

CLEVER TRAPPING OF YOUNG BANK BANDIT

HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS BEING SPENT AT PREMIER MINE

Hundreds of Thousands of Dollars Expended on Premier Mine Extension

Manager of mine says will handle 400 tons daily; Forty-Nine Mine being diamond drilled and compressor set up

Many hundreds of thousands of dollars are being expended at present in further development and extension work at the Premier mine and the company is having the busiest season it has had since the original concentrator and tram line were put in place. Dale L. Pitt, general manager of the Premier mine, who is in the city today returning north aboard the steamer Prince Rupert after a trip to Vancouver.

The capacity of the concentrator at the mine, Mr. Pitt says, is being doubled and when the work is finished the plant will be in a position to handle four hundred tons of ore daily. The excavation for the extension is now completed and work is in progress on the mill building.

The capacity of the power house is also being doubled and a tank which will hold one million gallons of oil is being erected near the Premier wharf.

Mr. Pitt also states that the company is proceeding vigorously with prospecting on the Forty-Nine mine which it now holds under bond. Three diamond drills are being operated by Boyle Bros., the contractors, and a compressor has been set up. A number of miners are engaged in development work on the property.

Both Parties Busy Lining Up Candidates For Big Federal Struggle

VICTORIA, Aug. 28.—While there is no news in regard to the federal elections, both parties continue to make preparations with a view to a contest this fall. It is expected here that an announcement will be made soon and that the elections will not be long delayed.

North Vancouver George H. Morden is spoken of as the likely nominee of the Conservative party but several other north shore men have political aspirations and it is not at all sure who will be chosen.

Most of the Vancouver nominations will be made next week.

PARENTS PAY FOR CLASSES

University Work to Proceed Under New Plan, Board Agrees

At an informal meeting yesterday afternoon between members of the school board and the parents affected it was agreed that Senior Matriculation work should be continued in the Prince Rupert High School. The terms on which this decision was made are that parents residing in the city shall pay \$125 per year for each pupil attending the Senior Matriculation class and non-resident pupils shall be charged \$150. The parents will be required to enter into a bond guaranteeing payment to the school board.

It is expected that eight local pupils will attend the class and the board will thus receive \$1,000 from the parents. There will be a further \$520 from the Department of Education leaving, it is estimated, about \$1,520 for the board to put up.

NANAIMO, Aug. 28.—Eight years in the penitentiary and twenty lashes was the sentence imposed yesterday on Alax. Stone who yesterday pleaded guilty to participation in the \$42,000 Royal Bank robbery in December last.

While being brought here from Vancouver this morning Stone made a desperate attempt to escape. He was captured after a struggle on the boat during which he was knocked out by the police officers.

Hard Coal Miners Will Suspend Operations Tuesday Unless Some Action is Taken in Meantime

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 28.—On Tuesday next the miners in the hard coal region of Pennsylvania will come out on strike unless some action is taken in the meantime to prevent it. John J. Lewis president of the United Mine Workers has issued a call to the men to suspend operations consequent on a proposed change in the wage scale.

The number of men involved is 158,000 working in 828 mines.

The September suspension is not regarded as a calamity by either the operators or the miners, judging from personal talk, provided the suspension is a short one. Speculation is developing as to what intermediary will appear to bring the parties together and make the walkout a short one. The name of Governor Pinchot is mentioned as being a likely mediator.

BROTHER OF MAJOR GIBSON PASSED AWAY

Dr. A. J. Gibson, Well Known Victoria Practitioner, Was Veteran of Two Wars

Word has been received of the death in Scotland of Dr. Andrew John Gibson, formerly a well known physician of Victoria and brother of Major Geo. P. Gibson formerly of Prince Rupert. The late Dr. Gibson was a veteran of the Boer War, after which he established practice in Victoria. During the Great War he joined No. 5 Canadian Hospital in 1915, with captain's rank, and went out to Salonika. Here he was stationed for three years. Never of robust constitution, his health gave way, and he himself became a patient in hospital. When sufficiently recovered, he returned home to Victoria on leave, but after a short visit with his family here he once more returned to military duty, and continued to serve until the end of the war.

Since then, suffering almost continuously from indifferent health, he took duty as medical officer on ships in the hope that the sea would benefit him. This it apparently had, as comparatively recently he settled down to practise at Duluth, Minnesota, where he had relatives, and where Mrs. Gibson and his daughter and son expected to join him in the near future. He was on a visit to Scotland when his death took place.

