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## FIVE GRAIN BOATS WITHIN 3 WEEKS

### UNITED STATES IS CHECKING UP ON COAST RUM RUNNERS

#### Wheat Shipments to Orient Will Be Instituted by Two Freighters from This Port

Announcement made of ships coming here direct from England to load for U.K. or continent, also from Japan for Shanghai

#### WELSH CITY DUE NEXT WEEK

Ryoka Maru, Innerton and Seine Maru will follow all being expected before January 15 to load full at local elevator

Five ocean freighters, three Japanese and two British, including two that will institute full cargo shipments from this port to the Orient, will be here loading grain between now and January 15 or, roughly, within the next three weeks' time. The list does not include the "K" Line steamer, Kifuku Maru, which sailed at noon to day with full cargo for the United Kingdom or continent.

First on the list is the Ocean Transport Co.'s freighter, Taiyo Maru, Capt. K. Okamoto, which arrived last night at 8 o'clock after an uneventful voyage across the Pacific Ocean from Yokohama, Japan, which port she left on December 5. She remained in the stream overnight, passing quarantine and customs inspection, and was to go to the dry dock for lining this morning.

#### MOVE REINDEER TO MACKENZIE RIVER REGION

DOMINION REINDEER CO. OF VANCOUVER THINKS THAT DISTRICT IS MORE FAVORABLE FOR THEM

VANCOUVER, Dec. 23.—The transfer of five thousand head of reindeer from Alaska to the Mackenzie River basin is believed to forecast intentions of the Dominion Reindeer Co. Ltd., whose officials believe that operations may be carried on more successfully in the Northwest Territories according to the Morning Star. Officials of the company, all of Vancouver, recently secured a federal charter. The concern is capitalized at \$500,000 and owns five hundred cows and three hundred bulls which it is planned to remove to a range near Great Slave Lake.

#### EXPIRED IN POLICE COURT

J. F. KING, OF VICTORIA, WAS BEING TRIED FOR ASSAULT ON YOUNG GIRL

VICTORIA, Dec. 23.—As he left the witness stand J. F. King, advertising solicitor, suffered a heart attack today and died within ten minutes in the police court where he was being tried on a charge of assaulting a young girl who kept house for him since his wife died on November 27. Jessie King, his cousin's daughter, who brought the charge against him, was present in the court when he collapsed at the end of a cross-examination lasting twenty minutes.

#### 'PEG THEATRE BURNED TODAY

ONE FIREMAN KILLED, ONE MISSING, TWELVE INJURED AND \$150,000 DAMAGE

WINNIPEG, Dec. 23.—One fireman was killed, one is missing, and twelve are more or less seriously injured, as a result of a fire at noon today which destroyed the Winnipeg Theatre and caused damage estimated at \$150,000.

#### FELL 8 FLOORS HOTEL WINDOW

YOUNG MONTREAL MAN MEETS TRAGIC DEATH IN VANCOUVER AND HIS COMPANION IS BEING HELD

VANCOUVER, Dec. 23.—Kenneth McLeod, aged 24, son of a prominent Montreal family, was instantly killed here last night when he fell from the eighth floor of the Hotel Vancouver to the roof of a laundry building below. Reginald Burdick, aged 23, of Victoria, is being held by the police pending an investigation into the fatality. He was McLeod's roommate, the two having arrived from Victoria on Wednesday.

The body of McLeod was without coat, vest, collar or tie when found. In the room occupied by the two men the police found a hole in the window but not large enough for the body of a man to pass through. Burdick appeared to have been dazed by the tragedy and, according to the police, he said he left his room and went to the ground floor, returning a few minutes later to find McLeod missing. He looked out and saw what appeared to be a body lying on the laundry roof and notified the management.

It is said that McLeod and Burdick were fellow students at the Royal Military College in Kingston.

Burdick was released this morning in the custody of his father, A. C. Burdick, a well known resident of Victoria.

