HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION STARTING AGAIN

FLYING BOAT HERE FROM SOUTH ENROUTE TO QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS

Provincial Government Resumes Kaien Island Road Work Tomorrow

Work will be resumed tomorrow morning by the provincial department of public works on the Kaien Island highway it was announced today. A good number of men will be employed, the work now starting to be on the continuation of grading. It is so expected this year to hard surface at least one mile of the government road, connecting with the splendid thoroughfare that has already been completed by the city to the city limits. The sum of \$25,000 is now available for the work, the undertaking of which at this time will be appreciated by men who may happen to be unemployed here.

MARRIED FOR MEAL TICKET

Resolution of Union of Young Woman With Aged Prairie Farmer Recommended by Chief Justice.

VANCOUVER, June 24. — Expressing regret that the court had not the jurisdiction to dissolve the union which was termed a "meal ticket marriage," Chief Justice Hunter in the Supreme Court here yesterday dismissed the petition of Grace May Shepherd, 31, for judicial separation from Francis Shepherd, 72, retired prairie farmer, whom she married in Victoria in November, 1922. "Dissolution of the marriage would be in the best interests of both parties and the public," said Mr. Justice Hunter who, nevertheless, rejected the wife's allegations of cruelty and desertion.

NOT IN FAVOR CENSURE VOTE

Winnipeg Labor Member Moves Sub-Amendment to Conservative Amendment on Customs Report.

OTTAWA, June 24. — After a nine-hour debate on Wednesday, S. Woodsworth, labor member for Winnipeg, moved a sub-amendment to the Conservative amendment on the customs report which asks that a judicial commission be appointed to investigate the administration of the customs department, thus eliminating the vote of censure on Hon. H. Bovin, minister of customs, and the government. The amendments will likely be voted on tonight.

SEA LIONS ARE BEING KILLED

Frenchy Bags 1956 on This Year's Expedition as Compared With 2827 Last.

NEW WESTMINSTER, June 24. — Back from a twenty-three day cruise on the Canadian fishery patrol vessel Givenchy, W. E. Galden, in charge of machine gun operations for the expedition, said that 1956 sea lions had been destroyed on the Virgin and Pearl Island rookeries as compared with 2827 last year. He explained that the drop was accounted for in a decrease in the number of sea lions which are being killed because they destroy the fish.

SURPLUS IS SHOWN BY B. C. PULP & PAPER CO., WHALEN SUCCESSOR

VANCOUVER, June 24. — A surplus of \$150,193 on March 31, after payment of all interest and depreciation charges, was shown by the B. C. Pulp & Paper Company, Limited, which took over the former Whalen plant, according to its balance sheet on April 30. The net profit for the month of April, after providing interest on bonds, but not depreciation, was \$58,124.

LAKELSE SPRINGS ARE UNEQUALLED

Largest in America with Depth Unknown—One of Nature's Wonders

There is nothing in Canada to equal the great hot springs at Lakelse lake, about ten miles from Terrace, says a C.N.R. publication. The analysis of the water in the springs is: Lithia, magnesia, soda and lime; temperature, 180 degrees Fahr.; circumference three hundred feet, the largest hot spring in America; depth unknown; elevation above Lakelse lake seventeen feet; volume of water flowing from spring is one hundred miner's inches.

These springs are one of Nature's wonders. The waters, which have to be piped to bath tubs in order to reduce the temperature, have curative virtues, as many persons afflicted with rheumatism and other ailments, external and internal, who have bathed in the water, can testify. There is no question but that Lakelse will become a great pleasure and health resort. Lakelse lake is situated in a beautiful Alpine district, being surrounded by mountains which carry on their crests glaciers and snow fields, which are always wildly picturesque, no matter what moods of weather prevail. There is good trout fishing in the lake and inflowing and outflowing streams, and game such as deer, caribou, goat and bear abound in the mountain fastnesses, furnishing good sport for devotees of rod and gun.

