### Delegation to Oppose Resolution

Delegates to the convention—drawn up for presentation of the 49th annual convention of the UBCM—will meet at the University of B.C. at Vernon next week to oppose a resolution to appoint only one of more than 50 resolutions drawn up for consideration.

### Statement Expected That Nixon Will Stay

WASHINGTON (CP)—An anti-climactic official statement is expected possibly today to confirm that it has been made obvious by a sweeping endorsement of Eisenhower, the Republican National Convention and tens of thousands of Americans: Nixon will remain the Republican vice-presidential pick.

Richard Nixon, presidential candidate, today said he is standing pat on what said yesterday—it would be "breach of faith" to name the key state officials whose salaries he said he had supplemented with donations from a special fund.

### Canada's Armed Forces Reduced

OTTAWA (CP)—Led by a sharp drop in army strength, Canada's military manpower tumbled below the 99,000 mark in August, the Defence Department reported Wednesday.

TORONTO (CP)—Gold valued at \$350,000 was stolen today at nearby Malton Airport. It was in boxes weighing 848 pounds altogether. Four boxes of gold were not touched. Gold was bound for Montreal and is believed to be refined here.

TORONTO (CP)—Eddie (Pistol) Dorohoy has been named coach of Victoria Cougars in the Western Canada Hockey League, it was announced today. He succeeds Roger Leger, now with the Montreal Royals.

### York Records B.C. Tremors

NEW YORK (CP)—Two sharp earthquakes reported today by a Fordham University geologist. It is believed the tremors occurred along the coast of northern British Columbia.

### Fire Reported At Pulp Mill

A fire call from Columbia Cellulose Co. Ltd. pulp mill at Watson Island was answered at 2:30 p.m. and a fire wagon dispatched immediately by the Prince Rupert fire department.

Further details were not known at press time, but it was learned that telephone lines to the plant went out at 2:40 p.m.

The pulp mill operates a small fire fighting unit of its own.

### Prince George Jury Returns Manslaughter

PRINCE GEORGE, B.C. (CP)—Francis Peter Dennis, who says his memory was blacked out by a blow to the head, today awaited sentencing for the death-by-motorboat which followed a homebrew party on shore of a wilderness lake.

Charged with murder in the death of William Austin—and convicted last night on a reduced charge of manslaughter—Dennis will be sentenced at the end of the fall assizes here.

Austin, 59, died Aug. 2 on Stuart Lake, 75 miles northwest of here. Dennis, 39, was arrested as he prayed in church at the settlement of Port St. James after Austin's widow and 14-year-old son told their story of death to the RCMP.

### WIDOW TESTIFIES

Testifying in Carriere Indian dialect, Austin's widow told the court Dennis and her husband quarreled during a drinking party on the lake's shore.

Two persons present at the party, Michele and Catherine Morris, said Dennis and Austin wrestled and that Mrs. Austin and their son, Alfred, had boarded a boat and headed out into the lake.

Austin's widow said Dennis followed them for some distance in his boat and then rammed them amidships. She said Dennis grabbed her husband by the hair and forced him into the water, saying: "I'm going to kill you."

Dennis, she said, lifted her husband from the water three times and struck him.

### Fishermen Turn Down Latest Offer

VANCOUVER (CP)—Salmon fishermen from Vancouver and the Fraser Valley Wednesday rejected a company price offer and will continue the strike which started 18 days ago.

A union spokesman said votes coming in from all other salmon fishing ports along the British Columbia coast "indicate a similar position in every instance."

Vancouver and valley fishermen are reported by secretary of the United Fishermen and Allied Workers Union to have voted for rejection "by a 99 per cent majority."

The secretary, Homer Stevens, said rejection of the offer was recommended by the union's central strike and policy committee.

This same offer was accepted by Indian fishermen represented by the Native Brotherhood of B.C., who signed an agreement Monday with the Fisheries Association.

