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TOLMIE NEW CONSERVATIVE LEADER GRAIN SHIP ON WAY FROM HONOLULU; OTHERS EXPECTED

Tolmie Chosen Leader of the Conservatives Kamloops Convention

Consented to take position after deadlock arrived at last night with Ladner and Taylor as rivals

KAMLOOPS, Nov. 26.—After an all-day effort to name a permanent leader of the party for British Columbia, the provincial conservatives in convention here last night elected Hon. Simon Fraser Tolmie of Victoria to the position. Six ballots were taken during the day without success when adjournment was taken. Ladner headed each ballot but lacked the sufficient sixty per cent of the convention to make his election conform to the recent constitutional amendment.

Ladner's greatest strength was shown in the third ballot when he secured 317 votes, lacking only 10 to elect. C. F. Davis then had 10 and Col. Spencer 14. The last vote taken, which was the sixth, gave Ladner 300, Taylor 218, Davis 10, Spencer 14.

When the convention resumed its sittings at 8:15 Ladner and Taylor proposed to the convention to offer the unanimous election to Tolmie but the latter refused it. A committee was named to investigate the deadlock situation and after a recess it was announced that Mr. Tolmie had reconsidered his refusal, finally accepting the position tendered him.

VETERINARY SURGEON
Simon Fraser Tolmie is by profession a veterinary surgeon and it is from his qualifications in that profession that he is often spoken of as "Dr. Tolmie."

On his farm at Mount Tolmie near Victoria he has for many years been a breeder of pure bred livestock and until his parliamentary duties compelled him to relinquish the work, often officiated as judge at fairs and in official capacities at local horse races.

Born in Victoria in 1867 he was educated in that city and at the Ontario University College at Toronto. He then returned to Victoria and engaged in farming with his father. Later he practised his profession at Victoria for fourteen years and held various positions under the government in connection with live stock, giving up these to accept the nomination for the Union Government during the war. He became minister of agriculture in the Borden government in August 1919 and carried on the same position with the Meighen administration which was purely Conservative, retiring when that government went out of office.

Of recent years he has been co-operative organizer for the whole of Canada, while still representing Victoria in the Dominion Parliament.

SANKEY GOES TO HIS DOOM

LEFT THIS MORNING ON PRINCE RUPERT FOR OKALIA WHERE HE WILL BE EXECUTED

In custody of Inspector William Spiller and Constables Robert Gibson and Thomas Camm, Joseph Sankey, Indian youth, sentenced to hang on February 16 for the murder of Miss Loretta Chisholm at Port Essington on May 23, was taken south this morning on the steamer Prince Rupert. Arriving at Okalla he will be placed in a death cell and will remain therein under constant guard to await the dawn of his execution day when he will be taken from his cell to the gallows, there to end his life at the noose. Arthur Ellis, official Canadian executioner, will come from the East.

Sankey's composure during the two nights and one day since the death sentence was passed upon him is reported by the police officers who guarded him to have been little changed. He maintained his customary stoical appearance and displayed no emotions, eating heartily and sleeping well. He was kept under guard in the Court House cells, not being taken back to the city lock-up. This morning, just before being taken to the steamer, he attempted to sing a song but the officers would not allow it. He was very cheerful and did not seem deeply concerned in the prospect of the immediate future.

Sankey is the second man sent down from a Prince Rupert court for execution. About eleven years ago an Indian, Johnny May, was found guilty of murdering a bridge watchman near Hazelton and was sentenced to death. He obtained a new trial, however, which resulted in his acquittal. Subsequently he died naturally.

TRAINMEN TO STRIKE SOON

ACTION ENDORSED BY FULL COMMITTEE AND ANNOUNCEMENT IS MADE BY VICE-PRESIDENT

MONTREAL, Nov. 26.—The action of the membership of the order of railway conductors and the brotherhood of railroad trainmen in voting to go on strike to secure increased wages was fully endorsed at a meeting of representatives of both unions today. At the conclusion of a two-day sitting, N. Berry, senior vice-president of the conductors' organization, made the following announcement:

"The full committee of the order of conductors and the brotherhood of railway trainmen have endorsed the action of their membership in voting for peaceful withdrawal from the railroad service unless a satisfactory settlement can otherwise be secured."

Officials of the railroads and the department of labor of the Dominion government have been so advised.

