LONDON, May 13.—Britain's nine day strike which was called off yesterday switched today to what labor regards as a spread lockout by railway employers against union men pending reinstatement on the Add status. Numbers of men in three unions concerned refuse to report for duty in spite of orders to do so from responsible officials.

MINERS WERE NOT A PARTY STRIKE END

Secretary Cook Declared Decision Arrived at Without Consulting Federation
LONDON, May 13.—The decision to call off the strike was made without consulting the miners' federation. Secretary Cook declared last night, adding that the miners were not a party in any shape or form. When proposals were submitted to miners yesterday morning they were rejected. Nevertheless the Trades Union Congress used the decision as a basis for its later action.

BEER SALES NOT REPORTED

More Than Sixty Per Cent Sold Without Knowledge of Manitoba Commission

WINNIPEG, May 13.—More than 60 per cent of the beer manufactured in Manitoba upon which a gallonage tax was paid yesterday appears to have been disposed of without being accounted for to the Government Control Commission, according to returns filed in the signature by Attorney General yesterday afternoon.

ALASKA EXPECTING ARRIVAL OF NORGE

Watchful Waiting for Big Dirigible to Poke Her Nose Over Top of the Earth

NOME, May 13.—Residents of northwest Alaska are scanning the horizon for a glimpse of the dirigible Norge as it pokes its nose up over the top of the earth. Preparations and watchful waiting for the big airship centres around Nome, although Point Barrow is expected to sight it first.

NOME is marking a historic journey. Much curiosity is expressed over what will have been found around the pole. Amundsen's arrival is expected to satisfy that curiosity.

OSLO, May 13.—Latest reports received here state that the Norge will arrive at Nome at 9 o'clock to-night. The airship was sighted off Point Barrow this morning and all was well.

Political Revolt in Poland is Cause Much Fighting; Warsaw Said to be in Hands of Rebels

PARIS, May 13.—Revolutionary troops headed by Marshall Pilsudski, former president, was in control at Warsaw, the capital of Poland, last night, according to the latest information received here. The new movement is due to political unrest and with the idea of preserving peace President Wojcieszowski offered to relinquish the presidency in favor of Pilsudski, which offer was refused. Owing to interrupted communication the situation at present is not clear.

Is Armed Camp

WARSAW, May 13.—Famous in history as the objective point of various armies, Warsaw again has become an armed camp. The government had taken precautionary measures for the city's defense as soon as news was received that a military revolt was designed to oust Premier Witos. Machine guns were placed on top of the government building and the telephone and telegraph lines were guarded by troops remaining loyal to the government.

Severe Fighting

BERLIN, May 13.—Advices from Warsaw say severe fighting occurred in the streets of the city and many persons were killed or wounded. Anti-government forces are reported to have occupied the castle, the premier's residence and the foreign office and are marching on the president's palace at Belvedere.

RAILWAYS AND PEACE RIVER

Both Canadian National and C.P.R. Want to Get Into New Country But Price Too High

OTTAWA, May 13.—Indications here are that both the C.P.R. and the Canadian National would like to get control of the Peace River development but both consider the price asked by the Province of Alberta for the existing lines too high. The favorite in the race is the C.P.R. because it already has possession. The rumor of a recent increase in their offer indicates that they are keen to retain what they have and to extend their holdings.

Unofficial opinion here is that the C.P.R. will eventually build through the Peace River country making for themselves a new outlet to the Pacific. The leasing the Prince Rupert elevator by the wheat pool is an added impetus to the big railway corporation to get to that port or to some other outlet where it may compete on equal terms with the Canadian National.

INDICTMENT FOR AIR COMMANDER DRY SQUAD HEAD

SEATTLE, May 13.—Captain E. L. Hedges, patrol commander of the general station and Lieut. George H. Comstock, head of the dry squad, with one policeman, were among those named in 37 indictments returned by the grand jury yesterday investigating the liquor traffic.

VICTORIA MAN GOES TO JAIL

Tried Smart Work in Chicago and Landed in House of Correction

CHICAGO, May 13.—A. E. G. Hall, of Victoria was yesterday sentenced to the House of Correction for six months on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses. Three fellow residents of a local hotel charged him with obtaining sums ranging from \$200 to \$235 on worthless checks.

Shriners Arrive and Parade Through City Headed by Gizeh Band

Visitors and initiates all take part in street display morning and afternoon

The Ancient and Arabic Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, Gizeh Temple, Victoria, on their northern pilgrimage, took Prince Rupert by storm this morning. Easily the most colorful and enthusiastic aggregation of excursionists that ever visited this city, they were brought here at 10 o'clock this morning by Noble D. Donald on the Canadian National steamer Prince Rupert which was a blaze of green, yellow and red decorations and insignia for the occasion. One of the features of the ship's decoration is an illuminated square and compass and shrine emblem on the port side.

