n spite of the fact that other food industries de an enormous business in catering to infants, the fact that sea food contains a high concentration of bone-building and other essential chemical elements, the B.C. fishing industry has so far entirely ignored this promising market. The explanation is hard to fathom as the process is the simple one of passing the product through fine-mesh plates, which would represent no great capital outlay. Now that the need for increasing per capita consumption of sea foods has been thoroughly exhausted in discussion, it seems about time that some resh action be taken to solve it. Building up the nfant market points to a possible way.