TEN DROWNED IN A TUNNEL

COFFERDAM BROKE AWAY AS RESULT OF CLOUDBURST NEAR OAKLAND, CAL.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 26.—Ten men were drowned Thursday at Orinda, fifteen miles from East Oakland when a concrete tunnel which they were constructing flooded as a result of a cloudburst which caused a cofferdam to break and send a torrential flood into the tunnel where the men were working in connection with the Mokelumne River aqueduct which will bring the new water supply to Oakland.

BOARD OF AUDITORS IS NOW APPOINTED

OTTAWA, Nov. 26.—The government has appointed members of the board of auditors which was created under an Act of Parliament in 1925. The board consist of Gordon Scott of Montreal, chairman, Eugene Potvin of Montreal, and E. Jay-Howson of Toronto.

Would Make Regular Sailings Japanese Freighters Into Port of Prince Rupert for Cargo

The shipping company Nakamura Guri & Co. Ltd., of Kobe and other Japanese ports, is becoming interested in Prince Rupert and is anxious to carry cargoes of lumber and other products from here to Japan with a view to inaugurating regular sailings, possibly a steamer every two months at first. Y. Miura, manager of the company, who was here yesterday, accompanied by T. J. Nagao, Japanese agent, told of the aims of his company. They own seventeen freighters beside subsidiary companies engaged in the lumber business. He is looking for all the information possible here in touch with local businessmen and get the carrying for his line.

Chief Hanson, president of the Board of Trade, and other local people took the visitors in hand and they interviewed a number of citizens and got in touch with those who would be likely to give them business. It was pointed out to them that the local Timbermen's Association could handle lumber shipments collectively and it should be an easy matter to provide lumber cargoes provided the market was receptive.

Mr. Miura saw P. L. Buckley before he went to the Islands, and got all possible information in regard to his mill on the islands and the class of lumber offered for sale. On his return to Kobe the visitor will at once get in touch with the buyers and it is very probable that some good business may result which will be advantageous to this port.

Next Grain Ship Due December Second Coming from Honolulu and Others to Follow Directly

The next grain ship for this port will be the "K" Line freighter, Meigen Maru, which is due to arrive here from Honolulu a week from today, December 2, a wireless having been received this morning from the master of the vessel by the Northern Shipping Co. Ltd., local agents. The vessel, which left Honolulu for this port on November 17, will load a full cargo of grain here. She will be lined at the dry dock and will probably be here about a week.

The Meigen Maru is a vessel of somewhat similar size and appearance to other grain vessels which have been here this fall. She was built in 1920 in Japan by the Asano Shipbuilding Co. for the Haischo Kaun Shipping Co. She is a vessel of 5435 tons gross with length of 400 feet, beam of 53 ft. 2", and depth, 29ft. 4 in.

Capt. Larry Thomson of the Federal Pilots of British Columbia local branch will pilot the Meigen Maru into port and as she moves in the harbor and out again.

Several other grain vessels will call here during the month of December to take grain out of the elevator which is now full.

Tornado Strikes When Thanksgiving Dinner Being Eaten in South

Forty or more people killed and large number injured and homes twisted to nothing by storm

ST. LOUIS, November 26.—A late November tornado travelling a zig-zag path through portions of Louisiana, Arkansas and Missouri yesterday killed more than 40 persons while one hundred or more were injured and property damage amounted to several hundred thousand dollars.

The "twister" tore through several small communities while the inhabitants were enjoying their thanksgiving dinners, mowing down homes. The place hardest hit was Heber Springs, Arkansas, with 15 dead and many homes destroyed. The storm came without warning and twisted the place into a mass of wreckage.

Several towns were gauged with fire and it is feared when communications are restored the death toll may be increased but the latest information shows that Arkansas suffered most, eight being killed in Moscow, five at Opelousa and two at Sheridan. Across the border Brandeville, Mo., was hard hit, three being dead and twenty injured there, nearly every business building, the church and community hall being destroyed.

MANSON ASKS LAW CHANGED

WOULD PROHIBIT PRIVATE IMPORT AND EXPORT IN THIS PROVINCE
PROVINCES TOGETHER
PRAIRIE GOVERNMENTS ASK FOR FAST PATROL SHIP TO STOP LIQUOR SMUGGLING

VICTORIA, Nov. 26.—The Royal Commission investigating the customs opened a session here this morning, the first witness appearing being Attorney General Manson, who advocated the passing by the Federal parliament of legislation prohibiting private import and export of liquors into and out of the province.