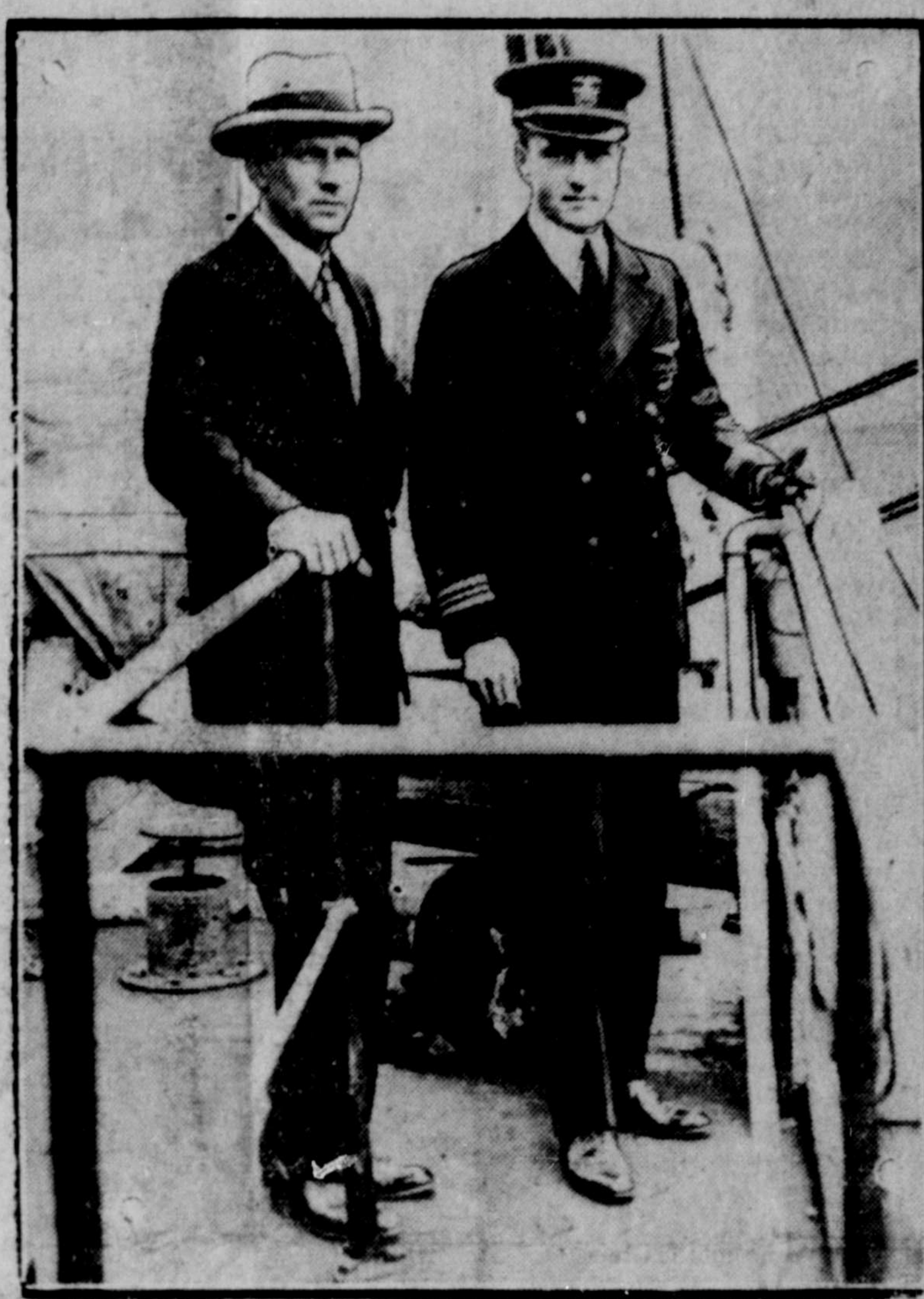
With all the attractions and a short mild winter, Lakelse will undoubtedly develop into an all-year-round resort, when proper accommodation has been provided for visitors. A number of Prince Rupert people have established summer cottages on the lake in the neighborhood of the springs. The number of such cottages is increasing every year. Terrace is now widely known for the excellence of the tree and vine fruits produced there. There is a good road, and auto service from the town to the lake and boat to the springs, but the housing accommodation at the present time is very limited and rather primitive.

