Kergin Makes Fighting Speech in Which he Scores Brady and Shows up his Inconsistencies

Fred Stork Lays Out Clearly the Liberal Policy and Tells of the Effect it has had of Recent Years

ALICE ARM, Sept. 11.—One of the clearest, sanest and most forceful political speeches ever delivered in Alice Arm was that of Fred Stork. Practically the entire voting strength of the camp was in attendance, and Mr. Stork was listened to with rapt attention throughout his entire speech. His address was free from mud slinging, destructive criticism, exaggeration or misleading statements. There was no heckling, and not once by word or deed did Mr. Stork refer to his Conservative opponent.

In the main his speech was one extolling the might and glory of the nation, and the nationhood of Canada—a Canada rich in the wealth of natural resources, a country favored geographically, a country filled with a people of energy, initiative and achievement, and a country, the chief concern of whose representatives at Ottawa should be the carrying out of a constructive program of legislation on a broad policy and looking toward the future greatness of the country.

LADIES ARE ADDRESSED

A. for Victoria, are speakers at a ladies' meeting being held this afternoon in the Commodore Cafe in the interests of J. C. Brady, Conservative candidate for Skeena in the federal election. Miss Blanche MacDonald is presiding.

THIRTY PUPILS ARE ON STRIKE

Objection Taken to Transfer from One School to Another.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 11.—With the support of their parents, thirty pupils of the school at East Killbuckan, the adjoining municipality, are on strike against an order of the school board to compel them to walk a mile to school. The authorities said the transfer of the pupils from one school to the other was necessary owing to the overcrowded condition of other schools in the district.

SPAIN RESIGNS FROM LEAGUE OF NATIONS

GENEVA, Sept. 11.—Following rejection of her demand for a permanent seat in the League of Nations council, Spain today resigned from the League.

Reviewed Budget
Mr. Stork reviewed the Robb budget, and told of the reduction of the taxation of the Canadian people. He referred to the trade policy of the Mackenzie King administration, and spoke of the wisdom of the enactment of the preferential tariff treaties with other nations. A country's exports, said Mr. Stork, were an index of the prosperity of its people, and that the opening up of these markets for the exportation of Canadian goods was bringing prosperity to the Canadian people, as the heavy favorable trade balance conclusively proved.

H. F. Kergin, M.P.P.
H. F. Kergin, M.L.A., who preceded Mr. Stork introduced his remarks by giving a short history of the Liberal and Conservative parties. He showed that the Liberal party and policies had ever been for the enactment of legislation of initiative and achievement, for the setting forward of constructive legislation, for the rebelling against any infringement of the liberties or rights of the people. In fact that the very word Whig as applied to the Liberals was a Scotch word and meant rebel and King John of England in his day had felt the power of the Liberals when he sought to oppress them.

Continuing further, Mr. Kergin launched into a scathing attack against J. C. Brady, the Conservative standard bearer for this riding. "I feel ashamed, as a Canadian," (continued on page 2)

FIRST VOTES ARE POLLED

Twenty-Four Persons Voted at Advance Poll Last Night.

Almost as many votes were cast at the first night of the election advance polls last evening than there were altogether in the advance poll at last year's election. Last night there were 24 votes as compared with 30 altogether last year. The ballots of the advance poll are not opened till the night of the election, next Tuesday. This poll, at which commercial men, sailors and railway employees are allowed to vote, will be held again tonight and Monday night between the hours of 7 and 10 in the office of the returning officer, Westenhaver Block.

J. O. Williamson is deputy returning officer with J. A. Morris, poll clerk. Government Agent Norman A. Wall is in attendance to issue voting certificates and the scrutineers are H. R. Love and Harvey Fraser.

ELIGIBILITY OF CANDIDATE

Joseph Graham Comments on Report That He Could Not Sit in House.

MERRITT, Sept. 11.—Referring to a despatch intimating that there was doubt of Joseph Graham's eligibility to contest Cariboo riding, the candidate stated that he was born in Scotland, although he spent a short time in the United States. When a miner in Nevada he took out naturalization papers, but automatically continued his British citizenship on his arrival in Canada.

BOMB THROWN AT MUSSOLINI

Hit Glass of Car and Did Not Explode Until After Premier Had Passed.

THROWER WAS ARRESTED

Police Have Difficulty in Defending Perpetrator From Crowd.

ROME, Sept. 11.—The third attempt on the life of Mussolini since he became premier was made today when a bomb exploded against the Premier's car as he was proceeding to the palace but the Fascisti head escaped unhurt.

A young Italian stone mason by the name of Giovanna, who was arrested, threw a bomb against the auto in which Mussolini was riding but the missile struck the window glass and fell to the ground before exploding. The auto proceeded. A terrific explosion followed and four passers by were wounded.

The police had a strenuous time protecting the bomb thrower from the threatening crowd, several civilians and police being injured in the struggle.

