MAJORITY FOR GOVERNMENT HIGHEST YET


Page Who Broke from Jail Last Week Goes up on Other Counts

TWELVE CARS ARE WRECKED

Five Killed and Property Damaged But No Lives Lost in Railway Accident

MONDODERRY, N.S., May 19.—Twelve head of cattle were shed to death and others injured and great quantities of merchandise and railway property damaged and the main line of the Canadian National was blocked when cars of fast freight were wrecked in Montreal for Halifax were wrecked. Mackenzie King Government Has Majority of Thirteen on Budget Following Debate Lasting Month

OTTAWA, May 19.—After more than a month's debate ending in an all-night session the House of Commons at 4:05 this morning defeated the Conservative amendment to the budget by a majority of 13, the vote against it being 121 and for it 108.

On the main budget motion, the voting was reversed. Liberals, independents, labor and Progressives, who voted against the amendment voted affirmative on the main motion that the House resolve itself into a committee of ways and means to consider the budget resolutions.

This was carried by a majority of 13, the vote for being 121 and against 108.

In the two divisions the Government secured the largest majority of the session on a major measure. It was half past three when the last speech ended and Speaker Lacombe rose to put the question. Following its adoption of the budget motion, the House went into committee of ways and means but only to report progress, after which it adjourned.

An unusual feature of the division was the fact that neither Premier Mackenzie King nor Hon. Arthur Meighen cast a vote, Mr. Meighen being absent through illness and Mr. Mackenzie King having paired with him. There were no party switches. Premier King spoke for three hours and R. B. Bennett spoke in place of Mr. Meighen.

Premier Mackenzie King spoke of the Manion amendment to the budget as a "milk and water amendment." It said nothing for good or ill and did not touch on the vital questions of the tariff but dealt merely with incidental procedure. He charged that while Mr. Meighen pleaded in the election campaign for tariff revision on a protective basis, Conservatives had not been prepared to bring in such a budget amendment.

R. B. Bennett asserted that the National debt was in reality substantially greater than when the present Government took office. Every trade treaty negotiated by the Government had meant increases in trade for the foreign country and lessened trade for Canada.

AVIATOR HAS NOT ARRIVED

Fears Expressed for M. B. Favor and Mechanic Who Left Two Days Ago For Ketchikan

SEATTLE, May 19.—Fears are expressed for the safety of M. B. Favor, a local aviator and his mechanic R. W. Swinheart, who hopped off here Sunday for Ketchikan en route to Bristol Bay, Alaska. Advice from Alaska says he had not arrived.

It is stated that Favor had had but five lessons in flying. He was engaged by the salmon canning company to spot salmon and report their presence to the fishermen.

LONDON, May 19.—The position is a deadlock, declared Secretary Cook of the Miners' Federation today, referring to the Government proposals which come before the miners' national delegates in conference tomorrow. The miners, he asserted, would not agree to any alteration in hours of labor or wages.

Reading Teacups is Illegal and Must Stop in Vancouver Declares License Inspector

VANCOUVER, May 19.—While palmistry, phrenology, and astrology are recognized as sciences under the criminal code and persons found practising them are eligible to receive civic licenses, fortune telling by teacup readings are illegal and will be banned in Vancouver, henceforth, Charles Jones, city license inspector said today.

The practice of giving a free "reading" of the future in Vancouver cafes and beauty parlors has recently achieved great popularity but persons permitting its continuance are liable to cancellation of their business license and to police action under the criminal code, said Mr. Jones.

Final Flurry in City Council Before Passing of Agreement Handing Policing to Province

The final passing of the agreement which handed over the policing of the City of Prince Rupert to the Provincial force under Colonel McMullin, took place last night but it was done only after quite a dramatic scene in which the mayor objected to his being deprived of the right to sign the agreement, the city clerk having been authorized instead to do so, and Alderman Casey fairly raved at what he designated "an iniquitous agreement." He threatened that the one who came up and signed it would be "nailed to the cross."

