## U.S. LOSES THIRTY MILLION ON M. MARINE JUSTICE MURPHY THRILLS WOMAN'S CANADIAN CLUB IN STIRRING ADDRESS

### Exaggerated Sense of Nationality Obstacle Against Banishing War

Mr. Justice Murphy delivers strong address to Women's Canadian Club at luncheon on Saturday

"It is our exaggerated sense of nationality that is the chief obstacle to universal peace," declared Mr. Justice Murphy in speaking to the women's Canadian Club here Saturday afternoon at a luncheon given in his honor. "In loyalty to the flag I stand aside for no man but my loyalty is based on reason rather than sentiment," he declared. "Only under the British flag and to a lesser degree under the United States flag can human beings live free and untrammelled as long as they do not interfere with the rights of others. British treatment of minorities is the test of this. Yet if the law of the jungle is to continue as it has hitherto and if force is to dominate and not reason, then war is inevitable and the next war will end our present civilization. If war is to be avoided public spirit must be created against it. Nations are necessary but they must deal with each other as citizens deal with each other and the law of the jungle must pass. The judge outlined the present condition of Europe and the part each nation played there, especially in relation to Germany, and he closed with a stirring appeal to the women in which he pictured to them the horrors of war and the scars it left even yet in thousands of Canadian homes today.

Mrs. J. C. McLennan introduced the speaker in a brief speech and at the close a vote of thanks was moved by Mrs. C. A. Eggerl, and seconded by Miss Mills and carried with enthusiasm.

In opening, Judge Murphy said the perpetuation of peace and the outlawry of war was something that would appeal to all and especially to the ladies of the Canadian Club. As he grew older he was inclined to become cynical about the future but the spread of primary education and the changed status of women made for peace. Women knew the value of human life because they had to pay the price.

Turning backward, the speaker said that Canada found herself plunged into the war over night. A situation such as this made it desirable that they should understand the international situation. Chamberlain in one of his speeches declared that fear brooded over Europe and unless the situation was relieved they were moving toward a new catastrophe. Canada would be drawn in again if it occurred. The last war was inevitable under the law of the jungle as it prevailed.

The war, the speaker said, was to destroy autocracy, to recognize nationality and to recognize democracy. The first of the three had been accomplished but not the other two. Autocracy had been destroyed but they must go further and the law of the jungle must give way to that of reason.

Discussing the European situation, Judge Murphy, told how following the war Britain and the United States had tried to write into the Treaty of Versailles some of the new idealism, but this was opposed by France which still relied on the doctrine of force. She could hardly be blamed for her country had been ravished twice in one generation.

### BURGLAR WAS CAPTURED BY POLICE TODAY

VANCOUVER, Dec. 7.—Half an hour after burglars early this morning shattered the window of the New York Fur Company and stole five valuable fur coats, Henry Gerlitz was arrested after an exciting chase and four of the coats recovered.

Two companions of Gerlitz escaped. Two armed masked bandits raided a gambling den in Chinatown and "stuck up" fifteen players and the keeper and escaped with \$210.

### DEWEY TRIED TOWING OROWA

Can Make Little Progress Until Jury Rudder Rigged on Helpless Vessel

SEATTLE, Dec. 7.—Steamer Admiral Dewey reached the West Orowa in northern waters yesterday but was unable to commence to tow the vessel to safety as the rudder of the disabled ship was completely out of order. One tow line snapped.

### BUS CRASHES INTO CAR AT VANCOUVER

Injured Taken to Hospital this Afternoon; None Seriously Hurt

VANCOUVER, Dec. 7.—Twenty-five persons were injured this afternoon when a B.G. Rapid Transit Bus, enroute from New Westminster to Vancouver, crashed into a street car at the corner of Eighth Avenue and Kingsway. Ten of the injured were taken to the hospital. None of them are believed to be in a serious condition.

**CHILDREN ASPHYXIATED**  
LEMGO, Westphalia, Germany, Dec. 7.—Seven children ranging from one to three years were asphyxiated at the children's hospital by coal gas today.