Port Essington Springs

On the Skeena river, six miles east of Port Essington, there is a group of springs that are frequented every week of the year, by quite a number of people seeking cures for various ailments. Indian and Japanese fishermen know the medicinal virtues of these springs and repair there at week-ends to bathe and drink the waters. Analysis of mineral water: Lithia, lime and soda, in the form of chlorides and sulphates. The lithia present gives the water a medicinal value. It is said that plans are now being made for the erection of a hotel on the site. The springs are reached from Haysport a few miles east of Prince Rupert. A ferry boat service is available from that point to Port Essington.

WOULD CONTROL SALMON CANNING

Toronto Concern Trying to Bid in B. C. Packers on Open Market With View to Consolidation.

MONTREAL, June 24. — A Toronto financial house is endeavoring to secure control of the B. C. Fishing & Packing Co. through purchase of stock on the open market, according to a local financial service story. If successful, consolidation with one or two large competing companies in British Columbia will be sought. The name of the Gosse Packing Co., Ltd., is associated with the B. C. Packers in these rumors.

TWO MEN KILLED IN ALERT BAY LOGGING

White Man and Jap Lost Their Lives As Result of Accidents Last Week.

VANCOUVER, June 24. — Fred Miller, 24, and Uichi Watanabe, a Japanese, were both killed in up the coast logging accidents last week, according to word received by the provincial police. Alert Bay coroner's juries found that both fatalities were accidental.

WIRE TROUBLE TODAY

After Arduous and Much Delayed Flight Up Coast, Whale Spotting Plane Arrives Here from Victoria

After an arduous and much delayed trip up the coast, Lieut. J. A. Reece arrived here by airplane at 8 o'clock last night from Victoria en route to the Naden Harbor whaling station where he will be stationed this summer in connection with the "spotting" of whales, for the Consolidated Whaling Corporation, and will also carry out certain work in connection with the salmon patrol in that district.

While on the flight from the south foggy weather had been encountered, which had considerably delayed his arrival, and it was necessary to make a landing at Storm Islands, off Hardy Bay, where he remained that night. Previous to that he had been delayed for several days at Alert Bay.

It had been Lieut. Reece's intention to hop-off early this morning for the islands, but a heavy fog prevented it. The plane was towed by tender to the Digby Island marine station this morning, where certain adjustments will be made. Lieut. Reece will continue the flight to Naden Harbor early tomorrow morning, weather permitting.

Two American and Six Canadian vessels Sold Their Catches at Exchange This Morning.

Halibut arrivals marketed at this port today totalled 134,000 pounds, two American vessels disposing of 75,000 pounds and six Canadians landing 59,000 pounds. Prices were from 15.4c and 9c to 15.7c and 8c for American fish and from 14.4c to 8c and 15.3c and 9c for Canadian.

LONDON, June 24. — Oakhill, at Ipswich, the beautiful residence and estate of the late Sir Daniel Goddard, has been offered to the Institute of Journalists by Thos. Parkington, a councillor of Ipswich, as a home for veteran newspaper writers or their dependents.

The gift was announced by Sir Robert Bruce, editor of the Glasgow Herald, president of the institute at a luncheon in his honor, and it was stated that a committee of British and overseas journalists had been appointed to prepare plans for administration of the home.

REDUCTION IN POSTAL RATES

Letters May Be Mailed For Two Instead of Three Cents After July 1.

Reduction in letter rate of postage from three to two cents, as announced in the Federal budget, goes into effect on July 1. On and after that date the rate of postage on letters for Canada, the United States, Mexico and all other places in the North American Continent will be two cents for each ounce or fraction thereof.

The two-cent letter rate will apply on letters posted in Canada addressed to: Canada—for local delivery and to all places within the Dominion; the United States, Newfoundland, Mexico, British West Indies (Bermuda, St. Kitts, Antigua, Montserrat, Dominica, St. Lucia, Barbados, St. Vincent, Grenada, Trinidad, Bahamas, Jamaica, British Guiana, British Honduras), Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Dutch West Indies (Aruba, Bonaire, Curacao, Saba, St. Eustatius, St. Martin), French West Indies (Martinique, Guadeloupe), Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras Republic, Salvador, St. Pierre and Miquelon.

MINIMUM WAGE LUMBER TRADE

No Less Than 40c Per Hour May Be Paid After Nov. 1, Administration Board Rules.

