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# LEGISLATURE PROROGUED SATURDAY NIGHT

## MINIMUM WAGE EXTENDED TO ALL BUT FARM LABORERS AND DOMESTICS

### Legislature Prorogued at Ten O'clock Saturday Night After Session Lasting Seven Weeks

Seventy measures passed including minimum wage bill which applies to all but fruit pickers, farm labor and domestic servants

VICTORIA, Dec. 21.—The second session of the sixteenth Parliament of the province of British Columbia prorogued Saturday night at ten o'clock, after the House had been in session seven weeks.

At the Saturday night sitting final passage was given the P.G.E. bill, the Sumas Reclamation Assessment Bill, the Minimum Wage Bill and the Sheep Protection Act.

As finally ratified, the Minimum Wage Bill applies to workers in all industries except fruit packing, farm laborers and domestic servants. Amendments broadening its scope to include all other industries, including coal mining were passed in committee at the afternoon session.

### BRIDGE FELL INTO FRASER

Collapsed When Crashed into Twice by Boom of Logs Towed to Westminster

### NARROW ESCAPE OF MANY

VANCOUVER, Dec. 21.—Fifteen persons narrowly escaped injury Sunday when the fixed span of the bridge over the North Arm of the Fraser River connecting South Vancouver with Lulu Island collapsed after it had twice been crashed into by a boom of logs being towed to New Westminster.

A number of persons who had been standing on the span, which is 150 feet in length, had just passed over it when it collapsed into the river.

### MIKADO ILL JAP CAPITAL

Emperor Yoshihito Suffered Fainting Spell Saturday Night and Trip Postponed

TOKIO, Dec. 21.—The departure to winter headquarters at Numazu of the Emperor Yoshihito, who suffered from a fainting spell Saturday night, has been postponed temporarily, according to a bulletin issued from the Imperial Palace yesterday.

The mental and physical condition of the Emperor, which necessitated the appointment of the Crown Prince Hirohito as regent four years ago, is described as slightly worse than it was last June.

### NO PROTECTION BRITISH STEEL

Premier Baldwin Says Not Wise to Grant Application of Manufacturers

LONDON, Dec. 21.—Premier Baldwin told the House of Commons today it was impossible to grant the application of the iron and steel companies for protection under the safeguarding of industries bill. This means that the government does not think it wise to impose import duties to assist this industry.

Three Hundred on Way to Shrine of Ste. Anne de Beaupre in Quebec Province

### BANQUET IN WINNIPEG.

French Canadian Excursionists from Prairies on Way to Spend Christmas in East

WINNipeg, Dec. 21.—Nearly three hundred French speaking men and women from the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, left Winnipeg on the second lap of a journey which will bring them on Christmas Eve to the famous shrine of St. Anne de Beaupre, Quebec, to assist in the celebration of midnight mass. After a busy afternoon in Winnipeg, when the delegates from further west were welcomed by dignitaries of church and state, the pilgrims left by special train over the Canadian National Railways and will continue their journey by easy stages to Ste. Anne, after which they will return to Montreal where the party will break up, the travellers returning singly or in small groups after spending their Christmas holidays with their old friends and relatives in their native province.

This is the first time that western Canada French Canadians have paid such an official visit to their friends in the east under the title "Survivance Franco Canadienne." This excursion is expected to develop into an annual affair, and also to result in a closer union between French speaking citizens of east and west.

### Take Along Exhibits

While the purpose of the excursion is really that of spending the Christmas season among old home surroundings, vital problems of migration within Canada is not being overlooked and a special car of exhibits attached to the special train and arranged by the Saskatchewan government will show the people of Quebec what western Canada can produce from her farms.

### Gets Pole Contract in East and Will Keep His Camps Running in B.C.

Olof Hanson, on return from Ottawa, says Robb and Stork devoting energy toward securing grain for Rupert elevator

Olof Hanson, head of the Hanson Timber & Lumber Co., returned to this city on this morning's train after a business trip to Eastern Canada and the United States including New York, Montreal, Toronto, Chicago, Ottawa and other points.

In Chicago, Mr. Hanson obtained a good-sized pole contract. While the company has the stock on hand in the interior to about fill the contract, Mr. Hanson stated that, as a result of receiving it, he will be enabled to keep his present organization going in a small way.