#### RECORD MADE ON EXCHANGE

PACIFIC LAND STOCK IS FIRST TO MOUNT TO OVER \$2,000 PER SHARE IN BIDDING

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—Jumping as much as 100 points on sales in ten share lots, Texas Pacific Land Trust Co. stock today achieved the distinction of being the first issue to sell above \$2,000 per share on the New York Stock Exchange. Less than one hundred shares changed hands in the forenoon trading today with the price mounting from \$1,800 to \$2,040. Early this year these shares had been quoted at as low as \$10.

Discovery of potash on the company's properties and a large increase in revenue from mineral and oil leases stimulated demand for the stock.

#### WRIT ISSUED FOR N.S. BY-ELECTION

Nominations on January 11 and Election Week Later to Fill Antigonish-Guysboro Seat

OTTAWA, Dec. 23.—A writ for the by-election in Antigonish-Guysboro, Nova Scotia, made necessary through the recent death of John Douglas, Conservative member, was issued yesterday afternoon. Nominations will be held on January 11 and election on January 18.

#### PREMIER WILLING CUT DEBATE SHORT

VICTORIA, Dec. 23.—Premier Oliver today signified his willingness to curtail the debate in reply to the speech from the throne when the present session of the Legislature is resumed on the condition that the Opposition is agreeable to such action.

#### Trade Pact Between Canada and Czecho-Slovakia Will Make Dominion Goods Mart

OTTAWA, December 23.—A commercial treaty between Canada and Czecho-Slovakia has been negotiated and approved by the cabinet. The Department of Finance states that, by means of it, Canada obtains the lowest rates of duty given any country on a list of some seventy-one commodities which comprise all the important Canadian exports to that country. In return, Czecho-Slovakia has been granted benefits under the Canadian intermediate tariff. The treaty will become effective on January 1.

Canadian goods given favored treatment under the pact include flour, wheat, hosiery, wrapping paper, barley, oats, rye, buckwheat, malt, peas, fresh and dried apples, all kinds of fish including canned fish, lard, butter, honey, cheese, canned fruits, vegetables, condensed milk, agricultural implements, tools, rubber footwear, rubber tires, lead, zinc, engines, motors, adding machines, automobiles and various other items.

A statement issued by the finance department points out that it is the first commercial agreement concluded since Canada obtained its new powers at the recent Imperial Conference.

#### Air Mail Service in Canada is Being Considered States Postmaster General Veniot

ST. JOHN, N.B., December 23.—"Proposals looking to the establishment of an air mail service system in Canada is under observation and consideration by the Post Office department," Postmaster General Veniot said today at Bathurst in an interview on the long distance telephone. "The matter," he said, "is only in a tentative stage, as yet, and a definite policy has not been adopted, but we have it in hand and expect to make definite announcement in the near future."

Whether the matter will come before Parliament when it meets in February in the way of appropriation, has followed with interest the suggestion of money. Mr. Veniot was not prepared to say. "The department," he stated.

#### Consolidated Exporters Corporation Figures in California Indictments

Thirty-eight members of alleged ring are committed by U.S. Grand Jury—Puget Sound liquor men also arraigned

LOS ANGELES, December 23.—Thirty-eight members of an alleged Pacific Coast liquor smuggling combine have been indicted by a United States grand jury. The committed men include virtually the entire list of stockholders and officers of the Canadian Consolidated Exporters Corporation which is said to have been the leader in the shipment of contraband liquor from Canada.

The indictments charge conspiracy to violate the National Tariff Act and are the result of investigations which federal prohibition agents say have been under way since last July.

SEATTLE, Dec. 23.—The federal grand jury which convened on December 14 to investigate charges of liquor graft violations in Snohomish and King counties last night returned sixty-four indictments including 21 secret and 43 open.

#### VERY PLEASED WITH RUPERT

M. YAMAMOTO, OF OCEAN TRANSPORT CO., HERE FROM SEATTLE IN CONNECTION WITH GRAIN LOADING

N. Yamamoto, representative of the Ocean Transport Co., whose vessel, the Taiyo Maru, is here to load grain at the local elevator, arrived in the city from Seattle yesterday. Mr. Yamamoto has already had time to inspect the harbor and its facilities and he expresses himself as highly pleased, predicting that many Japanese vessels will use this port for loading cargo.

