POLITICAL UPHEAVAL IN GREAT BRITAIN

BUCKLEY'S MILL AT PORT CLEMENTS TO BEGIN OPERATION NEXT MONTH

Political Sensation in Great Britain Caused by Break Between Asquith and Lloyd George Over Gen. Strike

LONDON, May 26.—A political sensation was created by publication today of letters from the Earl of Oxford and Asquith to Lloyd George strongly censuring the latter's attitude during the general strike.

Political gossip recently indicated that there was considerable tension between Lord Oxford, who is leader of the Liberal party, and Lloyd George, the party's parliamentary champion in the House of Commons. In these quarters the Earl of Oxford's letter is interpreted as meaning that either Lloyd George must resign his parliamentary leadership or that Earl Oxford, Viscount Grey, Sir John Simon and other prominent Liberals, who are in agreement with Oxford, will cut loose from the Liberal party.

At Llandudno, Wales, Lloyd George today defended his attitude towards the general strike, which he condemned, but declared that it was no excuse for the government breaking off coal negotiations when there still was a chance to prevent a great industrial tieup.

Police Chosen by Provincial Department For Duty in Prince Rupert

Sergeant J. P. M. Hannah of Criminal Investigation Department, Vancouver, has been appointed to take charge of the detachment of the provincial police in Prince Rupert following the decision to transfer to police authority for municipal provincial control.

Other officers of the city detachment will be Constable Fred Mackland of Logan Inlet; Constable Charles Kench of Massett; Constable J. M. Bella of Duncan; Constable J. A. Anderson of Ardenay; and Constable R. McFarley of Coquitlam.

These officers will be here to report by next Tuesday, when transfer is scheduled to go into effect.

ROKER CASE BEFORE COURTS

Case For Big Amounts Between Rivals in Business at Vancouver

VANCOUVER, May 26.—Seeking to recover \$100,000 damages, Charles Unverzagt, a Vancouver mining broker, issued a writ against John Horgan. Unverzagt alleges Horgan slandered him on divers occasions by maliciously writing and publishing false assertions to various persons with whom he (Unverzagt) was in the habit of doing business.

Counterclaim by Horgan alleges that Unverzagt was guilty of the same practices toward him and he is suing the latter for \$10,000 damages.

The trial of the case is set for June 1.

ANY VICTIMS CATASTROPHE

Caused From Volcano Eruption in Japan Number 250; Reservoir Burst Banks

OKIO, May 26.—The latest estimates place the loss of life through the eruption of Mount Tokachi volcano at 250 and 500 injured. Three thousand people are homeless.

Another catastrophe is reported from Akita prefecture where a dam irrigation reservoir at its banks, sweeping away the town of Kitsuura with a population of 7,000. It is feared casualties will be heavy.

JURY CHOSEN MURDER CASE

Local Businessmen to Inquire Into Death of Essington School Teacher

No important developments were announced at provincial police headquarters this morning in connection with the murder at Port Essington on Sunday last of Miss Loretta Chisholm, the 21-year-old school teacher. Investigations with a view to solving the crime are being continued at Port Essington by Chief Constable McNeill, assisted by Constables Gibson and Camm, and were announced this morning to be proceeding satisfactorily.

An inquest will be opened in the case at 1.30 tomorrow afternoon before Deputy Coroner J. B. Tannock with the following as Jurymen: H. B. Hoghesfer, R. E. Moore, L. M. Fuller, R. F. McNaughton, J. W. Scott and G. H. Arnold.

After the remains have been viewed by the jury, the body of the unfortunate girl will be prepared for burial.

School Inspector Fraser this morning received a telegram from Mrs. W. P. Chisholm of Eburne asking him to cancel former arrangements for sending the body of Miss Chisholm to Vancouver and to arrange to have burial take place here. She will be coming to Prince Rupert to attend the funeral.

WHEAT PRICES SOARED TODAY ALMOST SIX CENTS

CHICAGO, May 26.—Wheat prices soared today almost six cents. The cause of the rise is said to be scarcity of new wheat to meet contracts.

WINNIPEG, May 26.—Wheat prices here jumped two cents today.

VACCINE ARRIVES KODIAK ISLAND TO CHECK THE SMALLPOX

KODIAK, May 26.—Smallpox which broke out at this isolated village on May 19 is under control with the arrival of the United States Bureau of Fisheries vessel Kittewake from Seward with vaccine points to vaccinate all the residents.

