The government diverted onethird of the tax collected to municipalities and the balance has been used for social service benefits, mainly to old age pensioners.

In simple terms of difficulty as a cutting operation, carrying out timber clearance of the area in question is the extreme opposite of mowing a lawn. In many parts the country is rugged, precipitous and inaccessible: Rocky outcrops have shouldered aside the soil on which the timber feeds. The very features that make the park beautiful will present the greatest obstacles to keeping it that way.

The fact remains, however, that resignation in face of the task would be a tragedy much greater in size than the dimensions of the task itself. The two rich rewards to be gained are thousands of feet of marketable timber and the creation of a beauty spot in British Columbia which would undoubtedly become a magnet for travellers from all parts of the province.

To a certain extent, pursuit of the first reward would lead to the second as the way to both is over cleared fields of timber. Yet it must be accepted that it may, and probably will, be commercially impractical to cut every foot of good timber, and no attempt should be made to do so if it threatens to impede the entire scheme.

In the long run, formation of a spacious lake with a clean shoreline unblemished by a half-sunk forest is the more important consideration and, if there is some valuable timber on its future bed Contemplation of the work must start from At the same time, Alcan's record gives no rea-This is the point at which the provincial governpoint because, in the entire history of the case, no concentrated effort has been made to determine how the work might be done, or for how much. It is encouraging to learn, therefore, that Mr. Sommers and his deputy minister will visit the area personally next month to make their own study of the matter. This by itself, of course, will not be enoug'i. Forestry experts and engineers will have to be called on for professional advice. But it is a good start and raises the reassuring thought
