NO DOMINION ELECTION LIKELY JUST YET

B.C. HOSPITALS ASSOCIATION WILL HOLD CONVENTION HERE NEXT YEAR

Premier Mackenzie King Hints Election Not Likely Until After Another Session of Parliament

Declares Government master of situation and will not be stampeded into action not in best interests of country

OTTAWA, Aug. 24.—"Whether or not the present government will call another session of Parliament is for the government to decide. We do not propose to be stampeded into any dissolution of Parliament just to please the leader of the opposition and his press." So declared Premier Mackenzie King in a statement last night to the Canadian Press.

The Premier's statement refers to the public discussion which has been taking place with regard to the possibility of a general election this year. "The responsibility of carrying on the country's affairs was given us by the people. We have exercised it, notwithstanding all the difficult circumstances with which we have been confronted, in a manner, which we believe has won us a steadily increasing measure of public confidence. Under the circumstances the responsibility of advising dissolution would appear to be quite as great as that of continuing to carry on despite the difficulties of government we necessarily experience."

"When we have reason to believe there are national considerations so imperative as to necessitate an appeal to the electorate, we shall not hesitate to acquaint His Excellency the Governor General with our views and press for a dissolution of parliament. When that time comes I shall be equally prepared to state the reasons to the public," declared the premier.

It is anticipated that the movement of fish products from Alaska through Prince Rupert this fall and winter will be of even greater volume than it has been in past years.

FISH ARRIVES FROM ALASKA

Car of Salt Herring from Petersburg and Canned Salmon from Ketchikan

Bringing the first carload of salt herring ever delivered here from Alaska for transshipment East over the Canadian National Railway, motorship Bellingham, Capt. Len Williams, was in from the north on Saturday night. The herring came from Petersburg and is destined for Minneapolis. The Bellingham also brought 2,200 cases of canned salmon from Ketchikan and is due back here again today with another shipment of salmon. This also goes East to the United States over the C.N.R.

Major North and C. A. Banks Looking Over Situation in Smithers for their Company

C. A. Banks, manager of the B.C. Silver mine and Major North superintendent, left this morning for Smithers where they will make an examination of the Mamie Mine they recently bonded following its relinquishment by the Federal Mining Co.

It is probable that the mine officials will also look at other properties in the district with a view to interesting their company in them.

TRAINS MEET NUMBER DEAD

Fourteenth Railway Accident in France Within Month Reported Near Lens

PARIS, Aug. 24.—A number estimated at from three to ten were killed and more than thirty injured in a collision between two express trains near Lens shortly before midnight. It was the fourteenth railway accident within a month, the previous ones taking toll of 34 lives in all and injuring nearly 300.

AIRPLANE HAS AN ACCIDENT

Forced to Land in Millbank Sound and Towed to China Hat

A fisheries patrol plane piloted by Flying Officer Hull had to make a forced landing at Millbank Sound yesterday. She was taken in tow by the Alaskan Steamship Yukon northbound until picked up by the Malaspina and taken into China Hat where she now is making repairs.

Fisheries officer D. S. Cameron was aboard the airplane at the time of the accident.

Report from South SEATTLE, Aug. 24.—Three aviators were picked up in an exhausted condition in a machine at Millbank Sound yesterday by the steamer Yukon bound to Alaska, according to a wireless despatch received here. The seaplane was operated by the fisheries patrol and is being towed to Swanson Bay.

RUDE CHECK ON A LOVE CULT

VANCOUVER, Aug. 24.—John Bertram Clarke who was arrested Friday night charged with a statutory offence, appeared in police court Saturday and was remanded for a week. Police raided the office following allegations made by girls, who answered Clarke's advertisement for a stenographer, and are said to have broken up a "love cult" in its early stages.