The passing of the agreement was the only matter of interest at the city council meeting and, although the question had been thrashed out on several previous occasions, it was all gone over this time, each of the three opponents of the measure expressing himself fully in regard to it. When the vote was taken, those favoring it were Alderman Joe Greer, Ald. Brown, Ald. McKechnie and Alderman Perry. Alderman J. W. Greer was not present although he was known to favor it and had voted for it on previous occasions. Those opposing were Alderman Casey, Alderman Larsen and the Mayor.

Nothing new developed in the debate, except that Alderman Casey charged it was a political move. The agreement was read showing that the city was to pay \$10,000 in four quarterly instalments and to provide certain facilities as set out before. The superintendent of police is to be given absolute control. One-third of the fines collected to go to the municipality and the province retains the other two-thirds.

Alderman Casey was the first speaker. He said he had been elected to the council ten consecutive times and this would take away all their rights. It was an iniquitous document, Prince George had been killed by similar action. It had been foisted on the community by five individual men of the community. He urged the mayor to refuse to sign it and let someone else step into his seat and do so. "I am opposed to the thing absolutely," he concluded.

Mayor Newton reiterated the sentiments he had expressed before. He thought they were making a most serious mistake in taking away the fundamental principles of all municipal government. A majority of the council was taking away from a majority of the people the rights held since the beginning of the city. They were taking a serious step. When he was elected he was chosen for a dual position, that of mayor and police commissioner. The citizenship was being taken unaware. After they had made a choice, a majority of the council came along and told them they did not know what they were doing. It fell to the lot of a majority of the council to tell the citizenship what they should do. He maintained they should go to the citizens for a decision. In order to prove that he believed and was ready to back up his actions he stated "he was willing to bear the cost in connection with an appeal to the people."

Alderman Larsen said he would like to have seen some provision made under the agreement for taking over the local constabulary. There should be an assurance that they would be continued in the service. It looked as if they were being (continued on page 2)

UNWRITTEN LAW QUEBEC TRIAL

Men Who Killed his Wife Declared Guilty of Manslaughter and Plea for Mercy Entered

FIRST CASE OF KIND.

MONTREAL, May 19.—Armand Poitras, charged with the murder of his wife here on April 23, was yesterday found guilty of manslaughter by a jury, which attached a rider to the verdict containing a strong plea for mercy. The plea of the "unwritten law" was used for the defense for the first time in a murder trial in the history of the province, by Poitras' counsel, who asked for a verdict of either guilty or acquittal and not one of manslaughter.

GRANT CHANGE LIBEL TRIAL

Mr. Justice McDonald Says May be Tried in New Westminster or Victoria

APPEAL TO BE TAKEN

VANCOUVER, May 18.—On the ground that there would be serious injury and injustice to the case of General McRae should the trial of the \$50,000 libel suit launched by Hon. William Sloan be held in Nanaimo, Mr. Justice W. A. McDonald yesterday ordered a change of venue from Nanaimo to either New Westminster or Victoria. Mr. Sloan to have the choice of either city.

Counsel for Mr. Sloan announced they would appeal from the judgment granting the change and would take the case to the court of appeal sitting in Victoria in June.

More Like Business Every Day.

The elevator situation looks more like business every day. The final announcement made officially of what we all knew before makes it clear to everybody that Prince Rupert is on the grain export map and that there is about to be business done here. When the officials of the board arrive we shall doubtless learn more of their plans insofar as this port is concerned. The local opinion of those who have already conferred with the grain people is that it is the intention of the Pool officials to use the elevator here to its capacity and that we may look for a big export business from here in the near future.

It is also clear from despatches emanating from Calgary that plans are being laid to have shipments made regularly by a number of different steamship lines as well as by tramp steamers.

Why Not Regular Sailings From Port?

Now that the grain elevator is to be operated in a large way, it is probable that the Canadian Government Merchant Marine may consider the proposal to operate a line of steamers regularly from this port to the Orient, carrying grain and other merchandise outward and bring in silk and tea and the produce of the Far East as mentioned by Fred Stork in his budget speech. It is reasonably to be expected that some such action will be taken this fall. If ever it is to be done, the present time seems opportune.