The representations made by Mr. Manson were concurred in by the attorneys general of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba, who also were present, and included requests that adequate patrol ships with a speed of not less than thirty knots with suitable guns be established and directed particularly against motor ships from which supplies for smuggling in many instances were obtained.

Dealing with the question of private stocks of liquor within the province, Mr. Manson stated that this inevitably resulted, despite utmost efforts, in the re-venting of liquor by others than the government and the undoing of the Government Liquor Act and the greatly increased cost of law enforcement.

In reply to a question by Chief Justice Brown of the customs commission at noon as to whether it would not be possible to raise the license fee on export liquor houses in British Columbia so high as to put them out of business, Mr. Manson stated: "If we did it would be regarded as prohibitory legislation and would be declared ultra vires." He had considered increasing the fee from ten to twenty thousand dollars.

36 BELOW AT YUKON POINTS

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HON. S. F. TOLMIE CONSERVATIVE LEADER.

The Conservative deadlock at the Kamloops convention seems to have been of great benefit to the party for as a result they have chosen a man to lead them who is much better fitted for the work than any of those previously mentioned for the position.

Simon Fraser Tolmie, who was the final choice of the convention, is an outstanding man as an agriculturist and one who it is expected will not stoop to any of the pettiness which has often characterized the provincial politicians. While he has had no experience in the provincial House and knows little of parliamentary leadership, he has been official organizer for the Conservative party in Canada for several years and that experience should stand him in good stead as the leader of the party in British Columbia.

It is difficult to see how the Conservatives could have secured a better leader than they have done. If he is elected to the Legislature in the near future it will be a contest between two farmers, Farmer John Oliver and Farmer Simon Fraser Tolmie.

BACK TO THE LAND FOR A LEADER.

Readers of history will remember how the Romans found it necessary to take a man from between the handles of a plow to save the city from the attacking enemy. So today the farmer is to the fore. Joga Oliver, who was never anything else but a farmer before he entered politics has been one of the great successes of provincial statesmanship. S. F. Tolmie was taken from the farm when a union candidate was needed during the war and both Liberals and Conservatives supported him wholeheartedly for neither knew to which party he belonged and both claimed him. He was returned then by a huge majority in Victoria and has been returned at two general elections since as a Conservative, and during the Meighen administration held the position of minister of agriculture for which he was well fitted.

NEARLY A LEADER BUT NOT QUITE.

Leon Ladner came very near to being leader of the party. He had a majority vote of the convention but was unable to secure the desired sixty per cent, something which his opponents apparently banked on when they framed the convention constitution. Hitherto a majority vote has carried.

However, Mr. Ladner will be able to continue his parliamentary work at Ottawa and if an opportunity should arise for a Conservative government to again take the reins of office in the federal field, Mr. Ladner will undoubtedly be a possibility for a ministerial position, if he is then a member.

Senator Taylor, the choice of a section of the convention, is almost unknown in modern politics. He is the owner of the New Westminster Columbian, a strongly partisan daily newspaper, which has never made any great mark in the newspaper field, although it has been a financial success.

W. J. Bower, who dropped out near the beginning and who was the force behind Senator Taylor, is probably out for good. It is not likely that he will again attempt to lead the party in this province but is much more likely to essay the federal field, possibly as a successor to Mr. Tolmie.

KING APPROVES CANADIAN APPOINTMENT.

The new dignity of the Canadian nation was emphasized yesterday when King George in person approved the appointment of Hon. Vincent Massey as minister of His Majesty's Canadian Government to Washington. This is the first appointment of the kind approved by the King and is an indication of the change which has come about as a result of the Imperial Conference.

DUTHIE TALKS OF NEW MILL

SAYS AT SMITHERS HE HAS PLANS FOR CONCENTRATOR AT HUDSON RAY MINE

With the single stipulation that the property maintains its present rate of progress on improvement, J. F. Duthie announced on Thursday evening his plans for erecting a concentrator on the Duthie mine after the new year, says the Interior News. Mr. Duthie returned to Smithers on Thursday evening after a trip of inspection of the mine and he did not attempt to control the enthusiasm he felt for the future of that property, which has made such sensational progress and given up a steady flow of high grade ore in the process of development during the past few years.

