STEAMER CAPSIZED GRAY'S HARBOR BAR

STOCK EXCHANGE GAMBLERS ARE BATTLING FOR ADVANTAGE IN NEW YORK

Steamer Went Ashore on Gray's Harbor Bar Then Turned on Side

HOQUIAM, Wash., March 5.—The Japanese steamer Horikasa Maru, commanded by Captain T. Ho of the Mitsui line, capsized on Gray's Harbor bar late yesterday afternoon after having gone ashore on the north side of the entrance to Gray's Harbor.

The vessel headed to sea with a cargo of 3,000,000 feet of lumber, 500 tons of flour, and 2,000 tons of wheat loaded at Vancouver. All the 48 men on board were saved. The crew and Pilot Charles Hansen were thrown into the water when the ship turned on its side as the tide receded, but they were picked up by a cutter from the Westport coastguard station and put on tugs which were sent to assist the steamer.

The vessel is valued at about \$100,000 and the cargo at \$250,000.

TELLS OF GOLD IN HOT VALLEY

VERY RICH IN MINERAL

SEATTLE, Mar. 5.—Sam Scott, a prospector, told the Seattle Mining club of the tropical valley, which he reported discovering four years ago in Northern British Columbia. It contained vast riches including oil, gold, silver, lead, platinum and asphalt. He said one creek patterned \$7,700 in gold in twelve days.

STEWART MAN IN ACCIDENT

Car Went Through Bridge at Koksilah on Vancouver Island, Injuring Passengers

VICTORIA, March 5.—H. J. Thomey of Stewart, B.C., and Miss K. McLeod were injured when the automobile in which they were travelling to Duncan yesterday afternoon plunged through the Koksilah River bridge into the stream below. Three Indians who heard the crash rescued the victims and took them unconscious to the Duncan Hospital.

TWO MILLION FOR VESSELS

American Steamship Company Awarded Claims for Losses in War

SEATTLE, Mar. 5.—The American-Hawaiian Steamship Company announced today that it had been awarded claims aggregating \$2,050,000 by mixed claims for losses on five freighters sunk during the world war by German submarines.

WOMAN DIED RESULT FIRE

PORT ARTHUR, Mar. 5.—Mrs. Mike Hotchkowski died in the hospital yesterday as the result of burns received in the early morning in a fire which destroyed their home. The three-year-old daughter, one of two children she heroically rescued is in a serious condition.

CANADA MAKES GOOD PROGRESS

Canadians who are disposed to lament the slow progress that the country has been making in growth of population and wealth production may with profit ponder some figures recently published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Taking the dates 1901 and 1925, it is shown that during this period:

Canada's population has increased by 4,600,000, or 72 per cent.

Her wheat production has increased from 55 to 416 million bushels.

Her field crops are worth \$1,159,000,000, instead of \$195,000,000.

Her gold production has increased from 1,167,000 oz. to 1,730,000 oz.; silver from 8,173,000 oz. to 19,191,000 oz.; nickel, from 9,189,000 lbs. to 73,150,000 lbs.; copper, from 37,827,000 lbs. to 112,526,000 lbs.

Her coal production has increased from 6,185,000 tons to 13,922,000 tons; her cement production from 459,000 bbls. to 7,499,000 bbls.

Her mineral production has increased in value from \$66,000,000 to \$228,000,000.

The gross value of her manufacturing production approaches \$2,700,000,000 instead of \$181,000,000.

Her railways carry 106,000,000 tons of freight where they carried only 37,000,000 in 1901.

Her bank deposits range in the neighborhood of \$1,800,000,000 instead of being only \$317,000,000.

Autonomy in Egypt and Palestine Should Prove Complete Success Says Viscount Allenby Today

VICTORIA, March 5.—Viscount Allenby, the famous British Field Marshall, who led the allied forces in the Near East during the great war, accompanied by Lady Allenby, arrived this morning on the steamer Aorangi from Australia. "The world expects reforms to unroll almost with the rapidity of a motion picture machine," said the Viscount, in reply to a question with regard to the future of those countries with which his military and administrative career is identified, notably Egypt and Palestine. He said he believed to grant autonomy to those countries would prove completely successful.

