# MURDER COMMITTED SAKE SUPER THRILL

## JURY SWORN IN FAMOUS SCOPES CASE AND TRIAL BEGINS ON MONDAY

### Young Man Commits Murder for Experience of Super Thrill and says Enjoyment in Facing Death

MINEOLA, N.Y., July 11.—Police are searching for Philip K. Knapp, 27 years of age, an ex-college Beau Brummell and deserter from the United States army aviation corps who is charged with murdering Louis Panella, a Hampstead taxi driver on the night of July 3 in order to get a "super thrill." Panella's body was found on July 4 in the ruins of an old hospital near here.

In a letter to his father, a retired manufacturer of Syracuse and to the commandant of the air squadron, Knapp said life was too dull in the army and stated that "everything was welcome that endangered his life."

Knapp in the letter referred to the thought of his committing suicide but in this "the excitement and utter enjoyment of facing death was absent."

Bootlegging also proved too tame the letter added.

### IS COMMITTED ASSIZE TRIAL

**Charles Morris of Seattle to Face Charge of Murdering Capt. Gillis**

VICTORIA, July 11.—Charles Morris of Seattle, accused of complicity in the murder of Capt. W. J. Gillis of the schooner Beryl G., last September at Sidney, B.C., was committed for trial last night at the conclusion of the preliminary hearing. The hearing lasted six hours.

Morris made no statement other than to protest his innocence. He now faces trial by jury at the next assizes probably in October. Owen Baker and Harry Myers, alias Sowash, recently convicted of the same crime are under sentence to hang on September 4.

The same witnesses whose testimony convicted Baker and Myers appeared against Morris yesterday.

### MINERS' STAND IS ENDORSED

**British Employees Backed by General Council of Trades Union Congress**

LONDON, July 11.—The general council of the Trades Union Congress today issued a manifesto endorsing the refusal of the miners' federation to meet owners of the mines until the owners proposals calling for lower wages and longer working hours are withdrawn. The Congress pledged assistance to the miners in every way.

The Baldwin Government is expected to begin an inquiry into the mining disputes question.

### CHECKED UP POWER POSSIBILITIES HERE

Chief Engineer Davis of the water rights branch of the department of lands will leave on the Venture for the south today. While in the north he very carefully checked up the power possibilities at the Woodworth Lake plant and also compared the same with the Falls River power. His survey was very carefully and accurately made and his report will not be known until he has turned in the results of his findings to his department.

Word was received in the city last evening that an Indian child by the name of Wesley had fallen over the wharf at Inverness cannery and was drowned. It is not known whether the body has been recovered.

VANCOUVER, July 11.—Five hundred delegates and their wives opened the 1925 convention of International Gyro. Yesterday the Salutation "Cheerio" was heard to resound throughout the corridors of the Hotel Vancouver and vicinity. A business session was held in the morning and a very interesting trip to New Westminster and luncheon at the Gyro auto camp.

A tree topping exhibition was given by the Kin-Farris Lumber Co. and the ladies were entertained at the Vancouver Golf Club.

### LUXURY DUTIES IN JAPAN TO BE TAXED

TOKIO, July 11.—In view of the excellent returns from the luxury taxes which went into effect last August, the department of commerce and industry is reported to be considering the enforcement of further duties. It is said that an increased import duty on watches is being contemplated, owing to the fact that the Japanese manufacturers are now turning out watches of a quality comparable with the best foreign make. Graphophone records are also included in the list on which increased duties are expected to be placed.

### Many are off to Babine River Scene of Gold Strike Reported this City Yesterday Afternoon

Word received here from Hazelton is to the effect that everyone who could possibly get away is on his way to Babine River in the neighborhood near Kisgagas, where the gold was taken out by Charles Ek and M. F. Burke. Ek is looked on as a particularly reliable prospector who is well known in the district and people have faith in his report.

A few outside people are already moving toward Hazelton from outside points, and it looks as if the old town may be the centre of excitement far exceeding that of Goldpan at Cassiar recently.

Ben Self wired last night to R. S. Sargent at Hazelton asking if the strike was authentic. The reply received this afternoon reads:

"Have no reason to doubt the truth of the two men who showed coarse gold, the same as they made discovery up the Skeena River, Hugh Harris, Geo. McBain, and Geo. Hodgins all pulled out, and myself and others sent in men determined to get in on the ground floor. We expect fuller information when some of the men of more experience in placer mining return."