One encountered in the shaft establishing depth of the property, progress on the drift to tap the ore shoots and the continuity of the ore deposits in the various workings all entered into the optimism of the owner, who saw the early necessity of embarking on operations of a major scale, of which the most pressing and first to be provided would be the mill to handle a generously estimated output of the future.

Such an enlargement of operations would mean a great deal to the mining industry throughout the interior and especially to the town of Smithers. In transportation alone a mill would mean much in the way of reduced costs to the ratio of concentration and the population around the mine would jump to big numbers.

Mr. Duthie outlined other undertakings now under way that would revolutionize the mining industry in this whole country, but details of which were as yet not available for the public.

H. H. Halliwell returned from Prince Rupert on Wednesday after a short business trip.

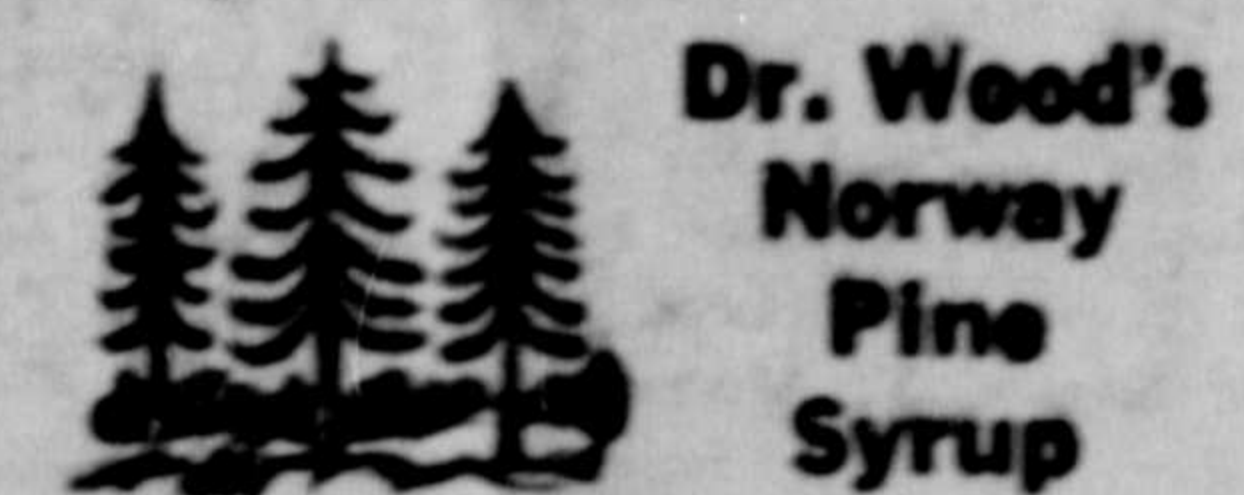

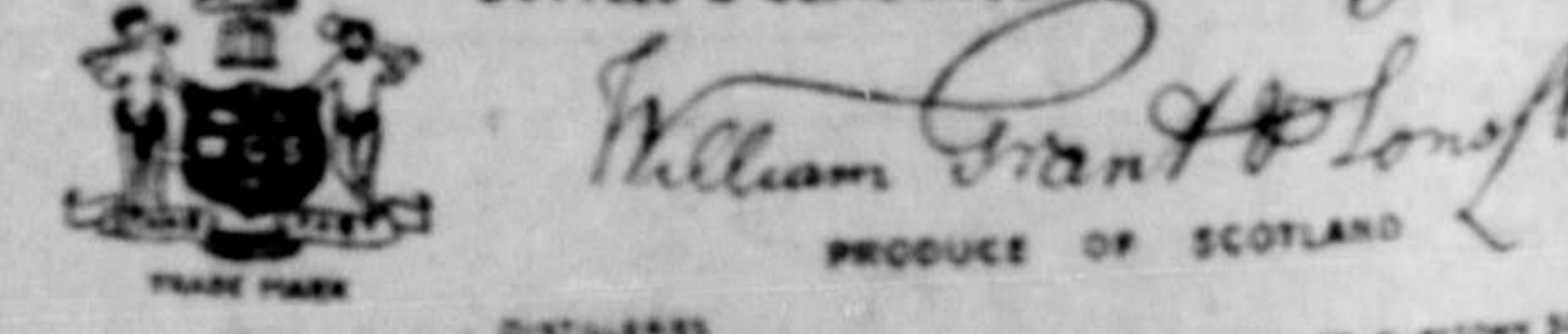

ROAD PROGRAM OF COWICHAN

AMBITIOUS DISTRICT PLANS LARGE EXPENDITURES ON VANCOUVER ISLAND

DUNCAN, Nov. 26.—At a meeting of the North Cowichan Council, the council considered and approved a program of road construction and estimates of costs in connection therewith, covering a period of twelve years, to be financed by the issue of short-time debentures, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent and maturing in seven years.

