## FINANCIAL PANIC IN NEW YORK ALLAYED

### TRUNK ROAD FROM PRINCE RUPERT EASTWARD IS ENDORSED BY MAYORS

#### League of Mayors Goes on Record in Favor of Highway to This City

**Newton Urges road to Jasper; many recommendations made at meeting of newly formed western organization at Vancouver**

VANCOUVER, March 4.—At the concluding meeting of the Western Canada Development and Unity League held here yesterday Mayor Newton of Prince Rupert urged the building of a highway outlet from Prince Rupert eastward to Jasper and the conference went on record requesting the British Columbia government to connect Prince Rupert with the inter-provincial highway system.

Before concluding their sessions the league, which consists of the mayors of western towns, made a number of recommendations, among which were:

#### NO OPPOSITION TO MINISTER BY CONSERVATIVES

**Dunning May Secure Seat Without Poll Being Taken as Big Majority Assured**

REGINA, March 4.—Conservatives have definitely decided not to oppose the election of Hon. C. S. Dunning, minister of railways and canals, who was recently appointed to the cabinet and who is a candidate for Regina. Following the defeat of the independent by such a large majority by Premier King at Prince Albert it is thought that it would be disastrous to have another such decisive victory for the government at Regina. It is said that a big majority for him is assured.

#### VESSEL AFIRE AT VANCOUVER

**Loss to Steam Schooner Sierra While at Dock Amounts to \$50,000**

SAN PEDRO, Mar. 4.—A fire aboard the steam schooner Sierra which arrived at the E. K. Wood Company's dock here Tuesday night laden with lumber from Gray's Harbor took place yesterday. After several hours of fighting it was brought under control and the resulting damage is estimated at \$50,000.

#### BIG BUSINESS PACIFIC PORTS

SAN FRANCISCO, March 4.—A total of 66,000,000 tons representing 8,800 shiploads was the foreign, inter-coastal and coastwise cargo moved by water from Pacific coast ports during 1925, William Piggot, president of the Pacific Foreign Trade Congress informed the members at the opening of the session this morning.

VANCOUVER, Mar. 4.—Lieutenant Governor Bruce arrived here last night and went on to Victoria by the midnight boat which is due to arrive there this morning.

#### TO SHIP ORE FROM LA ROSE

**Installation of Tramway Projected for Alice Arm Property Near Dolly Varden**

With prospects on the property better today than they ever were before and shipment of ore to start just as soon as transportation is possible this spring over the Dolly Varden Railway, people who invested money in the La Rose mine at Alice Arm will start to collect dividends next year and possibly this, states J. M. Morrison, an official of the company who is visiting in the city. Mr. Morrison arrived on the Prince Rupert yesterday afternoon after having spent the winter in Victoria and other points in the south and will proceed to Alice Arm on Sunday. He has been actively engaged for the past few months in the marketing of La Rose stock and reports that there has been a splendid sale particularly in Prince Rupert where the property has been attractive through the fact that its directors and operators are all local men of repute and experience.

**Stock is Low**  
The stock has been sold at 50 per share but it is thought it will undoubtedly go up with the commencement of shipping in the near future. There has been little inclination on the part of people owning stock in the company to turn it over but its healthy position was demonstrated recently when a small parcel brought 75¢ on the open market in Vancouver.

The Lalrose Company being developed under the personal supervision of Miles Donald, president of the company and one of the best known mining men of the north, has encountered high grade silver ore in an upraise from its new tunnel, 130 feet below the surface exposure. A previous shipment of 50 tons of picked ore from this property, rawhided to the Dolly Varden Railway and shipped to Trail, gave a return of 250 oz. silver per ton.

Installation of a tramway is now projected so that steady production can be maintained.

#### GOVERNMENT ASKED LIFE SAVING TUG

VICTORIA, March 4.—A life saving tug for use on the west coast of Vancouver Island is once more being asked of the Dominion government by the people of Victoria. An agitation for this has been going on for years. At one time a motor launch was placed at Banfield but it had not been there long before it was allowed to beat to pieces on the shore.

