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STEEL SMELTER TO BE ESTABLISHED

GOVERNMENT MAY TRY TO REGULATE LIQUOR TRAFFIC

Directors of Powerful Old Country Financial House Coming to Coast

Vancouver claims it will get new industry forecasts say will be established within twelvemonth

VANCOUVER, December 29.—The Vancouver Daily Province yesterday published the following:
"Two directors representing a powerful English financial house have left London for Vancouver to investigate the possibilities of establishing an iron and steel industry here. Dai Thomas, who represents the syndicate in this city, was advised of their departure by cablegram.
"Early this month Mr. Thomas received letters stating that the English house was favorably impressed with the opportunity of establishing an electrically operated smelter here. It was stated that for the past two years experiments have been made with satisfactory results in the electric treatment of British Columbia ores.
"Mr. Thomas declared that it was his conviction that the plant would be established in or near Vancouver, construction to start within twelve months."

PREMIER BRUCE IS IN NEW YORK

PRIME MINISTER OF AUSTRALIA SAYS HIS COUNTRY WILL NOT APPOINT MINISTER TO UNITED STATES

"EXPENSIVE AMUSEMENT"

NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—Premier Bruce of Australia landed here last night en route home from the Imperial Conference. He told interviewers that he "did not think the time was ripe" for the appointment of a minister from Australia to the United States. "I believe that Australia is well served by the diplomatic corps of Great Britain without engaging in that expensive amusement herself," he said. Even the possibility of South Africa following the example of Canada and Ireland in appointing ministers to Washington would not gauge Australia's policy he declared. He said that the relations between Australia and the United States at the present time were on a basis of trade more than diplomacy and a commissioner would serve the purpose better.

GERMANS PLAN WORLD FLIGHT

IN GIANT DIRIGIBLE WHICH IS FIFTY PER CENT LARGER THAN AMERICAN BALLOON, LOS ANGELES

BERLIN, Dec. 29.—A great dirigible fifty per cent larger than the Los Angeles, may be used by German fliers in an attempted trip around the world. The L-Z-1277, now under construction, is intended by Hugo Eckner and Dr. Duerer, colleague of the late Count Zeppelin, for the proposed flight.
"The success of the first round of the world airship trip," says the newspaper Deutsche Zeitung in commenting on plans for the flight, "would insure German leadership in trans-oceanic aviation."
Tentative plans call for the airship to start in Spain, cross the Atlantic to Argentina and then to make the trans-Pacific flight.

ANXIETY FOR J. D. WELLS

WELL KNOWN USK PROSPECTOR MISSING FIVE DAYS—FEARED HE MAY HAVE DROWNED

TERRACE, Dec. 29.—Great anxiety is being felt in Usk and vicinity as to the whereabouts of J. D. (Jimmy) Wells, well known prospector and prominent citizen of Usk, who left Terrace on Friday evening last and has not been seen since. It is feared he may have been drowned in crossing the self-operating ferry at Usk.

The result from Ketchikan had not been received up to noon today but it is not expected it will affect the present standing in favor of Capt. Morrison.

TAIYO MARU FOUND TO BE UNDAMAGED

Ocean Transport Co.'s Freighter Will Move Down to Elevator Today to Start Loading

It was found at the dry dock yesterday afternoon when the vessel was taken out of the water for survey that the Ocean Transport Co.'s freighter, Taiyo Maru, had sustained no damage in the recent stranding. The vessel was examined by Robert Blance, marine inspector, and also by Capt. B. C. Marsh, harbor master.
Lining of the Taiyo Maru is completed and the vessel will move down to the elevator as soon as she is taken off the pontoons today.

Having left Vancouver at noon on Sunday instead of 4 o'clock Christmas afternoon as her regular schedule would have called for, C.N.R. steamer Prince Charles, Capt. Neil McLean, will arrive here from Vancouver Thursday night or Friday morning.

NEW SCHEDULE OF C.N. SHIPS

1927 TIME TABLE FOR COAST STEAMERS IS ANNOUNCED—NO CHANGE TILL MARCH 21

Canadian National Steamship Co.'s vessels to northern ports, it is officially announced, will run upon the following schedule in 1927:

The present winter schedule calling for steamer to leave Vancouver early Monday evening at 8 o'clock for Powell River, Ocean Falls, Prince Rupert, Stewart, and Anyox will continue in effect until Monday, March 21, out of Vancouver, when the spring timetable commences with two sailings each week.
The steamer leaving Vancouver Monday evening at 8 o'clock will call at Powell River, Ocean Falls, Prince Rupert and Anyox, and the steamer leaving at 8 o'clock Thursday evening will call at Powell River, Ocean Falls, Prince Rupert and Stewart. The same calls will be made southbound.

The summer schedule, effective June 13, which includes sailings to Skagway, will call for three sailings from Vancouver each week, viz., Mondays Wednesdays and Saturdays, at 8 o'clock in the evening. The Monday boat will run through to Skagway, making the usual calls en route, while the Wednesday steamer will serve Powell River, Ocean Falls, Prince Rupert and Stewart. The steamer leaving Vancouver Saturday evening will touch at Prince Rupert, Anyox and Stewart, returning to Prince Rupert and Vancouver via Massett Inlet.
This schedule provides for a steamer to leave Prince Rupert every Wednesday for Alaska.

