OLD COUNTRY STRIKERS EXPECTED TO BE BACK TOMORROW EXCEPT MINERS

LONDON, May 14.—The British industrial crisis began to rapidly today. The railwaymen, who had remained out, withstanding the official termination of the general strike, had an agreement with the companies at noon today and will be resumed as soon as possible with the expectation of normalcy will be reached by tomorrow.

Premier Baldwin told Parliament today that he had framed proposals for the settlement of the miners' strike and that these had been placed in the hands of both the men and their employers immediately so that they can consider them over the week end. The indications, he said, were brighter for agreement. The Trades Union Congress officials said there was a marked easing of tenseness in the situation throughout the country. Employers were being increasingly inclined to discuss a reasonable basis for the resumption of work.

TORONTO NOW IS AFTER ELEVATOR

TORONTO, May 14.—The Harbor Board of this port plans to take up with the Dominion Government at the earliest possible moment the matter of federal assistance for an elevator.

When Commissioner Hogg was president of the Board of Trade a deputation went to Ottawa and urged the construction of a large grain elevator for the port but no money was voted for the project. The application is to be renewed with the idea of having the Government construct one at an early date.

Amundsen's Airship Norge Has Failed to Report and Fears Are Expressed for Safety of Party

NOME, May 14.—The dawn of the third day since the dirigible Norge left King's Bay to fly across the Pole to Nome saw the world anxiously awaiting word from her naval radio station at Hinchinbrook Island, near Cordova. It was reported to the Associated Press early this morning that they had picked up a mysterious message which said the Norge passed Point Jarrow at noon yesterday, Eastern standard time. The distance from Barrow to Nome is 550 miles, only an eleven hour voyage for the dirigible.

RUTH COMING BACK TO FORM

By Making Two Homers Yesterday He Overtakes His Record of Five Years Ago

NEW YORK, May 14.—Babe Ruth is abreast of his terrific home run pace of 1921 when he established a record of 59 for the season. By clouting the ball into the right field bleachers twice yesterday in a game against Cleveland for the ninth and tenth homers he duplicated the total he had at the same date five years ago.

Both the major leagues were the scene of terrific batting yesterday, nineteen doubles, eleven triples, and five home runs being chalked up in eight games.

Detroit and Boston used eight pitchers in their efforts to stop the batting run. Philadelphia's winning streak of nine games was stopped by Chicago.

Capital of Poland in Throes of Revolution

Government claims majority of troops loyal and revolt will be crushed; other reports tell different story

PARIS, May 14.—Eighteen persons are dead and eighteen wounded as a result of street fighting during the past 48 hours in Warsaw, a communication from the Polish government to the embassy here states. Other advices say that complete confusion prevails in Warsaw and that unless mediation succeeds, civil war is inevitable.

The government claims that the majority of the troops are loyal to them and counts upon crushing the revolt and establishing order quickly.

BERLIN, May 14.—Government air forces are reported to have bombed the revolutionary headquarters of Marshal Pilsudski in Warsaw and it is estimated that 150 persons have been killed in the strife thus far. Foreigners are fleeing from the country, according to advices reaching here.

Reports state that Marshal Pilsudski had captured Belvedere Palace after a terrific battle and that several cabinet ministers were taken prisoners and that the whole city is in the hands of the revolting troops.

Peace Restored
LONDON, May 14.—The Polish Legation received a telegram today at noon from Warsaw saying peace and order had been restored there.

SEVENTY-ONE TONS OF HALIBUT SOLD AT EXCHANGE TODAY

Ten halibut schooners arrived from the banks this morning with a total of 143,000 pounds of fish for sale on the local Exchange. Four American boats had 97,000 pounds and six Canadians, 46,000 pounds. MINERS SENT JAIL ENGLAND

Sixty-eight Implicated in Interfering With Road Transports and One Fined

DOUGCASTER, Eng., May 14.—Sixty-eight miners were sentenced to three months' hard labor for breach of emergency regulations during the general strike by interfering with road transports. The leader in addition was fined £20 or two months' extra penalty.

