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SLOAN ENTHUSES OVER MINING PROSPECTS

OKANAGAN PAPER SAYS LAKE BOAT IS TO BE BUILT AT PRINCE RUPERT

Mining Getting into Stride and Will Assume Importance Beyond Conception of Anyone

Members Provincial Cabinet guests at banquet in Vancouver; Manson proud of personal honor of ministers; Sloan and Pattullo optimistic

VANCOUVER, Feb. 8.—"Mining in British Columbia is getting into its stride and will go ahead until it reaches a position of industrial importance beyond the conception of the most optimistic among us," declared Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines, addressing the Laurier Club at a banquet Saturday night. The affair was attended by all the members of the provincial cabinet and by Liberals from various parts of British Columbia. Premier Oliver, in an address, said that the lesson to be learned from the present condition at Ottawa was that no matter what political complexion members had outside conservatism, all united in a crisis to prevent the Tories from gaining power.

YUKON PIONEER DIED FROM FALL

VICTORIA, Feb. 8.—William Bell, 58 years of age, a pioneer of the Klondike gold rush of 1898 and said to be well known throughout the north, died Saturday night as a result of injuries sustained, according to the police, when he fell down stairs Thursday night at the G.W.V.A. club rooms. He was taken to the hospital Friday.

The case of William Oram, who is charged with the theft of logging equipment from the Whalen Pulp and Paper Co., opened before Judge Young in the County Court this morning and is continuing this afternoon. L. W. Patmore is prosecuting while S. W. Taylor is defending.

Another Report

VANCOUVER, Feb. 8.—(Later)—At a banquet tendered the cabinet by the Laurier Club Saturday night, Hon. William Sloan dealt exhaustively with the mining industry, declaring it would now go ahead until it reaches a position of industrial importance beyond the conception of the most optimistic.

Hon. A. M. Manson reviewing the Government policy, went back to the administration of Harlan Brewster and said all Liberals must take satisfaction from the fact that no matter what charges were made against the government during the past nine years, the personal honor and integrity of every minister has been untarnished. "We may have erred, but we have kept our personal honor clean," declared the Attorney General.

Hon. W. H. Sutherland, minister of public works, Dr. McLean, minister of education, and Hon. E. D. Barrow, minister of agriculture, reviewed the activities of their respective departments.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, in a lively address predicted a vast improvement in the lumber situation of the province and instanced the great use being made of British Columbia airplane spruce and railway timber overseas.

BIG GALE DISTURBS SLUMBERS BUT DOES LITTLE DAMAGE HERE

Prince Rupert experienced a real old-time southeast blow during the night, the gale having been one of the strongest of the season. No serious damage seems to have been done although some people lost sleep in the fear that something would blow in on them.

The Digby Island meteorological station reported today that the velocity was from 50 to 60 miles per hour pretty well throughout the night, the peak having been about 1 o'clock.

FELL FORTY FEET INSTANTLY KILLED

MONTREAL, Feb. 8.—Charles Pennoyer, 46 years of age, was instantly killed when he fell forty feet from the balcony of an apartment building. The mother, three brothers and two sisters live at Grand Forks, B.C.

APPEALS MADE ON ASSESSMENT

M. M. Stephens Asks For Reduction on 45 Separate Parcels and G.T.P. Development Co.

FEW CHANGES MADE

Flea For Market Value Not Listened to by Members of Court of Revision

With fourteen appeals on the list including that of the G.T.P. Development Co. Ltd. on its property, that of Mr. Stephens representing 45 separate parcels of land in various parts of the city and that of the Somerville Cannery Co. on its waterfront leasehold, the municipal court of revision on the 1296 assessment roll opened its session at 10 o'clock this morning and, after disposing of a number of minor appeals, adjourned until 2:30 this afternoon. There were present at the court Mayor Newton, Ald. Jos. Greer, Ald. G. B. Casey and Ald. W. J. Greer, members; Mr. Stephens, representing clients; Assessor J. C. McLennan, and City Solicitor E. E. Jones. Ald. Jos. Greer was appointed secretary of the court.

Ald. M. M. Stephens, consistent with his attitude in council, maintained that the assessment of the city should be based on actual market values of the day. In view of the decisions made, other members of the court apparently held the same view as the mayor.

