr. Meighen to gain? And if he continues playing politics against the Canadian National and its 100,000 employees, will Mr. Meighen not find the Canadian National and its employees and their friends playing politics against Mr. Meighen?

During his three years as President of the Canadian National, we have never seen in print, from Sir Henry, one single statement of political significance. On the contrary, Sir Henry, by public and private gesture and utterance, has valiantly fought against political interference with the road and its employees.

In the interests of Canada and in the interests of the Conservative party, it would seem like sound advice to Mr. Meighen to suggest that he stop his attacks on Sir Henry, his organi-

IRRIGATION PLAN IS DUBBED AS UNMORAL BY MINISTER LANDS

NELSON, B.C., Aug. 17. — "Knowing what I know of the whole question, having given it the most careful study for years, being the minister under whom the present policy has been followed, I look upon the suggestion to shunt part of the burden upon the province at large as positively unmoral," declared Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, with reference to the Kelowna irrigation convention resolution advocating a policy of government contribution to irrigation projects.

"That conditions vary in different districts, and that there are some outstanding questions affecting each that will require further consideration and action, we are well aware, and appropriate action will be taken in respect thereof as changing conditions dictate but the people who actually own and operate and get the direct benefit from the systems will have to do the paying.

"If irrigation farming is to be bonused, so also should dry farming, so also should lumbering, and in fact, to be consistent, every other line of endeavor."

