## IMPORTANT GRAIN PORT RUPERT'S DESTINY

### POLITICAL ACTIVITY AT OTTAWA CENTRES ALL EYES ON NATION'S CAPITAL

#### Elevator Places City in Position to Become One of Great Ports of Pacific says Sir Henry Thornton

Visitor says Stork never gives him moment's peace in Ottawa; Reviews finance of Railway

##### ANXIOUS TO CO-OPERATE WITH CITY

"There were a number of things Prince Rupert wanted at the time of my previous visit here, and one of these was a grain elevator. Now that the elevator is being built the city will be in a position to take its place as one of the great ports of the Pacific." So said Sir Henry Thornton, president and chairman of the board of directors of the Canadian National Railways, at a luncheon given in his honor yesterday afternoon. Fred Stork, M.P., presided and there were also at the head table F. G. Dawson, local member of the board of directors, Consul Wakefield, acting Mayor Casey and a number of prominent visitors.

#### BEAR WANDERS INTO CAMP AT WARKE CHANNEL

Phil Brentzen Follows Him to Woods and Now Bruin is no More

Considerable excitement was caused in the Flewin & Brown fish camp at Warke Channel Thursday about noon when a year old black bear wandered unconcernedly into the place. The engineer of the boat Taplow, Phil Brentzen, took his trusty gun into the bush and returned about fifteen minutes with another hide to his credit.

#### FLYING BOAT ON WAY HERE

Machine GN Leaves Jericho Beach Today for North—Due at First of Week

Flying boat GN which is to augment the aerial fisheries patrol detachment here, left Jericho Beach, Vancouver, this morning for Prince Rupert. The ship is expected to come as far north today as Swanson Bay, completing the flight to the Base at Digby Island at the first of the week. On the arrival of GN from the south, one of the machines now here will be taken to the Queen Charlotte Islands to remain in service there until the end of the season.

#### COLLISION ON C.P.R. LINE

Pusher Engine Ran Into Passenger Train and Two Men Killed

LETHBRIDGE, Aug. 15.—Engineer Middleton of the pusher engine and fireman Kendall of the Canadian Pacific passenger train were killed at noon today when the pusher engine running light collided with the passenger train here. Two other members of the engine crews were hurt together with twelve passengers, none of whom were injured seriously.

#### NEW METHOD HUNTING BEAR

Lasso and Axe Used at Queen Charlottes in Capturing Big Brown One

Hunting bear with a rifle or even a shot gun is not an unusual sport. It lay for Rufus Watts, however, to invent a new method of toying with bruin in his own haunts. It was in Massett Inlet last Tuesday that the exhibition was given. A bear was seen swimming in the inlet. Watts, who was fishing, approached from the water and lassoed him with a rope he had in the boat. Bruin set out for shore towing the boat and net and it became evident to the captor that unless more strenuous efforts were used the big brown fellow would escape. Just as Bruin struggled out of the water on to the beach, Mr. Watts brought an axe down on his head and bowled him over.

#### GRAIN CROP IS VALUABLE

Hon. Dr. King Says it Will Bring Cycle of Prosperity

VICTORIA, Aug. 15.—Canada's grain crop for 1925, is estimated to be worth \$400,000,000 more than last year's. Together with immigration on a large scale it will be the means of achieving another cycle of great prosperity, according to Hon. J. H. King, minister of public works in the Dominion Government, who arrived here today. He returns to Ottawa next week.

