### Salt Lake In Hands Of Citizens.

By putting a board representative citizens in control of the place the provincial government will have lived up to its promise of turning over the Salt Lake to the people of Prince Rupert as a public resort. On this board will devolve the responsibility of administering and caring for the resort and it will have the authority to adopt such methods as it sees fit to carry out the work -under the supervision of and at the consent of the government which owns the land. Further improvements to the lake and its surroundings will be arranged and financed by this board. The government will, undoubtedly, continue to give some assistance and the Prince Rupert Swimming Club can still keep up its activity as an adjunct to the board-both active and advisory.

### Scopes Trial Is Battle Of Wits.

A deep interest, not only on the North American continent, but also in Europe, seems to be taken in the Scopes evolution trial which is now taking place in the village of Dayton, Tennessee. The accused is charged with teaching a theory which is contrary to the state laws of Tennessee. Some states have no statute against such teaching while others-such as Tennessee—have. The case does not seem, to be so very important of public meetings to be held in itself and more interest will attach itself as to who will be the winner in the legal battle between William Jennings Bryan and Clarence Darrow and their lieutenants than as to what actually will happen to John T. Scopes. This interest has been largely worked up by newspapermen and there is also a taint of politics involved.

### Education Is Going Amiss.

News columns tell the story of six Vancouver men who have just passed examinations entitling them to practice the medical profession in the State of Washington.

That means that the brains and energies of six intelligent young Canadians have been lost to the Dominion of Canada and gained by United States.

And the reason they have been lost to Canada is because Canadian educational institutions are not training men according to the abilities of the country to absorb them. They insist on making doctors when the country needs good farmers, and on making lawyers when the country needs pioneers.

Today everyone wants to go in for a professional or business career. No one wants to go in for a trade. Everyone wants to wear kid gloves and keep, as far as possible, from actually soiling his hands.

And the universities and schools are encouraging that viewpoint.

The dignity of the professions is preached in and out of season. The dignity of labor is ignored. The result is that the manhood and womanhood of this country are being unfitted for the common duties of life.

A country of 9,000,000 people can absorb only a limited number of professional men. So after Canada and Canadian little. universities carefully turn out a surplus number of professional men, United States promptly swallows them up, because in a country of 110,000,000 people they can find a wider market for their abilities and training.

What Canadian universities need to emphasize is the dignity of labor. What they need to produce is a quantity of craftsmen, farmers and working men who are trained to get out and do the work that is waiting to be done .- Vancouver Sun.

The preserve has already been made by British Columbia though the United States government has not yet.

Mr. Jackson and Mr. Butler were joined here by other members of the board - Hon. J. A. Buckham of Golden; T. B. Booth, Nanaimo publisher; Dr. P. D. MacSween, dentist of New Westminster, and J. Murray of Vanderhoof-and the first of a series place here in the Court House last night. 