STRAWBERRY PICKING VANCOUVER ISLAND

VICTORIA, May 26.—Strawberry picking is commencing in the Gordon Head district and on warm slopes in other parts of the Saanich peninsula. The fruit looks well and a large crop is anticipated.

Buckley Mill at Port Clements Commence Cutting Lumber for Export Next Week Says Owner

With a staff of some 75 men and a daily capacity of 75,000 feet, the sawmill at Port Clements, now one of the finest and best equipped lumber plants in the district as a result of the great amount of improvement work that has been done recently, will start cutting within a week's time states F. L. Buckley, well known northern operator, who is in the city today aboard the Prince Charles returning to Vancouver after a visit to the plant.

Logging contractors have already started work for the mill, a party of some 25 men having arrived from Vancouver yesterday to be employed by Crawford & Moore, who hold logging contracts for the mill. The principals of this logging concern, Ed. Crawford and Albert Moore, both of whom arrived at Massett Inlet yesterday, are well known in the district, having been formerly with the Whalen Co., Mr. Crawford at Swanson Bay and Mr. Moore at Thurston Harbor.

Bert Aekert will be superintendent of the Port Clements mill, Mr. Buckley stated.

Mr. Buckley stated that arrangements had already been made for the disposal of the mill's output. Airplane spruce, on which the plant will specialize, will be shipped to Vickers', London, while common grades will go to Vancouver for box making, etc.

Speaking of conditions generally on the Islands, Mr. Buckley was of the opinion that they were due for one of the most prosperous seasons in their history.

WHEAT POOL NOT TO GET AN ELEVATOR

Prince Rupert Experiment Will be Watched Before Further Extension

WINNIPEG, May 26.—The Vancouver harbor board will continue to administer the government elevators in Vancouver, according to a well-defined report in grain circles here today, forcing the Wheat Pool to take steps to acquire its elevator at Vancouver.

The experiment of leasing the government elevator at Prince Rupert to the Pool will be watched for some time before further government property is leased to the Wheat Pools.

LIQUOR CHARGE AGAINST FLYER

Man Who Tried to Reach Hawaii by Airplane is Indicted by Grand Jury

SEATTLE, May 26.—Lieut. Commander James H. Strong of the United States Navy, who last year unsuccessfully attempted to fly from the United States to Hawaii by airplane, is charged with liquor conspiracy in the federal grand jury indictment warrant, which was returned as unserved in the district court yesterday.

Strong is in San Diego with the aircraft squadron of the Pacific coast fleet.

FIRE DAMAGE AT COURTENAY

Five Business Establishments Wiped Out in City in Comox District of Island

COURTENAY, May 26.—A fire early today destroyed five business establishments including a garage containing six new automobiles, twelve used machines, causing an estimated loss amounting in all to \$50,000.

Aviators Raced to Get Films from Teller for Exhibition on Outside

Pictures of Norge and Amundsen north polar party being sent out on steamer from Skagway

DAWSON, May 26.—Aviator Bennett of Fairbanks returned here Monday from Whitehorse after delivering for transportation to Skagway the films of the dirigible Norge and the Amundsen North Polar party which he carried from Teller, Alaska, in an effort to deliver them to the United States ahead of rival films which also speeded by the airplane route to the outside in what is claimed to be the greatest flying race in the history of the north.

Bennett arrived here en route to Whitehorse last Thursday, on his return picking up Miss Pauline White, a school teacher of Selkirk whom he brought to her home here.

Bennett left Tuesday for his home at Fairbanks.

NANAIMO TO ASK GOVERNMENT TAKE POLICING OF CITY

NANAIMO, May 26.—The city council at its meeting last night decided to ask the Provincial Government to take over the policing of the city.

NEW OFFERS BEING SUBMITTED BY BOTH RAILWAY COMPANIES FOR RAILWAY TO PEACE RIVER

EDMONTON, May 26.—It is understood here that new offers are being submitted for the railway to the Peace River country from this city by both the C.P.R. and the Canadian National and these may be in the hands of the government tomorrow for submission to the Legislature.

The settlement made by the government with the Royal Bank, which liquidates their claim against the railway, leaves the way open for dealing directly with either railway company or for the province to operate the railway itself.