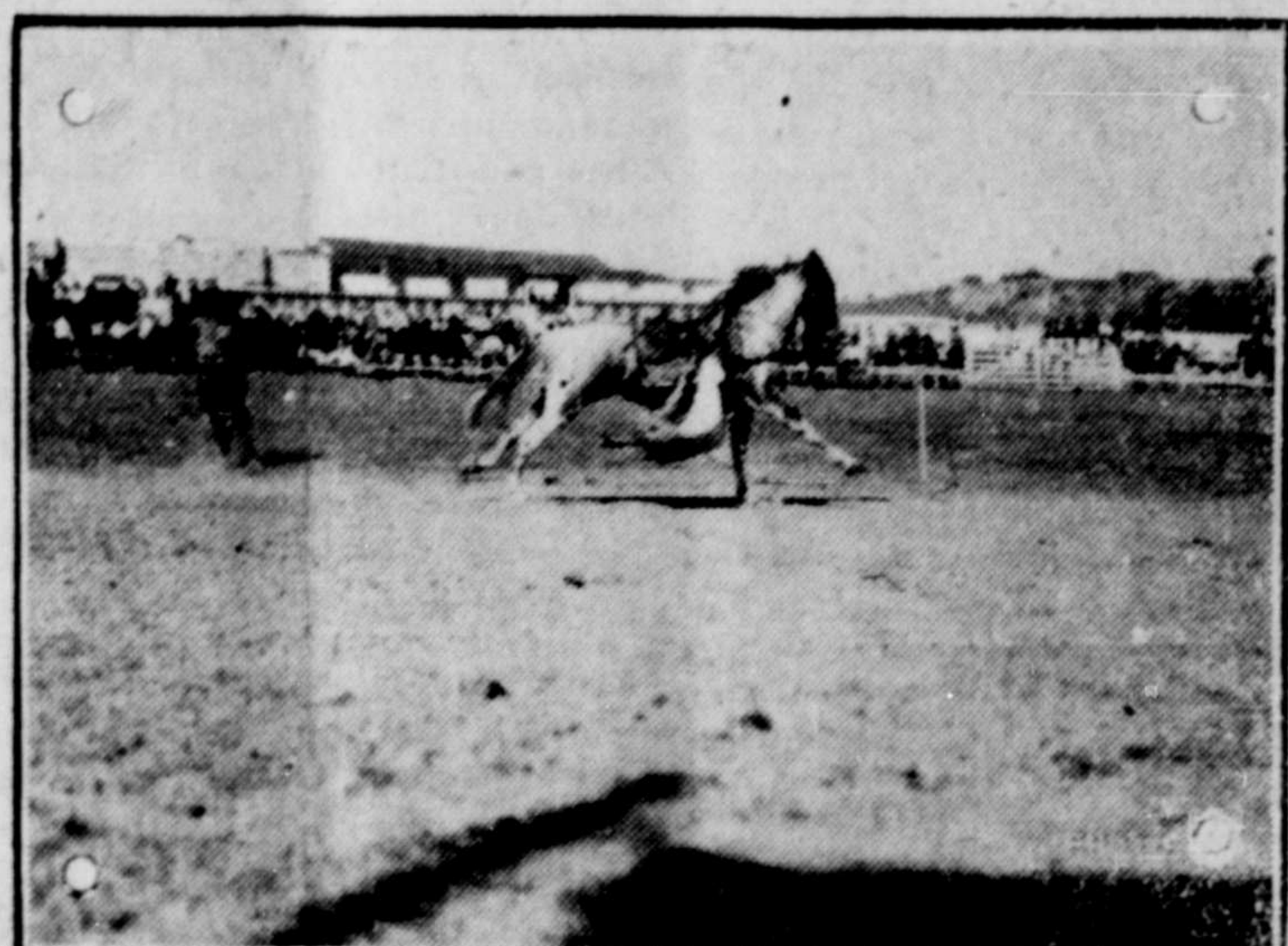
#### ENGINEER INJURED MARITIME FISHERIES

#### Notorious Mail Robber Shot Man Who Caused His Arrest; Companion Convicted Murderer

MUNGIE, Indiana, Aug. 15.—Ben Hance and his wife were shot to death yesterday by a man whom Hance identified shortly before dying as George Anderson, companion to Gerald Chapman, the notorious mail robber, now under sentence of death in Connecticut state prison for the murder of a New Britain policeman. Hance was responsible for the arrest of Chapman. Anderson was convicted with Chapman of complicity in a million dollar mail robbery at New York in 1921 and was sentenced to prison for 25 years. He escaped from jail at Atlanta.

#### Activity at Ottawa is Attracting Attention

Possible election following dissolution of House is matter of paramount importance; Larkin from London

OTTAWA, Aug. 15.—With the Canadian high commissioner in London arriving at Ottawa today and with the Dominion prime minister and the premier of Saskatchewan engaged in conversations looking to the entrance of Premier Dunning into the Dominion cabinet and with a full meeting of the cabinet summoned for Monday, the coming week promises to be an active one in governmental circles. Premier King has gone to Quebec to meet High Commissioner Larkin and they will proceed to the premier's country home for the week end. They will be in Ottawa for the cabinet meeting, however, and probably Mr. Larkin will make a report on the conditions overseas and the work of the departments under his direction.

