MEIGHEN STRIKES SNAG FILLING CABINET

REMOVAL OF DISCRIMINATORY MOUNTAIN RATE URGED ON RY. COMMISSION

Meighen Finding Difficulty in Completing His Cabinet in Quebec Delays Announcement

Mass meeting for Ottawa delayed until July 21 and election announcement may not be made until that date

OTTAWA, July 13.—Premier Meighen has practically all his cabinet formed except the representatives for the province of Quebec. There it is found difficult to secure men whom they think can carry their constituencies and Mr. Meighen does not want to be in the position of having to refill his cabinet after the election if he should be successful. Hon. E. L. Patenaude seems to be definitely slated for a position, but J. H. Fisher, frequently mentioned as a possibility, stated this afternoon that he was definitely out of it.

The only portfolios definitely filled up to this morning are stated to be:

Minister of finance, R. B. Bennett, of Calgary.

Minister of agriculture, Simon Fraser Tolmie, of Victoria.

Minister of railways, Sir Henry Drayton, of West York.

Minister of customs, H. H. Stevens, of Vancouver.

The allocation of other portfolios will depend largely on the action in regard to Quebec. It is thought Patenaude may be minister of marine, but until the difficulty in that province is settled no announcement will be made.

The mass meeting scheduled for Friday evening at Ottawa has been postponed until July 21 and it is not at all improbable that the election announcement will be withheld until that date. Mr. Meighen is loath to formally launch his campaign without a complete cabinet.

POSSIBLE COALITION FOR WESTERN SEATS

Effort Being Made to Prevent Return of Conservatives in Three Cornered Fights on Prairies.

EDMONTON, July 13.—An effort will be made to prevent the return of Conservatives in three cornered fights at the forthcoming federal elections. A coalition of forces to fight high tariff candidates is being discussed here following word that a similar course was being taken in Manitoba.

Advices from Winnipeg are to the effect that Fred Chamillon, president of the Manitoba Liberal Association, and Robert Forke, former Progressive leader, following a review of the political situation, have decided upon joint action and have tentatively arranged a rapprochement of Liberals and Progressives whereby joint candidates of the two interests will oppose Conservatives in all ridings.

It was left with the entertainment committee of the Board to look after them and see that they were shown the points of interest here.

BURKE WINNER SMITH PRIZE

BISLEY, July 13.—Lieut. Desmond Burke, winner of the King's prize two years ago, won the Clement Smith aggregate shoot off yesterday with Sergeant McGregor, also of Ottawa, and Pte. Hengriff of the Northumberland Regiment. The three had tied for first place with a score of 118.

TROLLERS HOLD ANN. MEETING

Officers Elected at Gathering of Fishermen at Dundas Island.

DUNDAS ISLAND, July 13.—The Dundas Island Salmon Trollers Association held its regular meeting last week, a very interesting session of "the toilers of the sea." Among the numerous items on the order was the election of officers, which resulted as follows:

President, W. A. Brown; secretary-treasurer, A. O. Morse; executive board, S. Paton, R. Roberts, W. McKinnon, Gust. Quist and Al. Seaberg.

The association is sending out a call for a conference of salmon fishermen to be held during Fair week. It will work for the abrogation and cancellation of holding of fishtrap sites.

The members will pledge their co-operation in the patrolling of creeks and rivers if desired by the marine and fisheries department.

Captain Spreighorst, who is chairman of the fishtrap protest committee was given an ovation and well deserved praise and, being absent, the recommendation for some fitting token of gratitude was well taken.

A 100 per cent organization is on the ground.

FOREST FIRES SOUTHERN B. C.

Brooks Scanlon Camp at Lewis Lake Wiped Out And Comox Fire Spreading.

VERY HOT YESTERDAY

Courtenay Blaze is Checked, But Kootenay National Park is Burning.

VANCOUVER, July 13.—Bush fires are raging over a distance of seven miles in the vicinity of Lytton along the Canadian Pacific, destroying a number of telegraph poles on the right of way.

Intense heat prevailed yesterday on the coast and in the interior, Vancouver recording a temperature of 92.