The general impression here is that the C.P.R. will get the line and that it will be continued through to the heart of the Peace country and beyond toward a coast outlet, which will be utilized by the C.P.R. for shipment of the greater part of its west-bound grain.

SPECTACULAR BASEBALL IN LEAGUE GAMES

Yankees Took Double Header From Boston and Ruth Mung up Sixteenth

PITCHER UHLE SCORES

NEW YORK, May 26.—By defeating Boston in a double header yesterday the New York Yankees bettered their consecutive victories to fifteen. Ruth lunged up his sixteenth homer in the seventh inning of the first game, giving him 325 for his twelve year major league career.

Philadelphia and Washington split even in a double header that required five hours to play, Washington scoring eleven runs on nine hits and two passes in the fifth inning of the first game.

Pitcher Uhle by hitting a homer in the eleventh, enabled Cleveland to defeat St. Louis.

The New York Giants celebrated their return home from a disastrous trip by defeating Brooklyn twice, the first game being featured by Farrell's homer with the bases full.

Detroit batted Chicago pitchers hard, securing one homer, three triples and four doubles, besides twelve single hits.

CITY WOULD BUILD ROAD

Offers to Complete Island Highway for Government at Cost

In an attempt to hurry up the provincial government in the matter of resuming work on the Kalen Island highway, the council last night passed a resolution offering to carry out the work for the government at cost. A recommendation from the Board of Works, adopted by the council, was to the effect that the council communicate with the provincial department of public works at Victoria that the city would be prepared to construct the road from the city limits to Galloway Rapids at cost.

NEW HOTEL AT NANAIMO SOON

Quarter of a Million Dollar Structure to be Erected at Coal Town this Summer

NANAIMO, May 26.—Nanaimo is to have a new hotel. Local people have subscribed half the cost, amounting to \$125,000 and an equal amount is being financed through trust companies. The arrangements were carried out through an American organization that handles such matters on a business basis. Arrangements are being made for a site, construction will commence almost immediately and the hotel will be built this summer.

Do We Realize What Seasons Mean?

It seems to us that very many people have no realization of what is meant by the various holidays we keep. Take the last as an instance. It was May 24, but what did it mean? The holiday was first established because it was the birthday of Queen Victoria. On her death it was still called Victoria Day and the last day of school preceding it was known as Empire Day. The whole idea is for us to consider our position as a member of the British Empire.

The word "Empire," as we have mentioned before, is rather an unfortunate one because we associate with it all that goes with Imperialism. It brings to mind the imperialism of Rome, of France under Napoleon, and of Germany under the Kaiser. When it is considered, however, that the British Empire is not imperialistic but is a commonwealth of free and independent dominions, the word loses its sting and we can celebrate Empire Day without losing any of our self-respect.

Next Holiday Is Dominion Day.

The next important public holiday is Dominion Day, which comes on July 1. It celebrates the birthday of the Canadian confederation although at that time the Dominion was not by any means complete. It was the beginning of the confederation idea under which the Canadian nation came into being. It is celebrated here with more show of patriotism than any other holiday and rightly so. It is the largest governmental entity to which we belong. There is no government of the British Empire. The British commonwealth is just beginning to develop and no one can say what its final form will be. Possibly there will be no finality about it but just a steady evolution just as the British nation evolved.

Having A Scrap Over Flag For South Africa.

In South Africa they are having a big scrap over the question of a new flag. It is proposed to have a South African flag without any Union Jack on it but this seems to meet with the opposition of every Britisher. Meetings are being held and resolutions passed protesting against it on the ground that it is totally opposed to the sentiment of a greater part of the white race there and is an affront to the British section of the country. So strong has been the opposition to the move that it is thought the Hertzog government will not proceed with it at this session of the House of Assembly.

Startled By Crime At Port Essington.

The whole west country was startled yesterday by news of the crime at Port Essington when a girl was horribly murdered by some brute in human form. It is to be hoped that the perpetrator of the deed will be quickly brought to justice. It is satisfactory to know that an efficient police force is working on the case and results are expected.

It is difficult for the normal person to understand the attitude of mind of a man who would commit such a crime. It strikes the average person with horror and possibly so reacted on the criminal as soon as the deed was done.

Complain Because No Music Here.