It is very probable that a number of men will leave here Monday on the way to the Babine River.

### Hundred Million Bushels More Grain this Year is Estimate of Govt. Bureau

OTTAWA, July 11.—The increase in Canada's wheat crop this year over last will be over one hundred million bushels if the Dominion bureau of statistics forecast, issued in regard to the season's crop, materializes.

A yield of 365,000,000 bushels of wheat is estimated for 1925 against 262,097,000 bushels, which was the final estimate for 1924. Other grain crops it is estimated will be greater than last year.

### Ukrainians Object to Stigma Cast on Them by Trail Police Commission; Mostly Farmers

There are about twenty Ukrainian families in Prince Rupert, according to J. Krievsky, and they feel that the local police board should be congratulated on not taking any action in connection with the letter from the police commission of Trail.

In talking over the matter of immigrants coming to this country, Mr. Krievsky said that undoubtedly it would be a good thing for this country to have this type of settler as they are primarily farmers, and they are very anxious to get away from the conditions which exist there. There are nearly 300,000 Ukrainian people in Canada, and by far the great majority of these people are settled on the farms, and do not give any trouble to the authorities.

### BAIL IS GRANTED THOSE COMMITTED ABDUCTION CHARGE

VANCOUVER, July 11.—Police Commissioner McDonald, Chief of Police John Murdoch, Sergeant Percy Kirkham of the Point Grey force, and J. S. Cowper were released on \$5,000 bail to await trial on a charge of abducting Wong Foon Sing.

Reeve-Patton of Point Grey stated that the police commissioner and police officers would continue the performance of their duties.

### Scopes Defense Will Reconcile Evolution with the Bible Story

Jury in case chosen yesterday and actual trial to commence on Monday of next week

DAYTON, Ohio, July 11.—The jury that will try Thomas Scopes on a charge of violating the Tennessee law prohibiting the teaching of theories of evolution in the public schools of the state were chosen yesterday. The trial will commence Monday, the delay enabling the defense to confer on points it desires to stress in the contention that scientific testimony will show that the theory of evolution and the story of the divine creation as told in the Bible are not in conflict.

The indictment under which Scopes is tried charges that he taught theories that deny the story of divine creation of man as taught in the Bible and that he taught that man was descended from the lower animals.

### CHAMPIONSHIP TENNIS GAMES

Crack Players to Meet this Afternoon at Vancouver in Finals

VANCOUVER, July 11.—Today sees the conclusion of the Canadian lawn tennis championship finals being played in men's and ladies' singles, men's and ladies' doubles and mixed doubles.

Yesterday in the semi-finals for men's singles Wallace Scott of Tacoma eliminated Jack Wright, a member of last year's Canadian Davis Cup team. Willard Crocker, another Davis cup player defeated Leon Turanne of Seattle.

This afternoon Crocker and Scott will fight it out. In the ladies' singles Mrs. H. F. Wright of Ottawa meets Miss Marjorie Leeming of Victoria for the title.

### SEAPLANE AT DIGBY ISLAND

Third Machine Reaches Base at Marine Station

Another seaplane reached the city last evening about six o'clock for work in connection with the fisheries patrol. The plane, commanded by flying officer A. L. Morfee, left Vancouver about six-thirty yesterday morning and after stops on the way reached the city after about seven hours and a half of actual flying time. From Bella Bella the weather was very heavy and made progress very slow. The plane will remain in the north until the close of the fishing season.

### MARRIED WITNESS IN CASE AGAINST HIM

Law Invalidates Testimony of Wife Against Husband in Prince George Trial

PRINCE GEORGE, July 11.—Illustrating the intricacies of the law an unusual complication has arisen in a trial here. Arthur Bellos, who is committed for trial on a charge of assaulting Richard Brotherstone in the Quebec rooms, has married the star witness for the prosecution thus invalidating her evidence in a court of law.

Mrs. Jack immediately tried to get transportation south to attend the funeral but it was impossible owing to the large amount of travel at this time of the year and consequently will be unable to attend the funeral.

Deceased is survived by ten children.