Mr. Yamamoto is only three months out of Japan but he has a surprising command of English which is taught in the Japanese schools.

#### PAUL LUDWIG DIES IN LOCAL HOSPITAL

Was Old Timer of City, Having Formerly Lived on Queen Charlotte Islands.

Many old timers will regret to learn of the death at the Prince Rupert General Hospital last night in his 54th year of Paul Ludwig. Deceased was first admitted to the hospital in the early part of October where he received medical attention until December 11 when he left the institution only to come back on December 21.

Of German descent, deceased formerly lived on the Queen Charlotte Islands, but during the last few years has been employed as cook on various boats operating out of here.

Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers.

#### MANDAMUS ORDER REFUSED BY JUSTICE

#### JAPAN IS HAVING MUCH INFLUENZA

ALREADY NEARLY SIX HUNDRED DEATHS ARE ATTRIBUTED TO DISEASE DURING MONTH OF DECEMBER

TOKIO, Dec. 23.—Influenza is spreading in Tokio. Fifty one deaths reported on Monday make a total of 591 for the month of December so far. In connection with the epidemic here it is noted that Japan was not hit so seriously with influenza when the plague was sweeping the world in the fall of 1918.

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ROYAL DELUXE TOURS COSTLY TO COUNTRY.

Supplying of special trains and cars to distinguished foreign visitors who wish to see this country in deluxe style has become an interesting if uneconomic phase of American and Canadian railroad-ing, something that a great many people do not approve of if the trains are furnished without cost.

Through the courtesy of the railroads, in many cases, members of royal families and other notables have been able to tour the United States and Canada in luxurious equipment at nominal cost to themselves. The transcontinental jaunt of Queen Marie of Rumania and the earlier visit of President Machado of Cuba are outstanding instances when the railroads and government themselves played host and footed most of the transportation bills.

The Crown Prince and Princess of Sweden paid for the special car which, attached to regular trains, took them across the country on their recent visit, but the Prince of Wales and Marshal Foch of France rode in special trains that cost them next to nothing.

The most consistent user of special trains is President Coolidge, but he buys his own ticket out of a special appropriation provided for the purpose. The government at times employs special equipment with which to transport distinguished visitors from New York to Washington and return when they pay official calls to the national capital.

More than the desire of the railroads to be courteous hosts to visiting sightseers is necessary in supplying trains at nominal cost to the guests. Under the law only railroad employees are allowed free transportation and in order to carry Queen Marie, for example, at a one dollar fare, a special tariff had to be filed.

TEN THOUSAND MILES FOR ONE DOLLAR.

In Marie's case, she paid out of her own pocketbook one dollar for herself, her two children and each member of her immediate party to each of the several railroads over which she travelled on her 10,000 mile tour. Railroad fares alone, at winter tourist rates, would have totalled approximately \$20,000 for the nearly 80 persons aboard the Royal Rumanian.

Another huge expense borne by the roads was that incident to stocking diners and private kitchens aboard the several special cars making up the royal train. Special illustrated booklets describing the country through which the queen passed and elaborate menu cards also were paid for by the railroads.

Railroad men agreed that the royal Roumanian was the most luxurious equipment ever assembled. Comprising six special cars, all of them the property of railroad presidents, and equipped with the most modern conveniences.

MR. MASSEY'S JOB IS REAL ONE.

