CANNERIES DESTROYED IN ESSINGTON FIRE

FORMER LOCAL MAN IS HELD IN VANCOUVER ON COMPLAINTS FROM HERE

Plan Outlined to Parliament by Premier Baldwin Expected to Mend Cabinet Differences

LONDON, July 23.—Premier Baldwin, in Parliament today, announced that the government's naval construction program would include two cruisers to be laid down in October, two next February and three yearly thereafter. This makes four cruisers to be constructed this fiscal year and three next year.

The government has also decided upon the annual construction of nine destroyers and six submarines together with certain auxiliary vessels beginning with the fiscal year of 1926-27. This program is to be continued during the normal life of the present parliament.

It is felt that the program will pacify cabinet members and admiralty officials, among whom relations have been strained over matters of naval policy.

HEAT AND HAIL DAMAGE CROPS SOUTH FRANCE

PARIS, July 23.—A series of electrical storms last night brought to an end the heat wave from which France has been suffering for many days. Much damage was done throughout the country, especially in the southwestern section. In Beauce, one of the most famous wheat regions of Europe, whole fields were beaten flat by hail. The Layrisse and Pique valleys are under water. The damage in Normandy to the apple and wheat crops will amount to several million francs.

CHAKAWANA IS SEIZED

VICTORIA, July 23.—The liquor freighter Chakawana of Vancouver was seized in Barkley Sound on Tuesday night and was brought here by the government steamer Armentieres. There is considerable liquor aboard which is believed to be part of the cargo of a mysterious five-masted vessel which left Shanghai last March for this coast with 50,000 cases aboard.

The Chakawana was formerly used in this district by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police on patrol work. She is a gasoline boat.

SMALL ALASKA SALMON PACK

BELLINGHAM, July 23.—The smallest pack of red salmon in the history of Alaska, probably not exceeding about 40 per cent of the normal, is predicted for 1925 by E. B. Deming, president of the American Fisheries.

RIDLEY WINS AGAIN.
VANCOUVER, July 23.—The touring Bishop Ridley college cricketers of St. Catherine's defeated the local representative eleven yesterday by 150 runs to 78 on the first innings.

COAL MINERS IN BRITAIN STRIKE

Will Go Out on July 31 as Protest Against Wage Reduction

LONDON, July 23.—A general strike of all British Union coal miners will commence on July 31, the miners' executive decided last night at a meeting here. The difference is over wages, the miners refusing to accept a cut proposed by the owners.

REGINA HAS BIG BLAZE

REGINA, July 23.—Damage estimated at \$150,000 resulted when the plant of the Canadian Oil Co. Ltd. was destroyed last night in the most spectacular blaze in the city's history. Great damage was avoided through the strenuous work of the firemen who prevented the flames from reaching twelve large tanks containing about 20 million gallons of motor oil. The explosions of gasoline drums and oil tanks hurled barrels of flaming liquid through the air to the distance of a city block. The tanks contained more than three million gallons of gasoline.

WESTERN CRICKET.

REGINA, July 23.—In the Western Canada cricket tournament on Wednesday, Manitoba defeated British Columbia by seven runs, the score being 126 to 133. It was B.C.'s first defeat.

Two Canneries at Port Essington Going up in Smoke; Town Menaced

Vancouver Board of Trade Party Visits Hazelton and Finds Wealth and Romance

(Special to Daily News)

HAZELTON, July 23.—A land rich in romantic tradition as well as in wealth of timber, minerals and agriculture, awaiting completion of a road system which will link it directly with Vancouver, was surveyed by members of the Vancouver Board of Trade excursion party spending yesterday in this pioneer northern settlement.

When the transprovincial highway link now under construction in the Fraser canyon is opened and a twenty-five mile gap is filled between Burns Lake and Endako, tourists will be able to drive from Los Angeles to Vancouver, outfit for another long drive and come north over the old Cariboo road of gold rush fame to Prince George, Hazelton and Terrace.

"Then watch this valley come into its own," declares R. S. Sargent, prominent citizen of Hazelton who, with Dr. Winch, M.L.A., arranged entertainment of the Vancouver party. "We have all the elements that go to make a tourist country to which people will come from all parts of the south. We have the historical romance, the Indians, totem poles, hunting, fishing, beautiful scenery and colorful northern life."