### DAM BURST KILLING TWO CHILDREN AT A MONTANA MINING TOWN

**More Complications Peace River Railway.**

According to H. G. Perry, member for Fort George in the Provincial Legislature, Premier Oliver has been negotiating with American syndicates for the taking over of the P.G.E. and the E.D. & B.C. Railway and connecting them through one of the western passes and operating them as one system. The government of British Columbia was prepared to make an extensive land grant and it was expected that the co-operation of the Alberta and Dominion government would be secured. The syndicates had been informed just how much aid the B.C. government would give and the matter was still under advisement.

**Railway Heads Not Anxious For The Job.**

President Beatty has been losing a lot of money on the operation of the E.D. & B.C. railway, more it is said than was lost during the same time by the P.G.E. and he is not looking for further trouble. Sir Henry Thornton does not see any use to which he could put the P. & G.E. Railway. Yet offers have been secured by Premier Greenfield of Alberta in regard to the operation of the E.D. & B.C. line and the probability is that it will be extended westward across the British Columbia boundary very soon.

What is certain just now is that no government, Dominion or Provincial, feels itself justified in spending large sums of money on railway building when the railways they already have are not paying operating expenses.

**National Awakening Proceeds in China.**

China is undergoing a national awakening. She has been in process for some time past. Preparation has been made in the educating of a great many young men in the universities and schools of the United States, Canada, and Great Britain and European countries. Just now it seems as if Russian activities were playing an important part, which is hostile to British interests but which will be a great impetus to the rousing of a national spirit in China. Something is needed to bring about a change in China and if the present anti-British and anti-Japanese movement is able to do it, the eventual result will be beneficial.

**Christian General Leading The Movement.**

It is curious that a Christian general, Feng Yu Siang, should be leading the anti-British movement in China. He is not tied by the Chinese religious scruples against fighting and is doing his best to rouse the people of the country to stand up for their own rights. What Feng objects to chiefly is the foreign concessions in China. These are mostly held by Britain, but France and other countries also hold some. These it is claimed are centres of disaffection against any strong national movement and a demand is being made that they be removed. Britain holds the island of Hong Kong and Kowloon on the mainland adjoining a concession in Canton, in Shanghai and numerous other points. Japan, U.S. and France also hold concessions. These will undoubtedly have to be given up when the Chinese government is strong enough to take care of itself and to defend foreigners against persecution in that country.

**MINIMUM WAGE BOARD REPORT**

Department of Labor Prevents Sweating of Girls in Shops and Factories

**COLLECT FROM EMPLOYERS**

Many of Offenders Against Law Have Been Foreigners or Those Ignorant of Provisions

VICTORIA, July 11.—The work which has been accomplished by minimum wage legislation, in improving conditions for female workers in this province, is emphasized in the annual report of the Minimum Wage Board for 1924, which has been presented to the Hon. A. M. Manson, Minister of Labor. The report is signed by J. D. McNiven, chairman of the board, and by Mrs. H. G. MacGill and T. Mathews, the other members.

In the course of the year, says the report, a number of cases came to light in which girls were being paid less than the minimum wage required by the board's orders. Steps were at once taken to recover for the girls affected the full legal minimum wage, and representations made to employers have in all cases been effective. In this way female employees in the province have received weekly additions to their pay as the direct result of the intervention of the board. Some of the most flagrant cases have been taken into court.

**Paid Up Arrears**

Experience has again proved the value of the provision of the Act which entitles a woman or girl to receive compensation from her employer for past under-payment for her services. Cases coming under this head have been brought to the notice of the board, and where the facts were clearly established they have insisted that employers should make up the amounts by which their employees have been under-paid during varying periods. The arrears received by employees thereby amounted to \$2,107.44, the individual payments ranging from as low as 7c to as much as \$250.00. Towards the end of the year a case was dealt with in which eight girls working for the same employer had been under-paid, and the total amount received from the employer in arrears was over \$700.

The girls benefitting by the action of the board in collecting arrears during the year included workers in restaurants, hotels, millinery, tailoring and dress-making establishments, dentists' offices, glove factories, laundries, fruit canneries, garment factories, retail stores, commercial offices, and paper box factories. The principal delinquents were found in Vancouver, Victoria, New Westminster, Chilliwack and Penticton, although re-adjustments were necessary in other centres.