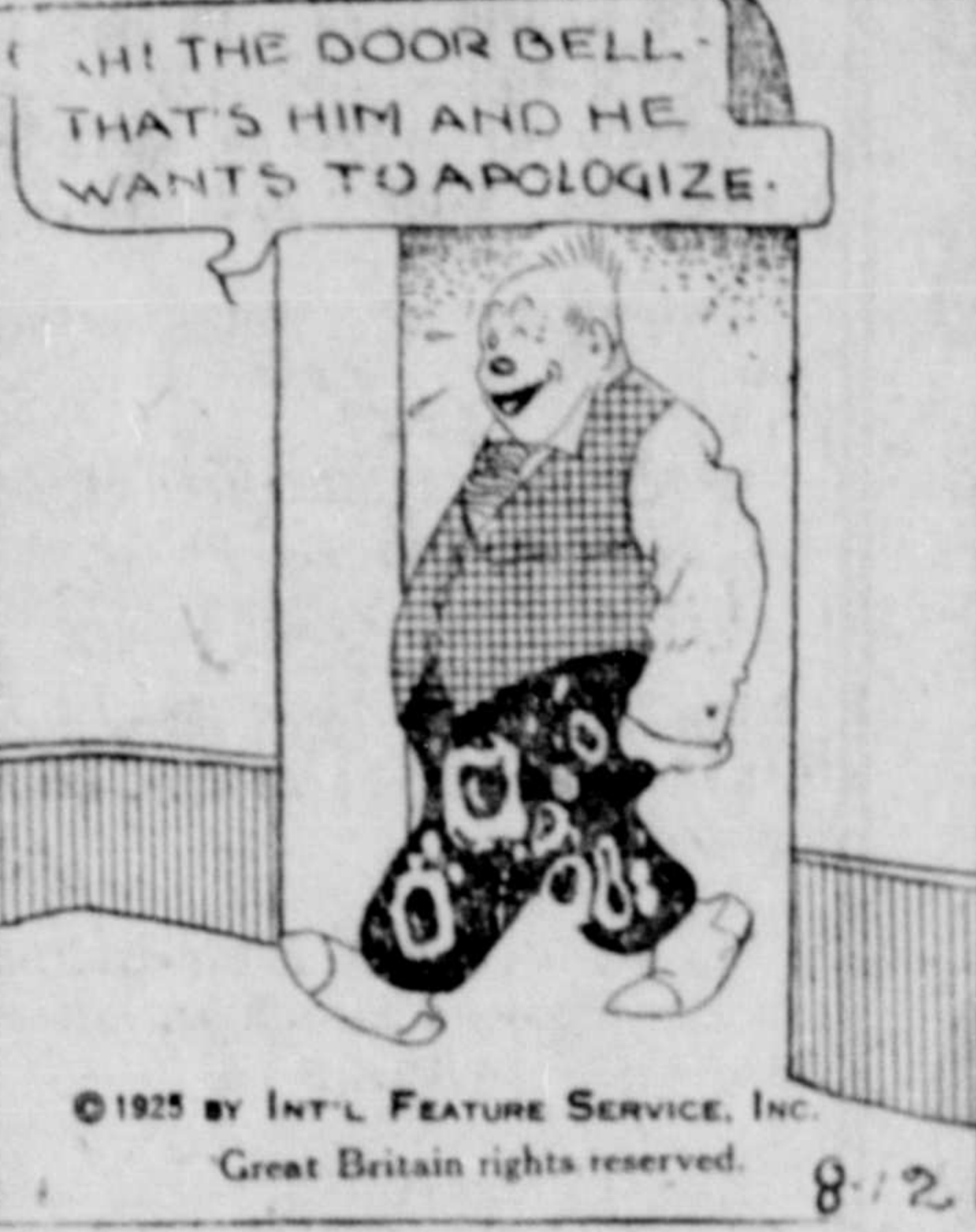

Independence and United Empire Mines in Bear River Valley at Stewart Dealt With in Report

(By G. A. Clothier, Resident Mining Engineer)
The Independence Gold Mining Co., Ltd., was incorporated early in 1924 with a capitalization of 1,500,000 shares of \$1.00 a share par value. The holdings of the company consist of the Independence group of six claims on Goose creek owned by the Fitzgerald Bros., of Stewart. During the winter the main tunnel was extended to about 270 feet, exposing some ore, and it was therefore decided to erect a small compressor. Several log buildings were erected, including a bunk house, cook house,

trites, or the Pacific Mines, Petroleum, and Development Company, Limited, a limited company incorporated for 2,400,000 shares at \$1 a share par value, in December, 1922.
Work was started on the No. 3 vein, on which there is a very promising exposure of ore. A cut was put across this with good results. FISHERMEN ON TARIFF

Unanimity for Reduction Was Feature of Seattle Hearing says Local Union Agent

A feature of the evidence presented at the halibut tariff conference in Seattle last week was that American and Canadian fishermen alike were desirous of a reduction in the tariff being made, states J. H. Meagher, local agent for the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union who, accompanied by Mrs. Meagher, returned to the city this morning on the Prince Charles after attending the conference. Mr. Meagher himself had a petition, containing some 140 names about equally divided between American and Canadian fishermen, asking for a reduction in the tariff. There was a similar petition from Petersburg, Alaska, and it was notable that Ketchikan, which staged the most bitter fight for the continuation of the present tariff, had no petition from fishermen asking that the tariff be maintained.

As far as the Canadian fishermen were concerned, Mr. Meagher says that it was made plain that, unless there was a reduction in the tariff on Canadian fish entering the United States, the fight for the closing of Canadian Pacific ports to American fish would be continued.

Despite bitter opposition, against tariff reduction, Mr. Meagher is hopeful that such may be recommended in the commission's report to the President of the United States.

EDMONTON, Alta., Aug. 17.—(Canadian Press)—At the opening of the Red Cross Outpost hospital at Rife, Alta., recently, the celebration was of a unique nature, the Indians coming in from the reserve to assist. The admission tickets were sold by chief Red Blanket, Chief Young Chief, aged 86 years, also lent dignity to the occasion by his presence. A small hog sold by auction for \$26.50, a box of candy for \$13.50, a blue kitten for \$5 and a June bride doll, \$15.75. There was a creditable display of butter, bread and cakes and home-made articles of clothing. An Indian woman donated a quilt made from the empty tobacco sacks collected at the Mounted Police Barracks at Onion Lake. This quilt took ten years to make, and is a striking example of Indian patience. The quilt will be sent to the tobacco company. The hospital under the management of Miss Anderson will provide valuable assistance to the settlers.