NEW METLAKATLA BALL PLAYERS COMING HERE

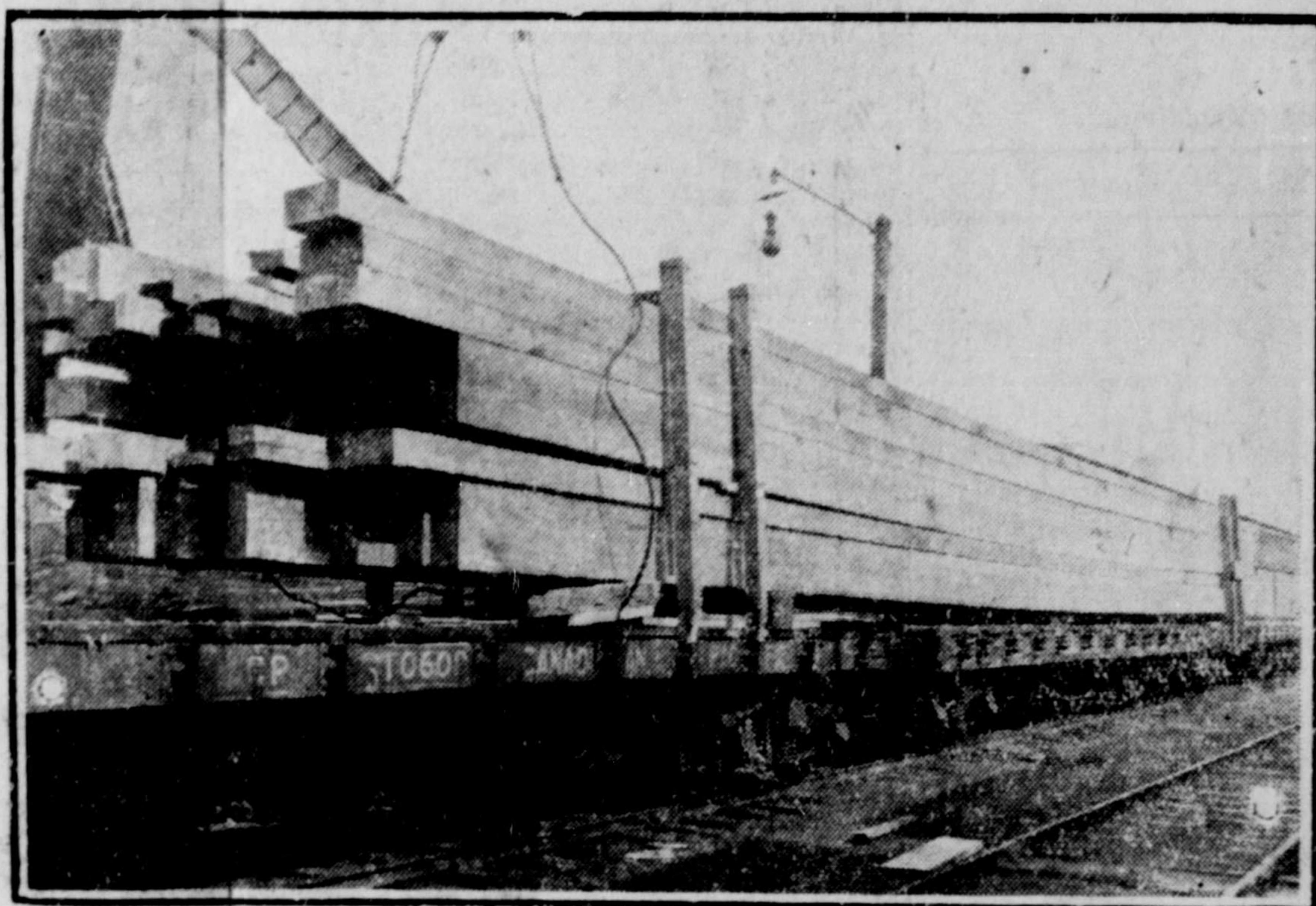
Series Will be Played on September 2 and 3, Ben Self Announces

Final Scenes in Liard River Witchcraft Cases Sentences are Passed

FEATURES OF THE LIARD RIVER WITCHCRAFT KILLING CASES

Big Alec, found guilty of manslaughter in inciting Edie Loo to tie Moccasin up thus causing his death, sentenced to five years in New Westminster penitentiary. Edie Loo, wife of Pierre, found guilty of manslaughter with recommendation for mercy, released on suspended sentence on condition of ten years' good behaviour. Jim Loo, Clem Loo and Dan Loo, acquitted. Recommendation of E. F. Jones, defence counsel, to His Lordship that the efforts of Inspector T. V. Sandys-Wunsch and his detachment of Royal Canadian Mounted Police in obtaining the evidence in the case and bringing about an impartial and fair trial be specially reported to the Department of Justice. Recommendation by His Lordship, on suggestion of L. W. Patmore, crown counsel, to the Department of Indian Affairs, that Lucy Loo be awarded a pension for her conduct, at risk of her own life, in having Moccasin untied before his death and subsequently acting as star witness in the case for the crown.