NEW RULES IN LIQUOR TRADE

STRINGENT REGULATIONS WILL BE LAID DOWN BY CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT, OTTAWA HEADS

OTTAWA, Dec. 29.—It is stated here that the customs department will lay down a rule that ships clearing from Canada henceforth with liquor cargoes must prove that they have been landed at the points for which the clearances were granted on a penalty of forfeiting bonds for double the excise duty.
It is also stated that liquor cargoes will be confiscated if it becomes certain that clearance papers are made out for fictitious trips.

WARRANT FOR ROY THORNTON

UNSERVED BECAUSE HE LEFT KETCHIKAN LAST WEEK IN SMALL GASOLINE BOAT

JUNEAU, Dec. 29.—A warrant for the arrest of Roy Thornton was marked unserved here yesterday upon receipt of information that he had left Ketchikan last Thursday in a small gasoline boat. The warrant, issued under an indictment charging anti-prohibition conspiracy, had not reached here when Thornton, after announcing he would go to Seattle, where he was formerly a dance hall operator, to face his accusers, departed from Ketchikan.

JAMES GILLETT IS APPOINTED INDIAN AGENT

POPULAR ANGLICAN CHURCH MINISTER SUCCEEDS THOMAS DEASY ON QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS

Announcement is made of the appointment of Rev. James Gillett of Massett as Indian Agent for the Queen Charlotte Islands succeeding Thomas Deasy who retired a couple of more years ago and is now residing in Victoria. He will officially commence his duties on January 1 and will be installed by W. E. Collison, Indian agent for the Skeena and Naas River districts, who has also been in charge of the Island district since Mr. Deasy retired.
The appointment of Mr. Gillett will be a popular one for he is widely known and well liked from one end of the Queen Charlotte Islands to the other by natives and whites alike. Coming out from Newfoundland and a graduate of Wycliffe College, Toronto, Mr. Gillett has been in charge of Anglican Church mission work on the Islands for eight years. His headquarters have been at Massett and he has carried out ecclesiastical duties over his extensive field with the mission boat Western Hope.
Mr. Gillett, still a young man, is married and has two children. His wife was formerly Miss Gilbert of Porcher Island.
Mr. Gillett will continue his ministerial duties pending the appointment of a successor for which arrangements are now being made.

CASE INVOLVES SIGNAL LIGHTS

CHARGE LAID IN VANCOUVER BY U.S. COASTGUARD CUTTER AGAINST LIQUOR BOAT KUYAKUANT

VANCOUVER, Dec. 29.—A charge that may necessitate the calling of United States coast guardsmen from California as witnesses has been laid against the Central American Shipping Co. Ltd., and Capt. A. D. Vosper of the steamer Kuyakuant, formerly the Canadian government boat Stadacona. The case, which was ordered by Police Magistrate Henry Shaw to be remanded for one week when it was called yesterday, alleges that the Kuyakuant, while lying off the coast of California in June, September and October, 1925, failed to display proper signal lights. The charge was laid by the commander and crew of the United States coastguard vessel Shawnee.

CRANBROOK HOTELS ALL ASK LICENSES

Eleven Houses Make Application Following Recent Favorable Vote

CRANBROOK, Dec. 29.—Every one of the hotels in this city, 11 in number, are making application to the Board of Liquor Control for beer parlor licenses following the recent vote taken here, which went strongly for beer by the glass. The government has announced that licenses will be granted early in the year, but it is not known yet whether they will grant all the applications.

FURTHER CUT IN LICENSES TO ORIENTALS

POLICY OF STEADY REDUCTION IS BEING CONTINUED BY FISHERIES DEPARTMENT

A further reduction of 5 per cent in the number of fishing licenses to be issued in 1927 to Orientals is announced in a despatch from Ottawa. The office of the Inspector of fisheries explains that this 56 per cent cut applies only to two varieties of licenses—namely, salmon trolling and cod.
Reduction of fishing licenses to Orientals has been put into effect steadily during the past four or five years and the same policy is being featured during the coming year.

MEMBER BACK FROM OTTAWA

J. C. BRADY RETURNS TO TOWN AFTER ATTENDING HIS FIRST SESSION OF PARLIAMENT

J. C. Brady, M.P., returned to the city yesterday afternoon after attending the opening of Parliament at Ottawa. Mr. Brady found much of interest in the proceedings which were said to be possibly more elaborate this year than any year since the war.

There are still many people in the East, Mr. Brady says, who are misled as to the city of Prince Rupert and the coast generally. During the cold spell when the thermometer registered 18 below in Ottawa, it was not an uncommon thing for many to hazard the opinion that the city of Prince Rupert would be suffering from a greater cold and that the harbor would be filled with ice.

The principal business before the House was the passing of estimates for the carrying on of the public services of the country, these estimates being practically all before the last Parliament but failed to be passed because of the abrupt dissolution. Further estimates were passed covering additional expenses of the country since that date. Mr. Brady will remain in the city until the early part of February when he will leave to attend the resumption of parliament on February 8.

CANADIAN MAGAZINES ASKING PROTECTION.