Giovanna entered Italy from Switzerland and the police believe the attempt on the Premier's life was planned by exiled Fascisti in Lyons and Paris.

Mussolini maintained his accustomed calm and continued to the palace.

MAPPING EXPEDITION OF ALASKA'S SOUTHBOUND

JUNEAU, Sept. 11.—After photographing 12,000 square miles of southern Alaska, the mapping expedition consisting of the tender Gannett and three naval planes are southbound today for the winter.

Nickerson Reports to Board of Trade in Optimistic Vein Regard Islands Service and Grain Trade

The most interesting part of the report of G. W. Nickerson to the Board of Trade last night in connection with his recent visit to Vancouver was a statement that B. C. Keeley, Pacific Coast manager of the Canadian National Steamships, had put in a tender for the Islands service which would give 80 trips a year out of this port and, if the contract was secured, arrangements were made for the boat to be built at the Prince Rupert shipyards. Plans were already prepared for this.

Mr. Nickerson said he found in Vancouver a strong sentiment in regard to the importance of this port and an optimistic vein. There was no doubt about the wheat moving through the port. Mr. Clendenning, who is doing the chartering, stated that all boats are under option to load at Prince Rupert if required at an additional nine pence a ton. However, this was not a set rate for all vessels. Representatives of one of the big Japanese steamship lines whom he had seen had given the opinion that they could load at Prince Rupert cheaper than at any other port. The difficulty was that most Japanese ports were looking for other cargo to go with wheat. Only three deckers took wheat only. They liked logs or lumber for filling in. Mr. Nickerson saw in the development of business with Alaska a remedy for this as the vessels could load grain here and complete the cargo at Alaskan ports if it could not be secured here.

FAIR OPENS ON TUESDAY

Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, to Officiate at 7.30 p.m.

The Prince Rupert annual fall fair opens on Tuesday evening next at 7.30, Hon. T. D. Pattullo officiating. By that time the election will be over and people at the fair will get the returns there. Today Thomas Reid, Reeve of Surrey, arrived with the fruit and vegetables for the special display from the Fraser Valley and the grains and other parts of the exhibits were brought by Claire Le-max earlier in the week. The work of putting up this display is already well in hand and it will be itself well worth a visit to the fair.

The fair this year will be quite different from previous occasions. Considerable improvement has been made to the interior of the building and everything is differently arranged. Flower entries are coming in well and it is likely the local flower display will be the best ever seen. If the present fine weather keeps up, a special feature is being made of this and Manager Thomson invites all who have flowers to enter their exhibits at once or to contribute them for decorative purposes.

SPAIN VOTING ON GOVERNMENT

On Third Anniversary of Military Dictatorship Opportunity is Given For Opinion.

MADRID, Sept. 11.—Three years ago today Spain came under military dictatorship. Today all citizens, men and women over 18 years old, are being given an opportunity in a plebiscite to endorse the work and achievements of the De Rivera Government. Abstention from voting will indicate disapproval.

The voters are also expressing an opinion on the establishment of a national assembly.

Meighen Gets Desperate as he Sees his Chances Vanishing Says King

NAPANEE, Sept. 11.—The Prime Minister and minister of customs were both sharply attacked by Mackenzie King here last night, Meighen for recent references to the late Hon. George Bovin and H. H. Stevens for his use of House of Commons stationery in connection with the sale of oil company stock.

"I say Meighen does not represent the Conservative party. I say Conservatives all over the country are shuddering at the things he is saying," said Mr. King. "The Premier's reference to Bovin was the saddest incident in the history of the present campaign. He waited until the last week of the campaign to slander a man who is now dead," said Mr. King. "It is only fair to say he sees his chances vanishing and that he does things today which he would never do in his own sober mind."

It is Near the End; Let Us Summarize.

The political campaign is near the end, and many voters find themselves badly confused over the issues because of the many smoke screens drawn across the trail by those who would use the electors for their own purposes. Here are a few of the issues in rather brief form:

Stork will support Mackenzie King and tariff for revenue. Brady is openly and avowedly in favor of a higher tariff, which is a tax which the people of Canada must pay to make the Eastern capitalists richer.

Stork stands for representative government, with Parliament supreme. He also stands for old age pensions and has implemented his belief by action which the Tory Senate turned down.

Stork stands for making the taxes lower and has supported Mackenzie King in recent tax reductions, whereas Brady believes in higher taxes through the medium of an increased tariff.

Stork stands for elimination of duty from fishing and mining material and other articles used in the development of the natural resources.

Stork stands for extended markets through trade treaties and reciprocal action with other countries.

Stork stands for the utmost possible independence of Canada within the British Empire.

Stork believes in a square deal for all and no preference for the rich and no fish traps.

Stork stands for the continuous operation of the elevator by the Wheat Pool and the elevator stands an everlasting monument to Stork and a pledge of his sincerity in working for our interests.

A vote for Stork is a vote for ourselves, whereas a vote for Brady is a vote for the effete East which has bled the west long enough.

