AIRSHIP DEFLATED: PARTY SOUTHBOUND

FRED STORK GIVES LENGTHY ADDRESS IN PARLIAMENT ON THE BUDGET

Norge Deflated at Teller After Landing of Amundsen and Party Who Return South by Steamer

icy water and thin ice at North Pole official of party states; landing was made without difficulty at Alaskan point

NOME, May 17.—The voyage of the dirigible Norge from Teller, Alaska, proved very successful on the whole, the big airship passing over the pole and spending some interesting observations in the neighborhood and later landing at Teller without any injury to the ship or crew, after anchoring and sending down a man to make ready Amundsen and his party found some difficulty getting away from Teller as the ice was frozen and it became necessary to haul their launch a number of miles to open water to launch it. They then came on here and are going south, leaving instructions for the deflated airship to be shipped later.

Second Pilot's Story

NOME, May 17.—Liputenant Hjalmer Riiser-Larsen, second pilot of the Norge, said thin ice and open water was found at the North Pole but no land was discovered in the Arctic wastes by the expedition.

The Norge was in the air 72 hours and considerable time was spent at the pole making observations, the Norge descending to within 600 feet of the ice and rose to an altitude of 4,000 over Point Barrow. Ice formed on the propellers and then broke off, cutting the gas bag, causing a loss of hydrogen to the Norge, but an extremely heavy fair wind aided their voyage to Teller.

Anchor Dropped

The crew of the big ship was very tired. Preparatory to landing an anchor was dropped and a mechanic descended to supervise. A strong head wind was blowing while the airship was being lowered.

After motion pictures had been taken of the Norge, she was deflated in 30 minutes. A perfect landing was made in Frozen Bay at Teller.

Amundsen, Ellsworth, Captain Oscar Wisting and Oscar Omdahl arrived at Nome at five o'clock Sunday morning in the launch Pippa, which was dragged fourteen miles over the ice to open water. They left Saturday night leaving the dismantled Norge for shipment to the United States.

Amundsen and Wisting are the only two men who have visited the north and south poles.

Nome People Annoyed

Feeling resentment is expressed against Amundsen over his failure to bring the Norge to Nome after sending the message saying he was coming to Ralph Lomen, Norwegian vice-consul, who had arranged for the landing. The message assured the populace that Nome would be the landing place and the chamber of commerce went to considerable expense in preparing a stage, decorations and a triumphal arch. Some suggested the decorations be substituted by crepe.

SEATTLE MEN ON SCHOONER

One of First Cruising Parties of Year Reaches Port on its Way to Alaska

On board the ten-ton 57 foot two masted auxiliary schooner Anna Helen are visitors in Prince Rupert today, Dr. Good, Seattle dentist, and his mother; Dr. S. L. Wilkeson, eye specialist, and Ed. Amund, whose special interest is radio work. The party, which arrived yesterday morning, is on its way to Alaska on a pleasure cruise and, after having some compass adjustments made here, will proceed to Ketchikan tomorrow.

The Anna Helen, which is tied up at G.E.P. wharf No. 1, made the trip under favorable weather conditions from Seattle to this point in ten days. Stops were made at Victoria and other points on the way up the coast. Primarily a sailing vessel, the Anna Helen made a good part of the trip up the coast through the "inside passage" under canvas with the 15 h.p. Miller auxiliary gasoline engine called upon at certain stages. The Anna Helen, which is practically a new boat, having been built last year in Seattle, is comfortably equipped and bears the appearance of being a very staunch sea vessel. Next fall the party plans on making a voyage from Seattle across the Pacific Ocean to the South Sea Islands on the Anna Helen. The vessel is equipped with radio and has no less than four sets on this trip.

Dr. Good and Dr. Wilkeson are experienced yachtsmen. The latter last year made the trip from Seattle to Los Angeles in a 22 foot open gasboat. That voyage took two weeks.