VANCOUVER, June 24. — Effective November 1, all men engaged in the lumber industry in British Columbia will receive a minimum wage of 40c per hour, it is announced by the administration board of the new minimum wage act. The order includes "all operations in connection with logging, shingle mills, box factories, pulp and paper mills, veneer plants and cooperages" in which industries approximately 10,000 persons are employed.

JACK BARNESLEY RESIGNS POST

Agent of Union Steamship Co. for Eight Years Moves to Vancouver.

Jack Barnesley, who has acted as local agent for the Union Steamship Co. and the Dominion Express Co. for the past eight years, has resigned his position and will, in all probability, be succeeded by R. M. Smith, now acting purser on the steamer Cardena.

Mr. and Mrs. Barnesley will locate permanently in the south. Mrs. Barnesley, who is now in Vancouver, will return north prior to finally moving.

Immediate Outlook For City is Good

The quiet business conditions now reported to be prevailing in Prince Rupert can be easily explained and might have been anticipated to a certain extent. There has not been a big building program here like there was last spring and the season in various tributary industries has been quite late in opening. The prospects from now on, however, are good. Halibut fishing is at its height and the salmon canning season which gives promise of being profitable for all concerned, has just started. In a very short time these and other industries will have their effect in improving general business here. With the chances of grain being shipped through the elevator this year, with a new mill under construction at Seal Cove, etc., indications are that the coming fall and winter will probably be busier in this town than at any such time in Prince Rupert's history.

Customs Report and Political Capital

Attempts to make political capital out of the disclosures of the inquiry are futile. Officials appointed by both parties are among those recommended for dismissal, and there is every indication that many of the illegal practices disclosed have been going on for years. The indiscretions of Civil Service Commissioners, for example, involved one who was formerly a Conservative member of parliament. The Collector of Customs of Montreal recommended for dismissal was a Conservative appointee. On the other hand, Hon. Jacques Bureau, who is censured in the report, was Minister of Customs until a short time ago and is now a member of the Senate. The matter is too important to be treated by either party as a political stinkpot. What the country wants is a reorganization complete and effective enough to prevent a recurrence of the illegalities disclosed by the recent inquiry under the auspices of any political party.—Victoria Times.

Religious Beliefs of Experienced Men.

Prof. F. W. Kerr, former pastor of the Presbyterian Church here and now at Knox Church, Winnipeg, in a recent sermon discussed a series of articles that had appeared dealing with the religious beliefs of Canadian writers and men of politics. All these writers, Prof. Kerr stated, expressed their conviction in regard to a future life, but they differed somewhat in their conception of it. Likewise, in all cases, the imagery of this future life had undergone considerable change since their childhood days. All showed that many childhood beliefs had been discarded, and the outlook of a few had grown very philosophical. Prof. Kerr said he had noticed an effort to get down to fundamentals and essentials in almost all the articles. He noticed that several of the writers believed less than they did when they were children—that is, they believed in fewer ideals, but these few with deeper conviction. All, he said, welcomed a revelation of God, coming from science as well as from the Bible. All seemed to agree with the statement of Prof. Coleman, who said, "Nature and the Bible are both trustworthy in their own spheres. There is no conflict between them."

Prof. Kerr said that he noticed a slightly regrettable tendency in the articles to veer away from a belief that God is all-important to the world. Some seemed to have assumed an almost too-philosophical viewpoint, and lacked the passionate belief in God which was to be desired. "This was the only fault he could find with the religious beliefs of the writers, he said.

MINING ACTIVE STEWART AREA

Interesting Review of Operations
Contained in Northwest
Mining Service

The following interesting review of mining developments in the Stewart district is contained in Northwest Mining Service, a Spokane publication:

Development of the main high grade ore shoot in the central portion of the B.C. Silver Company's property is demonstrating that it is a real bonanza ore body. Ore is being sacked just as it is broken in the up-raise, without the necessity of any sorting whatever. The showing in this section of the company's ground is so promising that B.C. Silver is now recognized as a definite rival to Premier Gold, with a good prospect of ultimately having a similar record for production and dividends.

