Blood Stains on Shirt Led to Arrest of Joe Sankey on Day After Murder of Miss Chisholm

Evidence of Sergeant Alex. McNeill of the provincial police that bloodstains had been found on the clothing of accused and statement made to the officer by the accused that these stains had been caused through a cut on his finger and the further statement that he had been asleep in his shack the entire morning in question featured the testimony that was taken yesterday afternoon in the preliminary trial of Joseph Sankey, charged with the murder of Miss Loretta Chisholm at Port Essington on May 23. The statement of accused contradicted evidence of many crown witnesses that they had seen him out on the morning in question and also that of his own relatives who testified that, during the morning of May 23, he had gone out from the shack in which they all were living. Shortly after 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, after the day had been spent in examining a large number of witnesses, the hearing was adjourned until Tuesday morning on the request of A. M. Johnson, K.C. crown prosecutor.

New Governor Is Selected.

Viscount Willingdon is to be the new Governor-General of Canada, the link between Great Britain and this country for the next few years. While the duties as Governor have little to do with governing except to sign the bills which are passed by Parliament and which without his signature cannot become law according to the Canadian constitution, there are various important social and other duties which a governor performs which have an important influence on the relations between Canada and other parts of the Empire.

The Viscount is a Liberal by birth and training but his experiences as Governor of two Indian presidencies would tend to make him more conservative. With considerable experience both as a parliamentarian and diplomat and with all the old British traditions, he should make an ideal governor-general and Canada will welcome him.

One thing that will commend Lord Willingdon to many is the fact that he is not a military man. Lord Byng has filled the position with honor and tact and has been an ideal governor, but most of his sympathies were military. Now we have a man who has devoted himself to civil life, and that fact will appeal strongly to a large section of the Canadian people.

Many people will be interested in reading the sketch of Lord Willingdon published in this issue. As he will be much in the public eye and will probably visit Prince Rupert before very long it is well to know who he is and what have been his activities in the past.

Cost Huge Sum To Build To Hudson Bay.

It will cost a huge sum of money to build the railway to Hudson Bay and when the work is completed the advantage to Canada will be doubtful. Insofar as it will open up new country it will be worth something, however. But whether it will be worth the sum of twenty-six million dollars is not at all sure. As most estimates are much under the actual cost it is to be assumed that the railway and other works will cost more like forty millions.

If half that amount were spent in opening up the Peace River country it would be much more real advantage to the country than building to a sea that is frozen over the greater part of the year. However, the Government seems to be committed to the project so we shall apparently have to accept the new line as one of the Government-works of doubtful value.

Senate Has Killed Pension Bill.

The Government old age pension bill, which recently passed the House of Commons, has been rejected by the Senate and therefore will not become law this year. Probably it will be introduced again next year or as soon as there seems a possibility of it going through. It ought not to be very long before the political complexion of the second chamber has changed. Then, it is to be hoped, its constitution will be changed and it will be made into a more useful body. At present it is simply a divorce court and a source of expense and irritation.

Rejection of the pensions bill is to be regretted. Many old people through no fault of their own find themselves in poor financial circumstances and the bill was designed to make it possible for them to be independent of relatives and friends and to end their days in peace.

Prohibitionists Are Becoming Active.

Activity is being shown among those who are advocating prohibition of liquor selling in this province. At the time of the passing of the Government control measure, it was argued that it would do away with bootlegging, and that was the chief reason why people voted for it. They were misled. Bootlegging did not cease. It has not ceased yet. An illegal traffic is being carried on all over the provinces, only in a different way from what it was before the present law passed. The way to kill the prohibition movement is to have the liquor laws enforced and to keep sale of beer and liquor within reasonable limits.

ASSIZE COURT OPENED TODAY

Prisoners in Three Cases Arrived From Okalla Yesterday Afternoon

The spring session of the Supreme Court Assizes opened this morning at 11 o'clock before Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald. Ruby Dolan, charged with the murder of James Neil Donald at Stewart on January 1, was brought from Okalla yesterday in custody of Mrs. Sam North, police matron. Gladys Gale, jointly charged and who has been out on bail, arrived from the south on the same steamer.