Prices Not so High This Morning and One American Boat Proceeded to Seattle

One boat, the Polaris, refused to accept the price offered for halibut and cleared for Seattle. Bids were from 13.5c to 15.2c and 7c for American fish and from 43.2c to 43.5c and 7c for Canadian. Britain Slowly Recovering from Big General Strike but Not Back to Normal Condition

LONDON, May 17.—Although most of the industries are steadily recovering from the effects of the general strike, only one railway system is able to give full service today, other companies admitting they are unable to provide more than fifty per cent of normal service. The Post Office is congested with mail and parcels. The parcels post service has been suspended entirely during the tie-up.

Strong hopes are being entertained that the miners' strike will be settled but several days must elapse before preliminary arrangements can be made.

Figuring the cost of the strike has become a favorite pastime, one of the estimates placing the loss to the National Union of Railwaymen at a million pounds and to the companies as five and a half millions. Chancellor of the Exchequer, Winston Churchill informed Parliament, adding that direct expenditure has not as yet been large, there being counter receipts in some cases and in others the strike caused a saving in the curtailment of branches of the government. All morning papers appeared in normal sized sheets today but none exceeded four pages.

Prisoner in Vancouver Jail Broke Away on Second Attempt and Was Chased Through City

VANCOUVER, May 17.—Frustrated in his first attempt Saturday night to break jail, Ray Page, alias Charles Tollington, against whom the police allege theft and burglary and uttering false documents made a successful but brief getaway early Sunday morning.

In the first attempt Page sawed a bar in the police cell at headquarters which fell into the lane and attracted the notice of the police. He said the saw was lowered to him from the roof by an accomplice. No other implement was found, so Page was again locked up.

At four o'clock Sunday morning a police officer noticed a blanket hanging from the corridor window 40 feet from the ground. Investigation found Page gone, the grating of the cell having been cut away. He was located later up town and an exciting chase followed during which several shots were fired at the fugitive, who was finally rounded up in the C.P.R. yards.

NEW YORK, May 17.—Cincinnati by taking a third straight game from New York giants are now only a game and half behind the leading Brooklyn team. The set back by the Reds caused McGraw to send out calls for help to minor leagues.

In the only American League game played, Detroit took an eleven innings battle from Boston.

The debate has taken more than 500 pages of Hansard to report, which means more than 354,000 words used by members in the course of four weeks.

IMMIGRANTS FROM EUROPE

Fifteen Hundred From British Isles and Other Countries Come at Week End

MONTREAL, May 17.—Fifteen hundred immigrants, mostly from the British Isles and northern European countries, passed through Montreal over the week end on their way west.

At Halifax one hundred passengers landed Sunday, over 500 being made up of special parties of immigrants brought out by the Canadian National Railway for the eastern provinces.

NEW CUTTERS FOR ALASKA

SEATTLE, May 17.—A Washington telegram advised the Chamber of Commerce that Congress will likely pass a bill authorizing construction of ten new coast guard cutters costing \$9,000,000.

The Pacific coast campaign was started a year ago when, it was pointed out, there was a diversion of cutters to fight rum running. The coast, especially in Alaska, was left without protection.

Carrying On Much As Usual.

Prince Rupert is carrying on much as usual. There is no elevator building this year and the mill has gone up in smoke but very soon we shall have the elevator in operation, which is something we have never had before and next spring the mill is to be rebuilt, although not as large as before. The development of the fisheries is on the increase and this is the first year that two canneries are being operated in the harbor. The Reil Mill is an addition to the infant industries and there are additions to the facilities at the waterfront being installed. Building generally is about normal and all the new houses are occupied.

Visitor Compliments Local Boys' Band.

The local boys' band was complimented by the visiting Shrimers last week and the bandmaster took them under his wing with good effect during the afternoon of the last day of his visit. It was a good experience for the lads and should give them an impetus to work. Proficiency is gained by practice and by comparing with the best. Such experience is worth a great deal and the counsel of those who know is also valuable. There is always plenty of counsel coming from those who don't know.