As the steamer approached its berth at G.T.P. wharf No. 2, the famous Gizeh Temple Band tuned up its airs. This party of bandsmen is indeed a notable one and will no doubt be one of the most important features of the two-day visit of the big party.

There was a large crowd of local citizens at the wharf and along the streets to greet the party and there was much cheering. The rather unsettled state of weather, coming rather unfortunately after a beautiful week of sunshine, did not dampen the enthusiasm of either the visitors or the Prince Rupert public.

Official Welcome
As soon as the steamer was tied up, the local reception committee of Shriners and their wives together with Mayor Newton boarded the vessel and, in the observation room, an official welcome was extended to the visitors. Mayor Newton spoke briefly and a huge golden key was presented to James W. Hudson, the head of the party and potentate of Gizeh Temple.

With the welcome proceedings over, the big party disembarked and was marshalled for its first parade through the city streets. Led by Noble George Tite and Noble George Frizzell, the line of march was from the wharf to Second Avenue and by way of Seventh Street and Third Avenue to the Masonic Temple where the ceremonial proceedings were formally commenced.

Order of Parade
Heading the parade was the 35 piece band of Gizeh Temple, its members in their green and yellow uniforms with white bandsmen's caps and pink capes. Then came the patrol of 25 men in their fully Western Asiatic uniforms. The potentate's car, on the fender of which Archie Robinson was seated with the golden key to the city, followed with the civilian members of the Shrine behind. Bringing up the rear were the initiates being led as lambs to the slaughter.

It was a parade which could not but capture the ear and eye. There were many on the streets to witness it and, doubtless, when further parades take place this afternoon and evening and tomorrow there will be many more on hand to see the spectacle.

STOCK BATTLE ENDS HAPPILY

Nash Motors Resists all Attempts to Beat Down Price and Advances Instead

NEW YORK, May 13.—One of the greatest stock exchange battles of recent history was staged today when bear traders made an unsuccessful attempt to break the common stock of Nash Motors below \$52 a share. Nearly 875,000 shares were thrown on the market but without avail as all offerings were readily absorbed, the stock advancing three points and the raiders being forced to beat a hasty retreat.

The city has taken on a gala appearance for the visit of the Shriners, the most of the business premises having been suitably decorated to match the arches, etc., that have been erected by the local nobles, the city and the Canadian National Railway. Two Surprises In Britain Recently.

There were two surprising things about the strike which happily ended yesterday. One surprise was the solidarity of the strikers, who stuck together well and made a decided impression on the nation. The other was the manner in which the men of Great Britain rallied to the service of the country on the opposite side, either as special police or to operate the public utilities of the country. According to the despatches there were always more volunteers than were needed.

The people of the country were divided into two camps, each sticking up for what it considered right.

End Of Conflict Was Welcome Here.

People here take a great interest in Old Country affairs and the end of the conflict was welcome news to local people. Everyone was glad to know that the great struggle was at an end and that an attempt would be made to carry on without resort to the milling process which breeds so much ill feeling.

The strike is a closed book. It is to be hoped a clasp will be put on and clamped tight and that we shall hear no more of such a big industrial struggle for many a day.

Not Great Danger Of Communism.

Judging from a distance it seems as if there is no great danger of communism in Britain today but rather the danger is from a Fascist movement which might have taken possession if the strike had been extended indefinitely. At any rate there would have been a great struggle which might have ended in much bloodshed.

Irish Free State Today Shows Pro-British Tendencies and is Sick of All Extremists

Lack of Policy May Cause Fall of Government But no Group Strong Enough to Put up Determined Fight For Power

The many and various extremist weeklies in the Free State have recently been making their readers' flesh creep by dark hints of conspiracies for bringing the "old ascendancy gang" back into power. This gang is differently described by different weeklies, according to the peculiar shade of the strongly tinted spectacles worn by each. The "Capitalists," the "Freemasons," the "Protestants," the "Planters," the "Ex-Unionists," the "Imperialists," the "Redmonites," the "West British"—all these, and many more, are the titles bestowed upon the enemy, says a writer in the Manchester Guardian. The extremist's alarm is not entirely groundless. He has reason to doubt whether the present government can hold together much longer, and when he looks round to find support for an extremist successor he experiences a certain sinking feeling which tells him that the country is sick of him and all extremism—for the moment at least.