What is asked now is a tug large and powerful enough to handle any situation that may occur.

#### NEW COMPANY ON ISLANDS

**North Pacific Forests and Mines Limited Will Develop Timber and Coal Mine**  
AFTER WATER RIGHTS  
Former Concern Had in View Establishment of Pulp Mill at That Point

A new company, The North Pacific Forests and Mines Ltd. which is financed by the De Boys interests of New York, has been formed for the purpose of developing the Slate Chuck coal property and timber limits on Skidegate Inlet, according to word which arrived here this morning.

The company is applying to the government for water rights on the property to be used for industrial and other purposes. This, it is understood, will be in connection with the proposed developments.

About two years ago another company cruised the timber and prepared to take over the same property and they had in view the erection of a pulp mill on Skidegate Inlet, using the same water power which is being recorded now by the new company.

#### Almost a Financial Panic in New York; Stocks Liquidated

**Partial recovery takes place this morning as banking support is given to high grade shares**

NEW YORK, March 4.—All previous records for the volume of trading on the New York stock exchange were shattered yesterday when prices broke from one to 33 points under a gigantic wave of liquidation. Wild disorder reigned on the floor of the exchange as the closing gong sounded with the final quotations the lowest of the day.

NEW YORK, March 4 (later)—The reactionary movement in stocks which continued uninterrupted for more than a week and has reduced the quoted value of securities by more than a billion dollars, was checked temporarily this morning when strong banking support was provided for a long list of high grade railroad and industrial shares. A rally of from one to seven points followed the initial buying with trading again taking place totalling an enormous volume.

#### LOW PRICE DUE TRAIN SERVICE

**Fishermen Would Like to Get Train Out of Prince Rupert Thursdays**

If a train could be run out of Prince Rupert on Thursdays it would be a great help to the fishing industry, the fishermen say. The lack of a train today put the price of halibut down several points causing loss to the fishermen. This condition will continue until the double service commences, which is not expected for a month or two yet. Fish is a commodity that does not keep well and every day out of the water decreases its value. Because of that it is essential to get the halibut to market at the earliest possible moment. The matter is being taken up with the railway management to see if something can be done to relieve the situation.

#### FIFTY GALLON STILL FOUND

**Was Carefully Concealed in Roof of House on Lulu Island; Chinese Charged**

VANCOUVER, March 4.—Police and customs officers seized a fifty gallon still carefully concealed in the roof of a house on Lulu Island last night, together with 200 gallons of mash and 15 gallons of moonshine liquor. Lee Sing and Lee Tin, two Chinese, charged with keeping an illicit still, were this morning remanded.

Parliament Adjourned For Short Recess.

Parliament has adjourned for a short recess before starting the serious business of the session. When they reassemble, the Premier will be back in his old seat and will lead the House in person. The members will then have to speak to the subject in hand instead of wandering all over creation for matter about which to talk in order to carry on the work of obstruction.

Reading Room And Public Library.

There are in the city two separate and distinct institutions, the city reading room and the library where there is also a small magazine reading section of a different type from the other. The reading room is a place where the homeless men of the city, the unemployed and any others who wish to see the newspapers and magazines, assemble and smoke and occasionally play a game of checkers or talk. It is in the nature of a club for those who have nowhere else to go and who do not wish to spend money or have none to spend. It is a most useful institution and it would be a pity to spoil it for the purpose for which it is designed.

At present the library is operated by the Library Board, an independent body appointed by the Mayor, a certain number retiring each year. It is used by about half of the people of the city, including children, and fills a need in the educational and recreational life of the city. All that is wanted there is more books and the city council is being asked to increase the grant this year to provide those.

Local Cannery Is First To Open.

The Miller Cannery at Seal Cove is the first one to begin operations this year and it is expected it will continue from now until late in the autumn. It puts up herring in the early spring, salmon in the summer and clams in the autumn, so that it works for about eight months of the year.

This cannery is very valuable to the city and it is to be hoped it will prosper.

Water Rates To Cold Storage Co.