No decision appears to have been arrived at yet as to how the development of the other high-grade ore shoot in B.C. Silver Company's ground is to be achieved. It has long been positively known that the main Premier ore shoot passes into B. C. Silver ground on the Premier No. 3 and No. 4 levels. Ore could therefore most easily be extracted through the Premier workings by some arrangement with that company. Unless some such arrangement is made, it will be necessary to drive a new tunnel on the B. C. Silver Company's property to attain the requisite depth or to sink a winze from the No. 2 level. Pending a decision on this point work is not being pushed in that section of the B. C. Company's holdings, as it is elsewhere on that property.

Hitting the Ball

Premier Gold is hitting the ball in all departments and its new shoot of high-grade is more than maintaining its recent promise. The Premier Company has definitely turned down its option on Indian Mines, although for a long time it was considered certain by everybody here, including some of the resident officials of the Premier, that the option would be exercised.

Sebakwe is going ahead in an energetic manner, drifting and cross cutting. On the Big Missouri, a new drift has been started to open up further ore and the outlook for the property is considered very satisfactory. A lot of work is to be done on the Silver Crest this summer. Dunwell is preparing for immediate stoping on the No. 3 level and drifting in two tunnels at a depth of approximately 100 feet in one, and in the other on the lowest level at a depth of 1009 feet, with a view to striking a ledge carrying high-grade ore similar to the Premier lynch against the Victoria claims. It will be fall before this work is completed.

Extensive Campaign

Snow is all gone up to the timber line now and various properties are getting started on an extensive summer campaign, the results of which will not materialize until fall or later, since mines are not made in a day. Initial development work involves a good deal of luck and requires both nerve and patience as the tribulations of a young mine are invariably numerous. This district has passed through a lot of the trials incident to early exploitation of its properties and on the whole has proved itself deserving of development directed by sound common sense and business judgment. Capital is coming in freely now from British, American, Eastern Canadian and other sources, so that the cheaper stocks, if well selected, should provide interesting speculative possibilities.

QUEEN CHARLOTTE

The fish packer Jedway has gone out to Hippo Island to buy springs for the B.C. Packers. Capt. Hann of Sandspit has taken the Jedway for the trip. It is reported that there is a big run of springs at Hippo.

Capt. Jack Kemp leaves this week for the mainland on the seifer Agnes C. to seine for sockeye for the B.C. Packers. The crew is comprised of local men.

INDIAN AGENT GYRO SPEAKER

W. E. Collison Gives Address on
Native Customs and
Traditions.

A highly interesting discourse on the traditions and ancient customs of the natives of this district was delivered by Indian Agent W. E. Collison before the Gyro Club yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Collison opened by referring to the great advance that had been made by the Indians in the period of the last 100 years in which time they had risen from practical barbarism to the full state of civilization. No Indians on the North American continent had advanced so rapidly or had become more civilized than the Tsimpsians or Haidas.

Within a distance of 100 miles of Prince Rupert were to be found five distinct tribes of Indians, none of which spoke the same language and whose peoples did not know each other. The Tsimpsians had come as their tribal name indicated from "out of the Skeena."

The origin of the Indians of this district was not definitely known, but ethnologists were of the opinion that they had reached here in the far distant past from Asia. Wherever they had come from, their language indicated that they had originated from some highly educated race. There was no language, Mr. Collison declared, that was more perfect than that of the Haidas. It had set grammatical rules and was capable of as clear and beautiful expression as was the English language itself.

Mr. Collison went at some detail into the former customs and traditions of the natives. In closing he referred to the native totem pole lore stating that totems were not, as many people thought, idols or religious symbols.

In the course of his address, Mr. Collison made a plea for the preservation of the ancient native lore and art which was rapidly passing and which, in a few years, would have entirely disappeared.

President Stan Taylor presided at the luncheon and, beside Mr. Collison, the guests included T. A. B. Ferris, Vancouver; Mr. Everett, Philadelphia furniture manufacturer, and David Thomson, Will Kergin, Fred Kergin and Jarvis McLeod.

It is expected that the Gyros will be addressed at a special meeting next week by Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands.

In The Letter Box

SKIDEGATE NARROWS.

