





GENE TUNNEY WON WORLD'S CHAM-PIONSHIP FROM JACK DEMPSEY IN GRUELLING FIGHT

132,000 PEOPLE ATTEND

CHALLENGER CAME WITHIN ACE OF KNOCKING OUT CHAMPION IN FIRST ROUND

(Government Telepraphs) PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 24.—Gene Tunney won the heavyweight championship of the world in a pouring rain last night when he defeated Jack Dempsey in a savage ten-round battle to a decision. The fight went the limit and both judges were unanimous in declaring the blonde ex-Marine the winner. Tunney came within an ace of knocking Dempsey out in the first round when he planted a hard right to the jaw before the bell rang.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 23 (Ringside)-Although a thick haze consisting of tobacco smoke and partly of fog hung over the arena there was little time lost when the preliminary fights started at eight o'clock. Fifty thousand fight fans swarmed into the stadium while the coming was good before the last hour rush. Gaining in momentum as the hour for the title bout approached, the crowd reached a capacity gate of 132,-000 of which 127,000 were cash custom-

Just before the battle Tex Rickard announced officially a \$2,000,000 gate. He had not announced this previously he said for fear of injunctions.





BANKING WAS ROTARY THEME

D. C. PATERSON OF THE BANK OF MONTREAL TOLD HOW PUBLIC PROTECTED

Teiling some of the means taken by the Canadian banks to protect customers, D. C. Paterson, manager of the Bank of Montreal, gave an interesting address yesterday afternoon at the weekly lunchech of the Rotary Club.

Mr. Paterson explained that the Bank Act was revived every ten years. Banking affairs are administered by a board consisting of the minister of finance, the receiver general and five privy counillors. Their chief duties are to see that the regulations are complied with in the establishment of new banks and more particularly to deal with the amalgamation of banks.

The Bankers' Association consisting of the general managers of the banks controlled the clearing houses and had the custody of the central gold reserves. A Pacific branch had charge in this pro-

Another body known as the Central Gold Reserves was a trustee body consisting of four members, three appointed by the Bankers' Association and the other by the minister of finance.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural

Full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions to given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for

five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be For more detailed information see

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre.
