NEW METHOD OF HALIBUT FISHING SOON

WRECKAGE OF FAVOR'S SEAPLANE HAS BEEN FOUND IN QUATSINO SOUND

Wreckage of Seaplane Used by M. B. Favor Found at Quatsino Sd.

VICTORIA, June 5.—What is believed to be the wreckage of M. B. Favor's seaplane, which left Seattle on May 16, has been found at San Josef Bay, Quatsino Sound, a message to the provincial Police stated.

A fisherman named Rasmussen is reported to have seen a plane flying low and going down in San Josef Bay on the north side. On May 25, he stated he found wreckage of the plane on the north side of the bay.

Favor, accompanied by R. W. Swinehart, was en route to Bristol Bay, Alaska, via Ketchikan, for the Carlisle Packing Co. No trace of him or of his companion has been found. Whether the men were lost in the thickly-forested country of the Quatsino district or whether they were drowned or died from exhaustion in trying to find their way to some village is a mystery.

Two airplanes of an Alaskan air mapping expedition are leaving Seattle today and planned to search for Favor and Swinehart.

VICTORIA, June 5.—J. P. Babcock, chairman of the International halibut commission, announced today that the halibut vessel Scandia of Seattle had been chartered by the commission to carry out work of investigation in northern waters.

The Scandia has already sailed north where she is fishing like other vessels. A large part of her catch is being tagged in an endeavor to learn the movements and habits of the halibut.

The entire population, men, women and children, of the village of Metlakatla was present yesterday afternoon at the obsequies for the late Charles Venn to pay their last respects to one of the most highly respected residents of the community whose death occurred this week. Headed by the village band, a long procession followed the bier from the family residence to the church and thence to the burying grounds. At the church, Archdeacon G. A. Rix officiated and there was an anthem by the choir. Others who gave addresses were William Leighton, Joe Nelson, Peter Haldane and Peter Ryan representing various organizations of the community and the church. At the grave, Peter Venn, brother of deceased, gave an address telling some of deceased's history and thanking all those who had participated in the service and shown their sympathy to the family. There were a large number of floral tributes.

Among those in attendance at the funeral was Indian Agent W. E. Collison.

Huge Fishing Boat Will Operate on Far Away Banks; 30 Dories and 1,000 Tons

VANCOUVER, June 5.—Following a discovery of new productive fishing banks between the Aleutian Islands and Japanese waters, the largest halibut boat ever fitted out at Vancouver, the auxiliary motor ship Chris Molter, is now being done over, and it is expected the alterations will take five months to complete.

The vessel which will carry 30 fishing dories, is a large tender launch. She will have a capacity of 1,000 tons of fish in cold storage.

Los Angeles Evangelist Reported to be Found Near City of Edmonton

LOS ANGELES, June 5.—A telegram received by the police here from Edmonton states that Aimee Semple Macpherson, the missing evangelist, has been located in that city by private detectives. Miss Macpherson arrived via Calgary with a party driving two California autos.

A Mrs. Blanche T. Potter, a Los Angeles art studio representative at a local hotel, denies that she is the missing evangelist and does not resemble her.

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Brought Girl from Italy and She Then Married Another so Martino Wants His Money Back

VANCOUVER, June 5.—How Pasquali Martino, living off life as a bachelor coal miner of South Wellington, Vancouver Island, entered into correspondence with Salvina Corsoro Torillo of Italy, whom he had never seen, and induced her to come to Canada was revealed in the county court here yesterday when he brought suit against her for return of \$313, which he says he advanced her in the belief that she would become his bride.

The young Italian girl, when she arrived in Vancouver in 1923, refused to marry Martino and instead wedded John Berardino, a hotel proprietor.

Martino said he paid \$293 for his alleged fiancee's travelling expenses beside giving her \$20 spending money.

The present Mrs. Berardino defends the action on the ground that no engagement existed between her and the plaintiff.

SERVICE WITH Q.C. ISLANDS

Matter Discussed at Vancouver With Canadian National Officials by Local Delegates.