No Canadian will worry much if President Coolidge gives a dinner at the White House and Mr. Massey finds himself in the remote company of the Minister from Hayti instead of up among the diplomatic lions near the head of the table. But a lot of Canadians may wonder—more particularly in the light of the recent announcement that we are to have an expensive Embassy building at Washington—whether Mr. Massey will be able to do anything to protect Canadian interests in such matters as those attending the theft of waters from the Great Lakes by the City of Chicago. That, we are glad to note, is the test that is being applied to Mr. Massey's usefulness by two such newspapers as The Toronto Globe and The Montreal Star—and it is the only test. To put the matter in its briefest form, a Canadian Minister at Washington is a business, not a diplomatic proposition, and the dividends that the Canadian people will expect from it will not be a lot of rhetoric about status, but some practical achievements of economic worth.

"Wonder Ship" of Pacific is Described in Article by Former Prince Rupert Man

One recent Saturday afternoon in Vancouver the writer chanced to stroll along the waterfront in the vicinity of the Canadian Pacific liner docks and became interested in an immense greyhound of the Pacific bearing the name "Aorangi," a 23,000 ton boat commissioned on the Australia, New Zealand, Honolulu and Fiji Island run.

The scene on the dock was one of much bustle and hurry, the ship taking on freight prior to her departure on the following Wednesday. A gang of longshoremen, assisted by small motor tractors, were busy loading large crates bearing the name "Nash," the crates containing motor cars of the well known Nash manufacture and destined for export to Australia and New Zealand while the adjacent warehouse was packed to the roof with a variety of export material to be loaded on the same trip.

The writer, with the customary "newspaper cheek," endeavored to sneak beyond the guarded barrier and thus to the giant liner, but a courteous dock policeman blocked the path and informed him that a pass to go over the ship could be obtained upon application to the office of the Canadian-Australian steamship line. It took but a few minutes to reach the steamship office which is situated at the corner of Hastings and Burrard office, where G. R. G. Bagnall, office superintendent, not only signed the necessary pass very willingly but, in addition, telephoned to the ship and asked that Roy Ford, in charge of the information bureau aboard the Aorangi, meet the bearer of the pass and conduct him over the motorship. After that life was just a pleasure and once aboard "the lugger" one could easily imagine himself a director of the S.S. Company, or an officer of the ship. Upon getting aboard with the proper credentials the writer was ushered to the presence of Roy Ford, who proved to be a "regular fellow," on to his job and very proud of his ship.

GETTING READY

As the Aorangi was due to sail on the following Wednesday the entire interior was being overhauled preparatory to her return voyage. However, only the more intimate things such as linen, etc. were missing and this fact did not, of course, detract from the general beauty of the cabins, libraries, music rooms and other sumptuous apartments. After "arming" himself with many bunches of keys Mr. Ford, who, by the way, is making his thirteenth voyage on the ship and is not a bit superstitious, said "this way please" and the sight-seeing trip commenced. The tour of the liner commenced on "A" deck, or the first class quarters, the elegance of which has to be seen to be realized and which will give accommodation to 440 passengers. Two electrically operated elevators furnished an internal transportation service between decks. The two, three and four berth state-rooms are very commodious and are mostly decorated in "Queen Anne" style, the walls being beautifully paneled in oak, rosewood and mahogany, and are adorned with tapestry designs. The bathrooms adjoining the state-rooms are particularly elegant and are as large as those found in any first class hotel. The drawing room, music room, dining saloon and library are beautifully appointed, and provision has been made for the staging of concerts and picture shows in the dining saloon. The men's smoking room on A deck is a lovely room—really too nice for a lot of smoke—and is decorated in Old English style with armor, swords and lanterns decorating the walls. A fully equipped gymnasium is another convenience furnished for the benefit of cabin class passengers.

RADIO A FEATURE

A central radio receiving set broadcasts through loud speakers situated in the passenger and crew's quarters. On a recent voyage of the Aorangi radio reception was maintained throughout the entire trip between Australia and Vancouver. The ventilating system throughout the ship is a masterpiece of ingenuity and furnishes a cool artificial breeze in all quarters while the ship is travelling through tropical seas. The accommodation in the second class quarters is almost on a par with the first class accommodation, while the third class cabins and living quarters are splendidly equipped and roomy and plenty of deck space is afforded. In fact the entire ship resembles a wonderful floating hotel and everything about it—appointments, decoration, and the many comforts furnished—surpass many of the London hotels.

