MIKADO DIES CHRISTMAS DAY MORN WELL KNOWN VANCOUVER AUTO DEALER IS MURDERED

Emperor Yoshihito Succumbs in Tokyo After Long Illness

TOKIO, December 25.—Emperor Yoshihito died at 1.25 Christmas morning of pneumonia. He had been critically ill for several weeks and the end was expected. Prince Hirohito, who became Regent in 1921, succeeds to the throne, becoming Japan's hundred and twenty-fourth Emperor.

Yoshihito (Harunomia), the late Emperor of Japan, was born at Kyoto on August 31, 1879. He succeeded his father, Emperor Mutsuhito, to the throne on July 30, 1912. On May 10, 1900, he was married to Princess Sadako, born June 25, daughter of Prince Kujo.

KIFUKU MARU LEAVES TODAY

ANOTHER GRAIN VESSEL, HAVING
LOADED HERE, SAILS FOR UNITED
KINGDOM OR CONTINENT

TAIYO MARU AT DOCK

Having delayed her departure scheduled for yesterday on account of the stormy weather, the "K" line freighter, Kifuku Maru, laden with 7,062 tons of grain which she took on at the Wheat Pool's local elevator, cleared at 8 o'clock this morning for the United Kingdom or continent via Panama Canal. The vessel was taken out to Triple Island by Capt. Larry Thomson, local pilot of the Federal Pilots of British Columbia.

The Ocean Transport Co.'s freighter, Taiyo Maru, which arrived Wednesday night from the Orient, moved into the dry dock this morning. This vessel will have an inspection made following a recent stranding before she starts lining.

BIG DISTILLERY DEAL IS CLOSED

GOODERHAM & WORTS HAS PURCHASED HIRAM WALKER PLANT
AT WALKERVILLE, ONTARIO

TORONTO, Dec. 24.—The Telegram says: "At eleven o'clock Wednesday night, H. C. Hatch, president of Gooderham & Worts Distillery, Toronto, signed papers by which the Hiram Walker distillery at Walkerville was acquired for \$15,000,000. There will be no merger of the two distilleries but they will be operated in conjunction with each other and their combined output will be more than any other Canadian distillery. Eleven millions of the purchase price has been financed and the remaining four million has been underwritten by a New York house and the stock will be offered for public sale early in the New Year. It is understood that the capital of the Walker distillery will contain ten millions of common stock. By this deal, the ownership of the distillery is transferred from United States to Canada."

BOARD TO SET GRAIN STANDARD

CALGARY, Dec. 24.—Appointment of a separate board to set the standard for Alberta wheat shipped through Pacific Coast ports was recommended at a meeting of the Calgary local of the United Farmers held here last night. The recommendation will come before the U.F.A. convention in Edmonton.

REVOLT RISING MEXICO AGAIN

UNITED STATES ADMIRAL HAS
LED FORCE OF BLUE JACKETS


WASHINGTON, Dec. 24.—The revolutionary situation in Nicaragua is becoming increasingly serious. Apparently, Rear Admiral Latimer, in command of the American special service squadron in Latin-American waters, found it advisable to land a force of Blue Jackets at Rio Grande Bar to proceed with himself to Puerto Cabello, the chief centre of revolutionary movements. Meanwhile, Adolfo Diaz, Conservative president, recognized by the United States, is being opposed by Liberal revolutionaries headed by former vice-president Sacaia, recognized as president by Mexico. Diaz renewed an appeal for American intervention.

MANAGUA, Dec. 24.—Fifty of the government troops were massacred at Elpuente when they fell into an ambush of the Liberal forces, it is announced.

CHAMBER OF MINES HAS NEW ASSISTANT SECRETARY, ANNOUNCED

VANCOUVER, Dec. 24.—J. C. Kirk, an experienced geologist and formerly in charge of the Chinese immigration office, has been appointed assistant secretary of the B.C. Chamber of Mines in succession to F. J. Fraser who left today for Ottawa where he has accepted a position with the Geological Survey of Canada.

Policemen and Officials Are Apprehended in War on Liquor Conspirators

SEATTLE, December 24.—The number of arrests in the alleged gigantic liquor conspiracy case in northwest Washington now approaches thirty names. Eleven Seattle policemen, a former prohibition agent, county prosecutor, two deputy sheriffs and former state senator are on the list of those apprehended. Arrests are being made on indictments returned by the Federal Grand Jury in which more than one hundred persons are named.

"We are closer to the throne of official corruption than we have ever been before," declared United States Attorney Revelle, "and I am afraid that we are as close as we will ever get."