"Our tourist trade is going to be of immense importance to Vancouver since it will bring thousands through your city to holiday in this immense and beautiful northwest. We watch the progress of events in Vancouver and feel that it is our city and that your problems are our problems. We believe that you appreciate the wealth of resources and the opportunities that lie in the north awaiting only the advent of men and money to give British Columbia great and lasting prosperity."

COPPER MT. TO REOPEN

Col. Crabbs, Granby President, Now on Way to Anyox

(Special to Daily News)

VANCOUVER, July 23.—Col. Crabbs, president of the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting & Power Co., announced yesterday that operations of the company at Copper Mountain will be resumed as soon as the railway is repaired about the middle of August. A large gang is now engaged in the work of reconditioning the railway which connects with the Kettle Valley Railway at Princeton. All the concentrates from the Allenby mill, which handles the Copper Mountain ore, will go to the Trail smelter.

Col. Crabbs, accompanied by Col. D. C. Jackling, a director of the company and a millionaire copper king, sailed last night for Anyox.

RAIN CHECKS FOREST FIRES

Situation in South is Now Well in Hand, State Forestry Officials

VANCOUVER, July 23.—Fairly general rains over the Lower Mainland and in the Kootenay have checked the forest fires and forestry officials believe today that the situation is well in hand. In the vicinity of Revelstoke, serious fires that have been burning during the past few days were checked by an all night rain.

Wholesalers in South and Rupert Merchants Victimized by Fraud

George C. McAllister is arrested on charges of realizing cash on worthless checks

VANCOUVER, July 23.—Nearly one hundred merchants and citizens of Vancouver having been victimized by means of worthless checks and merchants of Prince Rupert having been loaded down with goods shipped from here that they did not order, the police are now holding George C. McAllister on definite charges in connection with the issuance of some of the checks. McAllister appeared in police court here yesterday morning and was remanded for one week.

Investigation shows that a man, claiming to be a partner of a Prince Rupert merchant, visited numerous wholesale houses and ordered large bills of goods, tendering checks and receiving the excess of the checks over the orders in cash. Meantime the startled merchants of Prince Rupert found every boat bringing them large shipments of goods which they had no use for and which they could not dispose of. Finally local wholesale merchants were wired to accept no further orders.

McAllister was arrested on Tuesday while arranging for a shipment of hardware to Prince Rupert. The majority of the checks were drawn on Prince Rupert banks.

Some of the local merchants who are said to have been involved as a result of McAllister's orders are W. W. Wrathall, Fred Gilhuly, George Hill and the Family Shoe Store. McAllister left Prince Rupert some two months ago and for some time the police in the south have been on his trail. He was formerly connected with the Massett Timber Co. at Buckley Bay and later in Prince Rupert was employed by Mr. Wrathall and Lipsitt & Cunningham.

FORETELLS AN ALASKA 'QUAKE

Italian Prophet Says the North Will Tremble on Saturday or Sunday

FAENZA, Italy, July 23.—Raphael Bendali, the earthquake prophet who has correctly foretold a number of quakes in the past two years, predicts that there will be violent disturbances in the region of Alaska on July 25 or 26 and also in Japan on July 30.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., July 23.—Two men killed and three others probably fatally injured marked the end of an auto joyride through the streets here early this morning. The car, being driven at a terrific speed, swerved into an iron trolley pole.

Ketchikan Breaks Loose Again.

The pronouncement in Seattle yesterday of Edward Morrissey, editor of the Ketchikan Chronicle, that a fight was to be launched against any reduction in the halibut tariff and that steps were to be renewed with a view to preventing the marketing in the United States of any fish not landed at an American port makes it look as if the business men of Ketchikan, leagued to have a monopoly of the halibut industry in all its phases, are about to stage another battle against Prince Rupert. This seems particularly disappointing to Prince Rupert at a time when better relations between Prince Rupert and Ketchikan have been so much in the limelight.