If Prince Rupert boys stick together and are determined to make their band worth while, they may easily become the premier musical organization of the north.

Military Revolution In Poland Successful.

The despatches state that the military revolution in Poland last week was successful and a new government is in charge, placed there not by the votes of the people but by the force of the group that has usurped the position.

We do not know anything about the right or wrong of this case, but it seems to be in line with movements that are going on in many countries to bring about stable government by destroying democracy. It is a reversion to older methods and is brought about by a revision of public opinion against the extremists. Radicalism defeats itself in the long run.

There are still thousands of people who think the world can be reformed in a day and that it is their duty to reform it. They ran go so far and then they find that instead of carrying it forward they have been damming the stream of progress.

We have made great advances in the past few years. We shall make still greater advances in the next half century, but it will not be necessarily along the lines proposed by those who think themselves the advance guard of civilization. We have a lot to learn about government and it will take us more than one generation to learn it so that it can be worked successfully.

Sterling At Par In New York.

At the week end sterling exchange was actually at par. Par of exchange is \$4.86 2-3 to the pound sterling but take off the cost of transfer of the money from one country to the other and you have as actual par on this side about \$4.86, to which point the pound came at the week end. This is the first time it has reached that point since the war and is an indication of the renewed stability of British finance. It shows the wisdom of the line of action taken by British statesmen in facing the actual conditions and grappling with them bravely at the first. The finances of a nation like the finances of an individual can improve only when a determined effort is made to set the house in order and bring the income to a point where it is greater than the expenditure.

