SPEECH FROM THRONE IS COMPREHENSIVE

NEW LUMBER AND SHINGLE MILL IS TO BE BUILT AT SEAL COVE AT ONCE

New Canneries to be Built and Other Activities are now Being Arranged for Queen Charlottes

Sitka Spruce Mills at Queen Charlotte City doubling its output by putting on extra shift; bright outlook for Islands

With the construction of no less than four new canneries and a dog fish reduction plant projected, with the Sitka Spruce Mill at Queen Charlotte City doubling its crew and production and with the T. A. Kelley Logging Co. planning the taking out of logs on a bigger scale, the outlook for 1926 on the Queen Charlotte Islands is probably the brightest in the history of the Islands according to word reaching the city on the Prince John this morning.

Of the four new canneries, two will be located on Massett Inlet and two on Skidegate Inlet. Arriving at Port Clements on the Prince John this trip were Richard Gosse, J. Field Strang and William G. Mitchell of the Gosse-Miller Co. They are making surveys for a new cannery which will be established there and which it is expected will be in operation for this year's pack.

TWO INDUSTRIES MADE PROGRESS

Hon. T. D. Pattullo Tells About Timber Income and Hon. W. Sloan of Coal

VICTORIA, Jan. 8.—Improvement of the positions of two of British Columbia's leading industries are shown in figures made public today. Hon. T. D. Pattullo announced that forest revenue for the year 1925 totalled \$1,492,502, an increase of \$9,000 over the previous year, while penalties and interest collected on certain areas of timber licenses amounted to \$28,010 compared with \$64,953 in 1924. The province produced 509,000 tons more coal in 1925 than in 1924. Hon. William Sloan announced.

EATON TAKING OVER SPENCERS

Despatch to Financial Journal Says Big Company to Invade Vancouver

A special despatch from Vancouver to the Monetary Times dated December 26, says: Entry of T. Eaton & Company into the commercial life of Vancouver is prophesied for the first of the year, when the business now conducted under the name of David Spencer Limited will fly the Eaton flag. It has been declared for some time that Eaton money was interested in the Spencer store and it is expected that the change will be announced in a couple of weeks.

MEIGHEN SAYS NO GOVERNMENT

Concurs in Selection of Speaker But Makes Remark in Doing So

OTTAWA, Jan. 8.—During the election of Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux as speaker yesterday afternoon, Hon. Arthur Meighen, who concurred in the appointment, observed that Hon. Ernest Lapointe, who moved the resolution, was doing so only as a member of the House. He said Lapointe could not speak for the government "because there is no government."

Erect Shingle and Lumber Mill Here

There is to be another sawmill at Seal Cove and it will be in operation by the latter part of March according to an announcement made this afternoon by C. P. Riel of this city, principal of a newly-formed company, the Seal Cove Lumber Co. Ltd., for which incorporation papers are now being taken out. It will be a sawmill and shingle mill of 35,000 feet daily capacity, Mr. Riel stated. The machinery has already reached the city and construction will start within two weeks' time, the idea being to have the plant in operation by the end of March.

VICTORIA, Jan. 8.—Conviction of Charles "Sonny" White, the half breed, of murdering Frank Rosso, a North Vancouver storekeeper last June, was set aside this morning by the appeal court and a new trial ordered.

ROSS IS CONSERVATIVE LEADER IN THE SENATE

OTTAWA, Jan. 8.—Senator W. B. Ross of Cape Breton was elected leader of the Conservative party in the Senate this morning.

CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE.

Government to Reduce Taxation and Practice Economy says Governor

Speech from throne is comprehensive in scope and indicates period of intense political activity

OTTAWA, Jan. 8.—The speech from the throne at the formal opening of Parliament today announced the government's intention to substantially reduce taxation. Other main features of the speech are:

The consolidation of certain public departments with a view to economy.

Measures to retain those already on the land and to encourage urban dwellers to go on the land.

A rural credits scheme for the purpose of advancing money to farmers for the development of their farms.

