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# NOMINATIONS TODAY FOR CIVIC ELECTIONS

## BANDITS HOLD UP TRAIN IN MEXICO AND KILL AND BURN THOSE ABOARD

### Bandits Kill Soldiers and Murder Passengers Mexican Railway Train

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 11.—A passenger train was attacked by bandits near Guadalajara, the majority of the passengers being murdered and most of the members of the military escort killed.

Twenty armed men who boarded the train at Guadalajara suddenly began knifing the soldiers and robbing and killing the passengers. Of the military escort, all but seven were killed and those not losing their lives were seriously wounded. The train was burned with the victims while the bandits escaped on the engine carrying away 300,000 pesos.

Twenty bodies, burned beyond recognition, were found tangled in the mass of ruins and it is feared others will be found.

### WAGE CUT WAS JUSTIFIED IN NOVA SCOTIA

Commissioner Says 1922 Demand Was Not in Order But Later It Was

#### REVISION RECOMMENDED

HALIFAX, Jan. 11.—That the British Empire Steel Corporation was amply justified in demanding a cut of ten per cent in wages in 1924 but was not justified in demanding the cut in 1922 and that necessary machinery be provided to permit revision of wage scale at six month periods based on the company's ability to pay, were among the findings and recommendations of Sir Andrew Bae Duncan, the Royal Commissioner, following a two months' investigation into the Nova Scotia coal industry.

### NEW SAWMILL FOR INDIANS

GITLAKDAMIX, Jan. 11.—A new sawmill is to be installed here for the use of the Indians of the village. Work is beginning on the foundation and the Indians will be busy during the winter getting out logs.

The Indian department is supplying a new mill and the Indians have agreed to supply the lumber and erect a day school building on the reserve.

### PROHIBITION OFFICER BURNED IN HIS HOME

NOME, Jan. 11.—Robert James, in charge of liquor suppression among the Indians in Alaska, died at the hospital Saturday as a result of burns sustained from a fire at his home.

### BODY OF ALBERTA MA ALMOST CUT IN TWO

VANCOUVER, Jan. 11.—R. D. Pearce of Strathmore, Alberta, was run over by a C.P.R. freight train and his body almost cut in two in the Vancouver freight yards yesterday.

### PILLSBURY IS TO BE LOCATED IN WINNIPEG

In Meantime, Former Head of Local Dry Dock is Going to Victoria to Take Charge of C.N.R. Work

The future headquarters of J. H. Pillsbury, pioneer engineer of this city and until recently manager of the Prince Rupert dry dock, will be in Winnipeg with the engineering department of the Canadian National Railways. This was stated by Mr. Pillsbury this morning on his return from Winnipeg headquarters of the western region of the Canadian National Railways. In the meantime, however, Mr. Pillsbury will go to Victoria for a few months where he will take charge of some work for the railway company. He will leave the city for Victoria on Friday morning, but Mrs. Pillsbury and family will probably remain in Prince Rupert until such time as Mr. Pillsbury goes to Winnipeg to take up his permanent residence.

### CONSTABLE'S REMAINS HAVE REACHED CITY

Body of Provincial Constable J. P. Eggleshaw Will be Forwarded to Vancouver For Interment

Accompanied by the widow and Provincial Constables S. Cline of Hazelton, the remains of the late Provincial Constable J. P. Eggleshaw of Terrace arrived in the city by this morning's train and are at the parlors of the B.C. Undertakers where they will await shipment south on the Gardena tomorrow afternoon for interment in Vancouver. Deceased was a member of the Masonic Order and also of the Oddfellows besides being prominent in the affairs of the Great War Veterans' Association.

### Motor Sledge Caravan will Travel 1,000 Miles to Point Barrow with Supply of Gasoline

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—Malcolm Smith, 67 years old, a veteran of Alaska, a dog team driver, left New York Saturday for Seattle to take command of a motor sledge caravan which will start on a 1,000 mile trip across Endicott Mountains and the bleakest part of Northern Alaska with gasoline fuel for the airplane in which Captain George Wilkins will attempt to fly from Point Barrow to the North Pole.

### EMPRESS RAN DOWN VESSEL

Ten Chinese Drown When Tungshing Rammed Belong Shanghai

SHANGHAI, Jan. 11.—The C.P.R. steamship Empress of Asia outbound from here today rammed the Indo-China Steam Navigation Company's steamer Tungshing, twelve miles down river and sank her. Ten Chinese were drowned.

The Empress picked up many survivors and after making minor repairs proceeded en route to Vancouver by way of Japanese ports.