The program contemplates a total expenditure during this period of \$245,394, or an average of \$20,450 per annum. This compares with an average yearly expenditure during the past five years of \$21,288 per annum.

The council's plan provides for the tarriating of fourteen miles of Island Highway, for which seventy-five per cent of the cost will be provided by the Provincial Government. Nearly seven miles more will be included under the heading of "Secondary Highways," towards which the Government will contribute on a fifty-fifty basis. The Quamichan Lake Road and Evans Road come under this classification.

In addition, it is planned to pave the Bell-McKinnin, Gibbins, and Lakes roads. Duncan Street, the streets of Chemainus townsite, and a portion of Bonhall Road. The cost of paving these roads will be paid for entirely by the municipality. Fourteen miles of roadway are included under this heading.

TOPLEY PROPERTY LIKELY TO BE SOLD

Spokane Firm Probably Will Take it for \$200,000 With \$10,000 Down

The Interior News of Spithers says that The Standard Silver-Lead Company of Spokane expects to purchase the mining property recently discovered by Frank Taylor of Topley on a thirty month bond for \$200,000 with \$10,000 cash down. B. N. Sharp, field engineer for the company, and W. H. North, general manager, have visited the property.

Mr. Taylor denies that the property has been taken by the Consolidated Company of Trail, as reported by the Omineca Herald.