The Ketchikan people in the past have not been altogether successful in their efforts to prevent the landing of American halibut at this port and it is doubtful if these renewed efforts will be any more successful. The fishermen themselves will be heard from. It is well known that the fewer restrictions on the port of Prince Rupert there are the better it will be for them. The petition from Petersburg, Alaska, one of the most important fishing communities in Alaska, asking for a reduction in the tariff, is an indication of the feeling of the American fishermen. After all Ketchikan is not "the whole cheese" in Alaska and the opinion or statements of Mr. Morrissey are by no means those of the Alaskans as a whole or the American fishermen.

Death Sentence Or Imprisonment.

There is a good deal to be said in support of the death sentence as against life imprisonment for murderers. If the courts decide that a man with criminal instincts is not safe to be at large, the question is: What good is it to himself or to society to keep him in jail for the rest of his days? Murder is altogether too common an occurrence in the world nowadays and the fear of losing one's own life if another's is deliberately taken seems to be the only effective deterrent. Until a more proper value is generally placed on human life, it would seem inconsistent for governments to take the step of abolishing capital punishment.

PASTORS AND NEWSPAPERS

Valuable Suggestions Made in Address Recently Delivered in Houston, Texas

Some interesting suggestions as to the relations of ministers and newspapers were given recently by Frank Leroy Blanchard of New York in addressing the Church Advertising Department of the convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World at Houston, Texas. A good portion of this address is here-with reprinted in the hope that its suggestions may prove of value not only to the pastors of Prince Rupert but to many others in public positions who have frequent contact with the press.

The pastor of a church in a prosperous city of the middle west complained to an elderly clerical friend from out of town, who was his guest, that the local newspapers seldom published anything about his church. Previous to the assumption of his present pastorate he had been for two years the rector of a church in his home town where he knew everybody and where the newspapers had been particularly generous in chronicling the news of his parish. His visitor knew this and he also knew that he was popular with his new parishioners. The lack of publicity which he had complained was therefore not due to any defect in his ability as a preacher or pastor.

"I am afraid," began his visitor, "that you have not co-operated with the local newspapers in the way you should. Perhaps that is the reason they have not paid more attention to your church. Co-operation implies mutual helpfulness. It takes two persons or groups of persons to practice co-operation. You wonder why the representatives of the newspapers are not more eager to print items about what is going on in your church. Tell me, frankly, have you personally done anything to indicate your desire to co-operate with them in their newsgathering efforts?"

"Well," replied the clergyman, "I always treat them courteously when they call to see me and give them the information they desire when I am free to do so."

Go to Papers

"But that is not enough," said his visitor. "If you wait for the reporters to come to you uninvited, you may wait a long time before one of them appears. Bees are no more industrious in gathering honey from thousands of flowers than reporters in searching for news. They will travel through storm and flood and endure all kinds of discomfort to get an important piece of news for the papers that employ them. To anyone who gives them aid in their eternal round of duty—for there is no end to the unquenchable thirst of the public for news—they are always grateful.

"Therefore, it is to your interest to make friends of the newspaper men and women by co-operating with them. You will find them willing to meet you more than half way. Most of those with whom you will come in contact are college graduates and keen readers of human nature. Their work is hard and often not very remunerative. You are in a position to render them valuable assistance if you will make the effort."

"I am curious to know what I am to do," said the rector, smilingly to his friend. "I had supposed all along that the reporters would cover our church services as a routine duty."

"In a small town they might do that, but not in a city of this size with thirty churches," continued the visitor. "How can you win the good will and co-operation of the newspaper men? I will tell you.

It Pays Well

"I take it for granted that you advertise your Sunday services in the newspapers. Some churches do not, and miss an opportunity to attract larger congregations and increase their income. A Detroit church that had never advertised was induced to invest \$2,000 in newspaper publicity. Much to the gratification of the church officials, the contributions that year were \$10,000 greater than the year previous and many new members were added to its list. If advertising can be employed profitably in selling merchandise, it certainly can be employ-

ed profitably in bringing people to church on the Lord's day.

"When you send the copy for your weekly advertisement to the newspapers, send along with it to the city or Sunday editor a news item in which the principal feature of the morning and evening service is set forth. It may be that the subject of the sermon, because of its timeliness or unusual character, will arouse general interest. Perhaps you have invited a distinguished clergyman from out of town to preach in your church, or the choir is to render special music at the evening service. Although your advertisement contains this information, the busy editors do not always have time to prepare a news item from it, but will print the item if you furnish it.