### WILL REDUCE JAP LICENSES

Fifteen per Cent Fewer to be Issued During Coming Year It is Announced

Word has been received here that the federal department of fisheries has reduced the number of Japanese that will be allowed to secure licenses during the coming fishing season. This is in accordance with the recommendations of the fisheries commission of which Fred Stork was a member.

In 1922 the licenses were reduced by one third. In 1923 they were reduced 25 per cent, in 1924 10 per cent and this coming year the reduction will be 15 per cent.

### CONSERVATIVE WINS RIPPON

Elected by Large Majority Over Liberal in British Election

LONDON, Dec. 7.—A by-election in the Rippon division of Yorkshire made necessary by the appointment of E. F. Wood to the office of the viceroy of India, resulted in a Conservative victory, Major J. Wills receiving 16,433 votes to 11,422 for John Murray, Liberal.

### ACCIDENTAL DISCHARGE OF GUN KILLED LAD AT STEVESTON YESTERDAY

VANCOUVER, Dec. 7.—Gordon Hartney, 15 years of age of Steveston was instantly killed Sunday when the shotgun he was lifting out of a boat was accidentally discharged, the contents entering his head.

### Serious Situation Over Mosul Develops in Dispute Between Britain and Turkish Rulers

GENEVA, Dec. 7.—A serious situation has arisen in the dispute between Great Britain and Turkey over the disposition of Mosul, the country held by Great Britain under a mandate since the war.

### U.S. Merchant Marine Loses Thirty Million Dollars During Year

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—In the fiscal year 1925 the operation of the American Government merchant fleet shows a loss of approximately \$30,000,000, according to a report of the shipping board to Congress today.

The report points to the need for some form of government aid to assure a continuance of the development of the American merchant marine, either through preferential tariff duties, preferential tonnage dues or subsidies more or less direct and it should be general.

### BAD TIE-UP OF TRAIN SERVICE

Traffic Will be Unable to Move Along This End of Line For at Least a Week

With one bridge out at Kayex River on the west and two bridges out near Usk on the east making it impossible to get equipment together to make repairs following a number of washouts which have inundated the track at various points, the situation along the line as a result of recent rains and mild weather is such that it was announced at the office of the C.N.R. superintendent this afternoon that there would be no train service either in or out of Prince Rupert for at least one week's time. All the company's resources from Prince Rupert on the west and Smithers on the east are now working to replace the damaged bridges. These will have to be repaired before work can be done on the washouts between at such points as Salvus and Estew.

### SASKATOON BEAT VICTORIA SATURDAY NIGHT AT HOCKEY

VICTORIA, Dec. 7.—Closing the first visit of the hockey season to the coast, Saskatoon Saturday night beat Victoria in the Willows arena by a score of three goals to one. The visitors left later for home and will not play again until they meet Edmonton at Saskatoon on Thursday.

### ALASKA MAY TAX SALMON CANNING

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—The supreme court today declared valid and constitutional an Alaska law imposing a graduated excise tax on those engaged in the salmon canning industry. An appeal to that court was made by the Pacific American Fisheries.

### Engineer Making Survey of Waterfront at Cow Bay with View to Providing Facilities

For the purpose of making surveys and obtaining the necessary information regarding the location at Cow Bay so that estimates may be prepared for the next session of parliament to provide mooring facilities for the fishing craft and mosquito fleet using Prince Rupert harbor, J. P. Forde, of Victoria, district engineer for the federal department of public works, arrived in the city, on the Cardena yesterday afternoon accompanied by Capt. H. Peters of Victoria, a departmental engineer. Mr. Forde and Capt. Peters are proceeding with their work today and expect to return to Victoria tomorrow evening.

### HUNTER FOUND BACK BROKEN

POWELL RIVER, Dec. 7.—The body of Jack Blades, who has been missing for the past week in the hills where he had gone on a hunting trip, was brought into town last night by one of the search parties which had been looking for him for the past few days.