Report of delegates from Prince Rupert Board of Trade, who waited on Canadian National officials at Vancouver in connection with the steamship schedule between this port and Queen Charlotte Islands, was presented to the Board at its monthly general meeting last night. It was shown that the delegation had waited on B.G. Keeley, George McNicholl and R. Beaumont and had gone into the whole question with them with the final result that it was decided nothing could be done until September when a re-arrangement will be made on the cessation of the three boats a week service between here and Vancouver.

The change to the present schedule it was pointed out had been made as a result of an agreement with the Union Steamship Co. who had for a short time given a service direct with Vancouver. It was shown that with Graham Island points Prince Rupert had the advantage whereas with the south islands Vancouver benefitted.

One result of the conference was that Mr. Keeley stated that if a suitable boat could be secured they were prepared to put it on at once in direct service. If they could not secure one any other way they might build one. The motorship Lillehorn could be diverted this way in case of emergency.

Another concession made by the company was that they would see that there was a boat to bring people and produce from the Islands to the exhibition this year.

F. G. Dawson said that after going into the matter at length, it was found that they had nothing better than the present schedule to suggest as long as the equipment was as at present.

Prince Rupert delegates present included F. G. Dawson, M. P. McCaffery, Olof Hanson and D. Thomson.

SUBURBAN LANDS FOR SETTLEMENT

Board of Trade Receives Report on Subdivision at Digby Island

At the meeting of the Board of Trade last night H. F. Pullen reported on behalf of a special committee of the Board that had been appointed last year to take up with the minister of lands the surveying and marketing of lands in this vicinity for use as suburban sites. The result of their activities had been that two tracts were now being surveyed on Digby Island, in the bay just back of the quarantine station and the other at Crippen Cove. The survey would soon be complete and the lands available for those who wished to purchase.

There were no lands available on Kain Island as none belonged to the Provincial Government there, the railway company being the owners. The land commissioner of the company, who had been expected to visit Prince Rupert, had never got this far although he was supposed to have been coming and the result was that nothing had been done in regard to railway lands.

E. C. Gibbons suggested that the secretary write the land commissioner and ask that he pay a visit to the city in the near future.

The committee was asked to continue its activities.

WILL ASK LEGISLATURE FOR MONEY FOR ROAD AT SESSION IN FALL

On behalf of a local delegation of the Board of Trade, F. G. Dawson last night reported to the Board that they had discussed the Kain Island road continuation with Mr. Pattullo, at Victoria and had been told that the sum of \$25,000 was available for the work this year and it was the intention to ask the Legislature at its next session to vote sufficient money to complete it to Galloway Rapids.

DEATH WAS ACCIDENTAL

Julius Olsen, Logger, Struck on Head by Falling Limb at Rivers Bight

Holding no one to blame for the occurrence, the jury sat yesterday afternoon before Deputy Coroner J. R. Tannock at the inquest into the death of Julius Olsen found that deceased came to his death through an accident when struck by the limb of a falling tree at the J. R. Morrison logging camp at Rivers Bight on June 3. According to the evidence that was presented, Olsen and his partner, Ed. Nelson, were felling a large larch tree and as it dropped to earth it struck another tree, the limb breaking off and striking Olsen on the head as he was stepping off the spring board. Dr. L. W. Kergin testified that death was due to fracture of the crown of the skull with severe injury to the brain. He testified that death was probably instant although Nelson, partner of the deceased, stated that the accident occurred about 9 o'clock in the morning and that Olsen did not actually expire until 10:15. Blood was issuing from his mouth and nose but his pulse was still beating up to the latter time. Beside Dr. Kergin and Ed. Nelson another witness was Emil Palmer who did not actually see the accident and whose evidence was of an unimportant nature. The jury consisted of Alex. McRae (foreman), W. W. Wyfall, Fred Hardy, J. A. Kirkpatrick, A. J. Phillipson and John Bulger.



BOAT SUBSIDY TO ISLANDS

New Form of Tender Provides for 80 Trips Between This Port and Various Points

At the meeting of the board of trade held last evening in the city council chamber, Olof Hanson presiding, G. W. Nickerson reported success in getting a promise from the governmental authorities that they would call for tenders for the subsidy to Queen Charlotte Island, the terms of the subsidy requiring the making of 80 trips a year, between this city and the Islands, the amount of subsidy being \$21,000 from the trade and commerce committee and \$9,000 from the Post Office for carrying the mails.