**Twelve Cases in Court**

Where it appeared that an offence could be clearly established by evidence, and there were no mitigating circumstances, the board proceeded against the offenders in court. Twelve such cases were taken during the year and nine of the defendants were fined.

The defendants in most cases were either foreigners or persons who had recently gone into business. It is noticed that, as experience of the Act becomes more general, there is less reliance on the part of girls who have been unfairly treated, in making complaint, or in coming forward to testify against the offenders. Their unwillingness to do so in former years was one of the chief difficulties confronting the board, and the changed attitude of female employees will tend toward more effective administration of the provisions of the Act.

**Pseudo Schools**

One of the most embarrassing problems which the board encounters are the pseudo "schools" which profess to teach some industry or occupation, and either pay nothing or frequently charge for what they designate as a "course" of instruction.

If wage earners are paid lower sums than the legal minimum to which they are entitled, the board may proceed against the offending employers in the police courts, and the employees themselves may recover in the civil

courts the difference between what they were paid and what they should have received. But when girls are induced to pay fees, in some cases amounting to \$75 or \$100, for the privilege of learning some occupation, even though the instruction is indifferent or worthless, and the employers are being paid by their customers for the services of the "pupils" the board is helpless. The courts having decided that such girls are not employees in the legal sense, since they are not in receipt of wages and are therefore not technically employed, the board has no power to obtain redress for them.

The report pays a tribute to the work of the late minimum wage inspector, Mrs. Winifred Mahon, and refers to the appointment, as her successor, of Miss Violet Smart. Since taking over her present duties Miss Smart has made tours of inspection in various parts of the province, visiting working establishments where women and girls are employed.

**Learning Trade**

It has happened frequently that the attention of the board and its officials has been directed to cases where an infraction of the law was supposed to have occurred, but after investigation it has been found that everything was in order. Such misunderstandings may be avoided if those making complaint bear in mind that a girl under eighteen years of age is permitted to be employed at a salary less than the full legal minimum for older experienced girls, and also that persons over the age of eighteen may be employed for a certain stated period, which varies in different industries, on a reduced scale of pay while learning the trade.

Other cases producing a crop of unfounded complaints are those in which women and girls at work for less than the full legal number of hours weekly are paid on a pro rata basis, their weekly pay being thus less than would be required if the full number of working hours were put in. The number of communications received by the board relating to cases coming under these heads, leads us to believe that the degree of flexibility authorized by the law as to these matters is not fully understood.

**Statistical Information**

The report contains a large amount of statistical information relating to wages and working hours of women. This is based on returns received from 2,287 firms who have female employees on their pay-roll—an increase of 92 employers as compared with the previous year—and accounting for 11,597 female workers, as compared with 10,863 in 1923. The weekly average wage of adult workers was \$17.05, this being 9c lower than the 1923 figure, but the average wage for young girls rose from \$10 to \$10.18.