Help the Reporter

"Don't ask a reporter to call upon you for this routine matter. Send it to him by mail or messenger and thus save his shoe leather and conserve his time. He will appreciate your courtesy, even if he says nothing about it.

"During the year you are called on many times to perform a marriage ceremony—sometimes in the church, but often at the home of the bride's parents, or at the parsonage. Unless requested not to do so, notify the newspapers of these events by telephone, giving the names of the bride and groom. Such information is always welcome, especially when the persons are socially prominent.

"Items about the deaths of members of your parish or notices of funerals have a certain news value. They may not always be considered of sufficient importance to print, but the fact that you were thoughtful enough to send them in makes an impression on the editorial mind.

"Again, in your contact with the public you sometimes hear news stories that have not appeared in print. If not of a confidential character, and when you they are of sufficient importance, you can give your friendly reporter or city editor a tip that he can follow up.

How To Do It

"You may think from what I have said that you are to be a reporter, in addition to your duties as a clergyman. In a sense that is true, but only to a degree. It is not necessary for you personally to attend to all the things I have mentioned. Your secretary, or a bright young man with ability to write news items and who goes to your church, can probably be found who will gladly act as your publicity representative.

"The reward for your assistance to the reporters in gathering religious and other kinds of news will be found in their helpfulness to you through the articles they will voluntarily print about your church and the work it is doing in the community."

The advice given by the elder clergyman to his friend, the young rector, was sound. It was founded on his own experience. What we learn through contact with the real problems of life is

most valuable. If we can pass on this experience to those who can make good use of it, we are doing them a good turn for we can prevent them from making the same mistakes we ourselves have made, or help them to secure results they could not otherwise obtain.

Experience

For more than twenty years I was employed in newspaper work. I started as a reporter on The New York Tribune, where I remained nearly three years. Then I went with the New York News Bureau which furnished the Associated Press and the New York newspapers with local news. During this period I reported many sermons and church events. Among the clergymen with whom I came in contact were some of the foremost in the metropolis.

I found them human even if they wore priestly habiliments. Occasionally, here and there, one of them tried to impress me with his superiority and dignity. To his mind reporters were to be tolerated, but not encouraged. They could not be knocked down the front steps when they asked unimportant questions, but they could be frozen stiff by an icy stare. When accorded this kind of treatment, the reporters sometimes got even either by ignoring him in their articles whenever he attended a public function, or by making him appear ridiculous by calling attention to some peculiarity of his speech or person.

On the other hand, the reporters were always charitable in their treatment of a clergyman who was kind and helpful to them, but who had a frailty of some sort that his wardens or deacons might be horrified by if they saw mention of it in the newspapers.

Two Types of Ministers

I need not tell you which of these two types of ministers was the one who complained loudest about the way his church services were neglected by the newspapers. The more experienced of the reporters are experts in sizing up people. They can detect sham and hypocrisy, or virtue and sincerity, as quickly as any groups of persons I know. Bluff does not go very far with them. They may be misled once, but the person who tries to do it a second time is certain to rue it sooner or later.

On the other hand, the clergyman who is earnest and sincere, who is trying his best to help people to understand how much more real happiness they can get out of life by following the precepts of our Lord and Master, and emulating His example, will always command the respect and support of the newspapers.

Committee for Publicity

Perhaps some of you may say to yourselves that if you undertook to carry out all the suggestions I have made, you would not have much time to attend to your multifarious duties as the pastor of a live church. My advice to you is that you should not attempt to do all the publicity work connected with your church unless you have an aptitude for it.

Every parish should have a publicity committee to take care of its routine news. Appoint from the members of your church or congregation a newspaper editor or reporter as chairman. If there is none, select someone—man or woman—who has had some practice in writing for the press and who has a nose for

news. Such a committee would work under your supervision and relieve you of much of the detail.

Give Editor Abstract

When you are to deliver a sermon on a topic of unusual interest, either because of its timeliness or the importance of the occasion, prepare an abstract which you can furnish the newspapers beforehand. It might first be advisable to find out how much of the address the editors would like to have. Sometimes their judgment may not coincide with you as to the news value, or because of the pressure upon their columns they may not be able to give it as much space as they ordinarily might. If, however, you know how much of your manuscript they want, you can often save yourself or your secretary considerable time and effort.