Other prisoners brought from Okalla yesterday were the Bird brothers and Pierreway, half breeds, charged with the murder of Matthew McLean at Hazelton in 1921. Provincial Police Constables Cruickshank and Elliott of Vancouver, who accompanied these prisoners north, also brought Edgar Plimney charged with wounding Albert Sandstrom at Lockport.

The accused in the local attempted rape case, Darrow Casey, Murdoch Mackenzie and Albert Capstick, are also here, the two former having been out on bail and the latter having been a prisoner in the city jail since the alleged occurrence.



Too Low Air Pressure


The next illustration to the left shows the damage done. This becomes apparent on the inside of the tire, because the rubber on the outside of the tire is less susceptible to scar.

The injuries illustrated above can be satisfactorily repaired by competent tire repairmen.

The illustration to the right gives a sectional view of the position of a high-pressure tire under the stress of a bump providing the tire contains too little air. The wall of a high-pressure tire is thicker and the action is that of turning the tire inside out—of placing tremendous strain on the inner plies and compressing the outer part of the tire.

The next illustration to the right shows the resulting injury, which is also first apparent on the inside of the tire; but later, frequently, results in a blow-out through the tire.

How to Avoid These Tire Injuries

In addition to driving with reasonable care, the way to avoid these mishaps is to buy tires of a size adequate for the load to be carried and then to keep them inflated in accordance with the maker's recommendation. This information regarding tire size and inflation can be obtained from good tire dealers.

To guide you in maintaining the desirable inflation it is necessary that you have a pressure gauge. 
OCEAN GOING RAFTS OF TIMBER FOR SAN DIEGO

BLOOD STAINS ON SHIRT LED TO ARREST OF JOE SANKEY ON DAY OF MURDER OF MISS CHISHOLM.

(continued from page one)

the girl having been found, James Gray was also with witness and accused at this time.

Margaret Sankey, daughter of John Sankey, told of rising about 10.30 on the morning of May 23 and cooking breakfast which was eaten by her father and two little children. Joe Sankey was not in the house at that time but, while she was washing the dishes, he came in. He went right to bed, having his navy blue suit and light cap on. She did not see his shoes but later heard them drop to the floor. The girl described other incidents of the day in question, largely corroborating the evidence of her father. She had been at the same dance as accused the night before.

Was Sound Asleep

Under cross-examination, Margaret Sankey said she had not seen accused go out on the morning of May 23 though she saw him return to the house after the church bells had rung. She went out after he came in and he was still sound asleep at the noonday meal.

Dan O'Brien told of meeting accused in front of Kameda's store at 3.30 in the afternoon of May 23 and at 6.30 the same afternoon in front of the poolroom. At the latter meeting, they spoke of the search for the lost girl and accused said he was going to church. Witness said he was going to join the search party. At 6.30 witness noticed that accused had mud on the bottom of his trousers up to his ankles. He had not noticed this when he had met accused at 3.30. The mud was of a white color and was dry? His boots had no mud on them.

Put Him to Bed

Frank Gilhooly, a white man, told of seeing accused at the dance in the Band Hall on Saturday night. He (witness) left the dance hall at 12.15 and outside he saw accused "hanging" on a fence. At the dance hall, accused was wearing a three piece blue suit, brown shoes, cream colored shirt, soft collar, bow tie and light cap. The suit seemed in perfect condition. After seeing Sankey outside, witness stated that "with the best of intentions" he had taken him home and put him to bed. The cabin was lit with a coal oil lamp and there were two other persons in bunks. Witness assisted accused to walk home and did not allow him to fall down. After getting accused to the cabin, witness removed his (accused's) shoes and hung his coat and cap up after having thrown him on the bed. Witness identified shoes produced in court as being similar to those accused had been wearing on the night in question. Neither of two shirts presented in court, however, was like the one he had been wearing on the night of the dance.

