ROME, November 6 .- Sitting under the presidency of Premier Mussolini himself, the Fascist cabinet yesterday approved a series of drastic repressive measures, which are the first steps to subdue opposition throughout Italy.

The decrees approved provide the penalty of death for every attempt to injure or molest the Premier or strike a blow at the Fascist regime, and as much as 30 years' imprisonment for direct or indirect opposition.

New Method of Freezing Was Demonstrated This Afternoon Opening Experimental Station

In connection with the opening this afternoon by J. J. Cowie, secretary of the Biological Board of Canada, of the new fisheries experimental station at this port, there was a demonstration by D. B. Finn, acting director of the station, of a new brine method of freezing halibut that has been devised here and which is such an improvement in the matter of preservation of the fish that it will make possible the marketing of frozen fish on the eastern retail markets as the equal of fresh.

The demonstration showed the difference between air frozen

brine frozen halibut under the new#system developed here, following investigations that have been going on this season. Air frozen halibut, it was shown, was relatively dry when thawed out and the flesh was in no way comparable to fresh halibut whereas the flesh, when the brine freezing method was employed, could hardly be distintinguished from fresh fish either in texture or quality. 




