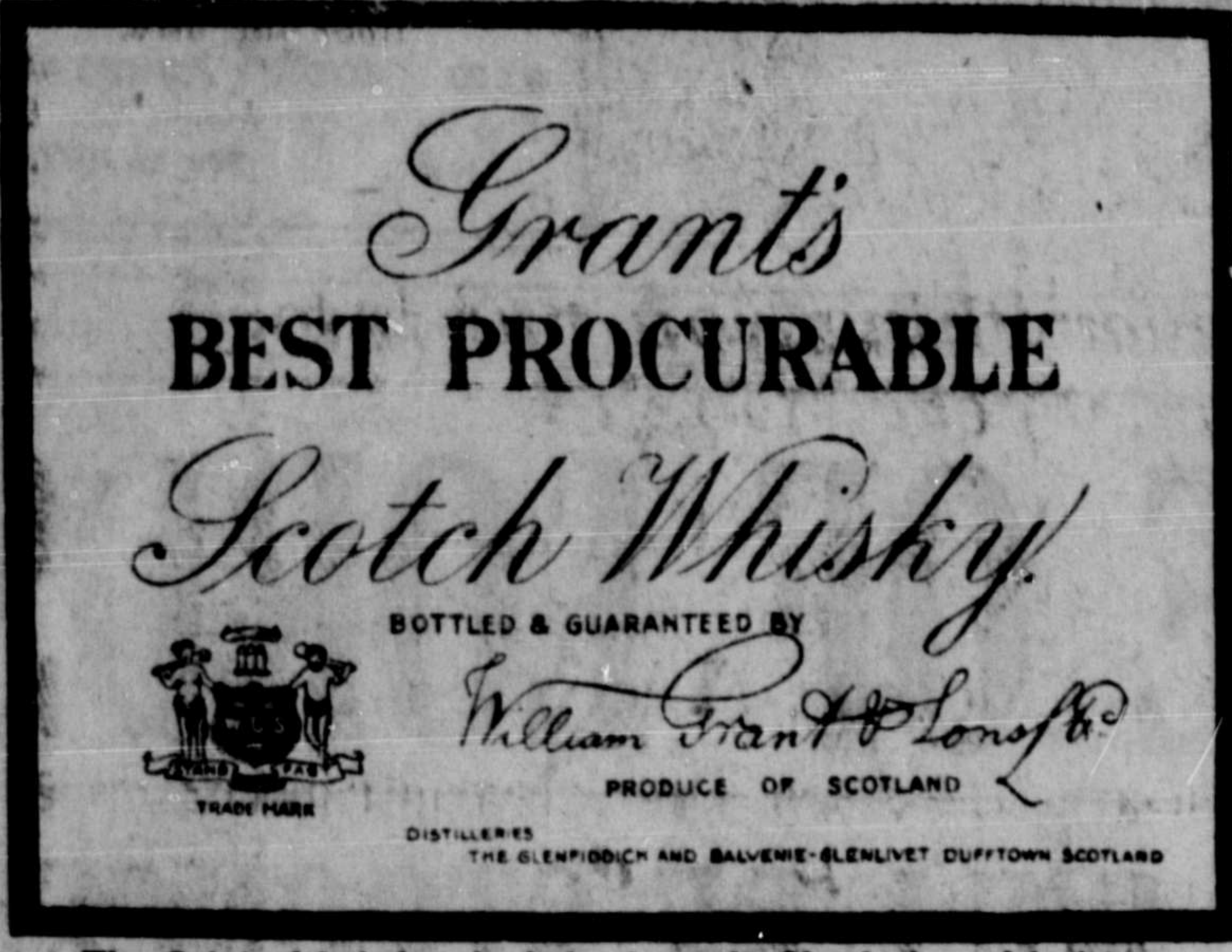

King's Position in the Country.

Everyone seems to be discussing the constitutional question today and we have been asked to outline as briefly as possible our views in regard to it, in view of the claim made that Mackenzie King had no right to a dissolution. After the last election, Premier King stated that he would meet the House and let the members decide his course of action. This was quite in accordance with constitutional practice. He did so and secured a majority, not a large one, but enough to enable him to carry on. His Government secured the support of the House and carried ten important divisions without once being defeated.

Then troubles arose. Two votes taken on matters initiated by private members were taken as a moral reverse and two courses lay ahead. One was to again appeal to the country in order to end the deadlock, the other to resign and let Mr. Meighen try. The premier knew then as well as he knows today that Mr. Meighen could not carry on the Government satisfactorily and the quickest way to end the unsatisfactory state of affairs was to again go to the country. He so advised the Governor, but his advice was not taken. Mr. King's only course was to resign in protest.

The Governor then called in Mr. Meighen and asked him to form a Government. He accepted the duty but did not carry it out. Instead he appointed a provisional cabinet in a wholly unconstitutional manner and proposed to carry on. For doing so he was censured by Parliament and should have resigned. If it was not right for Mackenzie King to go to the country it was not right for Arthur Meighen.