LIVERPOOL, May 14.—Complete industrial chaos reigned among the Mersey docks yesterday when 50,000 volunteer workers were sent home on the announcement being made that the strike was over, and the failure of the regular workers to report.

Five Years Longer For Us All To Live.

For some years statisticians have been telling us that the average length of the human life was doubled during the nineteenth century. It is difficult to realize that only a century ago the average life was less than thirty years. Now comes the further news that the average span of life in the United States and Canada has been lengthened by five years since 1900. So quietly and effectively have the forces of prevention been carrying on their successful warfare against disease and death, that it is only after statistical analysis that we appreciate the scope of their campaign, and the extent of their victory. It may be well to explain that a large proportion of the more recent increases in the average length of human life are due to decreases in infant mortality.

The spread of vaccination did away with smallpox, the insurance men say. Sterilization made possible modern surgery, pure milk and water prevented typhoid, and fresh air has done much to conquer tuberculosis. Such have been man's most outstanding achievements in dealing with the invisible enemies first discovered by Pasteur. Recent achievements have been due to better organization; the effective work of the public health nurse, the establishment of clinics and the improved standards of the medical profession have all had their part in making the treatment of disease more intelligent and scientific.

Insurance Companies And Medical Science.

In the past the physician had to depend to a great extent upon his own experience. If a patient recovered under a particular treatment, he was apt to give credit for the recovery to the treatment and forgot the number who failed to recover under the same methods. Nothing in the physician's training gave him any inkling of the value of statistical methods in relation to his own work and it was not surprising that he was somewhat skeptical concerning the possibility of such methods throwing light upon the methods he should use in the treatment of the patient. His interest was in the particular patient rather than in the statistics of comparative methods.

Under such circumstances the attitude taken by the insurance company represented a new element in the situation. It was to their interest to decrease death rates and they were therefore interested in the health of the community as a whole rather than in the welfare of the particular individual. Such interest quickly centred attention upon communities and occupations where conditions were unsatisfactory. Community health became a real problem when it became a matter of financial moment to prolong life.

It was only a step further in the same direction to note the success or failure of particular methods of treating disease. Naturally those methods which secured most general success were brought into greater prominence owing to this same viewpoint.

Prevention Better Than Cure.

Perhaps the most satisfactory fact in the whole situation is that it is not treatment of disease but rather prevention of disease which has made the greatest progress in recent years. The problem of days lost to industry was brought to prominence with the introduction of employee health insurance plans. As soon as interest began to centre on the fact that there was a substantial annual economic loss due to absenteeism, companies began to experiment with furnishing medical advice and nursing. In many cases, the results obtained were so encouraging that the company concluded that such work paid for itself. Only a step beyond this was necessary for whole communities to realize that the illness and deaths of individuals were an expensive waste of life to the community. All of these types of work have had cumulative results upon North American death rates, and recent statistics indicate that the American expectation of life is being steadily increased.

ROTARY HEARS NEW GOVERNOR

J. H. Beatty of Victoria Talks to Local Club on Work of Organization and Installs Officers

Emphasizing the fact that it was not the aim and object of Rotary to try and save the world but rather by means of fellowship, education, tolerance and understanding to extend their influence and improve themselves, J. H. Beatty, district governor, non-elect for this Rotary district, yesterday addressed the members of the club at their luncheon and installed the new officers. He emphasized that fellowship was the great thing for which they stood and added to it was the idea that he profited most who served best.

Mr. Beatty spoke of the wonderful progress Rotary had made and of its future possibilities. This district had wonderful possibilities for establishing good relations between this part of United States and Canada. Prince Rupert was particularly well located in this respect.

Lukewarm Habit.

The Governor spoke of the lukewarm habit of some Rotarians and warned against it. Modesty often meant nothing more than sheer laziness. As Canadians we should be able to give and take. Many Canadians could not take a joke on themselves but it was noticed that Scotch, Irish and English people did not mind having jokes at their own expense.

Mr. Beatty told of some of the good work the Victoria club had done. This year they were backing the movement to have high class band concerts in the city. It was well to try to carry out all undertakings. Britain had made a name in the world for carrying out what she set out to do.