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Many Are Coming Here For The Fair.
Many people are coming to Prince Rupert for the big fair week. Intimations to that effect have been received here. It is to be a big event and Prince Rupert people will do well to extend themselves to the utmost to welcome the visitors and make the affair one of the biggest successes in the history of the city.

Boys' Band Is Very Worthy Cause.
The boys' band which is being formed here under a competent instructor is one of the most hopeful institutions Prince Rupert has had. Already there are nearly thirty lads learning the rudiments of music and practising on instruments with a view to becoming members. There is plenty of material to work on but the lack is chiefly in instruments. They are costly and there is no fund to draw on with which to purchase them.

People who appreciate music or who appreciate the work that is being done in placing the opportunity before the boys to get a training in band music may well take this opportunity of showing it. Some individuals have donated instruments and others have given cash towards purchasing them. Just a few more are needed.

Splendid Move Of Allied Nations.
The nations which were allied to fight Germany are still allied in an effort to secure a permanent peace that will tend to prevent future wars. They have sent a suggestion to Germany and this suggestion promises to be the basis of a conference leading to a better condition of affairs.

The war between Germany and the allies was fought stubbornly on both sides and at times it seemed doubtful which would win. Fortune favored the allies with the assistance of the United States, and peace came. However, following the peace there was much natural irritation, a condition that is rapidly passing away. Today there is a better feeling and if the nations get together and Germany once more resumes her position in the council of nations, there should be such a change as will make for permanent peace. The effort is worth while.

Everyone Notices Improvement Here.
All visitors notice the general improvement of the city of Prince Rupert, especially the improvement in the condition of the streets. The backwoods appearance is rapidly passing and there is a more permanent and modern condition being assumed. That makes for stability.

The next move will be to beautify the city. Rows of trees on the streets and boulevards have been suggested but that would be a doubtful improvement. It would make Prince Rupert just like other cities and would not be distinctive. Trees are not needed in a damp climate but low shrubs would be more suitable. We do not need shade. We need all the sunshine that offers. This must be borne in mind by those who are anxious to make improvements along this line.

This Good Time To Visit Interior
This is a good time for Prince Rupert people, who so desire, to visit the interior. The coming week a fair is being held at Smithers and on Labor Day the big annual barbecue is the attraction at Telkwa. On those occasions the people from all the country side gather and it is an excellent opportunity to meet them.

The interior is steadily developing. It may not be growing just as fast as some people wish or as others should think it should but, as Mr. Phelan told the Rotary Club yesterday, there is a steady and marked advancement. Prince Rupert must keep in touch with the interior centres and be in a position to cooperate with them just as they co-operated with us in securing the grain elevator.

OUT OF TOWN BUYERS' WEEK

Special Opportunity For Visitors to Get Fare Paid to Prince Rupert

At this season of the year it is usual for those living in districts removed from large business centres to contemplate their winter requirements in the way of clothing, groceries, etc., and it is in the fall of the year the large household purchases are made.

Special Buyers' Week
The Prince Rupert Retail Merchants' Association will this year make it possible for out-of-town consumers to spend a very remunerative time in the city during Fair Week, September 6, to September 12, when business and pleasure can be combined at the minimum of cost.

This association has organized a Buyers' Week, similar to that held so successfully in Vancouver recently, and offers to refund railway or boat fare to each out-of-town visitor whose combined purchases in Prince Rupert amount to not less than \$100. Refunds will be based on excursion rates applying at the time. Boat fares, on which there are no reduced rates, will be refunded on the basis of fare and one-third. The only articles exempt from merchandise to make up the \$100 are sugar, canned milk, flour and feed.

Good Entertainment
The association has also provided excellent entertainment to visitors during this week including a banquet, dance and launch trips. The Buyers' Week will, therefore, offer a splendid opportunity to those living in remote districts to obtain their purchases at first hand from business houses, which stand behind their goods, and at the same time spend a very enjoyable holiday.

Upon arrival in the city visitors will register at the Board of Trade rooms, City Hall, and deposit their receipts for transportation paid and obtain a buyers' book wherein will be registered all purchases made in the city.

TWENTY INSTRUMENTS FOR BOYS' BAND WILL BE READY IN MONTH

Several More Needed to Bring New Organization up to Concert Strength; Boys are Keen

Within a month it is expected that twenty instruments will be available for the Boy's Band which is being formed here. Of these twelve are being provided by the First B.C. Regiment and eight by other citizens. Five or six more are needed to bring the band up to strength so that it may be in a position to give good performances.