Canadian Magazine publishers have a case before the Tariff Board asking for some measure of protection from what they term unjust and discriminatory competition of American magazines. While a duty on American magazines might not keep them out of the country an imposition of such might well be considered and there seems to be a good deal of virtue in the magazine publishers' case.

If you were a Canadian magazine publisher would you fight for justice and fair play and expect every Canadian to support your demand? Yes.

They allege that they are compelled to pay duties, sales taxes, income, business, property and other levies from which there is no escape, and that the government virtually bonuses their competitor by leaving them free to compete without paying one cent of any of these taxes.

These competitors, they say, have tremendous natural advantages, because of their own home market, that greatly and unfairly handicap the Canadian productions, while practically every industry in the country is protected in some way against unfair competition, they are left to struggle against the impossible odds and to suffer from the dumping of foreign goods in the market.

They say they are suffering grave injustice and are entitled to adequate remedy.

INDUSTRY WHICH IS PUBLIC ASSET.

The magazine publishers of Canada constitute an industry which employs thousands of Canadian workmen, pays out hundreds of thousands annually in wages, uses hundreds of thousands of dollars of Canadian material and contributes hundreds of thousands yearly to the public treasury. On the grounds of common justice, as well as on national grounds, these Canadian publishers ask that it be made possible for them to compete with foreign publishers in their own market on a fair basis. This is not now the case.

The industry undoubtedly suffers from unfair advantages extended to foreign publications coming into and circulated by the million in Canada. For instance, all the raw materials: paper, ink, engravings, art work, etc., are subject to sales tax and duties ranging from 10 to 25 per cent, while the United States publishers bring their finished product into Canada free of all duties, and import taxes.

FLOOD OF FOREIGN MAGAZINES.

The total circulation in Canada of United States magazines is over 50,000,000 copies yearly. For every copy of magazines printed and produced in Canada, the Dominion import more than eight copies of United States magazines. Added to these figures United States daily and week-end newspapers are flooding Canada to the extent of between 15,000,000 and 20,000,000 copies annually. Together they reach the staggering total of 70,000,000 copies annually. More than 1,000,000 magazines, printed and edited in United States and catering to the tastes of readers in that country, enter Canada each week of the year.

Striking proof of the seriousness of this competition is found in the discontinuance within the past few years of such Canadian publications as Canada Weekly, Canadian Courier, Woman's Century, Canadian Pictorial, Everywoman's World.

U.S. magazines are filled with advertising for the United States products, not Canadian. With 70,000,000 copies of these publications coming into Canada with over 4,400,000,000 pages of advertising, the volume of propaganda for U.S. products against those of the Canadian manufacturer is colossal. An anomaly in this connection is this: if any American publisher ships to Canada pamphlets advertising his magazine, he pays fifteen cents per pound duty. On the magazine, itself, however, sometimes three parts full of advertising, he pays nothing.

In several cases United States magazines are merely super-catalogues for manufacturers of patterns. Some of this group are issued by publishers whose chief source of revenue is pattern sales. Canadian publishers cannot absorb publishing deficits in pattern profits.

U.S. publishers, with their larger purchasing power, are able to, and do, monopolize the work of many of the best authors and artists, withholding it from Canadian publishers by forbidding contributors to sell to Canadian magazines or newspapers. They are able, also, to crowd the Canadian product off our newsstands, off our ships and off our trains, making it always difficult, often impossible, for the home-produced publication to get equal service and display.

WOMEN DEVELOP MUCH BENEFIT

Given an equal opportunity, and freed from present handicaps, undoubtedly Canadian magazines would increase their sales and new Canadian magazines be developed. More Canadian pulp and paper would be used here instead of being shipped out of the country, more employment would be available for Canadians in different affected industries and the Canadian government would receive a much larger revenue from postage and numerous other sources. And, through the development of Canadian industry, more magazine buyers would come to your newsstands.

The development of Canadian magazines would give Canadian authors and artists a wider home market for their fiction, articles and illustrations. Publishers would be enabled by circulation increases to maintain their present subscription prices. Unless they get relief, advances may be the only alternative.

Newsdealers who may fear a reduction in their sales and earnings, as a consequence of justice being granted to Canadian publishers, should take into account that Canadian publishers will naturally meet the demand with magazines that will be just as profitable to the distributor as the foreign publications he now sells. Furthermore, should United States publications find it necessary to increase their prices, the distributor will make a larger margin of profit on those copies he does sell, thus keeping for himself the same earnings as now. This is admitted by one of the largest distributors in Canada.

A fair duty and sales tax would not bar any United States magazines. It may reduce the sale somewhat but every dealer can keep up his profit by selling more Canadian magazines, newspapers, books, etc., and also develop greatly the sale of British and French magazines and newspapers. Some of the largest U.S. publishers have already considered plans for publication of their magazines in Canada if conditions make it advisable.

If foreign publishers paid taxes, etc., in this country on the same basis as Canadian publishers, that is, on the amount of business they do in Canada, it can easily be seen they would pour in several millions of dollars to the Canadian Exchequer.