At C.N.R. headquarters, Mr. Hanson took up the matter of tie contracts for this district and found that it had been definitely decided that about 500,000 ties would be taken this winter from the district west of Prince George. This is about half of the ties that the railway bought last winter from this district. Mr. Hanson was definitely informed that no increase was to be expected.

Speaking of lumber market conditions generally, Mr. Hanson states that the situation remains about the same as it has been during the past few months. An improvement in the spring is, however, looked forward to.

At Ottawa, Mr. Hanson found that Hon. J. A. Robb, acting minister of trade and commerce, and Fred Stork, M.P., were devoting much energy toward having grain shipments directed through the Prince Rupert elevator as soon as possible after it is completed.

The weather all through the East, Mr. Hanson says, was fine and exceptionally mild for this time of the year. The prairies when he passed through were still clear of snow.

Soon after the New Year, Mr. Hanson plans a trip for the benefit of his health. He will probably go to South America and Mrs. Hanson will accompany him.

### WORLD'S BIGGEST DRYDOCK ESQUIMALT NEARING COMPLETION

VICTORIA, Dec. 21.—While no time has been set for the opening of the world's biggest drydock at Esquimalt, the work is nearing completion. The latest contract to be let is for the installation of an air compressor plant to be used in connection with the work on the vessels. This cost \$21,000. A few other minor contracts have to be let and it is expected everything will be ready for use early next year.

### SPRING MEET LEGISLATURE

Proposal to Change After This as Time too Short Before Christmas

VICTORIA, Dec. 21.—The probability is that the Legislature will return to spring sessions after this, it being found that the time is too short to complete the business before the holidays, when the work begins early in November. While the House must sit some time during 1926, it may be called together and adjourn without necessitating the members from distant constituencies travelling as far as the capital. This could be done by arrangement with the leader of the opposition who would allow the pairing of members not present.

It is suggested that this year the plan would have been adopted were it not for the university over-committments, which the government was anxious to have sanctioned by the Legislature at as early a date as possible.

**Dissolution Of Local Grain Board.**

The local grain board is dissolved, apparently because it has failed to agree on a matter of policy for future operations. This does not mean that all local efforts to induce grain to come this way have failed. Further steps will undoubtedly be taken.

Even though the board has so far not brought direct results, it has collated a lot of valuable data and has brought Prince Rupert prominently to the attention of the trade. Much good should result from its efforts. The active member of the board was the chairman, M. P. McGaffery. He gave a great deal of his time to the work and spent a lot of his own money. It is to be hoped he may be induced to carry on the propaganda which has been commenced.

**How A Government Gets Defeated.**

When a government is defeated on a vote on which it stakes its life, it resigns. On minor matters it may be voted down and yet not feel that it has lost the confidence of the House. That was clearly illustrated in the life of the Labor government under J. Ramsay Macdonald in Great Britain. It was defeated a number of times on matters of minor importance yet carried on.

In the division in the Legislature recorded at the weekend the matter was a purely legal one and one on which lawyers might well disagree. It did not involve any great provincial policy. Anyway the vote was reversed later by striking out the machinery clause of the bill on motion of the attorney general.

**Modern Tendency Is To Delay.**

The tendency of late in the British Columbia courts has been to delay sentences and to give many opportunities for appeal. Twice the murderers Sowash and Baker appealed their cases and the dates of execution had to be postponed. So notorious have appeals become in this province that even the leader of the opposition felt called upon to expostulate in the Legislature.

The bill under consideration on which the government was defeated, was introduced by a private opposition member and tended to further delays. It gave an offender the opportunity of taking summary trial before a magistrate and then if convicted he could appeal and ask for a jury trial.

**Leave Administration Of Justice To Courts.**

British people have usually been willing to leave the administration of justice to courts and have not taken the law into their own hands. That was because they felt confidence in the law and in those who administered it. To pass legislation which would admit of further delays and further opportunities for a prisoner to get off would mean that faith in the administration of justice would be undermined.

In some of the States to the south, each one of which has its own separate and distinct criminal laws, there is a laxity in law enforcement which causes the people to be impatient and so brings about the organization of vigilance committees and results in lynchings. These outbursts of popular wrath are often most unjust. People are lynched who are not guilty and there is a general tendency toward reversion to the law of the jungle.

Admitting that law is only a palliative, we have to use that palliative until such time as people are educated to live without law. That time is many generations distant and in the meantime it is eminently desirable that the law shall be effective and that all shall be amenable to it without distinction of race, color, religion or nationality.