Colonel J. W. Nicholls at the Rotary luncheon yesterday, said he dropped into the basement of the church the other evening and found 25 boys all intensely interested learning some of the first principles of music under the new bandmaster and he felt sure anyone seeing those boys so keen would be willing to help so worthy a cause. The youngsters ranged in age from ten to fourteen, most of them being about eleven or twelve years old. The city had been generous and given \$150 and several local institutions had promised help. More was yet needed, however. Tenders would be invited at once for the supplying of instruments.

Len Williams, was in from Ketchikan yesterday afternoon between 1 o'clock and 8:30 discharging 8,700 cases of salmon at the ocean dock for transshipment east over the Canadian National Railway. The Pacific Stevedoring Co. made another record unloading the cargo of the Bellingham averaging 1,450 cases per hour.

C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. D. Donald, arrived from the south on time at 10:30 this morning and will sail at 4 this afternoon for Stewart and Anyox. The vessel has 172 passengers, 110 of whom went East by train. The latter number included 34 members of the Cincinnati Eagle's Lodge on their way home after having attended a convention in Seattle.

C.P.R. freighter Princess Eua Capt. W. Palmer, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Skagway and Icy Straits ports where she delivered a cargo of coal and explosives. The vessel is loading 100 tons of fertilizer at the Rupert Marine Products plant and will sail for the south this afternoon, calling at cannery points en route to Vancouver to load salmon. She has been over three weeks on this voyage.

Here and There

The first batch of last winter's furs brought from the Far North by the steamer "Distributor," from Ak-lavik, has arrived at Edmonton, Alta., and is valued at approximately \$1,000,000. Good catches of furs were reported throughout the north.

Sockeye salmon fishing around Vancouver, B.C., for the first three weeks of the current season, while not as active as last year, has, so far, resulted in fairly good catches. The latest reports indicate a catch to date of 55,000 cases, which is 2,000 cases less than last year.

While the members of Dean Sinclair Laird's party of school teachers from Ontario is returning East from their tour of the country the party of British teachers, who landed in Canada recently, is now travelling through the West on a special Canadian Pacific train to gain knowledge of the country and information concerning its resources.

Construction of the half million dollar storage and power dam on the Muskoh River, authorized at its last session by the Ontario Legislature, has been commenced. The proposed work is designed to control the flow from the Muskoka Lakes basin and will enable the linking up of power development in that district with the Eugenia-Severn system.

Passenger traffic over Western Lines of the Canadian Pacific Railway to date this summer has been particularly heavy, and a large number of special trains and special cars being operated for British, Canadian and American tourists. Lake side and summer tourist travel to the annual exhibition at Saskatoon and other Western points required the operation of special trains.

Construction of one of the largest and most modern departmental stores at Winnipeg, Man., by the Hudson's Bay Company will be proceeded with immediately, according to an announcement by Mayor Webb of that city. A start upon the company's building programme here was assured, stated Mayor Webb, with the passing of a by-law by the City Council providing for a memorial boulevard flanking the Hudson's Bay property.

During the first half of August two important Ontario railway towns celebrated their Old Home Week and held pageants illustrative of their local histories and industrial activities. These were North Bay and Smith Falls, both of which held C.P.R. Days and were the meeting points for thousands of railroad men, who assisted in the pioneering work of the districts. The Old Home Week at North Bay marked the graduation of that town to full-fledged cityhood.

The funeral in Montreal recently of the late G. M. Bosworth, chairman Canadian Pacific Steamships, was attended by E. W. Beatty, chairman and president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and nearly all the directors and executive officers of the company. An impressive and dignified procession followed the ceremony, a cortage being formed by the Company's police and officers and men from the crews of Canadian Pacific steamships.

A party of thirty prominent American society people, scientists and artists succeeded recently in blazing a new passage along the Wolverine pass across the northern Canadian Pacific Rockies with the Trail Riders of the Canadian Rockies. The Riders this year have many famous men among them and six separate countries are represented. Twenty of the members wear gold and enamel buttons, showing that they have ridden 2,500 miles along the mountain trails.