STEWART DEAL IS IMPORTANT

MINING AND INDUSTRIAL RECORD TELLS OF BONDING WOODBINE-VANCOUVER GROUPS FOR \$250,000

J. B. Watson of Calgary has secured an option and made the first payment under it on the Woodbine and Vancouver Groups of mineral claims adjoining the property of the Premier Gold Mining Co. on the west side says the Mining and Industrial Record. Ever since the spectacular development of the Premier Mine these groups have been regarded as amongst the most promising in what geologists claim to be the richest mining field yet discovered in British Columbia. A side cut on the old trail, where it crosses the Woodbine at the Red Bluff, exposed a mineral zone 80 feet in width. With the exception perhaps of the Big Missouri, this is the largest mineral outcrop to be seen in the Salmon River section of Portland Canal.

The deal was arranged by Edward G. Brown, of 705 Birks Building, Vancouver. Mr. Brown had been successful in handling two other large deals during the last two years and, in negotiating a deal on the Woodbine and Vancouver Groups, has succeeded where others have failed.

The Woodbine Group consists of the Woodbine, Kitchener, and Woodbine Fraction claims, covering an area of 64.14 acres. This group immediately adjoins the Fox and Cascade Falls No. 4 claims of the Premier Gold Mining Co. on their western boundaries. The locators and owners are Charles Lake and D. O'Leary, two of the best known prospectors of the camp.

The Vancouver Group consists of the Vancouver, Vancouver No. 1, Alaska Canadian Consolidated Fraction, and Premier Fraction No. 2 claims, with an area of 103.77 acres. This group is owned by the Premier Extension Gold Mining Co. Ltd., and the Alaska Canadian Consolidated Gold Mining Co. Ltd. Both these companies are represented by H. C. McGuire, their managing director.

Premier Extension Gold Mining Co. Ltd.

In 1922 these properties were bonded by Mr. McGuire to the Premier Extension Syndicate of Ottawa, of which the late "Foghorn" Macdonald, M.E. was an active associate. That syndicate organized the Premier Extension Gold Mining Co. Ltd., with a capitalization of \$4,000,000 in \$5.00 shares with a view to developing the property. It had a first class board of directors, consisting of leading business men of New York City and Canada. On the board were Hon. H. H. Stevens, M.P. for Vancouver, and Hon. E. Bristol, K.C. M.P. of Ottawa.

LONDON INTEREST

The success of the Premier Mine, and the spectacular boom in shares of B.C. Silver following its organization to take up holdings immediately north and south of the Premier, started a sudden interest in London in mining properties at Portland Canal. An English engineer bonded for the Latilla interests the Daly Alaska, Forty-nine and others at high prices. The New York directors of Premier Extension conceived the idea of sending one of their number to London to dispose of Premier Extension for a large price. J. M. Iles, a leading mining engineer of London, and the writer were retained to make a joint examination and report. After a careful examination and survey of the property, including the tracing of the shear-zones and dykes northwesterly, through the road and pipe-line cuts and canyons of the East and Main forks of Cascade Creek, on to the Woodbine-Vancouver Groups, they came to the conclusion that these properties, with their similar geological characteristics, and the mineralization found on them fully warranted development with the possibility of proving up ore-bodies of commercial value; and they so reported.

Meantime the temporary excitement had died down; and in any case experienced mining men in London knew that success is not attained by the payment of large sums for undeveloped prospects; but by development of ore in sufficient quantity in the first place, and payment for it after its existence has been placed beyond doubt. The plans of the New York directors for a get-rich-quick scoop failed. Trouble entered between the Ottawa and New York interests. Litigation resulted, and the property was tied up from development for two years.

NEW DEVELOPMENT

When the title was again cleared the property was examined by a number of mining engineers, representing leading companies, who all expressed favorable opinions concerning it. Meantime the owning companies carried on development in a small way. The construction of the wagon road to the Indian Mine two years ago opened out the mineral zone in a striking manner and disclosed valuable ore in the Red Bluff. This ore was followed down by open cuts to a considerable distance below the elevation of the road. Other open cuts were made up the Red Bluff and back along the strike for a distance of 750 feet, ore being found in all of them, and some of it very rich. Then a new drift was opened above the road, and run for a distance of 25 feet. This work developed the best ore found on this part of the property. From it 60 tons were piled on the dump and attracted the attention of all mining men who saw the showing.

LABYRINTH OF MINERAL

The Red Bluff vein strikes northeast and southwest. It is approximately parallel to the main veins of Premier and B.C. Silver. As such it is probably contemporaneous geologically with these veins and subject to similar influences to which the mineralization is attributable, especially where associated with the shear-zones and dykes traceable northwesterly from these properties. Northwest of the Red Bluff is another vein paralleling which is of large dimensions, but has not yet been cross-cut to its full width. This vein is well mineralized with silver, lead and zinc, and has given high assays from picked ore. On development it is prob-

able conditions will be similar to those at the Red Bluff.

Toward the northeast end of the property is a large vein in which open cuts show proportionately equal values in gold and silver. It looks very promising. Many smaller veins are to be found on the property associated with quartz-feldspar dykes and shear-zones, but no development has been done on them. Where broken into they show sulphides of promising appearance. On the southwest end of the property there is a contact between slate and gneiss where conditions appear favorable for development of ore of economic value. Rich ore occurs in a large vein in that locality on which no development whatever had been done.