The agreement led to court action started Wednesday by the operators. Nine of B.C.'s largest canneries applied in Supreme Court of an injunction which would prevent striking fishermen from interfering with Indian fishermen.

### Alberta Oil Open to British Investment—Low

VANCOUVER (CP)—Solon Low, national leader of the Social Credit party, said here Wednesday that British investment in Alberta's oil fields is possible.

He said in an interview Britain could find a way to become financially interested if she is "really in earnest about it."

### Prison Break Thwarted At Oakalla

VANCOUVER (CP)—A surprise security check at suburban Oakalla Prison Farm late yesterday thwarted a jail break. It was disclosed today by Warden Hugh G. Christie.

Security guards discovered four hacksawed gate bars at the end of a long corridor. The gate led from the prison's south wing where 60 prisoners are awaiting trial or transfer to the penitentiary.

A prison-wide search failed to disclose any hacksaw blades.

### 4 Killed in Blast, Two Still Missing

PORT ARTHUR (CP)—A bomb-like blast killed four men and left two others still missing today, 24 hours after it shattered part of a grain elevator, causing damage estimated up to \$3,000,000.

Fourteen men were injured, four severely, in the explosion and subsequent fire.

Bodies of missing men are buried in tons of concrete and metal wreckage, at the Saskatchewan Pool Elevators No. 4A terminal.

Dead: Steve Wasilka, 58; Peter Dye, 46; Philip Dorzek, 28, all of Port Arthur; Robert Deer, of Burnt Island, Conception Bay, Nfld.

Missing: A. Lobsiger and F. Zakunsky, both of Port Arthur.

### Polio Claims 23rd B.C. Life—Burns Lake Boy

VANCOUVER (CP)—Polio claimed the life of a 14-year-old Burns Lake boy Wednesday, bringing British Columbia's total fatalities to 23.

Meanwhile, the province's total number of cases for the year rose to 345 with reports of four new cases.

### SYNOPSIS

Clear skies prevail in all the southern regions of British Columbia. Afternoon temperatures will reach the low seventies near the coast and mid-eighties in the southern interior valleys.

A diffuse and slow moving disturbance moved inland over the northern coastal areas during the night bringing rain or drizzle to the Queen Charlottes and the northern mainland and cloud to northern Vancouver Island and the central interior.

Variable amounts of cloud associated with this system will drift slowly into the southern coastal regions during the next 24 to 48 hours but no precipitation is expected. Southern interior regions will remain sunny and warm.

### Forecast

Cloudy today and Friday. Intermittent rain or drizzle. Little change in temperature. Winds southerly 25 in the exposed areas, light elsewhere. Low tonight and high Friday at Port Hardy, Sandspit and Prince Rupert, 50 and 60.

## British Warships Trade Fire With Communist Installations

HONG KONG (CP)—Two British warships and Communist shore batteries traded fire today after the Reds swarmed over a British-operated passenger vessel and forcibly removed two Chinese.

Commodore Harold G. Dickinson, Hong Kong naval chief, said the destroyed Consort and frigate Mounts Bay returned fire on Red shore batteries after they were fired upon following the raid.

The passenger ship, Takshing, was raided about 3 a.m., some 10 miles east of the Portuguese Macau in a channel of "normal international traffic."

Communist shore batteries opened up from Lapsampei, but the British warships were not hit, Dickinson said.

### Man Convicted Of Manslaughter

VANCOUVER (CP)—William Moon of Campbell River, B.C., standing trial on a charge of murder, was convicted yesterday on a reduced charge of manslaughter.

Mr. Justice J. M. Coady remanded him to end of the assizes for sentence.

Moon was charged in the death here of William Valpe, 74-year-old roominghouse caretaker who died in hospital May 22 from effects of a beating the crown said was administered by the fisherman.

The crown said that robbery was the motive for the attack and said a watch pawned by Moon for \$5 belonged to Valpe.