#### 35 CATTLE ARE FIRE VICTIMS

Ranch Near Slocan City and Several Pole Camps Destroyed

SLOCAN CITY, B.C., Aug. 15.—Robertson Creek forest fire is practically out. On Thursday it cut a devastating swath, burning out the ranch of P. B. Hall, the house, barn, crop and stock being all destroyed. Mr. and Mrs. Hall barely escaped with their lives. The fire killed 35 head of cattle belonging to the Halls and several pole camps were wiped out. The fire on Thursday came within two miles of Slocan City which was saved only by a timely change of the direction of the wind.

**Lengthy Visit  
Of Sir Henry.**

Sir Henry Thornton has shown by his acts and words that Prince Rupert is a good stopping over point for those who use the railway. He stopped over himself as a test and it is the general belief that he did not find the time hang heavy on his hands. His party also seemed to enjoy the hours they were here and doubtless will go away with pleasant recollections of the embryo city of the far west.

It has been mentioned that the question of arranging stop-overs is at the option of the purchaser of the ticket, yet everyone knows that when a traveller or tourist is buying a ticket he usually takes the advice of the agent and is willing and ready to take it in regard to places about which he knows little. If Prince Rupert can show that this is a good stop-over point and the railway can co-operate, both the city and railway will benefit from a system of co-operation.

**Non-committal Address  
Of The President.**

Sir Henry Thornton told Prince Rupert people at the public luncheon tendered him by the board of trade that he realized that it was good business to build up this port as it would bring business to the railway. We naturally expected he would take that point of view. The difference of opinion lies in the methods to be adopted and in the heartiness with which he and his officials enter into the scheme. We have got to a point now where we do not expect favors. We are down to bedrock. What we do expect and shall always expect is that we shall get an even break with every other place, be it large or small. We see no reason why Prince Rupert should be penalized because the port is small.

**Co-operation In  
Shipping Of Grain.**

The next step will be to secure the co-operation of the road in regard to the shipping of grain out of this port. Sir Henry advised that the elevator be built. The railway benefits from every pound of freight that goes through here. Prince Rupert people seem ready to rustle for business if it cannot be secured in any other manner, so there is no good reason why there should not in the near future be a steady flow of grain this way. We do not share the pessimistic view held by some, that the elevator will not be used. That is a ridiculous view to take. The western route is already established and with revision of the railway rates is bound to grow. With an increasing western routing this port is bound to get some of the business if any ordinary business sense is used in connection with it. Let us forget our doubts and fears and use our energy in creating confidence rather than distrust.

**Influence Of Thought  
On Local Business.**

The doubters are the ones who create doubt and distrust in the minds of those who would come here or who would do business here. There seem to be no doubters in Vancouver who are looking for an opportunity to say "I told you so." All seem to have perfect faith in their city and in the ability of their citizens to do the business. The city is being carried forward to success on a wave of supreme optimism. Prince Rupert can also succeed. All she needs is the men who will think success, work toward success and enthuse others with the idea of success and the desirability of joining in it here.

**MANY MATTERS  
ARE DISCUSSED**

**Board of Trade Lays Before  
Railway Management Mat-  
ters of Vital Importance**

**SYMPATHETIC REPLIES**

**Sir Henry Thornton Explains  
Some of Difficulties in Re-  
gard to Local Matters**

At the conference between a committee of the local board of trade and Sir Henry Thornton and other officials of the railway held yesterday a memorandum was handed to the visitors laying out the views of the committee and to this Sir Henry replied in detail. The memorandum follows:

It is with great pleasure that this board again has the privilege of extending to you and your associates a very cordial welcome to this district.

While you are amongst us, we are grasping the opportunity to personally thank you for the grain elevator which is now in course of construction at our port, as we believe that it is mainly through your efforts that it is being built.

At the same time we wish also to bring before your notice some other matters which are of vital importance to us and of interest to your company.

**Mail Subsidy to Skagway**

Whereas the Canadian government pays annually a sum of money to the Canadian Pacific S.S. Co. for carrying mail to Alaska; this board considers that it would be advantageous to keep the money within the government by having the Canadian National boats increase their earnings by carrying the Alaskan mail after being distributed through this port, and hopes that your company will be carrying this mail, upon the expiry of the present contract.