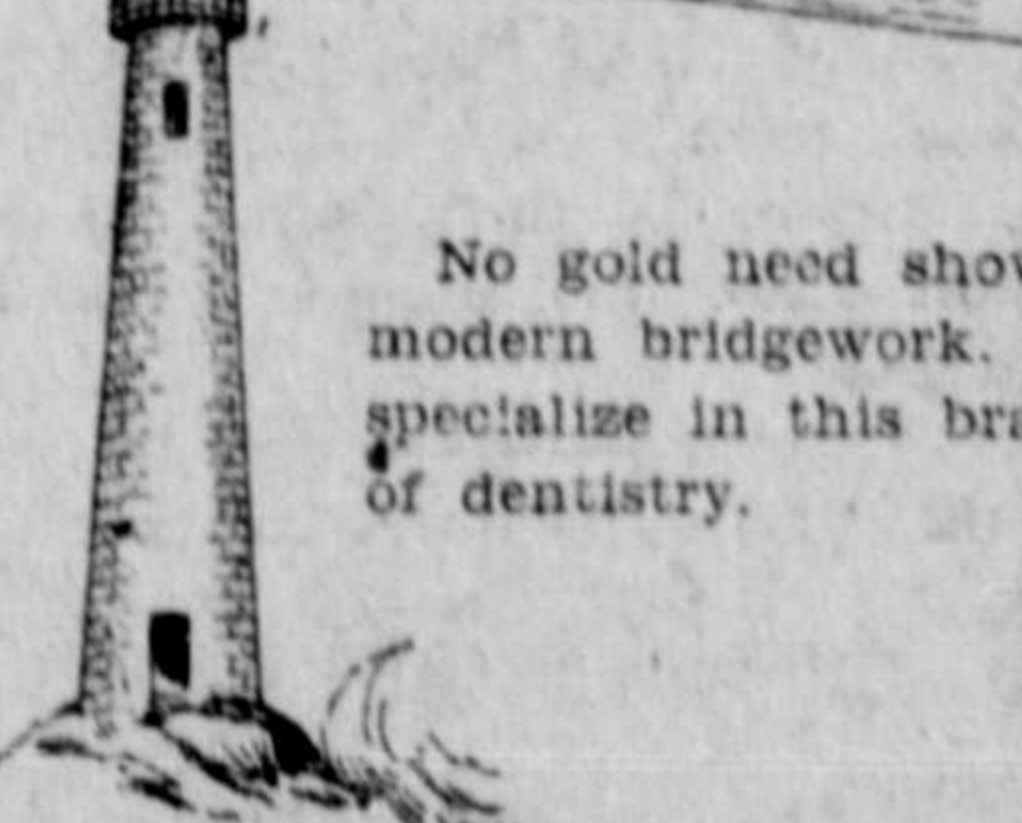

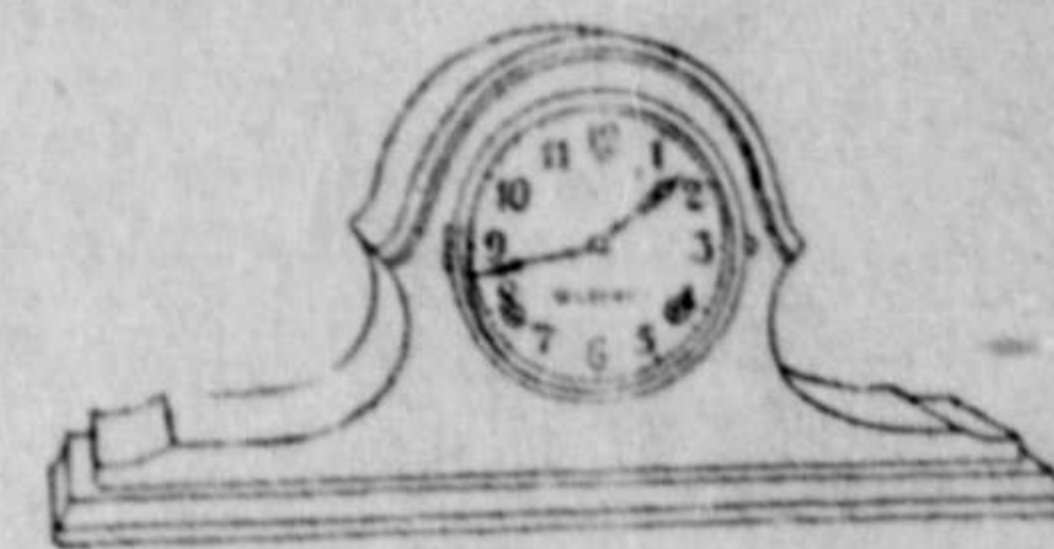

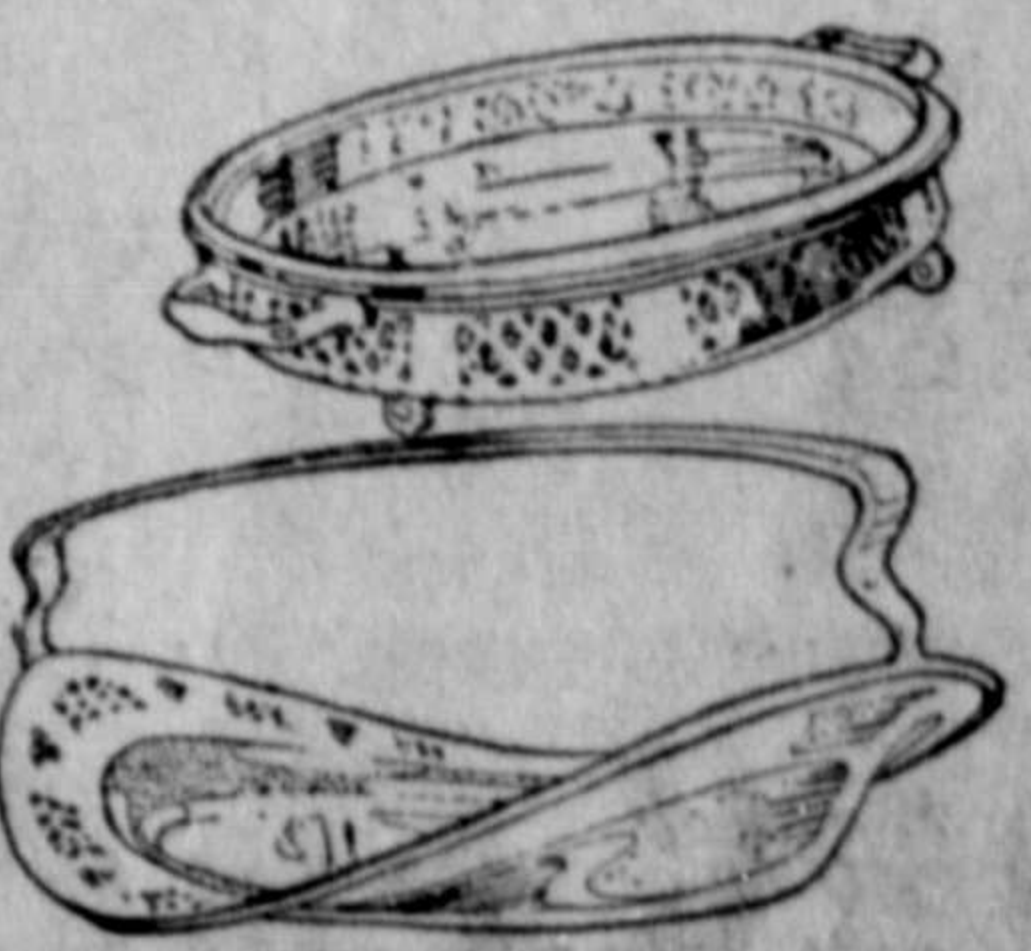

TEN SERVANTS ARE FINGERS

LADY FROM ENGLAND IN ARTICLE TELLS OF HER LIFE IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

A London periodical "The Lady" has an interesting letter from a lady settled in British Columbia who signs herself "Nomad." Under the heading "The Lady in British Columbia" she writes: "She keeps ten servants, her ten fingers; these digital allies have to serve her faithfully and well. They are all the help she has to depend upon."

Her husband wisely went abroad before her to spend a year in "learning." At the expiration of that period he bought with his capital a poultry farm, cabled home he was "ready," and then settled in with such patience as he could muster for weeks of "hatching" which must elapse before his family could arrive. His wife, his three sons, his household goods answered his summons with promptitude.

HER NEW HOME

The lady finds her new home, to be fifteen miles from Victoria, the principal city on Vancouver Island. She is driven by motor stage to her farmhouse, a frame bungalow of four rooms (awaiting additions when circumstances justify such an expense) situated in a clearing of the forest five minutes' walk from the only road; barns, chicken houses, and cow shed are near by. Cared patches have been sown with vegetables, there are fruit trees and bushes, the lady is greeted by the call of the pheasant and the quail, the Cumberwell Beauty and the Swallow-tail butterflies are flitting hither and thither, in the distance she can see the sea. There