Blades, who was 21 years of age and was an experienced hunter, had apparently fallen from a great height as his neck and back were broken in addition to other injuries.

### VOTING TODAY BY-ELECTION

People of Bagot Constituency in Quebec Choosing Successor to Marcellie

ACTONVALE, Dec. 7.—Voting is taking place today in the federal by-election for Bagot to fill the vacancy caused by the death of D. E. Marcellie, Liberal, who was elected at the general election with a majority of 774. The candidates are Hon. Under Fauteux, Conservative, who was defeated by Marcellie and G. D. Morin, Liberal.

### CALGARY OPENS ITS HOCKEY SEASON BY BEATING PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Dec. 7.—Calgary hockey team made a good start in the Western Hockey League for the season by beating Portland Saturday night by a score of six goals to three. The team had just arrived on the coast and will play its second game next Saturday, when it performs at the Willows Arena in Victoria. The team expects to win that game as Victoria has not been making such of a showing so far this season.

### DAUGHTER BORN TO JAPANESE PRINCESS

TOKYO, Dec. 7.—Princess Nagako, who became the bride of Crown Prince Hirohito on January 26 last, presented the Imperial family last night with a granddaughter.

### LUMBER KING IS DYING AT OTTAWA

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—John R. Booth, the Canadian lumber king, is dying, it is announced this afternoon. The family have been summoned to his bedside. Mr. Booth is 98 years of age.

#### Local Member In Defence Of North.

The other day one of those periodic slurs on the north was made in the Legislature by one of the opposition members, who suggested that the people should be moved down from the north closer to the larger centres of population. Hon. T. D. Pattullo at once took up the cudgels for the north pointing out the favorable position which the port of Prince Rupert occupied for Oriental trade, stating that a vessel operating out of the port of Prince Rupert could make at least ten per cent on operation over and above a similar vessel operating out of a southern port.

#### Powerful Address Of Mr. Justice Murphy.

On Saturday afternoon Mr. Justice Murphy delivered a very powerful address to the Women's Canadian Club of this city, urging the influence of the people and especially of the women of the world to prevent future war. He outlined briefly the present condition of that part of the world where conflict seemed possible and pictured the horrors of war in a manner to make one shudder. He ascribed war as being due to an exaggerated sense of nationality.

#### Possibly We May Settle Cow Bay Controversy.

Since the Cow Bay controversy has been with us for at least seven years and probably much longer, it might be wise for us to settle it now. Apparently there is an effort being made to have the matter closed with advantage to the port. If that is so, why delay? The people have voted in favor of closing Cow Bay and all that is awaiting is the final decision of the city council. At any rate a decision should be arrived at. If the present council find themselves unable to function successfully in regard to this matter, there will soon be another and they may be able to settle it, but not in time for possible action by the federal department of marine at the coming session.

#### No Money Yet For P.G.E. Railway.

No money is to be provided this year for extension of the P.G.E. Railway, it was announced Friday, but it is probable provision may be made for the making of land grants in case of a sale of the property.

While it does not seem likely that anyone will wish to buy the P.G.E. just now at a price which would be considered reasonable by the Province of British Columbia, no stone should be left unturned in efforts to get some private concern to take it over and operate it. If it could be made to pay by the use of an oil-electric car, someone might be able to make it pay.

#### Why Unload It On To Englishman.

Charles Woodward, the doughty Liberal member for Vancouver, head of the Woodward stores, thinks it would be good business to unload the P.G.E. on some gullible Englishman. He would give him some land which anybody could have for the asking at any time, as a further inducement to take over the road.

There may be people in the Old Country who would fall for a deal of that kind without investigating but we doubt if Honest John would be justified in pulling through such a deal. If he made it a bargain sale and gave it for half price, we still should not have much opinion of the Englishman who would undertake such a proposition, but the deal in that case would not be unequal, and British Columbia would certainly be the gainer.

