MACKENZIE KING GOVERNMENT RESIGNED

OPERATION OF ELEVATOR DURING COMING FALL AND WINTER IS ASSURED

Wheat Pool Will Ship Between 10 and 15 Million Bushels of Grain Through Prince Rupert

Forty vessels will be required to handle cargoes to Orient and Europe says Co operative manager

ARRANGEMENTS FOR SHIPS MADE

George McIvor and shipping representative are here today making inspection of grain plant

"We will do everything humanly possible to do all the grain shipping business we can through the local elevator, commencing early in October, and it is our intention to ship grain both to the Orient and to the European markets," stated George McIvor, of Calgary, manager of the Canadian Co-operative Wheat Producers, Limited, better known as the Wheat Pool, who arrived on the Princess Louise this morning, to look over the elevator and make preliminary arrangements for taking over the lease from the government on August 1.

FORMER MEMBER OF LOCAL R. C. M. P. DID GOOD WORK IN NORTH

Constable Thornthwaite, a former member of the local detachment of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, figured prominently in the bringing to justice of Harry Davis, who was sentenced to life imprisonment in Dawson last week for the killing of Chas. H. Smith in a lonely cabin 100 miles south of Dawson on February 12. It was Thornthwaite who discovered the remains of Smith and who, despite the handicaps of a winter bound trail, arrested Davis and brought him and the body of the man he had killed into Dawson.

Rose Hoffman, charged with doing grievous bodily harm to Einar Anderson, again appeared before Magistrate McClymont in the city police court this morning and was committed for trial before Judge Young and ordered to be retained in custody.

CANADA LUMBER KING LEFT EIGHT MILLION

John R. Booth Bequeathes His Fortune to Two Sons and a Daughter Living in Ottawa.

OTTAWA, June 28.—The will of the late John R. Booth, lumberman, who died last fall, was filed for probate this morning. It shows an estate valued at \$8,000,000 which goes to the three surviving children, C. J. and J. F. Booth, and Mrs. Gertrude Fleck, all residing in Ottawa.

TRAIL WOMAN DIES ON ATLANTIC OCEAN

Mrs. Grace Davies Succumbs to Pneumonia While on Her Way to Canada.

VANCOUVER, June 28.—Mrs. Grace Davies, of Trail, aged 26, died from pneumonia aboard the liner Montcalm on which she was en route to Canada.

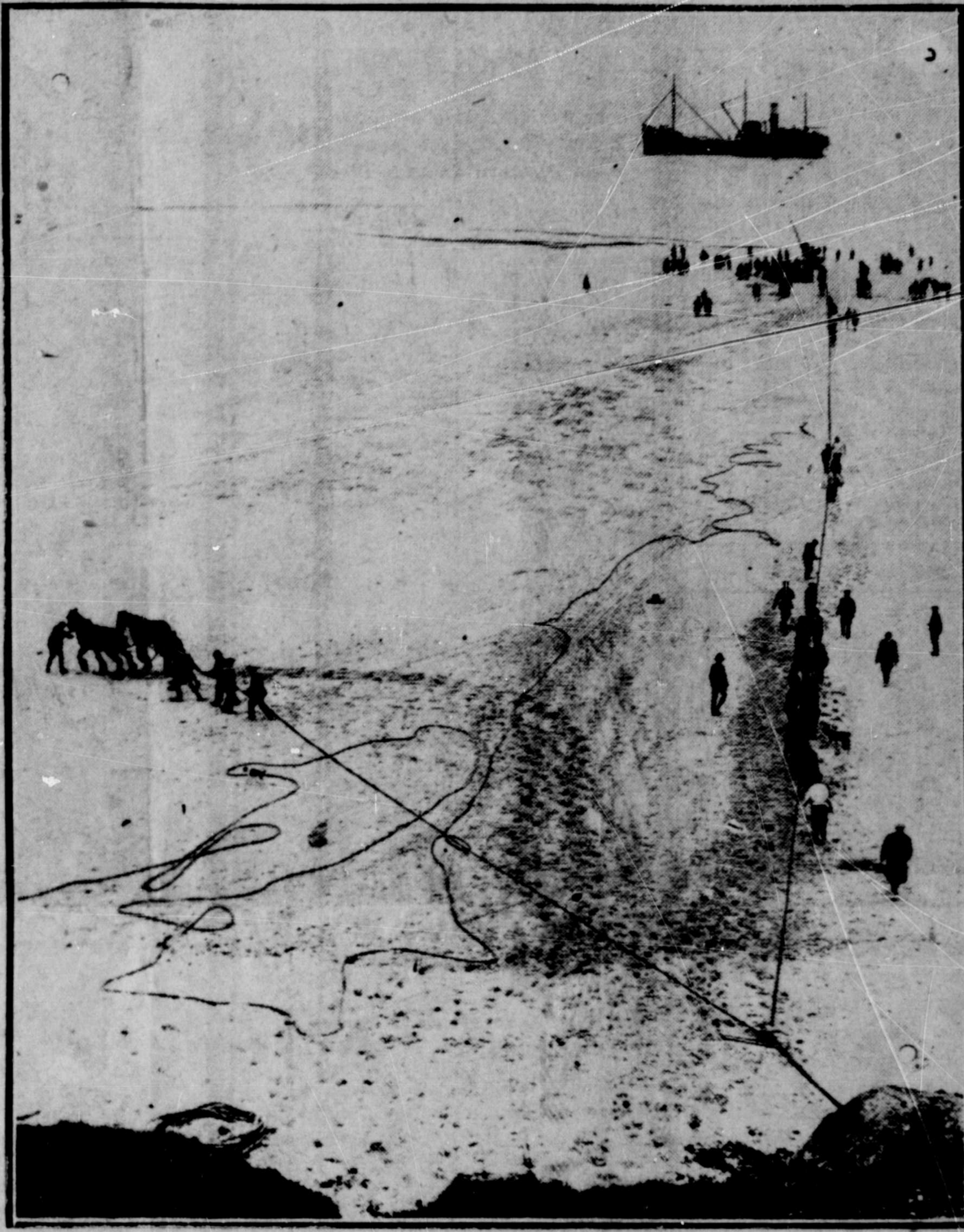
FOUR MEN KILLED.