### Deep Sea Bass 2 Pounds Short Of World Record

Probably the heaviest sea bass ever caught in this district has been weighed in the Rod & Gun Club Derby by Miss Betty Martin. The bass weighed six pounds.

An eight-pound sea bass is considered the world's record. Miss Martin caught her entry near the Prince Rupert dry dock on bucktail streamer.

Latest coho entry was made by Dr. L.M.M. Greene, whose silver weighed seven pounds, eight ounces.

### Free Fish Given to Vancouver Families in Government Test

VANCOUVER (CP)—The Federal government is feeding 64 Vancouver families free fish once or twice a month.

The families are members of a government sponsored fish-testing panel. Their job is to test the effect in freshness and taste of different methods of handling.

The fish are caught by the Fisheries Research Board's boat Tauganaga and the object of the experiments is to test the relative merits of freezing the fish at various stages against simply keeping it cooled on ice.

## Submarine Lost in Deep Water

TOULON, France — The French navy said today the submarine La Sibylle, missing with 48 men aboard, must have been crushed to fragments by underwater pressure and sank helplessly into the depths of the Mediterranean east of here.

All hope was abandoned for the crew early today when a vast oil patch and bits of wreckage floated to the surface of the sea at a point which is more than 2,600 feet deep.

What caused the La Sibylle to plunge out of control toward the sea's bottom may never be known. She failed to surface at 9:30 a.m. yesterday after a routine dive.