Rebuke For Those Who See Nothing In Canada.

There are those who, though living here, see nothing good in Canada. Such were well rebuked by the Governor-General in his address to the Canadian Club at Victoria when he said in effect that Canada was an improvement on the Old Country and the United States. The country, in the matter of constitution has adopted some of the features of each with good results. The governor said he was optimistic in regard to this country where he said the Old Country prejudices had been dropped.

Courtesy Of Premier King.

Hon. Arthur Meighen was sick yesterday and could not appear in the House of Commons to take part in the debate and to vote on the question at issue. Arrangements had to be made for him to pair with some member of the government, and that courtesy was extended to him by Premier Mackenzie King, who himself abstained from voting because his doughty opponent could not be present to do so also.

Regret Illness Of Mr. Meighen.

Everyone will regret that Mr. Meighen was unable to take part in the budget debate. He was to have closed the long debate for the opposition but his place had to be taken by his lieutenant, Hon. R. B. Bennett of Calgary. White doubtless Mr. Bennett would undertake the work with dignity and also effectively, everyone would have liked to read the speech of the leader of the opposition on so momentous an occasion. The fact that he was unable to take part owing to illness is matter of regret. It is to be hoped that he will be back in his place soon, making the government hew to the line and watching that they do not abuse the power which is theirs.

SALE OF FUR AT EDMONTON

Good Prices Obtained at Sale in Spite of British Strike Condition

EDMONTON, May 19.—The fur sale held here at the week end, showed beaver selling well and good prices obtained in other lines in spite of the British strike condition. Beaver found a strong demand, selling steadily with last sale prices, with extra large prime lots up to \$33, large skins around \$30, mediums \$18 and smaller skins \$11, which fully equals prices at recent New York and Seattle sales.

A good offering of northern muskrats showed strongly the effect of the unsettled market, registering a drop of seven per cent. from last sale. Best lot containing as high as 20 per cent of shot pelts brought in \$1.40. A small offering of ermine sold steadily with last sale, best lots worth around \$1.10, while fisher also showed a 10 per cent. drop with best skins at \$75.

Foxes

Several winter caught large red fox pelts sold up to \$22 with the average offerings in this line still somewhat neglected at \$12 to \$13. A very common offering of cross foxes declined five per cent., with average pelts around \$18. Silver fox showed a fair demand, with good medium-priced skins finding ready sale at \$45 to \$60. Average lots of white fox were in firm demand at \$36, with a number of choice lots of firsts and seconds up to \$42.

Some good winter-caught offerings of lynx advanced about 10 per cent., to sell at around \$23 for tops, with average lots at around \$17. Spring offerings of this fur are neglected on the market. Marten showed a further decline of 10 per cent., which was anticipated, as this fur has been in rather poor demand throughout the winter.

Mink sold in strong demand with best lots of winter-caught pelts up to \$13 and mixed spring collection around \$9. Choice offerings of winter-caught wolf sold strong at around \$12.50, but spring and rubbed skins are not wanted. Otter, wolverine and timber wolf are quoted as unchanged from last sale prices.

ditched. He was willing always to be guided by the majority but in this instance the majority had not had a chance to express themselves. He urged that the matter should be submitted to the ratepayers.

Urned No Delay

Alderman Joe Greer said he was prepared to submit a motion asking that the provincial police take over all members of the local police force. There was nothing against any of them. Dealing with them was the most difficult part of the change. However a number of other cities were taking advantage of the proposal and it would expediate matters to settle it tonight.

Alderman Casey characterized the move as the last act of a dying government. The Attorney General would kill all his enemies with this police force. The vote was then taken and carried, after which Alderman Joe Greer's motion recommending the taking over of the members of the local force was passed, but not until Alderman Casey had designated it as "bunk" and the mayor had said he supposed it was but he must put the motion.

When the other few matters of business had been disposed of Alderman Casey asked the mayor if he was going to sign this agreement.

