# Prisoners Stage Hunger Strike; Claim Cooks Had Dirty Nails

VANCOUVER (P-A short-lived hunger strike of 250 prisoners at Oakalla Prison was staged Tuesday, Warden Hugh Christie reported Wednesday.

Oakalla was the scene of a major riot last week in suburban Burnaby. It has 800 prisoners.

When the trays came around with full meals, most of the prisoners in the east wing took only tea and bread and sent the rest of the meal back untouched.

The strike was staged after some prisoners had made complaints to the warden. One report said the men complained that kitchen workers had had dirty fingernails.



# Chinese Throw Stones at Canadians in Latest Move

WITH THE CANADIANS IN KOREA (CP)- of the most marvenous scenic Chinese have started throwing stones at the Canadians in the front line.

They do it mostly by night, sneaking up to the Canadian barbedwire entanglements, rattling them and then tossing their new weapon.

At first the troops used to shoot at the throwers but they were ordered not to. A few Canadians were hit, none badly. One Royal Canadian Regiment man suffered a badly-bruised neck. All three Canadian infantry battalions here have experienc-

While the bulb is a storehouse of food for the embryo within, experience has demonstrated that more vigorous growth and larger flowers will be produced if the soil is enriched by commercial plant food when the bulbs are planted.

The greatest enemy of bulbs is dampness. To assist drainage it is sometimes the practice to put sand beneath each bulb. This is a useless measure. If you must plant in a spot where water stands long after it has been drained from the rest of the garden, elevate a bed as high as necessary to insure drainage, and plant your bulbs there.

In average soil, plant snowdrops, scillas, chionodoxas, with three inches of soil above them. Grape hyacinths should have four kiches of soil over them. Most lilies should be planted with 4 to 6 inches of soil over them and hyacinths and narcissi need six inches covering. Tulips which are intended to be lifted from the ground each spring, and replanted in the fall, may be planted at the same depth as narcissi. But if they are not to be lifted, but left in the ground for several years, deep planting, 10 to 12 inches down, is recom-

The reason for this deep planting is that it prevents the formation of several small bulbs to ! replace the one you plant, bulbs tes small to flower the following

Bulbs planted after mid-October should always be covered with a heavy mulch to prevent the ground from feezing before reet growth can begin. Bulbs which are frozen before growth starts may be prevented from growing, and lie dormant or decay during the winter. A mulch will delay freezing and permit the necessary root growth.

Today Livestock Commissioner W. H. T. Mead reported he is also investigating three more large bands in widely-separated parts of northern Alberta.

Mr. Mead will leave tomorrow to look into complaints from farmers about the bands which included branded horses that have strayed from pastures and wild horses that have bred and thrived on the open range.

Information is needed on which to base a fairly-accurate estimate of the number of horses so proper plans can be made to round them up. Then riders would be signed up and corrals

Mr. Johnson enlisted in the wartime army at 18 but was discharged for medical reasons. public administration at Toronto and Harvard.





VANCOUVER ( - A rock 100 death of more than 100 men. feet in diameter, lying just below the surface, rules the north-south marine traffic on the British Columbia coast with an iron hand

Ripple Rock in the Seymour Narrows between Vancouver Island and the mainland, 100 miles north of here, is dreaded by mariners just as European seamen fear the Goodwin Sands in the Straits of Dover.

First recorded by Captain George Vancouver on his voyage of discovery of the B.C. coast in 1792, the rock has destroyed or damaged scores of vessels and hundreds of small boats, with the

SWIFT-RUNNING TIDES

Thousands of ships and small craft bound to and from northern B.C. and the Alaskan ports must pass through the Seymour Narrows. Tides of 10 or 12 knots race through the channel, churning the water into a cauldron of whirlpools that can suck small boats under or dash big ships against the rock.