IMMENSE DAMAGE FROM RAIN IN JAPAN

Several People Drowned and Loss Estimated Fifteen to Twenty Million Yen

TOKIO, Aug. 17.—Several people were drowned during a violent rainstorm which flooded various parts of Japan today. The damage is estimated at between fifteen and twenty million yen.

DUNWELL MINE TO SELL STOCK

Company Proposes to Continue Its Own Operations Instead of Selling

VICTORIA, Aug. 17.—The Dunwell shareholders are proposing to develop their own property instead of selling it. A meeting of shareholders is to be held next week when a concrete proposal will be laid before them by the directors. The general scheme as discussed now is as follows:—The mine is to be retained under the present directorate and developed, the necessary funds to be raised by the sale of more stock.

A prominent engineer is to be engaged to have charge of the work with a view to placing the property on a shipping basis immediately or as soon as possible.

Present shareholders are to have first opportunity to purchase new stock at par.

For several months past the company has been making an effort to sell the property outright at such a price as would give the shareholders a good return on their invested capital. This having failed it is decided by them to operate the mine themselves and develop it as a purely British Columbia property.

When the possible sale of the property was first announced the price of the stock jumped, but as the sale did not materialize and the shareholders realized it they began to unload and the price became depressed until today it is worth less than half what it was a month or two ago.

If the directors show that they can command the money market and raise the necessary money to carry on, the price of this stock should again rise. The value is still there.

ONTARIO'S POWER WIZARD DIES AFTER WORK HAD BEEN CARRIED ON WITH SUCCESS MANY YEARS.

Ontario Legislature as member for London in the General Election of 1923, and was appointed Minister without Portfolio in the government of Hon. G. Howard Ferguson.

"Remember Beck \$6,000,000 is the limit," Sir James Whitney is said to have cautioned Beck when the first government guarantee of hydro bonds was demanded. Mr. Beck found little difficulty in getting the Whitney limit raised to hundreds of millions after he had shown him what he could do. The first provincially owned current from Niagara was turned on in the town of Berlin, now of Kitchener, in 1910. The second transmission line was built to Toronto.

Beck continued to represent London in the Legislature until 1919 when he went down with the Conservative party in the Provincial general election. He was retained by the Drury U.F.O. Labor Government however, as chairman of the Power Commissions, in which capacity he at that time was paid a salary of \$18,000 a year.

Broke with Farmers

Sir Adam Beck's plans in Hydro affairs met with setbacks under the Drury United Farmer Government, particularly with reference to Hydro Electric Railways. A Royal Commission, after several months of investigation, recommended against building certain radial railways under provincial guarantees, and thereby took issue with the Hydro Commission and Sir Adam Beck. This report caused a certain division between Sir Adam and the government when the latter made it clear that they were inclined to accept the Royal Commission's report as the one to follow.

Then there was the break over the cost of the Chippawa project and while the Drury Government did not stop the work there it held up the latest advance of three and a half million dollars until the legislature could vote on it. Sir Adam defended the stand of the Hydro Commission with characteristic vigor, attacked the Royal Commission's report and defended the Hydro Commission's expenditures.

P. W. Anderson, road superintendent, returned to the city on the Prince John today after having made his annual tour of inspection on the Queen Charlotte Islands.

They will come up for trial tomorrow on charges of resisting arrest, doing wilful damage and assault.

MANY FATALITIES IN EASTERN CANADA

OTTAWA, Aug. 17.—A double drowning and four other fatalities were reported from eastern Canada this morning bringing the week end toll to fifteen.

SENSU TRIBESMEN RISE AGAINST ITALY

PARIS, Aug. 17.—Reports received here state that 700,000 members of the Sensu tribesmen of northern and central Africa have risen in rebellion against Italy in Tripoli.

There was a battery of moving picture cameras aboard the C. P. R. steamer Princess Alice which was in port this morning bound north for Alaska. There were also some big hunting aggregations aboard including James Lippitt Clark, assistant director of the American Museum of Natural History, and Mrs. Clark who are going on a two months' trip to the Cassiar district expressly to collect specimens of caribou for the museum.