Closing scenes in the remarkable Liard River Indian witchcraft killing cases were enacted in the Supreme Court assizes here on Saturday afternoon when sentence was passed on Big Alec and Edie Loo, wife of Pierre, who had been convicted of manslaughter in connection with the killing of Moccasin at Thirty Mile Bar, Liard River, in March 1923. Edie was called upon first by Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald to have sentenced passed. Asked by his Lordship if she had anything to say why sentence should not be passed upon her, Edie replied, through her interpreter: "I want to go home."

E. F. Jones, Edie's counsel, then asked His Lordship to take into consideration the recommendation of the jury for mercy, the fact that she had a sick husband and three children with no means of support and also the fact that she had already been in jail for almost a year. She may be technically guilty but I am sure that no intent has been proven," he declared.

Police Complimented Mr. Jones then went on to compliment Inspector Sandys-Wunsch for the assistance that had been given by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in doing everything possible to bring

Another raft of similar size is expected at the mill in about a fortnight and, in the meantime, flat booms of logs will be delivered from Surf Inlet.

Hospitals Association to Hold Convention in Prince Rupert in 1926; 2 Local Officials Chosen

NANAIMO, Aug. 24.—Prince Rupert is to be the next meeting place of the British Columbia Hospitals Association and two Prince Rupert people were elected to prominent offices for the coming year. H. W. Birch is the new vice-president and Miss Jean Harrison, R.N., lady superintendent of the Prince Rupert Hospital, was chosen as convener of the committee on nursing affairs. Other officers of the association chosen were: Honorary president, Hon. William Sloan, provincial secretary and minister of health; president, Dr. G. B. Brown.

STABBER GETS THREE YEARS

Stiff Sentence Meted Out to Faustino Pena, Peruvian, at Supreme Court Assizes

Faustino Pena, Peruvian ship's fireman, found guilty with intent to do grievous bodily harm in connection with the stabbing of C. Algarde, colored mess-boy and shipmate, at Stewart on June 8 last, was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary by Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald at the Supreme Court assizes on Saturday afternoon.

E. F. Jones, counsel for Pena, asked that the peculiar temperament of accused especially when under the influence of liquor and the fact that he had already been two months in jail be taken into consideration. His Lordship, however, took a more serious view of the matter and, in passing sentence, declared that such a ready use of the knife could not be permitted in this country.

LIEN PLACED ON STR. MAUDE

Amundsen's Vessel to be Sold at San Francisco After Adventurous Career

NOME, Aug. 24.—Amundsen's exploration ship Maude reached here late Saturday night enroute to San Francisco where she will be sold. After Carl Lomen had taken possession of the vessel in the name of the Norwegian government as vice-consul, U.S. Marshal Charles Jones went aboard with an attachment for more than \$600, which an old company contended was owed for fuel taken by the Maude before her departure in 1922. Lomen posted a bond for the amount.

The Maude came here from East Siberia where she went to meet a Russian vessel with a supply of fuel oil after returning from an unsuccessful attempt to drift across the North Pole.

TALKING OVER FRENCH DEBT

Ministers of Both Countries Meet to Try to Reach Settlement

LONDON, Aug. 24.—M. Caillaux, French finance minister, and Right Hon. Winston Churchill, British chancellor of the exchequer, today began discussions of the terms of settlement of the French debt amounting to £623,000,000. It is not known how long the conversations will continue and any agreement reached between them must be ratified by the French government before a decision can be made.

DOROTHY ELLINGTON GUILTY MANSLAUGHTER

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 24.—Dorothy Ellington, the seventeen year old confessed matricide, was found guilty of manslaughter in the superior court here by a jury late Saturday night. The youthful defendant took the verdict calmly. It carries a penalty of from one to ten years.

Attractive Proposal Rupert Businessmen.

An attractive proposal is being made by Prince Rupert businessmen. The offer to refund the fare on excursion tickets or on ordinary tickets to the amount of a fare and a third is made by them to out of town buyers who make purchases amounting to at least \$100.

A great many people who come to Prince Rupert will spend a hundred dollars in all. All they need to do to secure the refund is to get a buyers' book at the board of trade office so that the merchants may be able to check up on the purchases.