The water charges at the Gold Storage plant is complained are excessive. The institution is the largest purchaser of water the city has, and much of it is used for washing down fishing boats and carrying on the fish packing business for which water is given at a very low rate to the other fish houses. The city council is taking a very sensible view of this matter. We have to encourage our industries, and especially those pertaining to the handling of fish.

The Gold Storage plant employs a large staff all the year round and is the most important industry in the city at present. It has fed the people when all other industries failed. It is the wise thing to keep it going and to encourage other businesses to locate here and develop our resources.

PRINCE CHARLES MADE FAST TRIP NORTH IN SPITE OF FOG DELAY

Going South Soon as Cargo Discharged and Will be There Two Weeks

C.N.R. steamer Prince Charles, Capt. Neil McLean, arrived in port at 3:45 yesterday afternoon after making another fast run from Vancouver via the Queen Charlottes Islands in spite of the fact that she lost seven hours on Monday night in Skidegate Channel where she was forced to anchor on account of the fog. The vessel left Vancouver at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon so the run was done in just about four days. The Charles brought a light passenger list here and about fifty tons of freight consisting mostly of lumber and steel plates for the dry dock to be used in connection with the building of the Okanagan Lake motor vessel. Unloading of this started this morning and, as soon as it is discharged, the Charles will sail direct for Vancouver where she will remain for a couple of weeks until the double weekly service between here and Vancouver is commenced. Taking no passengers on this trip south, the Charles will proceed to Vancouver with a skeleton crew under Capt. McLean. Chief Officer Gleason and Second Officer Thomas will transfer to the Prince Rupert tomorrow morning and Purser Bert Robson and Chief Stewart Frank Bray will go over to the Prince John which, in command of Capt. E. Mabbs, will pick up the Queen Charlotte Island service sailing from here on Saturday night.

SABATINI STORY DONE IN PICTURE

Captain Blood is Story of Pirate and Shows Sinking of Victorieuse

The explosion which sinks the Victorieuse, one of the traitorous French ships, is one of the most remarkable scenes ever filmed. This galleon carrying more than forty guns is utterly destroyed by the force of hundreds of kegs of powder in its hold. The sinking of the Arabelle, the flagship of Captain Blood is one of the most marvellous sea scenes ever screened. More than a dozen of these full rigged thirty-six and forty gun fighting galleons take part in this great sea fight.

The picture was directed by the skillful hand of David Smith, whose 'Black Beauty,' 'The Courage of Marge O'Doone,' 'Masters of Men,' 'Pioneer Trails,' and 'The Man from Brodney's' have gone down in cinema annals as masterpieces of the screen.

The cast is composed almost entirely of players who have been starred in various productions. In addition to the score of principals the cast is augmented with several hundred players in the spectacular ship and land scenes.