It was thought that if the big companies did not put in a tender that the board might interest themselves in it and form a local company to either build or buy a boat. Tenders had to be in within two months and the present contract with the C.N.R. expires March 31 of next year so that there would be plenty of time for a local concern to secure a boat, even if it has to be built.

F. G. Dawson mentioned that this was quite a concession on the part of the government. Quick action would have to be taken if any results were to be obtained.

It was decided to leave the matter with the trade and commerce committee to keep in touch with a view to action if necessary.

PRESENTATION MADE TO MRS. WATSON ON LEAVING DIGBY ISLAND

The home of A. Watson, the popular accountant of Digby Island, and a late member of the Canadian expeditionary force, was invaded on Monday last by the "troops" of the Digby mess, to present him with an illuminating address, ably prepared by Lieut. Hooper of H.M. Canadian Forces.

The address was read by Corporal G. Purvis Connally, a veteran of the South African war and a member of the late C.E.F. Forestry Corps.

After Corporal Connally had read the address, supported by "Chef" Hamblin, Andrew "Gillingham," Drummer Kelly, Farrier - Sergt. Fraser, "Caribou" Dunn and "Chips" Kilday, Mrs. Watson (Auntie Kate) who also saw considerable service in the war, whose many kindnesses were so much appreciated by the heroes of the "Bungalow," was presented with a three piece silver coffee set as a small token of remembrance on their leaving Digby.

After the singing of "Blest be the tie that binds," and "For he's a jolly good fellow," the "troops" returned to their permanent grade.





DISCUSSION ON FISH TRAPS AT BOARD MEETING

Matter of Canadian Fishing Company's Application to be Further Considered

The question of the operation of fish traps on the American border was discussed at some length by members of the board of trade and a special meeting of the council of the board is to be held soon at which it will be further thrashed out.

Milton Gonzales, representing the Canadian Fishing Co., opened the discussion. They had taken over the Wales Island interests which formerly operated three traps right on the boundary. They had been told that if they built new traps they would be allowed to operate but on finally applying for licenses were unable to get them until pressure had been brought to bear and then it was only for one season. Now they had the traps which had cost a large sum and they could not secure licenses owing to the presentation of a petition from this port opposing them.

Precedent Fearing

The traps did not affect the trolling or seining and the fishermen acknowledged that. All the fishermen were afraid of what a precedent might be set and other traps would follow. They had taken the matter up with many of the fishermen and while they acknowledged the justice of the claim to a license, they would not sign a petition to that effect.

The fish at the points where the traps were to be located ran in the direction of Alaska and would be taken by the American traps. Last year in that neighborhood there were 23 traps but this year the number had increased to 32.

In the Canadian Fishing Company's traps last year 105,000 fish were taken and out of this large number only 2,400 were cohoes and 52 springs. This was a very small number. The others were the cheaper grades of fish, pinks and dogs.

Labor Council

The matter had been taken up with the Trades and Labor Council but they had refused to act unless on the recommendation of the fishermen.

The board of trade had some years ago gone on record as opposed to fish traps and he asked that in this case they reconsider their decision. The company was entitled to at least get out what they had put in.

F. G. Dawson explained the situation in regard to the department at Ottawa. A petition signed by 600 men had been presented against traps and a pledge had been given by the minister of fisheries that no trap licenses would be issued. He personally believed in this case the traps were justified but he would like to see the matter thoroughly investigated and no snap judgment given. The fisheries committee should report on the matter.

Olof Hanson, the chairman also urged further investigation before a decision was given.

Not Injurious

G. W. Nickerson strongly urged the granting of the licenses. In this particular case the Americans would get the fish if Canadians did not. The trollers had known all along that these traps did not hurt them. He believed that the stand taken by the board in the past should not apply to this case. Pinks and dogs must be caught cheaply. His opinion was that the traps were less injurious to fishing than the seine.

Mr. Hanson mentioned that the fishing population was what Prince Rupert had to depend on and the board should not do anything against their interests.

It was then moved by F. G. Dawson, seconded by G. W. Nickerson that the matter be referred to the fisheries committee to report to the executive which would have power to act. This was carried.
