## LEADERS OF RUM RUNNERS ARRESTED SECRET SERVICE WITNESS TELLS METHODS OF SMUGGLING

### Secret Service Agent Employed to Pick Up Drugs from Steamers

**After dragging was successful in locating sack containing 90 cans of opium near Victoria wharf**

VANCOUVER, November 16.—The manner in which narcotic drugs are dropped from Pacific liners nearing the British Columbia coast and the method employed in smuggling it into Canada was told in the police court yesterday afternoon by V. A. Partlow, secret service agent in connection with the trial of Frank and Dominic Marino, Dominic Cristofli, Lee Sing, Lee Coy, Jim and Wong Sung, charged with smuggling drugs.

Witness told how, employed by a member of the gang, he helped take the speed boat *Dynamite* from Seattle to Victoria to pick up a load from the *Empress* liner dropped near the wharf at Victoria. The first trip was unsuccessful but the next one made on July 14 last was successful after considerable dragging operations in locating the sack which later was found to contain 90 cans of opium.

On another occasion Partlow said he was instructed to go to William Head and wait there for a load dropped in that vicinity. The hearing is continuing.

### MURDERED MAN WAS WITNESS

**CHARLES HARRIS WHOSE BODY WAS FOUND IN BUSH PLAYED ROSS WATSON'S DOUBLE**

ATTEMPTED SUICIDE

INTIMATE FRIEND OF WOMAN WHO TRIED TO END LIFE AFTER HEARING OF HIS DEATH

SEATTLE, Nov. 16.—Charles Harris, 39 years of age of Kenosha, Wisconsin, whose slain body was found in the brush near here Wednesday, is revealed as the leading figure in important hearings here. He is further identified as the intimate friend of Ross Watson, former Seattle policeman, who is defendant in one of the cases and of Mrs. Watson, who attempted to end her life here the day after the body of Harris was found.

### BOWSER WINS IN VANCOUVER

**IN BIG CITY 45 DELEGATES THOUGHT TO FAVOR FORMER PREMIER**

VANCOUVER, Nov. 16.—The Bowser forces carried the day at the Vancouver Conservative primaries last night. The estimate placed by well informed party men on the men chosen as a result of the balloting for delegates to the Kamloops convention at 45 for Mr. Bowser and ten for Mr. Ladner with five doubtful. This is the result of twelve meetings.

### PIRATES BOARD BRITISH SHIP

**SET THE VESSEL ON FIRE BUT SAVED BY ARRIVAL OF BRITISH GUNBOAT**

HONG KONG, Nov. 16.—The British steamer *Stinning* was boarded by pirates eighty miles from here and set on fire but was saved from destruction by the arrival of the British gunboat *Bluebell*. No advices are received as to whether the pirates secured any loot.

### EXPLOSION IN JAPAN

TOKIO, Nov. 16.—Thirty miners are dead or injured in an explosion which occurred today in Oyabu Colliery at Kyabo.

### Governor General Willingdon Asks Consideration Should He Stray from Political Virtue

TORONTO, November 16.—Addressing the members of the Canadian and Empire Clubs at luncheon yesterday Governor-General Willingdon appealed for co-operation particularly with the Empire. After referring to his earlier days in the diplomatic service when he had liberty to discuss political questions as they arose, Lord Willingdon said: "But now, in my present position I am bound to keep myself clear of discussion of any political issue. I intend, believe me, during my life here, to keep strictly to the narrow path of virtue in this matter, but if, owing to my previous experiences, I ever stray from the way, I trust some sympathetic consideration may be shown me owing to the difficulty I may find in getting rid of my old habits."

### MEET DEPUTY MINISTER AND DISCUSS AIDS

**COMMITTEE TAKES UP WITH ALEX. JOHNSON NUMBER OF QUESTIONS OF LOCAL INTEREST**

Various matters concerning this port were taken up yesterday afternoon with Alex. Johnston, deputy minister of marine, by a committee of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade consisting of John Dybavon, chairman, W. O. Fulton and David Thomson. The meeting took place in the recently opened fisheries experimental station which was inspected by Mr. Johnston and with which he stated he was much pleased.