ELEVATOR FOR PORT MANN IS NOW PLANNED

Gillespie's to Lease Plant to be Erected by New Westminster Is Reported

That the Gillespie Grain company plans to lease a \$600,000 grain elevator that will be erected by the harbor authorities of New Westminster on a site at Port Mann, is reported here. Local officials of the company, however, say they have no information about the matter while John Gillespie, head of the concern, is now absent at the coast and may not return for some time says the Edmonton Journal.

It is understood that the plant will be erected just west of Port Mann. On completion it is to be turned over to the Gillespie grain interests, who undertake to pay a rental sufficient to take care of interest and sinking fund on the total investment.

Plans for a 600,000 bushel elevator together with a request that authority, formerly given to issue bonds for \$500,000 for construction purposes, be increased to \$700,000, have been forwarded to Ottawa by the harbor board. As the requirements laid down by the department of marine have been fully met, it is confidently expected that the necessary order to proceed will be promptly forthcoming from the department.

The Gillespie company has two big terminal elevators at Fort William leased to the interprovincial wheat pool for three years. In view of the development of the western grain route it has been rumored for some time that the company has been on the lookout for satisfactory facilities at the coast.

CALGARY OIL BOOM IS ON

Brokers Doing Wonderful Business all this Week Result of New Well

CALGARY, Mar. 5.—As a result of the bringing in of the new oil well near McLeod, there is a veritable oil boom on here just now. Brokers are doing a great business in oil shares, oil leases, real estate and everything that has to do directly or indirectly with the business of oil producing. It is reported that a number more wells are likely to become producers within a short time and the number, according to report, increases every day. Shares in oil companies have bounded upward.

Another Battle Royal on New York Stock Exchange Drives Prices Down After Recovery

NEW YORK, March 5.—Another battle between opposing speculative forces developed on today's stock market. After prices had been marked up from one to nine points in the first half hour after the exchange opened on the execution of a large volume of buying orders, presumably attracted by yesterday's brisk recovery, the bear traders launched a series of savage attacks against industrial issues, forcing declines as much as eight points.

VANCOUVER, March 5.—Quotations on the local stock exchange show a general decline in sympathy with the bearish attitude on the New York market. Portland Canal and other stocks are generally lower than last week.

ROBBERS SECURE BIG PAYROLL OF HARVESTER COMPANY

CHICAGO, March 5.—Robbers this morning seized an eighty thousand dollar payroll of the international Harvester Company and got away with it.

PROHIBITIONISTS ARE ACTIVE IN ALBERTA

Asking for Plebiscite with View to Eliminating Beer Parlors From Province

EDMONTON, Mar. 5.—Ardent prohibitionists are shaking a mailed fist at the members of the Legislature. All the members have been circularized in respect to the Prohibition association's petition to the government to have a plebiscite taken at the forthcoming general elections, the circular stating that such action would "eliminate the matter completely from politics."

Then comes the veiled threat. "Providing that the question is not submitted at the election, it will be impossible to keep it out of the campaign, as many of our friends in all parts of the province are so intent on getting rid of the beer halls that every candidate will be questioned as to his stand on the matter. It is, of course, for the government to judge and decide" recites the circular, which has been received with mixed feelings by the members.

CUSTOMS RETURNS

Collections For February Showed Little Variation From Figures For Previous Years

Customs and excise collections at this port during the month of February totalled \$32,033.39 showing little variation from the same month in previous years. Last year the collections for February totalled \$34,617.62 while in the same month in 1924 the total was \$33,532.

FRUIT GROWERS MAKE PROTEST

President Says Horticultural Council Ignored in Australian Trade Treaty

OTTAWA, March 5.—Complaint that the Canadian horticultural council was totally ignored despite its request to the Government to be consulted before anything concerning horticultural interests be included in the Australian treaty, was voiced in the presidential address of L. E. Taylor of Kelowna at the opening session of the fourth annual conference yesterday afternoon.

The president reported that the organization of the Canadian fruit distributors since the last meeting "though operating on a rather small scale" had been successful. It was expected at least \$15,000 would be refunded to the members.

FAMILY LOST ON LAKE ERIE

Were Crossing Lake in Automobile and Have Not Since Been Seen

LEAMINGTON, Ont., Mar. 5.—James Phipps, his wife and three children are believed to have been drowned on Lake Erie when an auto used in crossing the ice from Pelee Island to the mainland broke through. The party has been missing since Monday. An airplane and more than 200 persons are engaged in a search for the missing people but so far without success.

