WHOLESALE EXECUTION TURKISH PLOTTERS

HALIBUT BOAT DESTROYED BY FIRE OFF CAPE OMANEY BUT CREW ESCAPE

Halibut Schooner Was Burned at Sea and Her Crew Are at Ketchikan

KETCHIKAN, July 15.—The hardship and danger of the life of a fisherman was again well illustrated this week in the account of the burning at sea of the halibut schooner Gladys, the crew of which have arrived here. Rowing in an open dory for two days and two nights without shoes, coats or hats, Einer Rolie, Hans Birkland and L. Bogen were picked up Saturday off Cape Omaney and arrived here this week.

GOLD STRIKE IN CARIBOO

VANGOUVER, July 15.—A new gold strike has been made near Cedar Creek in the Cariboo district, according to word received from that settlement, which said about 400 ounces has just been brought from the scene of the find. The amount was recovered after a short sluice run despite the fact that a large number of men employed in the workings lately were engaged in fire fighting operations.

SALMON RUN ALASKA GOOD

CORDOVA, July 15.—It is estimated that the canneries of Prince William Sound have packed about 15,000 cases of humpback salmon more than they had at this date two years ago, when the fish were unusually plentiful.

While engaged in fishing for halibut shortly after noon on Thursday, the Gladys caught fire in some as yet undetermined manner. Unable to check the flames or save any of their personal effects the men threw the dory overboard. The dory drifted away from the flaming Gladys and the men had to swim for it to save their lives.

Eliminate Noise,
Get Down to Facts.

Much that is said amid the clatter of an election campaign is of little account, says the Manitoba Free Press. Issues are created that are not real issues, appeals are made to sentiment and to the emotions, personalities are praised or attacked, animosities are kindled, old scores are taken out and burnished for new use, statements are made that sound well but which have no basis in fact, rumors are circulated and given an added importance, there is a general hurrah in the grand scramble to get votes for one side or the other. Most of the noise made during an election campaign does not mean anything. It ceases with the election and a few days later the bulk of the electors are wondering how it was that they ever regarded these things as of importance.

Another general election campaign is coming on and if he listens to all he hears or does not make an attempt to analyze all he reads, the elector will be likely to find himself rather thoroughly confused and his decision at the ballot box controlled by some passing factor or fancy that has nothing to do with the real issues of the campaign.

Two Outstanding Matters of Policy.
There are two outstanding matters of policy that British Columbia people can agree upon. One of these is a steadily decreasing tariff wall, the breaking down of which has just been commenced by the Liberals in regard to automobiles. The other is to fight persistently and consistently for freight rates for British Columbia as low as for other parts of Canada. Neither of these are new policies but they are just as important as ever. They are matters on which we can all unite. We all want those things.

Here's What Vancouver Sun Says of Restriction.
As opposed to the principles of Liberalism, which call for a policy of trade and expansion, Mr. Meighen is again going to urge that Canada adopt his policy of restriction: Build a tariff wall around Canada; stop this; stop that, don't let this be done; don't let immigration come in; no truck nor trade with the Yankees; no agreements with Australia or West Indies, and all the rest of the isolationist performance.

Mr. Meighen's friends would be doing a great service to this public if it would show how Mr. Meighen's Eastern policy of restriction will build up a prosperous West—how it will build up a prosperous Vancouver.

Under a policy of restriction, a few privileged people in Eastern Canada might get rich, but the country gets poor. In 1911, the Tories came into power on the policy of restriction. What was the result? The day before the polls were closed, there was not a worker in Canada who could not go out and get a good job at high wages. Twelve months after the polls were closed and the country had voted against a policy of trade and expansion, they were opening up soup kitchens all over Canada, and except for a few Tories, who, during the war, got rich, the business of the country languished.

Coming into power in 1920-1921, the Liberals again set about a policy of expansion and trade.

A firm that ceases to think in terms of trade, cannot rush out with a new policy and get a big list of new customers. Trade connections and trade confidence are things that take a considerable time to develop and in a very short time can be destroyed.

During the past five years, trade agreements have been made with various countries. Perhaps some of these agreements are not very clever, but they are evidence of a policy of trade expansion and show that the country is heading in the right direction.

If the West and Vancouver are content to revert to a policy of restriction, Mr. Meighen's Eastern policy of restriction should be adopted.

But there can be no growth for Western Canada or Vancouver except under a policy of trade. If the West and Vancouver are to grow, that growth must come from a Liberal policy of expansion and trade.

**IS OPPOSED TO
INSTALMENTS**

Speaker at Convention Urges Curtailment of That Method of Doing Business.

VANCOUVER, July 15.—Excessive instalment buying is a menace and danger to unsecured creditors, such as wholesalers and retailers, and to the prosperity of business in general, declared Stanley Windle, of Regina, Sask., who today addressed the Dominion convention delegates of the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association on "Instalment Selling from the Wholesalers Viewpoint."

"I am not opposed to instalment buying, but I am opposed to it when it encourages an over-consumption of luxuries," said Mr. Windle.

Injure Nation
In his address, Mr. Windle appealed to the delegates to do "all in your power to stop the spread of instalment buying," which, in periods of depression and crop failures, would injure the nation.

Mr. Windle pointed out that the instalment selling has many supporters, particularly the automobile industry, but that business experts are opposed to this form of purchase. They declare it is impossible for the public to discount or mortgage future earnings for an indefinite period in advance, and that luxuries are often purchased instead of necessities. There is also the temptation to spend more than is earned.

Dakota Example
Continuing, Mr. Windle said: "In 1922, it is estimated that the entire income from wheat growing in North Dakota was barely sufficient to pay the cost of automobiles and their maintenance. Without desiring to earn for myself the reputation of being a visionary, I venture to state that a similar situation would occur in many localities in Canada if they should, unfortunately, suffer a crop failure. Reliable data on Canadian conditions is very hard to obtain, but one's observation is sufficient to convince us that there must be a huge sum outstanding and payable from the proceeds of the 1926 crop."

CAUGHT YOUNG SEAL WHEN FISHING NEAR VICTORIA IN SAANICH

VICTORIA, July 14. — Half a dozen young fishermen at Brentwood, in Saanich Arm, this week got the surprise of their young lives when they hooked a baby hair seal which had apparently got caught in grabbing a fish which the boys had previously hooked on their lines.

According to G. C. Grant, the baby seal weighed about fifty pounds. It was unable to free itself from the hook and, evidently disinclined to tear its mouth by snapping the line, it followed the boat until the boys pulled into the shore. Bellowing and crying after the manner of baby seals it made a noise that caused some alarm to the young anglers. After the seal had made its way to the beach, Capt. Baker of the boathouse released it from the hook upon which, with more bellowing, it immediately turned around and flopped back into the water.