It is rather a common thing to hear complaints that in Prince Rupert there are no opportunities to hear good music or to go to good theatres. All we have is movies. This week there has been such an opportunity and the music given has been strictly high class. Yet the people have not taken advantage of the opportunity to hear it. Tonight is the last on which the Lyric quartette will appear and those who have not yet heard them should do so. They are well worth it.

Walter Bates and His Lyric Quartette Prove Great Entertainers at Westholme

The Walter Bates Lyric quartette made an excellent impression last evening at the Westholme Theatre when it appeared for the second time, giving an entertainment that anyone with musical taste should appreciate. Mr. Bates, the tenor of the party and trainer of the other members was the feature of the evening but Miss Edith Pickells, the English soprano, also proved very popular with the audience. They gave a mixed program including a number of selections from the opera "The Bohemian Girl" all with good effect. Charles Balagna was accompanist for some of the singers and in a few of the numbers Will Balagna played a violin obligato.

Tenor Selections

While no two members of the audience would agree exactly on what they liked best in last night's program, "The Largo" by Walter Bates was undoubtedly the best bit of work of the evening. "The Road to Mandalay" by the same singer was also well rendered as was also "Then You'll Remember Me," from the Bohemian Girl. His other numbers were "My Lovely Gelia" from the old English "I Look into Your Garden," "Were You to Call," "When Love is Kind," from the old Irish, and the Scottish ballad "Afton Water."

Miss Pickells, a girl who graduated from the College of Music in London, England, sang well the soprano solos "My Laddie," "If I knew You," and from the Bohemian Girl "I Dreamt That I Dwell in Marble Halls."

Miss Jane Sugden was very effective in "My Dear Soul" and especially in "Calling Me Home to You," while Basil Roberts sang well "Asleep in the Deep," "Little Grey Home in the West," and "The Heart Bowed Down."

Part Singing

Of the part singing the quartettes "Annie Laurie" and the selections from the Bohemian Girl and from Tannhauser were much appreciated, while one of the gems of the evening was the duet "Whispering Hope" by Miss Pickells and Miss Sugden, the voices blending excellently and being most effective.

Mr. Bates proved a good story teller and kept the audience amused between selections with bright anecdotes.

Taken all in all it was a good concert and one that Prince Rupert people cannot afford to miss. The program will be changed again tonight and will be particularly attractive. This will be the last opportunity of hearing this excellent quartette and should not be passed up.

City Council to Ask Federal Government What Plans are Regarding Cow Bay

THOMPSON STREET GRADING PROJECT DROPPED BY CITY

The city council is having considerable difficulty in the matter of arranging under the local improvement plan for an eastern outlet to Seventh Avenue West, which is about to be graded. First it was proposed to have a road on Dunsmuir Street from Seventh to Sixth Avenue but property owners abutting objected and this was dropped. Next it was planned to place the road on Thompson Street, a block further west, but a delegation of property owners concerned, consisting of Mrs. Moss, A. Brooksbank and W. E. Willisoff appeared before the council last night to protest against the work on Thompson Street on the ground of excessive cost, so this project was also dropped. If such an outlet as seems to be desir-

able is to be given, it now appears that work on one of the lateral streets will have to be paid for out of general fund or else the original project of cutting through the high hill on Seventh Avenue between Dunsmuir and McBride Streets will have to be proceeded with.

