# FIRE SITUATION IN PROVINCE SERIOUS

## SENATE COMMITTEE TO RECOMMEND THAT GOVERNMENT TAKE OVER C.P.R.

### Much Valuable Timber Destroyed and Logging Camps Are Threatened

VANCOUVER, Aug. 5.—Millions of feet of merchantable timber is being destroyed and logging camps are threatened by numerous forest fires all over the province according to Chief Forester Gowan of Vancouver district.

The most serious outbreak is at Stillwater, 45 miles south of Powell River, where the flames swept 300 acres destroying nine million feet of standing timber.

Fires at Pender Harbor and Sechelt are also out of control and are sweeping towards Green timber despite the efforts of one hundred men who are engaged in fighting the flames.

Many of the fifty fires reported from the Kamloops district are out of control and are destroying timber.

Near Victoria a bad fire is seriously threatening the city's watershed at Sooke, a mile of which is already destroyed. Considerable time and the efforts of 125 men will be needed to curb the advance of the flames it is expected.

Juneau Paper Enters  
Halibut Controversy.

The Alaska Daily Empire, published at Juneau, devoted the most of its editorial column one day last week with a reply to an editorial written in the Prince Rupert Daily News recently regarding Ketchikan's efforts to capture the halibut packing industry on the Pacific coast.

The editorial imputed that, whereas the people of Prince Rupert were some time ago seeking to have the port closed to American fishermen, they were now worrying because Ketchikan people were urging regulations that would prevent American fish from coming here.

The Empire should not assume that this comment applies to the Daily News. This paper never actively supported the move to have the port closed to American fishermen. It, however, counseled that such a step should be taken only as a last resort and only then if it was certain that it would not be "cutting off Prince Rupert's nose to spite its face."

The Empire also says that The News is slightly confused concerning the Ketchikan proposal regarding the shipment of American fish in bond through Canada and then proceeds to explain that what the Ketchikan people really want is to have American fish handled through here considered as Canadian and have the two-cent tariff imposed on it. We are quite aware that that is what Ketchikan really does want for the editor of the Ketchikan-paper said so when he was here last week. That, however, is simply another thing that Ketchikan thinks would compel American boats to land their catches there rather than come to Prince Rupert. And, at that, there is a question whether the American fishermen would be ahead by landing their halibut at Ketchikan for a ferry trip to Prince Rupert than they would be if they came direct to Prince Rupert and paid the suggested two-cent tariff. It is generally conceded that there would be considerable delay in getting the fish east through that extra relay, and that would no doubt affect prices.

All resolves itself into the same old thing. Ketchikan wants to use the Canadian National Railway out of Prince Rupert but it wants to reap all the benefits that Prince Rupert, in some measure at least, is entitled to. It is not a matter of observing "the principles of the tariff and international trade laws of the country." It is simply a matter of business competition with Ketchikan and Prince Rupert the competitors in this instance.

Election Issues  
In New Brunswick.

Perhaps the outstanding issue in the present provincial election campaign in New Brunswick is the proposed hydroelectric development at Grand Falls. At the last session of the legislature, the government introduced and succeeded in piloting through the house legislation which provides for the expenditure of ten million dollars to complete the initial development at Grand Falls. The Conservatives do not oppose the Grand Falls development but argue that the scheme is being proceeded with before sufficient information is available to ensure its success. Further the Conservatives take the stand that, in view of the tremendous financial outlay involved, the people of the province should be given the opportunity to say at the polls whether or not they desire the province to take hold of the project and operate it.

The government's general record, particularly the highway policy and the administration of other public services, is also an issue as well as prohibition enforcement.

On the whole, however, it looks that the Liberals are stronger in New Brunswick than they were in Nova Scotia and no big upheaval is expected when the ballots are counted on the night of August 10.

## Bear River Mining Properties Reviewed in Report; Symptoms of Real Operations Apparent

(By G. A. Clothier, Resident Engineer)

The Bear River section includes all the Bear River valley and tributaries thereto from Stewart north. It has had a great revival of mining this year, due to the very gratifying results obtained in the development of the Dunwell mine on Glacier creek. During the summer there were at least fifteen companies carrying on development work, of which nine are continuing work throughout the winter, the greatest activity yet seen in the Bear River section. The symptoms of real mining development are becoming more pronounced each year, and the "wild-catter" is at least in some instances changed to a "lame-cutter."