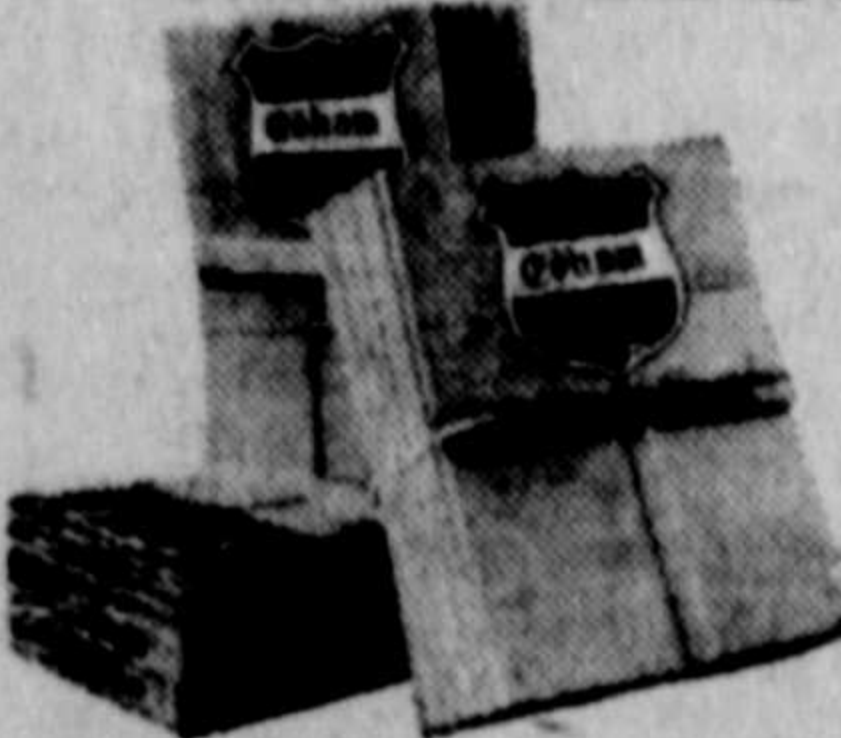

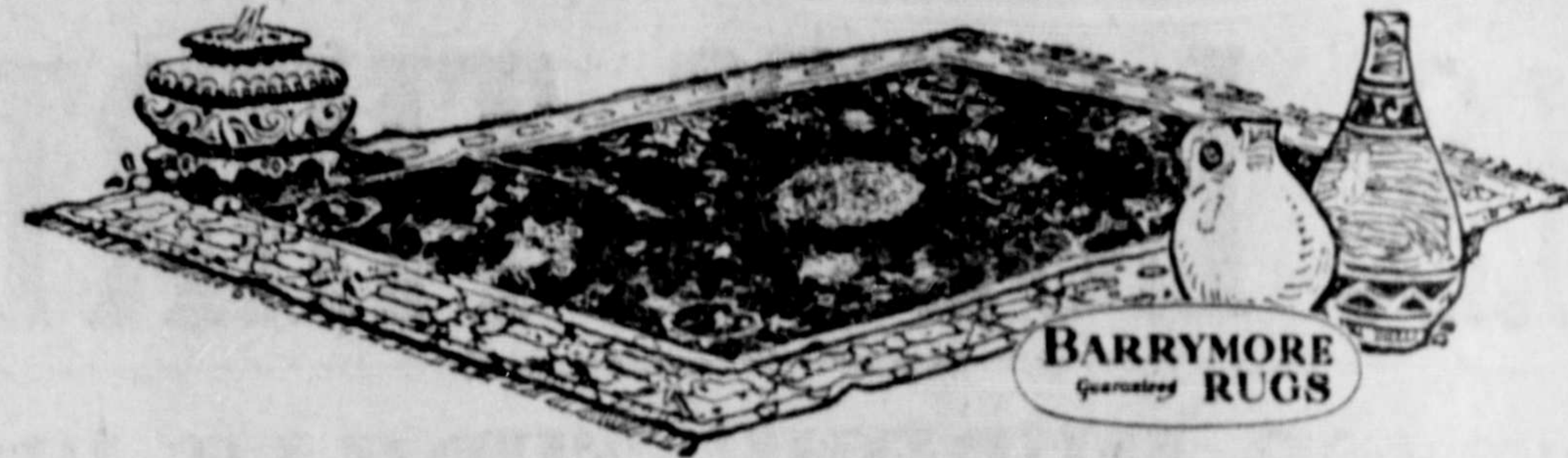

## HERE DIRECT FROM ORIENT

Freighter Norman Monarch Arrived Yesterday Afternoon Enroute to Queen Charlotte City

After an uneventful voyage of sixteen days from Mororan, Japan, the Monarch Steamship Co.'s Freighter Norman Monarch, Capt. A. W. Kane, arrived in port at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon and, after passing quarantine and customs and taking on stores here, proceeded early this morning to Queen Charlotte City where she will load one million feet of lumber at the Southern Alberta Lumber Co.'s mill for delivery on the Atlantic coast. The vessel will remain about seven days at Queen Charlotte City and will then sail for Vancouver to complete, leaving that port for Key West and New York. This was the first call of Capt. Kane and his ship to this port. The vessel was on her return to this coast after having taken cargo from Vancouver to Japan. The Norman Monarch was met and piloted into Prince Rupert harbor by Capt. C. W. Wearmouth of Vancouver who is taking the vessel to Queen Charlotte City and will have charge of her till she arrives in Vancouver. Meeting the vessel here was also Jess Wright of Vancouver, who will superintend the loading at Queen Charlotte City.

Capt. Kane had nothing outstanding to report after the voyage. Speaking of conditions in Yokohama, he stated that there had not been much rebuilding at that port following the disastrous earthquake of a couple of years ago. So far only a few large buildings had yet been erected to replace the many that were razed in the catastrophe. Business was being carried on and people were residing in shacks and huts among the ruins, which by now have been pretty well cleared away.