POLAR PROBLEM IS NOW SOLVED

Nothing But Detail Work Left, Says Amundsen, Who Reached Seattle Yesterday.

SEATTLE, June 28.—Capt. Roald Amundsen and the sixteen others who flew across the North Pole from Europe to Alaska, arrived here on Sunday from Nome. "My work is finished and all the big problems are solved," declared Capt. Amundsen. "The work that remains in polar exploration is only a matter of detail. Let others handle it."

Seven Norwegian members of the party said they would likely organize another Arctic expedition with the aid of Ellsworth, who is Amundsen's financial backer.

Amundsen expressed himself as "virtually certain" that there was no land on the route which was followed by the Norge. One hundred thousand square miles of icy wastes occasionally broken by open water had been seen on the trip, he said. It was thought that islands might lie on one side or other of the route, more likely the west side.

Amundsen left on Sunday night for New York en route to Norway.

WINNIPEG TRAGEDIES

Four Women Drowned in Lake Winnipeg, One Suicides and Child is burned to Death.

WINNIPEG, June 28.—Four women were drowned in Lake Winnipeg during the week-end, another committed suicide and a child was burned to death.

Evelyn Tasse, of St. Boniface, aged 19; Anna Wilson, 18, and Marjorie Wood, 16, of Winnipeg, were drowned when a canoe upset at a summer resort on Lake Winnipeg, and Mrs. S. E. Godwin of this city was drowned while bathing at Victoria beach.

Mrs. Mary Mazzyrak took her own life in her home in the city and Solly Morzanstein, aged 5, was burned to death when her clothing caught fire during her mother's absence.

GOV'T FILLS VACANCIES

Senator Appointed and New Civil Service Commissioners Are Named.

OTTAWA, June 28.—One vacant senatorship and two vacancies on the Civil Service Commission have been filled by the government. Dr. R. L. McDougald, chairman of the Montreal Harbor Board, has been appointed to the Senate and Newton McTavish and P. E. Tremblay, of Ottawa, are named to the Civil Service Commission.

VANCOUVER MAN IS DROWNED AS BOAT UPSETS IN INTERIOR

GRANBROOK, June 28.—Eldon Walker of Vancouver, was drowned on Saturday in the mill pond at Lumberton when the boat containing himself as well as four others upset. Deceased was an employee of the British Columbia Spruce Mills.

Meighen Being Called Upon Today to Assume Leadership at Ottawa

Resignation of Liberal administration follows refusal of Governor to grant dissolution of House

OTTAWA, June 28.—The administration of Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King has resigned and Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the Conservatives, was called to the Government House this afternoon to confer with the Governor General with a view to forming a new government.

Premier King today announced the resignation of the government and advised the Governor General to dissolve the House which, however, Baron Byng declined to do.

At the sitting of the House, which lasted only a few minutes this afternoon and which followed a meeting of the King cabinet, Premier King, in announcing the resignation of the government, made the following statement: "I have a very important announcement to make before proceeding further. Public interest demands the dissolution of this House of Commons, and as Prime Minister, I so advised His Excellency, the Governor General, shortly before noon. His Excellency having declined to accept my advice to grant dissolution to which I believe, under British practice, we are entitled, I immediately tendered the resignation of the government which His Excellency has been graciously pleased to accept. Under the cir-

umstances, as one of the members of this House, I move that the House now adjourn."

Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen rose to make a statement but, as the motion to adjourn carried, he did not complete his remarks. When the House rose, Mr. Meighen and the Conservative members of the customs committee were loudly cheered. Mr. Meighen declined to make any statement for the present, immediately going into conference with his followers.

The remaining business of the session will probably be wound up in quick order.

BIG MORTALITY MEXICAN FLOOD

Bodies Being Burned and Buried As Fast As They Can Be Found. Crop Damage.

MEXICO CITY, June 28.—Despatches from Leon, where the flood waters of the Gomez River wiped out a large section of the town, state that bodies continue to be found but no estimate of the dead is yet possible. Thousands of houses in the city were washed away and destruction of crops throughout an extensive region is reported to be complete. As fast as the bodies can be recovered they are being burned and buried and it is believed that several hundred victims are lying under the debris in several towns.

BUTTH MAKES 26TH HOMER

Cincinnati Shut Out Pittsburg Yesterday By Getting 18 Hits.

NEW YORK, June 28.—Babe Ruth scored his twenty-sixth home run on Sunday and is now only three behind his 1921 record. Cincinnati defeated Pittsburg on Sunday by securing eighteen hits off four pitchers, the score being 16 to nothing.

**Pleasure Seekers
Cause Most Fires.**

Provincial statutes and regulations make it compulsory for settlers clearing land to secure permits from forest officers before they can light fires for land clearing purposes during the fire season, May 1 to October 1. Similar statutes make it compulsory for logging operators and other industrial operations to secure certificates of clearance before they can operate steam units in the woods during the closed season. The regulations also indicate that such industrial operations must be equipped with certain fire fighting equipment and fire prevention appliances.

Such regulations are good and aim to prevent forest fires. Forest authorities state, however, that there has been a very decided improvement in logging operations regarding fire, and that now such industrial operations are only credited with approximately 7% of the 2,500 fires which sweep this province annually.

The same authorities, however, state most emphatically that the chief sources of fire in the woods of British Columbia are the individuals who frequent the forests on pleasure bent, such as the traveller, picnicker, camper, fisherman, hunter, and tourist who are held responsible for 40% of the number of fires which occur annually.

**Should not All
Have Fire Permits?**

If it is considered good business to make farmers and industrial operators take out permits in order to control the forest fire situation, then surely in view of the statistics published, it is equally important that people who frequent the woods for pleasure, who light camp fires and throw lighted tobacco and matches around promiscuously, should also be placed under permit.

Public education in the matter of forest protection is essential, but there is a certain class of citizen who can only be convinced of the necessity of forest fire prevention by a strict application of the law. If the law does not cover the situation, then it is time that it be changed.

Individual permits controlling the activities of citizens frequenting the woods would undoubtedly do much to solve the fire problem, and it is worthy of the careful consideration of those responsible for the administration of our forest resources.

The logger is spending thousands annually to keep down fire in his operation for the protection of his equipment and timber, and incidentally the people's equity in the timber which he is cutting. Surely then the law should be such that he will be protected from the fires which sweep into his operation, started by the careless smoker, camper, traveller, and others.

**GOVERNMENT RAILWAYS
IN JAPAN WILL HAVE
RADIO LIKE C. N. R.**

VANCOUVER, June 28.—With a view to investigating the radio receiving and broadcasting services of the Canadian National Railway, Hikojiro Suzuki, special representative of the government railways of Japan, arrived in Vancouver Sunday night from Seattle and left the same night over the National lines for Montreal. The Japanese government railways have in mind the establishment of radio receiver sets on board their main passenger trains and also the development of several powerful broadcasting stations similar to those used by the C.N.R. Mr. Suzuki has been sent by his company to Canada to secure as much data as possible.