UP FOR TRIAL MURDER CHARGE

Two Men Alexander Andersen and Harry B. Howard Committed this Morning

VANCOUVER, Mar. 5.—Alexander Andersen and Harry B. Howard, accused of murdering John Bogres in a confectionery store here on February 14, were today sent up for trial.

Walter A. Adams and his son Reginald, who chased the two men after the shooting, refused to swear positively that accused were the same men.

RADIO PIONEER AT VICTORIA PASSES

VICTORIA, March 5.—Kenneth George Moffat, 39 years of age, radio pioneer, died last night. He served during the war with the Royal Air Force as a wireless instructor.

They continue to buy and the advancing prices encourage them to think the prices may go higher yet. Then when the buying gets beyond control, something happens and it usually happens quickly. There is a break and within a few hours fortunes have disappeared, business houses are ruined and suffering and sometimes suicides follow. All this is because of the desire to make money by gambling.

Selling To Minors Has Been Punished.

Selling beer to boys has been justly punished by the authorities at Vancouver. There are laws passed regulating the selling of beer and in the southern city they have failed to live up to it. The result is that three hotels lost the right to sell. There has to be protection for young lads against the actions of those who would make money from them before they are old enough to take care of themselves. The Attorney General is to be congratulated on the prompt action that has been taken.

MAYOR TELLS ABOUT RUPERT

Report of His Speech as Reported in Vancouver Province

Reporting the proceedings on Tuesday at the Western Canada Unity and Development League convention, at which Mayor Newton is the Prince Rupert delegate to the Vancouver Province said:

Mayor S. M. Newton of Prince Rupert made an eloquent plea for the development of the grain route through his city. It was an open port the year round. Vancouver had a start and could paddle its own canoe and while leaders here were not selfish there was a tendency on the part of some people to "hog it all." As far as New Westminster was concerned, that city was practically Vancouver and he predicted that one day they would be one city.

The speaker denied that the elevator at Prince Rupert had been built for political ends.

While he was of a different political stripe from the present government he did not think it possible it would have spent \$1,250,000 on an elevator from political motives. That would give the government a black eye. True no grain had moved through the elevator yet but after talking with Mr. Robinson he felt hopeful that grain would soon be moving that way.

Other advantages of Prince Rupert harbor were freedom from fog, no dredging necessary and a big drydock and ship plant to serve shipping.

Mayor Hardie of Lethbridge expressed the opinion that there was some politics in placing the elevator at Prince Rupert, which was 200 miles farther away from the grain section than Vancouver.

In reply, Mayor Newton stated that the railways granted the same rate on grain to Prince Rupert as to Vancouver, and the difference in mileage was made up by the lack of grades between Jasper and Prince Rupert. These were more favorable for economic operation than the grades between Jasper and Vancouver.

CANNERY STAFFS ON STEAMER ARRIVING FROM SOUTH TODAY

Having had on board some 100 members of Naas and Skeena River cannery staffs forming advance crews to make preparations for the season's operations, the Union steamer Cardena, Capt. J. A. Findlay, arrived in port from the south at 9:30 this morning and sailed at 10:30 for the Naas River. The crews were principally for Claxton, North Pacific, Naas Harbor and Mill Bay canneries. The vessel made her calls in the Skeena before arriving here.

The steamer Catala will be back on the cannery run next week following annual overhaul at Vancouver and the Cardena will then return to her regular Prince Rupert - Anyox - Stewart service on which the Camosun has been relieving for the past month. The Camosun will be making her last trip in this service at the end of this week.