Installed Officers

The new governor-elect explained that this was not an official visit. He was not yet installed and he expected to come here again and make his official visit in the fall. He then installed President Orme, past President McClymont, Secretary Sid Johnston, Treasurer George Borrie, Sergeant-at-Arms Jim Lee, and directors J. W. Nicholls, McMorrie, and Woodland.

Cyril Orme, the new president, thanked the club for the honor done him and promised to use his best efforts in the interests of the club.

George Ozard of Victoria, the famous orchestra leader, played compositions of his own on the piano.

NEWEST SYSTEM OF PROMOTION

Pupils in Schools to be Advanced on Recommendation of a Committee of Four

The new regulations in regard to school promotions as set forth by the department of education is summarized as follows:

The examination system of testing pupils' fitness for admission to High School has been in use in Canada for more than fifty years. From time to time discussions arise at teachers' conventions and other educational gatherings regarding the advisability and necessity of giving written examinations to test the attainments and ability of pupils who desire to enter High School. It is claimed by many that the pupil's classroom record, and not his performance at an examination, should be the factor to decide whether or not he should receive promotion. A pupil's attitude to his studies and his continuous effort from day to day, it is said, give a better idea of his acquirements than the results of the examination. There is some force in this, and the Department of Education of British Columbia has for several years tried to give due weight to this argument.

Qualifications

More than 2,000 pupils are promoted to High School each year on the recommendation of teachers. It is felt, however, that a large number of the smaller schools are in charge of young teachers who have not yet had sufficient teaching experience to determine whether or not their pupils have reached the educational standard necessary for successful work in a High School. The Department of Education has therefore decided to extend the privilege of promotion on recommendation to all entrance pupils attending public schools of four or more divisions in districts where High Schools are in operation. Promotion to High Schools in future will be made on the recommendation of a committee composed of the principal of the school, the principal of the High School, the municipal inspector (if one is employed by the district) and the provincial school inspector.

Lists to be Sent

The committee will look into the attainments of each of the pupils and send to the department a list of those who are considered qualified to take up High School studies. Entrance pupils whose classroom record is not of a sufficiently satisfactory character to justify the committee in recommending them for promotion may, if they so desire, sit for the departmental examination. Pupils in attendance at schools in districts where High Schools are not in operation and pupils attending schools of fewer than four divisions will, before they are granted entrance certificates, be required to sit for examination in arithmetic, geography, grammar and composition, penmanship, dictation and spelling and drawing. To be successful a candidate must obtain an average of at least sixty per cent on the five papers and satisfy the department that he has a good knowledge of the work prescribed in English literature, British history, Canadian history, nature study and hygiene.

Change From Former System

Under the existing regulation, which is now being superseded, the most proficient pupils in the entrance classes of schools of seven or more divisions, were promoted on recommendation. The other pupils of the school, as well as those from schools of less than seven divisions, were required to sit for examination.

NEW CAPITAL OF AUSTRALIA

Canberra Parliament Buildings to be Opened Next Year by Member of Royal Family

LONDON, May 11.—It is announced here that Australia's new capital, Canberra, is almost ready for occupation by the federal government and the new parliament buildings will be opened next year by a member of the Royal Family. Washington provides the nearest parallel to this fashioning on virgin soil of a city designed for purely governmental purposes, and when Canberra is complete the noble lines on which it has been planned will give to it on a small scale something of the dignity and spaciousness of the American capital. Its site on an undulating plateau of the Australian Alps, its tree-lined streets, its three gracious lakes, its ample gardens, and its convenient radial thoroughfares will make it an addition to the world's cities of which Australia may well be proud.

SNOW AS AN ASSET TO CITIES OF EAST

Speaker Urges Advertising Winter Attractions of Snow, and Ice

OTTAWA, May 14.—"If the city fathers would leave a little more snow on the streets and spend the money in advertising Ottawa as a winter resort, as well as a summer, then thousands of tourists could be attracted here with immense benefit to the city and citizens," said J. C. Campbell, of the National Parks Branch, Department of the Interior, to members of the Elks Lodge of Ottawa.