Many of the buyers live a long way from Prince Rupert. The fare amounts to a good deal and the rebate is well worth earning. It really gives them a free trip to the city. Also they will be entertained one evening at a banquet and will be admitted free to the Friday evening dance.

The Prince Rupert merchants are to be congratulated on their efforts to induce out of town people to come here for the big event. A visit to the fair is well worth while.

Elevator Is Up Sixty Feet.

Prince Rupert people do not realize what progress is being made on the new elevator. Already the walls are up over sixty feet and they are shooting up so rapidly that soon they will have reached the limit. Of course there is a lot of other work to do besides pouring cement but it is good to see the walls rise and to look forward to the time when the big structure will be in operation.

Anti-Smuggling Treaty Arranged.

An anti-smuggling treaty between Canada and the United States has been arranged by a joint committee and if it is not knifed in the U.S. Senate there should be a reasonable attempt made to be mutually helpful. Until we know the terms it is useless to comment further, but it is good to know that the two nations find it possible to agree on matters of this kind.

Steady Increase in Number of Automobiles.

There is a steady increase going on in the number of automobiles in British Columbia as well as in other provinces of Canada and states of the union. At the end of 1924 there were 42,925 autos and 8,564 trucks. At the end of July this number had been increased by 4,424 automobiles and 851 trucks and delivery cars. Of course the ubiquitous Ford led the way in point of numbers but the Chevrolet came a good second and the Star third. Following that was the Dodge, McLaughlin, and Studebaker. The Ford truck led in that class with the Ford, Delivery second. The number of other trucks was negligible, the G.M.C. heading the list with the Chevrolet next.

Crop Much Larger Than Last Year.

The grain crop on the prairies is expected to be much larger than last year, the estimates placing it anything from 100,000,000 bushels higher. This means more business for the railways and the possibility of business for Prince Rupert. The next step will be for Prince Rupert to make a big effort to go out after that business, provided it is assured that the elevator will be ready to handle it.

GRANBY SHOULD PAY NEXT YEAR

Bank Loans Will be Pretty Well Cleaned up This Season Says Report

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—The annual report of the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting & Power Company Ltd., shows that the total income for the second quarter amounted to \$180,114. The net income, before depreciation and depletion, amounted to \$269,864, or approximately 78c a share comparing with 57c a share for the first quarter. For the first six months of this year, Granby earned, after interest charges, but before depreciation and depletion, \$1.35 a share, and the prospects are that in the last six months the company may earn as much as \$2 a share before depreciation and depletion. Even allowing for depreciation at the same rate the company has been charging off in recent years, Granby has good possibilities of earning slightly over \$1 a share, which would compare with a deficit last year after depreciation.

The bulk, if not all of the bank loans should be cleaned up this year, and in 1926 Granby will be in excellent physical and financial position to realize substantial profits from its copper production, provided the metal market remains favorable.

The Allenby property is practically ready for production and may begin such operations late this year or early next year. Theoretically, at least, with this property producing, Granby will have a capacity of around 60,000,000 pounds of copper, which should be made at an average cost of under 10c a pound before depreciation and depletion. Even if, for a time after operations are begun at Allenby, production is only at the rate of 50,000,000 pounds for both properties, earnings, before depreciation, but after bond interest, should be at the annual rate of between \$6 and \$7 a share, or between \$4 and \$5 a share after depreciation. It is several years since Granby shares have paid a dividend.

STOLE SKINS IN MONTREAL

Burglars Also Stole Car to Get Away With Loot Cleverly Obtained

MONTREAL, Aug. 24.—Climbing up a telephone pole burglars during the night entered the premises of the Canada Motors Ltd., 3487 Park Avenue, and using the tools they found there, bored through a two foot brick wall into the Normandin-Turoette Ltd. store, where they stole skins and dressed furs valued at \$2,000. They then went down stairs in the Canada Motors building and stole an automobile with which to carry the loot.

The robbery was discovered this morning when the proprietors of both places saw each other through the gaping hole in the thick wall.

The burglars evidently took their time and planned the looting well. They seemed to know just what tools they needed and where to find the heavy drills and chisels which they used in their work of cutting through the wall.

They ransacked the fur store and chose all the more valuable pieces leaving the less expensive stuff strewn about the place.