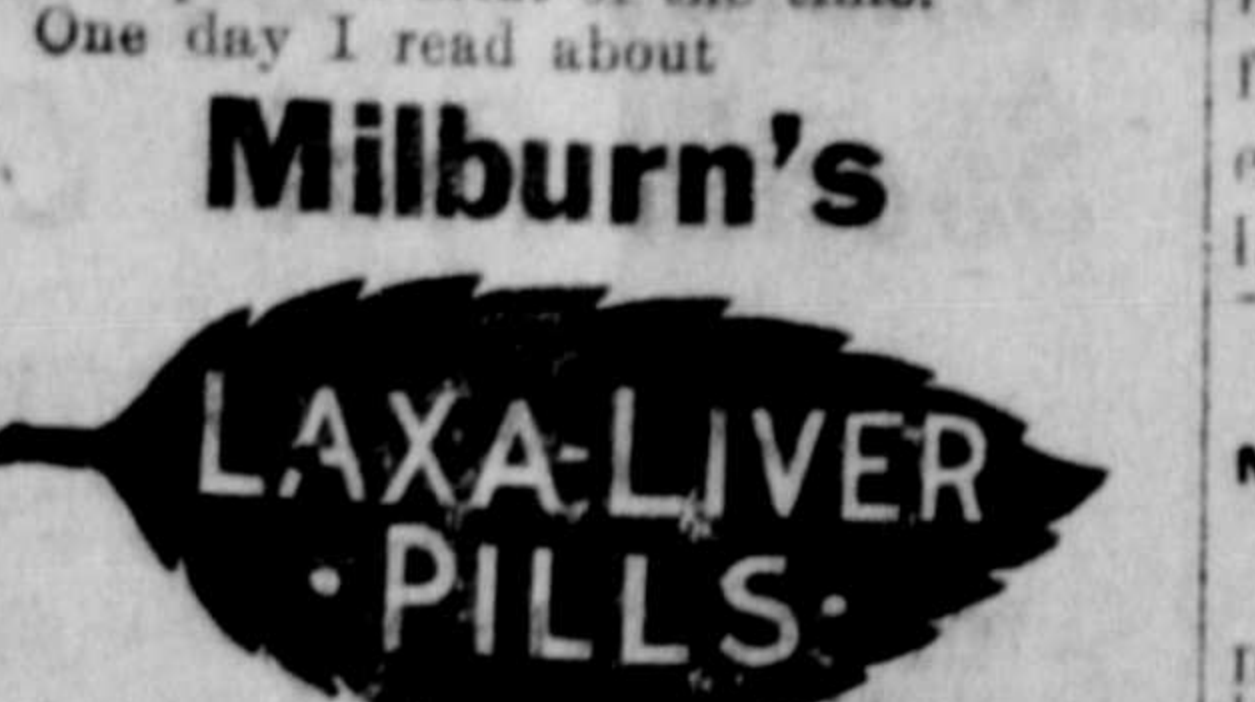

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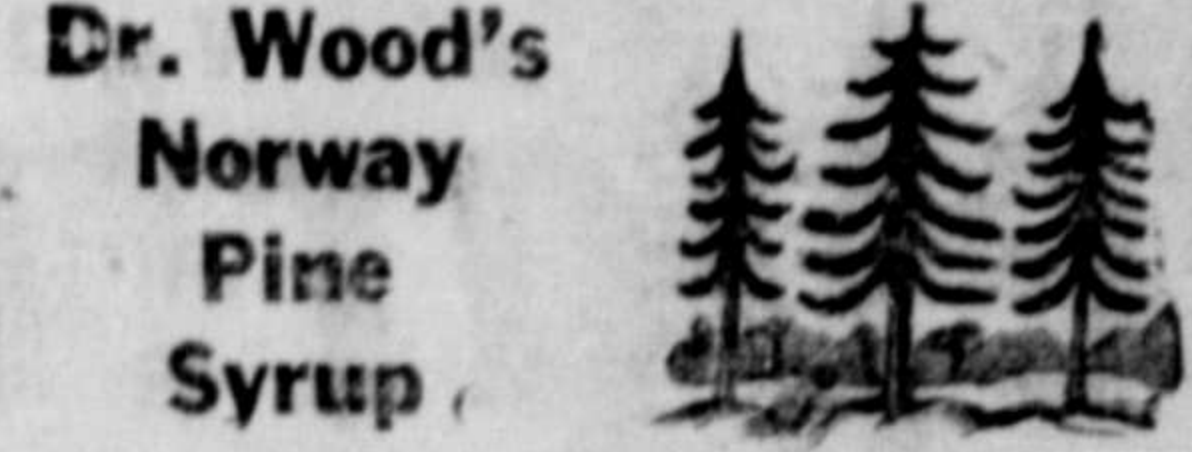

NEW HAZELTON MINE OUTLOOK

District Around that Point Gives Promise of Activity this Season

(Omineca Herald)
There will be considerable activity in mining circles close to New Hazelton this year. One of the chief operators will be the Northern Prospecting and Development Co. of which W. S. and Al. Harris are the moving spirits. W. S. Harris is looking after the northern field and he reports to the Herald that his company will be very active. They are ready to examine any prospect and to deal with any that have merit. During the last couple of months he succeeded in putting the company in good shape financially.