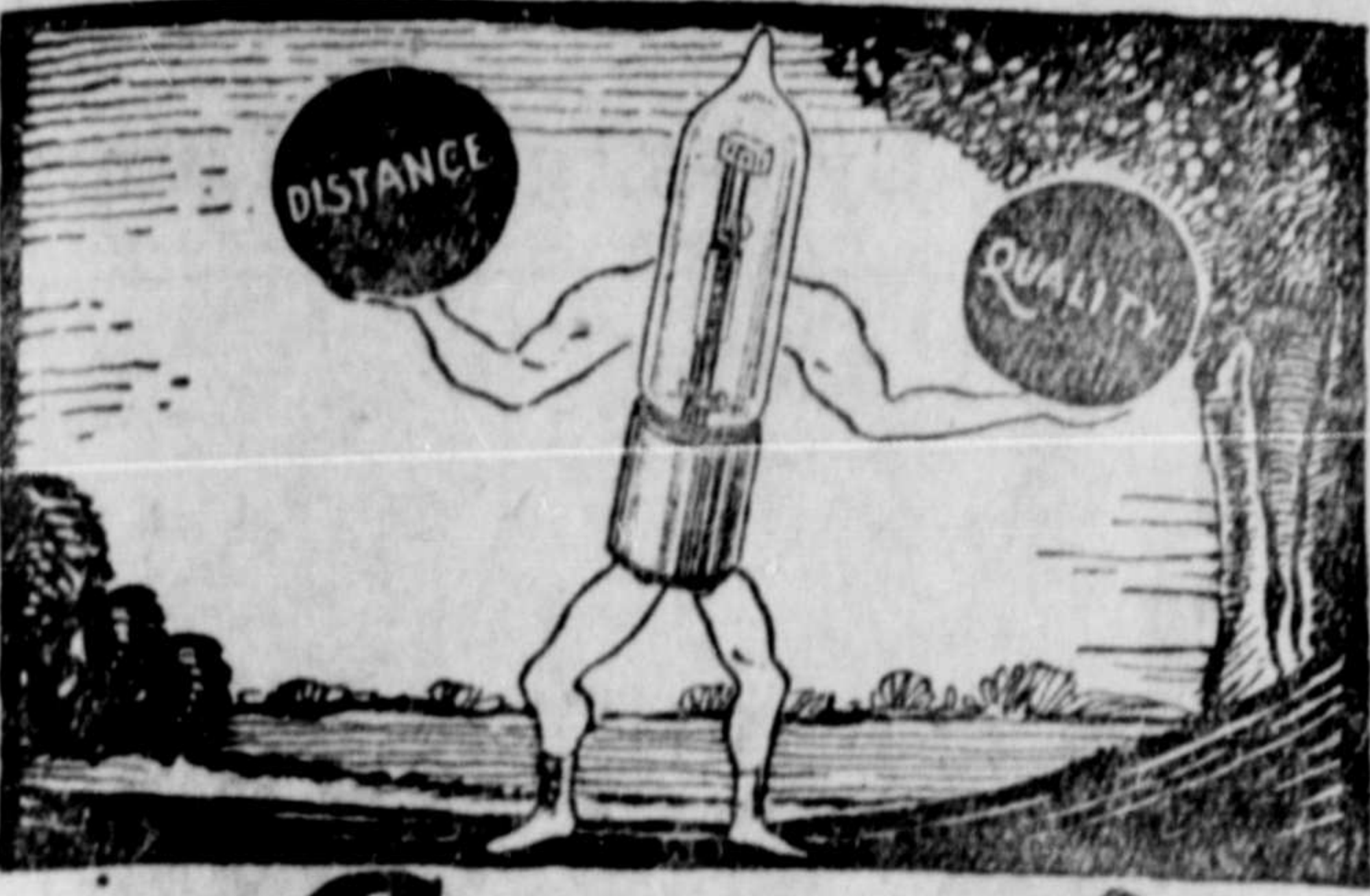

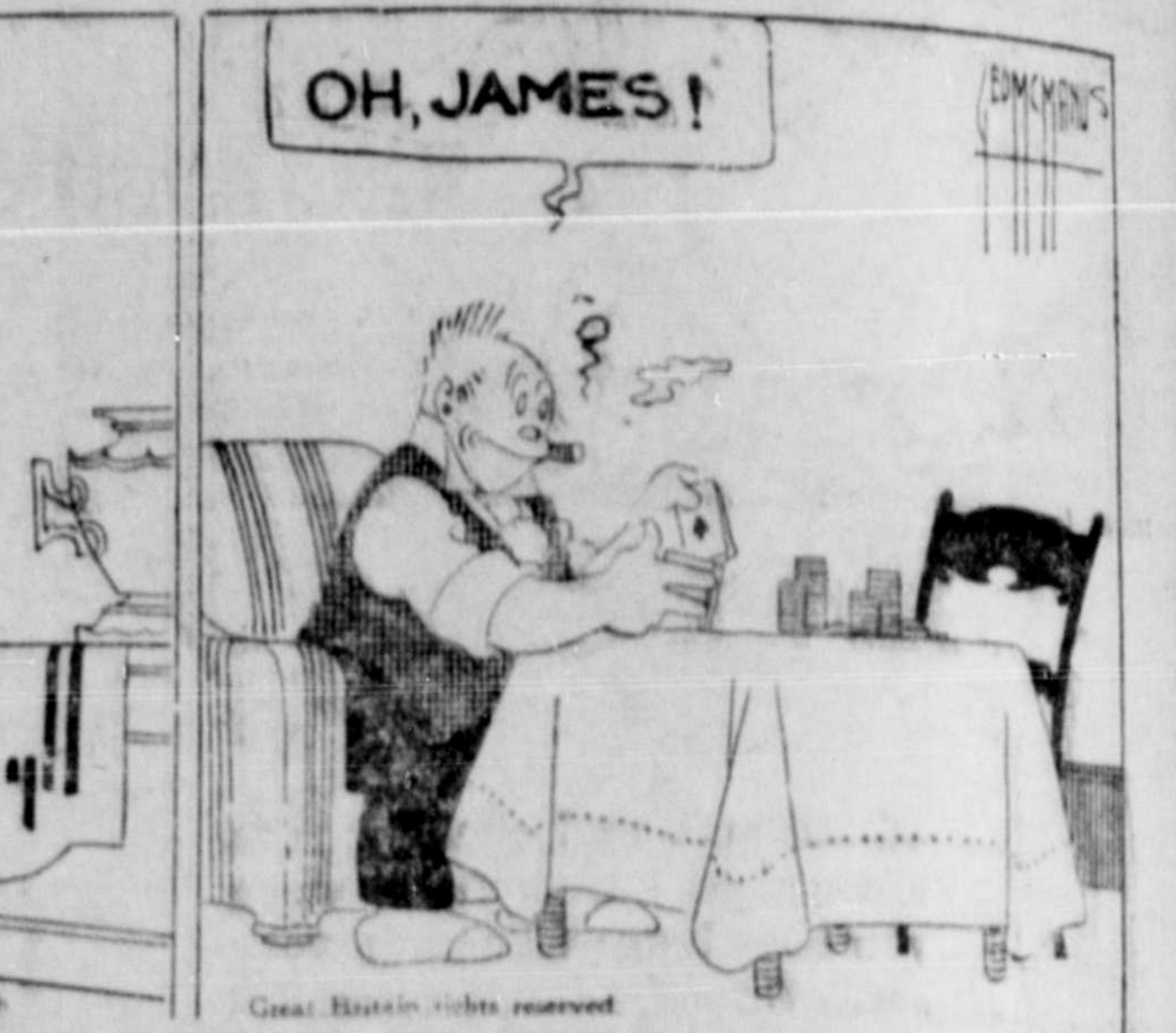

## CURE HERRING AT SEAL COVE

Millard Cannery Starting Operations at Once; Men Being Employed There

Herring curing operations are starting immediately at the Seal Cove cannery stated Francis Millard, owner of the plant, who returned to the city yesterday afternoon on the Prince Rupert after having spent several weeks in the south. Mr. Millard brought with him several men and the full crew will be made up here to start work at once.

Mr. Millard denied the report that he was to take over and operate the Prince Rupert cannery of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. this year.

### Sees Discrimination

Mr. Millard is very uncertain as to what his future activities at this port will be and he stated this morning that he was seriously considering withdrawing from here altogether. He changes "discrimination of the rankest kind" against himself in the matter of Japanese salmon fishing licenses and states that it has been impossible for him to obtain such licenses while at the same time the department has decided this year not to further reduce the Japanese licenses to other plants. Mr. Millard declares that, when he decided to come here last year and acquired the plant at Seal Cove, he saw great prospects for the development of the fisheries here not only in salmon canning, which industry now has about reached its peak, but also in the curing of herring and canning of clams, etc. The next thing should be the development of fruit canning with establishment of can and box factories, etc., here. The Australian preferential treaty further should act as an encouragement to production on this coast but Mr. Millard states that, as far as Prince Rupert, which should be a centre of such development, is concerned, southern interests are endeavoring to put every possible obstacle in the way and are being assisted in that attempt by the governmental authorities. The situation has become such that further development here is stifled.

### At Alert Bay

Mr. Millard announces that he is building a new cannery near Alert Bay where the floating cannery Laurel Whalen is at present. He also states it was himself and not the Gosse-Miller Co., as stated in Tuesday's despatches, that had purchased the Sechart whaling station. It is his intention to replace the whaling station there with a fish meal plant.