Sarcastic Mood

Mayor Newton said he thanked the council for again ostracising the mayor. The citizens had seen fit to repose confidence in him and he did not think they should ostracize him. They had given him one more clip under the belt and naturally he was not pleased. It was not done to him but to the citizens who had supported him. Under this agreement he did not think he had any say about signing it as it was the city clerk who was designated as the one to sign.

Alderman Casey: There are several aspirants for your office. I'd let him sign. If he does so we'll nail him to the cross.

Answering a question the city clerk said the document was legal without the signature of the mayor.

Passed Him Up.

The Mayor: You have passed me up. The motion speaks for itself. It makes no mention of whether the mayor signs.

Alderman Casey: It is costing six thousand dollars more under Alex. Manson's scheme.

Alderman Brown: When you say it is a political move you are saying what is false.

Alderman Casey: This is the biggest falsifying council that was ever in Prince Rupert.



PROHIBITION OFFICERS MAKE STRONG APPEAL

Ask Government and Parliament of Canada to Stop Border Rum Running to End Disgrace

SORDID SHAMEFUL STORY

Much of Liquor Short-circuited Back to Canada to Compete With Government Stores

OTTAWA, May 19.—J. H. Carson, president, and Rev. Ben Spence, secretary of the Prohibition Association of Canada have addressed an open letter to the Government and Parliament of Canada as follows:

For the honor of Canada, something effective and adequate should be done, and done immediately, to end the infamous and intolerable border situation created by rum running. The evil is a growing one has assumed enormous proportions, and is not only dishonorable in itself, but contributes to the violation of our own restrictive liquor laws.

Poor Boast

Sometimes, we grandiloquently boast of our three thousand miles of international boundary across which, for over a hundred years, there has not been a hostile shot fired and upon which not a fortification has been erected, and yet, at the present time, day and night, practically that whole boundary is patrolled, and the coast waters watched, by armed forces found necessary by our friendly neighbor nation to protect its shores from marauding incursions of organized gangs of unscrupulous bandits of non-descript nationality, who, using Canadian soil as a base of operations, under the protection of the Canadian flag, by the sanction of Canadian law, and with the knowledge if not connivance, of Canadian government officials, are carrying on what is practically a guerilla warfare against the governmental forces of that country. Plouting every canon of international honor or courtesy and in defiance of all obligations of decency and ethics, those booze bandits are seeking to break down and through the legal barrier that the citizens of the United States have erected to protect their homes against the liquor evil.

Blush of Shame

The situation is one that should bring a blush of shame to the cheek of every right-loving Canadian citizen. It is despicably outrageous. It ought to be ended.

The government and parliament of Canada are the custodians of the honor of our country. Upon them rests responsibility for international relations and domestic legislation. The present border situation should be dealt with in a strong way by the enactment of measures and regulations that will be as meaningful and adequate as our present methods are trifling and insufficient.

That the evil is a growing one, official figures emphatically confirm.

The steady growth and the enormous proportions which this trade has assumed, will be seen by the following table which gives the value of all liquors exported to the United States for a number of years, for the twelve months ending March 31 of each year:


Not one drop of all this enormous amount of liquor is legally landed in the United States. It all gets into the hands of American or Canadian bootleggers.

Base of Supply

Not only has the export directly to the United States grown, as is shown by these tables, but there has developed a trade with the West Indies, Mexico, and other countries which are used as a base of supply for rum running outlaws.

There is no need for us to call attention to the ramifications of this nefarious traffic and the local reaction therefrom as brought out in the investigation now being conducted by a committee of the House of Commons. The evidence there adduced tells a sordid, shameful story of graft, corruption, debauchery, immorality, and crime that seem

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to be the inevitable accompaniment of the booze business always and everywhere. That evidence moreover, shows what an enormous leakage there is into our own Canadian underworld, making for the breaking down and violation of liquor restrictions in practically every province of Canada.