FIJI HEARS HELEN KELLER LECTURE ON RADIO FROM OAKLAND

SUVA, Fiji, Aug. 24.—Helen Keller, speaking at K.G.O. broadcasting station at Oakland, Cal., was heard distinctly here on a recent evening. Miss Keller was introduced by her lifelong friend and teacher, Miss Annie M. Sullivan, who taught her to talk, read and write, helping the noted blind and deaf girl to form the basis of her remarkable education.

Miss Keller's voice, which she herself was destined not to hear, was heard on this occasion in Australia and New Zealand. Reports of the reception of the Oakland program in those countries have been received here.

Story of Jazz—Mad Age Deals with Life and Love and Laughter and Consequences

"Broken Laws" is a story about our jazz-mad age. It concerns a mother and son, and the disastrous effect of too much love on the life of this boy. The mother is typical of millions of mothers today, who lavish all their love on their children. Blind to the child's feelings, she thinks him a paragon of all the virtues, with nary a fault. She never reprimands, never scolds, but continually indulges the boy in all his demands.

Her husband remonstrates with her; he sees the change in the boy and is grieved by it. He believes in the old maxim—"Spare the rod and spoil the child." But Joan, his wife, will not let him punish the boy Bobby for any of his misdemeanors. Gradually, through her selfish love for her boy, Joan finds herself losing the love of her husband who has taken to gambling and drink. This is the atmosphere in which little Bobby grows to manhood.

Next door Dick and Muriel Heath. Muriel is typical of the so-called modern woman. Dick, a book-loving and home-loving soul, in his desire for peace and harmony, has given Muriel free swing and she makes a fine mess of her life—all before her husband's very eyes. And this is the atmosphere in which Patsy, the little daughter and Bobby's dearest friend and pal, grows to womanhood.

The years pass. Ralph Allen dies. Bobby has grown into an arrogant selfish boy, a likeable, albeit lawless youth, a product of our jazz-mad age. Patsy is a typical modern flapper.

Disobeying all laws simply because he had never been taught to respect them, Bobby is sentenced to a term in jail for manslaughter. He has killed an old woman while out joy riding with Patsy.

Heartbroken, Joan the mother, in a scene of stupendous and heartrending drama, pleads with the judge to let her serve her boy's term in his stead, because it is really she who is guilty.

Start Out Again
Bobby is man enough, however, to take his punishment, and at the expiration of the jail sentence he and Patsy and Joan start life again on a surer, finer footing.

PLAYING WITH SOULS STORY OF NIGHT LIFE

Disruption of Home and Realization of Tragedy Shown in Picture

Countess de Chambrun's vivid analysis of the domestic tragedies that often lie behind the Wall Street dollar mark, which has made her novel, "Playing with Souls," an international success, is now on the screen.