Editor, Daily News. Skidegate Channel, which divides Graham and Moresby Islands of the Queen Charlotte group, is a body of water about 28 miles long. Midway through this channel is what is known as Skidegate Narrows. There are two such narrows—the east narrows and west narrows—about two miles apart. At low tide it is impossible for small boats to go through these narrows as they practically go dry.

There is no body of water in Northern B.C. where there is more traffic than there is in Skidegate Narrows. It is used by the New England Fish Co., Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., B.G. Packers, Maritime Fisheries, Lockport Canning Co., all local trollers, habit boats that ply in and out of Prince Rupert and a large number of American boats.

The Canadian government, both Conservative and Liberal, has been petitioned to have these narrows dredged out so as to allow larger boats to run through but nothing has been done. The Conservative government did put in three wooden beacons but that is all.

Large boats that draw over seven feet of water have to make the extra run of over 150 miles along a rough, uncharted and unlighted coast when coming to Prince Rupert with their catches and this often means that the fishermen are held up on account of bad weather, losing most of their catch which spoils on account of being kept too long.

The dredging of Skidegate Narrows would not be a big job. It would simply mean the deepening of the channel and the diversion of the mouths of two streams that empty into it. These streams, when the winter freshets come, run tons of gravel and rock into the channel thus forming gravel and sand bars. If the courses of these creeks were changed and the dredging undertaken, the channel would gradually deepen itself.

We think it is high time the government should do something for the fishermen. So far the only representatives of our government we have seen have been a seaplane to see that the poor fishermen did not get within the fishing boundaries and a steamer which comes into Skidegate Inlet once a year with a lot of brass buttons on board.

So we are asking you, Mr. Editor, to take up this matter for us through the columns of your valuable paper.