POSTCARD RATE MAY DROP TO ONE CENT

Canada May Follow Example of States
It is Said in Ottawa

OTTAWA, Dec. 24.—It is believed here that if the United States Senate adopts the measure restoring one cent postage for private postcards, Postmaster General Veniot will follow suit for Canada. At present postcards cost as much in the confines of one postal centre as drop letters. It is thought, however, that the two-cent rate will be maintained, for some time at least, on picture postals, the reduction only applying to "strictly" business cards.

Thirty Persons Killed When Crack Florida Trains Crash Into Each Other in Georgia

ROCKMART, Georgia, December 24.—At least thirty persons are thought to have been killed in a collision last night between the Royal Palms and Ponce de Leon, crack Southern Railway passenger trains. Early this morning, thirteen bodies had been already recovered. The injured number sixty-five.

All those killed were on the Ponce de Leon, northbound from Miami, which collided head on with the southbound train as the latter was waiting on a siding for it to pass. Most of the dead were in the dining car and the day coach immediately behind it.

J. E. McIntyre Killed in Room at Angelus Hotel with Revolver

Detectives searching for wife from whom deceased was separated—ten year old son made gruesome discovery

VANCOUVER, December 24.—Summoned to the Angelus Hotel late yesterday afternoon, police found the body of J. E. McIntyre, 45, well known local auto dealer and salesman, lying on the floor of his room with three bullet wounds in his body. McIntyre, according to the police, was the victim of a murder and detectives are searching for his wife who is believed to have been the last person to see him alive, a hotel clerk having reported that she went in the room early in the afternoon.

McIntyre and his wife had been living apart for some time and the gruesome discovery of his dead body was made by his nine-year old son who was sent to the room to get a suitcase.

First police reports said that it was a case of suicide but medical examination revealed the three bullet wounds and, on a dresser nearby, was found an automatic pistol with one cartridge in the barrel and the magazine empty.

BIG INCREASE IN CUSTOM'S REVENUE

Figures For November and Also For
Year Reported Away up by Department

OTTAWA, Dec. 24.—Customs collections showed a marked gain in the month of November over the same month last year. Last month \$13,600,000 was collected on dutiable imports while in November, 1925, \$11,700,000 was collected. In the eight months ended November 30, \$105,000,000 was collected by the customs department while in the same period last year \$95,000,000 was taken in the revenues.

The grand total of Canadian trade for November was \$241,000,000 while it was, in the same month last year \$215,000,000.

INVESTIGATION OF FRUIT MARKETING ASKED BY SHIPPERS

KELOWNA, Dec. 24.—Independent shippers in the Okanagan Valley at a public meeting last night decided to petition the provincial government for a commission of three to investigate all the circumstances connected with the marketing of fruit with particular attention to the co-operative movement.

PIONEER ALASKA HOTEL MAN DEAD IN WALLA WALLA

WALLA, WALLA, Washington, Dec. 24.—J. W. Wilson, who built the Hotel St. Michael in Alaska twenty-nine years ago and who later operated the Hotel Dawson, remaining in the north eight years, died here today after an illness of two months. He was 72 years of age.

LOGGER DIES

From Injuries While on Way to Powell River Hospital
POWELL RIVER, Dec. 24.—Struck by a falling tree at a Theodosia Arm logging camp, Hugo Rantatala, aged 28, sustained injuries which resulted in his death a few hours later while being brought to the Powell River Hospital.

BIRTH CONTROL CAUSING SPLIT

OLD COUNTRY SOCIALISTS DIVIDED
AS TO WHETHER OR NOT IT
SHOULD FORM PART OF
PLATFORM

LONDON, Dec. 24.—The Socialist Party in England is threatened with a split over birth control. Proponents of the idea want an understanding that in a future general election, the Socialist Party will adopt birth control teaching as a part of its platform. They say that the advice which is open to any married woman who has the money to pay her private physician should be given the poor woman free of charge.

The executives of the Party, however, reported that birth control was a matter for individual decision and could not be made a party cry. The report, however, was referred back for further consideration.

OTTAWA, Dec. 24.—Priceless Canadian historical relics and jewellery were stolen when thieves ransacked the residence here of the late Sir Joseph Pope, former under secretary of internal affairs, during the absence of Lady Pope who is spending the Christmas holidays in Quebec. The monetary value of the articles taken is estimated at about \$2,000.

PRINCE RUPERT PROVING ITSELF.

