WESTERN PORTS NOT GETTING THEIR SHARE

VANCOUVER SUN SAYS SOMETHING RADICALLY WRONG WITH GRAIN TRADE OF CANADA

(Vancouver Sun)

That something is radically wrong in the grain trade of Canada is the contention of Vancouver observers familiar with the situation.

Although the western grain route through Vancouver has been proved beyond doubt to be a feasible and economical outlet for the grain crop of Alberta and a large part of Saskatchewan, it has handled so far this year only 7,000,000 bushels of grain or about half the amount shipped at this time

Canada's grain trade, it is pointed out, continues to function on the assumption that there is only one channel of exit for grain and when that is topped the grain movement in Canada must stop.



COAL TENDERS

CITY COUNCIL ENGAGES IN SOME SCIENTIFIC STUDY ON MATTER

The city will purchase 500 long tons of steam coal from Albert & McCaffery for use at the auxiliary plant at the dry dock. This was decided by the council last night on an amendment of Alderman Casey to a motion moved by Alderman Brown that the tender be awarded to Philpott-Evitt Co.

Alderman Brown explained that the Clocks, Brushes, Trays, utilities committee had cancelled the former order with Philpott-Evitt as it was felt that the coal supplied was not up to the specification called for. He explained that it was decided to again call for tenders for 500 tons and Philpott-Evitt Co. had tendered at \$6.72, and Albert & McCaffery \$7.50. The tender of the Prince Rupert Coal Co. was not considered as the class of coal tendered on was not suitable. The tenders of Albert & McCaffery and Philpott-Evitt Co. were then considered as it appeared that, while there was a great discrepancy in price, still there was a difference in the grade of coal. Alderman Brown explained that under the stardard of British thermo units there was a difference in the price of the coal of seven sents per long ton in favor of Philpott-Evitt coal. The coal which they supplied contained 12,600 B.T.U.'s per pound while the coal of Gent's All Wool Sox, per Albert & McCaffery contained 13,930 B.T.U.'s per pound.