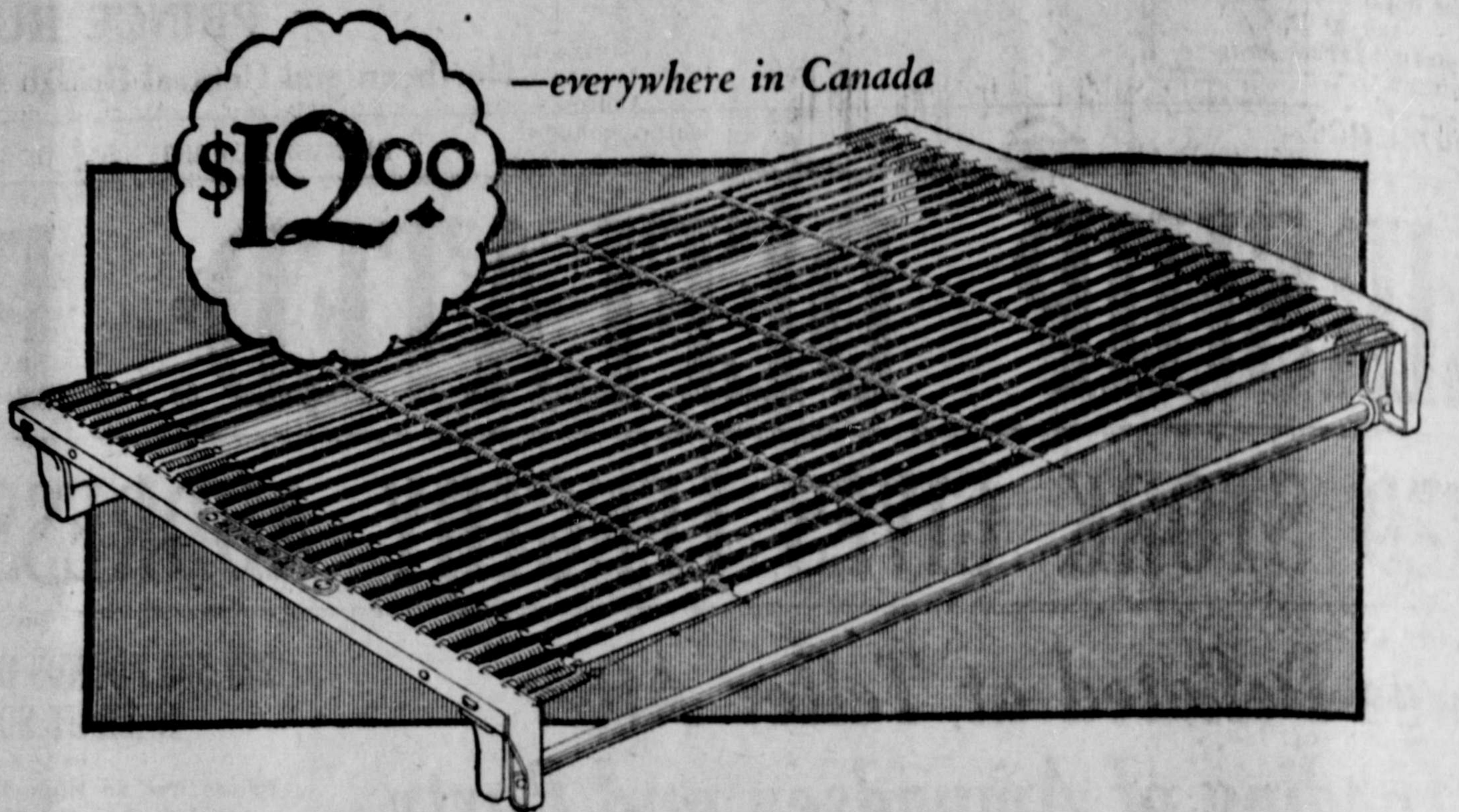

than will those fishermen who go down to the sea in ships and eke out a hard livelihood. They grow old quickly in the fishing game, especially on the stormy, rock-bound coast of the North Pacific, and those men will welcome the announcement that an old age pension system is to be brought into force.

Fordney Tariff

In 1911, Mr. Speaker, we had an election in this country, held in connection with a reciprocity arrangement. The real issues of that election were lost sight of, and the slogan of our friends opposite became, "No truck or trade with the Yankees." Our American friends to the south naturally heard the people of Canada repeating that slogan, and said, "That is fair enough; we will have no truck or trade with the Canadians," and as a result we now have the Fordney tariff. We have heard a good deal recently about this "brick for brick" policy, but it seems to me to be a question of a brickbat for a brickbat, and the first brickbat thrown hit the fishermen on the Skeena River right in the eye. The high tariff has no supporters in the county of Skeena. I have just placed on Hansard a table showing the tremendous amount of halibut taken from the North Pacific, and the people who are catching halibut are free traders; the high tariff makes no hit with them. They are shipping this vast amount of halibut largely to the American market; it goes out over the Canadian National railways in refrigerator cars and contributes largely to the revenues of the Canadian National, since each refrigerator car earns about \$1,000 in the transportation of fish.

Canadian Fishermen

But we are under a very grievous disadvantage in connection with this market. Halibut is sold in the open market by auction, and our Canadian fishermen receive two cents per pound less than do the American fishermen who market their catch in that port. All the fish are supposed to be destined for the American market; the buyer, anticipating that he will have to pay the two cent duty, deducts that amount from the price paid the fisherman. Thus this duty of two cents per pound has been for some time a burning question with those people. Negotiations have been carried on and are still in progress, and we urgently and earnestly hope that they will result in the abolition of this duty.