The Aorangi carries adequate lifeboat protection, all of which is operated by electricity from the ship's bridge, and can be swung into the water in 32 seconds. Provision is also made for launching the lifeboats by hand in case of the power failing for any reason. The ship is also divided into various compartments by mechanically operated watertight doors, any one of which compartments can be sealed up separately at a second's notice. These doors are also operated from the bridge.

PUBLISHERS NEWSPAPER

"The Aorangi News," a 20 page newspaper, is published aboard daily giving all the latest wireless news and carrying advertising of the hotels, leading stores, etc. encountered on the voyage. The News is certainly a wonderfully compact sheet and carries a good fifty-fifty division of space including editorial and advertising matter. On Tuesday, December 14, the day prior to the Aorangi sailing for the An-

tipodes, the funeral urn containing the ashes of Major C. Gardner Johnson, a pioneer shipping man of Vancouver, was solemnly given in charge of Commander R. Crawford, R.N.R., to be cast upon the waves of the South Seas on a moonlight night by Capt. S. Phillips, of Sydney, Australia, who was an old friend of the deceased. This request had been made in Major Johnson's will. An arrangement was made between Capt. Phillips and Mr. Johnson some years ago that the survivor would take the ashes of the other and scatter them to the waves. The friends and family of Major Johnson, in carrying out these last wishes, gave the ashes in care of Capt. Crawford, who will turn them over to Capt. Phillips for final disposal.

R.M.M.S. Aorangi left Vancouver at noon on Wednesday, December 5 with 500 passengers on board and her cargo holds full. Among the passengers were Mr. and Mrs. R. A. H. Welsford of Liverpool. Mr. Welsford is head of the Union S.S. Co. of British Columbia and is on a holiday tour to the Antipodes.

DETAILS OF SHIP

The Aorangi, the largest passenger liner to be fitted with diesel internal combustion engines, is commanded by Commander R. Crawford, R.N.R.; R. M. Scott is chief officer; P. A. Chappell, purser and Roy Ford, information clerk. Unfortunately, at the time the writer was aboard, the majority of the officers were on shore leave and the Captain's bridge was closed to visitors.

The ship was built by the Fairfield Shipbuilding Co., Ltd., Scotland, her displacement is 23,000 tons; length 600 feet, breadth 72 feet; moulded depth 46 feet; four screw propellers, each driven by a six-cylinder Fairfield Sulzer Diesel engine; total power developed 20,000 I.H.P. giving a normal speed of 18 knots. The Aorangi has six decks, accommodating 440 first, 300 second, 230 third class passengers, and 230 officers and crew. Electrically operated clocks, loud speaking telephones, lifts, an electric laundry, every modern appliance for safety and comfort, with her magnificent saloon and stateroom decorations, makes the Aorangi indeed a wonder-ship of the Pacific.

SENATORS ARE VERY WRATHY

FALL-DOHENY VERDICT WAS "IN-SULT TO JUSTICE" DECLARES ONE MEMBER OF UPPER HOUSE AT WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 23.—The acquittal of Albert B. Fall and Edward L. Doheny by a jury on charges of conspiracy to defraud the government in the 1922 oil leasing negotiations has produced senatorial reverberations. Senator Hefflin, (Democrat), Alabama, denounced the trial in unmeasured terms on the senate floor. "An insult to justice," he shouted fervidly at one point in an address delivered two hours after the verdict. "With Fall and Doheny going free and Frank L. Smith coming to Washington, God help the nation!" Senator Norris (Republican), Nebraska, chairman of the judiciary committee, made the trial comment that "you can't convict a hundred million dollars." Four indictments growing out of the senate investigation, two against Fall and Doheny for bribery, one against Fall and Harry F. Sinclair, lessee of the Teapot Dome reserve, and one against Sinclair for contempt of the senate, are still to be disposed of by the prosecutors.