is one shop, two miles away in the village where a handful of cottages, an Anglican church, a forge, and a schoolhouse keep it company, and to this school the lady's three boys will have to go daily their parents not being sufficiently well off to send them to a private one. But they will soon cease to mourn for the loss of "preparatory." Up at six, they all three, in overalls, will help their father with the milking, will groom the horse, will (under his superintendence) feed the chickens, chop the wood, pick the fruit and vegetables, and then, after breakfast, clad only in shirt and knickerbockers, halloo, unless they will start off cheerily on their two-mile tramp to school.

MOTHER NOT IDLE

But while they have been at these several chores their mother has not been idle. Her husband having lighted the fire before she entered the kitchen, to her falls the business of preparing breakfast, and filling the school-bags with biscuits, house-cleaning, cooking, washing, writing home, mending, patching, darning, giving a helping hand when required both indoors and out. She will, when necessary, cut the hair of both husband and sons. She will bake all her own bread. Through the medium of the stage which passes her house four times a day, she may—can she afford so to do—send in the basket of her washing to the city laundry.

She has just bought a bicycle so as to keep in touch with those of her children who have married and live away from the village.

Erna Nissen, a young girl from Trollholm in the province of Holstein, single handed saved four women and three men from drowning and was awarded the Prussian hero medal.