The appointment of a tariff advisory board to make a study of tariff problems and advise the government what steps to take, with a view to its revision from time to time. Provision for this was made last session, and appointments to it are to be made forthwith.

The Board of Railway Commissioners to be instructed to include in its general rate investigation a special inquiry into the causes of the diversion of grain and other products through other than Canadian ports.

The completion forthwith of the Hudson Bay Railway.

A bill will be introduced transferring the natural resources of Alberta from the control of the federal government to the province.

Another bill will be introduced to amend the Dominion Elections Act.

COST OF ELECTION WAS TWO MILLION

OTTAWA, Dec. 8.—An estimate of the cost of the general federal election places it at \$2,100,000 or about 66 cents for each person who voted.

LUMBER EXPORTED FROM THIS DISTRICT

Six Thousand Cedar Poles Were Shipped to San Francisco During Year

The total lumber export from the mills at Queen Charlotte City and Swanson Bay for the year 1925 amounted to 7,750,000 board feet. This was all sent to United States Atlantic ports.

There were exported to San Francisco from Massett and Bella Goola 6,000 cedar poles by the Baxter Company.

Other lumber exports were made by the Georgetown Mill and the Prince Rupert Spruce Mills, the shipments being made by rail.

A very successful basket social was held at Skidegate Mission on Christmas eve when the Skidegate concert band used this