POOL LOADS WHEAT AT PRINCE RUPERT

Pacific Coast Shipments Slightly Lower Than at Same Time Last Year, Calgary Announces

A Calgary despatch to the Edmonton Journal says: The Alberta wheat pool has shipped 4,000,000 bushels of wheat through the port of Vancouver this fall, out of a total of about 7,500,000 bushels shipped. The big pool terminal at Prince Rupert is practically filled with wheat, with 1,000,000 bushels en route. The first British ship to load wheat from this port, SS. Yseric, took on 226,000 bushels of pool wheat in six hours and 45 minutes, creating something of a record. Other boats loading pool wheat at Prince Rupert this week are: SS. Meigen Maru, loading half a cargo of 2s and 3s; SS. Ypres Maru, loading full cargo of 2s; SS. Kifuku Maru, loading full cargo of 2s. The SS. Taiyu Maru is expected in port this week-end to load a full cargo of 3s. The grain is all going to Europe. Shipments via the Pacific coast this

fall have not been as heavy as last year at this time, owing to high ocean rates and scarcity of boats, the result of the British coal strike. Rates are easing up now that the strike is ended. The pool at this time is a couple of million bushels short of the total amount shipped last year at this date. Less beer and whisky and more tea and sugar are being consumed and more tobacco used, report the British customs and excise commissioners.



REINDEER MAY OUST HUSKIES

PROSPECTORS IN ALASKA FIND ANIMALS TRAVEL ON LITTLE FOOD

ANCHORAGE, Dec. 23.—Tobacco chewing reindeer, possessing the stubbornness of a mule and the fighting qualities of Gene Tunney, bid fair to challenge the supremacy of the malamutes in the field of Alaskan transportation.
This is the belief of W. G. Culver, formerly of the United States bureau of education, who says Eskimo herders of Broad Pass are finding a ready sale to prospectors of sled-broke reindeer for draught purposes.

The use of dogs entails hauling dog feed to the base of operation and feeding the animals during the summer months when they have no work to perform. It has been found more economical to utilize a pair of reindeer for hauling supplies over the spring snow crust and then butcher the animals for meat at the end of the journey.

Where it once required fifty pounds of tallow, 100 pounds of cornmeal and 100 pounds of rice with addition of dried salmon to feed a dog during the summer, 100 pounds of cornmeal and a small quantity of reindeer moss suffices to cover a journey of a hundred miles with a reindeer team, and the prospector's grub bill is reduced to the extent of about 160 pounds of reindeer meat.

REINDEER TEMPERAMENT
Reindeer are extremely temperamental and must be handled with diplomacy and discretion, says Culver.
"Better call a truce when 'Reiny' becomes temperamental," he advises, "offer him a chew of the various brands of strong plug tobacco, then sit down and wait until the steed's mental process digests his single idea—that of adamant stubbornness—and supplants it with something bespeaking a desire to travel."

FLYING IN DOMINION HAS GREAT FUTURE

Says Sir Alan Cobham, Famous British Aviator

TORONTO, Dec. 23.—"There is greater opportunity for the development of aviation throughout the Dominion than there ever will be in the home country, for the simple reason that whereas in England we are handicapped with short distances, very bad visibility and a lack of the necessity of flying, in the Dominion we have vast distances to be covered, as a rule, good flying weather and an opportunity of proving that flying is the quickest means of transport."

Such is the prediction of Sir Alan Cobham, world-famous aviator, who last October completed his record-breaking 28,000 mile flight from England to Australia and return, and who is now touring Canada.

It was his first appearance in Canada, where he will deliver lectures.
"To deal with the case in England we will set, for example, a journey from London to Manchester, a distance of about 200 miles, with a very good train service that does this journey in three hours and 40 minutes, and the quickest it can be done by air is about two hours, added to which must be the time of getting to and from the aerodrome," he continued.