**Queen Charlotte Isd. Mail Subsidy**

Your company has a contract with the government to carry mail to Queen Charlottes, and which expires March 31, 1926. These islands are very close to this port and are in our territory. At present you are operating this mail service from Vancouver, while it was the intention that it should be operated from this port. We would like to know how you are going to operate this mail service if you should again be awarded the contract.

**Freight Service—Alaska and  
Prince Rupert**

Whereas there are considerable quantities of freight going in to, and coming out of Alaska at all times, and whereas only a very negligible quantity is passing through this port and over the Canadian National Railroad; this board feels that the business should be vigorously gotten after and secured for the benefit of the Canadian National Railway and Prince Rupert.

**Cannery Service**

Whereas there are about 5,000 persons engaged in the salmon canning industry within a distance of 40 miles of this port, and whereas the passenger and freight traffic connected therewith is now handled by the C.P.R. and the Union S.S. Co.; this board feels that this business naturally belongs to, and could more economically be operated in connection with this port, and believes that a small boat making its headquarters here would take care of the business, increase the earnings of your company, and also be of benefit to this port.

**Peace River Outlet**

Whereas the construction of a westerly railroad outlet from the Peace River district may be commenced at a near future date; this board feels that before any decision as to the route is made, all feasible routes shall be investigated, and that the railroad when built shall open up as much arable country as possible and at the same time link up with the main line of the C.N.R. at a point which will enable it to reach the Pacific coast by a westerly route as possible.

**Oriental Silk Through Prince  
Rupert**

As the Canadian National R.R. is now taking care of silk shipments from the Orient to the East, and as this Canadian National port is 480 miles nearer the Orient than Vancouver, and that with the completion of our grain elevator there should be trans-Pacific steamship service from here, this board feels that a trial silk shipment should be

made through this port in the near future, with the object in view of making it a permanent route for this traffic.

**Alaskan Passenger Service**

This port being 550 miles closer to Alaska than any terminal port to the south of us, this board feels that Canadian National passenger service to Alaska should be through this port in conjunction with the Canadian National R.R. & Steamships, and requests that in time tables and tariffs in the United States, Prince Rupert be put on the same basis as Vancouver.

**C.N.R. Tourist Hotels**

You decided, two years ago to build tourist hotels at this port and at other points east in order to link up with your chain at Jasper, realizing that the full development of the tourist traffic materially depended upon these. This would now appear especially apparent in view of the success you have achieved with your hotel and golf course at Jasper, and we trust that you still have this in mind, and that the near future will see this project consummated.

**Development of the Interior**

Our citizens realize that the growth of this port and the success of this line of the railway are linked up with the settlement of the fertile valleys adjoining us. This board recalls the promise of energetic co-operation by the railway company in furthering the settlement of the country along the line and would like to know what steps, if any, they have taken to develop these agricultural lands.

**Sir Henry Replies**

In replying, Sir Henry congratulated the delegates on the improvements in the city and especially in regard to roads. The various matters in regard to the Alaska service, he said, were under consideration. Nothing could well be done, however, until there was a proper service. This year the service was largely experimental. He explained the difficulties in regard to booking passengers on the American side and said efforts would be made to have this city placed on the American tariffs.

In regard to the service to the Queen Charlotte Islands an attempt had been made to operate the steamer to this port only

but it had been threatened that another boat would enter the business if the C.N.R. did not run theirs to Vancouver.

The president said they were now investigating the proposal to handle canned salmon from this port. The shipment of silk by this port had also been considered and probably a trial shipment would be made.

**Peace River**

In regard to the Peace River outlet Sir Henry said an outlet through B.C. as proposed would cost \$35,000,000 and from his experience he would say another \$35,000,000 would be required for feeders to the railway. This was an enormous sum to ask for just now. When the line was built, he thought it would be of great advantage to Prince Rupert.

In regard to bringing immigrants to the interior valleys Sir Henry said that owing to red tape methods, immigration had come almost to a standstill during the past few years. The two big railways were getting together in the matter, however, and he had reason to believe there was a better prospect of getting settlers in large numbers.