No Dirt on Clothes

Under cross-examination, witness said he had seen no dirt on accused's clothes. He had not been looking for any, though there might possibly have been some.

Margaret Sankey was recalled and identified two shirts as being those of accused.

James Gray told of meeting John Sankey and accused on the morning of May 24 at B.A. cannery where accused was employed repairing buildings. They found there was to be no work that day so they went down the street to Cunningham's store where there were a lot of men standing. There they heard that the dead girl had been found and they walked on further to the old steamer Inlander toward the spot where the body had been found. John said they should not go any further as it was "the sacred place of the dead" so they returned. After having heard that the teacher's body had been found, witness stated that Joe Sankey said: "I wonder why she walks by herself in such a lonely place."

Buddhist Witness

Sam Shimda, a barber of Es-sington, was called to the stand with Frank Suga as interpreter. The court was slightly worried as to what form of oath was binding on a Buddhist but was content with a simple declaration. When it was discovered that witness never saw Sankey before the day of the murder, he was asked to step down.

Charles A. Moore, bookkeeper, said he knew deceased. He told of finding the body as related at the inquest previously. It was

lying on the face at a point about a mile from town. It was allowed to lie as found until the police came.

Dr. L. W. Kergin reported having made an examination of the body. Death was due finally to suffocation as a result of mucus stuffed in the mouth and throat. Apparently the girl had been struck and stunned and finger marks on her throat indicated an attempt to strangle her.

Sold Him Shoes

Eric Pottinger, store keeper, told of selling accused a pair of Oxford shoes. Only three pairs had been sold by him, one of which he identified. About the same time accused had bought a shirt and collar, but neither of the shirts exhibited in court was the one bought from him.

Sergeant McNeill described the place where the body was found. When he saw Sankey on the afternoon of May 24 there was blood on his shirt. He was wearing a sort of brown woollen shirt at the time. He also saw the shoes which he found under the bed in the cabin. They were water soaked.

Inspector Spiller told of visiting Port Essington in company with other police officers. He described the condition of the body and the place where a struggle had evidently taken place. He did not think it was much of a struggle. He returned to Es-sington from the scene of the murder about three o'clock and Sankey, the accused, was brought to him. There were smears of blood on his undershirt, those on the top part being fainter than those lower down. There was a little blood on the pocket of the top khaki shirt. He recognized the shirt as the one produced in court and pointed out the blood stains. The blood on the undershirt seemed to be older than on the other.

Finger Was Cut

Accused's finger was cut and bound with a rag. He placed him under arrest and brought him to Prince Rupert. He travelled on the same boat with him and saw him several times later in his office.

Prisoner's Statement

Inspector Spiller told of accused making a statement to him after being warned that anything he said might be used against him. The statement, which was signed, was read in court. In it accused said he had played pool the previous Saturday night and then had bought a pint of whiskey from a Jap for \$3.75. He went to the dance hall and drank the liquor. He was drunk but could look after himself. He was stopped from dancing and went home with Frank. The next morning (that of the murder) he bought two ice cream cones. Then he bought a third, walked around the block and to the B.A. cannery wharf and back to the

house at ten o'clock, went to bed and remained there until 4.30. He went to church with George Sankey and Herbert Spalding. Monday morning he went to work but there was no work because a girl had been lost. Later he heard the girl had been found. His finger was bleeding and he shook his hand. That was how the blood came to be on his undershirt. He let it stay on the shirt because he did not know they would get after him under this case.

The next day the statement was slightly amplified but was not signed.

The court then adjourned until Tuesday.

(By Canadian Press)

Certain popular sayings warn us to look out when all men praise us, and tell us that a prophet, however well he may stand with the world at large, has no honor in his own country. Lord Willingdon must be one of the exceptions to the general application of these rules, for those anywhere who do not speak well of him must be few, and those in his own country—in his home district—who do not give him honor simply do not exist.