Mr. Millard will proceed to the Queen Charlotte Islands on Saturday night.

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SIR GUY GAUNT ON SINGAPORE

Thinks Establishment of Base no Menace to Other Nations But Coaling Station

HAS SCHOONER YACHT Will Cruise up Coast Soon in British Columbia Waters

VICTORIA, March 3. — No menace to other nations is implied by the Singapore naval base project, in the opinion of Rear-Admiral Sir Guy Gaunt, K.C.M.G., C.B., C.M.G., M.P., who is now engaged in supervising of his four-masted schooner yacht, the Four Winds, at Esquimalt, preparatory to cruising the waters of the British Columbia coast and, subsequently, the world's seven seas.

Other nations need not interpret the establishment of a base at Singapore for the British Navy as a gesture of belligerence, according to Sir Guy, who observed that Hong Kong is situated at the very threshold of China and is about 1,500 miles closer to Japan.

Singapore, he pointed out to The Colonist, is the gateway to the markets of the East, markets whose richness, in the opinion of many experts, is fast shifting the centre of the world's trade from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

Should there "be trouble" in, say, the China Sea, the nearest adequate base for the British Navy would be Malta, many long days' steaming away from the scene of the warfare.

On the voyage from Malta to the China Sea, a fleet would find an intermediate fueling and outfitting base an absolute necessity.

Once arrived in the Far East and operating under conditions of warfare there, the fleet similarly would need a strongly fortified base for refitting and fueling. Singapore, Sir Guy says, is the logical place for such a base, and without it, the Empire's eastern trade routes can never be adequately protected.

Sir Guy touched briefly on the advertising value to the Empire of a naval base at Singapore, and indicated the extent to which it would enhance British prestige in Asia. It would be "a great shop window" in the market of the East, he said.

As a Conservative member of the House of Commons for the Buckrose Division of Yorkshire, Sir Guy has been one of the leaders in the fight for an appropriation to establish the Singapore base. His eminence as a naval officer, and his wide experience in the waters of the East constitute him an authority on this question.

Because of the distance at which it would have to operate from its base, an Asiatic fleet would find the utmost difficulty in attacking the North American Pacific littoral, Sir Guy thinks. Aircraft and aircraft carriers would not, at their present stage of development, render such an offensive against this coast appreciably easier.

The distinguished admiral does not, however, minimize the importance of aircraft in the general scheme of war. The time is not far distant, he says, when the admiral of the fleet and the commander of the army will both take to the air to direct the operations of their commands.