KERGIN MAKES FIGHTING SPEECH IN WHICH HE SCORES BRADY AND SHOWS UP HIS INCONSISTENCIES.

nadian, I feel ashamed for the Conservative party, that they have such a man as Mr. Brady as their leader. Mr. Brady, as revealed in his speeches, shows himself to be devoid of honor and to be utterly minus any political ability. In his speech here and in his Anyox speech he did not advance one point or discuss one single bit of legislation that should be enacted in that so far as the Canadian people are concerned would amount to the snap of your fingers."

To Purify Politics

Voice: "You did not hear him at Alice Arm; you do not know."

"All right, I did not hear him here, but I heard him at Anyox. And I will go further, if you can name one single constructive issue or point, anything he said that is of any value in a legislative way, I will give way and let you point it out. All right, can any of my Conservative friends in the hall point out anything that he said that was of any value. No one replies, and again I say that I feel ashamed for your candidate. Yes, I was at the Anyox meeting and I made several notes of statements made by Mr. Brady. Statements made by Mr. Brady, who told you here that he had entered this political contest to purify politics, to place political campaigns upon higher plane, and who further told you that for the love of country, to place altruism above self he had given up a job in Prince Rupert as school principal that was paying him more than he would get should he be sent to Ottawa.

"Let us listen to this candidate of the Conservatives from the rostrum at Anyox and be made to think and ponder by the profound discussion of the issues now before the voters of Canada; let us edify ourselves by absorbing his altruistic utterances. Here are some of his utterances, I quote from notes that I made at the time. He introduces himself to the audience by praising the value of the mining industry of the riding, he praised the Anyox mine and the Premier mine as two of the outstanding mines of the province, and the officials of whom should have great credit. But he revealed himself as the man he is when he concluded further by saying that 'these are not the only mines in your district, you have great wealth and possibilities; why I can point out in your district twenty mines as great, if not greater, than the Premier or the Anyox mine here.' 'Now what kind of bunk is that? When did Mr. Brady blossom out as a prospector or mining man? I suppose if Mr. Brady is not sent to Ottawa, he will refuse to point out where these mines are, and the province will be short of the payrolls of twenty mines like the Granby and the Premier.

Trails and Roads

"And further along in this great speech of his, Mr. Brady launches into a discussion of the trails and roads of this riding. He said that 'they were woefully inadequate to the needs of the prospector, and badly in need of repairs. Put the Conservatives in power, send me to Ottawa,' says Mr. Brady, 'and all this will be speedily righted.' 'And further Mr. Brady said that 'this road work was smeared with graft and corruption.' So much for Mr. Brady. His remarks that the Conservatives, if placed in power at Ottawa, would remedy the alleged road evils only reveals the futility of his speeches, shows his utter lack of comprehension of the affairs of government, since the road and trail work of B. C. is purely a provincial affair, and the Dominion government has nothing to do with it at all. And as to his accusation that the road and trail work was smeared with graft and corruption, I take that as a direct insult to me, since this work is in my riding and is a provincial matter. And this from Mr. Brady, the school principal who enters this political race from altruistic motives, and would put the discussions in this campaign upon a high plane. And I have further notes.

Political Ranting


"Mr. Brady, the school principal, holds up the high places of office of the government of Canada to ridicule and derision. This school principal who has taught our children, this man who has lectured them in civics, in political economy, in the wisdom and the value of our form of

government, who has pointed out to them the debt that we owe to the fathers of confederation, and to the others that have followed them, this man who must have pointed out to them the sacredness and trust of a political office, and this school principal who must have pointed out to them that the greatest gift in the hands of the Canadian people, the culminating point of Canadian statesmanship was the Premiership at Ottawa. And in what light does Mr. Brady hold up the Premiership of Canada to an Anyox audience? He works himself up to a high pitch, and rantingly crossing the stage, he says: 'Mr. King is a liar, Mr. King is a crook, Mr. King is a grafter, Mr. King is a traitor.' He infers that the calibre of the man who occupies the Premier's chair should not be any greater than the underworld politician who controls a few votes in a slum district.

Right Arm Cut Off

"And here is a further note that I made. This shows how earnestly Mr. Brady feels the need, and the desire to discuss the real issues of the campaign before the Canadian people, and who will not be side-stepped into the indulgence of personalities or the discussion of frivolities. Listen to this great contribution of Mr. Brady to the solving of Canada's ills. Discussing Mr. Stork and the Liberal party Mr. Brady crosses the stage, and dramatically holding out his right arm exclaims: 'I would have my right arm cut off before I would vote for Fred Stork and the Liberal Government.' I ask you as voters of Canada, when has the cutting off of the right arm of Mr. Brady become an issue in the campaign for the Premiership of the Dominion of Canada? Again, I say, in listening to Mr. Brady I felt ashamed as a Canadian."