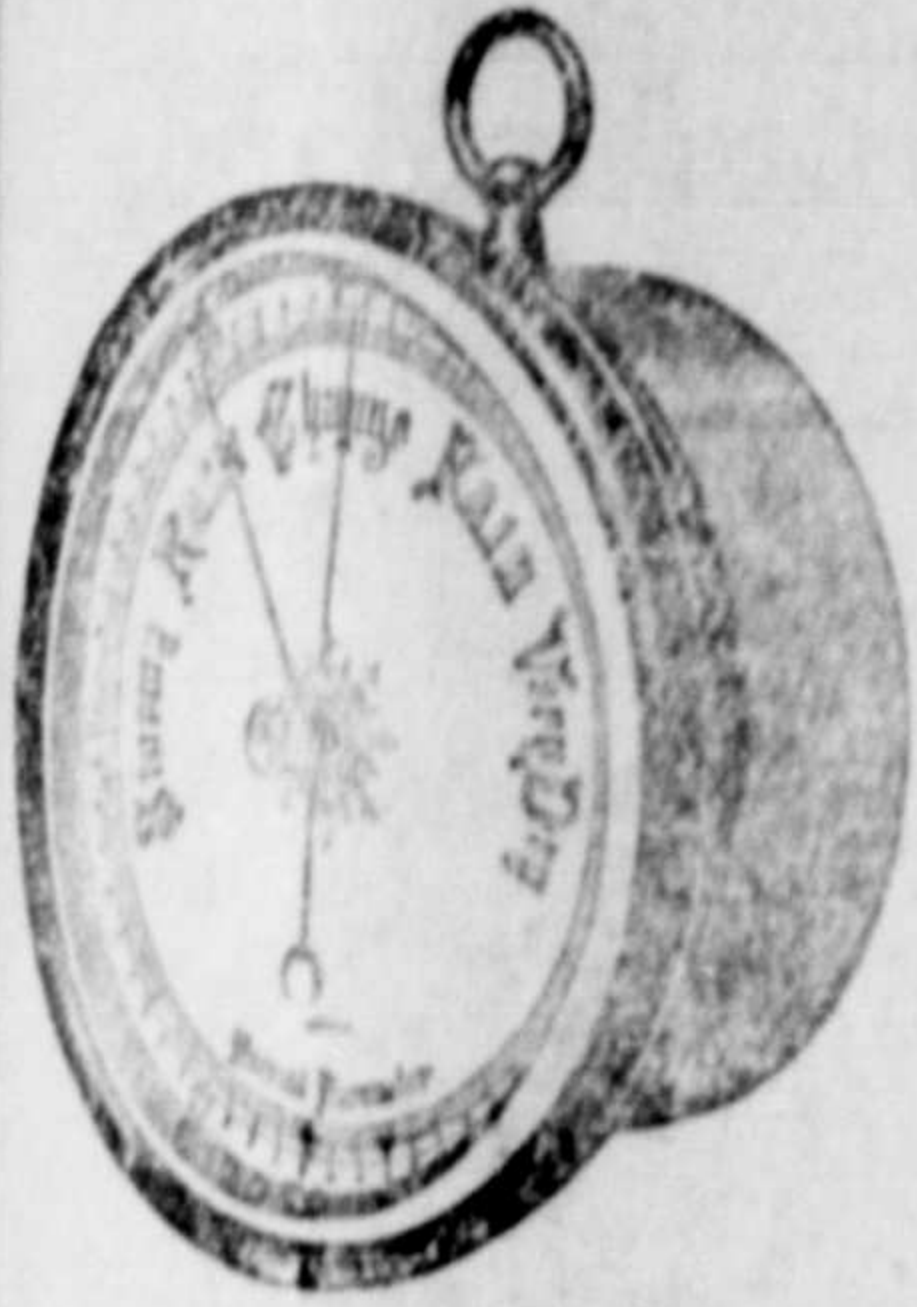

The meaning of these words being conveyed to him, the expression of a slight smile crossed Alec's face as he was led away from the prisoner's box to start the period of confinement from which some believe he may never emerge alive.

To Reward Lucy

The concluding incident of the trials, was the suggestion of L. W. Patmore, crown counsel, to His Lordship that the recommendation be made to the Department of Indian Affairs that a pension be awarded Lucy Loo for her action, at risk of her own life, in first attempting to prevent the death of Moccasin, subsequently giving assistance in bringing the crime to the light of justice. His Lordship admitted that Lucy deserved credit and announced that he would act upon Mr. Patmore's suggestion. He asked the interpreter to tell Lucy that "I recommend Indian Department give her pension. She good woman." Lucy received this announcement with unmistakable signs of delight.

WIRELESS STATION BEING DEMOLISHED IN IRELAND TODAY

Monorail Line of Railway at Same Place Being Discontinued

DUBLIN, Aug. 21.—The two great Irish wireless stations at Clifden, County Galway, and at Ballyhunion, County Kerry, are being dismantled and sold in lots or broken up for scrap. Clifden, during the Irish fighting, was destroyed by the irregulars, and though compensation for the damage was made dependent on its reinstatement, the others preferred not to reconstruct, and sold to a Sheffield firm of iron merchants.

The Ballyhunion station was originally erected as a possible rival of the station at Clifden and was bought over by the owners of the latter and never used. Its masts were of wood and were 525 feet high. Difficulty in disposing of it is caused by the fact that there is no transport by rail. The monorail railway connecting Ballyhunion with the general railway system at Listowel has been discontinued. When constructed it was supposed that its smaller design would lead to its general adoption throughout Europe but it found no imitators.

C.N.R. steamer Prince Charles, Capt. Neil McLean, arrived from the south at 10:15 this morning having aboard 80 passengers, 50 of whom went East, the most of the balance making the round trip to Stewart and Anxox.