Near Courtenay, on Vancouver Island, a bad fire is burning, threatening a shingle mill and logging camp and settlers' homes. A search is being made for a Japanese woman and two children who are missing.

Later Report

VANCOUVER, July 13.—The forest fire at Lewis Lake, 20 miles inland from Stillwater, on Monday wiped out camp number four of the Brooks Scanlon Lumber Company camps. The crew is safe.

Fire along a two mile front at Deep Bay in the Comox district is reported to be out of control and spreading. Two logging camps have burned together with equipment and many thousand feet of cut logs.

Late reports say the Courtenay fire is checked.

A serious fire is burning in the Kootenay National Park.

ILLEGAL STOCK SELLING CASE

Twenty-Eight Indicted in Connection With Prosecution of Gold Extraction Concern.

SEATTLE, July 13.—Deputy United States Marshal Joe Knizek returned here from Bellingham with two more men alleged to be wanted in connection with the Ruby Beach Mining Company stock sale case, C. P. Proctor and E. S. Cassidy, said to be members of the G. P. Porter brokerage firm of Vancouver.

Twenty-eight persons have been indicted by the federal courts for conspiracy in using the mails to defraud in connection with the sales of stock by the Ruby Company of Aberdeen, which it is declared advertised a process to remove gold from salt water sands.

Province Again Asks Removal of Mountain Scale of Freight Rates by Railway Commission

VANCOUVER, July 13.—Removal of the mountain scale under which producers and consumers in British Columbia are compelled to pay higher freight rates than the people in other sections of the Dominion was the kernel of the argument of G. G. McGeer on behalf of the province before the opening session of the hearing of the board of railway commissioners here yesterday.

Premier Oliver also made the same claim and suggested to the board that if they found their statutory powers did not enable them to remove the unjust discrimination against British Columbia they should make a report to the Privy Council, drawing attention to defect in the statute.

In his opening remarks Mr. McGeer stated that exorbitant profits from one hundred to four hundred per cent were admitted by the railways on their own figures.

Mackenzie King Defends Action of Government in Regard to Customs Probe

In defending his position in the House of Commons during the debate on the customs revelations during the last few days of the life of the last Parliament, Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King made a stirring speech which roused much enthusiasm among the members of the House and shed a good deal of light on the whole question. He was constantly interrupted, but held his ground and clearly stated the facts. The speech is much too long for reproduction in a newspaper, but it dealt with early

NATION SHOWS MUCH PROGRESS

Fine Spirit of Optimism Follows Period of Gloom Throughout Canada Today.

VANCOUVER, July 13.—From a nation steeped in gloom we have developed a fine spirit of optimism that is instilling strength and activity into all classes and what is more to the point we have tangible grounds for our belief," declared Henry Detchon, manager of the Canadian Credit Men's Association at their convention here.

Mr. Detchon pointed to progress in agricultural life, greater earnings by the railways, a favorable balance of trade, new discoveries of mineral wealth, the filling up of vacant lands with settlers, improvement in Government finances and a steady decrease in failures under the Bankruptcy Act, as symptomatic of the more prosperous times.

RICH STRIKE GOLD TEXADA

Mill Enabled Recovery of Over \$6,000 on Saturday, According To Report.

POWELL RIVER, July 13.—Reports reaching here today state that a gold strike of remarkable richness has been made on the property of the B. C. Gold Mines at Van Anda, Texada Island, known locally as the "Old Nutcracker."

The strike was made in the glory hole of the property and consists of high grade free milling quartz.

The mill was operated on Saturday and on Sunday reported having recovered more than \$6,000 in gold.

STRUCK BY BALL DIED YESTERDAY

U. S. Naval Man Went Blind Following Game Played at Port Angeles Sunday.

PORT ANGELES, July 13.—Earl Leonard Miller, U. S. N., chief quartermaster on the battleship West Virginia, who Sunday played two innings in a baseball game after he was hit by a pitched ball, died yesterday. After the game he marched with the team to the waterfront and went aboard the ship. Sunday night he became blind.

Stopoffs Here Should Be Arranged.