Apostles of Purity Who are Charging Liberals With Being Party to Smuggling Operations

The Conservative party has been coming before the electors all over the country as the apostles of purity and the speakers have been haranguing from every platform on the alleged sins of the Liberals, using the Customs probe as a text and trying to vilify some members of the Liberal Government for things which mostly Conservative appointees to the positions have been responsible for. In view of this Liberals have been looking up the records of the Conservative leaders, some of them members of the Meighen cabinet, and here is what they have found in the official records:

W. A. Boys, Ex-M.P.

Used his prestige as a member of Parliament to prevent the punishment of Daivey Wasberg who was convicted of smuggling goods into Canada and of attempting to bribe a customs officer. (Vide pages 1639-1646, 1661-1667, 1915-1916, 1919-1922).

W. A. Black, Minister of Railways

Pickford & Black, Limited, of which firm Mr. W. A. Black is the senior member, are managers of a steamship line operating between Halifax and the West Indies. Numerous fines have been imposed on vessels of this line for smuggling liquor, etc., into Canada. Preventative files affecting these vessels were in the hands of the committee but no evidence on them were taken. At least one fine was imposed on one of these vessels while the committee was sitting. (Vide minutes of proceedings of committee, March 7, April 6, April 9).

Thomas Cantley, Ex-M.P.

This member is still the registered owner of the schooner "Victorian" confiscated by the United States government last January for rum running into the United States.

Mr. Cantley states that the vessel was sold time ago to a "Charles Strafford." This gentleman cannot be located by either the United States or Canadian governments or by Mr. Cantley who has expressed the desire to turn the vessel over to Mr. Strafford. (Vide Return to the House last Session, No. 166).

R. B. Hanson, Ex-M.P.


Was suspended by the Appeal Division of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick for a year, from April 23rd, 1926, as a barrister, on charges of professional misconduct preferred by the secretary of the New Brunswick Barristers' Society. One specific charge was that Mr. Hanson had caused a decree of the court to be changed and used it, knowing it to be changed. The Council of the Barristers' Society unanimously found Mr. Hanson guilty and so reported to the Supreme Court. In giving judgment on this charge, Justice Hazen, an old political friend of Mr. Hanson, stated in part: "This charge (that of causing the falsification of a Decreeal order) was of a most serious nature and criminal in character. The court held that in a criminal charge of this nature the accused should have the benefit of the doubt." In this connection, he said that there might be a direct charge of perjury against Mr. Hanson, in which case that charge would be in another division of the court. The court therefore disagreed with the unanimous finding of the Council of the Barristers' Society which had declared Mr. Hanson guilty of causing falsification of the Decreeal order. The judgment stated that the court had power either to strike off the roll of barristers or to suspend any barrister of the court found guilty of professional misconduct. If Mr. Hanson had been found guilty of the first count, that of causing the falsification of the Decreeal order, there would have been no other course left open than to strike the accused's name off the roll. (Vide Supreme Court Reports, N.B., 1925, 1926).

A. deWitt Foster, Ex-M.P.

Was read out of parliament and out of the Conservative party on April 15, 1915, by the then Prime Minister of Canada, Sir Robert L. Borden, following the Report of the House Committee on Public Accounts enquiring into war appropriations. The Report of the Committee said in part as follows: "Your committee have had under consideration the purchase of horses for the Militia Department in the province of Nova Scotia, and beg to report to the House the evidence and documents in connection therewith. "Your committee are of the opinion that the evidence respecting the purchase of horses in Nova Scotia discloses circumstances of such an unsatisfactory character that further investigation and action are necessary, and they recommend that the said evidence and all documents in connection with the matters aforesaid be referred to the Department of Justice with instructions to make such investigation, and to institute such proceedings as may be found necessary to protect the public interest." (Vide Appendix No. 3, Part 2, to the Journals of the House of Commons, 1915). Also Hansard, 1915, page 2614.

Powell, to secure a number of valuable contracts from the Militia Department. The Report of the Committee said in part as follows: "Your committee ask leave to submit to the House, the evidence taken in respect to the contract for supplies purchased from Mr. E. Powell, and to express their opinion, that the contracts for such supplies do not appear to have been so worded as to fully protect the public interest. "Your committee therefore recommend that the evidence adduced, and all papers connected therewith be referred by the House to the Department of Justice, for any further investigation, if necessary, for the recovery of any moneys overpaid the holding back of any moneys not yet paid over, and the taking of such further action as may be warranted by the facts..." (Vide Appendix No. 3, Part 2 to the Journals of the House of Commons, 1915). Also Hansard, 1915, page 2614.

J. K. Flemming, Ex-M.P.

Forced to resign the premiership of New Brunswick by the exposure of his extortions from lumbermen and railway contractors. The Royal Commissioner appointed by his own government pronounced him guilty of trafficking \$75,000 from the timber limit holders of New Brunswick in addition to the percentage taken from every contractor on the Valley Railroad. (Vide Royal Commissions, N.B.).