Matters taken up with Mr. Johnston were particularly in regard to aids to navigation such as the establishment of a direction finding radio station on Langara Island, the installation of a light-house and fog horn at Rose Spit and the putting in of an occulting light and fog horn on Rachel Islands. The deputy minister stated that these matters would have the attention of the department but on the money available would depend the complying with such requests. Mr. Johnston definitely cleared up any misunderstandings that might have prevailed as to who were qualified to attend the school of navigation. Such a school as this, the deputy minister said, was open to all who wished to attend. Mr. Johnston could not say if a school of navigation would be conducted here again this winter.

### CUSTOMS PROBE PREPARATIONS

VANCOUVER, Nov. 16.—A. E. Nash of Toronto and R. B. Law of Ottawa, Government counsel in the customs investigation, arrived at Vancouver yesterday to gather data preparatory to the sitting of the commission here. Both conferred with Dugald Donaghy and they plan to co-operate with the Board of Trade and other civic bodies in the preparation of evidence.

### ALLAN CHISHOLM IS LAID TO REST

**FUNERAL SERVICE AT CHURCH OF ANNUNCIATION — WAS WELL KNOWN AND ESTEEMED CITIZEN**

With Catholic rites, the funeral took place this morning of the late Allan Chisholm, whose death occurred last week. With a large number of mourners in attendance, high requiem mass was performed in the Church of the Annunciation by Rev. Father P. J. McGrath, O.M.I., the choir being present. Following the service, interment took place in Fairview Cemetery. The pallbearers were Peter Byrne, J. J. Gillis, Lawrence Lawler, A. D. Gillies, George Holmes and J. Johnson.

Deceased, who was a native of Antigonish county, Nova Scotia, and 64 years of age had lived in British Columbia for 43 years and, in Prince Rupert, about eight years. He was highly esteemed by many friends whose sympathy is being extended to the bereaved widow.

Among those who sent flowers to mark their esteem were the Longshoremans' Union, Mr. and Mrs. A. Clapperton, Mr. and Mrs. George White, and Mrs. M. Richards and son.

### JOHN BULL'S BEER IS SOMETIMES POISON

LONDON, Nov. 16.—John Bull's famous bitter manages sometimes to get lead, boric acid and an excess of salts into it in spite of the boasted purity of British beer. The Minister of Health reports that out of 387 samples of beer which were taken at random for analysis, nine samples contained one of these three adulterants.

### Leaders of Rum Runners Are Arrested Including Captain Geo. Ford formerly of Quadra

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 16.—Government officers last night arrested four men at Los Angeles and two at San Francisco, three of whom are said to be among the wealthiest and most powerful liquor smugglers on the Pacific Coast, as the organizers of a huge rum-running conspiracy credited with landing in San Francisco last week a single shipment valued at \$300,000.

All the prisoners are said to be connected with the operations of the Consolidated Exporters Limited of Vancouver and include J. W. Neard, a wealthy B.C. liquor dealer, alleged by government officials to be a powerful figure for the past three years in the rum-running industry; L. L. Tait, a Canadian, said to be the San Francisco agent of the Consolidated, and Captain George Ford, former commander of the seized rum-runner *Quadra* and who is now under sentence of two years' imprisonment.

### FRENCH FRANC IS MOVING UPWARDS

MONTREAL, Nov. 16.—The persistent strength of the French franc during the past few months has been the outstanding feature of the foreign exchange markets. Yesterday it closed at 3.36 showing a net rise of 143 points from the low level of the year reached on July 20. The drastic deflationary measures instituted by Poincare are believed to be behind the rise of the franc but the return of French capital and consequent demand for French currency is also an important factor. It is believed that if this latter movement gains further momentum the advance of the franc is likely to become a skyrocketing affair.