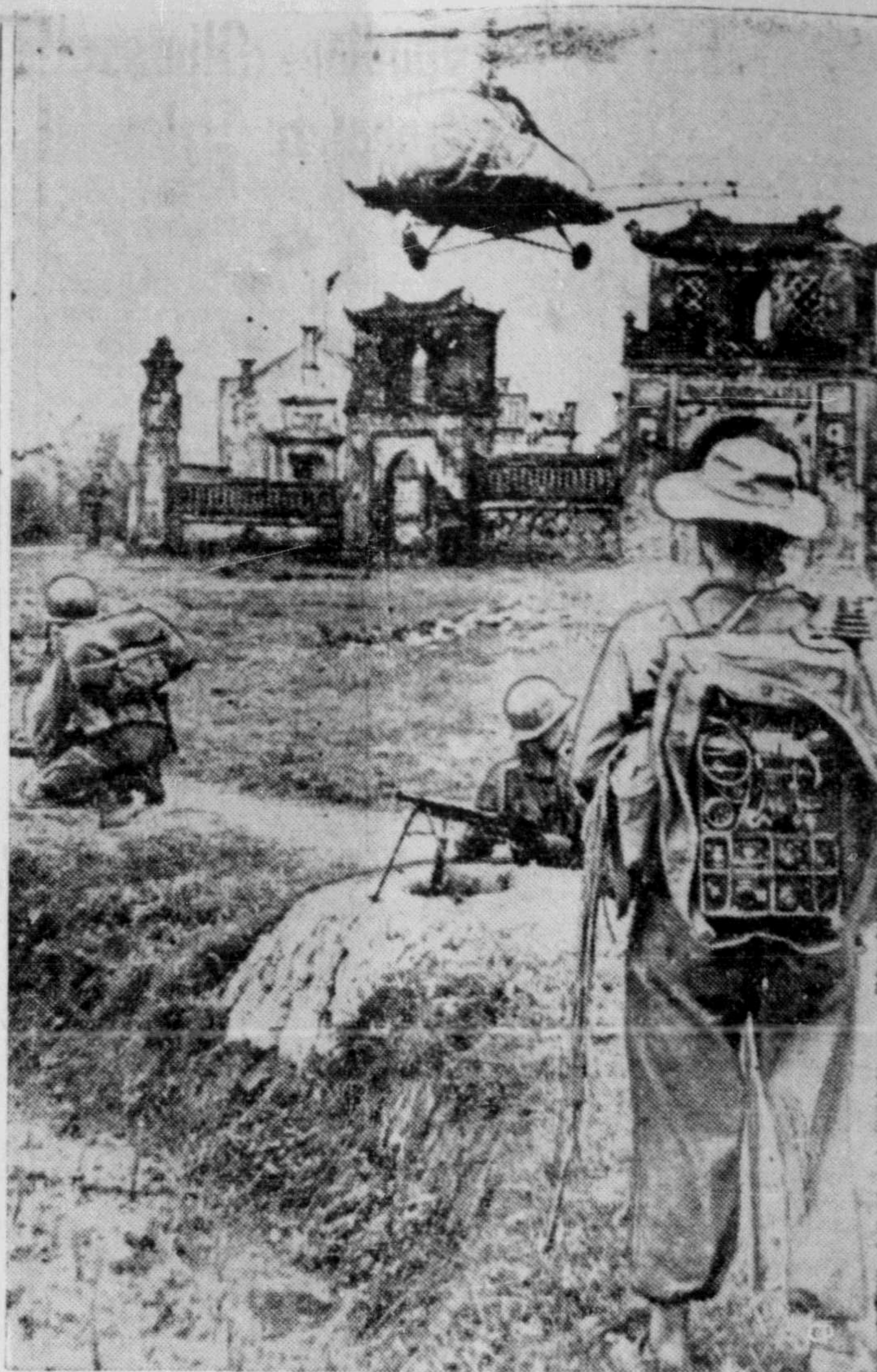

And Mr. Champion knows it. He purposely uses it when talking to Mr. Muzzy for the sake of emphasis.

Actually, the word "always" should never be used in a connection with any bridge situation. Ooops, there I go doing it myself. What I mean, of course, is ALMOST never.

In today's deal, Mr. Dale opened the six of spades. Mr. Muzzy was elated as this gave him three sure spade tricks. He played low from dummy and killed Mrs. Keen's queen with the ace.

Laboriously counting his winners, he found that he had just eight, three spades, four diamonds and the ace of clubs. Where was the ninth trick coming from? Well, Mr. Champion had said to go after the longer suit first. There were eight clubs in the two hands and only six hearts. So at trick two Mr. Muzzy led a club and finessed dummy's 10.

Mrs. Keen won with the jack and returned a spade. Dummy's king won and Mr. Muzzy came to his hand with the ace of diamonds and finessed the queen of clubs. When this lost, his last spade stopper was knocked out and he had no further chance for three tricks.

"You beat yourself at the second trick," snarled Mr. Champion. "Why not start on hearts instead of clubs? Even lead a heart from your own hand."

"But you told me..." began Mr. Muzzy.