One of the objects to be gained by furnishing the newspapers an abstract or a copy of your manuscript in advance is that you are certain what the newspapers print will be accurately quoted. I have known of instances when this has not been done, when reporters have made clergymen say things they did not say, much to their discomfort.

You should also remember that the amount of space devoted to your church, and incidentally to you, depends on your ability as a preacher. If your sermons are dull, platitudinous, and lacking in vital interest, how can you expect the newspapers to report them? Editors are always desirous of securing for their columns material that people want to read. They will not print any part of a commonplace sermon, unless for a special reason. Say something worth while, something that indicates thought and study, and it will attract their attention and literally compel publication.


COLORADO CLOUDBURST DOES LARGE DAMAGE

Alice Arm and Illiance River Properties Dealt With in the Report of Minister of Mines

(By George Clothier, Resident Engineer)

The Alice Arm Section (proper) includes the country tributary to Alice Arm, of which Lime and Roundy creeks, emptying into the northeast side of the arm, are the most important areas. There is a fair foot trail up Lime creek to its head and the trail up Roundy creek was improved this year to permit of pack-horses going through to the Keystone group. Any extensive development would, however, necessitate the building of good pack trails. These areas are well mineralized and have had a lot of prospecting but as yet nothing has been found of much promise.

The Keystone Mining Co., Ltd. was incorporated in January, 1923, with a capitalization of 200,000 shares at \$1 a share, to take over the Sunset group of seven mineral claims staked and owned by G. W. Morley, and seven other mineral claims from O. M. Gray, all situated on Roundy creek.

I have always considered the property interesting and worthy of some development on account of the geological features, the showings lying in a broad belt along the contact of the argillites and the Coast Range granite. The operations of the company have been of a very desultory nature. This year a log cabin was built and it was the intention to continue driving the old tunnel, started by the owners, Morley & Clary. I understand that work was closed down after short operation and that wages are still unpaid.

Such operators and operations are not very nourishing to the local mining situation or to the mining industry in general.

Keystone Extension

The Theda Bara and Behr Daniels mineral claims were formerly owned by E. Jones, but R. Inghram purchased an interest in them this summer and the partners did considerable exploratory work. The claims adjoin the Sunset mineral claim of the Keystone Mining Company's ground.

The showing here is a quartz vein mineralized with pyrite, galena, zinc-blende, striking S. 38 degrees East into the hill and dipping 73 degrees S.W. The country rock is argillite more or less broken up close to the vein. The main fissure is apparently about 10 inches wide, but the quartz widens out in spots into the hanging-wall, making a vein width up to 4 feet. An open cut has been run in on the vein at this point, exposing a face about 12 feet high. Along the bottom of the cut there is good-looking ore for the width of the fissure, about 10 inches, but the values are low, a sample across this giving only a trace of gold, 1.5 oz. silver to the ton, and 5 per cent. lead. The cut should be continued into the hill as a tunnel to get a little depth and see if there is any improvement.

Further up the hill the owners were working on another showing of a different character. Here there is a quartz vein about 5 feet wide lying along a diorite dyke, honeycombed on the surface and very heavily pyritized where broken into. It strikes N. 30 degrees E. and would therefore intersect the galena vein about 300 feet up the hill.

The vein is a breccia of quartz and country rock up to 10 feet in width, striking S. 15 degrees E. into the hill, following the bottom of the gulch, and dipping 55 degrees W., therefore cutting the country rock bedding in both strike and dip. There has been intense movement since the vein was formed, resulting in another quartz-filled fissure about midway between the foot and hanging walls of the original vein, up to 6 inches in width, and in which fissure is found the values. The quartz is mineralized with pyrite, with which is associated grey-copper. A sample gave only a trace of gold and 3.5 oz. silver, showing that the grey copper does not carry high silver values.