Some worthy development work has been done by the small operators this year and, while all cannot be successful, many of the properties are showing considerable merit.

The Dunwell Mines, Limited, has demonstrated the continuation of its ore-bodies to the fourth level and is now in an excellent position for serious development. The Glacier Creek Mining Company has done a lot of underground work and will now further explore its ground by diamond drilling. The Lakeview Mines, Limited, has very successfully opened up its property, above the Dunwell, this year. The North Line and South Line group of claims also has demonstrated that extensive development is justified. The Victoria Mines, Limited, has, I judge, a good chance on its ground adjoining the Dunwell on the north. The L. and L. (Glacier Creek) Mines, Limited, has proven a considerable tonnage of high-grade ore, warranting further expenditure. The Silverado Mining Company Limited, is exposing good-grade ore in the present tunnel being driven to cut known veins on the surface. The Terminus Mines, Limited, will prove the vein at depth when the present crosscut tunnel reaches it. The Independence Gold Mining Company, Limited, has very promising ground to explore. The Rufus Silver-Lead Mines, Limited, made a good start in the right direction in the prospecting and mapping of the surface. The International Petroleum and Development Company is doing some deep crosscutting to get under any favorable outcrops on the Inland Empire group. The Ruby Silver Mines, Limited, is prospecting a promising looking vein.

In addition to these companies there is a very appreciable amount of individual prospecting and development being done in all parts of this section. This region has been pretty well staked, especially close in, but exploration trails are being extended yearly as an aid and incentive for wider prospecting.

## Silverado Group

The Silverado Group consists of four claims and a fractional claim, owned by John Haafii, J. W. Stewart, of Stewart, and associates. The property is situated on the east side of the head of Portland canal, above the town of Stewart, and at an elevation of about 4,000 feet. It has been reported in the Minister of Mines' Reports of 1921, 1922, 1923, to which the reader is referred.

Subsequent work consists of the driving of the old tunnel 122 feet, making it a total length of 385 feet from the portal. A short tunnel 12 feet long was driven on the vein 100 feet south of the main tunnel. Forty feet of drifting was done on what is known as the gold vein, at 3,200 feet elevation. Several open cuts have been put in near the lower camp.

The main tunnel is being extended for the purpose of cutting two other parallel veins which outcrop above, and in which good average silver values are obtained on the surface. Should these veins prove equal to expectations from the surface showings, this property can no doubt be developed into a paying undertaking.

Its situation is ideal for transportation. The present aerial tram can be extended from the mine to tidewater. Under present conditions it is not particularly pleasant for winter work, but these could be readily improved if extensive work were planned.

There is a small bunk-house at the tunnel, telephone connection to the office in Stewart, and a cache and barn at the lower camp.



The Argentine getting ready for Prince

Southern Republic Prepares For Reception of His Royal Highness in August

Buenos Aires, Aug. 5.—Argentina is making preparations for receiving the Prince of Wales who will reach here about August 15 for his South American visit.

He will come to Buenos Aires aboard the British cruiser Curlew, transferring to that warship at Montevideo, Uruguay, from the battleship Repulse, aboard which he is now coming from South Africa. This change is necessary, as the Repulse is unable to enter the port at Buenos Aires because of its heavy draft. The Curlew sailed from Pernambuco, Brazil, for Montevideo, to await the arrival of the Prince, due there on August 14. The official program in honor of the Prince will comprise a military parade in which 12,000 men of the Argentine army and navy will have a part, and a display of forty military airplanes. To familiarize himself with the city of Buenos Aires, the Prince's private chauffeur has already arrived.



## H.M.S. CAPETOWN CLEARED TODAY

Warship, Which has been here  
for Past Seven Days, left  
for south at 8.15 this  
Morning

After a visit of seven days to  
this port, H.M.S. Capetown cleared  
this morning at 8.15 for Vancouver, Victoria and Nanaimo.