One would almost think that the present system had been devised in the interests of bootleggers and bling-piggers, for this presumably "exported" liquor leaves Canada duty free. When, therefore, it is smuggled back, it has cost the bootlegger less than the domestic price at brewery or distillery. The bootlegger can actually undersell even the distiller, and in government control provinces, the government itself.

Huge Shipment

Further, much liquor in transit, supposed to be for export is really short-circuited to local bootleggers en route. Large quantities of duty-paid liquor are also being shipped disguised as other goods. Recently a car, which the bill of lading described as lumber, was seized at Port Huron and found to contain over \$20,000 worth of liquor. Moreover, in the shadow of technically and ostensibly legal shipments, much wholly irregular traffic is carried on. This traffic is more difficult of detection because of what the law allows.

Were the whole border story told, it would undoubtedly link this illicit liquor traffic to many other crimes such as perjury, robbery, hi-jacking and even murder.

Disrespect for Law

One inevitable result of this law violation is the breaking down of respect for law and order along other lines. If criminals can with ease and impunity, and indeed with the tacit concurrence of Canadian law officers, violate the law of another nation and conspire with expatriated or disloyal citizens of that country in their nefarious plans, they will violate the laws of this country or any country. As a matter of fact, it is easier for a cargo of liquor, legally exported from Canada upon almost any of our inland waterways, to illegally re-land upon Canadian soil, than to illegally land upon the American shore. Who is so innocent and guileless as to think these rum-runners care where they land it or what law they violate, so long as they make their profit?

Pending the enactment of national prohibition, which in our judgment is the only final and real solution of the liquor problem, and without now urging the entire prohibition of exportation or liquor from Canada, which would be by far the most effective and thorough-going method of dealing with rum-running, a remedy has been proposed that is simple and should commend itself to the good judgment of our national administrators and law makers. It merely seeks to secure plain common honesty in all shipments that are made and to make law evasion more difficult by ensuring the actual delivery at the real destination of all liquor exported from Canada. We ask:

Asks This Plan

(1) That all shipments of intoxicating liquor, for export, shall be made only by brewers or distillers and from a bonded warehouse and through regular transportation, and customs

channels, and shall be accompanied by a bond (a heavy bond) to be forfeited, and export permission may thereafter be refused, unless absolute proof is furnished that the liquor in question is actually consigned at the point of destination, or satisfactory proof is given of loss.

(2) That liquor not shipped through regular commercial transportation, and custom channels, and as provided, shall be subject to summary seizure and confiscation and parties having such liquor in their possession, or in any way responsible for such shipment, shall be liable to heavy penalties.

(3) That when a vessel is cleared outwards with a cargo of liquor, it shall not again be cleared without proof being furnished that the preceding cargo was delivered as consigned.

Public Opinion

There is no doubt as to the opinion of the citizens of Canada generally. The people whom you represent want this wrong righted. Continuance of present conditions is only in the interests of the liquor underworld.

Parliament is now in session. Where there is a will, there is a way. May we ask that you, whom we look to as our national leaders, will approach this question with an earnest desire to solve the problem. If you do, it will be solved.

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EMPIRE EVENT IS SPONSORED

Proposal to Celebrate Diamond Jubilee of Canadian Confederation in Large Way

TORONTO IS MOVING

TORONTO, May 19.—The celebration of the diamond jubilee of Confederation on Dominion Day next as an Empire as well as a Canadian event is the object of a movement now being sponsored by James P. Murray, former Ontario Vice-President of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.

Mr. Murray, who was one of the three organizers of the Empire Club several years ago, is a steadfast advocate of Empire unity, based, so far as this country is concerned, upon Canadian national unity. In 1894 he was proposer of the slogan, "Made in Canada," and it is now his aim to take advantage of the diamond jubilee celebration to promote the slogan "Produced in Canada."