As a result of the improvement in the fishing industry we find two new canneries being built in the northern part of the county of Skeena, and there is also a newly established biological station, put into operation by the Department of Marine and Fisheries for the study of

fish life and the general advantage of the trade. At that station they are discovering new varieties and new species of fish. I have been in the province of British Columbia for some thirty-seven years, and there are varieties of fish there of which I have never heard before. Only last fall, over on the north shore of Queen Charlotte Islands, I found a brand new variety. At a little town called Tow Hill there has been established a new clam canning factory. When we speak of clams we all have in our mind's eye the old style of shell which litters the ocean beach, but this particular clam which they are developing at Tow Hill is a brand new variety, and I would imagine it to be the aristocrat of the clam tribe. It is enclosed in a case which looks very much like a spectacle case that a man might use, made of tortoise shell. The shells are as thin as paper, beautiful in finish and color, about 7 inches long and 1 1/4 inches wide, with the ends rounded. They make a very beautiful looking shell. These clams are of such a quality that there is an unlimited market for them. It is something entirely new. This is just one instance of what can be procured by scientific research, by investment and by the far-sightedness of the people who live in that country.

Immense Sandy Beach

I discovered while I was at Tow Hill that they have there one of the finest natural beaches, I should think, on the known globe today. It has been my good fortune to have visited the beaches in California, the sands at Blackpool and Ostend, and I say without hesitation that on the north shore of Queen Charlotte Islands is a sand beach as hard as a cement floor, fifty miles in extent—the greatest natural speedway that one could find anywhere. Fifty, yes, one hundred, automobiles could race along this speedway for fifty miles, and I am sure that when Sir Henry Thornton gets his eye on this locality, with his desire to attract world tourists and build up the Canadian National Railway, when he brings to bear his activity on that section of the country, we shall have an improved steamboat service from Prince Rupert to Alaska via the Queen Charlotte Islands. This beach I speak of is one of the greatest natural advantages, I think, which the whole of the north country possesses. If Burns or Byron had visited such a spot, it would be interesting to see what they would have produced in the way of description of what I regard as one of the greatest wonders of the North American continent.

City Held Back

Seventeen years ago, in the town of Prince Rupert, Sir Charles Rivers Wilson, who was then the president of the Grand Trunk Railway Company and also of its subsidiary the Grand Trunk Pacific, made a speech in which he said he regretted the fact that he was an old man with not many more years to live, but that even at his age he hoped to see before he died the fulfilment of the project of the Grand Trunk Pacific. He said he hoped to see going out of the port of Prince Rupert the trade and traffic of the western prairies, and coming back through that port the wealth of the Orient. This grand old man has long since passed to his rest. The defeat of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in 1911, the death of Charles M. Hays, the change of government in 1911, the stress of war, the further fact that the Grand Trunk Pacific had its throat cut by Mackenzie and Mann—due to all these things the development of that great country has been temporarily arrested. There was a period of stagnation between 1911 and 1921, but, Sir, under the present Prime Minister, and under the genius of Sir Henry Thornton, this country is now beginning to be developed, and with the tremendous improvement in the situation of the Canadian National Railway, as stated in the budget, and with the improvement of the Grand Trunk Pacific, we can look forward to the future as being bright and promising.