What Liberals allege is that the Governor has allowed his sympathies to run away with his judgment in refusing the treatment to the Liberal leader which he afterwards granted to the Conservative leader.

It will be for the electors to decide this question. If they think the Governor was right in his attitude they will vote for the Conservative candidate in the coming election, but if they think he was wrong and there was discrimination they will so express themselves by voting for the Liberal candidate.

This will be the great question of the contest, undoubtedly, and it is much more important than many people think. On it hinges whether we are to have a constitutional government under which the Governor will act as a passive administrator or whether the powers of the Governor shall grow and develop along the line of present tendency toward autocracy.

Slight Backward Bend in Democracy.

This is an age of democracy, but just now there is a slight backward bend toward autocracy. This has been seen in Italy and in Poland. It is seen in the Soviet Government of Russia. It is a reaction consequent on war troubles and may possibly have been necessary in countries such as Italy and Poland. Not so here, however. This country is a democracy and it is hoped will remain one. We have done nothing to make necessary a return to middle age conditions. Gradually we are learning the lessons of Government. We make mistakes, but there is a steady forward movement with the object of making the conditions of all men better. This is the Liberal aim.

ROTARY FACTOR IN SETTLEMENT

Irish Troubles Ended Largely As Result of Work of Clubs There.

Dr. Ed. Rich, of Tacoma, who is making a trip to the Valley of the Thousand Smokes in Alaska, taking with him Dr. Charles Baker, international Rotary lecturer, declared at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday afternoon that the Irish question was settled largely through the instrumentality of the Rotary Clubs of Ireland.

The movement for peace was initiated by two clubs, one Protestant and the other Catholic, at Belfast and Cork, and they arranged for the calling of a conference and this conference appointed a committee to deal with it. Within two days peace was declared.

Mr. Rich said he had been a Rotarian for twelve years at Tacoma. He joined when the club was no larger than that at Prince Rupert and the attendance not as good. He urged them all to get the Rotary spirit, which was the best think he knew.

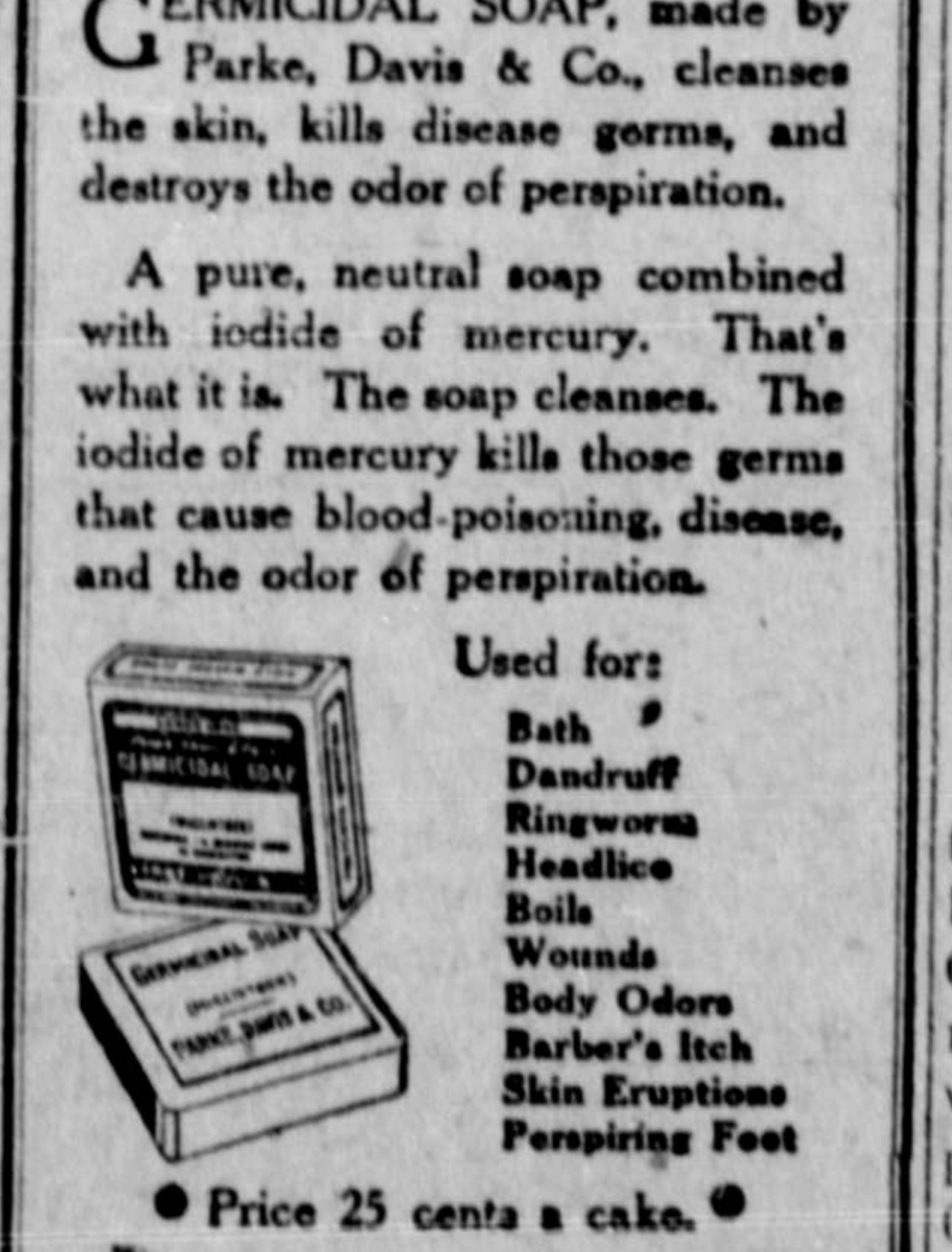
Olof Hanson and John Dybban came in on yesterday afternoon's train from Lake Kathiyo where their families are spending the vacation at their summer homes.