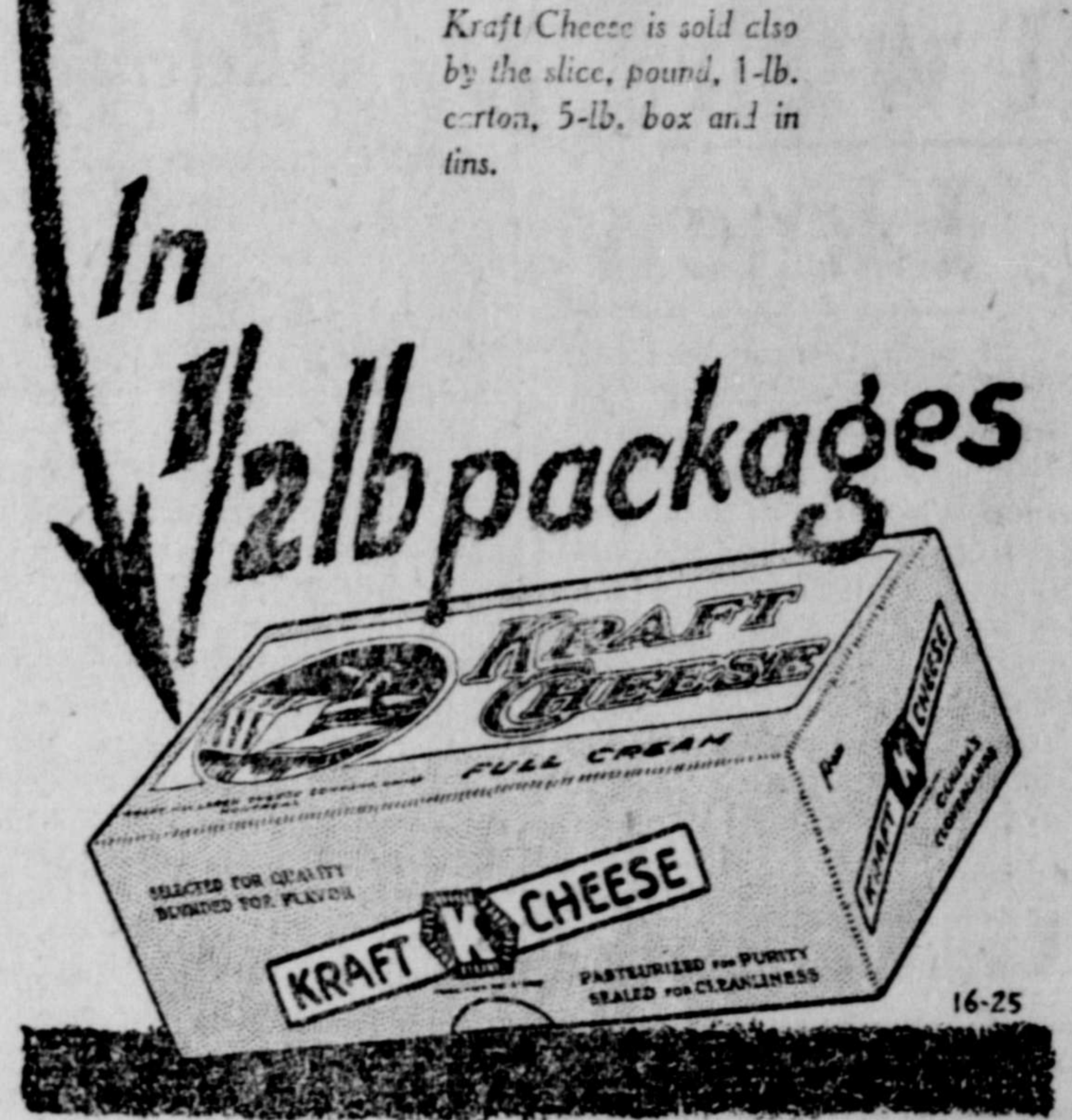

NIPPON YUSEN KAISHA PLANS

May Operate Freighters to This Coast in Place of Passenger Vessels

VICTORIA, Aug. 28.—The Nippon Yusen Kaisha is considering the adoption of two plans to counteract the shipping depression, it was learned here yesterday, one of which will affect transpacific shipping considerably and may mean the building of a fleet of new freighters.

One of these plans is to reduce the number of liners that ply on the transpacific run. At present the company operates the Yokohama Maru and seven other steamers on this line. Of these the company plans to continue only five or six, putting the others on some other lines.

The second plan, and the one which is strongly favored by shipping men both in the Far East and on this side of the Pacific, is to replace all the liners on the transpacific route with freight carriers capable of developing more than fifteen knots, which is two knots faster than the speed of the present steamers in operation. This would call for the construction of five new freighters. This second plan is being strongly advocated by some of the directors of the firm.

Deisel Engines
The new vessel which would probably be propelled by deisel engines, would cost in the neighborhood of \$8,750. Still further plans are being considered for the improving of the revenue for the N.Y.K. by improving various services, plans for which will be taken up at a directors' meeting of the company to be held shortly. This readjustment is to deal with the shipping service. One of the lines, which calls for immediate adjustment and improvement, is the Yokohama-Victoria and Seattle line, on which the company has been provided with a subsidy of \$200,000 for operation.