Prince Rupert is proving itself in all ways a convenient and advantageous grain port. To the strategic position of the place, not only for Oriental but European shipping, has been added a fine grain handling facility which, through two months of successful use, both as a receiver and despatcher, has now proven itself, as it was at first declared, to be one of the finest plants of its kind on the continent. The proof of the pudding has been in the eating and, indeed, at this time when Christmas puddings are so much talked of, we may say that this one has proven to be a splendid dish for Prince Rupert which for many years wanted a taste but up to recently did not have the opportunity of having it.

Now that one elevator here has been successfully and economically established, Prince Rupert may look for more. The place has been much in the public eye since its inauguration as a grain outlet and many interests are known to be in close touch with developments and experiments here. It may be believed that greater things are in store along this line and there are many who think, and probably rightly, that there will be an immediate materialization of some of them.

NEW LEADER'S FIRST ATTEMPT.

The first major speech of Hon. Hugh Guthrie on the floor of the Canadian House of Commons as leader of His Majesty's Opposition did not leave a favorable impression in the country. A man must be much more clever than Mr. Guthrie to successfully adversely criticize the report from the Imperial Conference because the quality of the report makes that a difficult thing to do. Mr. Guthrie impressed his listeners as a man trying to do his duty as he saw it. If he conceives his duty as Opposition leader to be petty criticism of everything at all times then the Conservative party is certainly no better, and probably worse, off than it was some months ago.

LONG TRAIL OF SCANDAL.

Washington is probing a political scandal arising from transactions of some years ago in New Brunswick politics, says the Toronto Globe. The election of Senator A. R. Gould of Maine is being contested owing to charges of payments by him, as President of the St. John & Quebec Railway, in 1912, to Hon. J. K. Fleming, then Premier of New Brunswick, to secure financial favors in connection with the railway agreement.

In 1914 a Royal Commission reported that Fleming had been guilty of compelling a contractor to pay him money for campaign purposes in order to get a second contract after one contract had been completed. At a subsequent inquiry in 1917 Mr. Gould admitted, with reluctance, that he had agreed to pay Fleming \$100,000, that he had, in fact, paid the Premier personally more than \$75,000, and the balance at his direction.

The Senate at Washington is now testing out Mr. Gould's fitness to be a member, but is handicapped by inability to compel witnesses to come from Canada to testify. "It is evident," says The New York Nation, "that we have here a first-class scandal which should be investigated by the authorities in Canada as well as by the Senate of the United States."

Washington does well to take cognizance of the matter. The only place where indifference reigns is in the ranks of the Conservative party, which elected Mr. Fleming to the House of Commons in 1925 and again in 1926, despite public outcry, and in the House of Commons itself, which appears not to consider Mr. Fleming's membership any tarnish on its reputation.



GERMAN ENVOY BREAKING ICE

DR. OTTO WIEDELDITZ AND WIFE ARE OVERCOMING PREJUDICE AT WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—Winning back a place in the sun for Germany on the social map of Washington is one of the many problems which nowadays besets every German ambassador and his wife.

The late Dr. Otto Wiedfeldt, Germany's first ambassador after the conclusion of peace, frankly admitted that to him had been assigned the role of "ice-breaker" politically and socially, and

in the latter part he found the going particularly rough at times.

But the present ambassador, Baron Ago von Maltzan and his wife find Washington society cleared of much of the wartime and post war debris, and what remains is rapidly giving way before the social graces and tactful procedure of what is called "the new German embassy crowd."

The Maltzans have scored decisively in the manner in which they have won a place in the capital's social life. The Baroness, who comes from a well known Westphalian industrialist family, is no stranger to diplomatic social life and although a comparative newcomer to Washington she has quickly taken her place among the official hostesses of the capital.

Baron von Maltzan has proven himself

a good mixer by his democratic manner and his extended experience in the German foreign service. He is fond of riding, tennis and golf and begins his official day early in order to be able to spend his afternoons outdoors. He is a member of the Chevy Chase and Congressional country clubs.

IS BUSINESS MAN

That the Baron also continues to enjoy the complete confidence of his home government was demonstrated when Dr. Stresemann, the German foreign minister, defended him in the Reichstag against attacks because the Baron displayed the German colors on the embassy building here last armistice day.

Dr. Wiedfeldt was not a "service man," and it required considerable persuasion on the part of the German foreign office to induce him to exchange his post as directing head of the Krupp corporation for the job of initiating the resumption of diplomatic relations with the United States in Washington. He referred good naturedly to his social isolation in the capital, and did not weary of comforting his immediate staff whose members not infrequently found themselves confronted by a chilly aloofness in their social rounds.

KANSAS WOMAN BEAT HUSBAND IN CONTEST FOR SHERIFF'S POST

GREENSBURG, Kan., Dec. 24.—The next sheriff of Kiowa County will be a woman. Her husband will be the deputy.