Meant Certain Death The problem of returning to his cabin immediately assumed very serious proportions. 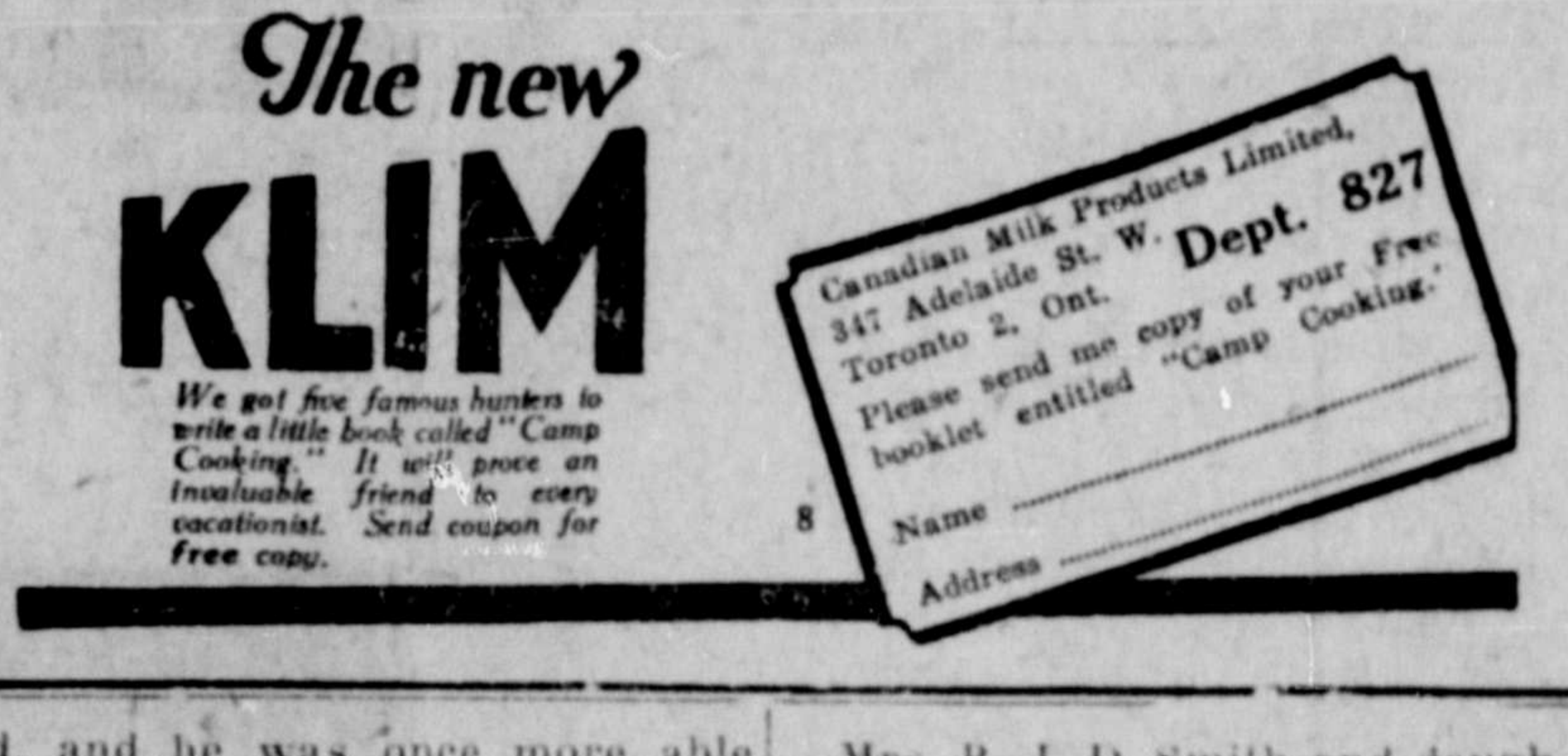