Have Royalty Come

At Mr. Murray's suggestion, the Empire Club has taken up proposals for a huge national celebration of the jubilee. He has suggested that efforts be made to have the King and Queen, or the Prince of Wales, cross the Atlantic for the occasion, and at the same time have an invitation issued to every Government in the Empire to send a representative. He also urges that a special postage stamp be issued to commemorate the event, and that the British Government have its buildings ready for the 1927 Canadian National Exhibition. All the Legislatures will be asked for financial and executive co-operation, and, he states, if at all possible, the Conference of Empire, Premiers should be postponed and arranged to convene in Canada.

Great Impetus to Loyalty

As providing an impetus to Empire loyalty the value of such a jubilation would be immense. Mr. Murray is convinced. He points out that the World War prevented extensive celebration of the semi-centennial in 1917, and ventures the hope that the diamond jubilee will be a greater Empire event than could have been any celebration held ten years earlier.

Representations have been made already to Premier King, and replies to letters on the subject have been received from eight of the Provincial Premiers, all of whom, by varying expressions of enthusiasm, heartily endorsed the proposal.

General Support Sought

Col. A. E. Kirkpatrick, president of the Empire Club, has addressed a letter, asking for co-operation in the celebration, to the Canadian Daily Newspaper Association, every Provincial Board of Education, the Canadian Clubs, all military regiments, all women's associations, all Board of Trades, the general manager of every bank, all soldier and sailor organizations, the Red Cross Society, the men's and women's teachers' federations, the Mayors of all cities, all manufacturing and labor bodies, the leading exhibition associations, all fraternal organizations and service clubs, the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A., the railway and steamship lines, all hotels from coast to coast, all sporting and recreational clubs, the universities and are and music organizations.

Lord and Lady Byng Leaving Coast Thursday to Spend Week End at Popular Resort

WINNIPEG, May 19.—The season's first visitors at Jasper Park Lodge will be Their Excellencies, Baron and Lady Byng, who leave the Pacific coast on Thursday for Jasper, where they will spend the week-end before

proceeding on the return portion of their valedictory tour across the Dominion. The party is travelling in a special Canadian National train and will remain a day at Edmonton and Saskatoon and two days in Winnipeg, en route east.

Arriving at Jasper on May 21, Their Excellencies will be just in time for the official opening of the Lodge, which takes place on the following day. This has been a popular spot with the Governor-General and Lady Byng during their stay in Canada, the latter taking particular delight in the profusion of wild flowers which abounds in the vicinity of the Lodge and which are just now at their best.

Improvements Many additions have been made

to the Lodge since last season for the comfort and convenience of patrons and the accommodation is increased this year to take care of 450 guests. This was found necessary on account of the tremendous growth of tourist business through the northern Canadian Rockies last year.

Building operations at Jasper have included the erection of four ten-suite cabins overlooking Lac Beauvert from the well treed slopes to the northwest of the main building. These were designed to embody the best features suggested for this type of structure, with a verandah on the lake side and private bath for each bedroom. Improvements have been made to the other cabins, the main building and swimming pool.

Ore Bunkers and Sorting Shed to be Built and Bulk Handling Planned
The Wolfe mine, adjacent to the town of Alice Arm, and operated by J. Fiva and associates, is being developed into a shipping mine which may assume considerable proportions says the Alice Arm Herald.
The crosscut tunnel has been driven to the hanging wall of the ore vein, a distance of 155 feet from the portal. The foot-wall of the vein was encountered at a distance of 125 feet. MAN SAYS HIS WIFE THREW A MEAN AXE
Charges Her With Assault After She Had Thrown Woodpile at Him and Ended With Edged Tools
EDMONTON, May 19.—Annie Shewchuk, a middle-aged woman, who sat in the dock and smiled while her husband related her adroitness in chasing him with an axe, was remanded on a charge of assault when she appeared before Emily Murphy.
Family squabbles over a number of years, arising out of the husband turning over all his earnings and property to his wife was the cause of the trouble, according to Fred Jackson, prosecuting privately. The husband told a tale of woe in which he stated he was refused food. When he refused to plow a garden because he could not eat, his wife threw most of the woodpile at him, finishing up with the axe which struck him in the back as he ran for the road, according to his allegations.