"Montreal and Quebec have shown the way," said Mr. Campbell, "and Ottawa has just commenced to follow suit. Moving pictures such as that recently taken in Ottawa, showing the skiing possibilities, are of immense attracting value."

Mr. Campbell stated that millions of dollars came into the Dominion during the summer, owing to the tourist traffic; and that this sum could be doubled if the attractions of the winter season could be made known.

TRAP LICENSES ARE OPPOSED

Trades and Labor Council Goes on Record as Opposed to Attempted Move

The regular meeting of the Trades and Labor Council was held last night with a good attendance of delegates present and President S. D. Macdonald in the chair.

President Macdonald having mentioned that a strong effort was being made to force the government's hand into issuing trap licenses with the cannery trust one of the big factors in the effort, the following resolution, opposing the issuing of trap licenses, was carried unanimously:

Whereas, certain salmon trap licenses were issued in District No. 2, during the season 1925, and

Whereas, it is the declared policy of the Department of Marine and Fisheries not to issue such licenses in future in District No. 2, and

Whereas certain powerful interests engaged in the fishing industry of this province are endeavoring to have the Department alter their declared policy, and obtain licenses for salmon traps for the season 1926, and

Whereas the issuance of such licenses would permit a method of fishing known to be the most deadly and destructive in existence, and would, if permitted for any length of time, result in the total depletion of the fisheries, and in hundreds of salmon fishermen losing their means of livelihood;

Therefore be it resolved that the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council, in regular meeting assembled, protest against the issuance of salmon trap licenses in District No. 2, and request that the Department of Marine and Fisheries abide by its declared policy of refusing to issue same, it being detrimental to the interests of salmon fishermen to do so, and

Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the member for Skeena, Fred Stork, M.P., with the request that he use his best endeavors to prevent the issuance of salmon trap licenses, and also that copies of this resolution be forwarded to the Prime Minister, and the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa.

TORONTO THE GOOD NOW WICKED CITY

Increase in Juvenile Delinquency There Greater Than in any Other

TORONTO, May 14.—The Mail says editorially:

"Juvenile delinquency shows a marked increase in Canada, according to a bulletin of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, with the greatest increases in Toronto among the cities, and in Ontario among the provinces. This is not creditable to our social conditions, or to the influences of the home, and should receive the most thoughtful consideration. What is the matter with our boys and girls? Judge Dysart of the King's Bench, Manitoba, is quoted in the Bulletin as saying 'It is not society but the homes that are at fault, and I am convinced that there is no need of the radical reformation suggested in our punitive system. Quite true the home may be so infected by general conditions of society as to be demoralized and slack, but for this condition the parents, I submit, are surely responsible and primarily to blame.'"

SUNDAY GAMES ENGLAND TODAY

Ecclesiastical Commissioners Granting Permits to Clubs to Use Grounds

LONDON, May 13.—There is likely to be a considerable increase in Sunday games in and around London this year.

May be Withdrawn The leases from the Commissioners contain a clause prohibiting Sunday play, but early this year, after long consideration, the Commissioners decided to allow clubs to apply for a special licence for Sunday play.

The regulations are strict. Play is not to begin before two o'clock in the summer and one o'clock in the winter, no paid labor whatever is to be employed and the club houses are not to be opened until the time when the play is permitted and are to be closed when play ceases.

Objection to Cricket "Twenty years ago tennis was a game," said an official of the Commission in an interview. "Now it is a life pursuit. If anyone started playing a game on a Sunday their licence would probably be taken away."