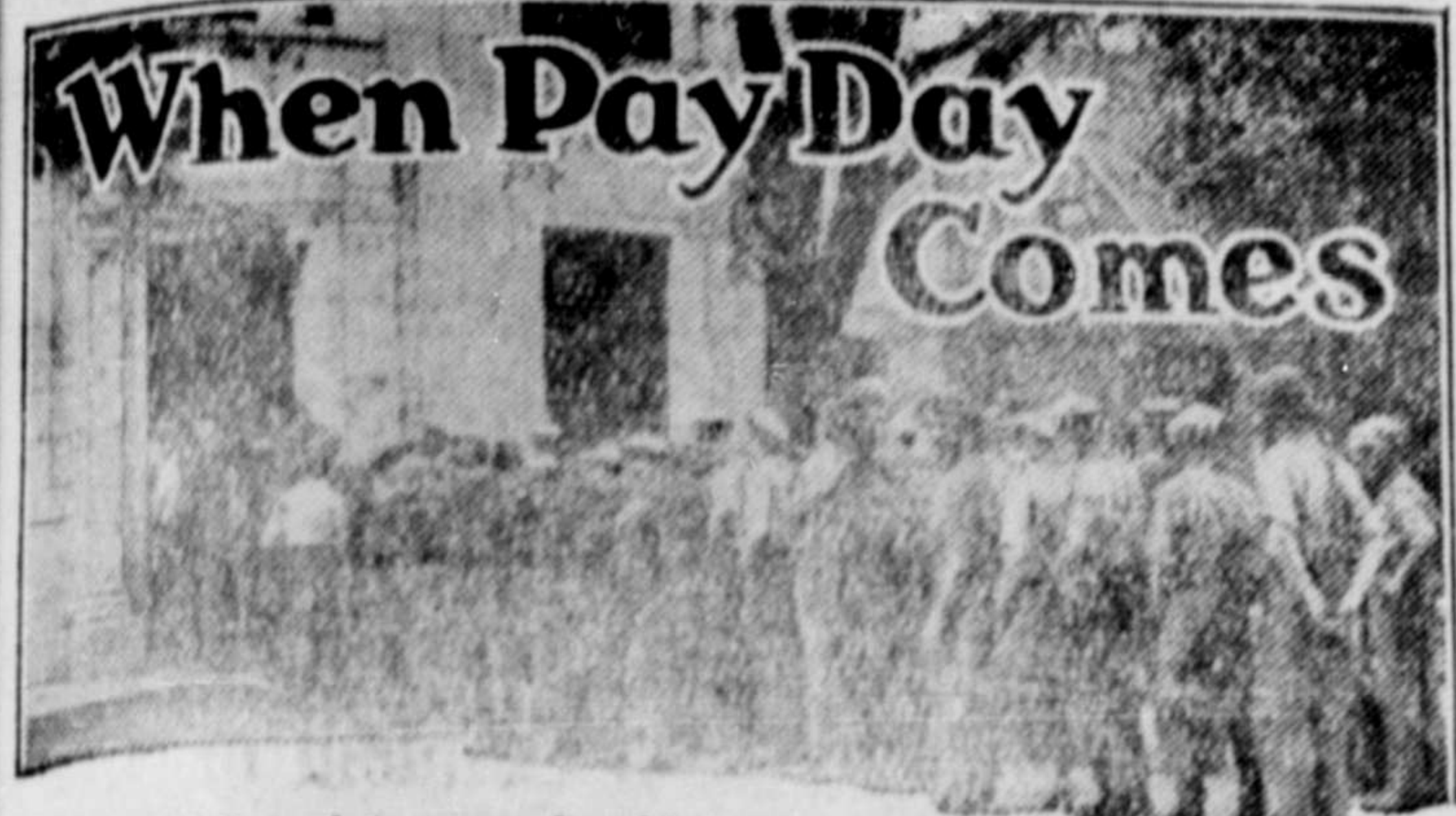

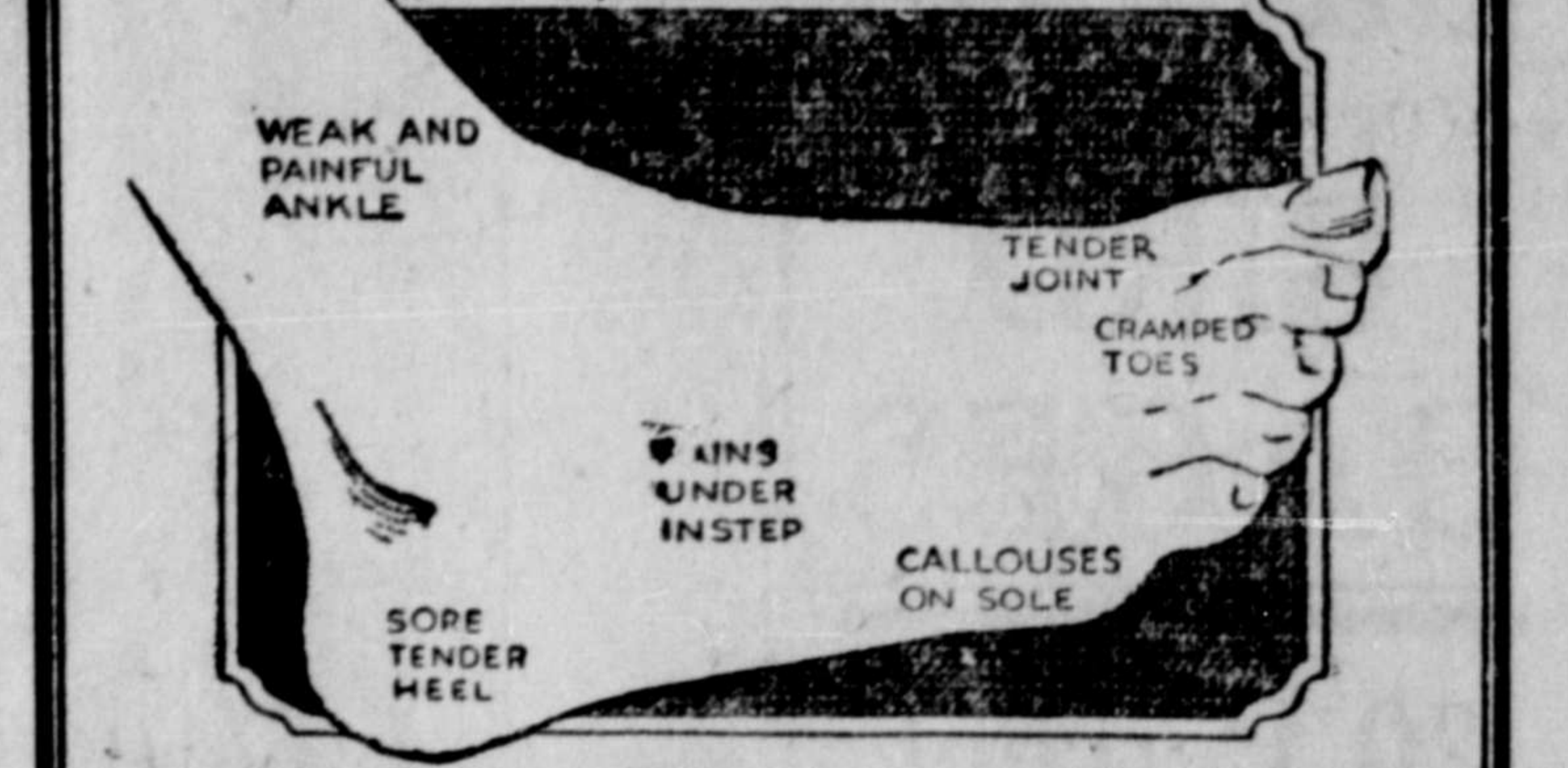

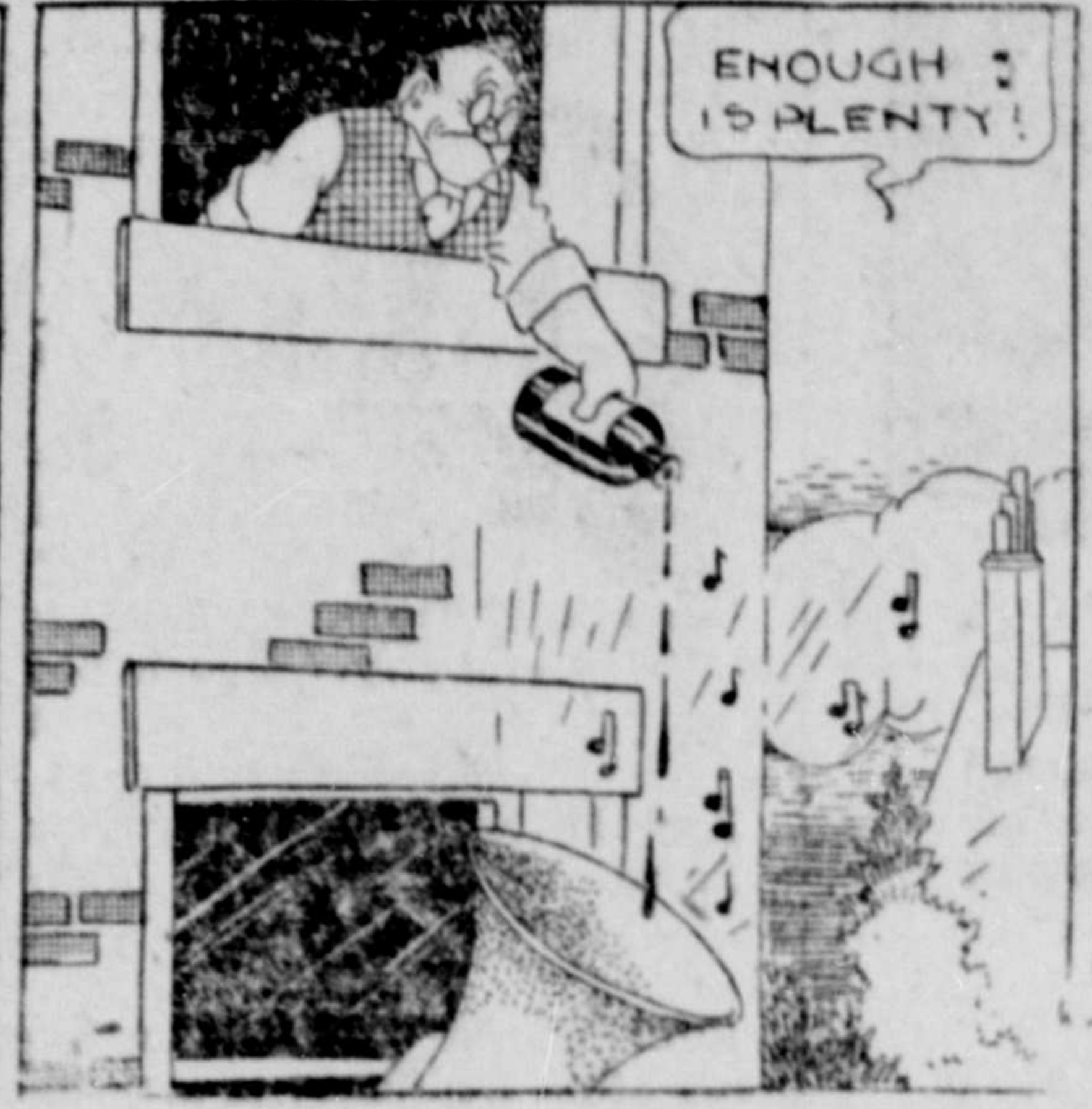

(continued from page one) vancement of this strategic point. "However," Sir Henry continued, "it takes more than water and railway to make a port. No railway can grow faster than the development of the land to which it is contiguous. It was necessary to settle up the fertile valleys of the interior if the railway was to prosper. Operation of Railway In regard to the operation of the railway, Sir Henry told his audience that for the first six months of this year the gross earnings had decreased by nine million dollars and the expenditures had decreased more than ten million dollars. The increase in the net earnings were therefore \$1,100,000. The Canadian National was the only railway in Canada that had a substantial increase during the first six months of the year. Maintenance had decreased only three per cent, most of the savings having been made in transportation expenses and in increased efficiency. With increased efficient methods and an abundant crop this year, he thought the railway would show a larger increase next year than it did in 1923 which was the year in which the greatest increase had been shown heretofore. New avenues of economy were being found and new methods of efficiency. In spite of the critics of his administration he asked them to judge him by results. If good and satisfactory service was being given he would stand on his record.