The time has arrived when determined steps should be taken to bring pressure on the railway company to arrange stop-offs for their passengers at Prince Rupert. While it is true that the company has no hotel accommodation here, yet arrangements might be made, either to have suitable reservations made at the local hotels or to have another hotel built that would cater to the tourist business.

At present the railway company does not suggest to its patrons that Prince Rupert be included in the places to stop over for a day. It does not take advantage of the position of the city with its interesting industries and points of vantage to visit. At how many places this far north could tourists get salt water swimming? Yet hardly a tourist ever visits the salt lake swimming pool. Where else could the handling of halibut and a huge cold storage plant be seen? At very few. Where could tourists be taken to the top of a mountain for a most wonderful view? Arrangements cannot yet be made at Prince Rupert, but the mountain is there, and if some assurance were given that it would be used for the purpose, it is probable that the Government would build a road to the top or help to do so.

Prince Rupert Needs Enthusiastic Citizens.

What Prince Rupert needs just now is some enthusiastic citizens who will get these things done. They are quite within the realms of possibility and they would mean a great deal to the place. It is useless to grouse about what governments are not doing. What are we doing ourselves? Are we doing anything in a public way? We are making good roads and that means a lot. It is about as much as the city council can be expected to provide just now. The citizens, outside of the council, can, however, do a lot if they will only get busy on it.

The city seems to be running to seed, so far as any enthusiasm is concerned. The "go" has been taken out of those who have tried by the people who sit back and criticize and refuse to help.

One or Two Good Leaders Required.

Much of the success of a movement depends on leadership. Just now there are no enthusiastic leaders who are willing to give their time in the public interest. If one or two people got really busy on the scheme we should soon have railway stop-offs here, tourist money circulating in the city, and the city taking its place among those to be visited annually by thousands of Americans and others with the result that some of them would become interested in other things than scenery here.

Condition Today is Not Good For Anyone.

What is the condition today? Visitors stop here an hour or two. They visit the totem poles and look in the shop windows and possibly spend a few dollars with the liquor vendor. Then they proceed on their way. Many of them never get a chance to see even that much. When asked later what Prince Rupert is like they say it is a little village with a few hundred inhabitants, mostly dead ones.

Many visitors have been surprised when they have been taken around the city and shown the sights. They did not believe the place was as large as it is, or the scenery as beautiful.

MACKENZIE KING DEFENDS ACTION OF GOVERNMENT IN REGARD TO CUSTOMS PROBE

(Continued from Page One.)

Mr. Mackenzie King: Hon. gentlemen laugh, but I cannot see the point of their laughter. I said, "Give me a chance to start an inquiry against Bisailon and I will appoint a royal commission to look into the whole situation and anyone can come before that commission and make any charge regarding customs frauds in Canada."

I challenge hon. gentlemen to say that what I am saying is not true. I repeat once more, I said to Sparks: Not only can one of those detectives lay the information, but you talk of having had a body of criminal investigators at work for months; those criminal investigators have nothing at stake so far as their reputation is concerned in laying a charge; therefore if you have any specific charge let one of them lay it, and I will see that this whole business is investigated by a royal commission. But I told him that as Prime Minister I would not lightly go over the head of the department unless a definite charge was laid. It is not permissible to disclose what takes place in the cabinet, but I think I am justified in going this far: The position of the government with respect to appointing a royal commission to investigate this whole business if a charge of any kind was laid was a matter of government policy agreed to by Mr. Bureau himself. He said he would take no exception, if a specific charge were made against Bisailon, to the appointment of a royal commission to investigate everything in connection with his office or other matters at the port of Montreal.

Were Not Ready

Now, I ask the House, what position was the government in, with respect to launching a royal commission when the protective association working with criminal investigators and with detectives for months were not yet prepared to make a single charge against that officer? Just let us forget for the moment the customs department. Suppose an identical situation in the justice department. Someone comes to me and says: We have a matter with the justice department in regard to the conduct of certain of the mounted police. People have come to me and said: We believe some of the men in the mounted police are crooks; they are betraying you, they are playing into the hands of the Tory party, they are furnishing information to your opponents; they are dishonest; they should be fired. I tell the House I have had many requests of that kind, requests to dismiss this and that member of the mounted police because he is said to be a crook, because he has done this or that. What course do I take? I speak to the minister of justice, who is head of the mounted police, and I put the matter before him. What is his reply? I will dismiss the man? No. His answer is: Let someone bring in a charge against the man and I shall see it is investigated; if he is found guilty I will dismiss him, but I want something specific to go on. The minister has to defend his action in parliament. What would be thought of me as prime minister if, when the minister of justice takes that position as head of his department, I should turn around and dismiss the man or order his dismissal?