The construction of new steamers, however, for the European line has been cancelled and a rigid policy of retrenchment has been adopted wherever possible. But there are some services which are badly in need of improvement and the one which is the bone of contention among directors is the transpacific route, which is claimed by some of the directors to be in need of new vessels.

Recently Commissioned
The N.Y.K. only recently commissioned two new deisel liners to the transpacific service. These were the Alago Maru and Asuka Maru. The first two trips have already proven a success. The fuel consumption has been much lower, while labor has been reduced.

PRESENTATION MADE TO GENERAL MANAGERS

ANTI-BRITISH CHINESE MOVE

Money Subscribed in Vancouver and Sent to China to Help Cause

CRITICIZED GOVERNMENT

University Graduate Said to be one of Leaders on This Coast

VANCOUVER, Aug. 28.—Anti-British feeling in Shanghai and other disaffected quarters in China is being fed from Vancouver.

Money and material is being sent to China on every boat from this port, and the efforts being made here to keep the Shanghai anti-British agitation alive are not without official sanction.

Revelations were made today that as far back as June 25 last a meeting was held in the Chinese Benevolent Association rooms here at which the whole question was discussed, and at which steps were taken to organize for the collection of funds to aid the anti-British movement.

Decision to stage a play in the Chinese Theatre on Sunday, July 5 in order to raise money for this purpose was reached, and so great was the pressure brought to bear on all sections of the Chinese community that over \$2,000 was raised at this time. Since then regular collectors have been appointed and the movement is spreading.

Consul Implicated

That the June and July meetings had official sanction is apparent from reports in the Canada Morning News, a Chinese

Newspaper owned by the Nationalists and published in Vancouver. At the June meeting the Chinese consul, Ho Tsang, who is unable to speak Cantonese, spoke through an interpreter, and thanked his hearers for the money subscribed in the Wong Foon Sing case, and also for their "help in the Shanghai anti-British movement."

King Lee has been in Hong Kong and Shanghai for the past nine years, and according to members of the Nationalist movement belongs to the ultra-rad wing of that party.

Although both men are alleged to be working in collusion here, Chinese who fear the spread of the movement in Vancouver and Canada generally and are anxious to keep out of the trouble, report that the two men pretend not to know one another. They are credited with being the envoys who harangued the crew of the City of Victoria and induced the Chinese seamen to refuse duty.

Meetings in Chinatown here are growing in numbers and intensity and older members of the community report that there is grave danger of the disaffection in Shanghai becoming apparent here in clashes with white residents if the present propaganda continues, especially with the official approval it apparently has at the present time.

BARKERVILLE BOASTS INTERESTING RELICS

Also Lady Lives There Who Has Not Been Outside for 51 Years

BARKERVILLE, B.C., Aug. 28.—A visitor to this old gold rush town, now practically forgotten, describes a resident in these words: "A little further up the street from 'Pady's place' is a neatly kept white and blue painted house which is the home of one of the most remarkable characters in all Cariboo. Here lives Mrs. Housser, a hale and hearty old lady of 84, who has not been out of the immediate district of Barkerville for 51 years. In 1867 she came out to Barkerville from Germany, returning there in 1868. She came back to Cariboo in 1874 and with her sister shares the distinction of never having seen a train or street car in her life.

"Across from Kelly's Hotel lives Mrs. Murphy, postmistress and telephone operator of Barkerville. One could spend half a day examining the collection of strange relics she has found in and about Barkerville. Here is a fine old pewter mug whose markings prove that it dated back to the days of Charles L. here a silver teapot and three silver spoons and other trinkets.

VICTORIA HOTELMEN OUT TO GET LICENSES

Petitions Being Circulated With View to Having Plebiscite Very Soon

VICTORIA, Aug. 28.—Victoria, the only large city in a British Columbia where the sale of beer by the glass is prohibited, soon will have beer parlors like those in Vancouver, local hotel men predicted today when they launched a petition in favor of a new beer plebiscite.

At a conference with mainland and Island brewers the hotel interests mapped out a vigorous drive for beer. A petition will be circulated immediately under the recent plebiscite order-in-council passed by the provincial government, and beer advocates are confident that it will receive the necessary signatures of forty per cent of the registered voters.

The chief argument to be used in the beer campaign will be that Victoria is losing business through its present dry condition. The moral side of the question it will be urged, already has been determined by the establishment of beer bars in Esquimalt, adjoining the city, where beer drinkers from Victoria can get all the refreshment they want.

As Victoria voted dry by a heavy majority in the last beer plebiscite it is expected that the new beer move will be met with strong opposition.