A tunnel had been driven on the vein about 20 feet with no apparent improvement. Because of the surface up the gulch showing a well-defined vein from which fair values had been obtained by the owner, I advised a short continuation of the tunnel before abandoning it.

from the open-cut. The iron cropping is a strong, well defined vein and would be well worth developing if the value warranted. I took a sample of heavy sulphides off the surface, but only obtained a trace of gold and 4.5 oz. silver to the ton. I advised them to crosscut it from a convenient point which would give about 10 feet depth. This was done, but there was no improvement in values. It looks very probable that the galena vein is the extension of the vein on the Keystone Mining Company property.

These are the only two properties on which anything was being done on Roundy creek.

Illiance River

The Illiance River section had a great deal of prospecting and exploratory work a few years ago, but nothing of any note appears to have developed and interest has therefore lessened particularly in the upper part of the valley. On McGrath mountain, to which there is a branch trail from the main Illiance trail, assessment has been maintained on several groups.

The only work being done this year in the upper valley was by W. B. Bower on the Monarch, Silver Star, and Silver Leaf groups.

The Silver Leaf Group is composed of four mineral claims—Silver Leaf, Silver Leaf No. 1, Silver Leaf No. 2 and Silver Leaf No. 3—staked and owned by James Nick, of Alice Arm. The claims are situated about 7 miles from the mouth of the river, just opposite Copper Creek, on the south bank of the Illiance. The general rock formation is banded argillite striking N. 50 degrees E. and dipping about 55 degrees E. in this immediate area. Several dykes were noted cutting the bedded formation at different angles, as well as smaller dykes interbedded with the argillite. The showing lies in a deep gulch up which there is a steep trail from the cabin to the tunnel. The cabin is at 800 feet elevation and the tunnel at 1,200 feet.

THORNTON HERE ON AUGUST 12

President of Canadian National Starts Western Tour This Week

MONTREAL, July 23. — Sir Henry W. Thornton, chairman and president of the Canadian National Railways will leave Montreal Saturday of this week on an extended tour of inspection of western lines which will include several of the new branch lines which have recently been constructed. On this trip he will be accompanied by Major G. A. Bell, deputy minister of railways and canals and J. Gill Gardner of Brookville, Ont., director of the Canadian National. After arriving at Winnipeg, officers of the western region will join the inspection party and various divisional officers will be picked up from time to time along the route.

The party will proceed from Montreal to Ottawa and thence to Port Arthur and Fort William where they will spend the day of July 27. Minaki, which has developed into a popular resort for the Westerners, will be visited on the 28th, and an inspection of the new golf course will be made. On the afternoon of the same day the president will continue to Winnipeg and thence west to Saskatoon, passing through Prince Albert arriving at North Battleford, Sask., July 31. At this point Sir Henry will participate in the opening of the North Battleford exhibition, leaving the same evening for Edmonton where half a day will be spent.

August 2 and 3 will be spent at Jasper National Park, the great playground for tourists which the C.N.R. has developed in the Rockies. Here the new golf course which is said by tourists to be one of the finest in the world will be inspected. Other improvements and activities at Jasper Park Lodge will also be reviewed. On leaving Jasper they will go to Kamloops and thence to Vernon, B.C., over the new branch line, proceeding by road to Kelowna and return to Kamloops.

The following day the trip from Vancouver to Victoria will be made by steamer, the party returning to Vancouver Monday morning August 10. Here Sir Henry will attend the opening of the Vancouver Exhibition and will officially open the Canadian National's new radio station C.N.R.V., on the evening of August 11.

Here on August 12 August 12 and 13 will be occupied by the trip by Canadian National steamer from Vancouver to Prince Rupert where the party will remain a part of August 14 and the 15th. On the return intervening points will be visited for short periods with arrival at Edmonton scheduled for August 17. From Edmonton the trip to Calgary will be made via Mirror and after 24 hours in that city tentative plans are for a trip via C.P.R. to Lethbridge, where Sir Henry has been invited to attend a luncheon given by the Lethbridge Board of Trade.

On August 20, the party will again reach Canadian National lines at Moose Jaw and proceed to Regina and Brandon and from that place to Winnipeg again. On the trip east from Winnipeg a number of brief visits will be made to points in Northern Ontario including Smooth Rock Falls and Cochrane as well as points on the T. and N.O. Railway, from North Bay the party will go to Algonquin Park where a visit will be made to Highland Inn. Return to Montreal will be made August 26.