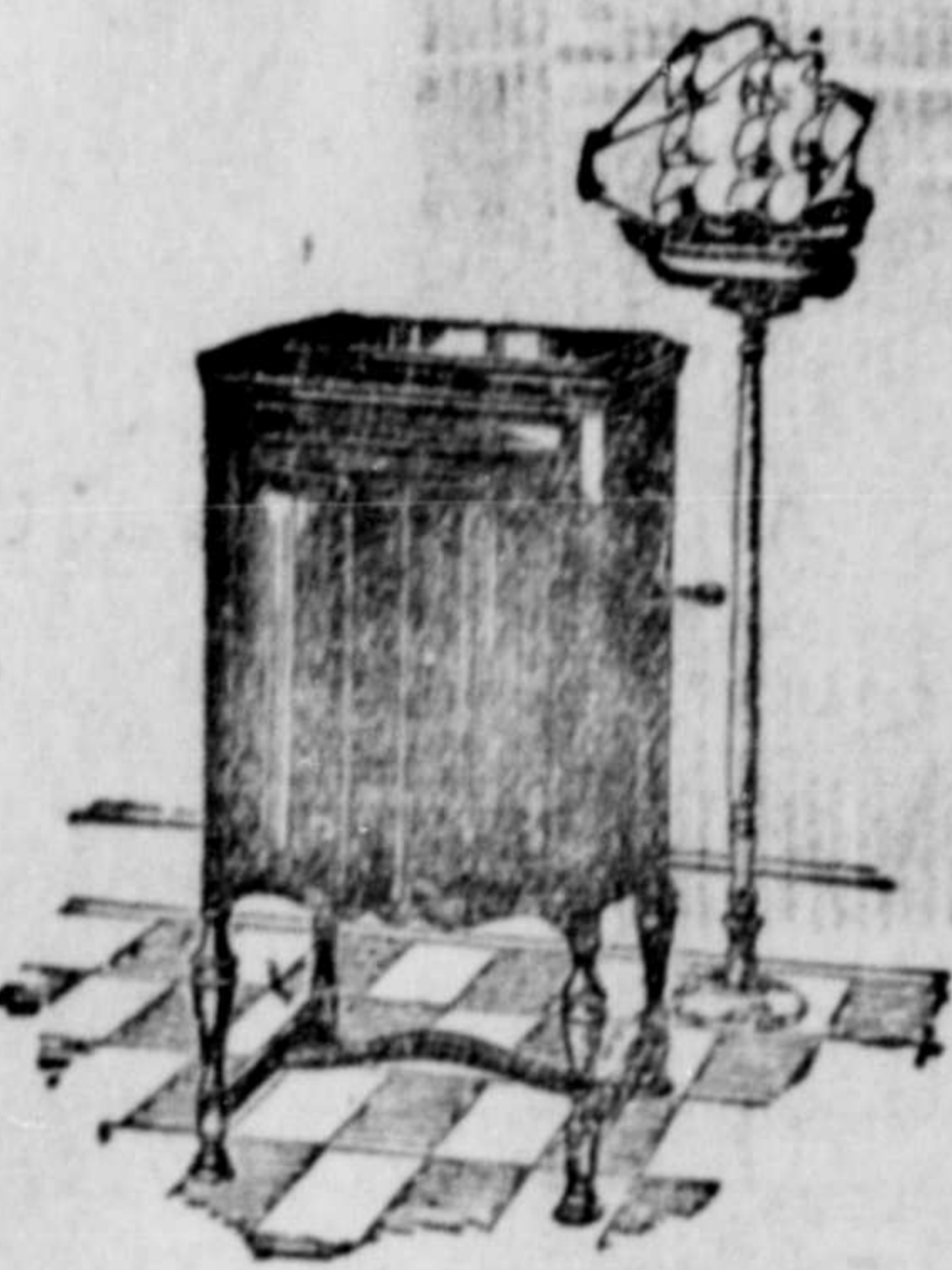

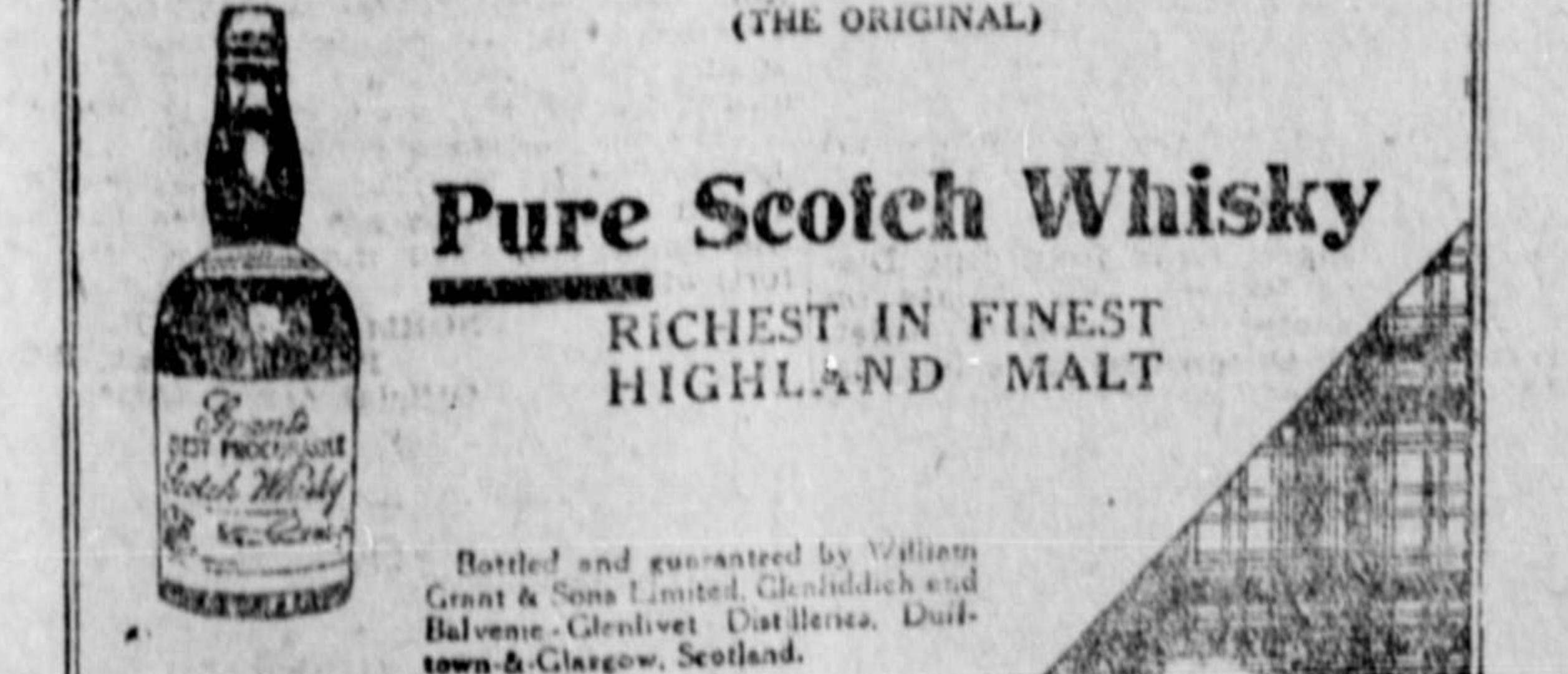

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FUTURE LINERS MOTOR DRIVEN?

IS QUITE WITHIN BOUNDS OF POSSIBILITY DECLARES HEAD OF ROYAL MAIL PACKET CO.

LONDON, Dec. 29.—It is within the bounds of possibility that mammoth Atlantic liners of the future may be propelled by motor engines. This statement was made here today by Lord Kylsant, chairman of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, who by a recent merger of that concern with the White Star, became the world's greatest shipping magnate.

Speaking before the Institute of Marine Engineers, where he is president, Lord Kylsant said he believed it was already a proved fact that, for most trades and for almost every class of vessel up to the largest ocean-going passenger ships, the motor engine was not only suitable already, but more economical to work than any other sort of machinery. He capped this remark with the prophecy that motor engines may some day supersede steam even in the hugest ocean craft.

NO MORE DOUBTS "Until comparatively recently doubts on the reliability of motor ships existed," said Lord Kylsant. "These doubts were due partly to some minor failure arising from faults in design which have been successfully eliminated, and possibly to a larger extent to difficulty in the earlier stages of always obtaining a staff of marine engineers familiar with Diesel engines. The experience of the shipowners who have operated motor vessels is, however, that they are both reliable and dependable. Contrary to expectation they compare favorably with steamships in the matter of vibration, and since no smoke is given off the motor engine enables the