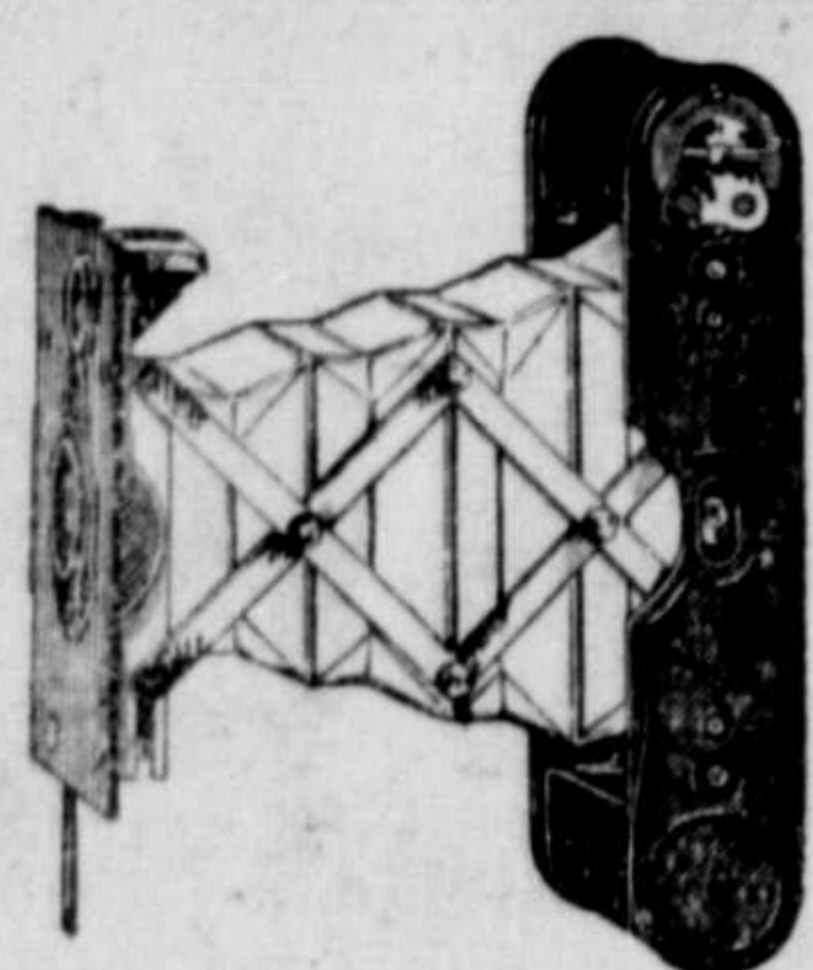

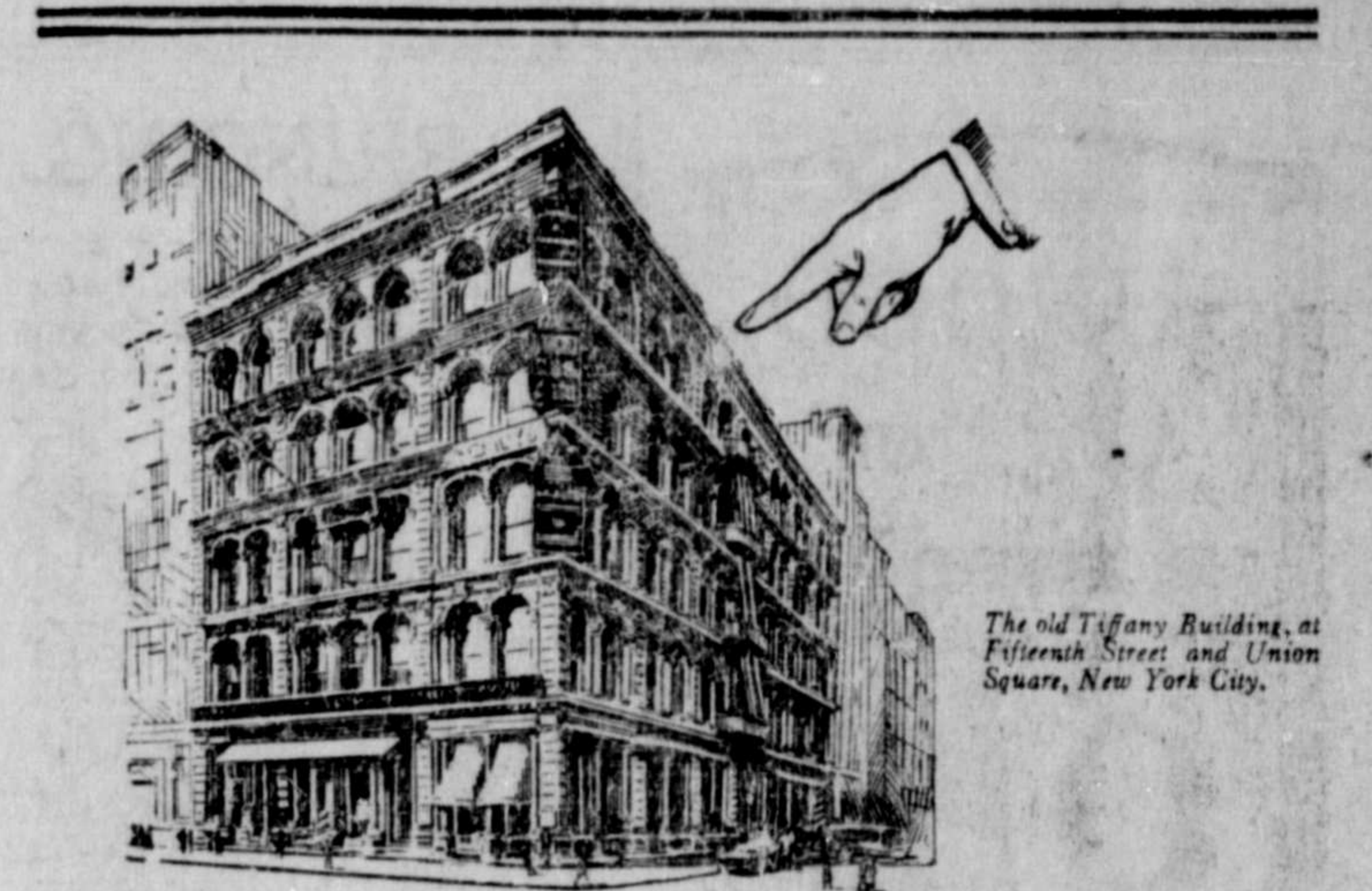

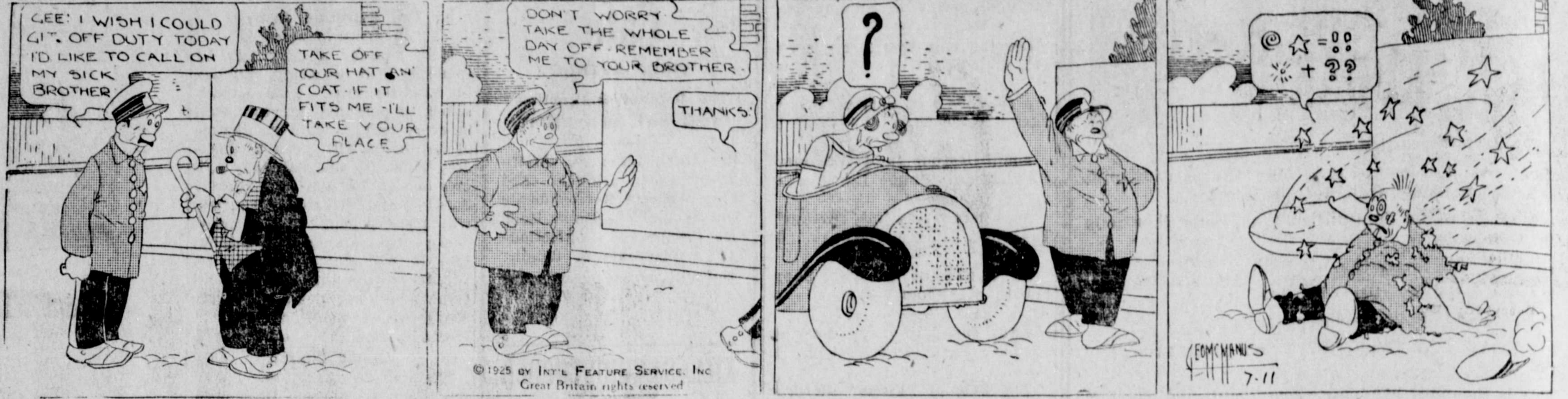

WANTS TO FLY ACROSS OCEAN

**French Airman Would Make Non-Stop Flight From France to United States**

PARIS, July 11.—Paul Tarascon, French "ace" and pioneer in prewar flying in Europe, has been bringing all the pressure he can to bear on M. Painleve at the war office and M. Laurent Eynac of the aeronautic department to enable him to make his proposed non-stop flight across the Atlantic this summer.  
Tarascon, who lost a leg before the World War and had difficulty in getting into the service, will be accompanied by another skilled air pilot, if the flight is made, Francois Goli, a naval officer who accompanied Rogel on his France-Rumania flight and on his "stunt trip" of crossing the Mediterranean twice in one day.  
It is planned to start the flight toward the end of this month, provided the necessary government authorization can be obtained, leaving from Le Bourget airdrome, just outside of Paris, and making the jump to Mitchell Field on Long Island. The French air authorities are counselling the two pilots to take off from Ireland or nearer the French coast than Le Bourget, and to aim for Newfoundland as a first landing place. Tarascon and Goli, however, persist in maintaining the flight can be made without a landing and are demanding a fair chance to prove it.  
The plane they intend to use is the Breguet "Paris-Tokyo" model made famous by Captain Pelletier D'Oisy on his flight a year ago. The engine will be either the Hispano-Suiza or the new Renault.