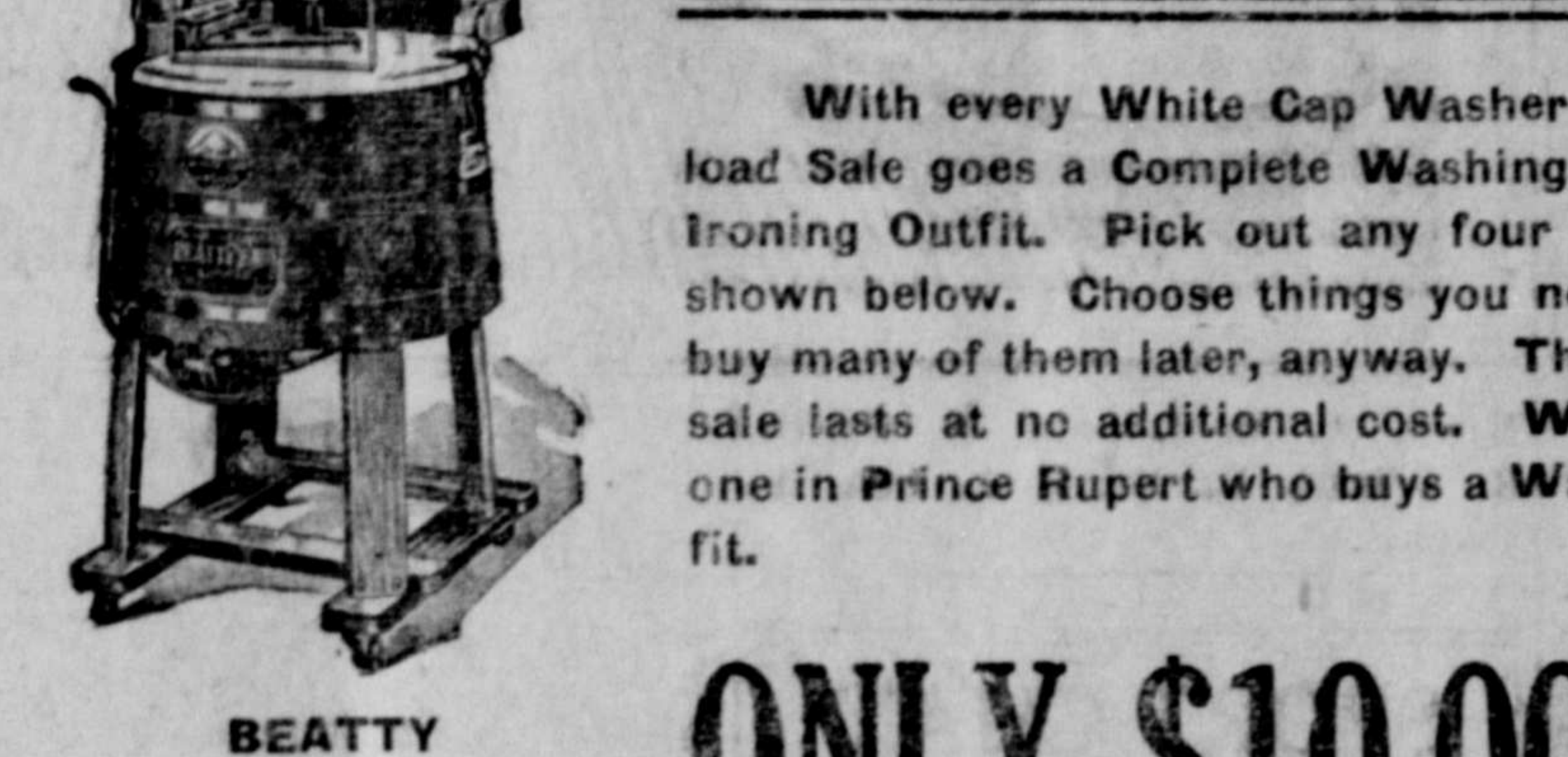

Rupert elevator the charge that it was one of the crimes of the Mackenzie King government. Even in the recent by-election in Middlesex, if I am correctly informed, the hon. member for Fort William (Mr. Manion) took further occasion to refer to this matter. Our Conservative friends, who have had so much to say in denunciation of this proposition, ought to remember that within three months of the day they came into office in 1911 their act in this despised town of Prince Rupert was to expatriate from their own friends 100 feet of frontage on Third Ave. at a price, set by their own board of arbitrators, of \$95,000. Then out of the native rock they chiselled a basement at an additional cost of \$25,000. We have a very wet climate in that part of the country, and this post office site was so located that it acted as a drain pool for the surrounding land, with the

result that this basement filled up with water. Then our loyal friends who think so much of Prince Rupert installed an electric pump, operated by one of their own friends. This pump would work night and day pumping out the water, and those of us in the north country who were doing what we could to keep up our courage during the dark days of the war had our courage renewed and our spirits revived by listening night and day to the patriotic heart throbs of the Tory pump working in the government cellar. When they criticize this Prince Rupert elevator they ought to say that they themselves in 1911 gave the people of that north country reason to hope that they had located in a place that would be advantageous. Let me say that this elevator at Prince Rupert has been completed now only a matter of seven or eight weeks. The sawdust and the shavings have