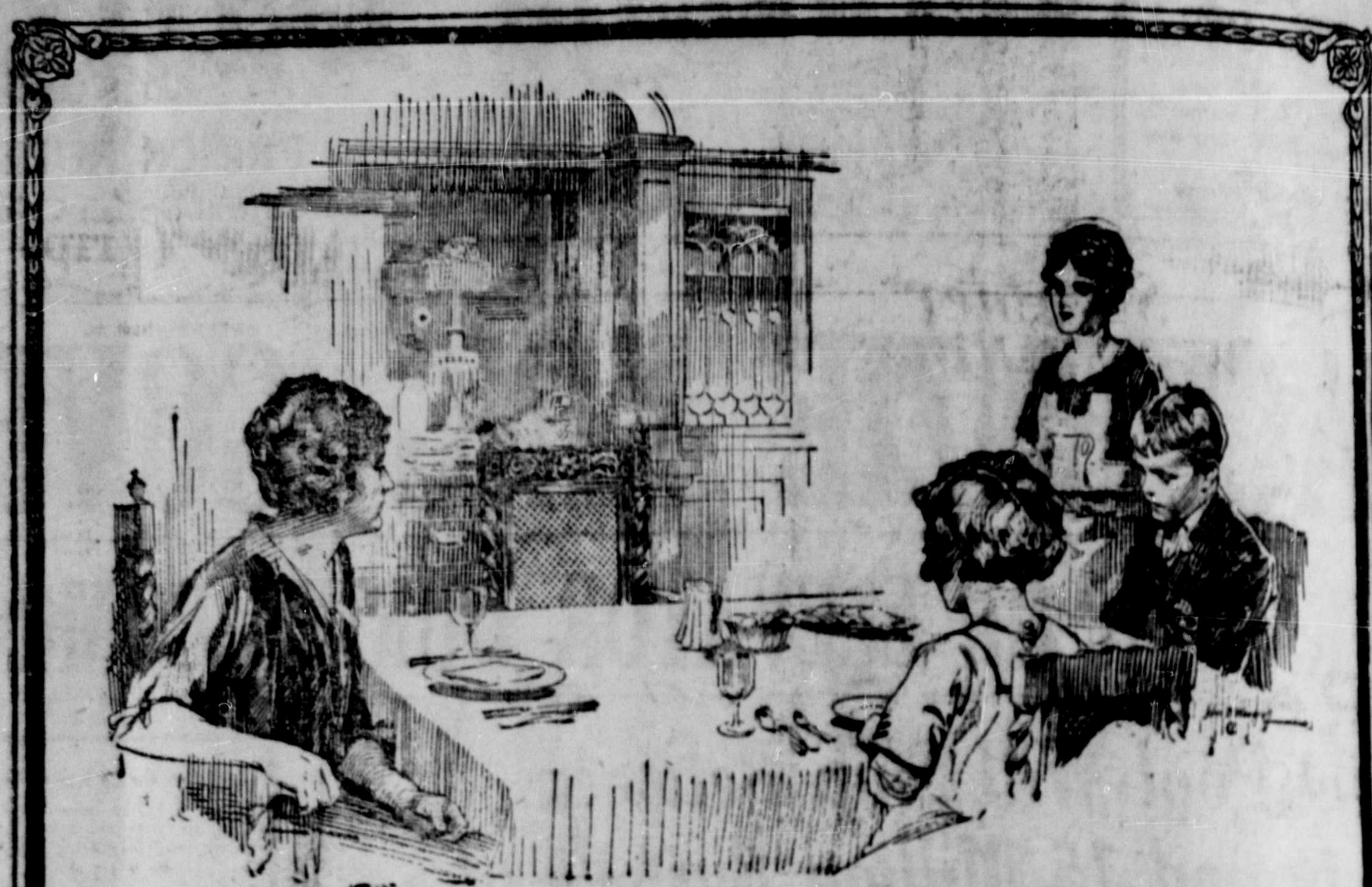

The creation of a Conservative government would, therefore, leave Mr. Meighan without a majority in the House unless he got either Liberal or Progressive support to wind up the business of the session. Mr. Meighan might, however, appoint an acting minister without salary and appoint one of his colleagues to represent him in the House temporarily.

The House meets again Tuesday afternoon.

Following the return of Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighan from an interview with the Governor General, he entered into a conference with prominent members of the Conservative party. It is stated, although unofficially, that Mr. Meighan has not yet been sworn

REPUBLICAN SENATORS DEFEATED IN PRIMARIES

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 26.—(Canadian Press)—The great biennial campaign for the control of Congress is getting underway. While the actual elections will not be held until next November, the primaries for the nomination of candidates are being held, the lines of the struggle are being planned, and it is already possible to get some idea of the general nature of the contest.

It is already apparent that the political mortality in this year's campaign is going to be high. In the opening clashes thus far, the casualty list has been unusual.

Primaries have been held in Illinois, Pennsylvania, Oregon, Indiana and South Dakota. In Illinois, Senator William B. McKinley, administration republican, has been defeated for re-nomination; in Pennsylvania, Senator George W. Pepper, administration republican, has likewise been defeated; and in Oregon, Senator Robert N. Stanford, administration republican, has also fallen. Senator James E. Watson and Senator Arthur R. Robinson have been nominated to succeed themselves in Indiana, after voting against the Coolidge administration on the World Court. Senator Peter Norbeck, who generally lines up with the administration and the Old Guard republican organization, has been re-nominated in South Dakota. In the cases of Watson, Robinson and Norbeck, each will have real fights on their hands for reelection in the face of strong Democratic opposition.

To have three administration senators go down to defeat thus early in the campaign in itself is an extraordinary development. Moreover, some House members have already been knocked out in the primaries.

The question has already been asked whether, in view of the blows struck against administration senators, President Calvin Coolidge will be able to force his own re-nomination in 1928. It is apparent that he will be an active candidate to succeed himself.