vessel to be maintained in a better state of cleanliness." He declared furthermore that, owing to the motor engine occupying less room than the steam engine, especially in the faster vessels, and to the enormous reduction in bunker capacity, the motor vessel can carry a larger cargo than a steamer of the same dimensions and speed, and that experience likewise shows there can be a big saving in actual running costs.

In ships of the same size and speed, he continued, motor engines consume a ton of oil against four or five tons of coal required by reciprocating steam engines, and normally in case of passenger vessels one ton of oil costs about two and a half times as much as one ton of coal. In cases where speed is all important, he told his audience, the ratio of aggregate cost of higher speeds is less in motor vessels than steamers, and while in the coal-burning ship, increased speed means a bigger stake-hole for fuel, there is no such increase in the oil-driven vessels.

ADVANTAGE OF STEAM There is still something to be said for steam, continued Lord Kylsant—for instance, the first cost of the motor engine at present is still somewhat higher than the steam engine, with the possible exception of the latest high-pressure turbine, but those who have tried both types are satisfied that the additional capital outlay is more than offset by the results. The difference of cost is great in engines of smaller power, he said, but the success of the double-acting diesel engine is reducing the difference so greatly that in higher power engines it may disappear entirely. Moreover, more extensive application of standardization methods to motor-ship construction may solve the problem of the greater initial cost.