scarcely been removed, but still things are moving. The elevator there will be used. The dream of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the speech of Sir Charles Rivers Wilson, and the hope of Charles M. Hays will yet be realized. The elevator at Prince Rupert will hold grain that will be exported shortly to the Orient, and in return there will come back to the Canadian National Railways for transportation to the east the silk of Japan and of China, and other Oriental wealth. The prophecy of the grand old man who has gone to his rest is coming true. It is coming true rapidly, and it is heartening to pioneers of that northern country who have staked their all, and who are living in the hope of seeing the completion of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and of witnessing the prosperity that is bound to come in time to the whole of the northern part of the province of British Columbia.

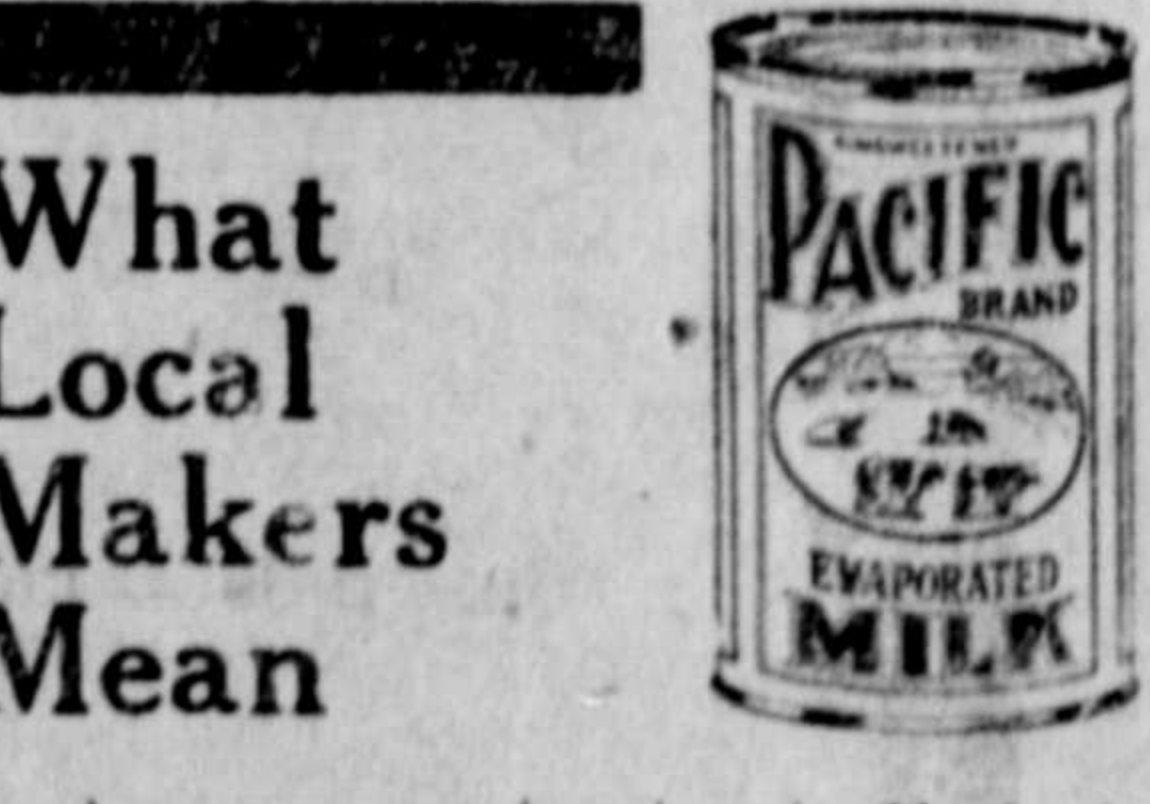