SOVIET RED ARMY SMALLER THAN THAT OF FRANCE CLAIMED

WASHINGTON, July 11.—The Red Army of Soviet Russia is 183,000 less than the armed forces of France and 170,000 less than the combined armed strength of Poland, Rumania and the Baltic states, says the report of M. V. Frunze, commissar of the Soviet army and navy. The report, a copy of which has been received at the Russian Information Bureau here, was made by Frunze, the successor to Trotzkly, at the recent Congress of Soviets at Moscow.  
The Soviet army of 529,000 men, says thereport, represents an average of 41 soldiers for each 10,000 of population, while on the same basis Rumania and Poland each have 100 soldiers, and France, exclusive of colonies, 200. The Soviet naval roster is given as 32,000, making the combined armed forces 562,000.

The idea when carried out is not only very simple but its installation costs are practically nil provided the exhaust pipe comes through the top of the boat. An empty gasoline tin is the only requisite for the transformation of the noisy exhaust into an exhaust giving forth harmonious notes. The formula is to secure an empty gas tin and place it securely over the exhaust. When the engine is started on no account take the tin off or the effect is absolutely spoiled and you can't get your money back. With the engine hitting on all "one" the vibrations of the exhaust in the empty tin have a soothing effect upon the nerves and remind one of a machine gun barrage at 3.30 "ack emma" on a nice wet, cold and foggy morning. Doc would doubtless be pleased to demonstrate the invention to any motor boat enthusiast desirous of being up to the minute in ideas.

Bill Leighton of Metlakatla is having a seine winch installed on his boat preparatory to seining for the Inverness cannery.

Schooner W. & F., Capt. Walters, which recently sank in Porpoise Harbor and has just been repaired at the dry dock, had the misfortune to break her clutch while en route to the Naas and was forced to put back for repairs.

Capt. Steve Ridley, skipper and owner of the power boat Katie, had the misfortune to smash his timing gears caused by a piece of metal falling into the engine. Repairs have been made and Steve is fishing for the Somerville cannery.

Oliver, came near to being destroyed by fire while at Oceanic on Monday last, and it was only due to the hard fire fighting work of the skipper and Dr. Spencer that a serious conflagration was averted. So serious did things look at one time that preparations were quickly made to tow the craft out to sea to protect other boats in the vicinity. A spark jumped from the electrical wires and fell upon a piece of oily waste which ignited. The skipper grabbed the waste and in an effort to throw it out of a closed porthole, it fell upon the gasoline pump. The flames quickly spread through the engine room and before the fire was finally got under the heat had melted the spout off a two gallon priming can. However, after a strenuous battle between the Pyrene fire extinguisher and the fire, the former won. But for the wood of the interior of the craft being scorched little damage was done. The Crosby left for the Skeena river district yesterday morning with Rev. G. G. Hacker aboard.

## U.S. INCREASE RUSSIAN TRADE

Has Grown to Higher Figure Than Before the War; Plan of Campaign

WASHINGTON, July 11.—Despite the diplomatic breach between Washington and Moscow, and the complete absence of the usual official agencies for promoting commercial intercourse, Russian-American trade continues on the increase.

Commerce department figures for the calendar year 1924 record a total export and import business with Russia amounting to \$49,000,000, while statistics compiled by the Russian Information Bureau here reached the even higher figure of \$55,900,000. The showing leads Information Bureau officials to predict a 1925 total of upwards of \$75,000,000, compared to an average annual interchange amounting to about \$45,000,000 before the World War.

### Trade Agencies

Trade agencies set up in the United States by the Russian government and by various Russian industrial groups have supplied the machinery through which this vast trade is carried on. In some measures these agencies have taken the place of the consular agents who are missing because of the failure of the United States government to officially receive any emissaries of the Soviet.