"This is generally the situation all over England and Scotland. Therefore the great hope of the development of civil aviation in England and Scotland is the private owner, who will use his aeroplanes chiefly for the pleasure of flying from one place to another and visiting his friends. Now in Canada, Australia and South Africa, the situation is entirely different. The time is not far distant when the quickest and cheapest and best way to get from most points in the Dominion will be by air."

## BRINGING UP FATHER



## GERMANY AND ITALY ALLIED

### RECENTLY CLOSED TREATY MAY GIVE LEAGUE OF NATIONS DIFFICULT PROBLEM

BERLIN, Dec. 23.—The following is an outline of the highly important main terms of the Treaty of Arbitration and Friendship drafted by Signore Scialoja and Piolotti for Italy, and Herr Schubert and Gauss for Germany at Geneva.

While Germany claims there are no secret clauses and it is announced that the treaty will be lodged with the League of Nations, some clauses in it are likely to cause lively comment.

The main clauses follow:

First: Italy offers to support Germany in freeing the Rhineland.

Second: Italy withdraws objections to an Austro-German Alliance.

Third: Germany will align herself with new grouping of powers including Italy, Rumania, Greece and Bulgaria, whose policy will be one of friendliness with Russia.

Fourth: Both countries will decline to take any defensive steps against each other commercially or otherwise if either is involved in a conflict with a third party.

Fifth: Italy will use her influence to persuade Poland to align herself with Germany.

Sixth: Both Germany and Italy are to endeavor to obtain Colonial mandates for each other from the League of Nations.

Seventh: Failing this, both pledge themselves to co-operate in an eventual move against Turkey.

There is also a proposal whereby Germany will lend German craftsmen to assist in constructing Italian submarines.

The seventh clause, if substantiated when the treaty is deposited in Geneva, is bound to raise an extremely difficult problem for the League, and might cause grave differences within the League unless, as rumored, Italy has already lined up the majority of the Balkans on her side.

## POST OFFICE REVENUE UP

### GOVERNMENT'S RETURNS NOT REDUCED IN SPITE OF RETURN TO PENNY POST

OTTAWA, Dec. 23.—After a two-month slump in August and September, the revenues of the Post Office Department bid fair to make good the prophecies that a return to two-cent postage would not reduce the Government's income.

Penny postage came into effect July 1, and in the month of July the postal revenues were slightly greater than in the preceding year. The figures are: July, 1928, \$2,300,000; July, 1929, \$2,300,000. However, in August and September the revenues dropped to \$1,900,000, the total being the same in each month. In the preceding year the revenues for these months were \$2,100,000 and \$2,300,000 respectively, so that the Post Office suffered a loss of \$600,000. In October, the figures for which are just in hand, the postal revenues for 1929 show a decided advance. The actual total is \$1,900,000, which compares more favorably with \$2,100,000 in October, 1928.

If the rate of increase is maintained, it is probable that Post Office revenues for November and December will show an increase over the preceding year and reduce the adverse balance.

The only other heading under which the Federal revenues show a loss in comparison with 1928 is the income tax. Here the receipts for the first seven months of the current fiscal year are \$43,482,000, as compared with \$50,705,000 in 1928 or a loss of more than \$7,000,000. When the great improvement in business is taken into consideration, it is clear that the loss on this count has been much heavier.

All told, after absorbing the losses in postal and income tax revenue, the Federal Treasury is better off by \$6,500,000, than in 1928.

## SPORT CHAT

While there are ten clubs in the National Hockey League, the professional hockey organization of North America, and while six of these clubs are owned in the United States, it is pretty safe to say that not more than one per cent of the players are non-Canadian. The same seems to be the case in most of the amateur leagues which have sprung up just lately across the line, and in the case of one for instance, in Portland, Oregon, there is not a native born American on the outfit. The players are all Canadians, and include representatives from McLeod, Alberta, Vancouver, Nelson, Edmonton, Ottawa, Prince Edward Island, Regina and Winnipeg.