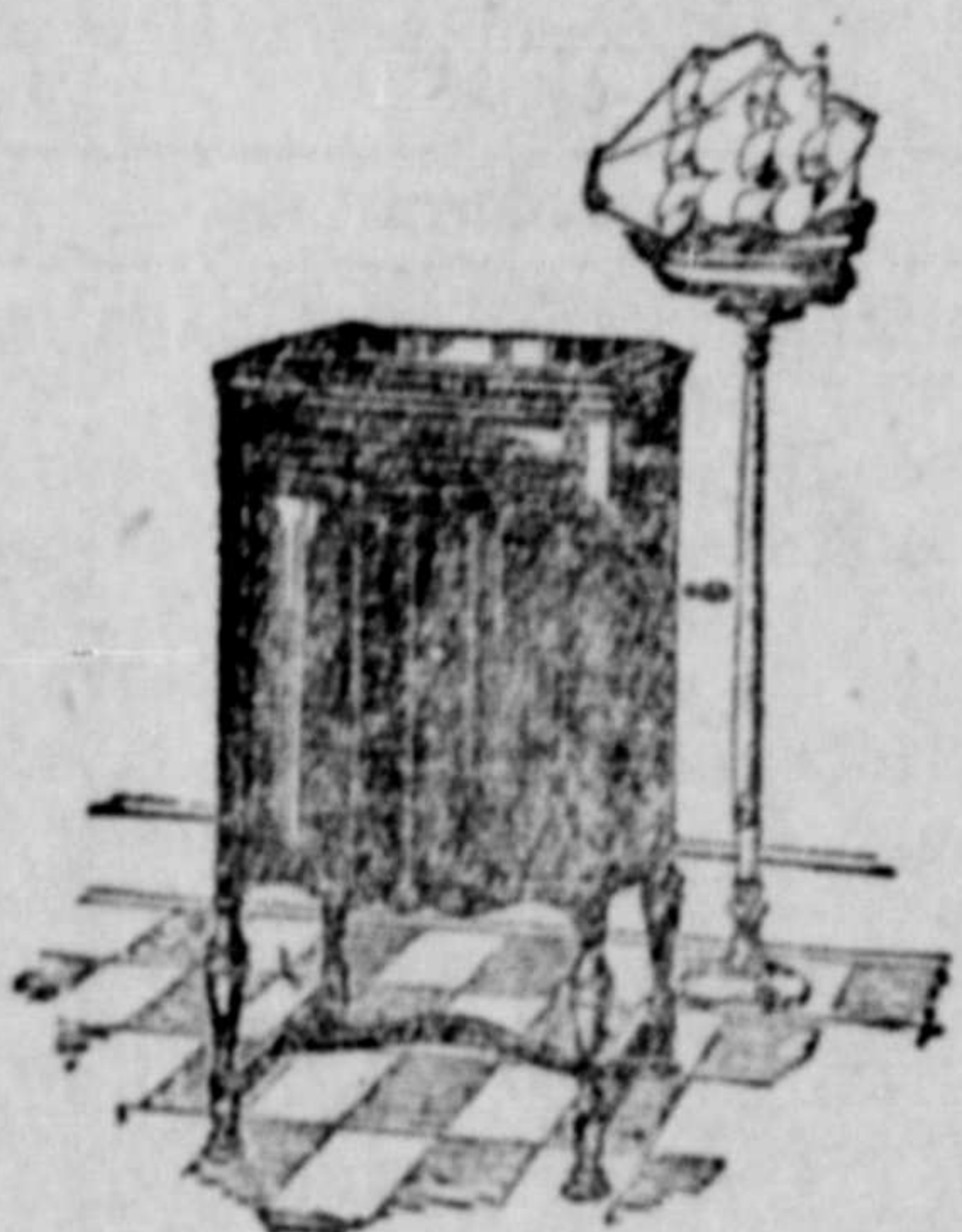

MEDICAL MEN SAFEGUARD IN IMMIGRATION

Dr. John C. MacGregor, President of Ontario Medical Association, Speaks of Operation of Doctors

LONDON, Ont., May 26.—(Canadian Press)—Medical men can assist materially in settling in motion machinery which will safeguard future generations of Canadians; Dr. John A. MacGregor, of London, Ont., President of the Ontario Medical Association, told the representative gathering of physicians and surgeons who are gathered here for the annual convention of the Ontario Medical Association.

"Immigration is a crying need in this country," said Dr. MacGregor. "Our expansive, fertile fields invite the coming of hundreds of men and women into this land of promise but we must be very particular regarding the types that we admit. Unfortunately no small percentage of those finding their way here at the present time and for some time past, have been of a definitely inferior type. Many of them are mental defectives of varying degree who shortly after coming, find their way into our hospitals and other public institutions and become charges on our municipalities. The medical profession can perform a lasting public service by bringing the matter to the attention of the Immigration Department and impressing on them the necessity of more carefully investigating, particularly the assisted immigrant, as to his mental status before he leaves his native country."

Measures For Defectives

Dr. MacGregor said that this suggested a consideration of the defective. With the imbecile and idiot the matter resolved itself into confinement in an institution, provision for which had been for some time made. For the minor types of mental defective, the moron, however, no measure for public protection was available unless he could be committed voluntarily or got into difficulty which brought him within the law.

"Is it not time," said the doctor, "that some arrangement for permanently taking care of this group be instituted in order that they, by some means, may be prevented from propagating their kind. The medical profession can here step in and help to set in motion the machinery which will safeguard our future generations."