"No matter what I told you," Mr. Champion interrupted, "it

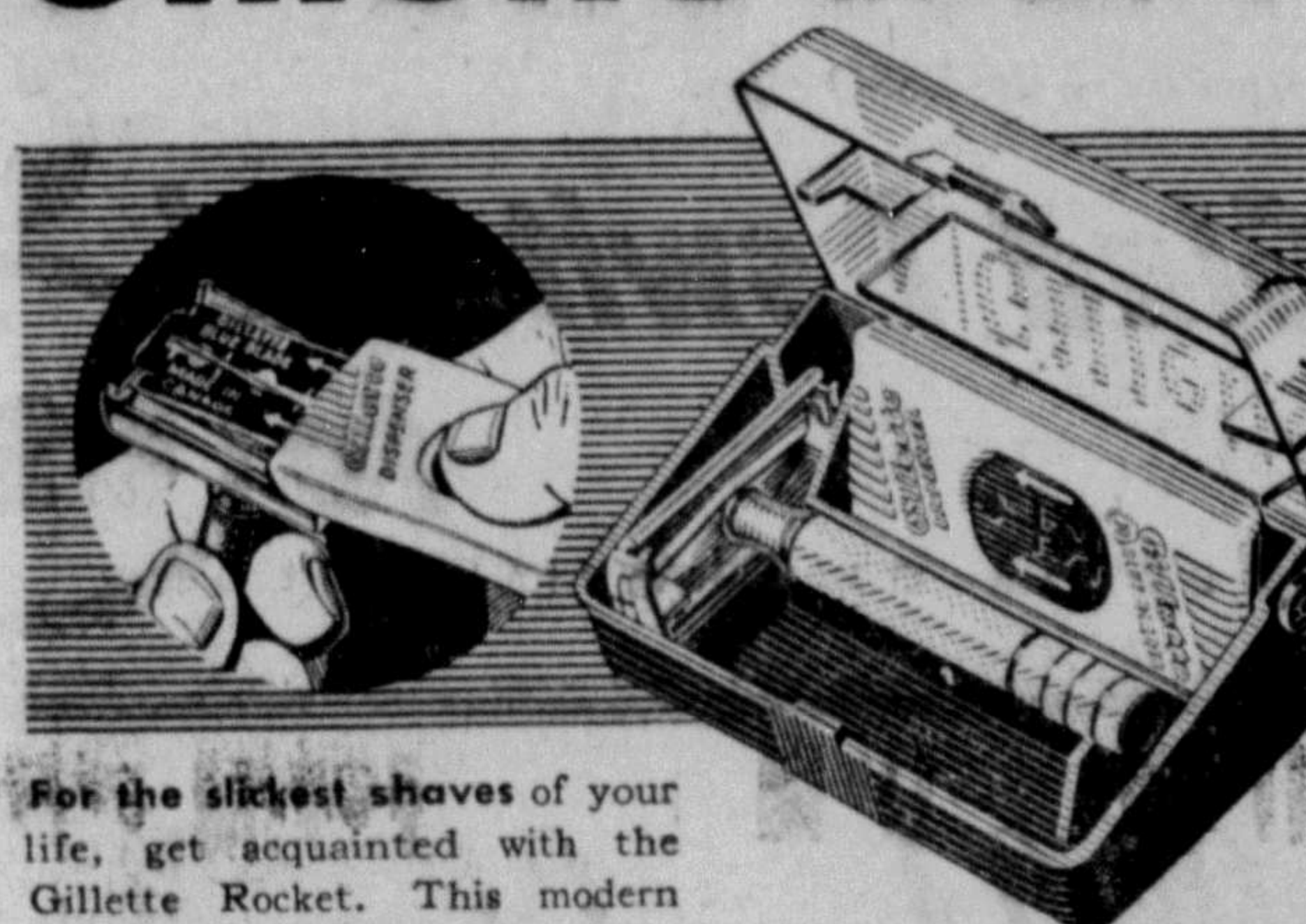

## CANADIANS ELIGIBLE

### U.N. Seeks Experts For Indo-China Jobs

BANGKOK, Thailand — Two UN jobs are open in Indo-China and French-speaking Canadians could fill them well. There may be many similar jobs in future. The jobs are for technical ex-

perts employed by UN and loaned to Viet Nam, Laos and Cambodia, the three associated states of Indo-China. They are for one- and two-year terms. N. E. S. Rachavachari, far eastern regional representative of the UN Technical Assistance Administration, has just re-

turned to his Bangkok headquarters from Indo-China. He has recommended that UN experts sent to Indo-China be French-speaking but preferably not French citizens, in view of the delicate political situation there.

French-speaking Canadians, Swiss, Belgians, Dutch, Italians and "perhaps Germans" will be wanted, Rachavachari said. Cambodia has put in the first request for help: a taxation expert and an economic planner. Rachavachari said Viet Nam will want experts in refugee administration, rural credit, industrial development and engineering.

He said interested persons should be in touch with the administration's office at New York headquarters of UN or with the Canadian Department of External Affairs through which appointments of Canadians will be arranged.
