LONDON, Nov. 11.- Canada's representatives at the Imperial Conference joined today the Empire's tribute on Armistice Day when King George, the Prince of Wales and the Duke of York laid wreaths at the foot of the cenotaph while Premier Mackenzie King and the other Dominion premiers stood with members of the British cabinet.

Story of Attack on Chinese with Axe by Countryman is Recounted in Assize Court by the Victim

Court Hears Both Sides and Jury Decides That Big Assailant is Guilty and Waives Aside Insanity Plea

Taking twenty minutes for its deliberations following a twohour hearing in the Supreme Court Assizes yesterday afternoon, the jury in the case of Rex vs. Lee Foon brought in a verdict that accused was guilty of having assaulted a countryman, Chen Bow Hung, at Captain's Cove on the night of September 9 last, with intent to cause grievous bodily harm. Sentence was reserved by Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald until the end of the case which is before the court today. Milton Genzales acted as crown prosecutor and W. O. Fulton, voluntarily and with appointment from the bench, handled

After some persuasion by Mr. Fulton, who stated that accused would tell him nothing on which to base a defence and seemed to be of a very peculiar frame of mind. Lee Foon, large for a Chinese and of unkempt and shambling appearance in large and worn mackinaw coat, took the stand to tell his own story which turned out to be as his counsel suggested, something bearing on the irrational which, however, was not accepted by the court as such and which His Lordship declared would have to be proven by others

The narrative of accused partly con-

firmed and partly denied the allegations of the crown. Sworn with the fire oath. Lee Foon declared that a few days previous to the assault Chan Bow Hung and a white man, who turned out to be the watchman, Martin had attempted to murder him with a big knife as he lay in his bunk in darkness. This attempt, accused continued, was frustrated when he lit a match and his alleged murderers fled with him in pursuit. On the night in question, accusd said, h wnt out to get coal and he met Chan Bow Hung who flashed his light and made a pass as if to strike hm. A fight followed after which he (Lee Foon) returned to the bunkhouse. Accused declared that he was subject to nightmares and hallucinations. He denied having had an axe and said he knew nothing about the axe produced in court. In the fight with Chen Bow Under cross-examination, accused recounted some of the events leading up to his fight with Chen Bow Hung. He had jumped into the water he said because he feared he would kill the man. In his address to the jury, Mr. Fulhad committed the assault. The more important question was that of motive. Had it been an insane act or for the purpose of robbery? Mr. Fulton emphaisized the point of insanity.

The following memorandum of port and district requirement was presented Henry Thornton, Canadian National Railways, by a committee of the Board of Trade and Sir Henry gave his answer in regard to the requests at the dinner last evening.

It is with pleasure that we again, on behalf of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade, welcome you to our city. Since you last visited us the elevator has been completed and taken over by the Canadian Co-operative Wheat Pool. This organization has already loaded three ships from this season's grain crop, and indications are that some ten million bushels will move outward from this port by the time the present crop is disposed of. As you assisted materially in having this elevator constructed, we feel satisfied that the results so far obtained are as gratifying to you as to others interested in the development of Prince Rupert.

The movement of the grain over this part of your system, we feel, demonstrated that it is more profitable to the railway than though it had passed through the Port of Vancouver. Further, other traffic that will be created at this port by reason of this movement will directly benefit, in its entirety, the Canadian National Railway, where at other ports competitive roads obtain their portion.

MORE FACILITIES

While we can consider ourselves on the map as a grain port in so far as tramp cargoes are concerned, we cannot hope to be ranked as a one hundred per cent grain outlet until facilities are available for shipments of part cargoes. In this connection, may we suggest that you take under advisement the extension to this port of the service being performed by the C.G.M.M. boats to the United Kingdom and Europe, at the same time giving ship pers the same rate of freight as from the southern ports. Not only will this facilitate the movement of grain, bu allow exporters of other commodities to avail themselves of the economic advantages offered here. Alaska exports a considerable portion of their salmon and by reason of the service now established by the Northland Steamship Co., it is possible for them to deliver their salmon here at a lower rate than to the port of Seattle. This cargo is not available to any other Canadian to the labor used in the ordinary cost of handling salmon, the work of strapping and labeling amounts to a cor siderable sum which, as this salmon destined for foreign countries, can be done at this port as advantageously as though done at Seattle.

When you were here last we took u the question of supplying a boat for performing a service between here and the Queen Charlotte Island. Since then the Board has been able to influence the Department of Trade and Commerce in calling for tenders for a service of eighty trips a year from here to these islands, and we understand that you are to get the contract. This will necessitate the construction of a boat of one hundred and fifty tons carrying capacity. This boat could be u,sed advantageously during her spare time in freighting salmon here from adjacent canneries for rail and ocean shipment. left on Monday for the interior. This, coupled with the saving of four hundred and eighty miles in the water route between here and the Orient, should be an inducement for steamship lines engaged in the silk trade to make this their first port of call. If this is not a factor with the Blue Funnel Line, we have no doubt but what some of the Oriental lines would be glad to avail themselves of this opportunity if you were to offer them the same co-operation that you extend to the Blue Funnel Company. It should at least be possible to get some of these companies to make a trial shipment as they would lose very little in calling here as against going direct to Vancouver.

On previous occasions we have discussed with you the wisdom of constructing a hotel, primarily for the tourist trade, at this port. This, we believe, has appealed to you as being a reasonable request, the question of finance. however, in the past has been the barrier, but now that you have decided that you can afford to construct a hotel at Vancouver, we trust that an amount sufficient to build one here, suitable for our requirements, will be embodied in your estimates for the coming year.

SOURCE OF REVENUE It would seem that the longer you can keep tourists on your line, the greater the source of revenue. Having that in mind, we respectfully suggest that you take under consideration the development of a resort at some point between here and Jasper. Lakelse Lake. Hazelton, Lake Kathlyn, and Stewart Lake offer ideal attractions for tourists. Add to this a summer hotel at Stewart and you can offer the tourist attrac-