Alike in his private relationships and in his public life he bears the character of a courteous and high-principled English gentleman, and from friend or stranger he could have no better certificate. In the County of Sussex, in which practically all his domestic interests are centered, his position is unassailable. The people to whom he is going will be glad to know that this is how he stands among his own folk. In his public career they are perhaps able to judge for themselves. They know that already he has "done the state some service." Also, doubtless, they are informed on the variety of the activities which have helped to build up for him an excellent reputation. He is known as student, sportsman, soldier, courtier, parliamentarian, minister, statesman, and diplomatic missioner; in fact he has played many parts—all with a good measure of success, and some with such marked distinction as to earn the warm approval of his countrymen and a sheaf of loyal honors. As is well known, he is even at this moment engaged on a state mission to the far east, helping to smooth out the difficulties of administering the millions involved in the return of the Boxer rebellion indemnities.

debited to nature and culture for their achievements. In these respects Lord Willingdon, when he set out to make a name for himself, had advantages over most. He is tall and distinguished-looking and of dignified bearing, and with these physical characteristics he combines ripe intellectual attainments, and a charm of manner which all who come in contact with him find captivating. In education, training and influence he represents Eton and Cambridge at their best, and his record on the playing fields both of school and university proves that both helped to possess him of that true spirit of sportsmanship which becomes the man of affairs better than any arts of diplomacy.

As already indicated, the new Governor-General is very much at home and popular in the beautiful maritime country of Sussex, especially in its eastern part which embraces not only the home of his youth but also his place of entry into parliamentary life, the borough of Hastings, fashionable now as a health and holiday resort, but notable also in history as the principal of the ancient Cinque Ports group, to say nothing of its outlook over Pevensey Bay, the traditional landing spot of William the Conqueror, and of its associations with the decisive battle following that invasion. Moreover, at or about Hastings Lord Willingdon found a wife, as there will be occasion again to mention.

Early Life

Freeman Freeman-Thomas— for so was the new Governor-General named before he joined the ranks of the peers—comes of good stock long identified with Sussex, his father being Frederick Freeman-Thomas, of Hatton and Yapton, Willingdon, and his mother Mabel, daughter of the first Viscount Hampden, a former Speaker of the House of Commons. Lord Willingdon assumed the additional surname of Freeman in 1892, in which year also he married the Hon. (afterwards Lady) Marie Adelaide, daughter of the first Baron Brassey, afterwards Earl Brassey. He was born September 12, 1866, and was an only son. Two sons have been born to him. The elder, Gerard Frederick, born in 1893, went to the war as a lieutenant in the Coldstream Guards, and was killed in action in 1914. The surviving son, and heir to his father's peerage is Hon. Inigo Brassey Freeman-Thomas, who was born July 25, 1899, and married in 1924 Maxine, daughter of the eminent actor, Sir Johnston Forbes-Robertson.

Inherited Liberalism

Lord Willingdon's inherited political faith was Liberal, and he himself in his Parliamentary days adhered to Liberalism, which was indeed the creed of all those who claimed kinship with him—his wife's family as well as his own. But he had no passion for politics, as may be inferred from the fact that he was 34 years of age before he reached the House of Commons. Probably such predilections as he had for a political career may be traced more to the maternal than the paternal side of his family. The political strain in his mother's blood it may be assumed was very strong, for her father when H. B. W. Brand fought many battles in the constituencies before the Liberals placed him in the speaker's chair. One can well imagine that the example of his maternal grandfather, and that of his father-in-law, who was a star of considerable magnitude in the political firmament, had much influence in eventually turning Mr. Freeman-Thomas' steps in the direction of Westminster, via the borough of Hastings, for which he was elected in 1900. That seat had been occupied by his father-in-law (then Sir Thomas Brassey) from 1868 to 1886, when he was raised to the peerage as Baron Brassey, an honor that was followed by an Earldom in 1911.