Stewart McElenaghan, Ex-M.P.

Made a specialty of "Housewives" for soldiers. He secured the first order for 30,000 at 52 1/4 cents and swore before the Public Accounts Committee that he had figured that price so as to take care of his overhead. His total orders were for 100,000 all at the same price of 53 1/4 cents. (Vide Appendix No. 3, Part 2, to the Journals 1915).

A. J. Doucet, Ex-M.P.

Within the past five years the County of Kent, N.B. has become notorious through the government services for violations of the fishing and smuggling laws. Mr. Doucet has written the Fisheries Department repeatedly on behalf of the law-breakers in his constituency. (See confidential file).

Hon. Robert Rogers, Ex-M.P.

Vide Gall Report in Sessional Papers of the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba, 1917. Justice Gall said in part: (6) "I can give no credence whatever to Mr. Roger's fourth and final statement..." (7) The position taken by Mr. Rogers... was merely a desperate attempt to escape from an awkward dilemma. (7) I find upon the evidence that he (Rogers) gratuitously offered Mr. Carter the privilege of increasing his tender, and Carter acted accordingly..."

Geo. B. Jones, Minister of Labor

Mr. Jones figured prominently in the war-time patriotic potato scandal in New Brunswick and was censured by the local House for his connection therewith.

W. F. Garland, Ex-M.P.

WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Deer Hunting Season Open Today--G. E. Foster off to Fishing Grounds--Bait Shortage in Alaska

The deer and mountain goat hunting season in this district opened today and will continue until December 15. Although the wary animals are usually rather high up this early in the fall, a number of parties will probably embark tonight or tomorrow morning on their first expeditions with the hope of bringing home a bag before bombarding starts generally in the woods and the animals are startled into their usual timidity. Over one hundred gun licenses have already been taken out. The bear season opens concurrently with the deer season today, but will continue until June 15, 1927. Bag limits are set similarly to last season with three male deer allowed each hunter for the season, two mountain goat, three bear of any kind and two grizzlies.

The duck season will open on October 15 continuing until January 31, while it will not be in order to seek geese until November 1 and from then on to February 15. The blue grouse season is open from today until October 31. Bag limits for birds will be 20 ducks daily or a total of 150, ten geese or a total of fifty, and grouse, five daily or a total of 50.

It is again being impressed upon hunters by the game department that Kaien Island is a game preserve upon which the shooting of any game is prohibited. Incidentally, a word for the wise may be that, with an officer now on the ground whose duties are solely to see that the game regulations are complied with, a better watch will be kept on hunting in this locality this season than there has been for several years. New regulations for trapping are also in force now. All trappers are required to register their trappings with the nearest provincial officer. As far as possible traplines applied should be the same as in all former applications. This rule applies only on the mainland, applications being unnecessary on the islands.

The Seal Cove Lumber Co.'s sawmill at Seal Cove started deliveries of halibut and salmon boxes to the trade last week. The mill has been steadily jutting lumber since its opening in April.

Commodore George Rorie has replaced the 10-12 h.p. two-cylinder Gray engine in the cruiser Nancy with a 16 h.p. four-cylinder Easthope. The latter motor is working well says Mr. Rorie although he has not yet had the opportunity of giving the speed a double-entry audit. Anyway, Mr. Rorie expects to add his own in the future with anyone else in the matter of speed and the result of the cruiser race at the next Yacht Club regatta is already settled.

The trawler G. E. Foster, chartered from the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage by the Rupert Marine Products Co. for the purpose of engaging in scrap fishing in Beale Straits for the Tucks Inlet by-products plant, left port on her initial trip on Thursday afternoon at two o'clock. The vessel had been steamed up on Wednesday at the cold storage wharf, where she had been lying cold for a year or more, and moved down to the Albert & McCaffery bunkers where she was coaled and outfitted. With Capt. E. Sanderson on the bridge and Chief Engineer Sidney Milne in charge of the engine room, the Foster left with G. G. Bushby, head of the R.M.P., and Mr. Reed, of the fisheries experimental station, on board. The vessel will probably be back in port on Monday so that the crew may have opportunity to vote.

Halibut Landings

With splendid fishing weather prevailing on the banks, the halibut schooners have been doing well lately and some big catches are to be recorded. Perhaps one of the best was that of the local schooner Scrub, Capt. Adolph Prince, which came in on Thursday morning with a load of 20,000 pounds after having been out only a week. In spite of somewhat of a glut on Tuesday morning after the holiday when 307,000 pounds was offered on the Exchange, prices have held up well and it is very gratifying to note that Canadian fish has commanded as high and sometimes higher prices than American. With a drop at the middle of this week when there was a big supply, the price for first class fish ranged from 13.3c to 15.6c.

The landings at this port for the week (Saturday to Friday inclusive) were well above average, totalling 860,000 pounds—637,000 pounds from American vessels and 223,300 from Canadian. This brings the total for the season to date to 19,938,600 pounds of which American boats landed 14,331,100 pounds and Canadian, 5,607,500 pounds.