The trade machinery thus provided has its hub in New York City, where several Russian commercial agencies maintain headquarters. The system is described by the Russian Information Bureau as follows:

## PURIFIED BY CENSOR

Montreal Gets Revenue Out of Process and Fines for Dodging Inspection

MINNEAPOLIS, July 11.—Music as an aid in the treatment of tuberculosis was advocated before the American Sanatorium Association at its annual meeting here today by F. D. Bell of such things as revolvers or knives. This censorship was carried on by a city official. Now Montreal is to go a step further and magazines, book covers, paintings or drawings which may be exhibited publicly can be "purified" by this censor. The city also hopes to raise a little revenue out of the process and before the official stamp "approved" can be secured so much per foot of the poster must be paid. A fine of forty dollars or two months in goal is the penalty to be imposed for dodging inspection.

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

### PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

### PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

### HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

### LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

### GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.

## TWO MIRACLES AT ST. ANNE DE BEAUPRE

Young Woman and Young Man Said to Have Been Cured at Shrine

QUEBEC, July 10.—Two miracles are reported to have taken place at St. Anne De Beaupre during the week just ended. Miss Mary McKenzie, eighteen years of age, of Detroit, Michigan, who had suffered from birth with a displaced hip, is reported to have been cured after she had spent a day in prayer at the shrine of St. Anne. The girl, according to the story told by her companions saw her sink to her knees for the first-time in her life. At the same moment she uttered a cry that she was cured. Her injury had prevented her kneeling before.

On Saturday, a young French-Canadian, Romeo Bilodeau, of Biddeford, Maine, is reported to have been cured of a pedal infirmity. For many years he had walked only with the aid of a pair of crutches, but after arising from mass on Saturday he found it unnecessary to use these. He is reported to have walked out of the church unaided.

## VICTORIA ELEVATOR TO HOLD MILLION BUSHELS ANNOUNCED

The first unit of the Victoria grain elevator proposed to be erected by the Panama Pacific Grain Terminals Ltd. is to cost approximately \$1,100,000 and will have a capacity of a million bushels, almost as large as the elevator being built here. Discussing this elevator the Victoria Times says:

"The Panama Pacific Grain Terminals Limited is composed largely of prominent grain growers of Saskatchewan. Its officers are men of experience and sound judgment, who were quick to appreciate the advantages offered by Victoria as a grain port, and the excellence of the Ogden Point site. This is particularly gratifying in view of the fact that before Mr. Mooney, the president of the company, got into contact with the Victoria Chamber of Commerce he had investigated a number of sites on the Mainland, and had very little information of what this port had to offer. He very readily grasped the possibilities of this place when they were presented to him and had no hesitation in recommending the site to his associates."

VICTORIA, July 11.—The catch of the Victoria whaling fleet so far this season is 130 whales. Sperm whales have been most plentiful. Rough weather has been against the operations of the fleet.

## STANDARD MAIL PLANE IS TO BE DEVELOPED

CHICAGO, July 11.—On the Monmouth-Maywood air mail experimental track are being tested eight new different types of airplanes from which it is hoped to develop a standard mail plane.  
The all-metal monoplane, the first of the Ford series, is capable of carrying 1,000 pounds or more of mail, while the "Carrier Pigeon" and "Mercury" have a similar capacity. The others include a "World Cruiser" type, a Boeing, a Huff-Deland and a Cox-Clemens.  
Present air mail planes of the De-Haviland type carry only 500 pounds of mail, due to lack of cubic capacity.

## CONDUCTED TOUR

Big Party of Tourists From Winnipeg and Other Points Here This Afternoon

A special train bearing a personally conducted tour from the prairies will reach the city about four o'clock this afternoon. The party consists of over two hundred, of which approximately 135 are from Winnipeg.

Several stops were made by the party en route and various points of interest visited on the way. At Watrous, Sask., the tourists were taken for a drive to Little Manitou Lake, and many had a swim in the famous salt waters. At Saskatoon they were driven about the city, and at Wainwright they visited the famous buffalo park. After visiting Jasper Park they proceeded toward this city, stopping at Kitwanga, Hazelton, Sunnyside Cannery and several other points of interest. The party are sailing tonight on the Prince George for the south.

## FORTY-THREE DIED FROM PLAGUE, RUSSIA

MOSCOW, July 11.—There have been 43 deaths from bubonic plague reported in southeast Russia since the outbreak of the epidemic last month.