Medical Ethics

The association's president remarked that the grindstone of time had wrought many changes in systems, opinion and social conditions in general. Startling departures from former business and commercial methods and social customs were rapidly effecting the more sober practice of comparatively recent times. The changing social status demanded a readjustment of professional understanding and the code of ethics probably now merited some re-adaptation.

Medical Ethics

"In the present state of perturbation of mind and vacillating opinion, dominated to no little extent by the lure of commercialism, let us be certain that the highest traditions of medicine are not forfeited but maintained unswerving, a treasured heritage," concluded Dr. MacGregor.

LOUGHEED DIVORCE GRANTED BY COURT

Daughter of Late Canadian Senator Declares Marriage with St. Louis Man a Mistake

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 26.—Nolan L. Hussey, secretary of the Hussey Electric Company of St. Louis, was granted a divorce on a charge of desertion from the former Miss Dorothy Lougheed of Calgary, daughter of the late Sir James Lougheed, in the court of domestic relations here.

Hussey testified that his wife repeatedly told him she did not love him and declared they should be divorced. He testified that she also said their marriage was a mistake. "I will never live with you again," she wrote him on December 26, 1925, from Calgary, where she returned, he said. Hussey alleged desertion, based on his wife's return to her

He declared that she was not used to the environment to which he brought her here and returned to Calgary six months after the death of her father which gave her independent means. Mrs. Hussey was an only child.

Mrs. Hussey did not appear here today but was represented by counsel who entered into the record her entry of appearance which she had signed. She had withdrawn an earlier denial of the suit. In his testimony Hussey revealed that relatives on

both sides had met in Winnipeg shortly after the separation for the purpose of effecting a reconciliation but had failed.

NORTHERN CROSS FASTER CRUISER

Won Cup in Race Which Was One of Features of Victoria Day Celebration at Port Simpson

After a close contest over a ten mile course, honors were captured by the mission boat Northern Cross which was only about a minute and a half ahead of Dr. Sager's Leila. ALBERTA CONTROLS E.D. & B.C. RAILWAY SETTLES WITH BANK

(Edmonton Journal)

Thursday, Mr. Brownlee announced that they had been concluded. Two offers had been made by the bank and the government had decided to settle with it on the basis of one of them.

The province is to pay either \$1,275,000 in cash or \$1,300,000 spread over a period of ten years. These sums are much smaller than was asked by the bank in the first place. Its original price was \$2,400,000 and this was gradually reduced until \$1,500,000 had been reached prior to the regular session of the legislature last winter. The government had offered \$1,000,000.

MOTORISTS SUPPORT FAMILY FATHER OF WHICH THEY KILLED

SHICKSHINNY, Pa., May 26.—Eight young men, riding in an automobile which ran down and killed Augustus Spayder, father of nine children, have chosen to maintain the family as a partial means of retribution.

In the meantime charges of manslaughter, pending against the eight, have been suspended pending the outcome of the experiment.

The father was killed while walking along the highway after obtaining medicine for a sick child, which later died. The motorists failed to stop after hitting Spayder but later were apprehended. When arraigned in court no defense was entered and no jury trial was asked. Counsel explained his clients had moved the widow and eight children here, that they might be more easily cared for, and that they planned to erect and furnish a home for the family at a cost of about \$5,000. Court suspended sentence to see how the experiment worked out.

RAILWAY MAY PAY ITS WAY

Hon. C. A. Dunning Thinks Interest Charges to Public May be Met this Year

RECAPITALIZATION PLAN

OTTAWA, May 26.—After reviewing the most successful year in the history of the Canadian National Railways, Hon. C. A. Dunning announced in delivering his first railway budget that "given a reasonably good harvest and freedom from traffic losses due to labor difficulties, it may be possible for the National Railways this year meeting the entire interest charges to the public." The minister's optimism was, he said, based on the fact that the earnings of the first quarter of this year were nearly six million dollars more than for the same period a year ago. The budget requirements this year were given as \$31,100,000.

Although the minister did not definitely state that the Government would wipe out the huge debt due the government on which it is his opinion and was that of his predecessor that the railway could never pay the interest, he hinted that something like that may be done and announced that Sir Henry Thornton was working out some kind of reorganization financial scheme involving readjustment of the railway capital.

MINING MEN ON WAY TO TERRACE TO RESUME WORK