Dismissed by Minister

Now I ask this House, was Bisailon dismissed? How was he dismissed? Who dismissed him? The hon. minister of customs (Mr. Boivin) who sits here in his seat was the man who dismissed Bisailon. How was he apprehended? It was by this very process the government was adopting of giving to detectives a free hand until they landed him. May I go a step further to show what the government had in mind and how it proceeded? The evidence shows that the present minister of customs told Mr. Duncan to work on Bisailon until he got him. The minute the minister had evidence sufficient to justify Bisailon's dismissal he came into council and said he was dismissing the man. What was the next step we took? We said: We will not publicly dismiss this man and let him carry everything away with him; we want to get at the inside of this smuggling business, and we are going to find out all we can about it. It was a Saturday afternoon, a special meeting of the cabinet was called to put the order through. It was sent down by special messenger to His

Excellency for signature. Then Detective Duncan proceeded to Montreal and took possession of the office, so that when Bisailon might come in to clear off his files he could be told, "You are no longer a member of the public service of Canada; I am here representing the government of Canada, I have taken possession." That is how the information was obtained on which most of this inquiry was based. There is how the material was obtained that the hon. member for Vancouver centre comes before this parliament and seeks to indict this government on—the material that this government itself secured in dismissing the official complained of and in its effort to put an end to this smuggling business. My hon. friend asked me why Inspector Knox had some powers taken away from him. I do not know, but I do know this that Knox was working in collaboration with Mr. Duncan, and that when Mr. Duncan got all this information he gave it to Mr. Knox, and Mr. Knox gave it to the hon. gentleman opposite.

Stevens Explains

Mr. Stevens: Mr. Speaker, I rise to a question of privilege, and in justice to a party who is not in the House at all, I never met Mr. Knox until after the inquiry started. I never saw the gentleman. As to the withdrawal of his powers, this took place in October, 1925. Furthermore, in evidence Mr. Sparks has stated, in fairness to all concerned, that he, Mr. Sparks, gave me certain information—that is without question—and that he had worked with the prime minister—as he has labored for over an hour to demonstrate—with Mr. Duncan, with Mr. Knox, with Mr. Sloan and others through a long period of time, and certainly this information was legitimately in his possession.

Mr. Mackenzie King: If it makes any difference to use the word "through" instead of the word "by" I am very glad to make the change... It was through Inspector Knox that the information came into the hands of my hon. friend.

Mr. Stevens: I want no excuses and I make none, but I wish to be fair to a man who cannot defend himself.

Mr. Mackenzie King: I think the House sees pretty clearly that Inspector Duncan after he had been working with the protective association, when he had all the information he could have collected by them and through them, was retained by the government expressly to try to get Bisailon where we could dismiss him—not only to dismiss him, but along with his dismissal secure such a mass of material that we could clean up this business in the fashion in which it should be properly cleaned up. There is the position and, as I say, the information Mr. Duncan got he got in that way, secured through this government directing him to secure it, and it was secured wholly and solely for the purpose of enabling the government to proceed further in its deliberate purpose to clean up this smuggling business as completely as we possibly could.

My hon. friend would never have been in a position to make the charges he did if the very information which our own officers gathered for us had not been put in his possession. But here, in the midst of a great effort on the part of the government to grapple with an evil such as smuggling is, my hon. friend for the sake of party politics comes along and makes charges in this House against the government on matters of which it had knowledge, not one of which he could have had knowledge apart from the information obtained by officers of this government and given to him before much of it was known to the government itself.

Mr. Stevens: Apparently the prime minister is very sorry that I did get it.