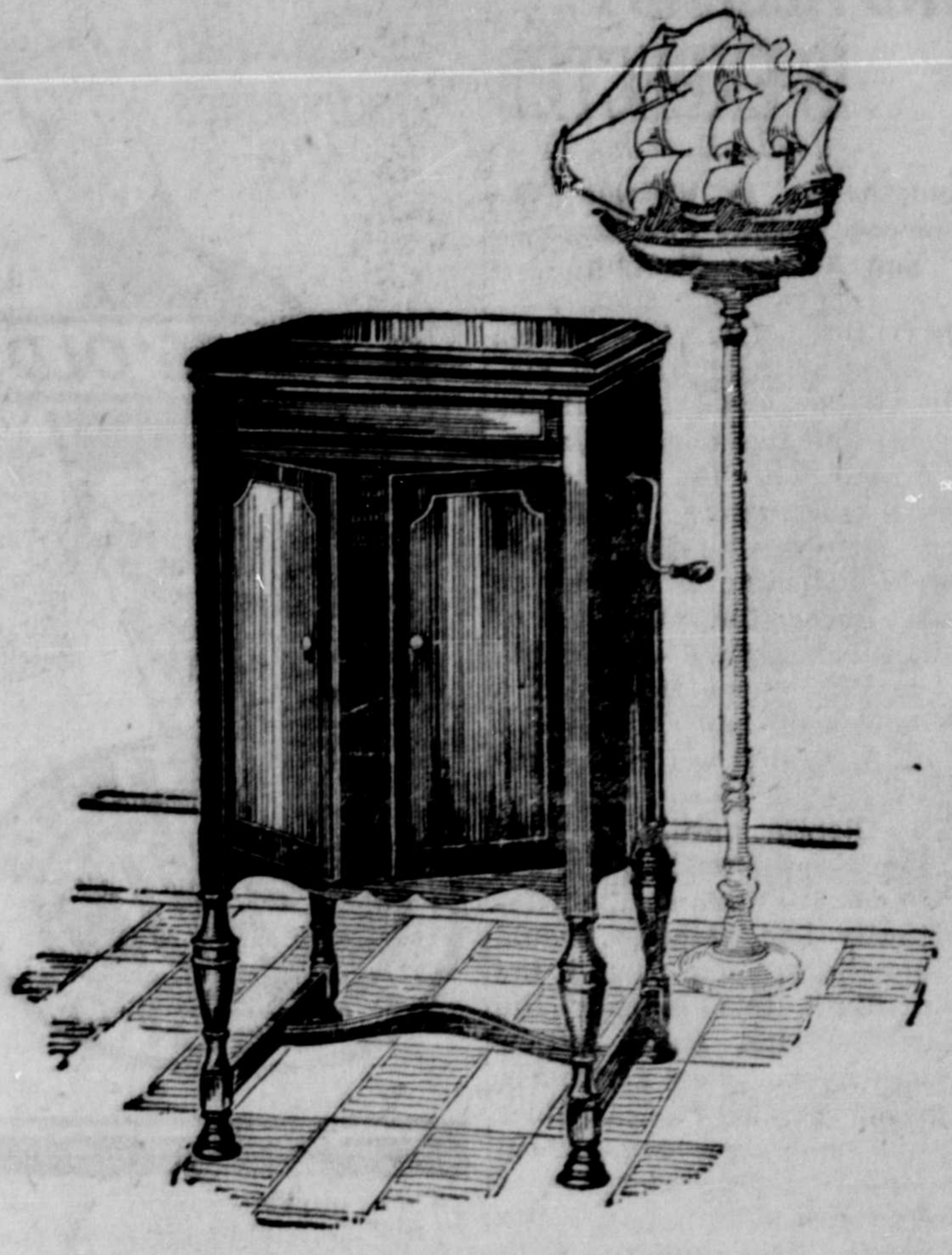
But talk of the aeroplane having supplanted the battleship, or the soldier, is just so much "tripe" at this stage of the game, he says.

And here, again, Sir Guy is well qualified to speak. His opinion is not that of one who has never flown. When aeroplanes were first developed to a

point where their military possibilities became apparent, he made frequent flights. Not because he liked flying, he explains, but because it was his business to know aeroplanes and the uses to which they could be put in war.

After his retirement from the navy, Sir Guy plunged into politics with the same energy and determination that marked his career as a sailor. He was elected in 1922 and has represented his constituency ever since. Last year his health gave way under the burden of his duties and he was ordered by physicians to seek complete surcease from his work.

His travels, since have brought him to Victoria. Last September he bought the Four Winds in Seattle, just after the schooner

# DOLLY VARDEN MINE LEASED

Company Expected to Operate It  
Has Victor Spencer on Directorate

The Mining & Engineering Record, a Vancouver publication, whose editor E. A. Haggen, is usually well informed on mining developments, says in its last issue that the famous Dolly Varden mine at Alice Arm has been leased by a company of which Col. Victor Spencer, well known Vancouver business man, is a director. On the strength of this announcement, Alice Arm people are hopeful that this year may see a resumption of operation on the mine and railway on the latter of which mining development in the Kitsault River district to a large extent depends.

Commenting generally on the Dolly Varden mine, the Mining & Engineering Record says: "The Dolly Varden, which has lain idle for some years, was a wonderfully rich mine, which produced 1,170,000 oz. of silver during its life. Values ran as high as 24 1/2 oz. per ton. The property is well equipped with mining plant, hydro-electric power, tramway and a splendid camp. There seems to be disagreement among engineers as to whether or not the mine is worked out. The high grade ore is evidently cleaned up as far as located and the question now is whether sufficient values can be obtained in the low grade to justify operation."