Republican Split

The Republican split has made the Republicans negligible. The present government, therefore, seems less indispensable to the men of property, the "respectables." But it is not so much the present government they want to get rid of. It is rather the present government party, which still contains strong elements of fanaticism and every now and then demands that the cabinet should offer up a sacrifice to its strange gods. On the next occasion that such a sacrifice is called for the "respectables" are likely to enter a vigorous protest. If they do they may find support in the country. Herbert, the country has always thought it pleasant and safest to give at least its vote to every form of patriotic extremism. But now it is finding that under Home Rule votes are translated into action and have to be paid for. Some hold that this discovery will revolutionize the average Irishman's attitude to politics. At least it seems certain that he has become disgusted with the whole campaign for the revival of the Irish language.

There is also a very general tendency to connect the depth of the present economic depression with the excesses of our anti-British policy. The country farmer and shopkeeper are for ever talking of the money the British troops brought into the country. They are sceptical about the benefits derived from the creation of the new tariff wall. They whisper that it does not pay to offend England. Besides, they grumble that the country is being run by a pack of inexperienced upstarts, adventurers, and fanatics, men with no better education and with less manners than themselves.

Men of Property

Many, therefore, are now quoting the Elizabethan Davies: "The people of this kingdom, both English and Irish, did ever love and desire to be governed by great persons." They infer that now is the moment for the aristocracy to step forward. So no doubt it would be if only we had an aristocracy. But the last Irish aristocracy was exterminated for good and sufficient reasons by the Land Acts, and a new aristocracy has not yet had time to grow up and take its place. We have only the men of property, the "respectables." These have plenty of goodwill and sense, but they are not sure whether they have the confidence of the people, and they, therefore, have not confidence in themselves. Under proportionate representation they could form a group which would be influential with any government, and might even be the main support of a government, but they could hardly form a government themselves. For the "respectable" group would be 50 per cent Protestant, and it would be tinged with Liberalism. Any possible Free State government must be Conservative and Catholic in its outlook in regard to education and morals. The weaker spirit of extremist Nationalism grows the more complete will be the ascendancy of Catholic Conservatism.

Several Dangers

The break-up of the present government might at any time be brought about either by the ill-health of the president, who holds the cabinet together, or by dissensions within the government party between the realists and the extreme Nationalists. An important section of the cabinet would, it is supposed, be glad

enough to base itself upon economic realism and Conservative Catholicism, rejecting high Protection and letting it be understood that Irish was not going to be crammed down reluctant throats. A minister who took his stand on that basis would be attacked by the Republicans, the separatist element in the government party, and by the Labor party. He would get the support of the realist element in the government party, the Farmers' party, and the "respectables." What chance would he have in a general election if he could appeal to the country? That is a very difficult question. The general opinion seems to be that the average Irishman would now be glad to vote for anyone who stood for a Catholic, Conservative, and realist policy. But I am not sure. The influence of history and tradition is apt to persist. Irish Ireland may mean more to the average man than we suppose. The intellectuals are still extremist, and their influence over him may be greater than we suppose. The suspicion that a realist policy means "Protestant" or "English" influence may prove more fatal than we suppose.

Labor Has Money

One thing only is certain. No party except Labor has at present any funds. Since no party stands for any consistent, intelligible, and definite policy, no one except the publican is ready to subscribe to any party fund. There are not many Irishmen who can afford to devote their time to politics and stand the expenses of an election for nothing. But there are plenty with axes to grind who would be prepared to invest a little money in getting into a position to grind them. After the next election the Dail may easily be filled with the nominees of publicans and axe-grinders unless our parties set to work soon and frame programs intended not so much to please everybody as to show exactly what they mean to do.





WHALING FLEET ON WAY NORTH

Four Vessels Going to Rose Harbor and Plane Following to Locate at Naden Harbor

VICTORIA, May 13.—Four steam whalers the Blue, Black, White and Brown are on their way to Rose Harbor on Queen Charlotte Islands and they will be followed almost immediately by the Grant and Green. Some of the vessels will operate out of Naden Harbor, from which centre the seaplane recently purchased by the Consolidated Whaling Corporation will also operate, doing the spotting for the fleet.

The whalers will do some scouting on their way north and will probably have commenced work in earnest long before reaching their bases. A large herd of whales was recently sighted near the north end of Vancouver Island. These will possibly be rounded up by the fleet.

Steamer Grey, which the C.P.R. has chartered to take the place temporarily of the Princess Env, has had new oil tanks installed in readiness for a busy season as tender to the whaling stations.

The use of the seaplane, which will be operated by Lieut. Reece, is a new departure in whaling on this coast. By keeping the plane busy spotting the huge sea animals, the whaling vessels will lose much less time than formerly in scouting. They will be kept in touch by wireless and will be informed directly a herd of whales is located. While this makes for the more rapid destruction of the whales it makes for economy of operation of the fleet, which is looking forward to a very busy season.