A shortage of bait is reported from all Alaskan ports with the result that this week some of the big American schooners, which generally go to Ketchikan, were outfitted at this port. The Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. had a good supply of frozen bait here which it was expected would meet all the usual demands until the end of the season but bait is being now shipped by the carload to Ketchikan and it may become exhausted here. Before the close of the season on November 15 there is, therefore, the possibility of a general shortage of bait along the coast unless the herring make an early appearance in northern waters or some can be obtained from the salteries of western Alaska.

Though a few of the boys may take the opportunity to cast their votes at the advance poll, the most of them will exercise the franchise in the usual way at the election on Tuesday. With the Exhibition coming next week as well as the election, there will be a large number of fishermen—both trollers and halibuters—home and the prospects are for a big and diversified fishermen's vote and it will be by no means a one-sided one. Judging from the various arguments one hears along "the front" neither the hardware man nor the school teacher is going to capture the fishermen's vote in entirety.

Seining for chums is now practically finished on the Skeena River but the trollers are still busy with cohoes, the run of which has not been large yet but which is expected to improve. From the south end of the Queen Charlotte Islands come reports of a somewhat improved run of chums. Balmoral, Inverness, Sunnyside, and Prince Rupert of the Skeena River district canneries are still running, B. A. having just closed.

Last Sunday and the Labor Day holiday saw George Bryant on a trip to Khatda on board the cruiser Harka with a party consisting of Mr. Bryant, Bill Willisroff and the boys of both families. The party got all the trout they wanted at the popular resort as did a party consisting of M. L. Stepp, Harry Farr and Fred Grumble which went up by train and which came home on the Harka.

Returning at the end of the week from the Skikine River whence she had come with a liquor cargo, power boat 28 (Leila R.), Capt. Alex. Saint, since made trips to Anyox with the Oddfellows, to Porcher Island with the inspector of mines, and to Captain's Cove with the police to capture an alleged murderous Chinaman.

The cannery tender Nishga was in port on Thursday on her way from Claxton to Skidegate Inlet where she will be engaged for a while in chum packing.

The U.S. revenue cutter Cygan, Ensign Desses, called in port on Thursday, having come in from the sea where she had been out of Ketchikan for two days. The other U.S. rum chaser Smith, which was here last year, is now working out of San Francisco.

Twenty-two local Moose Legionnaires made a trip at the first of the week to Stewart and Hyder to attend initiation exercises and the Labor Day celebration at the northern points. The party made the voyage on the

halibut schooner Johanna, Capt. John Wick, leaving here Saturday night and returning Tuesday. They reported a most enjoyable trip with plenty of hospitality on the part of the mining camp residents. Among the party were Gillis Boyer, past great north moose; Fred Scadden, great north moose; B. J. Bacon, south moose; A. Ohnesang, east moose; Joe Slaggard, west moose, and Thor Johnson, herder.

Lighthouse tender Newington, Capt. Joe Peterson, left on Tuesday for Cape St. James and is expected back at the end of this week.

Capt. Kohrt, who returned with the Bonito recently from the Hippo Island and Massett Inlet vicinity, where he had been engaged in salmon trolling during the summer, will be leaving again in a day or so for Skidegate Inlet to engage in coho trolling for the remainder of the season.

Ballot box trips are being made to the Butedale and Kitimat region by the D.S.T., Capt. Jim Parsons; to the south end of the Queen Charlotte Islands by the Wigwam, Capt. Claude Kitchum, and to local points along the coast by the Kouyosou, Capt. Alex. Wylie. The boats will return with the boxes after the election.

Another robbery was reported on the waterfront this week. On Wednesday night McLean's boat-building shop was broken into and a crowbar, hammer, caulking cotton, copper paint and rope removed. The matter was reported to the police.

The Osumi, which has been packing for the Somerville Cannery, left this week for Aliford Bay.

Repairing Boats

The seine boat Shuchoda, which was badly damaged when she struck Hana rock in Dixon's Entrance recently, has been handed over by the underwriters to the owners, Tanaka Bros., and the dry dock has the contract for rebuilding.

The American halibut schooner Eureka, damaged a few weeks ago in a gasoline tank explosion, will be ready for sea again in a few days.

Nothing has yet been ordered to be done with the Lincoln, also badly damaged in an explosion, pending the adjustment of the estate of the owner, the late Capt. Martin Foltand.

There is again a lull in the repair and machine shops along the waterfront. With the salmon season practically over and only two more months of halibut fishing, as little work as possible is being done on the boats.

The keel is being laid at the Suga ways for a new 35 foot seine boat which will be placed in the yard's stock.