According to official records of batting in the American League during the 1925 season there was heavier hitting during the year just closed than in 1924. Three teams, Philadelphia Athletics, Washington Senators and Detroit Tigers, batted better than 300 whereas 298 was the high mark in 1924. The averages for this season were: Philadelphia, .307; Washington, .303; Detroit, .302; St. Louis, .298; Cleveland, .297; Chicago, .284; New York, .275; Boston, .266.

In spite of the heavy hitting of the teams as a whole, the season's batting champion could not attain 400. That champion, Harry Heilmann, right fielder for Detroit, finished up with a terrific batting streak to attain an average of .393. Tris Speaker was second with .389; Al Simmons, third, .386; and Ty Cobb, fourth, .378. Ruth not only surrendered batting honors but also home run honors which were taken by his team mate, Bob Meusel who made 33 circuit clouts during the season against 25 for Ruth who was tied with K. Williams of St. Louis.

For the third year in succession, the New York Yankees led in team fielding, their percentage being .974—exactly the same as in 1924. Likewise Washington was again second to the Yankees with the same percentage as in 1924—.972. Other teams fielded during the season as follows: Detroit, .972; Chicago, .968; Cleveland, .967; Philadelphia, .966; St. Louis, .964; Boston, .957.

The leading regular fielders for the various positions in the League during the season were: first base, Joe Judge, Washington, .994; second base, Frank O'Rourke, Detroit, .971; third base, Joe Dugan, New York, .969; shortstop, Jack Tavener, Detroit, .968; catcher, Bengough; New York, .993; pitcher, Joe Bush, St. Louis, 1,000. Bob Meusel of New York led the left fielders, Johnny Mostil of Chicago, the centre fielders, and Harry Hooper of Chicago, the right fielders.