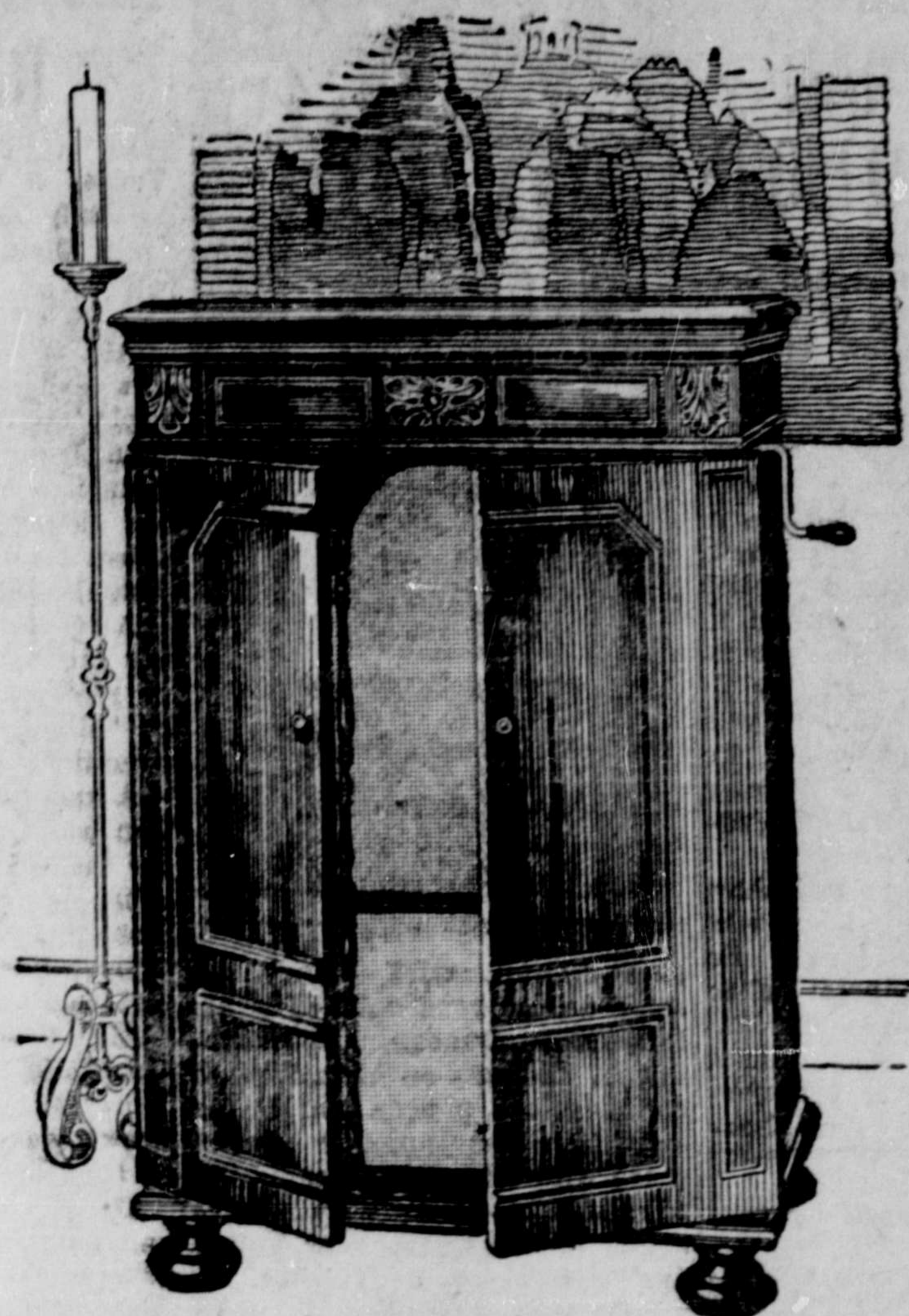

A resolution was passed placing the Trades & Labor Council on record as desiring a clean-up of "blind-piggers" and immoral conditions generally in the city. A unanimous vote of appreciation was tendered Mayor Newton for the support he has given the cause of labor in the past. Apart from this, the council did not express itself with respect to the forthcoming mayoralty contest.

Ald. Casey, Ald. Larsen and Ald. McKechnie were present and addressed the meeting. Ald. Brown was unavoidably prevented from being in attendance. There was a large attendance and municipal affairs and civic government were discussed at some length. President S. D. Macdonald occupied the chair.

AIRPLANES CRASH RESULT OF POORLY CONSTRUCTED EXHAUST

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Army air experts believe that in the exhaust stack they have found the firebug largely responsible for the tendency of crashed planes to burst into flames and which has cost many lives. The much repeated "flaming coffins" designation of certain old types of army planes by Colonel William Mitchell arose from this tendency.

An air service report said that thirty crash tests were conducted on obsolete airplanes. It was discovered that the exhaust stack was a very serious source of fire, and that if it were possible to so design an exhaust stack that it would be cool enough to prevent the self-ignition of gasoline or oil, sprayed into the stack, the number of fires would be very greatly reduced. Preliminary designs of standard length, water cooled exhaust manifolds and short air-cooled manifolds have shown that it is entirely possible to prevent fires from this source," said the report.

COLORED MAN MAY BE DEPORTED IF FOUND DESIRABLE

VANCOUVER, Dec. 8.—Whether Ben Esau, one-armed negro and well-known character in Vancouver's underworld, is liable for deportation will be decided by a board of enquiry following his arrest by Detective Ellice upon information furnished by D. J. Hyndman of the immigration department today.

Esau, who professes to have been born in the Barbadoes is held by the immigration officials who claim that his birth-place was Singapore, which makes him liable to be deported. Esau a short time ago was charged with having stabbed Pete Crudello during a fight over a half-breed woman in a house on 20th Avenue, E., but he was discharged by Judge Cayley.

HALIFAX ELEVATOR PROVED USEFUL TO DISCHARGE A CARGO

HALIFAX, Jan. 8.—The new Halifax grain elevator was operated for the first time, when 40,000 bushels of grain were shot through the steamer Ellerdale. It was stated that the elevator met the test satisfactorily. The Ellerdale loaded originally in Montreal, but while en route to England went ashore in the Strait of Belle Isle, and was brought here on Nov. 2 for repairs. Here she discharged her cargo of 475,000 bushels into the Halifax elevator, which was just completed. The Ellerdale was reloaded without a hitch and the vessel continued her voyage.