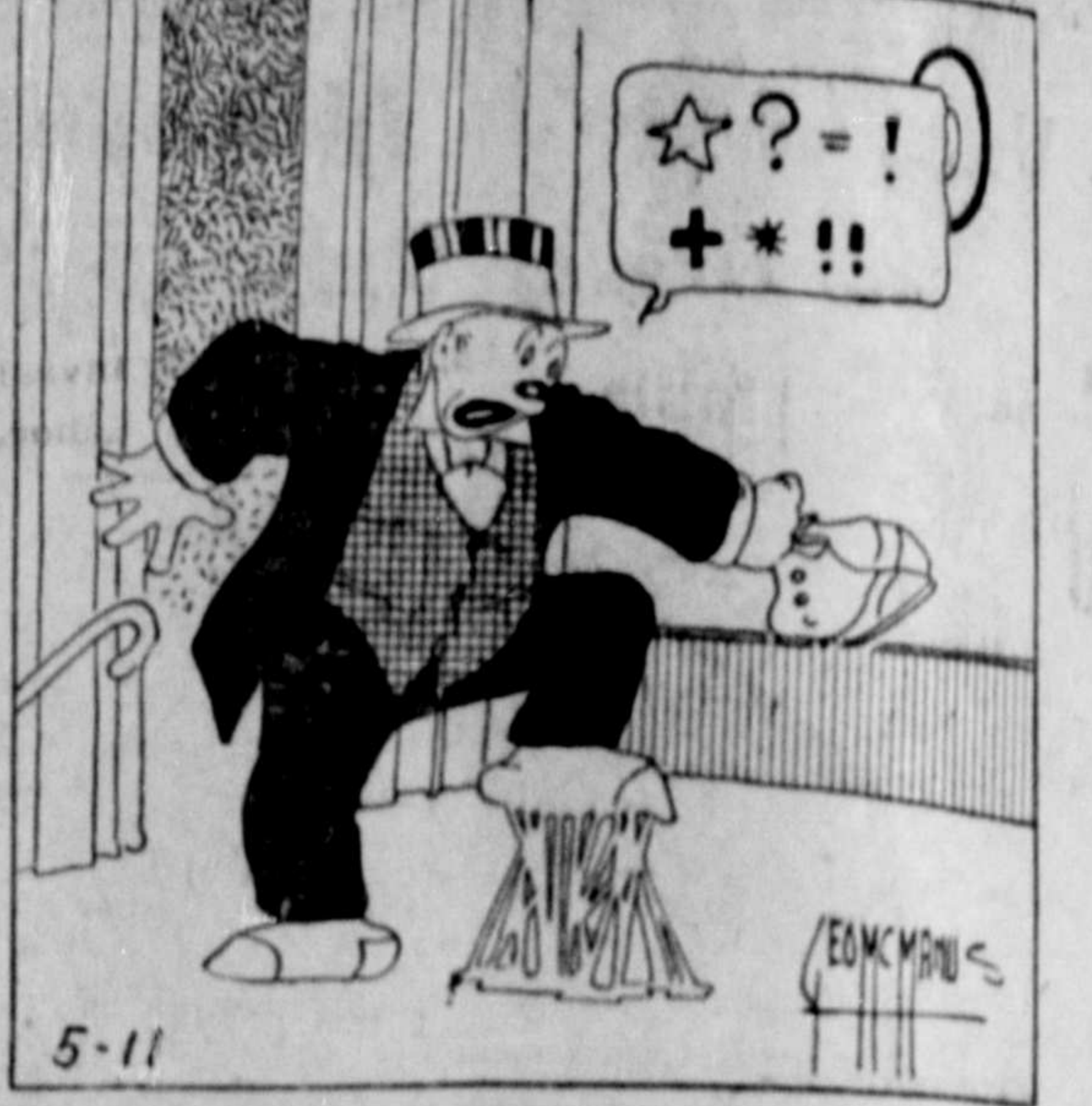
No Sunday Labor "The golf games will not be permitted to have matches on Sunday. Medal competitions will be barred. Sunday golfers cannot have caddies. If a man is not keen enough to carry his own clubs he must go somewhere else. If members want the greens cut in the morning they can cut them themselves. No football will be allowed on Sundays. The competitive element is bound to enter into football and it attracts crowds."

FRENCH HAVE OWN PROBLEM

It is Not Paying of War Debt so Much as from Invasion of Foreign Labor

TORONTO, May 14.—A well informed Canadian resident in Paris has written as follows to a friend here:

"You ask me 'how things are going along in our part of the world.' I confess they are becoming more complicated every day.