Mrs. Frank Chase, the mother of four children, won the office which her husband has held for the last four years. Although the law disqualifies the present sheriff from holding the office more than four years consecutively, he may accept appointment as the deputy.

FORMER TERRACE GIRL IS MARRIED

Miss Norma Mildred Kenney Became Bride of W. R. Smith at Victoria

The marriage of Miss Norma Mildred Kenney to Wm. Rodolph Smith took place in Victoria on Tuesday evening, December 21, at "Birchwood," the home of the bride's parents, Capt. and Mrs. D. V. Kenney, Craigflower Road, in the presence of about fifty guests.

Miss Kenney was well known in Terrace, having worked in the office of George Little for a year some years ago and visited at the homes of her brothers there last fall. The groom is a Vancouver broker.

After the ceremony the couple left for Vancouver where they will reside.

WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Scientist's observations on halibut fishing—
herring reduction to be engaged in by
Bushby—new halibut boats at
Seattle

The situation on the halibut banks south of Icy Straits is serious, writes Wm. F. Thompson, Director of Investigations, International Fisheries Commission, in the Pacific Fisherman. This is particularly true of the banks in Hecate Straits, Dixon's Entrance and off Goose Island. That the decline previous to 1914 has continued is not doubted by those fishermen who have followed events carefully. The catch per skate of gear was 400 or 500 pounds to a set in 1902, was 143 pounds in 1914, during 1926 was below 45 pounds. The fall, it will be noticed, was not very different in rapidity in the two periods, 143 pounds being one-third of 429 and 45 pounds being slightly less than one-third of 143.

But the past two years have seen somewhat of a revival of fishing on southern banks by larger vessels landing fish in southern ports. The revival is commonly ascribed to the use of small hooks. The fish caught seem unduly small in size, and the percentage of small chickens very high, so that the agitation for prohibition of use of this small gear has become very strong. In consequence, the International Fisheries Commission, during its operation of the Scandia the past summer, tried these hooks thoroughly.

The small hooks, No. 6284, were put on ten pound gangings, and the skates thus rigged were run alternately in the same strings with skates rigged with large hooks, No. 6283, on sixteen-pound gangings. All gear was nine feet between hooks, which were 210 to the skate. Every fish taken inboard was measured, and banks with medium fish as well as banks with small were tried. The results are worthy of remark, and are based upon a great deal of experiment.

Greatly to the surprise of the investigators, the sizes taken by the small hooks were not greatly different from those taken by the large. This held for all sets of gear made during the summer of 1926. The fact was clear, that fish were caught regardless of the size of hooks, lines or bait. If a school of small fish was encountered, that size was taken by both large and small hooks. If large fish were met, both hooks took that size. It seems necessary for us to conclude that the small hooks, although taking very slightly smaller fish, were not what might be termed unduly destructive because of the sizes they took. The data

WORKING OFF YAKUTAT

The Skandia arrived at Prince Rupert November 30, from her first trip of the season, having left Seattle early in the month and worked on the Yakutat banks since then. Nine hundred halibut were tagged on the trip, the fish totaling 60,000 lbs., too badly hooked for tagging were brought aboard, examined for scientific data, and brought to Prince Rupert in ice. She left again for the banks immediately after discharging.

The plankton net has been used in an effort to take halibut spawn, but spawning has not yet advanced far enough to produce results of value in this line.

Preparations are being made by the Rupert Marine Products Ltd. to inaugurate a new departure at the Tucks Inlet plant. In line with his progressive policy, the energetic head of the concern, George G. Bushby, will emulate the example of Alaska interests which have been for several years in the herring reduction business. Arrangements are now being made to manufacture herring oil and fertilizer at the local establishment and, as soon as the fish appear, probably next month, two seiners, which are to be engaged, will start catching them and the boats of the R.M.P. fleet will do the packing. This will permit of operations being carried on during months when there is not the usual supply of halibut and salmon offal. There seems no reason why this line should not be as successfully pursued here as it is in Alaska.

MAD RUSH FOR MINING CLAIMS

DEAL ON TAYLOR PROPERTY HAS
CAUSED COMPETITION FOR
GROUND IN THAT VICINITY

Completion of the deal for the Taylor
property at Topley brought about a re-
newed interest in that area and a wild
scramble for claims, and this in turn
has brought about a modern map of
that mining field that would do credit
to a dilettante design as conceived by
a demented futurist says the Interior
News.

For the past six weeks the local re-
cording office has had a large part of
its work recording claims staked in the
region of Taylor strike, and since the
bonding of Taylor's property to the
Standard Silver-Lead Co., this rush for
claims has been doubled up with con-