Mr. Freeman-Thomas doubtless owed some part of his success in this election to the Brassey influence, at that period all-powerful in Hastings. Lord Brassey was the head of a family which in the course of a generation had taken firm root in the Sussex soil, had built themselves a palace called Normanhurst, near Battle, and had both socially and officially become leaders in the district. The founder of the family fortunes, Thomas Brassey, who amassed great wealth as a contractor for the building

of railways, canals and the like, was one of the most famous specimens of England's self-made men of the early 19th Century. Lord Brassey was in several ways a great man. No man of his time was a more active figure in public and political life, no man cultivated a broader or more varied field of endeavor—intellectual and practical—and as scholar, scientist, and man of affairs his record of achievement was remarkable. Some of his best work was done at the Admiralty where he was at differ-

ent times Civil Lord and Secretary. He wrote much on naval matters, was the founder and first editor of the "Naval Annual" and was a practical seaman, holding a Board of Trade master's certificate. Everybody knows that he was the owner of one of the most celebrated yachts in the world, the Sunbeam. This vessel which had been seen on nearly all the seven seas, was in 1916 presented to the government of India as a hospital ship. Locally, Lord Brassey was relatively as great a man as he was nationally, and naturally his association with Hastings was something to conjure with at all times. Even from the historic and most ancient and honorable office of Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports—an appointment particularly coveted—he was not excluded. The peerage did not long exist after the death of the first holder. At the decease of his son, the second Earl, in 1919 it became extinct.

LIQUOR CONVICTION QUASHED IN SUPREME COURT HERE TODAY

On the condition that the case be reopened should counsel appear before the session of the Assizes ends on behalf of the crown which was not represented today, Mr. Justice W. A. MacDonald, on certiorari application of L. W. Patmore, this afternoon quashed a conviction and fine of \$300 that was imposed on James Robertson in December by J. L. Barge, J.P., of Queen Charlotte City on a charge of keeping liquor for sale.

The appeal was presented on the grounds that the magistrate had heard no evidence in the case except from the accused and that the conviction did not state where the offence had taken place.

Various technical points in connection with the case were looked up by His Lordship before giving his decision.

LORD WILLINGDON WHO WILL BE CANADA'S NEW GOVERNOR HAS HAD DISTINGUISHED CAREER.

should be mentioned, was Governor of Victoria, Australia, from 1895 to 1900, and during that period his son-in-law served as his aide-de-camp. It was immediately after his return from this first official experience overseas that Mr. Freeman-Thomas captured Hastings. This borough he continued to represent until 1906, when he was defeated and transferred his services to the Bodmin Division of Cornwall, for which he was the Parliamentary representative until 1910.

That year saw the end of his career in the House of Commons on his being given a peerage, but his Parliamentary activities were continued in the House of Lords until he was selected for the Governorship of Bombay. He proceeded to India in 1913 and did not finally return home until 1924. During the first half of this period he governed the Bombay presidency with such conspicuous ability that at the end of his term of office the Government were very anxious to retain his services in India, and he was persuaded to accept the Governorship of the Madras presidency. In this office he remained until 1924, when he retired with a greatly enhanced reputation for skill in handling Indian problems and difficult native character.

Heaped With Honors

The success of his work in India was signalized by his promotion to the rank of Viscount. He had previously been honored with the highest decorations of the orders of the Indian Empire, the British Empire and the Star of India. He is also a Knight of Grace of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem in England. This honor Viscountess Willingdon shares as a Lady of Grace. She is also G.B.E. (Civil Division), a Dame of the British Empire Order (Civil Division) and holds the Kaisar-i-Hind Gold Medal, First Class.

A pleasant incident, marking the home-coming of Lord Willingdon from India was the conferment upon him by his old constituents, and neighbors, in Hastings, of the freedom of their borough, and last year—on July 16—the continuance of the friendship between them was further manifested in his lordship being selected to represent the town in the ceremony attending the restoration to Canada of the Quebec Shield, a trophy which was brought from the sales of Quebec by Major Murray, the first British Governor, and presented by him to the borough of Hastings. In exchange for the shield Canada presented to Hastings a replica, to hang in the Council Chamber at the Town Hall, where the original was so long an object of interest to visitors. In the ceremony the Canadian High Commissioner (Hon. P. C. Larkin), the French