"France under a prosperous exterior is suffering from the foreign urge which is so harrying her that she cannot see the issue. It is not the urge from beyond her borders but a relentless one within. International debts notwithstanding what America or England thinks are the least of her worries. But what the millions of Italians, the hundreds of thousands of Poles, the thousands of Czechoslovaks in France are doing, is a real problem for the sanity, the peace and permanent welfare of this country.

Get False Idea

"The French people listening to the puerile debates in the Chamber and watching the daily fluctuations of the franc, ascribe the increase in the cost of living to the demands of England and America. But the intellectual classes find that the foreign labor now over-running France, securing work in the home and the fields, in the shop and in the factory, clamoring for more money, most of which is being sent home, is an irritating urge to them. Indeed, in order to escape having their heels trodden on, they are producing at a rate faster than their capacity warrants. Labor is gaining by it but that class at the moment is quite indifferent to the international situation. And labor certainly elects the deputies over here. It is not possible to say that the classes are losing by this state of affairs but it is doubtful whether they are."

New Blood There

"It costs 48 per cent of the total revenue of the country to run the government. The expenditure in money is not extravagant but the number of men taken from industrial life to become state employees is unquestionably too great. Officials admit it but maintain that the Italians, the Poles, the Czechoslovaks and the Russians will one day become good Frenchmen. This new blood will be to France what it was to America in the nineties. Therefore it is necessary to provide work for the above rationals even if Frenchmen are to be found state employment and even if labor should become increasingly dearer. The authorities do not say that the French people now refuse to do the rough work themselves. But the fact remains that they would rather be government employees than producers. If the contrary were the case then there would be fewer foreign workmen in France, there would be less clamor for higher wages, the cost of living would not be going up by leaps and bounds and France as a whole would not be so antagonistic to the foreign situation as she is today.

"In the meantime the ambitions of Mussolini are somewhat unsettling to the average Frenchman because of their possibilities."

INCREASE IN IMMORALITY

Winnipeg Has Twice as Many Juvenile Cases as a Year Ago and Homes Blamed

WINNIPEG, May 14.—Juvenile crime in Winnipeg and Manitoba—including sex immorality, equal and common drunkenness of boy and girl, and the spread of the gambling vogue to children on the verge of infancy—is terribly on the increase. On the docket of the local juvenile court there have been in the first three months of the present year nearly twice as many hearings as last. This, all local social agencies agree, is not because today's boys and girls are any worse, but because there appears to be no coherent public opinion to give unified support to the forces working for law, order and moral leadership.

The present parental laxity and the division and weakening of public opinion as to right and wrong are traced back partly to the relaxation and license fol-

lowing the war's close, which bred habits that prevail still, and partly to the lack of solidarity of opinion regarding liquor.

Expert Opinions

Interviews with Chief of Police Newton, Judge Hamilton, of the juvenile court, Crown Prosecutor R. B. Graham, and Secretary W. R. Wood, of the Manitoba Prohibition alliance, have elicited the following facts, which are set down in plain language as given:

That home conditions are the greatest cause of juvenile delinquency. The parents are living apart, or they neglect their parental duties in pleasure-seeking; or there is actual immorality in the home, which sets the children on the wrong path even from infancy.

That the age of criminals coming before the courts is younger and younger.

That stealing automobiles and hold-ups of citizens, and the murders which accompany many such cases, are the work of young men.

Chief Culprit

That the chief promoter of immorality among young girls is the type of older man in Winnipeg known in the juvenile court as a "contributor," always well supplied with cash, who drives along the street in a luxurious closed car, picks up young girls and takes them to private clubs or road houses.

That there are restaurants which have come to be known by the juvenile court's probation officers as places of rendezvous where young delinquent girls wait, to be assisted further and further into drunkenness and sex immorality by the "contributors" who see them there.

That, not only from Winnipeg and Brandon, but from towns and villages all over Manitoba, social workers report drunken and immoral parties of young people, where girls share equally with men in liquor-drinking.

No Punishment

That imprisonment has ceased to be a deterrent of crime; the jails being only schools of crime, and comfortable homes for the lazy.

That the gambling spirit has spread down to boys on the verge of babyhood, boys of nine years, who must "match" to see who pays for the chocolate bar, or "flip" for the ice cream.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