### Two Nominations for Mayor and Very Few for Other Offices in the Civic Election Campaign

When nominations for the civic election which will be held on Thursday closed at the city clerk's office at two o'clock this afternoon it was found, as expected, that there were but two candidates for the mayoralty—Mayor S. M. Newton and Ex-Ald. S. P. McMordie.

There was only one nomination for the one-year term in the city council to succeed Ex-Ald. McMordie, Wilbert J. Greer was thus declared elected by acclamation.

The two vacancies on the police commission were also filled by acclamation—George J. Frizzell for a two year term and Commissioner W. H. Montgomery for the one year term in succession to James Coombs, resigned.

There are six candidates for the four two-year terms on the aldermanic board, namely, Ald. M. M. Stephens, Ald. R. F. Perry, Ald. Oscar Larsen, Ald. J. A. Smith, Joe Greer and A. H. McPherson.

For the two vacancies on the school board, three candidates were nominated—George A. Bryant, Thomas McMeekin and Henry Smith.

In addition to the selection of mayor, aldermen and school trustees, the property holders on Thursday will vote on an \$18,000 money bylaw covering the grading of the Cemetery Road.

### BODY OF LUMBERMAN FOUND AT VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, Jan. 11.—J. Finlayson from a northern lumber camp, whose disappearance a few weeks ago caused friends and police officers to search for him, was found to have been drowned in the harbor. On Sunday his body was discovered in the inlet.

### CAPTAIN OF SCHOONER LOST IN THE ARCTIC

NOME, Jan. 11.—Captain Larson of the schooner Luxbury, trading expedition, which left Nome three years ago, was drowned when he fell through a rift in the ice in the Arctic Ocean. The information is conveyed in letters to friends from Point Barrow received Saturday.

### JAPANESE HORSEMAN TAKES DIFFICULT RIDE

TOKYO, Jan. 11.—For the third time in the history of Japanese horsemanship, a man has ridden up the long, steep stairway of the Atagoyama Shrine and made the return journey without injury either to himself or his mount. The intrepid horseman was Toshiba Iwaki. The historic shrine flight is 90 feet high and has an incline of about 60 degrees.

### NATIONAL THIRST FOR GRAPE JUICE BEING DEVELOPED

DETROIT, Jan. 11.—The Michigan grapegrower has been a chief beneficiary of prohibition, not because of a demand for grapes for wine-making, but because of the creation of a national thirst for grapejuice, said Seraphin Bruno, a well known grower of western Michigan. His views found concurrence from most of the growers visiting the Detroit market.

Grape prices have soared since prohibition almost entirely due to increased demand from grape juice manufacturers, Bruno asserted. Winemakers in the old days seldom paid more than 86¢ a ton. The price last fall was \$90 and more.

"There is some winemaking, I presume," Mr. Bruno said, "but grape-growers know, through their pocket books, that it is kickless grapejuice that has done the business."

### SOVIET FUNERAL AT DRUMHELLER RECENTLY

No Christian Service for Lad Who Was Burned in Mining Town But "Red Flag" is Chanted

CALGARY, Jan. 11.—Chanting the "Red Flag" and standing with bowed heads before the effigy of Lenin, a little group of Drumheller Communists conducted the first Soviet funeral service in the history of the mining valley—and believed to be the first in Canada.

Scorning the burial form of the Christian religion, the Communists laid to rest the body of Alfred Swartz, a lad who was burned to death when his home was destroyed by fire, recently.

One hour before the funeral service, the United church minister, who had been asked to officiate, was notified that his services would not be required.

Led by Louis McDonald, alias "Kid Burns," a group of about seven to ten adults and twenty-five children marched with the bier to the cemetery, where the Soviet burial rites were followed to the letter.

### SOUTH AMERICANS ARE BEST DANCERS

Italian, French, Spanish and English Experts so Decide

LONDON, Jan. 11.—South Americans are the best ballroom dancers in London, in the opinion of an impartial jury made up of Italian, French, Spanish and English dancing masters.

The South Americans are seen in the West End ballrooms nearly every night and are eagerly sought in society as well as for private affairs when hostesses vie with one another to have plenty of good dancers on their lists.

The South Americans have the rhythm of the North Americans and the style and deportment of the English dancers, the judges decided. The English dancers are too stiff, the jury agreed, and dancers from the United States, while doing splendidly, are inclined to put a little too much vigor into their movements.

### SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

#### PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 21 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulation regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e. carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

#### PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

#### HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

#### LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

#### GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.

## CANADIAN GRAIN IS BEING SHIPPED BY UNITED STATES PORTS

(Edmonton Bulletin) Government reports show that of 24,095,044 bushels of wheat exported from Canada to Great Britain in November, only 5,485,710 bushels were shipped from Canadian ports. The other 18,609,334 bushels went out of United States ports, which terminals of course were reached over United States railways or waterways.

That is to say, three-quarters of the wheat that was shipped to Britain during that month went through the United States, contributing to the prosperity of United States railways, canal, ports, and—in large measure also—of U.S. ocean steamship companies. Deducting from this total the amount which went out via Vancouver, the proportion of the eastward moving grain which flowed into U.S. channels and to U.S. ports is substantially more than three-quarters.

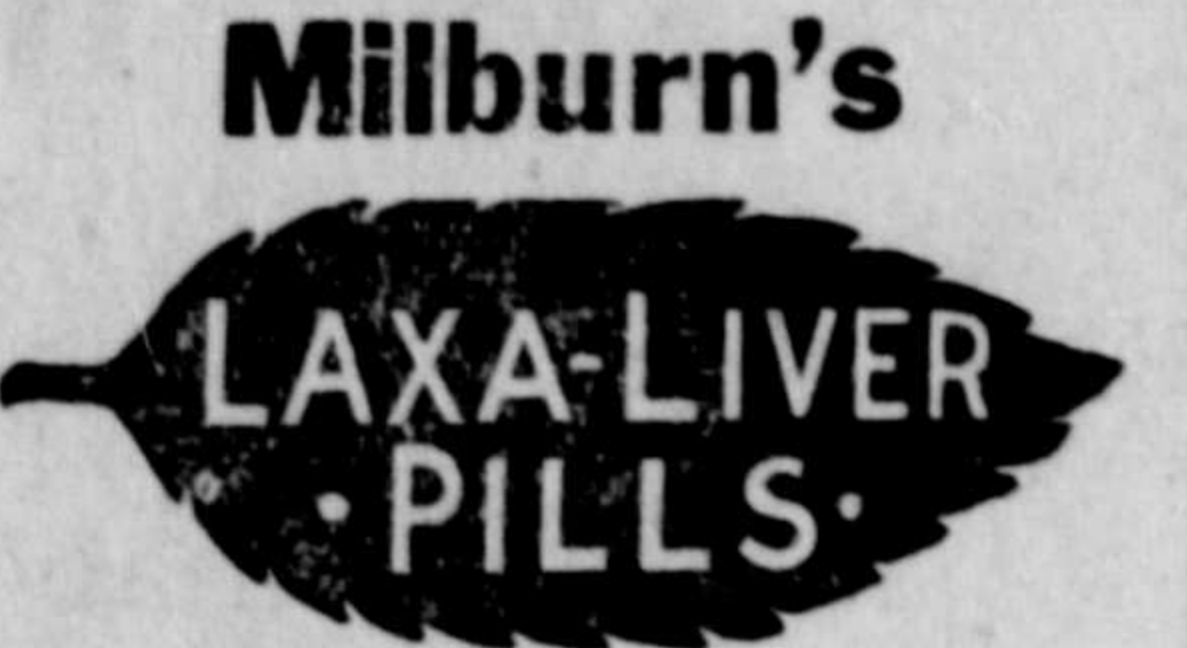

## RAILWAY HEADS TO SOLVE PROBLEMS OF TWO BIG SYSTEMS

(Vancouver Star)  
By far the most arresting piece of news presented to Canada for months is the statement that E. W. Beatty and Sir Henry Thornton, respective chiefs of the Canadian Pacific and Canadian National Railways, have resolved themselves into a permanent board to deal with questions of competitive service, to bring about economies in both railways and to promote greater efficiency.

In effect this means that a solution of the railway problems that have troubled the economic and political life of the Dominion is at last apparently in sight. Instead of a situation wherein the two roads were waging a commercial war, with the taxpayer and business man paying the cost, the country will be provided with two excellent services running in close harmony.

## LINKING OURSELVES WITH UNITED STATES

(Manitoba Free Press)  
For the first time in history, although traffic has been flowing north and south since the early days in English-speaking settlement of the Red River valley, Winnipeg, in 1925, became connected with United States cities to the south by a hard surface highway. The completion of the travelling of the Lord Selkirk highway from Emerson to St. Norbert now links Winnipeg to the United States by a motor highway that will be passable in all weathers. As a result of this, a heavy increase in tourist traffic is expected in 1926.