Four Mile Mountain

In regard to local operations Mr. Harris is preparing to start on the Mohawk claim on Four Mile mountain and to get that in the shipping class as soon as possible. A couple of men will be sent out there in a few days.

The Silver Cup will be operated as soon as men can get there. The Cup will ship several cars of ore this year. From fifty tons sent to the smelter last season a net return of \$3,990 was received. A car a month is what the company aims at this year.

A contract for extending the tunnel another two hundred feet on the Sunrise will be let and the work should get under way very shortly. When this work is completed it is expected that connection will have been made with the vein at a good depth.

Hazelton View

Work on the Hazelton View is also arranged for. There are 25 tons of ore now ready to ship and plans for the season should develop several cars more of that very rich ore.

In addition to the work outlined above Mr. Harris has some new things under way, and he reports that a good many mining men are coming in to look things over.

N. Schager of Southport Harbor is securing a Ford Truck from Prince Rupert which he will use for carrying passengers and freight between Skidegate and Tlell.

The village band at Skidegate is preparing to meet the salmon buyers when they come. A big run of fish is expected this year.

Huckleberries and salmonberries are in bloom here and everything points to an early spring. Bees are out and robins are here almost two months ahead of their usual time.

Mr. Miller, who is to have charge of the roadwork on the new government road between Skidegate and Queen Charlotte City, reached Skidegate Saturday with his crew.

FRENCH BIRTH RATE RISING

Both German and British Falling Rapidly and British Lower Than French

LONDON, Mar. 5.—Now that the British birth rate has fallen well below the French and is lower than that of any other great country, the French Minister of Health has been moved to publish a series of population statistics reassuring to French public opinion.

France is the only great nation with a birth rate that is actually rising—in 1913 191 births per 10,000 of the population and in 1924 192. The German birth rate in the same period has fallen from 276 to 204, the British from 241 to 188. The increase in the French birth rate is shown not so particularly in Catholic regions as, curiously, in the departments ravaged by the German invasion.

Nor is France in so bad a position as is generally thought in respect of infantile mortality. The death rate of babies less than one year old was, twenty-five years ago, 170 per 1,000 babies born alive; in 1924 it was only 85, and is still rapidly falling. The figure 85 is still behind that of England, where the rate of infantile mortality is 75, but it is far ahead of Germany's 108, Austria's 139, and Rumania's 207.

The reproach against France as a country of few babies and a high death rate amongst those few in short does not hold good. Great Britain has a lower natality and Germany a higher infantile mortality. Add to these statistics that France has a larger immigration than any other country except America and it will be seen how empty is the legend that France is a country doomed to fall into the second rank by reason of diminishing population.

BRIDE WAS DESERTED AT THE ALTAR WHEN SUBSTITUTE APPEARED

Curious Arrangement by Which Wedding Was Able to Take Place

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Mar. 5.—A strange story of a bride deserted at the altar only to be proposed to on the spot by a guest she had met but two weeks before has become known with the marriage of Alene G. Best, 17, to William H. Doolin, 19 year old army clerk.

Mrs. Doolin, the only white girl known to have been confirmed in a Negro church, was married by the Rt. Rev. Arthur S. Trotman, in St. Luke's African Orthodox Church, in the presence of a mixed company. Doolin is white, as was John J. Halligan, 21, Mrs. Doolin's first fiance.

Mrs. William Best, mother of the bride whose husband is janitor of the church, told reporters the story. Bishop Trotman, the choir, and numerous acquaintances were assembled in the church on January 17, waiting for Halligan. Time passed, the bishop grew impatient, the bride nervous and the mother tearful.

Finally, just as hope was abandoned, Doolin, a boarder in the Best household, and a guest at the ceremony, stepped forward and offered to substitute. Mrs. Best stopped crying. "Go see the Bishop," she said she told the youth. The Bishop was willing but pointed out the legal delay required and so the wedding cake was put away. Several days later Halligan appeared, but, according to Mrs. Best, could give no reason for his absence and Miss Best declined to change her mind.

Now the ceremony has been performed, and this time neither bride nor bishop was kept waiting. "We're all happy," Mrs. Best beamed as photographers snapped pictures of the couple. Doolin smiled in confirmation. Mrs. Doolin toyed with her bridal veil but said nothing.