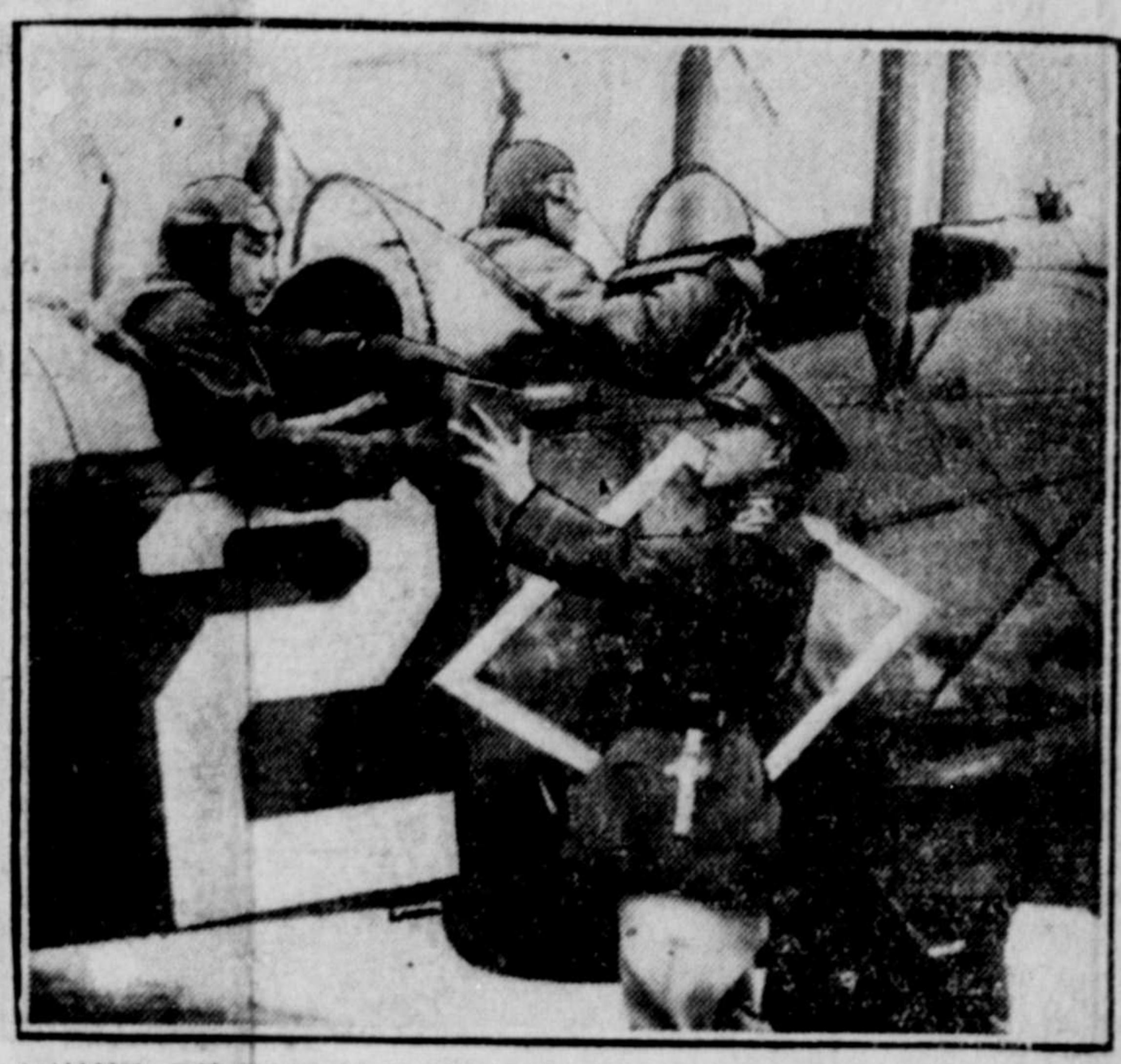
Boom of Logs Broke up in Big Storm There When it Blew for 24 Hours

Schooner Yosemite Sank Inside Golden Gate as Being Towed in by Tug

Crew was taken off Sunday after she crashed on rocks at Point Reyes Saturday night

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 8.—The steam schooner Yosemite, which crashed on the rocks at Point Reyes, 40 miles north of here last Saturday night while bound from Seattle with a cargo of dynamite, sank just inside the Golden Gate today.

The Yosemite's crew was taken off yesterday but the vessel, which had been towed in from Point Reyes by the tug Sea Ranger, sank, despite the efforts of the latter to save her.

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Boat may be Built Here for Operation on Okanagan Lake says Penticton Newspaper

Capt. P. S. Roe of the Okanagan Lake Boat Co. who was a visitor in this city a few weeks ago, has announced in Penticton that a 127-foot power boat is to be built in Prince Rupert for service on Okanagan Lake this year. There have been rumors current here for some time as to the building of such a boat but enquiry at the dry dock this morning elicited no definite statement.

The Penticton Herald of January 28 carried the following:

A new 127-foot boat, now building at Prince Rupert, and which will be assembled at Kelowna, will be in operation on Okanagan lake by June of this year, plying between Penticton and Kelowna, Captain P. S. Roe, of the Okanagan Lake Boat Co., well known valley resident, stated to The Herald today.

Mr. Roe states that the boat will be operated under contract with the Canadian National Railways for the carrying of freight and passengers, and will connect Penticton and the south with the new branch of the C.N.R. at Kelowna.

PORT CLEMENTS MILL TO START

Preparations Being Made to Resume Operations in Former Lynch Plant

The Canadian Lumber Yards sawmill at Port Clements, formerly known as the Lynch mill when operated by Prince Rupert interests but now owned by F. L. Buckley, the well known Vancouver operator, is now being refitted for the starting of cutting at an early date after having been idle for several years. The steamer Prince Charles this trip unloaded at the plant some 10,000 bricks and a large quantity of supplies and has still on board two boilers which will be taken off on the return trip south. These boilers weigh nine tons each and the lumber carrying barge Drumrock, now in Massett Inlet, will assist in taking them off the steamer.

Fred Weaver is now in charge of the Buckley operations at Port Clements. A logging camp is already running.

CRANBERRIES ON ISLANDS

Experimental Crop Being Tried at Massett With Imported Plants

MASSETT, Feb. 8.—The growing of cranberries is an interesting experiment being carried on here by C. Kirmis, who imported them last year from Washington.

It is thought that the climate and soil are both well suited to the growing of this berry. Mr. Kirmis visited Washington last year, where in one county alone the harvesting payroll in connection with the growing of the berries amounted to \$100,000.

JOINT ARRANGEMENT FOR CARGO SHIPMENTS GRAIN AT VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, Feb. 8.—Effective today through the agency of a joint surrender office, the Harbor Commission and private elevator will be enabled to interchange warehouse receipts for grain so that ships may load wheat at whichever elevator has the required amount of the grain required for a cargo.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