MONTREAL, Nov. 16.—After a record of 34 years as captain of merchantmen on the seven seas Captain John Cantell, R.N.R., died last night aged 66. He retired from active service three years ago. His son, Donald Cantell, resides in Victoria, B.C.

### MOLTEN SUGAR FLOWING FAST

**FIRE CAUSED LOSS OF WAREHOUSE BUT BLAZE CANNOT BE EXTINGUISHED**

PUEBLO, Colorado, Nov. 18.—Fire this morning caused loss of the three-quarters of a million warehouse of the Holly Sugar Company, one of the firm being seriously injured. It is expected it will take 48 hours to completely extinguish the blaze as the molten sugar is running in streams from the immense pile of 160,000 sacks which filled the warehouse.

### REDUCTION PLANT CLOSING FOR WINTER

**Tucks Inlet Establishment Will be Ceasing Operations Next Week After Busy Season**

The Rupert Marine Products reduction plant at Tucks Inlet, after a busy season, will cease operations next week for the winter. There will be a staff of four or five men kept busy throughout the winter, however, making the usual repairs, alterations, etc.

### BANCROFT SEES MINING IN B.C. FORGING AHEAD

McGILL PROFESSOR RETURNS TO MONTREAL AFTER YEAR SPENT IN THIS PROVINCE

MONTREAL, Nov. 16.—British Columbia has mineral resources which will materially assist in putting Canada on the map as one of the leading mining countries of the world, professor Austin Bancroft, professor of geology at McGill University, said today on his return after a year's leave spent in the examination of the lead, zinc and copper mines of that province.

While he was unable to say anything today in detail of the investigations, Dr. Bancroft intimated that British Columbia was going ahead fast and that the mining industry had a great future. "British Columbia seems to be moving along the good solid way. There's no boom on but real progress is being made," he concluded.

### PROVIDE FUEL IN HIS WILL

**MERTHYR BUSINESSMAN LEAVES COAL AND WOOD TO WIDOW AND SISTERS**

MERTHYR TYDVIL, South Wales, Nov. 16.—The coal strike was of so much concern to Edmund Edwards, prominent businessman, who died recently, that under his will now probated he bequeathed among other things, eight tons of coal and a ton of firewood each year to his widow and five tons of coal and half a ton of wood annually each to his three sisters.

VICTORIA MAN FIGHTS BUCK

VICTORIA, Nov. 16.—The story and evidence of how an unarmed man battled to the death with an enraged animal, came to Victoria with the arrival of W. T. Hamilton, manager of the Firlock Lumber Company of Crofton.

Mr. Hamilton left Nanaimo in the evening driving along in his motor. Suddenly out of the darkness of the road as he was near Tye on the Island Highway there loomed a great buck. He tried to swing the car to miss the buck, but one of the front fenders tore into the animal and stunned him, throwing him to the side of the road.

Thinking that he could easily dispatch the buck with his pocketknife and bring home some nice venison, Mr. Hamilton got out of the car to survey the situation and decide of the best way of going about it.

The buck charged Hamilton, but the man was able to dodge him and before the animal could recover he jumped in and grappled with him at close range. The two rolled over on the ground, the animal trying to get his hoofs into action and the man trying to keep out of the cutting stroke of the hoofs.

The man kept himself in to the animal's body so as to get the minimum effect from the blows of the animal, but, at that, the hoofs of the buck cut Mr. Hamilton's clothes to shreds. The tip of the hoof of one of the powerful hind legs grazed his collar and scissored it clean off his neck.

Mr. Hamilton finally managed to get some leverage on the animal's head and forced it back until the bones on its neck snapped. That ended the fight in favor of the human gladiator.

Outside of the bruises and cuts, Mr. Hamilton escaped serious injury. He bound himself up, loaded the buck into his car and started for Victoria.

He reached his home, 3027 Fifth Street, Victoria, before midnight. The buck had a seven-pronged set of horns, which are to be mounted by a taxidermist. The fender of the car, which was crumpled up like paper, is being repaired, and the family and friends of the timberman are eating some nice venison.