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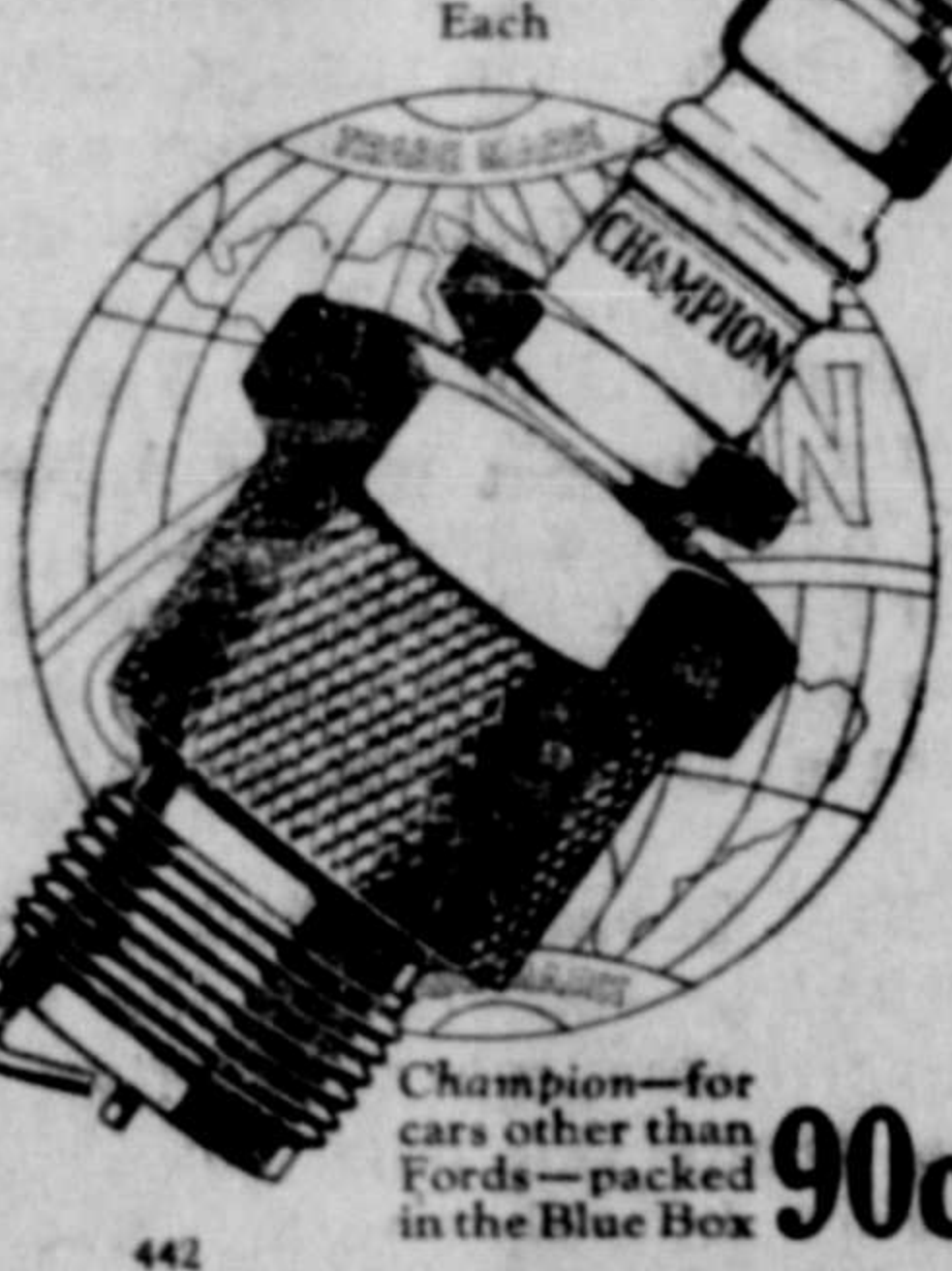
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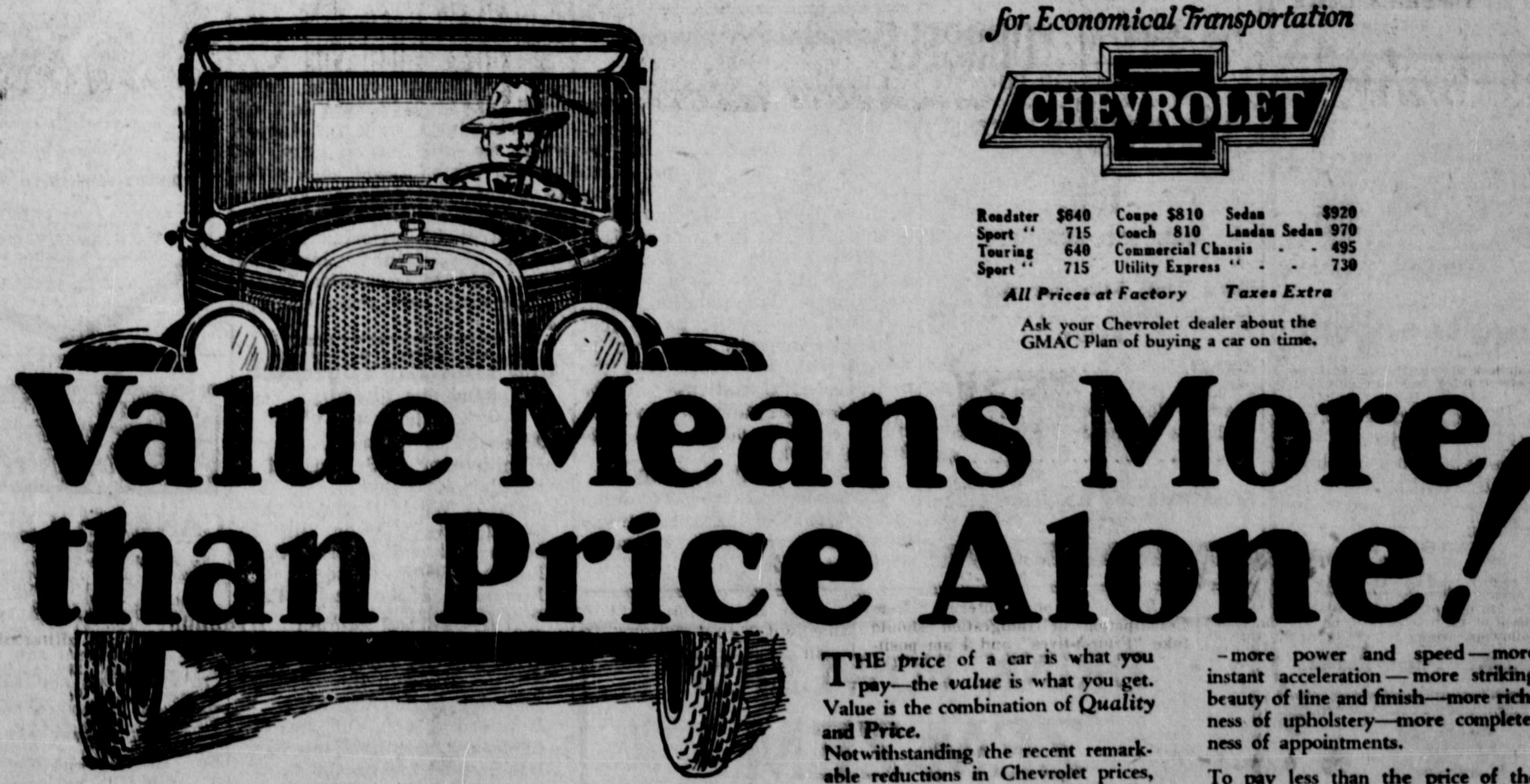