BIG RUSH INTO RED LAKE LOOKED FOR NEXT SPRING WINNIPEG, Dec. 29.—A big rush of prospectors and mining men into the Red Lake area with the New Year, is anticipated by G. D. Kenneally, engaged in the transportation business at Hudson, Ontario. The rush, he says, will centre in the Woman Lake and Narrow Lake districts, where spectacular discoveries of free gold are reported to have been made. There are only about 125 men left in the entire district at present, and communication with the outside world can be made only by dog team. Owing to the deep snow along the 124-mile run from Hudson to Red Lake, the road is still unsafe for horses. Only about four dog teams have "mashed" in since freeze-up. The Hollinger interests are building a team road from Hudson to Woman Lake, a distance of nearly 140 miles. Mr. Kenneally said, to take in diamond drills and other development equipment. B.C. MEETING ZINC SHORTAGE

STOCKS LOW AND PRICES RISING WITH GENERAL DECLINE IN PRODUCTION

British Columbia is being called upon to meet the world shortage of zinc.

The British coal strike and several other economic factors have resulted in a general decline of zinc production in almost every region where the mineral is found with the exception of British Columbia. This province, comparatively unaffected by the disorganization of industry felt in other parts of the world as a result of the prolonged strike, has taken its cue from the drop in production elsewhere and has rolled up a new record for itself.

Stocks of zinc, however, are generally low everywhere and prices have been rising steadily. Output of zinc in British Columbia has advanced accordingly and the value of the output this year will be approximately \$9,000,000. Most of the zinc is being taken out of the Sullivan mine, in the Kootenay, where until a few years ago the ores were regarded as so complex that successful smelting was not attempted.

WHEAT STILL FLOWS THROUGH UNITED STATES

VOLUME OF CANADIAN GRAIN SENT THROUGH FOREIGN ROUTE UNDIMINISHED IN VOLUME

OTTAWA, Dec. 29.—The flow of Canadian wheat through United States transportation channels continues undiminished in volume. Milton Campbell, Progressive M.P. for Mackenzie, already has announced that he will renew the fight in Parliament to have the Crow's Nest Pass rates on grain and flour extended to the National Transcontinental Railway. Mr. Campbell will receive the solid support of all three Western Progressive groups, and it is learned an effort will be made to enlist the support of Conservatives and Liberals from the Maritime Provinces, as well as Liberals from Quebec. Maritime Conservatives will be given every opportunity to help, as it is the present intention of the Progressives to invite them to a round table conference to discuss the Campbell resolution.

The other favoring factor is in regard to Quebec. The City of Quebec has had an application before the Railway Commission for the extension of the Crow's Nest Pass scale of rates to the Transcontinental since last February. The Railway Commission has deferred judgment until the general equalization case is completed, which means a delay of many months. The City of Quebec has protested against this decision, without success. It is now reported that the Quebec City interests will abandon hope of relief from the Railway Commission and will turn to Parliament as a last resort.