Considering the early season onslaughts of the batters, the pitchers held up well throughout the season. Herbert Pennock, the slim left hander of the New York Yankees, was the most effective pitcher in the league during the year. He displaced Walter Johnson the leader of last year who was relegated to third place, Stanley Coveleskie of Washington being second. In the matter of "won" and "lost" credits, honors go to Stanley Coveleskie of Washington with 29 victories and but five defeats during the season. Pennock, being with a losing team, did not register as good as .500 in won and lost, this indicating how little such credits amount to when it comes to actual performance.

BIG GOLD NUGGET FOUND IN ALASKA VALUED AT \$731

Raised Money on it at Bank and Returned to Kantishna on Alaska Railway

ANCHORAGE, Dec. 7.—C. B. Nelson delivered a gold nugget to the First National Bank yesterday weighing 43 ounces and valued at \$731. The nugget was discovered in Kantishna river and was among several others valued at from \$20 to \$30 each. The Kantishna country, stamped many years ago, has produced much placer gold and is known for the richness of copper and silver ores. Nelson declined to discuss his find, and left immediately with an outfit for the Kantishna. The largest stampede since that into the creeks around Fairbanks is expected to follow Nelson's discovery. The nuggets were found on a tributary to the Kantishna river below a large glacier, where more than \$1,000 worth were picked up against a ledge, mostly in large nuggets, Nelson admitted later in the day. Nelson obtained a loan on the big nugget and bought his outfit to return to the Kantishna. The route is via Kabe on the Alaska railroad 60 miles to the forks of the Kantishna and Toklat rivers. Nelson said the region is little prospected and includes many unexplored creeks.

FISHERIES LABORATORY FORMALLY ESTABLISHED

SEATTLE, Dec. 7.—A western federal fisheries laboratory was formally established at the University of Washington this week with the arrival of Dr. W. H. Rich, head of the division of scientific inquiry of the United States fisheries board, and ten assistants, and Dr. W. F. Thompson, head of the international fisheries commission now working out the problems of migration and conservation of fish.

SCHOONER FOREMOST STILL BEING HELD

Fishing Vessel will be Released on Payment of Fine of \$500 at Ketchikan

According to information received here yesterday by A. H. Ziegler, the halibut schooner Foremost, seized last month by customs officials on a liquor charge, was ordered released upon payment of a \$500 fine says the Ketchikan Chronicle. The order is said to have been issued upon direction of the secretary of the treasury to whom the case was presented, and he is said to have issued the order on Saturday. The local United States marshal's office, in whose custody the Foremost has been kept, has not yet been officially informed of the action, they announced, and the Foremost is moored at the Ward Cove float with two custodians on board. The Foremost was seized when a customs officer boarded the vessel upon its return from a trip to Prince Rupert and discovered a quantity of liquor on board. The vessel was ordered seized and was placed in custody of the local coast guardsmen until after the case had been heard in court. The court refused to order the release of the boat on the grounds that it was outside of its jurisdiction, and the case was appealed to the secretary of the

CRITICISM OF LORD BEATTY BY ENGLISH NEWSPAPER ON NAVY

(Manchester Guardian) Lord Beatty has been defending the Admiralty with more vigor than discretion against what he calls the "campaign of ill-informed criticism" conducted "for purely political or personal reasons." Lord Beatty seems to be sore because the Admiralty, which recently succeeded in forcing upon the Government and Parliament a program of naval building which will cost £58,000,000 within the next few years, has found the humble taxpayer a little sceptical about the value of his share in the bargain. The ordinary man knows that £58,000,000 is a lot of money—a good deal more, for instance, than the Government spends each year on education or on running the post office—but he finds some difficulty in grasping what Lord Beatty is giving him in return. Security he is willing to pay for, but he has a persistent notion, which Lord Beatty may call "amateurish," that he paid a good deal for it in the Great War and in the sinking of the only fleet which menaced us. But apparently he is not to open his mouth, except to swallow gratefully what Lord Beatty chooses to drop in. Anything by way of remonstrance is rebuked with a gibe at his amateurishness and lack of information. Even his patriotism is suspect in Lord Beatty's eyes. Wonder what makes the leaves turn red in the fall? "They are blushing to think how green they have been all summer."