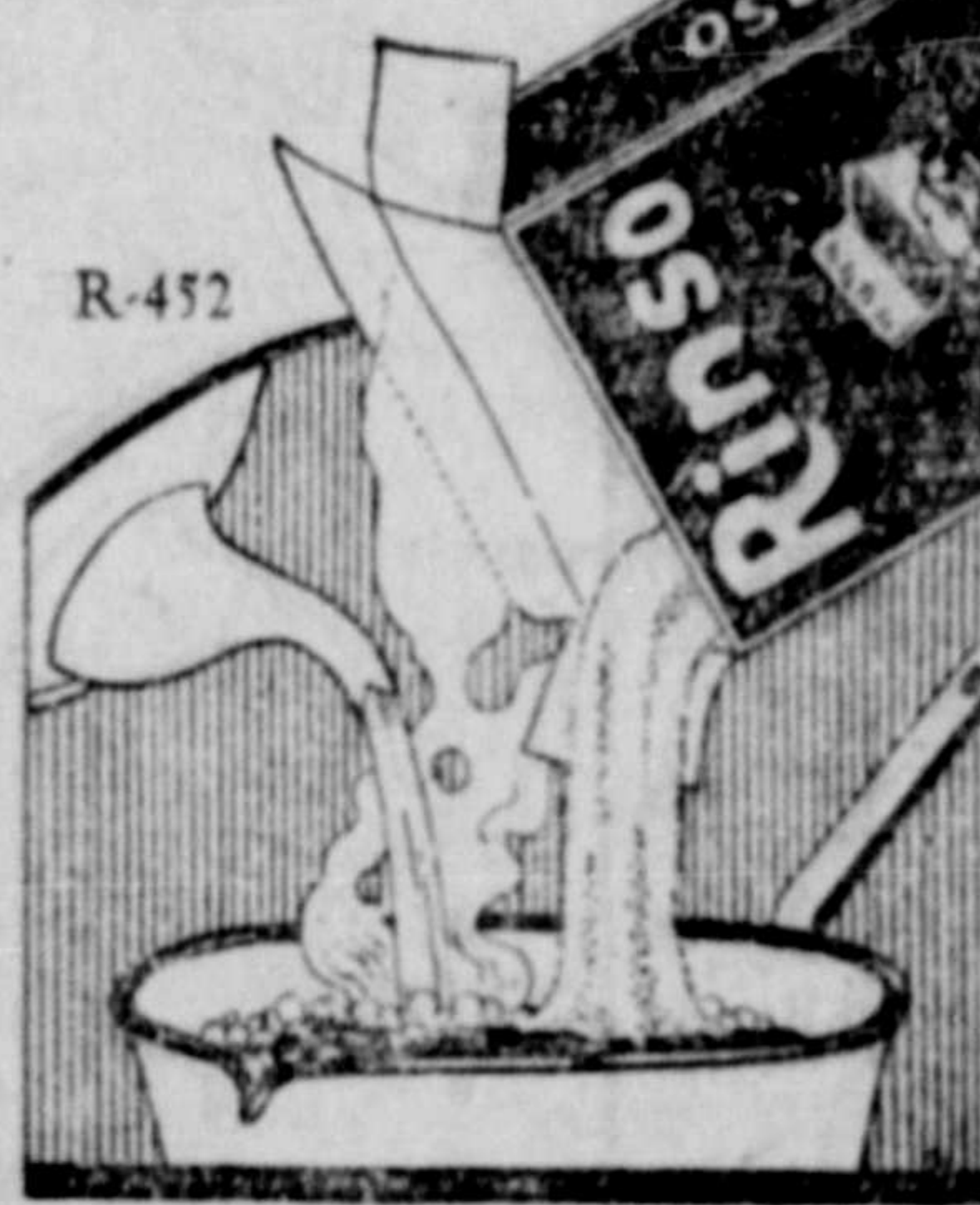