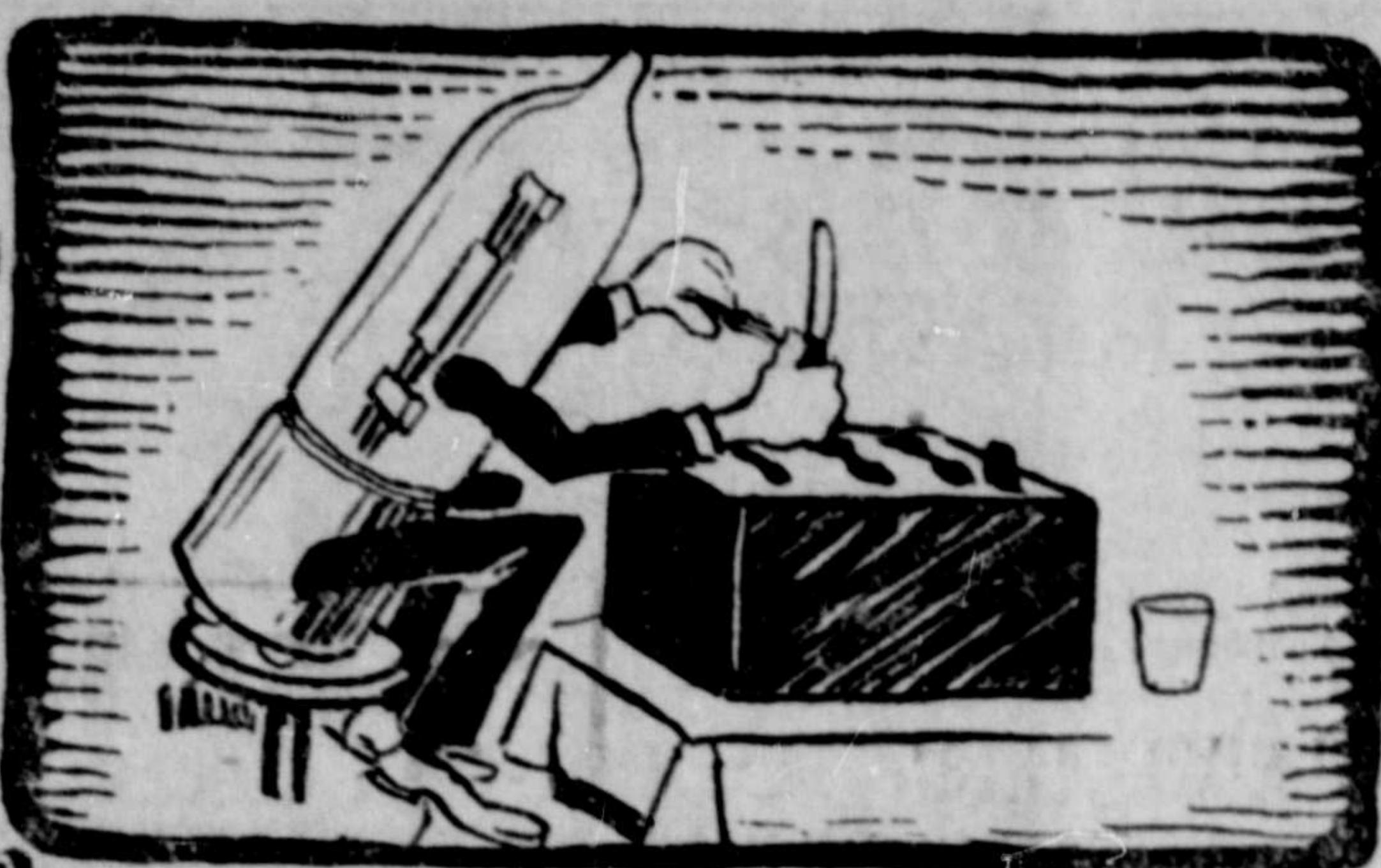

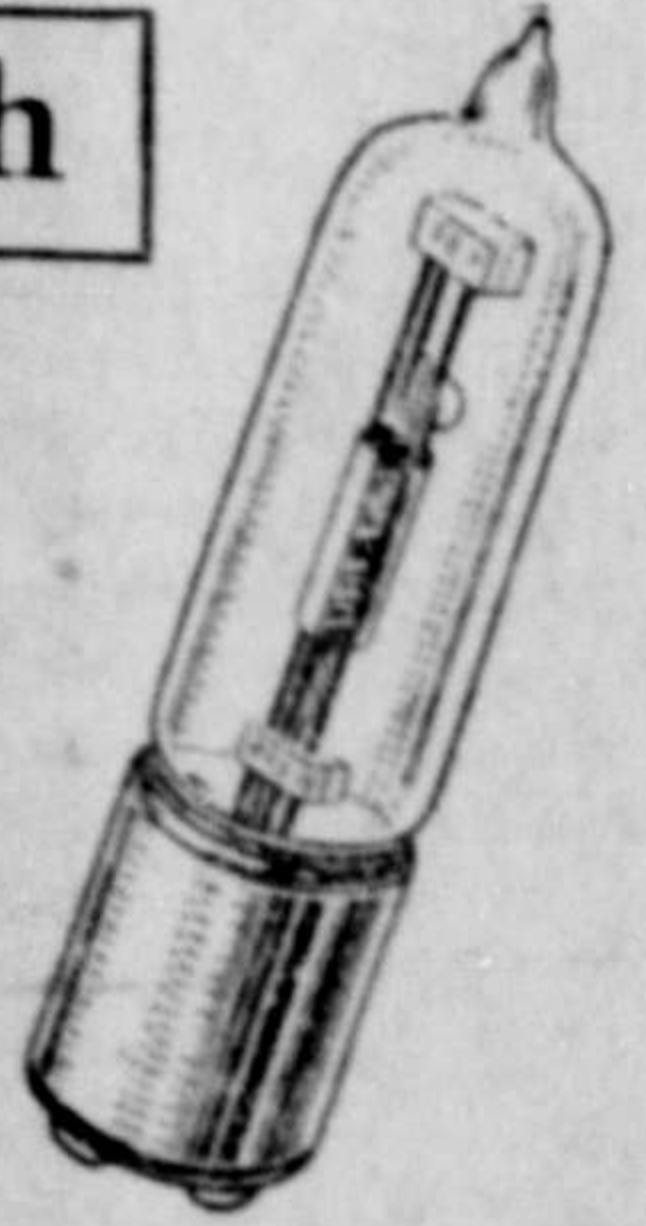

CIRCULATION OF FOREIGN PAPERS

ONE OUT OF EVERY SIX PERSONS IN NEW YORK READS PERIODICAL NOT WRITTEN IN ENGLISH

NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—The combined circulation of the forty foreign language newspapers published in New York indicates that one out of every six persons in this city reads a newspaper printed in a foreign language. With one out of three persons in New York Jewish, according to the latest estimates, the seven Jewish dailies alone reach more than half the foreign press clientele in every issue.

Forty foreign language dailies and a total of 193 foreign publications comes from the city's presses every month.

The Italians have 34 publications of their own; the Jewish organs run second with 27.

They print, examination shows, what their "public wants," a public largely of first generation immigrants interested in adaptation to a new environment.

Much, thus, is less sensational than informative. The tone of most of his papers is highly conservative, even the tabloids being concerned largely with travel, popular science and music.

Even the humor retains its old world flavor and the single joke-illustration predominates over the "strip." When the cross-word puzzles swept the country, many foreign language editors used them freely to help acquaint the immigrant with the new language.

Despite the reduction of immigration, editors say, they can't teach the immigrant in a language he doesn't understand and they do not expect for many years any great decline in the foreign language press.

"Instinctively," they say, "the foreigners trust the mother language and respond more readily to information about the new country that comes through their own papers."