Mr. Mackenzie King: I am not at all sorry that my hon. friend secured the information, but I am sorry that in the public service there are apparently men who are prepared to betray those by

whom they are employed, because I regard as a base betrayal the transferance of this information. My hon. friend says he got the information from Mr. Sparks; I wonder if that was a noble act on the part of Mr. Sparks.

Mr. Ryckman: Too bad they said anything at all.

Treatment of Sparks

Mr. Mackenzie King: Just a moment. Mr. Sparks' change of mind and heart is not difficult to see. In September, after a general election was declared, Mr. Sparks was tendered a banquet in the Chateau Laurier here; he was given no end of praise for having




FAIL TO FIND VICTIM'S BODY

Andrew McNaught Wes Well Known Old Timer of Bulkley Valley.

SMITHERS, July 13.—The body of Andrew McNaught, who was the victim of Friday's drowning accident, has not as yet been found, although Corp. Service, in charge of the local provincial police, organized search parties to patrol the banks of the Bulkley River and had the river bottom dragged in the vicinity of the accident. No sign whatever has been found of the body.

Andy, as he was familiarly known throughout the district, was born in 1880 about 12 miles from the city of Ottawa, but so far as can be learned has no relatives now in this country.

He came to the valley in 1908 and in his capacity of teamster and by his good natured ways, was soon known to all up and down the line of construction.

When Smithers was first started he made this his headquarters, and for a number of years has made the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Gray his home. In 1915 he enlisted for service in the Great War and went overseas with the 67th Battalion. He was a member of the local branch of the L.O.O.F. and also of the Native Sons of Canada.

He had remarked on a number of occasions in recent months that when his time came he would pass out with his boots on, as he had the hardy pioneer's dread of a lingering sickness.

His untimely end is being regretted throughout the district, especially among the younger generation, who will miss his cheery greetings and help with their troubles.

MACKENZIE KING DEFENDS ACTION OF GOVERNMENT IN REGARD TO CUSTOMS PROBE

ing secured the reforms which had been brought about, and I am told that as an additional recognition he was given an honorarium of \$1,000.

Mr. Stevens: That is too small for a prime minister—

Mr. Mackenzie King: It was too small; they should have given him \$10,000. My point is—

Mr. Stevens:—reflecting on a citizen who cannot defend himself.

Achieved Great Purpose

Mr. Mackenzie King: The point I am bringing out is that Mr. Sparks at that date was allowing it to be believed that he had achieved a great purpose, that he had done a great service to the association and to the country. That was in September, just at the time a general election had been declared. And then what took place? Mr. Sparks began to associate with my right hon. friend opposite, just as he is doing from the gallery at the moment. They worked together back and forth during the campaign and when the election was over, just before parliament was summoned, in order to make things difficult and complicated for the government, he supplied the hon. member for Vancouver Centre (Mr. Stevens) with the information brought out in this way.

Mr. Meighen: Will the Prime Minister be good enough to explain what he meant by saying that Mr. Sparks was in association with me from the gallery at the moment?

Mr. Mackenzie King: I have not been blind to my hon. friend's eyes.

Province of Quebec

Now I do not say that the action of my hon. friends opposite was designed to prevent inquiry elsewhere, but there is a certain chivalrous attitude that needs consideration in this regard. It so happened that hon. gentlemen opposite sought to focus this whole inquiry on the province of Quebec.

I am told there is more smuggling going on in the port of Vancouver than in any other port in the Dominion. I do not know whether that is the case or not, but I should like to be certain on that point. I should like it to be investigated. The port of Winnipeg has not been investigated.

An hon. member: What about Lunenburg?

Mr. Mackenzie King: The port of Toronto has not been investigated, the port of Halifax has not been investigated.

Mr. Mackenzie King: May I add this point? There are certain distilleries that have not been investigated as yet.

What is the object of hon. gentlemen opposite? It is that they and their friends may again control the policies of this country; it is another device whereby those who favor higher and higher protection—

Some hon. members: Oh, oh.

Party Politics

Mr. Mackenzie King: Hon. gentlemen may laugh but they know it. From the beginning