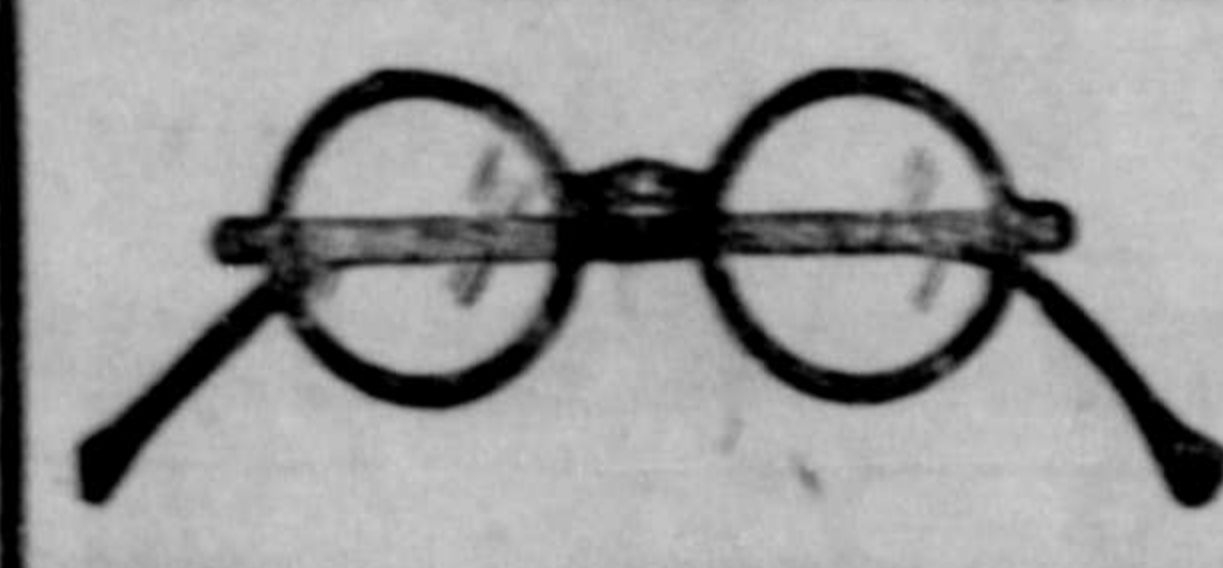

J. E. DALRYMPLE HAS RESIGNED

GIVES UP POSITION WITH CANADIAN NATIONAL AS VICE-PRESIDENT

MONTREAL, Nov. 26.—J. E. Dalrymple, vice president in charge of traffic and express, Canadian National railways, announced his resignation to take effect December 31 next. A. T. Weldon, general traffic officer, is appointed vice-president, succeeding Mr. Dalrymple. The position of general traffic manager will be abolished.
 "I have been contemplating this move for some time past," said Mr. Dalrymple. "In anticipation of which our traffic department has undergone reorganization and now that the new officers are functioning I feel that I can relieve myself of the arduous duties which have devolved upon me for so long and still be satisfied that the work in which I have taken such keen interest will be carried on to a successful conclusion. Naturally it will be a wrench but one that I have been planning in order that I might have more time at home with my family and friends."

Mr. Dalrymple added that the management had granted him leave of absence during the month of December and that he was, therefore, immediately transferring all outstanding matters to Mr. Weldon, his successor. On being asked as to his immediate plans he stated that he proposed to stay at home and get better acquainted with his family and was not going to think about business until at least the New Year. He proposed to continue to reside in Montreal.
 Mr. Dalrymple has had a striking career, having been engaged with one railway interest for over forty years, starting in as office boy with the Grand Trunk in July 1883, and finally filling the position of vice-president of the succeeding company, the Canadian National railways.

OUT AFTER BEAR IN MINING DISTRICTS
 (Mining and Industrial Record)
 In our last issue we pointed out the folly of the Game Board's policy in protecting that predatory animal, the bear. The matter is now being taken up by the Prospectors' Association, and is receiving the attention of the B.C. Chamber of Mines and the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy.
 The following is an extract from a letter of one of the best known Kootenay prospectors and it sets out a province-wide condition:
 "Presumably I have lost about three thousand dollars worth of supplies at one mine alone. This property is robbed every time the camp is left unattended. The bears in that district have also cleaned out every other camp. They are very destructive. All doors and windows are broken every time they make their raid. I might state that the prospectors here pay no attention to the present act. In fact most of us will go out of the way to destroy the marauders, but there are very few prospectors out nowadays so the bears have a good chance to increase in numbers."

ROTARY CLUB HEARS MR. JUSTICE D. A. McDONALD AND HEARS REVISION OF ADDRESS

At the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald gave the club a literary treat by repeating the address of Spartacus to the gladiators at Rome urging them to rebellion. He also spoke of the love for the beautiful and kindly thoughts and of the value of sincerity and earnestness in small things. He told of the fact that in this age we worked with the strength of all ages because we were heirs to the thought that came from every human mind through books. There were blazes on the sands of time by the Anglo Saxons perhaps more destructively the results of the more stern work of the race than the lighter and more frivolous works of the French people which were influenced by the joys of living. He quoted from Pauline Johnson, the Indian poetess, and then gave the splendid oration of the champion gladiator to his fellows.