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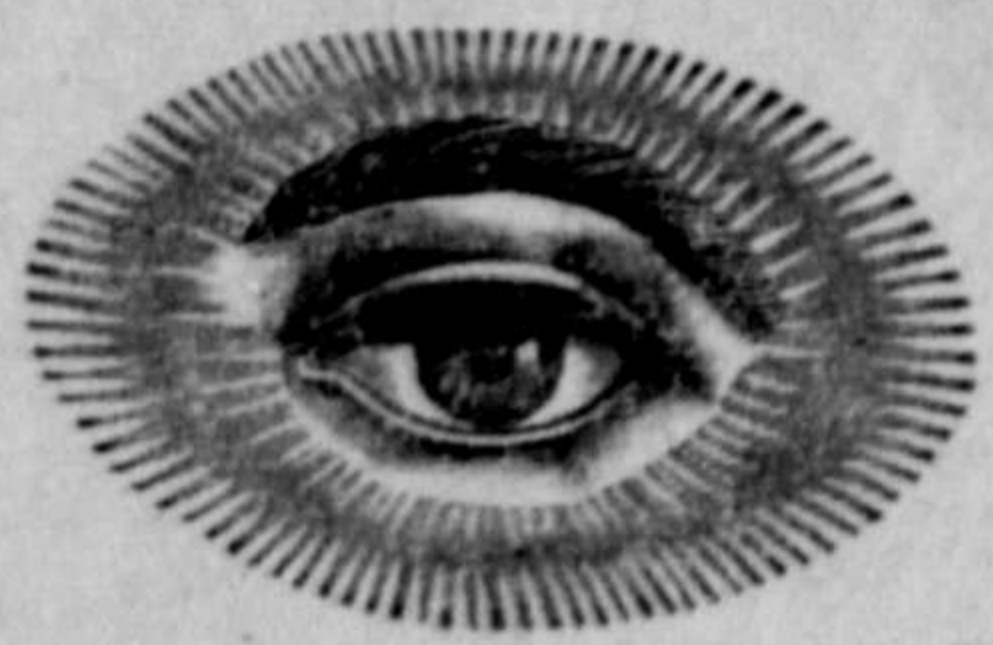