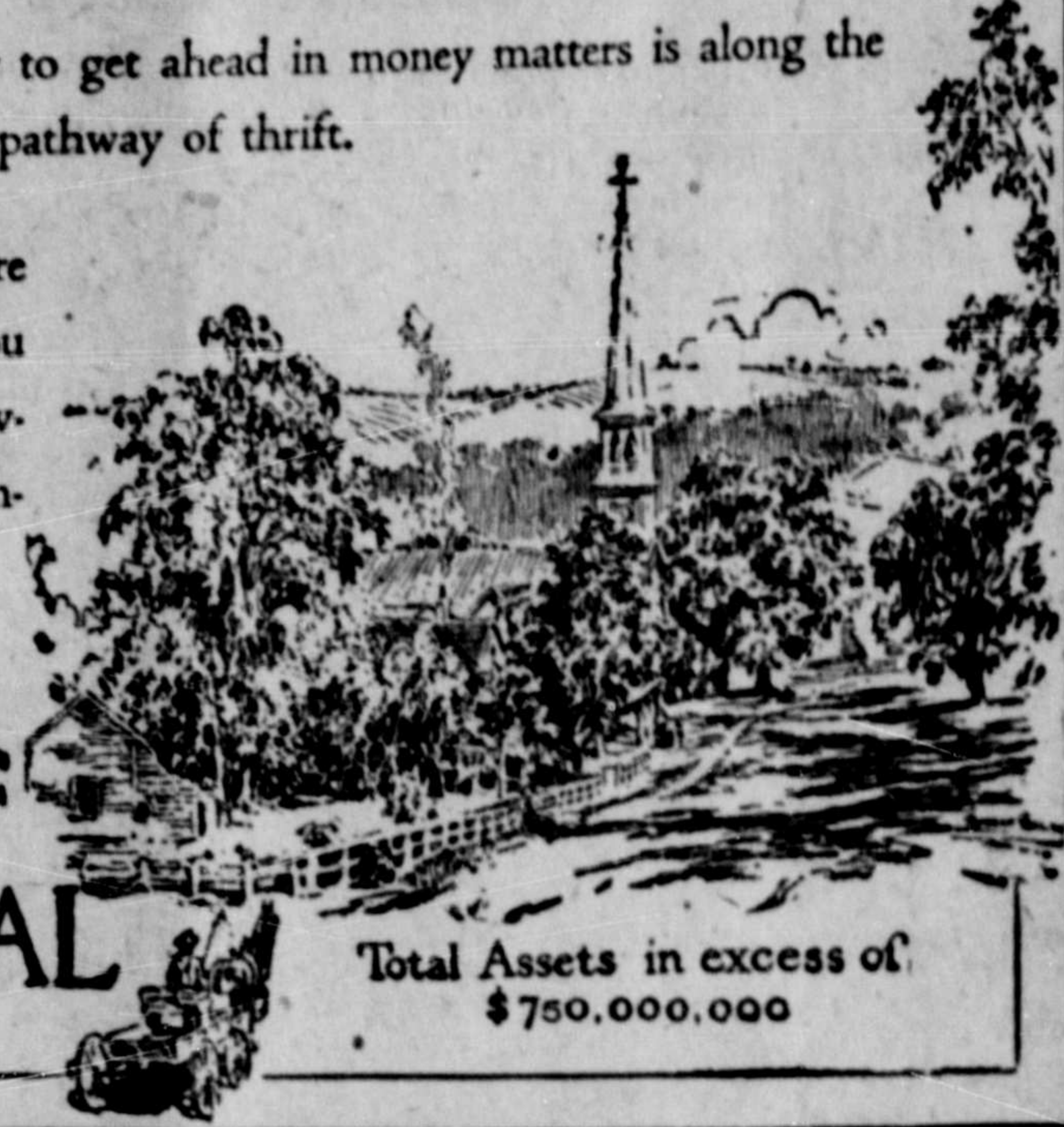

FLORIDA HOTEL RATES HAVE SLIPPED BACK IN LAST FEW WEEKS

MIAMI, June 24.—Hotel accommodations in Florida, which a few weeks ago cost on an average of \$25 a day, may be had now at from \$5 to \$7 a day, indicating, according to a close observer of business conditions in the state, a slip-back to what he regards as sound economic rates. He says that the tendency is general in this direction. The first break in the upward flight of speculation came last fall. There is a growing interest in substantial lines of development, such as the cultivation of the soil and the proper improvement of locations which warrant development, in his opinion.

This observer says the future of Florida is good despite the stories of pending disaster which have trickled through into the North. The real estate hysteria will be followed by a soberness of purpose which will build on a foundation that could not have been obtained in any other way than by the speculation which has dominated everything in the state for several years. What Florida has experienced will do her more good than harm when measured over a period of years. In one respect it has made the state one of the best known in the country.

EVENING DRESS RULE RESTORED IN LONDON

Tuxedos and "Plus Fours" No Longer Allowed in Covent Garden.

LONDON, June 23.—Evening dress is recovering from the wounds it received during the Great War. The manager of Covent Garden, the home of opera in England, has announced it is obligatory for evening dress to be worn in the boxes, orchestra stalls and dress-circle seats. In the years immediately following the war the tuxedo walked in where before only evening dress had dared to tread. Worse than that, even "plus fours" were seen there. In King Edward's reign no operagoer would have dared to enter the portals of Covent Garden in anything but evening dress.

FRENCH SCRIBES TO WEAR HIGH HATS SO THEY MAY BE KNOWN

PARIS, June 24.—Parisian newspaper reporters may wear high hats when covering assignments where trouble is likely to arise. Not as a matter of protection, but of identification. Instances of reporters being injured in street frays have grown quite common, not due to the police growing more ferocious but because they are unable to distinguish between rioters and reporters. French newspaper writers are beginning to appeal on the scene of manifestations rather than remaining behind police lines and waiting for the news to reach them—as once was the custom.

A. T. Eckoff was fined \$50, or as an alternative 30 days imprisonment, by Magistrate McClymont in the city police court this morning on a charge of keeping liquor in a public place.

MILITARY GUARD FOR IMMENSE STILLS IS FOUND IN CALIFORNIA

SAN FRANCISCO, June 24.—One hundred thousand gallons of mash, 500 gallons of alcohol, two large stills and a powerful donkey engine, all guarded by a watch tower 500 feet high and automatic rifles with thousands of rounds of ammunition, were discovered by federal prohibition agents in a canyon at Point Reyes, Marine county.

R. Luechesi, proprietor of a neighboring trout farm, was arrested near the plant. A five mile wooden flume supplied water for the operations.

The watch tower was fitted up like a miniature arsenal with loop holes in the walls. Hundreds of summer cottages are situated less than a quarter of a mile from the plant.