When the big Catalina Island swim takes place in California, which is supposed to be a sort of an Americanized version of the English Channel swim, there will be at least one Canadian taking part in it. That will be George Young from Toronto, one of the greatest of the younger generation of swimmers in the Dominion for long distances. That he has never attempted the Channel crossing is due probably to the almost prohibitive expenditure that is necessary to try that feat under the most favorable auspices. Beside contestants getting return fare for coming, the prize offered the winner of the race is well worth competing for, and will be paid at the rate of \$1,000 per mile or over for it amounts to \$25,000 and the distance of the race is about 22 miles.

Almost every year amateur boxers of eastern Canada and amateur boxers of the eastern United States have home and home tournaments. They are usually held in Boston and Montreal, and as a rule some important amateur athletic organization takes charge of them and the responsibility for financial loss if there be such. Interesting prizes are offered and this year they consisted of gold watches. Strange to say, in Montreal, Canada won all the five International bouts of the tournament, while in Boston the United States boxers won the majority of the contests. One man stood out in both tournaments and that was a Montreal policeman, named Ratelle. He boxes in the 75 lb. class and won handily in both meets.

## PERPETUAL MOTION IS STILL CARDINAL FAITH OF SOME MEN

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—Every knowledge of the realistic laws of mathematics does not make inventors immune to the romantic lure of one of the oldest fallacies cherished by human beings.

Belief that inanimate matter can be so patterned that it will, after receiving an initial human impulse, produce perpetual motion is shown by the Patent Office records to remain the cardinal faith of an astonishing number of dreamers.

Many have been men of considerable erudition, and some have to their credit invention of sound worth. Most of them have experienced the elation of apparent success until their little machines were stopped by the laws of nature.

A sketchy record of broken hopes extends far back into the files of the Patent Office. The only estimate of the number of applications to patent perpetual motion devices received since the office was established is a vague "thousands." None of the devices has been found patentable after examination by experts.

PETER BLACK PASSES AWAY

WELL KNOWN PIONEER OF CITY AND NORTH COUNTRY SUCCEEDED TO SERIOUS ILLNESS IN HOSPITAL THIS MORNING

One of Prince Rupert's, and indeed, one of the north's best known and most picturesque pioneers, passed to his rest in the death which took place at 3:05 o'clock this morning at the Prince Rupert General Hospital of Peter Black, proprietor of the Central Hotel and local coal dealer.

Born at Benhar, Lanarkshire, Scotland, 59 years ago, the late Mr. Black left home at the age of twenty years and came to Nanaimo, Vancouver Island, where, for some time he was engaged in coal mining.

Surviving relatives Beside his mourning widow and two children, a son, Peter Jr., and daughter, Hester, the late Mr. Black, who was the oldest member of his family, is survived by five brothers—David and William, mine managers in the Old Country, Archie, a Penticton rancher, who is now a patient in the Vancouver General Hospital; James and Thomas, both of this city—and two sisters, Nellie (Mrs. Arm-

COAL EXPORT BAN REMOVED

ENOUGH COAL IN ENGLAND TO ALLOW IT BEING SENT OUT AGAIN

LONDON, Dec. 23. — Announcement was made in the British Parliament that all restriction on the exportation of coal, except hard coal and coke, would be removed immediately. It was stated that there was sufficient coal now on hand to enable this to be done without endangering domestic supplies.

The removal of restrictions will facilitate resumption of work in the mines, and it now seems assured that the 900,000 miners will be working before the end of the year.

Incidentally the price of domestic coal was reduced about \$4 a ton.

A. J. Cook, the miners' secretary and the leader of the recent strike, appears by his declaration in Moscow that after a lull for preparation the miners would fight again, to be associating himself with the declared plans of the minority movement for a campaign to revive the militant spirit among the miners who have resumed work.

This plan includes a proposal to transform the Miners' Federation into a national industrial union of mine workers, to do away with the autonomy of the district miners' associations, and to discard the more moderate leaders.

To set against this movement there is the determination of officials like Joseph Jones, secretary of the Yorkshire Miners' Association, to restore authority to the Miners' Federation by driving out the Communist influences which have pervaded the coal fields.