Officers of the Capetown yesterday on the eve of their departure expressed appreciation at the reception that had been given them during their stay here and some of them were sorry that the visit was drawing to a close.

On arrival in the southern ports they will find that further honors are awaiting them. Plans have been under way for some time for their reception at the various points they will visit down the coast. The vessel will be on the coast till well on toward the end of September.

The Capetown will proceed from here to Esquimalt where she is due Friday morning, Lieut. R. P. Ponder, with a party

of ratings from the local Naval Volunteer Reserve, were on hand to assist the warship in getting away.

Prior to departing Capt. G. S. Knowles and his officers expressed to Lieut. Ponder their appreciation of the manner in which the Mayor, Aldermen and citizens of Prince Rupert had entertained the ship's personnel while in port and remarked that it had been the most pleasurable time the officers and men had spent on the trip to date.

**The Itinerary**  
H.M.S. Capetown will remain at Esquimalt until August 18 and will then proceed to Nanaimo where she will be until Aug. 22. At Port Augusta until August 25, will then be in Vancouver until September 5. From Vancouver the warship will proceed to San Francisco arriving September 8 and remaining until September 16. San Pedro which will be left on September 23 and the vessel will reach the Panama Canal zone on October 8. Leaving the Panama Canal zone on October 10 for Kingston, Jamaica, the Capetown will arrive back at Bermuda, her home station, on October 17.

## OLD AMUR IS NOW FOR SALE

**Freighter Famous, Wrecked Near  
Here Last Year, Said to be  
as Good as New**

VICTORIA, Aug. 5.—Formerly a coastwise ore carrier, the Famous, once known as the steamship Amur, is being offered for sale here.

Captain Berquist bought in the Amur last year, after the engines had been taken from her and brought her to Victoria, where she was reconditioned by the Victoria Machinery Depot at a cost of approximately \$25,000, not to mention the new engines that have been installed.

The Amur was wrecked off the mouth of the Skeena River early in 1924, and was badly damaged. She was salvaged by the Pacific Salvage Company, of Victoria, who delivered her to her owners in Vancouver.

There the engines were removed and installed in the former inter-coastal freighter J. H. Plummer, which has since been renamed the Amur, and is now operating in the ore-carrying business.

### New Engine Installed

Captain Berquist purchased the wrecked vessel and, bringing her to Victoria, let the contract for repairs to the V.M.D., which company, after installing thirteen new plates, repairing others and replacing broken frames and deck work, declares her to be as seaworthy as the day she was launched from the Strand Shipway yard, Sunderland, in 1890. A new triple expansion engine has been installed by Captain Berquist and the vessel is now completed and ready for operation. She is now lying at the V.M.D. awaiting a purchaser, it is reported.

## HYDROGRAPHIC SURVEY STEAMER ARRIVES HERE

**Lillooet Brings in Man for Treatment at General Hospital**

The Dominion Government steamer Lillooet, Capt. Moore, arrived in port last evening from the vicinity of Surf Inlet where she has been engaged in hydrographic survey work, to bring Mr. Willis, one of the party of hydrographers on board, to receive medical treatment at the local hospital.

Mr. Parizeau is chief of the hydrographic part on board and is anxious to make certain examinations of the coast line in the vicinity of Surf Inlet while the low tides are on at the present time so the steamer will clear this afternoon after taking on 35 tons of coal.

During their work at Surf Inlet the crew captured a young deer which they are taking over to the south end of Queen Charlotte Islands. This makes the second deer which the ship has taken to the Islands where deer are very scarce and it is hoped that with the addition of a few more, there may be quite a herd established.

An inquest is being held this afternoon before Coroner Watt into the death of Robert Parks who died during Saturday night. The jury empanelled consists of Ben Self, Vernon Casley, J. Ciccone, Fred Seadden, N. Clark and W. L. McKenzie.

M. D. Hamilton of Vancouver, who is Pacific Coast superintendent of the Canadian Bank of Commerce arrived in the city on the Prince Rupert this morning. He is making a trip of general inspection in the north.
